A. Approve Minutes of the January 22, 1991 Regular Meeting

B. Approve Issuance of 1989/90 School Accountability Report Cards (Mrs. Roberts)

Proposition 98, approved by the voters in November, 1988, has two major provisions. The first deals with the allocation of the state's fiscal resources to schools, and the second requires that local boards of education issue annual report cards for every school in the district. This is the second year of implementation of the School Accountability Report Cards. The data in these reports primarily reflects the 1989/90 school year.

Every report card must contain information about current school conditions in the following fourteen areas: (1) student achievement, (2) student attendance and dropout rates, (3) expenditures and services, (4) class size, (5) teacher assignments (6) textbooks and materials, (7) counseling and student support services, (8) substitute teachers, (9) school facilities and safety, (10) teacher evaluation (11) discipline and climate for learning, (12) training and curriculum improvement, (13) quality of instruction and leadership, and (14) state and district salary comparisons. The latter area was added by the legislature in 1989; however, state and district salary comparisons for the current report cards are for the 1988/89 school year. It should be noted that some schools elected to add sections related to their mission and goals, as well as a section on their demographic characteristics.

B. Approve Issuance of 1989/90 School Accountability Report Cards (Cont'd)

The supporting documents contain Accountability Report Cards for seventeen (17) district schools. Since Jurupa Valley High School does not receive a state CAP report, once again it was exempt from the requirement. Every report card begins with a message from the principal explaining the purpose of the document and ends with an invitation for those desiring further information about the school to contact the school principal. Copies of these reports are being printed on the basis of one per student and will be available to parents and the community during the next month.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the issuance of the 1989/90 School Accountability Report Cards as presented in the supporting documents.

C. Consider Nominations for California School Boards Association Delegate Assembly Region 18A (Dr. Wilson)

An information packet on 1991 CSBA State Delegate Assembly Nominations has been included in the agenda for Board members. In accordance with CSBA bylaws, Board nominations for the CSBA Delegate Assembly must be postmarked on or before March 1, 1991 without exception. The term of office is two years except for a new position added by reapportionment which is one year.

The Jurupa District is in Subregion 18A, Riverside, which has six delegates and four vacancies. Board member John Chavez has indicated to the Superintendent that he wishes to be nominated for another term. The Board may nominate as many individuals as it chooses. The four vacancies are as follows:

John J. Chavez - Jurupa USD

Joan Sparkman - Temecula Valley USD

Phil Stokoe - Alvord USD

New position added by reapportionment and will be filled for a one year term. Of the winning candidates, the candidate with the least number of votes will fill the one year position. Subsequent terms are two years long.

The Board may nominate candidates for CSBA Delegate Assembly Subregion 18A, or defer action to the February 19, 1991 meeting. Permission to nominate should be secured before any nominations are made.

D. Certify First Period Interim Report

5. Non-Routine Field Trip for Jurupa Valley High School Color Guard (Mr. Huckaby)

The Jurupa Valley High School Color Guard is requesting permission to participate in a competition at Castle Park High School in San Diego on March 15 - 17, 1991.

Students will have the opportunity to compete with other flag teams, develop team unity, promote school spirit, and enjoy an educational visit to Sea World. This tour experience will enrich the lives of our color guard members and help them to realize their responsibilities, limits, potential, and talent in a positive atmosphere.

Several fund raising events are planned, and no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of personal funds. The cost per student is approximately \$65. Students will be supervised by two Jurupa Valley staff members and three parent volunteers. Transportation will be provided by private coach as approved by the district's Transportation Department.

Administration recommends that the Board approve this non-routine field trip request for the Jurupa Valley High School Color Guard to attend a competition at Castle Park High School in San Diego, California on March 15 - 17, 1991.

6. Non-Routine Field Trip for Rubidoux High School Black Student Union

The Rubidoux High School Black Student Union requests permission to send delegates to the annual state convention which will be held in Sacramento on March 22 - 24, 1991.

Students will have the opportunity to participate in various workshops and will learn voting and caucusing procedures. Four of our students will be running for regional offices, and if successful, State offices. Our seniors will also be applying for UBSC scholarships.

Students will be supervised by Mark McFerren (math teacher), Devi Curtis (math teacher), and Karen Murphy (counselor). Lodging will be provided by the Red Lion Hotel; transportation will be by chartered bus.

Fund raisers are being held to help defer the cost of the convention. The cost per student is approximately \$175. No student shall be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of personal funds.

Administration recommends that the Board approve this non-routine field trip for delegates of the Rubidoux High School Black Student Union to attend their annual convention, March 22 - 24, 1991, in Sacramento, California.

- . ASB's second semester activities include preparation for the Blood Drive on March 6, and RHS Golf Tournament the end of April. The one-day tournament will be solely sponsored by the high school.
- . Mock Trial team is preparing for competition with 15 other schools in late February.

