COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

1. Recognition

- * a. Recognize Red Ribbon Week by Adopting Resolution 92/07, Commitment to a Drug-Free Community (Mr. Taylor)

Californians for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. (CADFY) and the State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs have announced that its annual California RED RIBBON CAMPAIGN will be held October 19-27, 1991. Other sponsors include the State Department of Education, the California Parent Teacher Association and the Attorney General's Crime Prevention Center. In 1985, Federal Agent Enrique Camarena was murdered by drug traffickers and the Red Ribbon Campaign was begun in support of a drug-free nation. The red ribbon is a visible support for the value "Drug Free & Proud." The Red Ribbon Campaign provides the framework for a positive prevention strategy.

1. Recognition

* a. Recognize Red Ribbon Week by Adopting Resolution #92/07, Commitment to a Drug-Free Community (Cont'd)

The Jurupa Unified School District and Jurupans United for Substance Abuse Training (J.U.S.T. Draw the Line) plan to coordinate a program encouraging employees and community members to wear a red ribbon during this week as visible support for a drug-free community.

This is an opportunity to create districtwide positive peer pressure, provide educational drug-free activities, and engage community support. All school sites have personalized Red Ribbon Week objectives in support of this campaign.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #92/07, Commitment to a Drug-Free Community, as shown in the supporting documents.

b. Recognize Adopt-A-School Partnership

(Mr. Taylor)

The Board is pleased to recognize a new Adopt-A-School partnership being formed between Jurupa Valley High School and McDonald's on Limonite. Mike Rix of McDonald's, has met with Principal Alan Young to discuss ways that the business can become involved in school programs. A variety of activities have been reviewed including promoting fund raising activities and providing student awards and incentives. In addition, Mr. Rix has donated helmets for use in the horsemanship class and an IBM computer system for the school.

An adoption certificate will be signed to formalize this new Adopt-A-School partnership.

* a. Adopt Resolution #92/09 in Support of Establishing a Law School on UCR Campus

The District received a letter from UCR LAW which is an Inland Empire support group organized for the purpose of promoting the establishment of a law school at the University of California, Riverside. Also included was a partial list of those organizations and leaders in higher education who have officially endorsed a law school at UCR. Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #92/09 in Support of Establishing a Law School on the UCR campus as shown in the supporting documents.

* b. Consider Nominations for the 1991 Election of Members to the Riverside County Committee on School District Organization

Included in the supporting documents is a letter and other information on the 1991 Election of Members to the Riverside County Committee on School District Organization (SDO). The Second Supervisorial District includes Alvord, Jurupa, Corona-Norco and Riverside Unified School Districts and Riverside Community College.

* b. Consider Nominations for the 1991 Election of Members to the Riverside County Committee on School District Organization (Cont'd)

The Jurupa District may submit a nomination for a qualified and interested candidate from this area to represent the Second Supervisorial District. Mrs. Katherine Westley, whose term is expiring this year, may wish to continue on the committee. Governing Boards are invited to recommend candidates who reside within the supervisorial district for which they are nominated. Written nominations must be received by the Riverside County Office of Education by Wednesday, October 16, 1991.

Board member Jose Medina will serve as the District's Representative Delegate to fill County Committee vacancies from the list of nominees. This will occur at a regular meeting of the Riverside County School Boards Association on Tuesday, October 29, 1991, 5:15 p.m. at Raincross Square as part of the program format for the Fifth Annual ACSA/CSBA Fall Conference.

c. Accept Donations for Schools

All donations are given to Jurupa Unified School District with the request that the money or item be used at the designated school.

The members of the Rubidoux High School Band, Color Guard and Parent Boosters would like to donate a 1986 GMAC Model 7000 22' Truck, valued at \$8,500, with the request that it be used at Rubidoux High School for the Band and Color Guard.

KMart Corporation would like to donate \$1,374.02 of office supplies with the request that it be used as needed at school sites and the district office.

Troth Street Elementary School PTA wishes to donate \$5,100 with the request that it be used for field trips at Troth Street Elementary during the 1991/92 school year.

