L. Recognition

a. Recognize New Adopt-A-School Partnership Between Sunnyslope Elementary School and McDonald's Restaurant (Mrs. Twombley)

c. Recognize Winners in 1991 County History Day

(Mrs. Twombley)

On January 23, 1991, the Jurupa Unified School District conducted its first districtwide History Day competition. Over 54 students from four schools in the district participated in the event. Thirty-five of these students went on to compete in the County History Day competition held on March 9, 1991 at Riverside Community College.

The Jurupa Unified School District was well represented at this competition, and had seven entries that received awards. Districts from throughout Riverside County entered a total of 143 projects.

The District is pleased to recognize the following students for their outstanding performance in the 1991 County History Day competition.

Four projects received third place awards in their respective divisions and entry categories. The District is pleased to recognize the following students for their third place awards:

- Jeany Zhao, an eighth grade student from Jurupa Middle School, received a third place award for her historical paper titled "The Holocaust" entered in the junior division.
- Kristina Ladwig, Sarah Morgando and Marisha Hagans, Middle School, received a third place award for their group project titled "Were the Cherokee Indians Moved Unjustly From Their Land?"
- James Cook, a ninth grade student at Jurupa Valley High School, received a third place award for his project "History Repeats Itself? The Israeli-Arab Conflict Compared to the German-Jewish Conflict" entered in the senior individual projects division.
- Tracy Smith, Linh Tram, and Michelle Powell, tenth graders at Jurupa Valley High School, received a third place award for their group project, "The Holocaust: Genocide of the Jews."

Students receiving a second place award in any category and division are eligible to compete in the statewide competition. The District had two students who received second place awards. They were:

- Beth Meyers, a seventh grader at Jurupa Middle School, received a second place award for her individual performance entitled "Rights of Religion versus Mormon Persecution" in the junior division. She was also eligible to enter the state competition.

HEARING SESSION

ublic Hearing on Proposed Waiver Request

(Mr. Campbell)

s required by law, the Board should hold a public hearing on the proposal that a waiver of Education Code Section 44252(b) be requested of the California State Board of ducation. This code section provides that prior to serving as a day-to-day substitute eacher, an individual must have passed the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST), the same test that is given to fully credentialed regular teachers.

Currently, the district is facing a shortage of substitute teachers which could lead to in inability to provide substitute coverage for teachers who are absent because of liness, personal necessity, jury duty, etc. The waiver requested only applies to those the have not yet had the opportunity to take the CBEST. The term of the waiver expires on an individual basis after scoring of each regular administration of CBEST has occurred. In April of 1989 the Board approved a request for a similar waiver which will soon expire. President Ruane should open and close the public hearing on the proposal to submit a waiver request.

B. Hear Report on Competitive Restructuring Grants

(Mrs. Roberts)

Senate Bill 1274, recently signed by the Governor, establishes a "Demonstration of Restructuring in Public Education" program. The intent of the legislation, authored by Senator Gary Hart and sponsored by the California Business Roundtable is to provide support for local schools in restructuring in order to increase student learning and success. This legislation envisions a five year effort with the initial year being devoted to planning a school site restructuring demonstration program which will take place during the ensuing four-year time span. According to its sponsors,

"At the heart of this legislation is a belief that we need to engage all students in powerful learning experiences, that all students deserve a rich thinking curriculum which empowers them to become life-long learners. All students, regardless of race, ethnic, linguistic or socio-economic background, need to learn to think critically, solve problems individually, or as part of a team, analyze and interpret new information, develop convincing arguments, and apply their knowledge to new situations."

Hear Report on Competitive Restructuring Grants (Cont'd)

Schools interested in applying for these grants are urged to consider a model which begins with "selecting the criteria for student success", followed by "planning the curriculum to fit into the structure", and lastly, "setting up the organizational structure" to accommodate the first two concerns.

The model developed to respond to this legislation involves two levels of participation, neither is mandatory. The first level of participation involves applying for a planning grant in which the school describes its "plan to plan," and the district describes the support that it will provide to the school in carrying out its plan to plan. The second level involves applying for a demonstration grant to conduct a "demonstration of school restructuring." The appropriation for the first phase would give \$30 per pupil to each school receiving a planning grant. Currently there is no appropriation for the second level; however, if this level is approved, a school would be eligible to receive \$200 per pupil for four years in order to implement its approved restructuring plan. This phase requires joint agreement by the Governing Board and the collective bargaining representative of the certificated employees.

