#### B. <u>Discuss Proposed Local School Bond Election for November 1990</u> (Dr

(Dr. Wilson)

For some time the District has carefully complied with the regulations adopted by the State Allocation Board (SAB) regarding the construction of new schools. This includes SAB's requirement concerning year-round school. We placed on file a letter committing the District to initiate year-round school by September of 1992 if a local study supports its feasibility. Until now this committment has been sufficient in order for the District to fully participate in the state building program. This full participation has carried through the allocation of projects funded from the June 1990 State Bond Election. Those projects are as follows:

#### B. Discuss Proposed Local School Bond Election for November 1990 (Cont'd)

It now appears that our letter of commitment may no longer be sufficient to continue participation in the state building program. At a recent meeting with representatives from the Office of Local Assistance it was stated that districts may in the future have to meet one of the following criteria:

- . Be on year-round school
- . Share 50/50 in the cost of construction
- . Have attempted to pass a local bond election during the past two years

In addition to those projects listed above that have been funded by the June Bond, there are additional projects which qualify for funding should a November State Bond Election also successfully occur. The District has been informed that modernization projects will not be funded from the June Bond Election and as such these are now included under projects which qualify for funding from a successful November State Bond Election. This creates an additional urgency in that reroofing of Rubidoux High School for a cost of approximately \$400,000 is absolutely critical. If Bond funds are not available for this reroofing, District educational funds will have to be used. Those projects are:

There is a need for two elementary schools for which the district does not presently qualify but which represent long range needs. They are:

The grand total of all projects yet to be funded is estimated at \$78.5 million with \$39.25 million being District's share for participation in a plan where the costs are shared 50/50 with the State.

It's apparent that the stage has been set requiring Districts to choose between year-round education or sharing 50% of the costs of future construction.

In Jurupa, to continue to build classrooms under such new requirements would necessitate a local election giving the Board the option of issuing bonds. It may be that as part of a bond campaign, a commitment to the community would be made that the bonds would be sold only if full funding from the State plan is not available and only if community preference was to build more schools utilizing the matching bond money rather than placing existing schools on multitrack year-round.

Based on the assessed valuation of the properties encompassed by the boundaries of Jurupa Unified School District, an assessment of six-tenths of one cent per \$100 of assessed valuation will retire in 15 years \$1 million in construction bonds. Thus 9¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation will retire in 15 years \$15 million in construction bonds, 12.9¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation will retire in 15 years \$21.5 million in construction bonds, and 23.6¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation will retire in 15 years \$39.25 million.

To give some feel for the increased assessment on property the following information is helpful.

#### B. Discuss Proposed Local School Bond Election for November 1990 Cont'd)

A successful local bond election would also open the option of working directly with developers in a shared effort to finance schools. This option would be especially attractive should the November State Bond Election fail and the state building program come to a halt.

Without a successful state bond election, year-round school planning should be completed by July of 1991 so that implementation for September 1992 can occur.

Bonds would be issued for the purpose of raising money for the acquisition of land and the construction of elementary and secondary schools; furnishing and equipping school facilities; modernization of existing classrooms and school facilities, and air conditioning existing classrooms and school facilities throughout the entire district.

With this in mind, administration recommends the Board adopt Resolutions #91/01 and #91/02 calling a \$39.25 million local bond election for November, 1990, which will be hand carried to the meeting.

#### C. Input for 1991/92 CSBA Legislative Platform

(Mr. Chavez)

Each year the CSBA Legislative Platform provides an opportunity for school districts in California to submit suggestions on specific issues of concern. Input forms must be received by July 31, 1990. The forms will be separated by issue and presented to the CSBA Legislative and Finance Committees in August for consideration. In September, the CSBA Board of Directors will review the proposed 1991/92 Legislative Platform and then recommend the document to the Delegate assembly for adoption in November. The supporting documents include a copy of the input form for review. Board members may wish to suggest some issues for consideration.

#### D. Request CSBA Recycling Support

(Dr. Wilson)

Board member Mary Burns has asked Mr. Chavez, as a member of the CSBA Delegate Assembly, to request CSBA to identify and support appropriate legislative remedies which will stimulate the purchase of paper products manufactured from recycled materials. This need is fully explained in a proposed letter from the Board to Mrs. Maureen DiMarco, President of the California School Boards Association. The letter is included in the supporting documents and accompanied by Resolution #91/03. Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #91/03.

#### COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

RECOGNIZE 23RD DISTRICT PTSA PRINCIPAL OF THE YEAR Mrs. Twombley, Public Information Officer, announced that Mr. Don Manzo, principal of Mission Middle School, was honored by the 23rd District PTSA as the "1990 Principal of the Year." Mr. Manzo has been with the Jurupa District fourteen years and principal of Mission Middle School for nine years. He graduated from the University of Redlands and received his master's degree from Cal State University, Fullerton.

RECOGNIZE PDK AWARD RECIPIENTS Mrs. Twombley, Public Information Officer, announced that Phi Delta Kappa, the professional fraternity for the field of education, recently honored two Jurupa administrators. Mr. Dave Hutchins, principal of Nueva Vista High School and also the district's Principal of the Year, received the Management Award in recognition of his outstanding leadership and community skills.

Mr. Hutchins has been with the district twenty-two years beginning as a teacher at Mission Middle School, then dean, assistant principal and principal of Nueva Vista High School.

The second administrator to be honored by PDK was Dr. Ron Needham, Assistant Principal at Jurupa Valley High School, who was the recipient of the Achievement Award for his contributions to PDK activities and leadership and service roles. Dr. Needham has been with the district fourteen years, beginning as a science teacher at Rubidoux High School, and after a short leave as assistant principal at Rubidoux and now Jurupa Valley High School.

President Ruane congratulated the administrators and noted the Board was proud to have them on the team.

RECOGNIZE GRADUATES

The Assistant Superintendent Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment, noted that more than 560 high school graduates received diplomas last week as noted in the supporting documents.

RECOGNIZE RHS AWARDS CEREMONY The Superintendent stated that a quarter million dollars representing 56 scholarships and/or grants were presented to Rubidoux High School graduates. A major award was a four-year scholarship.

RECOGNIZE BILINGUAL EDUCATORS The Assistant Superintendent Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment stated the district has more than 1200 Limited English Proficient students. Two district employees were among those being honored at the Third Annual Inland Empire Bilingual Recognition Program for effectively providing quality education for these students. They were Lupe Lopez, District Bilingual Resource teacher, and Esther Askew, Bilingual Teacher at Rustic Lane Elementary School.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Ruane noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board. Comments should be brief and concise, and refrain from discussing personnel in the district.

PRESENT RHS

Mr. Vince Rosse, Advisor for the Yearbook at Rubidoux High School, introduced Shelly Rodrigo, who will be Senior Editor in Chief next year. Ms. Rodrigo presented 1990 yearbooks to Board members and thanked them for their support.

COMMENTS ON ELEMENTARY VOCAL MUSIC PROGRAM Ms. Kathleen Scott, elementary vocal music teacher, played a cassette tape of a few selections from the spring vocal concert held this past April. She asked the Board to restore the elementary music program and accept her proposal for continuing the program with one teacher if the two teachers leaving will not be replaced. The program is important in providing students with a well rounded education.

Mr. Chuck Dunn, Resource Specialist at Jurupa Valley High School, addressed the Board as a community member. He asked the Board not to eliminate the elementary music program. The expense of the program was worth it because not every student is athletically inclined. Some need an opportunity to participate in other activities that provide a feeling of pride and accomplishment. Many people in the community would appreciate if the Board could find a way to keep the music program.

Mrs. Melody Arganda, who resides at 5952 Winncliff Drive and teaches in the Fontana District, stated she was a member of the Indian Hills Alliance which is a group of local residents concerned about the community. She expressed disappointment that the music program may be cut because it was an alternative for children who did not participate in sports or who were not academically inclined. She felt the music program was essential for students and the district should look elsewhere for cuts.

Mrs. Karen Bell, teacher at Rubidoux High School, stated that she began teaching in Jurupa schools in September 1969 during the worst crisis in the district. At that time many special programs such as music and instrumental were eliminated and it has taken quite some time to recuperate. However, for several months employees have been asked to cut successful programs that benefit students. In her opinion, Proposition 98 would provide the funds to continue the music program as well as junior varsity programs. Mrs. Bell also suggested the Board give consideration to reorganizing the budget process so it better serves the needs of the district.

Joanna Gonzales, student at Glen Avon School and member of the honor choir, stated the music program was very good this year. Students had the experience of singing with middle and high school students at a concert. She noted her two younger sisters love to sing and would be disappointed if the program were cut.

Mrs. Linda Gonzales, parent of Joanna, urged the Board not to eliminate the music program. It was a very important tool for developing listening skills, and motor rythmic skills which were all essential at the elementary level. Performing at concerts provides an opportunity for children to excel and demonstrate their talents and abilities.

Ms. Joan Bruce, PE teacher at Rubidoux High School, informed the Board that 59 freshmen signed up for the girls tennis team. She reiterated her previous stand to restore the cuts at the junior varsity level. A memo from the athletic director encouraging students to participate in sports at the high school was distributed.

