1. Recognition

a. Recognize new Adopt-A-School Partnership between Sunnyslope Elementary School and Carl's Jr. Restaurant (Mrs. Twombley)

An Adopt-A-School partnership is being formalized between Carl's Jr. Restaurant and Sunnyslope Elementary School. The Board is proud to recognize this new partnership through the signing of an adoption certificate.

Ms. Kim Boyer, Manager of the Carl's Jr. Restaurant located on Ben Nevis Blvd., has met with Principal Gary Hale to develop activities which will be beneficial to the students of Sunnyslope school.

These activities include providing weekly and monthly incentives for teachers to utilize in motivational programs, possible field trips to the restaurant, and career/vocational speakers at appropriate levels. b. Recognize the Third Annual Jurupa Family Picnic

(Mrs. Twombley)

The third annual Jurupa Family Picnic was held on Saturday, October 6, 1990 at Memorial Park in Rubidoux. This special event is planned for the enjoyment of JUSD employees and their family members and guests. Attendance on Saturday topped 920.

The picnic opened at 10:00 a.m. with registration in the front of the park. Rubidoux High School campus supervisor Harrison Cole, better known as "Sir Duke," provided disc jockey entertainment throughout the day.

Several competitive events were held on Saturday. 16 teams of volleyball players competed for first and second place. First place went to Nueva Vista High School and second place to Jurupa Valley High School. A softball tournament was added this year with 11 teams competing in this event. Jurupa Valley High School took first place in this event with Mission Middle School receiving second place.

Thirty entries were submitted in the Cake-Baking Contest which included two divisions: Best Tasting and Cake Decorating. The entries were judged by Board member David Barnes, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services Kent Campbell, NEA-J President Fran Rice, Employees Terry Glass and Penni Wilburg, and our clown for the day Mr. Harold Dennis. In the "Best Tasting" Division, first place went to the Lemon Lovers Cake made by Penni Wilburg from the Education Center, second place to the Pumpkin Pudding Cake made by Lynda Durand from West Riverside School and third place to the Lemon Cake by Diana Trust at Jurupa Valley High School. It was difficult to judge the very unique entries in the Cake Decorating Division because they were all very creative. Second place was awarded to Deanna Long from Ina Arbuckle for "Making A Difference," and third place went to the Dirt Cake in the flower pot made by Janet Templin at Camino Real.

* c. Adopt Resolution #91/16, Commitment to a Drug-Free Community (Mrs. Rubio)

Mrs. Roberts, Assistant Superintendent Education Services, will introduce Mrs. Lorraine Rubio, teacher on special assignment for the D.A.T.E. (Drug, Alcohol, and Tobacco Education) Project.

Californians for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. (CADFY) and the State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs have announced that its fourth annual California RED RIBBON CAMPAIGN will be held October 20-28, 1990. Other sponsors include the State Department of Education, the California Parent Teacher Association and the Attorney General's Crime Prevention Center. In 1985, Federal Agent Enrique Camarena was murdered by drug traffickers and the Red Ribbon Campaign was begun in support of a drug-free nation. The red ribbon is a visible support for the value "My Choice, Drug-Free." The Red Ribbon Campaign provides the framework for a positive prevention strategy.

The Jurupa Unified School District and "Jurupans United for Substance Abuse Training (J.U.S.T. Draw the Line) plan to coordinate a program encouraging employees and community members to wear a red ribbon during this week as visible support for a drug-free community.

This is an opportunity to create district-wide positive peer pressure, provide educational drug-free activities, and engage community support. All school sites have personalized Red Ribbon Week objectives in support of this campaign.

Board member Jose Medina will serve as the district's Representative Delegate to elect members to fill County Committee vacancies at the Annual ACSA/CSBA Fall Conference on October 30, 1990, at Raincross Square.

* C. Hear Report on 1989/90 California Assessment Program Test Results for Grades Three, Six and Eight (Mrs. Roberts)

BACKGROUND

Governor Deukmejian recently deleted the funding for the California Assessment Program from the current State budget. It is his intent that funds for CAP be deducted from Proposition 98 monies. At this time we are uncertain, until a new Governor is elected, about the future of this program. However, the district recently received results from CAP tests administered last spring in grades 3, 6, and 8.