During February and March, representatives of school districts attended informational workshops designed to assist them in developing task lists and timelines for completing a grant proposal. Planning grant proposals are due in Sacramento on April 19th. Successful proposals will be funded in June, 1991. During the planning year, school sites and districts will explore ideas relative to restructuring, and write a demonstration grant proposal drawing upon the ideas developed during the planning year.

Board members will recall that this is not the first time that the state has provided incentives for school reform. During the last thirty years, several pieces of reform legislation have provided financial incentives to schools and districts to change conditions in the schools to improve student achievement. The 60's and 70's were characterized by reforms calling for greater attention to equity and access; bilingual education, school desegregation, special education and early childhood education programs all essentially were concerned with equity or access issues. During the 1980's, the focus shifted to "excellence issues." Reformers became concerned about identifying the characteristics of "effective schools." Some of these prescriptions were found in the most influential school reform legislation of the 1980's, Senate Bill 813. According to the authors of this new reform legislation, school restructuring is generally characterized by the following:

- 1. Focusing on improving student learning as the end goal, not on process.
- 2. Developing a rich conception of learning and teaching.
- 3. Engaging all students in a "thinking curriculum" one which is rich in problem solving, critical thinking and analysis, and enables them to become life-long learners.
- 4. Shifting to a performance-based system of accountability.
- 5. Re-thinking the structure of schools - organizing according to the needs of students and how they actually learn.
- 6. Re-designing district infrastructures and services to school efforts.
- 7. Sharing decision-making authority.
- 8. Revising governance and management procedures.
- 9. Increasing meaningful participation of parents and the community.

3. Hear Report on Competitive Restructuring Grants (Cont'd)

This list contains a number of assumptions about the possibilities of a restructuring grant to fundamentally alter the way in which schools should operate in order to improve student achievement. Nonetheless, several schools have indicated an interest in pursuing planning grant funds. At agenda preparation time, we were unsure of the exact number. However, it is our intent to present the plans of schools wishing to apply for SB 1274 Planning Grant funds to the Board at the April 15th meeting. Information only.

2. Approve Application for Year-School Implementation Planning Grant

(Mrs. Roberts)

At the December 4, 1989 Board meeting the Board took the following action:

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD TAKE ACTION REGARDING ITS PRESENT INTENT TO COMPLETE A STUDY TO IMPLEMENT A YEAR-ROUND MULTITRACK EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM AT THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL LEVEL IN WHICH AT LEAST 30 PERCENT OF THE ELEMENTARY STUDENTS PARTICIPATE NO LATER THAN JULY 1, 1992. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Administration has prepared an application to receive \$25 per pupil in 1991/92 for implementation of multitrack year-round education beginning in July, 1992. Should this study determine that it is feasible, this would preserve the district's option to receive this money which could help defray the cost of implementing year-round education should that occur.

In order for a district to qualify for these funds, it must demonstrate that schools are at least 5% above capacity. This calculation is completed by excluding all rental and leased facilities. Using this formula districtwide, our schools are 14.1% above capacity.

The State apparently has the horse before the cart. We are required to submit an application identifying the year-round schools in order to obtain the implementation planning grant monies. However, that is precisely one of the questions to be answered during the planning time, i.e., which schools would most probably be year-round. An application has been prepared for the following schools: Indian Hills, Mission Bell, Troth Street and West Riverside, the four largest schools. State consultants have assured administration that there is flexibility to change the schools currently designated for these implementation grants if conditions change in the school district.

Administration recommends that the Board approve submittal of the application to apply for "Implementation Grant" funds to plan for multitrack year-round education programs in 1991/92.

D. Adopt Resolution #91/34 in Support of Legislation Codifying the Mira Decision

(Mr. Edmunds)

The 1988 court decision in the case of Mira Development Corporation versus City of San Diego set a precedent for cities and counties to deny zone changes, general plan amendments, and specific plans until the impact of a proposed project with respect to school facilities is mitigated. This decision is significant from the standpoint of financing school facilities, because it allows mitigation over and above the statutory fee of \$1.58 per square foot of new residential construction.

