COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

1. Recognition

a. Recognize Jurupa's 1991/92 Principal of the Year

(Mrs. Roberts)

Each year, the district is invited to submit the name of a candidate for County "Principal of the Year". This competition gives districts an opportunity to recognize an important leader among the school site management staff. This year, we are pleased to honor Mrs. Laverne Manns, Principal of Indian Hills Elementary School as Jurupa's "1991/92 Principal of the Year".

1. Recognition

a. Recognize Jurupa's 1991/92 Principal of the Year (Cont'd)

Mrs. Manns came to the district sixteen years ago as a Language Specialist. Subsequently she served as an Instructional Coordinator and Coordinator of Elementary Education. She began as principal at West Riverside Elementary School in 1979 and in 1986 was named principal of Indian Hills. In addition to the countless hours she devotes to her students, staff and parents, she has held various leadership positions in Phi Delta Kappa, an educational fraternity.

This is her twenty-sixth year in education. She started her career in the Colton Unified School District as an elementary teacher. Among Mrs. Manns' many outstanding characteristics is her ability to work with parents and the community in support of their children's education. Two years ago Mrs. Manns was recognized for her work with parents when she was named Principal of the Year by the 23rd District PTA. She carries out her tasks in such a way that people are most willing to cooperate with her on just about any project she undertakes. Mrs. Manns is a caring and concerned administrator and we are delighted to honor her.

* b. Recognize Outstanding Achievement of Judy Jones, Cafeteria Manager at Jurupa Valley High School (Mr. Edmunds)

Each year the California Milk Advisory Board sponsors the Food Service Achievement Awards Competition which consists of a statewide recipe contest using dairy products. Recipes are judged on originality, presentation, appropriate use of dairy products, ease of preparation, and food costs. Winning recipes are distributed to Food Service Directors throughout the State.

Judy Jones, Cafeteria Manager at Jurupa Valley High School, was awarded third prize in the 1991 Achievement Awards Competition. Judy's "Mexican Lasagne" was enjoyed frequently last year by staff at Jurupa Valley High School. Judy received a prize of \$150 for her winning recipe, and Jurupa Valley High School was also awarded \$150 to be applied toward new kitchen equipment. The award letter is included in the supporting documents. Congratulations Judy!

c. Recognize Rubidoux High School for Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute Award (Mrs. Roberts)

For the past three years, Rubidoux High School has been involved in the Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute (CTEI) in cooperation with the School of Education at the University of California, Riverside. This program is based on two goals: (1) to re-conceptualize and re-design several UCR teacher education courses for high school teachers, and (2) to demonstrate progress in implementing a professional development school. CTEI involves cooperation between Rubidoux High School classroom teachers, UCR School of Education faculty, and faculty in other disciplines such as the social sciences, natural sciences, and the humanities.

c. Recognize Rubidoux High School for Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute Award (Cont'd)

As a result of their involvement with CTEI, Rubidoux High School was honored with a "Quality of Education Award" from the California Council for the Education of Teachers.

The current director, Dr. Judith Sandholtz, submitted an application on behalf of Rubidoux High School and was notified of the award presentation to Rubidoux High School. A luncheon was held October 25th at the Hyatt Regency, Irvine to honor recipients of the Quality Education Award. Ben Bunz, Rubidoux High School Assistant Principal, and five classroom teachers attended and received a plaque noting this honor.

At the Board of Education meeting on October 21, 1991, the Board approved the names of twenty-eight community and staff members to serve on the Year-Round Education Ad Hoc Steering Committee.

Initial meetings of the Year-Round Education Steering Committee have been scheduled for November 14th and 21st, and December 12th. Each meeting will begin at 5:00 p.m. All meetings will be held in the Board Room at the Education Center.

Preliminary tasks of the committee will include: recommendation of a student calendar and a track assignment plan.

It is recommended that the Board approve the additional nominees to the Ad Hoc Year-Round Education Steering Committee for 1991/92.

D. Report on Project 20 -- 2nd Addition to Jurupa Valley High School (Dr. Wilson)

Planning for Jurupa Valley High School began in 1984 with the creation of a master plan that would allow the school to expand as the district became eligible for more square footage. Approval to construct the new high school started with 47,000 square feet and expanded to 120,000 square feet to house 1,400 students with an optimum size of 180,000 square feet to house 2,200 students. Construction of the 1st Addition of classrooms was just completed.