The main purpose of the statewide testing program is to evaluate instructional programs over time. The California Assessment Program does not report individual student scores. The technique used to assess the effectiveness of the instructional programs of schools and districts throughout the State of California is by matrix-sampling. In a matrix-sampled test, each student takes only a small portion of a test and results are averaged for groups. Using matrix sampling allows the California Assessment Program to assess a number of curricular objectives. Over 1,000 items per grade level are available to be included on the various forms of the CAP test and there are approximately 18 to 40 different test forms at varying grade levels.

CAP SCORES

CAP results are reported as Scaled Scores (SS), ranging from approximately 100-400. Scaled scores remain stable and allow us to compare performance over time. From these scores, Statewide Ranks (SR) and Relative Ranks (RR) are derived.

* C. Hear Report on 1989/90 California Assessment Program Test Results for Grades Three, Six and Eight

CAP SCORES (Cont'd)

Statewide and relative ranks are computed on a scale of from 1 - 99. The statewide rank compares a district's, or a school's, scaled score with every other district or school in the state. A relative rank compares a district's or a school's score with districts or schools with similar background characteristics. Both Relative Ranks and Statewide Ranks change annually as they are dependent on the performance of the group taking the test. Typically, schools with higher parent education and income levels out-perform schools where these factors are less favorable. The number of students in a school who are limited English proficient also tends to negatively impact scores.

COMPARISON GROUPS

A school's comparison group for reporting relative ranks is determined by computing a composite index which includes the socioeconomic level, the percent of students with limited English speaking ability, student mobility and the percent of students receiving Aid to Families With Dependent Children (A.F.D.C.). All schools are ranked from high to low on the basis of the current composite index and a school's comparison group consists of the 10% of the schools ranked immediately above and 10% of the schools ranked below that school's location on the list of school rankings. It should be noted that rankings change from year to year and are based on the responses placed on the information form for each student taking the test.

For districts, the relative rank is computed by averaging the comparison group ranks for all schools in the district.

Background Factors

As indicated, several background factors are used to determine which districts and schools are alike and thus, are likely to have similar achievement. Background factor information also is presented along with test scores so that schools and districts can monitor changes in the nature of their student populations.

SES: Socioeconomic Status

For grades 3 and 6, parent occupation is used as an indicator of SES. A value of 1 to 3 is assigned according to the occupation level of the student's parents (1 stands for unskilled employees; 2 stands for skilled and semiskilled employees; 3 stands for semiprofessional and professional employees). for example, an index of 2.00 at a school would mean that, on the average, the parents of students attending that school have occupations that are classified as skilled or semiskilled.

For grades 8 and 12, the parents' education level is used as an indicator of SES. A value of 1 to 5 is assigned according to the educational level of the student's parents (1 stands for those who did not graduate from high school; 5 indicates parents with advanced degrees). For example, an index of 3.00 at a school would mean that, on the average, the parents of students attending that school have attended some college.

* C. Hear Report on 1989/90 California Assessment Program Test Results for Grades Three, Six and Eight

Background Factors (Cont'd)

LEP: Limited English Proficient

The Limited English proficient (LEP) percentages are for the grade level being tested and may not reflect the percent of LEP students in a school. Districtwide, the percentage of LEP pupils increased at two CAP grades. Third grade showed a slight increase from 9.6% to 10.2%, sixth grade increased from 6.5% to 7.8%, while 8th grade showed a decrease from 5.0 % to 4.3%.

SUMMARY OF RESULTS

In basic skills, mathematics scores were highest at all three grade levels. Third grade scaled scores increased sixteen points, from 282 to 298. Sixth graders increased their average scaled score by 5 points, moving from 272 in 1988/89 to 277 in 1989/90. Eighth grade mathematics scores rose 4 points.