. Adopt Resolution #91/34 in Support of Legislation Codifying the Mira Decision

(Cont'd)

Locally, Riverside County Counsel has not upheld this interpretation of the Mira Decision and, therefore, the County Planning Department does not have the authority to require developers to fully mitigate school impacts when their projects involve zoning changes or general plan amendments. In addition, AB 80 has been introduced in the 1990/91 Legislative Session as an attempt to repeal the Mira Decision.

As our community continues to grow, a significant number of zoning changes and general plan amendments are taking place which will result in increased population and greater school enrollment than has been anticipated in our current facility planning efforts. Therefore, any legislation which is supportive of the concepts in the Mira Decision would be very beneficial to the District. Therefore, administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #91/34 in Support of Legislation Codifying The Mira Decision.

6. Adopt at Second Reading Proposed Policy and Regulation #1260, Parent Involvement (Mrs. Roberts)

New Policy and Regulation 1260, Parent Involvement, was approve at informational first reading at the March 18 Board meeting. As previously noted, at least fifty (50) research studies have documented parent involvement in a child's education as one of the key ingredients in school success. Last year the State Board of Education developed a policy on parent involvement in the schools and they are recommending that local district Boards of Education adopt a similar In addition, Chapter 1 regulations require districts policy statement. receiving these funds to implement parent involvement policies. Administration recommends the Board adopt at second reading proposed Policy and Regulation #1260, Parent Involvement.

7. Adopt Resolution #91/34, Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds

Throughout the school year, the Business Office monitors and adjusts the District's various budgets with respect to both revenue and expenditures. As information about revenue increases or decreases becomes available, this information is accumulated and used to adjust the budget.

Such changes in revenue result from grant applications, increased funding, increased ADA, apportionment reductions, etc. The method by which the revenue side of the budget is adjusted is to adopt a Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds, by which action the Board approves adding revenue to the budget for various projects. Since the last Excess Resolution on March 18, 1991, the District has received revenue adjustments in the amount of \$255,820 as identified below.

The amounts listed above for Special Projects and State Preschool are for special purpose grants and are restricted in their use; expenditure budgets have been developed. Because of reduced revenue, it is necessary to transfer some expenditures from the Lottery Fund to the General Fund (\$218,366). This additional expense will be offset somewhat by the transfer of allowable expenditures to the Supplemental Grant Fund (\$134,379).

10. Non-Routine Field Trip for Rubidoux High School ROTC

(Mr. Huckaby)

The JROTC unit of Rubidoux High School is requesting permission to participate in the 4th Annual Southern California Drill and Color Guard Competition. The meet will be held at the United States Marine Corps Recruit Depot (MCRD) in Santee, California on April 19-21, 1991.

10. Non-Routine Field Trip for Rubidoux High School ROTC (Cont'd)

Students (27) will be supervised by seven adults. Parents, students and instructors will stay in the dormitories at MCRD at no cost. Meals will be purchased at the military dining facility. Transportation will be provided by private vehicles. No student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of personal funds.

In addition to competing in this invitational drill meet, students will have the opportunity to experience military living and dining firsthand.

Administration recommends that the Board approve this non-routine field trip for the ROTC unit at Rubidoux High School to participate in the 4th Annual Southern California Drill and Color Guard Competition in Santee, California on April 19-21, 1991.

11. Non-Routine Field Trip Request for Student at Jurupa Valley High School (Mrs. Twombley)

The Jurupa Unified School District has a student from Jurupa Valley High School who was a first-place winner in the Riverside County History Day competition. Yen Tram, a senior, is now eligible to compete in State History Day in Sacramento on May 4-6, 1991. Her expenses are being paid for by the Riverside County Office of Education.

The District is requesting approval for Yen Tram's participation in this event and the provision of a chaperone for the trip to Sacramento. The District will be sending teacher Deb Bennett as a chaperone. Expenses are approximately \$750.

Administration recommends the approval of this non-routine field trip for the District's participation in State History Day.