Mrs. Lorraine Ellison, parent of three children at Van Buren School, requested that the music program remain a part of the curriculum. The district has programs for the gifted, bilingual Head Start and music should be included.

Mrs. Sheila Ladwig, stated that she will have children in middle school and kindergarten next year. She agreed with other speakers that music draws students out of their shells. Only through patience and guidance from the elementary teachers can students learn to express themselves.

Mrs. Amy Davidson, a parent of Sky Country School, encouraged the Board to reinstate a full vocal music program. To the question, "Why teach music"? Mrs. Davidson gave three answers: Music is a part of the world around us, music is part of our heritage, and music is expression. Children should not miss out on this experience. She personally thanked Kathleen Scott, music teacher at Sky Country School, for her dedication and accomplishments.

Mr. Bill White, parent who resides in the Sky Country area, recognized the fact that this was a period of hard decisions for the school district. Some children have more difficulty exceling academically and that gap can be bridged through music and athletic programs. He recommended the music program and junior varsity programs continue next year. Some suggestions for supplementing the programs were: eliminate blacktop resurfacing, ask the Parks District for quicker payment of its portion for the Jurupa Valley swimming pool, and consider Redevelopment Agency income, TRANS Money, and Mello Roos for the farmland.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

- Board member Jose Medina attended two middle school promotion exercises and the Rubidoux High School graduation. He commended the behavior of the students and organization of ceremonies. Mr. Chavez agreed and noted that one scholarship was given for the fourth year on Awards Night at Rubidoux High School.
- Mr. Chavez said he would be attending the CSBA Delegate Assembly in Sacramento on July 28-29. At the request of Mrs. Burns, he had administration draft a letter to the president of CSBA requesting their support for recycled paper products and tax incentives for using secondary resources. A letter accompanied by a resolution should be sent to CSBA so that the subject of recyled paper can be on the agenda for discussion. The Superintendent indicated the documents would be included in the July 2 Board agenda for consideration.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS (Cont'd)

- Mr. Chavez announced that CSBA is requesting suggestions for the 1990/91 Legislative Platform. He asked Board members to suggest some issues at the next Board meeting that can be recommended to the Platform.
- Mr. Chavez commented that he felt the State Budget will provide a 4.7 COLA which would allow the district to restore some of the cuts. urged citizens to write to the legislators about their concerns.
- Board member Mary Burns expressed appreciation to president Sandra Ruane for accompanying her on tours of the schools and introducing her to principals and staff members. Mrs. Ruane's team work was appreciated.
- President Ruane announced that she attended all graduations and received the class at Nueva Vista High School. All Board members participated in one or more ceremonies.

The incentives for encouraging employees to rideshare and/or utilize alternative modes transportation were approved by the Board on June 4, 1990. Implementation at the sites involved should begin in late August when most employees return to work. It is hopeful the plan will be effective in reaching the goal of 1.5 ridership within this area.

The Assistant Superintendent Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment stated that earlier in the year she sent Board members some information related to the Renaissance Project developed by Sue Teele and Dr. David Thornberg of the University of California at Riverside. It was a wonderful opportunity for students at Ina Arbuckle Elementary School to participate in this project which will last for three years. The ultimate goal of the program is to increase student achievement by helping teachers modify instructional methods to take into account the various intelligences, or put another way, the unique learning strengths that students demonstrate. Each teacher participating in the project will have a computer. There will be no cost to the district's general fund.

PRESIDENT RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE DISTRICT'S PARTICIPATION IN THE RENAISSANCE PROJECT FOR THE 1990/91 SCHOOL YEAR. MR. MEDINA SECONDED THE MOTION. The Assistant Superintendent added that if Dr. Thornberg is in the area during the summer she may be able to arrange a presentation for Board members. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT 1990/91 40 SPECIAL FUNDS -Motion #332 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services acknowledged the efforts of Mrs. Barbara Reul, Director of Business Services, and her staff for preparing the documents for 40 special funds that serve many purposes as summarized in the supporting documents.

President Ruane asked if that was the original money in the special reserve fund for the Indian Hills School Park. The Assistant Superintendent replied the district originally received \$60,000. The fund has been both expended and gaining interest for several years at the rate of about \$20,000 per year. 1990/91 should be the last year for this special fund.