West Riverside County Businessmen's Association wishes to donate \$1,400 with the request that it be used at Jurupa Valley High School for the FFA AG Support Group (\$100), Agriculture Department-Equine Science (\$100), Silver Brigade (\$100), Career/College Center (\$500) and the Jurupa Unified School District Just Draw The Line Project (\$600).

*** B. Consider Initiation of YRE Planning**

(Dr. Wilson)

At the September 16 Board meeting a thorough discussion was held on the State requirement for the District to have 30% of the elementary students enrolled in Year Round Education (YRE) by July 1, 1992 (this is referred to as substantial enrollment requirement) in order to obtain \$8.8 million funding for a third middle school. At that meeting the Board did not authorize administration to initiate YRE planning for the 1992 school year. The understanding of administration of that action was that this issue was to be placed on a subsequent agenda in order to give the community an opportunity to provide input.

It's important to understand the dilemma the Board and the District face in making a decision about YRE for the 1992/93 school year. On the one hand is the need for a middle school which will become very urgent within five years as the student enrollment at that level approaches 3,000. The state is offering to meet this need by providing \$8.8 million in construction money.

On the other hand is the additional costs to the district's General Fund that implementation of YRE will generate. The fiscal feasibility study estimated this cost to be approximately \$600,000 annually. Such costs are particularly onerous when sufficient space to house students already exists in Jurupa for 1992/93 with the opening of the two new elementary schools.

An additional complexity for the Board is introduced by the fact that the State Allocation Board is considering an alternative way for districts to meet this substantial enrollment requirement. In effect, this alternative would cause the district's eligibility for building new schools to be reduced by a figure equal to 30% of the elementary school enrollment. The district would then be permitted to choose its own date for YRE implementation. This would open the door for districts throughout California to implement YRE based on local needs and desires. A letter of support of this concept from Senator Presley to Senator Greene, a member of SAB, is included in the supporting documents on pages B 1 and 2.

* B. Consider Initiation of YRE Planning (Cont'd)

In conversing with a representative from Senator Presley's office, I am informed that the State Allocation Board (SAB) had hoped to make a decision on this option at its September 25 meeting. However, it has been the past practice for any topic on the SAB agenda to be held until a future meeting in the absence of any one of the four legislative representatives. Assemblyman Steve Peace was not present at the September 25 meeting and has informed the SAB that he will not be present at the next two meetings. As such this adds to the uncertainty as to when the SAB will make a decision concerning "substantial enrollment" requirement.

In the meantime, the urgent need to inform the community of this requirement to be on year round education by July 1, 1992 and to begin the massive planning that such a change will require, makes a Board authorization to the staff to begin such planning imperative.

Sample checklists of decisions to be made or jobs to be completed in each of these areas have been included in supporting documents B 3 through 10. These documents demonstrate the scope of the required planning.

Planning for the implementation of year round education involves the consideration of at least eleven (11) major areas of responsibility. Each area requires the development of a checklist of major activities/decisions and responsibilities which must be delineated before July 1, 1992. The following areas of concern have been gleaned from the research literature on YRE and from the planning documents developed by local school districts: Personnel, Support Services, Budget, Public Information and Notification, Administration, Calendar Development, Track Registration, Scheduling, Reporting, Management, and Buildings and Grounds.

Staff has developed the following approximate planning timeline.

* B. Consider Initiation of YRE Planning (Cont'd)

As was stated at the last board meeting, the decision to go year round can be modified at a later Board meeting should the SAB change its present requirements. However, the time for proper notification to parents and for effective planning to begin is now.

One of the most urgent planning needs is to begin the formation of the Ad Hoc YRE Steering Committee. The reason this is an urgent need is because the formation of the committee will take time in that not only must it be formed in a thoughtful manner but confirmation of people's willingness to serve must be obtained. Such a committee needs to be broadly representative of the community and staff and as such should be composed of approximately thirty people.

Administration would recommend that the ad hoc committee be created as follows:

- 1) Each Board member name two community representatives who have consented to serve.
- 2) Each bargaining unit name two representatives.
- 3) Site administration would be represented by three elementary principals, one middle school principal, and one high school principal.
- 4) Education Services, Personnel and Business Services would be represented by a maximum of four representatives.
- 5) The remaining members of the committee would be filled with representation from community business organizations such as West Riverside Businessmen's Association and Jurupa Chamber of Commerce; youth organizations such as Scouts and Little League; day care providers, parents, minorities, etc.

