(Mr. Huckaby)

Mr. Doug Huckaby, Director of Secondary Education Services, will introduce Mr. Dave Hutchins, Principal of Nueva Vista High School. Mr. Hutchins will comment on the school's general program.

** C. Approve Submittal of Planning Grant Applications for School Restructuring

(Mrs. Roberts)

At the last meeting, the Board received an extensive report on SB 1274, a program designed to fund schools to develop a "Demonstration of Restructuring in Public Education." According to State Superintendent Bill Honig, the purpose of the State's current restructuring effort is to assist schools in providing "powerful learning experiences for all students in a rich-meaning centered curriculum." Restructuring implies that, in general, changes will need to occur in curriculum and instruction, decision-making, staff roles and accountability systems. Approximately 6.5 million dollars is available to fund schools at a rate of \$30 per pupil for a one (1) year planning grant. If a state appropriation is available in 1992, schools will be eligible to apply for four (4) year demonstration grants, with a funding level of \$200 per pupil.

Van Buren Elementary, Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High Schools are submitting planning grant applications for approval.

It is recommended that the Board approve submittal of the planning grant applications for Van Buren Elementary, Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High Schools.

D. Report on 1991/92 Projected Enrollment, Staffing, and Facilities Needs

(Mr. Edmunds)

The projected enrollment for 1991/92 is 15,913 students. This represents a 2.9% increase over last year's enrollment, for a gain of 449 students. The anticipated rate of enrollment growth is less than it has been in the last several years, largely due to a slowdown in building activity resulting from the recession. Included in the supporting documents is a table titled "1991/92 Projected Enrollment" which shows the projected enrollment by school and grade level.

A second document in the supporting documents titled "1991/92 Enrollment Staffing and Facilities" summarizes the formula staffing projection and the projected utilization of facilities based upon the projected enrollment. The column on the right-hand side of this page entitled "Regular Use" summarizes the utilization of classroom space at each school and shows the number of additional classrooms needed next year at each school. In spite of the fact that next year's projected growth is not as great as it has been in past years, there are still several schools where one or two additional portable classrooms will be necessary.

D. Report on 1991/92 Projected Enrollment, Staffing, and Facilities Needs (Cont'd)

These ten portable classrooms will be moved from Rubidoux High School to the above locations during the next couple of months. The cost of moving these portable classrooms is estimated to be between \$75,000 and \$100,000. This cost will be paid from developer fees collected that would otherwise go to the State as part of our match requirement in the building program. The match calculation allows districts to keep developer fees collected for interim housing costs, which include moving, setting up, and furnishing portable classrooms. Administration believes that we will collect sufficient developer fees to defray this cost within the 1991/92 fiscal year. If this does not occur, then any costs not reimbursed can be carried forward as a credit until they are completely written off. During the next month or so Administration will be developing a bid package for moving portable classrooms, to be presented to the Board for award approval. Information only.

E. Authorize Preparation of Specifications and Solicitation of Bids for Relocation of Portable Classrooms (Mr. Edmunds)

The 1991/92 student enrollment projection for each site indicates a need to relocate approximately ten (10) portable classrooms to properly house students at various sites as discussed in the preceding information report. Funding for the move of these portables will be paid from the Interim Housing portion of our match fee requirements (Developer Fees).

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the preparation of specification and solicitation of bids for the relocation of portable classrooms. Recommendation for award of the contract will be brought to the Board after bids have been opened and analyzed.

F. Approve Purchase of Portable Classroom for Pacific Avenue Elementary School

(Mr. Edmunds)

Pacific Avenue Elementary School is requesting the purchase of one 24' by 40' OSA approved portable classroom to be funded out of their Chapter I funds over a three-year period.

In September, 1990, the District purchased a portable for the Head Start program at West Riverside Elementary School off of the National School District bid per Public Contract Code 20118. The contractor for that bid has extended the bid for two additional years at the same price, thus enabling the District to utilize the same bid again.

Public Contract Code 20118 permits the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, if the Board has determined it to be in the best interest of the district, to authorize by contract, lease, requisition, or purchase order, any public agency including another district to contract for the district in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law.

National School District waived the right to have all orders against the contract come through them and allows any district to contract directly with the vendor, ModTech, Inc., of Perris, California. The base price is \$26,800, and the bid allows for three, five, or seven year lease-purchases. Annual payments for a three year lease-purchase are based on 7.6% interest. The first payment of \$9,596 plus \$150 for markerboards is due at time of delivery, estimated to be within 30 days of order placement, second payment due twelve months later, and the third twenty-four months after delivery.