Ammie Wert, Jurupa Valley High School student representative, made the following announcements:

- Students were very enthusiastic during the Winter Sports Spirit Celebration. The basketball team defeated Centennial High School and its first Homecoming Dance following the game was well attended.
- Many students participated in a silent prayer for the safety of troops in the Persian Gulf.
- . Students are preparing for CTBS testing in February.
- . Social Science Department will begin preparations for a food and clothing drive for needy families.
- . Students are focusing on studying for finals as the end of semester approaches.

President Ruane noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

EQUESTS TO
EINSTATE RHS
EGINNING
ANCE CLASS

Breana Leitch, student at Rubidoux High School, repeated her previous request that the Board reinstate the beginning dance class for next semester so that students including some color guard members can take the class.

Dr. Christena Schlundt from the University of California, Riverside, expressed concern that the dance program at Rubidoux High School was being phased out. She reviewed the development and progress of the dance program at UCR that began in 1953, and compared its importance to that of athletic and academic programs.

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QUESTS TO INSTATE RHS GINNING NCE CLASS ont'd) Dr. Schlundt pointed out that in 1987 Rubidoux High School was the only school with a dance program that met UCR's fine arts requirements. She expressed concern that Rubidoux has one less dance class at a time when the University is emphasizing its program. She felt the district was going in the opposite direction in terms of developing the arts.

Latifia Layden stated she has been a member of the dance program for three years and felt it was an integral part of Rubidoux's program. It has taught her self-expression and team work, and has provided a physical outlet. Cancellation of the program was frustrating as she planned to continue with it in college. Ms. Layden was disappointed that it was not considered important enough to have a viable place in the curriculum.

Terri Schofield, Rubidoux High School student, stated that she has spoken out before about dismissal of the dance class and nothing has changed. Another concern was that the mats were not being rolled up in the gym.

MMENTS ON BIDOUX GH SCHOOL Rex Jackson, former Rubidoux graduate, read a statement regarding his concerns about a decline in standards at Rubidoux High School with discontinuance of the school newspaper and several classes. Copies will be distributed to Board members.

MMENTS ON ERATIONS Chuck Dunn, Resource Specialist at Jurupa Valley High School, stated that he was present as citizen of the community. He commented on a group of students who were unable to take a swimming class because it was canceled, use of student lifeguards in some swim classes, and proposal to charge an assessment of \$39 per home.

Tony Allega, Swimming Pool Operator, expressed concerns about the operation of the swimming program and asked for assistance in resolving the situation.

ARD MEMBER PORTS & MMENTS

- Board member Jose Medina noted that he and Fran Rice, NEA-J
 president, recently attended the CTA dinner and had an opportunity to
 hear educational issues as well as meet with board members from other
 districts.
- Mr. Medina stated that he attended RCSBA's annual evening with legislators and heard presentations by Senators Bergeson and Presley, and Assembly members Hunter, Clute, and Kelley, as well as comments from board members of various districts.

Mr. Medina stated that he shared the frustrations of high school students, teachers and parents regarding crime in the community, escalation of world tensions, effects of the State's budget crisis on public education, decline in 8th grade test scores, and apparent need to trim approximately \$3.3 million from the 1991/92 General Fund Budget.

OARD MEMBER EPORTS & OMMENTS Cont'd) Mr. Medina recalled that one of his biggest goals as a new board member was to reinstate 6th period at middle schools. He felt there was some correlation between more class time and better test scores. Now the district is considering a budget that will cutback the educational program. He noted that the responsibility lies with the State which is planning to drastically reduce its allocation to school districts, making teachers' jobs much more difficult when more students need special training.

Mr. Medina further stated that all Board members were listening, but lack the power at this time to go beyond the current program. The Governor may roll back Proposition 98 which shares 40% of its money with schools and eliminate cost of living increases. Schools are receiving less money from lottery funds, and might be required to pay fees to the county for its collection of property taxes. Mr. Medina encouraged citizens to contact legislators in Sacramento and express their concerns.

- Board member John Chavez stated that he attended Forecast '91 in Sacramento which focused on the Governor's budget for the coming year and the economic outlook for the state and nation. Information on the Governor's proposed budget indicated that school districts' COLA for 1990/91 would be a deficit by 1.76% from the statutory 4.76% COLA. The Governor's proposed new programs emphasize prevention and programs for children: \$50 million - Preschool reform and expansion; \$20 million - Healthy Start; \$10 million - Mental health counseling program in elementary schools; \$10 million - New pupil testing; \$4 million - Expand education programs on drug abuse; \$1 million - Early intervention for School Success.

Mr. Chavez also noted that the Governor has appointed Maureen Di Marco, past president of CSBA, as state secretary of child development and education. He felt the Board as elected officials should increase its correspondence to legislators.