12. Out of State Conference to International Reading Association Convention (Mr. Taylor)

Mary Harris, classroom teacher at Ina Arbuckle Elementary School, requests permission to attend the International Reading Association Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada, on May 5-7, 1991. She is a member of the organization, and has attended this convention in past years.

Mary will pay her own expenses (travel and lodging). The School Improvement Program will pay her registration and two days of substitute costs. There will be no impact on the general fund budget.

Administration recommends the Board approve the out of state conference for Mary Harris, teacher at Ina Arbuckle Elementary School, to attend the International Reading Association Convention to be held in Las Vegas, Nevada on May 5-7, 1991.

Review Routine Information Reports

Report on Annual Language Census

(Mrs. Roberts)

All school districts in California are required to conduct an annual language census. This census must include an accounting of all students with a home language other than English and a count of all pupils redesignated since the last census. Students are reported as either limited English proficient, LEP or fluent English proficient, FEP. In order to be classified as either LEP or FEP, students are identified by their parents as having a home language other than English and must be given a test to determine their oral proficiency in English. In the case of Spanish speaking students, a test of oral Spanish proficiency is also administered. In addition, the language classification for students in grades 3-8 is determined by an analysis of their performance on standardized achievement tests in reading, language and mathematics.

The 1991 language census indicates that there are 1,742 students who are limited English proficient. Last year, the district reported 1,376 LEP students. Since the last census, 84 LEP students have been redesignated as FEP. This process involves the same testing requirements as initial designation and also must involve reports from classroom teachers. The majority of the LEP population continues to be Spanish speakers. While approximately 33 other languages are reported in the census, only one-third of these languages are represented in the remaining LEP population. The majority of these pupils speak Asian languages such as Madarin, Cantonese, Vietnamese, Lao, Cambodian and Korean.

The supporting documents contain a chart showing the number of LEP students at each school. K-6 LEP students who are Spanish dominant are enrolled in bilingual classes when there are sufficient numbers at a given grade to make this a feasible option. Other students, K-12, are given instructional support services outlined in an Individual Learning Plan (ILP). All students must receive, at minimum, regular English as a Second Language instruction to support them in becoming fluent English proficient. Schools with more than 100 LEP students include: Mission Bell (101), Ina Arbuckle (155), Mission Middle School (172), West Riverside (226), Troth Street (115), Sunnyslope (119), Rustic Lane (135) and Rubidoux High School (208). COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

WELCOME FROM PRINCIPAL OF RUSTIC LANE SCHOOL The Assistant Superintendent Education Services introduced Walt Lancaster, principal of the newly modernized Rustic Lane Elementary School. She noted that Mr. Lancaster was recently honored as Jurupa's Principal of the Year. This evening he planned to comment on the general instructional program and progress of a "school within a school" program.

Mr. Lancaster welcomed everyone to the renovated Rustic Lane School which has given a new image to the community and a high personal value to students, staff members, and parents. He noted a variety of activities were in progress such as the third session of D.A.T.E. classes serving 192 students; Student-of-the-Month Assemblies; Attendance Incentive Program which recently rewarded 90 students with perfect attendance for first semester to a pizza party; and District Academic Olympics in which Rustic Lane was one of the winners in the preliminary rounds.

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PELCOME FROM PRINCIPAL OF USTIC LANE SCHOOL Cont'd)

Other activities in progress at Rustic Lane School were: Here's Looking at You 2000 in grades 1-6; portfolios in language arts and mathematics; training in the computer room; newsletters and calendars to parents; intramural sports program during recess coordinated by volunteer teachers; and preparation for the history/social science framework.

Mr. Lancaster stated that a major resource is to Rustic Lane School the school nurse who serves as the community liaison. He also noted that vandalism and graffiti have decreased significantly because of improved lighting on campus from Southern California Edison Company.

Mr. Lancaster stated that the "School Within a School" (SWAS) program was established for students with a need to increase attendance and improve self-worth. There is consistency in the classroom with the same teacher creating a family atmosphere and encouraging growth in academics and social skills. Parents of children in the program make a commitment to support the program.