PRESIDENT RUANE MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT THE 1990/91 TENTATIVE BUDGETS FOR ALL THE DISTRICT FUNDS LISTED IN THE ANNOTATED AGENDA. MR. MEDINA SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

DISCUSS 1990/91 TENTATIVE BUDGET The Assistant Superintendent Business Services summarized the process to produce a balanced budget based on the information at hand. Several months ago, preliminary budget projections, based on the Governor's proposed 3% COLA, indicated a shortfall of about \$3 million. In March, administration began to take actions to reduce expenditures, bring the budget into balance and maintain some reserve. The list of expenditure reductions for this year and next year were reviewed and should maintain a reserve of \$965,000. Hopefully, adoption of the State Budget will result in additional revenue.

DISCUSS 1990/91 TENTATIVE BUDGET (Cont'd)

The Superintendent added that several quidelines emerged in the development of the Tentative Budget. A strong effort was made to avoid cuts which would result in the loss of a job by someone already employed in the district. For instance, two of the teachers in the elementary vocal music program had submitted resignations and the third would be provided a classroom instructional position. He noted that a strong effort was also made to minimize the impact on students. However, that goal was not realized in three areas: Elementary Vocal Music Program where K-4 students receive about 25 minutes per week and are supplemented by the classroom teacher, and the Junior Varsity programs for soccer and tennis. He noted that morale was a high concern as well as the sensitivity of the issue of cuts as administration developed the budget to stay within the framework of 3%. President Ruane added that she was hopeful the State Budget would be adopted at 4% or better and that she would be willing to adopt the district's Tentative Budget with a stipulation that when funds are available, the Board would reinstate the vocal music program and junior varsity tennis and soccer programs.

Mr. Medina stated that he was appreciative of the input for the past several months on both sides of the issues. With a \$965,000 reserve, he felt the district could reinstate the junior varsity tennis and soccer programs and fund one music teacher to keep the elementary vocal music program continuing.

Mr. Barnes asked if the State required a minimum reserve. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services explained that school districts follow a new process instituted by the State called Budget Standards and Criteria. The responses in the Tentative Budget regarding the reserve are not critical because the State has not adopted its budget. However, if the reserve for the Final Budget is below 3% or \$1.7 million, the County could request more analysis before it is sent to the State.

Mr. Chavez stated that a \$965,000 reserve should be the minimum for the district. He felt the request to operate an elementary music program with one position instead of three would be difficult but only require about one-third of the cost. The Board has the options of reinstating some programs and cutting into the reserve, or adopting the Tentative Budget as presented and prioritizing the list of twenty reductions on page 12 of the agenda for reinstatement as funds are available. Mr. Barnes agreed that it might be helpful to prioritize the list for future reference but he felt it would be beneficial for planning purposes to block in approximately \$70,000 from the reserve for the junior varsity coaches and a single vocal music teacher in the Tentative Budget.

Mrs. Burns stated that ultimately she would prefer to reinstate the entire music program, but that cannot be done until the State has determined the COLA for school districts. She felt the one teacher should be given an opportunity to continue a minimal program and eventually funds may be available to fully reinstate it.

DISCUSS 1990/91 TENTATIVE BUDGET (Cont'd) President Ruane stated that she would prefer to adopt the 1990/91 Tentative General Fund Budget with the reinstatement of junior varsity soccer and tennis, and one vocal music teacher with the stipulation the whole program would be reinstated when money is available. Mrs. Ruane pointed out that although the music program will not be as effective with only one teacher, she would rather do that than lose the whole program. This program would be the No. 1 priority for reinstatement on the list of reductions.

ADOPT 1990/91 TENTATIVE BUDGET WITH TWO CHANGES -Motion #333 MR. MEDINA MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT THE 1990/91 TENTATIVE GENERAL FUND BUDGET AS PRESENTED WITH TWO CHANGES: REINSTATE JUNIOR VARSITY SOCCER AND TENNIS PROGRAMS WHICH INCLUDES EIGHT ASSISTANT COACH POSITIONS FOR BOTH RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL AND JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL; AND REINSTATE ONE MUSIC TEACHER TO ASSIST AT ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS THROUGHOUT THE DISTRICT. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services noted the cost would be \$71,849 and reduce the reserve to about \$894,000. Mr. Chavez cautioned about the tight reserve. Mr. Medina stated he realized the difficult financial position of the district at this time, however, many people in the community are still hopeful the school district will eventually reinstate sixth period at the middle schools. Barnes commended administration and the Business Services staff their hard work to develop a balanced budget for next year. referred to the priority list and pointed out that the environment of Jurupa schools was also very important and this is another area on the list for consideration. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE BID SECURITY AMOUNT -Motion #334 PRESIDENT RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE BID SECURITY REQUIREMENTS AS FOLLOWS: 1) PUBLIC WORK BIDS - 10% OF BID AMOUNT; 2) SERVICES, SUPPLIES, AND MATERIAL BIDS - \$50 OR 5% OF BID AMOUNT, WHICHEVER IS GREATER. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AWARD LEGAL BID FOR ASBESTOS ABATEMENT -Motion #335 MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AWARD LEGAL BID #90/16L, ASBESTOS ABATEMENT FOR SIX DISTRICT SITES, TO CONTRACTORS SPECIALTY SERVICE, INC., OF CHERRY VALLEY, AND THAT PURCHASE ORDER #62930, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$15,688, BE ISSUED TO COVER THIS PROJECT. MR. MEDINA SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