The charge that the Board would make to such a committee would include at least the following:

- 1) Study current YRE programs to become knowledgeable about successful practices.
- 2) Recommend the student calendar.
- 3) Recommend a method for student track assignment.
- 4) Conduct appropriate community forums.

If SAB relieves the District of the July 1, 1992 obligation, this information would be provided to the YRE Steering Committee. This would permit the committee to continue planning but might change the implementation date to a time made necessary by increased enrollment.

The magnitude of this effort requires ad hoc assistance to the Assistant Superintendent Education Services. The funding for such assistance would come from the YRE implementation grant of approximately \$83,000. This implementation grant money, should JUSD not have substantial enrollment in YRE by July 1, 1992, would have to be repaid to the State during the 1992/93 fiscal year.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize administration to initiate YRE planning for the 1992 school year.

* C. Affirm Submittal of Application to Participate in the Middle Grades Mathematics Renaissance Project (Mrs. Roberts)

Middle schools in California were invited by the State Department of Education to participate in a Middle Grades Mathematics Renaissance Project. The purpose of this project is to improve mathematics instruction by participating in a long-range effort to put into place a mathematics program that meets the specifications of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTA) and the 1991 State Mathematics Framework. According to the State Department of Education, successful implementation of such a program requires new curriculum, new assessment mechanisms, and most of all, extensive professional development for the faculty. Mission Middle School has applied to be a participant in the project and if they are successful, will have two (2) mathematics teachers participate in this statewide effort to pilot performance assessment tasks consistent with the intended curriculum in conjunction with the development of a new state assessment system.

During the summer of 1992, the district must agree to encourage mathematic teachers at the site to participate in a four (4) week summer academy. The principal indicates that School Improvement funds may be used for this purpose.

A copy of the application narrative is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board affirm submittal of Mission Middle School's application to participate in the Middle Grades Mathematics Renaissance project.

D. Annexation of Property into Community Facilities District No. 1 (Mr. Edmunds)

Board members may recall that Community Facilities District (CFD) No. 1 of the Jurupa Unified School District was formed to finance public facilities including water and sewer facilities for Jurupa Community Services District and public school facilities for Jurupa Unified School District. CFD No. 1 consists of two non-contiguous improvement areas. Improvement Area No. 1 consists of 240 homes developed by Van Daele Development Co. for which 2.5 million dollars of bonds were issued to finance public facilities. Improvement Area No. 2 is a tract of 442 homes to be developed by Concordia Homes, Inc. for which \$4.4 million dollars of bonds were issued to finance facilities.

At the time the CFD was formed, Van Daele Development Co. was contemplating purchasing Tract 20420; a tract of 102 homes to be constructed on 30 acres adjacent to Improvement Area No. 1. Because of this possibility, the improvement area was established with enough bonding capacity to finance the additional public facilities that would be required for this property. The property could then be annexed into the CFD with a special tax assessment to secure the issuance of bonds.

Van Daele Development Co. is now in a position to move ahead in acquiring this property and has requested that Jurupa Unified School District continue to act as lead agency in the annexation of this property into the CFD. There is an existing grandfathered fee agreement on this property of \$1,400 per unit that was signed in 1985. The District is legally bound by this agreement and cannot require the developer to provide mitigation above this amount. However, the developer may voluntarily agree to a higher amount.

D. Annexation of Property into Community Facilities District No. 1 (Cont'd)

Since there is very little benefit to the District to annex this property into the CFD at the amount of the existing fee agreement, the Assistant Superintendent Business Services suggested to Van Daele Development Co. that an improved mitigation formula would be desirable. After some negotiating, we have reached an agreement with Van Daele Development Co. to levy the same assessment on the new property as currently exists in Improvement Area No. 1, which provides \$1,915 per home to the school district. In addition, Van Daele Development Co. will pay \$1,400 per home in cash when building permits are pulled.

This agreement will result in \$338,130 in special tax revenue to the district, which is a considerable improvement over the \$142,800 which the District would be entitled to without annexing this property into CFD No. 1 with a higher negotiated fee per home. Information only.