Mr. Lancaster introduced teachers Kelly Sperry and Carol Smith and parent Carol Cowan to give a presentation on the "School Within a School" program. He indicated the program was implemented one and a half years ago and places students in the same classroom for a three-year period. The students are grouped at grades 1-3 and 4-6 and receive ongoing instruction from the same teacher. Mrs. Sperry and Mrs. Smith explained some of the teaching strategies and exposure to multi-grade curriculum. Mrs. Cowan commented on the benefits her children have received from the program and the importance of parent involvement. She also praised Mrs. Sperry and Mrs. Smith for their commitment to the School Within a School program.

Mr. Lancaster distributed 1990 CTBS test results for students in SWAS. Students did quite well when compared to the school as a whole and he was pleased with their progress and the teachers that participated in the program. President Ruane expressed appreciation for the opportunity to visit the newly modernized Rustic Lane School and hear enthusiastic, informative reports about the education program.

President Ruane noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board. She asked that comments be limited to five minutes.

OMMENTS ON LEMENTARY USIC PROGRAM Steve Shumaker, Rubidoux band student, said that being a part of the band unit gives students a natural high and keeps them too busy to do drugs. He also pointed out that not all students can be football or basketball players. Band is his life and he did not want it taken away.

Marty Shumaker, mother of five children who participate in the instrumental band program, recognized the importance of music in the schools. Music at the elementary level prepares students for the transition to middle school and high school. Eliminating the elementary program will diminish the number of students who participate at the secondary level. During the first half of this school year, Rubidoux's Delta Alliance Corp performed in at least 19 parades and field shows. The band won 12 first places and 14 sweepstake awards, and ranks 7th in Southern California out of 24 bands that participate. Without the elementary program, this kind of recognition would be unattainable. She noted that students involved in music seem to have higher test scores.

Mrs. Shumaker presented a petition with close to 500 signatures of parents and students interested in maintaining the elementary band program. She said an unpopular suggestion would be to close Jurupa Valley High School on a temporary basis for a couple of years and bring those students back to Rubidoux High School until the budget crunch is over. This would save several million dollars and all programs could continue. Mrs. Shumaker concluded by reading a statement in the petition requesting that no action be taken to cut any programs that affect the well-rounded education of our children.

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED BUDGET

Sara Lampe, parent, referred to an article in the Press-Enterprise which indicated the school district was considering year-round school. She asked if the \$86,000 for a feasibility study was in the proposed budget. Mr. Medina explained that the Board is considering the submittal of an application to the State for an implementation grant to cover the cost of the study.

Chuck Dunn, community member and resource specialist at Jurupa Valley High School, expressed concern that the assistant principal at Rubidoux High School will be removed after 27 years of dedicated service.

The committee took a position against Whittle Communications Channel One because the State Superintendent has indicated a portion of funds could be withheld for showing commercials during instructional time.

- Board member Mary Burns acknowledged receipt of a colorful drawing from student in Room 13 at Rustic Lane School.
 - Mrs. Burns noted that about three years ago she addressed the Board as a good citizen requesting support for a recycling program. She was pleased with a pink flyer announcing that West Riverside Elementary School is participating in a "Recycling Day" at the Tri-Co Disposal Buy-Back Center on March 30. Appreciation was expressed to Jana Twombley, Public Information Officer, for coordinating the recycling effort.
- President Sandra Ruane thanked Walt Lancaster and members of Rustic Lane for inviting the Board to the school and presenting informative reports.

President Ruane attended Rubidoux FFA's fundraiser Friday evening and said it was a good start for next year.

PRESIDENT RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE MARCH 4, 1991 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. MEDINA SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Dr. Ron Needham, Assistant Principal at Jurupa Valley High School, stated that he heard a presentation by Whittle Communications on Channel One twelve-minute newscasts offered to schools. There has been some controversy about the two minutes of commercial time included in the news broadcasts. The State Superintendent has indicated that portion of school district's funds could be in jeopardy if they participated in the program. He noted that Jurupa Valley has developed a schedule that would preserve the required number of instructional minutes.

Dr. Needham noted that the twelve-minute newscast was a high quality program and included free equipment. The Colton District board has adopted the program. Notre Dame High School has had the newscast for a year. Dr. Needham introduced Karen Leone of Whittle Communications to present a newscast from Channel One and answer questions on participation in the program.