Project 20, approximately 25,000 square feet, was planned to include additional science, math and business classrooms. At present, we are meeting the housing needs at Jurupa Valley with portables. As the high school continues to grow (see projection in the supporting documents, D Page 1) additional portables will be required at a cost of \$4,000 each. Also, it is difficult to meet the needs of science classrooms through portables.

As such, it appears that it is appropriate to move ahead with the necessary planning for the completion of Project 20. The only way the district can get in line for construction funding is to obtain working drawings stamped by the Office of the State Architect (OSA). This would provide us with Phase III approval without funding. In order to do Project 20, the district must again front architectural costs. This establishes an information date which determines the order of funding when a new state bond is passed by the voters.

We presently owe the architect \$56,000 for his work in providing us the necessary drawings for approval of allocation for Phase II of Project 20. In order to acquire the stamped working drawings necessary for Phase III approval, an additional \$156,000 in architect fees and \$25,000 in plan check fees will be required. This would put our total liability to the architect at \$237,000. If the District could pay the \$56,000 it owes, then the architect would begin work on the working drawings with no expectation that payments of fees would begin until the 1992 fiscal year.

Project 20 is presently at Phase II in the Office of Local Assistance (OLA) approval process. It is agendized for the December 4, 1991 meeting at which time the district will receive approval without allocation for \$237,000 in architect and plan check fees. This money would be available as new state bond elections are passed.

In tight fiscal times, it becomes increasingly difficult to front this kind of money in order to meet classroom needs of our community. Further, it might be assumed that this is taking a risk with general fund money. The fact of the matter is that this facility will have to be completed at some time in the future. Completion of the facility, whether it's with state bond money, or district money or a gift from heaven, will still require proper architectural drawings. As such, the money is not at risk.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the Architect to begin development of the working drawings necessary for Phase III of Project 20.

Breakfast is now served at Ina Arbuckle and West Riverside Elementary Schools to a total of approximately 360 hungry students each morning. Last year the Food Services Department was notified that a Breakfast Grant of \$10,100 would be awarded to the Jurupa Unified School District to implement the School Breakfast Program. This money was received in August and by October 1st the program began with overwhelming success.

The entire Food Services staff has contributed to the smooth transition into serving breakfast. Jurupa Valley High School cafeteria employees wrap approximately 1,000 individual bowls of cereal each week, and help bake cinnamon rolls, coffee cake, and muffins as needed. The baker at Rubidoux High School is currently producing cinnamon rolls, while the Middle Schools bake coffee cakes which are served to students before school.

Menus are simple and require no cooking. The nutritional requirements include two servings of bread, or one serving of bread and one ounce of protein rich food, or two ounces of protein rich food, and one half cup fruit, vegetable, or juice, and 8 ounces of fresh fluid milk. A copy of our current menu is included in the supporting documents, along with student comments on the program.

It appears that the Breakfast Program not only meets the nutritional needs of students, but also is very cost effective. An additional 2.25 hours of Activity Supervisors' time was added to cashier for breakfast. Two student workers at each school assemble and serve breakfast. All other production was absorbed with existing employees. Additional income from government reimbursements, commodities and student payments will more than offset increased costs for food, labor, and supplies, making this a "win win" program overall.

The intent is to expand the Breakfast Program to other elementary schools which indicate a desire for the program and can demonstrate a potential for adequate participation. It is well documented that hungry students do not function well in school. Food Services is thrilled with the positive feedback received from students and staff at both Ina Arbuckle and West Riverside Elementary Schools and looks forward to expanding the Breakfast Program to additional sites in the near future.

1. Authorize Substitution of Subcontractor on Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project (Mr. Edmunds)

RJW Construction Company, the prime contractor for the construction portion of the Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project, has requested Board approval to substitute CMI (Millwork Express) for Richards Cabinets and Millworks, who was the listed cabinet/millwork subcontractor on the original bid.

F. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Authorize Substitution of Subcontractor on Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project (Cont'd)

Public Contract Code 4107 prohibits the prime contractor from replacing any subcontractor listed in the original bid except for certain specific reasons, and then only with authority from the awarding body. One of the allowable reasons is if the listed subcontractor fails to perform his or her subcontract. Due to scheduling conflicts, Richards Cabinets and Millworks is unable to perform the work and has requested to be replaced on the Granite Hill project. The District sent Richards Cabinets and Millworks a certified letter advising them of the request from RJW Construction Company. They did not file any written objections within the allowable five (5) days; which, therefore, constitutes their consent to the substitution.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the request from RJW Construction Company to replace Richards Cabinets and Millworks with CMI (Millwork Express) for the cabinet/millwork portion of the Granite Hill Elementary School Construction Project.