In November, 1979, California voters adopted Proposition 4, commonly called the Gann amendment. This amendment was incorporated into the State Constitution as Article XIIIB. It requires all public agencies, including school districts, to compute an appropriations limit each year, based on a formula provided by the State. The District limit changes each year, depending on increases in pupil attendance and the Consumer Price Index.

H. Approve Routine Action Items by Consent

- * 4. Resolution 92/08, Appropriations Limit Pursuant to Article XIII B of the California State Constitution (Cont'd)

On September 17, 1990, the Board approved the calculation of the 1990-91 appropriations limit based on estimated revenue and pupil attendance. At this time, the District is required to submit to the State a recalculation for 1990-91, based on actual figures, and a calculation for 1991-92, based on budget projections.

These appropriations limits, also known as the "Gann Limit", have to do with how much tax money the State may appropriate. They do not affect the amount of money the District may spend. The 1990-91 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District was recalculated and increased from \$43,031,310 to \$44,109,374; the 1991-92 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District is \$47,396,251. Calculations are as shown in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution 92/08, Appropriations Limits for 1990-91 and 1991-92.

- * 5. Non-Routine Field Trip for Rubidoux High School (Mrs. Roberts)

The Rubidoux High School Agriculture Department is requesting permission to participate in the livestock show at Farmers Fair of Perris, October 14-20, 1991. Students will exhibit and sell class projects that have been raised in class. Students will return home each evening.

The students will be supervised by instructors and parent volunteers. Transportation will be provided by district vehicles. This is a voluntary activity and each student will be responsible for his/her own expenses. No student shall be denied the opportunity to participate in this event due to lack of personal funds.

This activity will also provide students with a learning experience about marketing and finance and provide an opportunity to learn and practice various agricultural skills.

It is recommended that the Board approve this non-routine field trip request for the Rubidoux High School Agriculture Department to participate in the livestock show at the Farmers Fair of Perris on October 14-20, 1991.

2. Non-Public School Placements

(Dr. Hendrick)

The District is responsible for serving all handicapped children who are at least three years of age but not over twenty-two years of age under the Education of All Handicapped Children Act of 1975 (PL 94-142). When no appropriate public school placement is available either within the local school district or the County Office of Education, then it is necessary to place these pupils in a non-public school. The law requires that we advise the Board of such placements.

This month, we have placed 2 Severely Emotionally Disturbed (SED) pupils at Advocate School. One of these pupils resides in an LCI operated within our district and is therefore 100% reimbursed by the State. One is a district pupil; the cost is \$89 per day; 70% of this cost, or approximately \$62.00/day will be refunded by the State. We have placed two Severely Handicapped Pre-School pupils at Children's Center. These pupils are from our district; the cost is \$41.80 per day; 70% of this cost, or approximately \$29.26/day will be refunded by the State.

2. Non-Public School Placements (Cont'd)

We have also placed 6 Severely Emotionally Disturbed pupils at Sommerset School. Five of these pupils reside in LCI's operated within our district and are therefore 100% reimbursed by the State. One is a district pupil; the cost is \$94.50 per day; 70% of this cost, or approximately \$66.43 will be refunded by the State. We have placed 2 Severely Emotionally Disturbed pupils at Crossroads School. These 2 pupils are district pupils; the cost is \$95.00 per day; 70% of the cost, or approximately \$66.50 will be refunded by the State. Code Nos.:91.1-91.10

The Case for a Law School at UCR

The University of California has assumed a major responsibility for professional education in this state and yet is not fulfilling that role in the education of California lawyers. Enrollment in the law schools at the UC campuses has lagged behind overall enrollment of the university by a substantial margin. The University provides enrollment for only approximately 18% of the law students in ABA accredited schools in Southern California. Obviously, the percentage is lower if the State accredited and unaccredited schools are counted. As a result, most students who want a legal education must seek it from private schools. Since space in the University system is limited, only a small percentage of students who apply can be admitted. UCLA regularly turns away significant numbers of well-qualified students.

The UC system has four law schools - three of them are located in Northern California, despite the fact that the bulk of the lawyers and the general population of the state is located in the south. The Inland Empire area of Southern California is projected to have a population of over 3 million people by the turn of the century, and yet there are no ABA accredited law schools in the area.