Administration recommends that the Board declare it to be in the best interest of the District to waive the bidding requirements and "piggy back" on the National School District Bid #1990/l for the purchase of one OSA approved portable classroom, and to issue Purchase Order #66174 to ModTech, Inc., of Perris, California, in the amount of \$28,938 to cover this transaction.

Authorize Preparation of Specifications and Solicitation of Bids and Quotations for State Deferred Maintenance Projects (Mr. Edmunds)

Each year Business Services prepares a State Deferred Maintenance plan for submittal to the Office of Local Assistance by the end of March. This plan identifies and prioritizes major maintenance projects which are eligible for 50% matching funds under the State Deferred Maintenance program. In the past, the normal statutory funding level program has been based on a formula of one-half of 1% of the District's General Fund budget. In the last three years, however, the funding for this program has diminished so that we expect to have only about half of the usual funding available for work to be done in 1991/92. We estimate that next year the District will be eligible for \$125,000 in State matching funds, which when combined with an equal match from the District's General Fund and approximately \$200,000 carried over from prior years, will adequately cover our State Deferred Maintenance plan of \$330,000 including salaries and benefits.

G. Authorize Preparation of Specifications and Solicitation of Bids and Quotations for State Deferred Maintenance Projects (Cont'd)

The supporting documents contain the list of State Deferred Maintenance items which are included in the 1991/92 Tentative Budget. The dollar amounts listed are estimated costs for the outside vendor portion of the work. Salary and benefit costs would be in addition to the amounts listed and included in our plan.

We should solicit bids during May for the projects listed so that most of the work can be completed during the summer when school is not in session. Bids will be presented to the Board for award approval. In addition to those projects listed in the supporting documents, District Maintenance staff may complete Deferred Maintenance work projects of a more limited scope.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the preparation of specifications and solicitation of bids on State Deferred Maintenance projects as listed in the supporting documents. Recommendations for award of the contract will be brought to the Board after bids have been opened and analyzed.

H. Authorize Advertising for Bids for Warehouse Stock Items (Mr. Edmunds)

The District stocks approximately 660 items in the Warehouse, all of which we try to purchase at the most advantageous price to the District. Each spring, we attempt to purchase all of the District's needs for the upcoming school year, where feasible, while minimizing carrying cost, stock outs, and excessive inventory.

Part of our effort to control costs is to bid as many items as possible on an annual basis to allow for one major purchase and fill in orders as needed over the next 6 months. It is time for us to go to bid and restock the Warehouse to allow us to fill all summer warehouse requisitions for fall start-up. This year we need to obtain bids on approximately 340 items.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the Purchasing Department to advertise for bids for standard athletic, custodial, office, instructional, and general warehouse stock items. Request for approval of award will be brought to the Board after the bids are opened.

I. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Authorize Substitution of Subcontractor on Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project (Mr. Edmunds)

RJW Construction Company, the prime contractor for the construction portion of the Granite Hill project, has requested Board approval to substitute another plastering subcontractor for Landon Construction who was the listed plastering subcontractor on the original bid.

Public Contract Code 4107 prohibits the prime contractor from replacing any subcontractor listed in the original bid except for certain specific reasons, and then only with authority from the awarding body. One of the allowable reasons is if the listed subcontractor is not licensed pursuant to the Contractors License Law.

Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Authorize Substitution of Subcontractor on Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project (Cont'd)

Landon Construction, while holding a Class "B" General Contractor's License, cannot utilize their general license to perform one specialty trade. In order to legally perform as a plastering subcontractor, they would need to possess a Class "C-35" License, which they do not have. The District sent Landon Construction a certified letter advising them of the request from RJW Construction Company. They did not file any written objections within the allowable five days; which, therefore, constitutes Landon's consent to the substitution.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the request from RJW Construction Company to replace Landon Construction Company with another subcontractor for the plastering portion of the Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project.

She felt this was interpreted as a political move connected with cityhood. Although the band did not perform, the ROTC color guard was present. Approximately 2500 people attended the parade. Mrs. Harrison said she felt an apology was in order from the district. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services noted that the matter would be brought Superintendent's attention upon his return. Mr. Barnes, a Viet Nam veteran, added that he has always been highly supportive of all veterans and the parades held in their honor.

Russell Lubbers, resident of Pedley, stated that his son fought in the Persian Gulf and was very appreciative of the letters he received from children in the district. Mr. Lubbers questioned why they could not participate in the parade or why some called it political in nature. Mr. Lubbers said he wrote to the president's wife Mrs. Bush and her reply expressed appreciation for their efforts in behalf of returning troops.