2. Approve Change Order #2 for Granite Hill Elementary School (Dr. Wilson)

Change Order #2 for Granite Hill Elementary School in the amount of \$17,217.90 is for the following: Stucco finish at parapet wall in lieu of plywood; Two teacher center cabinet units at room numbers 48/49 and 51/54; Six electrical grounds at six portable classroom buildings; Four type 'B' light fixtures in classrooms 48/49 and 51/54; Lower height of suspended T-bar ceiling grid by six inches to avoid HVAC ducting and lights in one classroom; Smoke detectors and audio visual alarms added by O.S.A. review of deferred submittal of fire alarm system; and add 2 x 4 facia at trellage structure for welding bottom angle plate at three steel saddles to support glu-lam trellage members.

Funding for this additive change order should come from the State's Leroy Greene Lease-Purchase Program.

Administration recommends the Board approve additive Change Order #2 on Legal Bid #90/12L for Granite Hill Elementary School in the amount of \$17,217.90.

* 3. Approve Change Orders 4, 5 and 6 for Jurupa Valley High School Addition #1 (Dr. Wilson)

Change Order #4 for Jurupa Valley High School Addition #1 in the amount of \$44,702.20 is for the following: Install additional countertop, install new vertical sliding windows and re-configure existing casework at the Attendance Office in the Administration Building; Paint masonry walls inside the toilet Rooms Bll2 and Bll3; install ceramic tile cover base at the tiled floor area at the hand-washing "fountain" in Room Cl04; install flexible sealant at the bottom of wall tile above the service sink in Room Cl08; Reverse the orientation of the skylights in the classrooms at Building "C"; Install seismic bracing for the chain-hung light fixtures in the Drivers' Education Room Cl07 and Office Room Cl09.

In addition, install a new scupper at the existing electrical room; obscure glass in the transom window above door number Bl3 in lieu of clear glass; Provide 5/8 inch plywood behind the gypsum board at the plumbing wall in the restrooms, B112 and B113; Provide a new chain-link gate at the opening in the block wall at the south side of the work-yard at Building "C"; Increase the height of the parapets at Building F from 14'-2" to 14'-8"; Install the glu-lam fascias at Building "F" at a height 6" higher than the top of the parapets; Install wood-framed parapet extension above the block wall at Building "B"; Provide gypsum board over metal stud shafts from the skylights down to the ceilings; Install chain link fence with solid vinyl covering at the north side of the pool area; Provide 1/4 inch tempered plate glass at the doors around the swimming pool; Provide rigid duct, in lieu of the flex duct connectors; Provide electrical stub-outs; Install five each 22" x 22" nonrated, galvanized steel access panels and two each 22" x 22" one-hour rated, galvanized steel access panels; Furnish four exterior P.A. speakers; Revise the reinforcing dowels and framing per Office of the State Architect corrections to Building "E" addition; Provide photocell on and time switch-off controls for lunch shelter light; Install two each "Caution, Chlorine" signs on the doors at the pool equipment room; Extend the fire sprinkler system at Building "C" to the four existing restrooms, the one existing janitor closet and the existing exterior soffit; Revise the quantity of fire alarm initiating zones; At Building "E", add 6" slim-foot ceramic tile cover base, provide vinyl-clad ceiling tile, and install sealer on the concrete floor; Relocate the existing gas line and electrical conduit to allow for the installation of the new HVAC duct to Building "E" addition; Install supports and bracing for the plastic laminate countertop in the Building "E" addition; Provide a 6'-0" high chain link fence and gate at the lunch shelter fire riser; provide onehour rated fireproofing material; Provide concrete to cover the reinforcing bars in the Dance Room slab; and add downspouts and splash blocks to Buildings "C" and "F".

Change Order #5 is not an additive. It is for the following: Clarification of connection detail and conduit column, installation of fire line PIV and riser; structural clarification; and parapet coping; structural field corrections, electrical revision and changes in piping location.

Change Order #6 for Jurupa Valley High School is not an additive. This change order is for a time extension of 169 days.