The University of California, in its four schools, provides a quality education for lawyers. This is demonstrated by the stature of the law schools and by the passing rate for the bar exam of graduates from UC schools. California has several fine private law schools that also do an excellent job of educating lawyers. There are a number of unaccredited schools which, although quite expensive for students, frequently do not give the education needed to pass the bar examination. With the UC system failing to provide enough spaces for law students in Southern California, those students must turn to expensive and sometimes inferior schools for an education.

Of the sixteen ABA accredited law schools, only two are located any significant distance from the ocean, and nearly all are located in major metropolitan areas. There is a great need for a publicly funded law school in an inland area which will be available to a different socio-economic strata of students and under-represented students. The affordability of housing near a law school is a real factor for a great many students. The University of California at Riverside could provide the perfect location to satisfy all of the needs set forth above.

UCR is favored by its location in another way. Riverside is a county seat and San Bernardino, also a county seat, is only 10 miles away. This gives immediate access to numerous public law offices in the two counties and provides an opportunity for clinical programs, internships, etc., for the law school. People operating in the public law sector feel that law schools generally need to provide an atmosphere of encouragement to get students into their area of the law. A law school at UCR could provide assistance in that regard. The judges of Riverside and San Bernardino and the justices of the Court of Appeal in San Bernardino support a law school at UCR because they know that their courts can provide programs which will benefit both the courts and a new law school.

A select committee appointed by UC President David Gardner recently released a report entitled "Analysis of Graduate Legal Education at the University of California." The committee found that the UC system should enroll more law students to remedy a shortage of minority and public service attorneys in the state. This report is a blueprint for a law school in the Inland Empire area.

UCR, as one of the fastest growing campuses in the county, is ready for and needs an anchor professional school. It has the site available. Plans are being prepared for the possible inclusion of a courtroom of the Twenty-First Century as focal point of the new building.

There is overwhelming evidence of support from the community. Dozens of governmental entities, chambers of commerce, civic groups, school boards, universities, lawyers, organizations, and others have passed resolutions and sent letters in support of the idea.

It is undoubtedly true that California has more than enough law schools in sheer number and many argue that it has more lawyers than it needs. The fact remains, however, that there is a crying need for quality legal education and well-trained lawyers. The University of California should be doing its usual efficient job of providing that sort of quality education through a public institution. The best place to locate a new law school is at the university campus in Riverside.

**RULES FOR THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE
COUNTY COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL DISTRICT ORGANIZATION**

1. A candidate must be nominated from the floor at the election meeting by an authorized representative delegate.
2. A candidate must be a citizen and, if nominated for a supervisorial district, must reside within that supervisorial district. A Candidate for Member-At-Large may reside anywhere in Riverside County.
3. A candidate may be nominated for both a supervisorial district and for membership-at-large. However, a candidate who is subsequently elected to both positions must accept the supervisorial district position.
4. A candidate cannot be an employee of either the County Superintendent of Schools, a school district, or a community college district. However, any member of the governing board of a school district or community college district in the same or any other county who is otherwise eligible may simultaneously serve as a member of the county committee.
5. An authorized representative delegate may cast one vote for each vacant position.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services noted that studies indicate year round education presents partial relief to overcrowding. YRE also reduces building costs for the state by having it as a requirement to remain in the State building program. Advantages and disadvantages of year round schools as noted in the Peltier study would be reviewed as the staff moves through the timeline for completing major tasks. Most neighboring districts have some schools on year round or are moving in that direction.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reviewed some statistics pertaining to the need for building a third middle school. Current 2nd and 3rd graders will be 7th and 8th graders in five years. 2nd grade has 1,352 students, and 3rd grade has 1,338 students, for a total of 2,690 students so far this school year. The district's two middle schools are near capacity with 2,279 students. The five year projection for 7th and 8th grade students was as follows: 92/93 -2485; 93/94 -2628; 94/95 - 2781; 95/96 -2978; 96/97 - 3143. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that projections were derived from the State Cohort formula, which is the basis for qualifying for the State building program and considered to be conservative. He also noted that financial considerations for year round schools include: capital costs, operational costs, transition costs, and special revenue incentives which are in addition to current ADA. Complying with the 30% requirement would result in four elementary schools moving to YRE at an annual cost of about \$600,000.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services observed that a variety of factors come into play when moving toward year round education, chief among them would be resistance to change. She felt it would be highly important to provide an opportunity for all segments of the community to have a voice in some of the decisions relative to implementing the program. Some advantages to YRE were: improved student and teacher attendance resulting in additional revenue for the district; increased opportunities for teachers to earn higher pay and also substitute with knowledge of the curriculum; more opportunity for enrichment and remedial programs during intercessions, and reduction in vandalism. The Assistant Superintendent pointed out that careful planning would avoid some of the disadvantages. Other districts have accomplished this transition successfully. Board approval of the proposal to initiate YRE planning for the 1992 school year would preserve \$8.8 million to build a third middle school.