EXTEND CONTRACT FOR ASPHALT MAINTENANCE -Motion #336 MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AWARD LEGAL BID #89/26L TO PACIFIC ASPHALT MAINTENANCE COMPANY OF ONTARIO FOR MONTHLY ASPHALT MAINTENANCE, AND IT BE EXTENDED THROUGH JUNE 30, 1991, AND THAT PURCHASE ORDER #62931, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$52,800, BE ISSUED TO COVER THIS WORK FOR 1990/91. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

FUTURE LOCAL SCHOOL BOND ELECTION The Superintendent reported that the \$800 million state construction bond in the November General Election may be distributed differently than in the past. The State may change its eligibility requirements and insist that districts meet one of three criteria: 1) Be on year-round school; 2) Share 50/50 in the cost of construction; 3) Have attempted to pass a local bond election during the past two years.

The Superintendent further explained that the district has a commitment on file with the Office of Local Assistance to initiate year-round school if a study indicated its feasibility. However, this may not be acceptable under the new eligibility requirements.

The Superintendent distributed an information report which analyzed future facility needs and explained why a local bond election is a significant factor in such continued planning. The report outlined projects funded from the June 1990 State Bond Election, projects eligible for funding if a November 1990 state bond election is successful, and future projects in need of funding. He emphasized the important of the district maintaining its options with the State by complying with the new requirements.

For the district to call a local bond election in conjunction with the General Election in November would be a substantial savings in cost. However, the timeline would make it necessary to bring the appropriate resolutions for action at the July 2 Board meeting.

Mr. Barnes suggested holding off with a local bond election until 1994. He felt this requirement was part of an evergrowing state bureaucracy of requiring school districts to have a local bond election or lose its position for funding. Past history of local elections in this area shows the voters have been against raising local property taxes. Mr. Chavez mentioned the same concerns.

Mr. Medina asked how the Jurupa District has avoided putting 10% of its students on year-round. The Superintendent explained that a letter is on file from the State Department of Education that commits the district to a feasibility study no later than July 1992 but does not required the district to go on year-round. However, under new requirements that may not be sufficient and the district may have to go on year-round or hold a local bond election.

Mr. Chavez stated that if there has to be a choice between a local bond election and year-round school, he would be in favor of the bond election. The Superintendent concluded that a detailed report will be provided at the July 2 Board meeting.

UPDATE ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION The Director of Administrative Services reported that the district broke ground last week to begin construction of the new Granite Hill Elementary School; the swimming pool at Jurupa Valley High School was in use for the first time June 25, 1990; the first addition to Jurupa Valley High School breaks ground June 26, 1990.

Dear Ms. DiMarco:

In California, legislation has recently been passed requiring cities and counties to reduce the amount of waste they send to the landfill annually, by 25% by January 1, 1995. Many school districts, in response to this legislation, are implementing programs designed to recycle the waste paper generated within the schools. As a further measure, most districts are considering procurement programs to purchase paper manufactured from recycled materials to supply California Schools. We are looking for long range solutions to the landfill crisis.

We have encountered difficulty, however, in locating sources where recycled paper can be purchased as inexpensively as paper manufactured from virgin pulp. There are a variety of reasons for this price difference. At one time the demand for the paper could not be demonstrated. Therefore, the manufacturers have been reluctant to manufacture recycled products. As increased demand has recently begun to be felt within that industry, the demand now outsteps the supply, causing the prices to increase. One other reason is federal subsidies for forest product consumers. These incentives while saving those paper manufacturers millions of dollars creates a disincentive for them to manufacture paper from recycled fiber. In addition, these subsidies allow the manufacturers to sell virgin pulp products at a reduced rate over recycled paper products. While we as consumers do not feel that these incentives should be repealed, we feel that the playing field should be leveled in the form of tax incentives for using secondary resources so that recycled paper can be utilized by government entities more easily.

The 1990s have been declared the decade of the environment by the President, we feel that the government of the United States of America should reflect that declaration by acting to stimulate the use of recycled materials and encourage industry to make better use of these secondary resources.