Jean Schottmuller, resident of Mira Loma, read a letter from a major in the Air Force thanking the people of Mira Loma for supporting those involved in Desert Storm and for the opportunity to participate in the parade.

Joseph Hoskins, coordinator of the parade in Mira Loma, stated that he was very proud of this community and its people. The hometown parade was an opportunity to show appreciation and support for those involved in the conflict. Each participating Grand Marshall received a Certificate of Patriotism and a yellow ribbon in recognition of having a family member in the service.

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED BUDGET

Craig Newby, parent and educator, expressed concern about the proposed budget cuts and its affect on children. An academic education is highly important but extracurricular activities is the glue that holds the schools together. Mr. Newby made some suggestions for curbing expenses and maintaining programs for next year: eliminate teachers' pay for recess duty; renegotiate teachers' salary increase for next year; request volunteers from the community athletics, assist with coaching band, etc.; ask administrators to work with teachers to find bonafide possibilities for funding programs.

PETITION FROM JVHS STAFF Tim Titus, Head of the Physical Education Department at Jurupa Valley High School, presented a petition that contained over 59 signatures of faculty members and classified staff. The petition indicated that other public comments should not be construed as representing the staff of Jurupa Valley High School. They are interested in working together, without a public forum, to come up with solutions to balance the budget for next year.

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED BUDGET

Chuck Dunn, resource specialist at Jurupa Valley High School, stated that he believed there was a financial problem in the district as in most of California. Mr. Dunn said he did not represent anybody other than himself and was concerned about students and programs. He suggested that teachers could take two extra students in each class and save about \$4 million; and the three prep days at the beginning of the year could be reduced to save about \$471,000.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member Jose Medina announced that he attended the Academic Olympics at Camino Real Elementary School and the close competition involving three schools was won by West Riverside.

Mr. Medina congratulated the Rubidoux High School track team for an outstanding performance this past weekend. He also expressed appreciation to students who had projects in the County History Day Competition and won awards.

Mr. Medina referred to a speaker's earlier comments and noted the district supports a good working relationship between schools, parents and the community, and recently developed a Board policy that encourages parent and community involvement. Mr. Medina also explained that the Board takes action only as a group at its meetings. Mr. Chavez agreed and said he would have participated in the parade as a former serviceman but was not aware of it.

 Board member John Chavez reported that he attended the dedication of the Latter Day Saints Jurupa Stake Center and toured the new facility.

Mr. Chavez noted the Riverside County School Boards Association has a business meeting on April 18 at Highland Springs. The topic will be "How to Keep Your District from Going Broke."

Mr. Chavez announced that interested community members were invited to the next meeting of Partners Against Gang Aggression (PAGA) on Tuesday April 2, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at Mission Middle School. The guest speaker will address how the community can assist students to resist gang aggression.

- Board member David Barnes suggested that the "Board Member Reports and Comments" section could be a topic later in the agenda.
- President Ruane said she comes from a family of service veterans and has the greatest admiration for returning troops and would not rain on their parade.

HEARING SESSION

PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED WAIVER REQUEST The Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services stated that since 1984, the district has had a waiver of the California requirement that an individual must pass the CBEST prior to serving as a day-to-day substitute teacher. Periodically the district must reapply for a waiver of Education Code Section 44252(b) and that requires a public hearing. The Assistant Superintendent noted that the waiver only applies to individuals who have a bachelor's degree and have not had an opportunity to take the CBEST. The waiver expires on an individual basis after scoring of the exam has occurred. Those who have not passed the exam or have missed taking the exam cannot continue to substitute. President Ruane opened and closed the public hearing on the proposal to submit a waiver request without public comment.

ACTION SESSION

APPROVE MINUTES -Motion #206 MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE MARCH 18, 1991 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

RECESS

At 8:03 p.m. President Ruane called a brief recess. The Board reconvened in public session at 8:23 p.m.

REPORT ON COMPETITIVE RESTRUCTURING GRANTS The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the annotation gives a brief history of restructuring or reform in California public schools. The intent of legislation SB 1274 is to provide support for local schools in restructuring in order to increase student learning and success. Schools interested in applying for grants were requested to: 1) select the criteria for student success, 2) plan curriculum to fit into that particular structure of student needs, 3) setup the organizational structure.