Ms. Leone stated that the program consists of ten minutes of news and two minutes of commercials on a daily basis for secondary schools. It was developed two years ago to create citizenship and global awareness through educational television. Participating schools are provided with necessary video and satellite equipment for all classrooms, which can be used by teachers for other purposes such as announcements and hookup to computers. The commercials include teen related products and public service announcements. Ms. Leone noted that Channel One is being shown in 7600 schools nationwide.

Mr. Chavez expressed concerns that the State could withhold some funds from participating school districts, Whittle Communications would be showing commercials to a captive audience during a school day, and the material may not be appropriate viewing for all students. In reply to Mr. Chavez' concerns, Ms. Leone stated that funds would not be withdrawn if two-minute commercials were shown outside of curriculum time. The National School Boards Association has determined the use of Channel One should be a local decision. California has only two high schools on the program, but nationwide there are ninety-four. She showed a videotape aired in August which she felt was a good representation of the Channel One educational program.

REPORT ON WHITTLE COMMUNICATIONS CHANNEL ONE (Cont'd)

Mr. Barnes had some concern about putting a mandate on teachers that may not be a part of their curriculum program.

Mr. Medina said he favored students learning about current events from video materials, however teachers have other resources available to them that are free and may be of better quality. He felt that it could be an intrusion on some teachers to show the newscast every day if the materials were not relevant, and also unfair to expose students on a daily basis to commercials.

Ms. Leone stated that the program has been successful in other states but has faced some controversy in California which Whittle Communications is attempting to overcome. President Ruane thanked Ms. Leone for the opportunity to review a Channel One newscast. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services indicated the report was for information only and thanked the Board for hearing the presentation.

DEFER APPLICATION FOR YEAR-ROUND SCHOOL GRANT

Superintendent Services stated Education The Assistant administration has prepared an application to apply for a year-round school implementation planning grant of \$83,950 from the State to complete a feasibility study on implementing multi-track year-round education programs by July, 1992. The district has identified four elementary schools (Indian Hills, Mission Bell, Troth Street and West Riverside) that may be most overcrowded in order to qualify for funding. However, the State has assured administration that changes in schools can be made. The Superintendent added that planning grant money would ultimately have to be returned to the state if year-round However, the district is under an school is not implemented. obligation to conduct a feasibility study and consider implementation by July 1, 1992.

Mr. Barnes stated that he has heard both positive and negative comments from parents on implementing year-round school. Mr. Medina expressed concern that approving submittal of the application implies that is the direction of the district. Mr. Chavez agreed and said this would be the first step, but he did not see a need at this time. President Ruane explained that the application was a request for funds to complete a feasibility study, not necessarily implement year-round school. This would also afford parents in the community that option.

The Superintendent pointed out that a requirement for continued eligibility in the State Building Program is to complete a study on year-round education and determine the feasibility of implementing it in this school district. Not to be in compliance could affect the District's position on the priority list.

EFER APPLICATION N YEAR-ROUND CHOOL GRANT Cont'd)

Mr. Medina pointed out there was not an apparent need for year-round school with Granite Hill Elementary opening in the fall of 1992 and Stone Avenue Elementary probably soon after. The Superintendent responded that in order to preserve the district's eligibility in the State Building Program, an obligation made in 1989 to study implementation of year-round school should be met.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services explained the grant is not competitive and the district should receive the funds. deadline for submittal of the application has been extended; however, a delay could put other school districts ahead of Jurupa. Superintendent asked that the Board delay action until the next meeting when more information will be available. The Board was in agreement.

- WHEREAS, not all cities or counties are considering the availability of school facilities when acting on such requests; and
- WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 80 has been introduced in the 1991 Legislative Session inclusive of language repealing the Mira Decision.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District as follows:

That this Board on behalf of its present and future residents and students urges the enactment in the 1991 Legislative Session of legislation codifying the <u>Mira Decision</u> and opposes the enactment of any legislation repealing or substantially changing the holding of the <u>Mira Decision</u>.

That the Superintendent of this District is directed to send a copy of this resolution to each legislator whose district includes territory of the school district, the California School Boards Association ("CSBA"), and the Governor of the State of California.