Administration recommends the Board approve additive Change Order #4, in the amount of \$44,702.20; non-additive Change Order #5, and Change Order #6 for time extension of 169 days on Legal Bid #90/08L for the Jurupa Valley High School Addition #1.





COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

RECOGNIZE RED RIBBON WEEK ACTIVITIES The Director of Education Services announced that the district received \$232,000 from the state in drug/alcohol/tobacco prevention money, which allows the district to provide assistance and programs without impacting the general fund. Mrs. Lorraine Mooney, DATE Coordinator, was a teacher in the district for eight years, and taught at West Riverside and Sky Country Elementary Schools. This is her second year as DATE Coordinator.

Mrs. Mooney expressed appreciation for the opportunity to share the variety of activities occurring during Red Ribbon Week (October 19-27, 1991). The nationwide campaign started six years ago with community support for drug prevention and intolerance for that type of behavior. Throughout the year, the district is involved in many far reaching activities on behalf of its students.

RECOGNIZE RED RIBBON WEEK ACTIVITIES (Cont'd) Mrs. Mooney stated that in celebration of Red Ribbon Week, four billboards with the district slogan, "The Choice for Me is Drug Free," have been placed at different locations in the area to ensure high visibility by the community. She expressed appreciation to the sponsoring companies for the billboards and to West Riverside Businessmen's Association for donating \$600 from the Jurupa Rodeo to cover the cost of artwork. Recognition was also given to local vendors for discounts or free items to children during this awareness week.

Mrs. Mooney highlighted some of the week's activities such as wearing school designated buttons and ribbons, poster and door decorating contests, "wear red day," and presentations to students. President Ruane thanked Mrs. Mooney for her fine efforts in renewing student and community awareness of this vital issue.

RECOGNIZE JURUPA VALLEY FFA The Assistant Superintendent Education Services introduced Gary Lesh, Future Farmers of America Advisor, who is continuing the tradition of excellence at Jurupa Valley High School. Mr. Lesh introduced Chris Williams, FFA President, to report on the many accomplishments the club has experienced this year. He noted that Chris was a member of the first Senior class to graduate from Jurupa Valley, and president of FFA twice. Chris was an outstanding young man who has excelled academically and contributed to the success of the FFA program.

Mr. Williams stated that FFA students have participated in the Riverside Jr. Livestock Show, Perris Farmers Fair, Norco Fair and Los Angeles County Fair. Over 26 trophies and ribbons were on display for various categories of competition. Sweepstake awards were won at both the Riverside Jr. Livestock Show and Farmers Fair. Future events include the Indio Fair with students participating on a horse judging team headed by agriculture teacher Brian Kantner; a BBQ for teachers on October 24 that administrators and board members were invited to attend; Haunted House fundraiser at Club Metro; and annual FFA banquet scheduled for June. In addition, more students were learning about the credit union on campus and becoming members. LANGUAGE **ASSESSMENT** CENTER

The Board reviewed routine information reports. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the District Language Assessment Center was established as a pilot program at four schools. In 1989 the program was housed at Rustic Lane School involving all schools, but had to close for one year because of increased enrollment. The center reopened this year on the Rustic Lane campus. To date the Center's personnel have assessed about 659 students. 529 have been designated as Limited English Proficient (LEP), which brings the total of LEP students in the district to 2,191. Assistant Superintendent also noted that in some cases the Language Assessment Center serves as a social services center to help non-English speaking parents become aware of what's available in the community.

The Assistant Superintendent expressed appreciation to Lupe Lopez, Bilingual Coordinator, and her staff for meeting the timelines for bilingual assessment in an orderly manner which has resulted in an excellent state compliance review. Principal Walt Lancaster, who hosts the program on the Rustic Lane campus, is a strong supporter of the center and believes it is highly needed in the district.

OTHER ROUTINE REPORTS

Other routine information reports were: Staff Development Days; Receive Reports Pursuant to Education Code #48915.

REQUIREMENTS FOR UNIVERSITY SYSTEM In response to Mr. Chavez' concerns, the Assistant Superintendent Education Services replied that the university system and Cal State system consistently send bulletins on new requirements to high schools in the area. A report will be presented on minimum requirements and college counseling for guidance coordinators.

CLOSED SESSION

At 6:00 p.m. on Monday, October 21, 1991, the Board met in Closed Session in the Superintendent's office at the Education Center. All Board members were present. Also in attendance were the Superintendent and other administrators.