The Superintendent announced that the State Allocation Board approved funding for Mira Loma Middle School at its September 11, 1991 meeting. The Office of Local Assistance will release funds upon receipt of the district's bid. A couple of years ago the district obtained a waiver to remain on the priority list for the State building program by agreeing to have 30% of elementary students on YRE by July 1, 1992.

Mr. Chavez stated that although he had been opposed to year round education for sometime, there is a need for additional facilities. Quite a few years ago the district made an extensive survey of the community and the outcome on establishing year round schools was close. The Superintendent responded that the climate has changed. Teachers are more positive about year round education, and the benefits for both families and teachers are more clearly defined.

The Superintendent commented that middle school enrollment could increase by at least 600 students within five years. Without a third middle school about 20 additional classrooms would be needed at a cost of \$50,000 each. The district should accept \$8.8 million from the state and build Mira Loma Middle School with a projected opening date of 1993. Mr. Medina asked at what point would a third middle school be essential. The Superintendent replied that the district's two middle schools have reached capacity. One portable classroom was added to each campus this year. Mr. Chavez added that the State building program is running out of money and not much is expected in the near future. The need for a third middle school will increase each year.

The Superintendent noted that the State Allocation Board is considering an alternative under AB 87 which would reduce school districts' eligibility for building new schools by the 30% requirement, allowing districts to establish YRE when the need arises. For Jurupa, this reduction would amount to about about 37,200 square feet or one elementary school.

Mrs. Burns stated that the year round process probably has many excellent points. She was concerned that the state requires the district to spend money it may not have for year round education in order to get funds for a needed middle school. Mr. Barnes noted that in a few years some people might question the Board's delay in building the school if the cost increases substantially. He asked the cost for converting four elementary schools to year round. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services replied that the annual estimated cost to put 30% of K-6 students on YRE would be about \$600,000. Some of the cost would be offset by additional grant money and operational money. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services pointed out that the main consideration should be the educational impact on students of overcrowded middle school campuses. Nearly all schools in Jurupa are reaching capacity.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services explained that the law requires the community be notified by November 1, 1991 of its intent to implement YRE. In response to Mrs. Burns' question, the Superintendent said the 30% commitment to YRE is a state requirement that cannot be bypassed. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH FAILED WITH A 3 TO 2 VOTE: NAYS, MR. MEDINA, MRS. RUANE, AND MRS. BURNS; AYES, MR. CHAVEZ AND MR. BARNES; Mr. Medina commented that he felt the district was moving in a positive direction for considering year round education. Mr. Chavez said it has been under discussion for sometime, and he was convinced it should be done and opened to the community at the next meeting. Mrs. Burns stated she was confident that administration could organize a successful implementation, but she was resistant to change as it relates to the state's funding process for providing needed schools. The Superintendent indicated the topic will be on the October 7 board agenda, notices will be sent home with K-6 students, and publicized in local newspapers.

Dear Senator Greene:

I am writing to encourage the State Allocation Board to take action at their September 25, meeting to adopt regulations for the implementation of AB 87, relating to year-round school requirements for state funding.

It has come to my attention that a great deal of confusion is occurring within the school community over the requirements of this new statute, and Board action to implement the bill's provisions without further delay are necessary in order for effective school facilities planning at the local level.