The Assistant Superintendent explained that the legislation involves two levels of participation. The first level involves applying for a planning grant with the submittal of a "plan to plan." If approved, each school would receive \$30 per pupil. The second level involves applying for a demonstration grant to implement the restructuring plan. If approved, a school could be eligible to receive \$200 per pupil for four years. This phase requires joint agreement by the School Board and collective bargaining unit. Several school plans will be presented to the Board at the April 15 meeting.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the Board's action of December 4, 1989 was the only addition to the annotation for Item C, Approve Application for Year-Round school Implementation Planning Grant. The action stated the Board's intent to complete a study to implement a year-round multitrack educational program at the elementary school level in which at least 30 percent of the elementary students participate no later than July 1, 1992.

An application has been prepared for the district's four largest schools: Indian Hills, Mission Bell, Troth Street, and West Riverside. The state has allowed flexibility should enrollment changes occur. For example, if Mission Bell would lose a portion of its population to Granite Hill next year, there would be no need to put Mission Bell on a year-round program.

In response to Mr. Medina's question, the Director of Administrative Services replied that the Board's December 1989 action was simply to do the study, but if it showed a feasibility for year-round education, the district would be expected to do it. A partial study was made but never sent to the state. The district then received a waiver to do the study with the understanding that it may be on year-round by July 1992. Mr. Chavez recalled that when the motion was made, no one could predict if conditions would change. Conditions have changed and now the district may be cutting programs that will have a direct affect on children. The district also has to consider the implementation of year-round education which is not fully funded by the state.

The Director of Administrative Services explained that at the time the Board took action several schools under construction were incomplete, funding for future projects such as Granite Hill, Stone Avenue, Mira Loma Middle, and second phase of Jurupa Valley High School was uncertain. State school building bonds for June 1990 and November 1990 were not even on the ballot, let alone passed. By the Board's action, the district was allowed to stay in the state building program because it had the real potential of having to go on year-round. Since then the state has provided school districts an opportunity to apply for an implementation grant to help defray the cost of the study and make year-round school operational. The Director said he felt the study might show a negative impact for year-round school at this time.

PRESIDENT RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE SUBMITTAL OF THE APPLICATION TO APPLY FOR "IMPLEMENTATION GRANT" FUNDS TO PLAN FOR MULTITRACK YEAR-ROUND EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN 1991/92. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE President Ruane stated that she felt the community and parents should have an opportunity to become more informative about year-round school and give their input. She opposed year-round school at this time and the study would probably show it was not Mr. Medina stated that the way to show his opposition to year-round school was by voting against it at this time. Barnes stated that under present economic conditions, the district should seek the grant, fulfill its obligations, continue to build schools, and keep the options open. Mrs. Burns stated that she had attended a year-round conference and would not be for or against year-round school without more data about its affect on the Jurupa District and she felt the study should be done. Mr. Chavez stated that he opposed year-round school from a financial standpoint that the district may have to return the money if it does not go yearround. He felt the district should have followed through with the study in 1989.

APPROVE APPLICATION FOR YEAR-ROUND SCHOOL PLANNING GRANT -Motion #207 (Cont'd)

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the Superintendent's intent was to put the implementation grant funds in a holding account pending the outcome of the study and clarification from the state. She noted that the district has an obligation to complete the study to determine if year-round school is feasible.

In response to Mr. Barne's question, the Director of Administrative Services replied that the state currently requires implementation of year-round school by July 1, 1992. The direction of the state is that construction funds which come from future bond issues will only be available for those districts on year-round school. If Mira Loma Middle School is funded from the November 1990 bond money, neither Mira Loma Middle nor Stone Avenue Elementary should be affected by the July 1, 1992 deadline. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED WITH A 3 TO 2 VOTE: AYES, PRESIDENT RUANE, MRS. BURNS, AND MR. BARNES; NAYS, MR. CHAVEZ AND MR. MEDINA.

ADOPT RESOLUTION SUPPORTING LEGISLATION TO CODIFY MIRA DECISION -Motion #208

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that locally there has been resistance to the 1988 court decision in the case of Mira Development Corporation versus City of San Diego which allows mitigation over and above the statutory fee of \$1.58 per square foot for new residential construction. The County Planning Department has resisted denying projects or changing mitigation when the district expresses concern about the impact on school facilities. Resolution #91/35 supports legislation codifying the Mira Decision and opposes the enactment of any legislation repealing or changing the Mira Decision.

MR. MEDINA MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT RESOLUTION #91/35 IN SUPPORT OF LEGISLATION CODIFYING THE MIRA DECISION. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

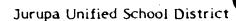