Written expression, which is tested at third and sixth grade levels in a multiple choice format was the next highest ranked area. While the scores at both grade levels dropped by 1 scaled score point and 3 points respectively, our relative ranks indicate achievement within the average range at third grade and in the top quarter of the distribution at sixth grade.

Reading scaled scores at all three grade levels remained virtually unchanged. The average scaled score for third graders, 271, is the same as reported for the previous year. The sixth grade scaled score declined by 3 points and the eighth grade average score dropped 1 point.

Eighth grade History/Social Science and Science scores continued an upward trend. Scaled scores in both subjects improved by one point.

Clearly, the two year decline in our reading and written expression performance can be attributed to the discrepancy between the goals and objectives in the State English Language Arts Framework which we are implementing and the content being tested by CAP which is based on older curriculum frameworks. If CAP continues, and tests are revised to reflect the curriculum currently being taught in our schools, we anticipate that there will be a return to higher levels of performance in these two subject areas.

The supporting documents contain a 4 year summary of results for the district and each school. In addition, Background Factor Summaries are included for a two-year period. Information item only.

D. Review and Act on District Advisory Committee Matters

** 1. Approve District Advisory Committee Members

State regulations governing Consolidated Application programs mandate that districts receiving State Compensatory Education Funds consult with parents regarding the planning of programs in the expenditure of these funds. In addition, the State regulations require that school districts with fifty-one (51), or more, limited English proficient pupils establish a district Bilingual Advisory Committee. Federal Chapter 1 regulations require consultation with parents, as do the State regulations for the Gifted and Talented program.

In response to the mandates of these various programs, the district has traditionally formed a District Advisory Committee composed of parent representatives from each school site receiving categorical funds. School sites have submitted names of candidates to serve on these committees.

Procedures for selecting members and operating such committees are outlined in District Policy 1221.3.

After consideration in closed session, it is recommended that the Board approve the 1990/91 members of the District Advisory Committee for the Consolidated Application and District Bilingual Advisory Committee.

* E. Adopt Resolution #91/15 Amending and Adopting Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (Mr. Edmunds)

The District is required to adopt and maintain a set of guidelines and procedures for evaluating the potential environmental impact of projects pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Within the last two years there have been changes made to CEQA by the Legislature and courts, and our current CEQA Guidelines should be revised to incorporate these changes. The supporting documents contain a memorandum from district counsel, Best, Best & Krieger, explaining the changes that have been made to our CEQA Guidelines. A copy of the CEQA Guidelines is available for inspection in the Business Office. Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 91/15 Amending and Adopting Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act.



RULES FOR THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

- 1. A candidate must be nominated <u>from the floor</u> at the election meeting by an authorized representative delegate.
- 2. A candidate must be a citizen and, if nominated for a supervisorial district, must reside within that supervisorial district. A Candidate for Member-At-Large may reside anywhere in Riverside County.
- 3. A candidate may be nominated for both a supervisorial district and for membership-at-large. However, a candidate who is subsequently elected to both positions must accept the supervisorial district position.
- 4. A candidate cannot be an employee of either the County Superintendent of Schools, a school district, or a community college district. However, any member of the governing board of a school district or community college district in the same or any other county who is otherwise eligible may simultaneously serve as a member of the county committee.
- 5. An authorized representative delegate may cast one vote for each vacant position.

WHEREAS, the School Board of Jurupa Unified School District must revise its local guidelines for implementing CEQA to make them consistent with the current provisions of CEQA.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the School Board of Jurupa Unified School District as follows:

SECTION ONE: Adoption of Local CEQA Guidelines. The School Board of Jurupa Unified School District hereby adopts "Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (1990 Revision)," a copy of which is on file at the



School District's office and is available for inspection by the public.

SECTION TWO: <u>Prior Actions Repealed</u>. All prior actions of the School Board enacting earlier guidelines are hereby repealed.

ING THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT

INTRODUCTION

As you know, the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") requires you to assess whether a particular activity will have a significant effect on the environment. In this regard, we have prepared local guidelines to assist you in implementing the provisions of CEQA. Since our last revision of your local CEQA guidelines in 1989, the California Legislature and the courts have made some important changes to CEQA. Our 1990 revision of your local CEQA guidelines attempts to incorporate each of the important changes in a manner consistent with your current staff procedures.