I would also like to express my strong support for one of the AB 87 implementation proposals now before the Board which would fund school districts at the reduced year-round eligibility levels, but would remove requirements that districts actually adopt year-round plans. The unique local educational needs that make up the fabric of this state require that local flexibility be the cornerstone of any statewide educational program. As an example, many of our state's desert communities, which I represent, will face greater limitations in the implementation of year-round education due to the significant impact of 110+ degree heat on physical education programs, transportation of students on busses, and general student safety and well-being.

While I do not believe these problems are insurmountable, I do believe we must ask whether it is realistic or even desirable to lock all school districts, regardless of local uniqueness, into choosing year-round education over other possible alternatives for housing excess students. Accordingly, I am supportive of the

proposal, now before you, which would have the State continue to fund new school construction at the reduced year-round levels, while allowing communities who do not wish to go year-round the option of bonding or taxing themselves for the costs of building the additional classrooms needed to operate on a traditional calendar. The State, in recognition of its inability to fully fund school construction needs, is generally moving in the direction of encouraging local financing for schools; in such a system, it follows that communities which are strongly opposed to year-round education should also have the option of providing the more costly traditional facilities, if they are willing to bear the costs.

Thank you for your consideration and again, I urge immediate adoption of Board regulations implementing AB 87.

APPLICATION NARRATIVE

Explain in 750 words or less why your school is a good prospect for succeeding in a complete revamping of its mathematics program over the next several years.

In the past, Mission Middle School used a packet and rote textbook approach to teaching mathematics. The current low level of mathematical achievement among MMS students must be reversed if students are to escape the economic realities their families now face. Most of our students cannot employ a variety of problem solving strategies nor can they visually or concretely represent mathematical concepts. For example, students may have memorized a formula but have no concept of what the formula will tell them in a real-life situation. If our students are to compete in the highly technological 21st Century workplace, they must be motivated to begin developing, to the fullest, their mathematical power - a vital key to opportunity since mathematics will continue to serve as the foundation for science and technology.

We are working towards improving our teaching effectiveness as we change the instructional and curricular emphasis found in our mathematics classes. We have abandoned teaching the typically decontextualized arithmetic algorithms which are notoriously boring and ineffective for many students. Additionally, we have abandoned ability grouping in favor of heterogeneously grouped math classes. Widely acknowledged by prominent educational leaders (e.g., Resnick; Wiggins) and teachers alike, the needed "Thinking Curriculum" goals will be difficult to achieve if emphasis continues to be placed on the superficial coverage that results from "the forced march through the textbook." Currently SIP funds targeted for Mathematics have been available to the department for the development of thematic units, supplemental resources and staff development activities.

As teachers in the mathematics department at MMS, we are committed to collaboratively developing and implementing a unit-based, activity-centered curriculum designed to challenge students with real-life problems which, by nature, require students to explore, experiment, investigate, reason, and communicate mathematically. Such problems would also necessitate that the students integrate concepts from various mathematical strands (e.g., geometry, algebra, probability and statistics). By engaging them in authentic mathematical activities, we hope to develop in all students a spirit of inquiry and excitement for learning mathematics. Ultimately we expect our students to be more motivated, confident, and able to make mathematically-informed decisions.

In an effort to align assessment with our curriculum and integrate assessment with instruction, our program includes designing benchmark activities. Performance on these benchmarks is a deliberate component of the portfolios students are constructing of their developing mathematical power. As windows into students' thinking and our classrooms, portfolios are utilized for classroom assessment.

We have a devoted staff of mathematics teachers, 100% of whom have participated in innovative mathematics training (e.g., Interactive Mathematics Projects, Project TEAMS, Math Solution, Project Equals, Math A, and County Workshops). The openness of our math staff to change is evident in their current teaching practices and their desire to participate in the Math Renaissance Project.

For the past two years we have had as our department head, Nanette Seago, a member of the CAP Mathematics Item Writing Team and a consultant to NAEP. Nanette has created thematic units with the properties described above; she has provided and will continue to provide the strong leadership needed to initiate this program aimed at improving the teaching effectiveness of the mathematics staff.

The principal and the Assistant Superintendent of Instruction are strongly committed to this project as illustrated by the targeting a SIP funds for Mathematics. We believe that our current emphasis and the support for change initiative in mathematics make us quality candidates for participation in the Math Renaissance Project.