Mr. Chavez also noted that as a member of the CSBA Finance Committee he has been given a list of major policy issues that will be under discussion: commercialization of schools - Channel 1; State and National Youth Policy for children's services; Codify the Mira court decision; Legislation that would allow a majority vote for bonds for school construction rather than a two-thirds vote.

- Board member Dave Barnes commented that as a result of the state's deep financial problems, school districts are facing some big challenges. Mrs. Burns agreed and noted that she supports expansion of education programs, but it's apparent the state is having a budget shortfall.
- President Ruane encouraged students and local citizens to address the Board on issues that have an affect on the school district. The Board is facing its biggest challenge in reducing the budget approximately \$3.3 million for 1991/92.

DARD MEMBER EPORTS & DMMENTS Cont'd) The Superintendent added that administration and the Board will work toward balancing the district's budget and hopefully the state can resolve some of its financial problems and restore adequate funding to education. The Superintendent made a commitment to provide the best schooling possible under the restraints that exist.

ACTION SESSION

PROVE INUTES Motion #138 MR. MEDINA MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 7, 1991 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ECESS

At 8:10 p.m. President Ruane called a brief recess. The Board reconvened in public session at 7:38 p.m.

ISCUSS 1991/92 ENERAL FUND JDGET The Superintendent stated that it is clear a financial emergency exists in California. For 1990/91 school districts will receive a 3% COLA instead of 4.76% which was based upon the statutory provisions. For next year, the Governor is considering a zero COLA which has dire implications for all school districts. The proposed suspension of Proposition 98 for this year would be a difference of over a million dollars to the Jurupa District.

The Superintendent explained that for the district to remain at the same level of services for a larger number of students with no salary increases for any employees, and a minimal reserve of \$1.5 million, approximately \$3.3 million must be trimmed to balance next year's budget. All employees will be offered an opportunity to make suggestions for reducing budget expenditures either to their immediate supervisor or to the Superintendent. That information will be thoroughly reviewed during the budget process.

The Superintendent suggested that it would be helpful administratively for the Board to select a couple of its members to work with him and other senior administrators on the budget process. A tentative schedule would be to meet on January 29 and 30. Some preliminary information may be available on the February 4 Board agenda.

WO BOARD EMBER OMMITTEE President Ruane noted that Mr. Medina has expressed an interest in being one of the Board's representatives. Mr. Barnes also volunteered to be a representative. By consensus, both members will serve as the Board's committee to meet with administration on the budget process.

ONSIDER

The Superintendent explained that information on forming an assessment district was shared with the Board because of California's serious financial condition for next year. The School district currently provides many services to the community which are funded by the General Fund. An assessment district would generate revenues for a portion of these expenses which are related to community use of school facilities and grounds for recreational and community activities.

The Superintendent explained that property owners would be notified of the district's intent to form an assessment district. If less than 50% of the property owners protest, the Board, by majority action, authorizes an assessment district. He emphasized that in light of the bleak financial picture, this could be a remedy to help balance the budget. A levy of \$39 on each parcel in the district would raise approximately \$850,000 annually to fund current budgeted general fund expenditures.

In order for an assessment district to be in effect for the 1991/92 budget, all legal requirements must be completed prior to July 1, 1991. Therefore, the Board would be asked to take action at the February 4 meeting to meet the tight timeframe.

Mr. Barnes stated that in his opinion if the school district moved foward by allocating funds to begin the process, it would be met with strong resistance from the community. The Superintendent pointed out that an assessment district would make it possible to preserve jobs in specific areas.

Mrs. Burns noted that this past November, voters in the community rejected a local school bond measure for additional facilities with an understanding the district could go on year-round education. Under this program the district would no longer have a valid reason for a school construction bond, or an assessment district.

Mr. Medina questioned how an assessment district fits in with school finance. The Superintendent replied it's a stop-gap measure. Don Wickert, a consultant in school finance, has established this ∞ ncept in one other school district as an alternative form of funding.

President Ruane said that she had recommended delaying action until the February 4 meeting so the Board would have adequate time to consider an assessment district and hear from community members it represents. She asked Board members if they will be prepared to make a decision on February 4. Mr. Chavez noted there were at least two board members who were not in favor of an assessment district and he felt that it was not financially feasible. Two workshops will be provided for middle school teachers on "Writing Across the Curriculum," and two one week sessions will be offered in June and mid-August. Improvement in the writing curriculum will require training at the elementary level as well. Time on task will be reviewed and more writing will be encouraged in all curriculum.

The Assistant Superintendent reported that the California Assessment Program test will no longer be administered. The state will probably develop another assessment program in a couple of years. For the district to develop its own writing assessment and train teachers in the scoring process would be costly.