While we believe these local guidelines provide an up-to-date manual for your environmental review process, we strongly advise you to consult with us when questions arise, particularly with regard to major projects. This memorandum describes the most significant changes made to your guidelines in this 1990 revision, and reflects new law through December of 1989.

1990 REVISIONS

A. NOTICE OF PREPARATION OF DRAFT NEGATIVE DECLARATION OR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT

were made in Assembly Bill 886 which became effective January 1, 1990. Under AB 886, CEQA now requires direct mailing of a notice of preparation of a draft Environmental Impact Report ("EIR") or negative declaration to occupants in addition to owners of property contiguous to a project area. Specific notice requirements have also been enacted for waste burning projects. These requirements have been added to your guidelines in a new section entitled Notice Requirements for Waste and Fuel Burning Projects. Also, a notice of preparation must now be posted by the county clerk (or clerk of the Board of Supervisors depending on local practice) for a minimum of 30 days.

Public review periods for a draft EIR or negative declaration have been changed. Previously, a Lead Agency was required only to have a "reasonable" review period for a negative declaration. Our recommendation had been that a public review period for a negative declaration be at least 10 days. Now CEQA states that the public review period for a negative declaration must not be less than 21 days, or 30 days if submitted to the State Clearinghouse. A new sec-

Publication of a Negative Declaration. The public review period for a draft EIR shall not be less than 30 days, or 45 days if submitted to the State Clearinghouse. This review period for an EIR was already specified in your guidelines.

Generally, the review period established by the Lead Agency must be at least as long as the review period established by the State Clearinghouse. If a shorter review period is desired, a written request may be made to the Office of Planning and Research. This shorter review period may not be less than 30 days for a draft EIR or 21 days for a negative declaration. A shortened review period is not available for any proposed project of statewide, regional or areawide environmental significance. Finally, a shortened review period must be given prior to (and reflected in) the public notice provided for the preparation of an EIR or negative declaration.

B. MANDATORY PREPARATION OF AN EIR FOR WASTE BURNING PROJECTS

The Legislature has added a section to CEQA which now requires an EIR for any waste burning projects involving the burning of municipal or hazardous wastes or refusederived fuel, if the project consists of either the con-

struction of a new facility or the expansion of an existing facility by more than 10 percent. Previously, CEQA had required an EIR for the construction of any project which burns municipal waste or refuse-derived fuel. This requirement has been added to Section 5.09 of your Guidelines.

C. REPORTING OR MONITORING PROGRAM

A Lead Agency is now required to submit transportation information resulting from a reporting or monitoring program to the regional transportation planning agency where the project is located for a project of statewide, regional, or areawide significance. As you recall from last year's revisions, this reporting or mitigation monitoring program is now required to follow up on EIRs and mitigated negative declarations.

D. <u>CONSULTATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES AND</u> PERSONS

A Lead Agency must now consult with transportation planning agencies in addition to other public agencies that might be affected by the project prior to completion of a draft EIR for projects of statewide, regional, or areawide significance. In addition, both state and local Lead Agencies must consult with any city and county which borders on the city or county within which the project is located.

E. SUBMISSION OF NEGATIVE DECLARATIONS AND ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORTS TO STATE CLEARINGHOUSE

We have added two new sections to your guidelines which outline when an EIR or negative declaration should be sent to the State Clearinghouse for circulation.

F. ALTERNATIVES

Language regarding project alternatives has been inserted into section 7.10 of your Local Guidelines in light of the court's holding in <u>Citizens of Goleta Valley v. Board of Supervisors</u> (1989) 216 Cal.App.3d 48. This new language provides that excessive costs which might result from a potential alternative does not prevent a discussion of that alternative.

G. CHANGES TO FORMS

The sample forms that we have provided for use in the preparation of CEQA documents have also been amended. These forms are found in the back of your guidelines. The Notice of Exemption (Form B) was modified to include several additional exemptions, including a declared emergency and a statutory exemption.
