b. Recognize 1991/92 Inland Science Fair Winners

(Mrs. Roberts)

On Monday, April 27th through Friday, May 1st, the tenth annual Inland Science and Engineering Fair was held at the National Orange Show Orange Pavilion, San Bernardino. Nineteen students from grades 4 - 12 represented the Jurupa Unified School District and six students won first, second or third place trophies. Four students from the comprehensive high schools are eligible to participate in the California State Science Fair to be held at the Museum of Science and Industry in Los Angeles on May 18-19, 1992. Students eligible for participation are: Jennifer Strona, Jurupa Valley High School (1st place trophy); Jamey Hesler, Jurupa Valley High School (2nd place trophy); Justin Nielsen, Rubidoux High School (2nd place trophy). The Board is pleased to recognize a new Adopt-A-School partnership being formed between Jurupa Valley High School and Chappy's Auto Parts of Glen Avon. * A. Approve Minutes of the May 4, 1992 Regular Meeting

** B. Approve Submittal of Healthy Generations Healthy Learners Application

(Mrs. Roberts)

The district was notified of its eligibility to apply for Healthy Generations Healthy Learners funding. Our district is eligible to receive up to \$15,000 for implementing Section 51203 of the California Education Code which requires instruction in grades 7-12 concerning the effects of alcohol, narcotics, restricted dangerous drugs and other dangerous substances upon prenatal development as determined by science. A recent article in the Kappan magazine on prenatal drug exposure indicates that 11% of children with some degree of disability can be directly related to prenatal exposure to illicit substances. As these children grow and develop, signs or symptoms start to appear that affect their school or social functioning. Curriculum Coordinator, Tina Brennan, worked with the DATE Program Manager and several County Health agencies to develop the application.

** B. Approve Submittal of Healthy Generations Healthy Learners Application (Cont'd)

This \$15,000 grant will provide supplementary funding for materials to assist the schools in implementing curriculum which effectively emphasizes the risks related to use of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs on prenatal development. If the district is successful in being awarded the grant, our goal is to strengthen the state's Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Education (DATE) program which has been implemented for the past four years. This will be accomplished by focusing on instructional activities, staff development and parent education which addresses risk factor reduction associated with the use of controlled substances. Copies of the application are included in the supporting documents for Board members.

It is recommended that the Board approve submittal of the Healthy Generations Healthy Learners application.

C. Approve Amendment to SELF Joint Powers Agreement (JPA)

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Schools Excess Liability Fund (SELF) was formed in 1986 to make available affordable excess liability insurance coverage for school districts in California. The program has been very successful and currently has over 1,100 member school districts. Jurupa Unified School District joined SELF in October, 1986.

The SELF Board of Directors has requested that we approve an amendment to the current Joint Powers Agreement. The proposed change involves that portion of the Agreement which specifies how amendments to the Agreement may be made. Currently the Agreement requires the consent of two-thirds of the member districts in order to make any change in the Agreement. The proposed change would specify that once a majority of the parties to the Agreement have responded to a proposed amendment approved by the SELF Board, it may be enacted by approval of two-thirds of the respondents. This change in the Agreement is necessary because with so many member districts, it has been impossible to get the currently required two-thirds majority vote on any amendment. The supporting documents contain a copy of the proposed change as well as a Certification of Board Minutes to document the Board's action.

Administration recommends the Board approve the proposed Amendment to the SELF Joint Powers Agreement.

D. Approve 1992/93 DATE Application

(Mr. Taylor)

In response to the urgent problem of alcohol and other drug use among children and youth, school districts in California are offering a wide range of drug-, alcohol-, and tobacco-use prevention programs. This comprehensive DATE application was designed to be a tool for building on what districts have already accomplished and to help set the stage for future success. It guides schools to join in a collaborative, comprehensive approach to drug-, alcohol-, and tobacco-use prevention by meeting the requirements of program legislation and taking into account current knowledge about the kinds of prevention programs that are likely to be effective.

The application was prepared by the DATE Coordinator with guidance from Program Specialists from the County Office of Education, and in accordance with the authorizing statutes and guidelines of each program. A DATE advisory board met throughout the year and identified goals and activities to be included in the grant application.

* 11. Non-Routine Field Trip Requests

(Mrs. Roberts)

The following Non-Routine Field Trips have been requested and administration has indicated that students will not be prohibited from attending any of the activities due to lack of funds:

- 1. Rubidoux High School Mentor Teacher, Terry Snell, is requesting permission to travel to Los Angeles on Monday, May 18th through Tuesday, May 19, 1992. The purpose of the trip is to participate in the State Science Fair. The plan is to travel with four students and two supervisors in district vehicles.
- 2. Rubidoux High School's GATE program advisor is requesting permission to travel to San Clemente and Dana Point on Tuesday, June 2nd through Wednesday, June 3, 1992. The purpose of the trip is to observe the grunion run and tide pools. Transportation will be by district vehicles and students will camp overnight at the State beach. The plan is to travel with approximately sixteen students and two supervisors.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip requests from Terry Snell to travel with science fair participants to Los Angeles on May 18-19, 1992 to participate in the Science Fair and the GATE advisor's request to travel with students to San Clemente and Dana Point to observe the grunion run and tide pools on June 2-3, 1992.

1. Replacement of Superintendent's Destroyed Office

(Mr. Edmunds)

We have collected and analyzed information concerning the cost of repairing versus replacing the portable that housed the Superintendent's Office. The cost of repairing the interior of the portable would be \$24,528, and the cost to purchase a new one would be \$28,356.

The additional \$3,828 cost to replace the unit must be considered with respect to two other variables. First of all, the State will allow us to utilize developer fees from our "Match" requirement to replace a damaged portable, but not to repair it. Otherwise, these developer fees would be sent to the State, since we are in the State Building Program. In addition, the damaged portable can be moved to our Maintenance Yard where it can be cleaned up and utilized for badly needed storage. In view of these considerations, we have decided to replace the portable rather than to repair it. Information only.

Mrs. Ruane asked for a report of findings at a future board meeting.

PARENT BUDGET INFORMATION SHEET

The Superintendent reported that the Parent Budget Information Sheet has been developed for parents to have a broader understanding of the state's fiscal condition and its impact on Jurupa Unified School District. It will be released to parents through K-8 students on Thursday, May 7, 1992.

REPLACE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE AT ED. CENTER

The Superintendent reported that Room 12 at the Education Center was on fire at approximately 1:30 a.m., May 3. An inventory of losses was made and office personnel have temporarily relocated to Room 4. Insurance officials are checking on the cost to replace Room 12 with a new structure. In the interim, temporary offices will be set up in a 10' x 40' trailer located in the back parking lot. Superintendent said a majority of the records were saved, memorabilia expanding 30 years was lost.

REPORT FROM JURUPA VALLEY STUDENT

Kim Schroeder, Jurupa Valley High School student representative, made the following report on current events:

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Barnes noted that the public verbal comments section of the agenda was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

NATIONAL DAYS OF THANKSGIVING

Tom Dowling, president of CSEA Chapter 392, presented a letter to the Board which in summary requested a meeting to negotiate and resolve the issue of the National Days of Thanksgiving proclaimed by President Bush.

Sandra Mason, classified employee in the Jurupa District, also commented on compensating bargaining members for the National Days of Thanksgiving. Mrs. Mason questioned the accuracy of the monetary figure that was quoted to CSEA as the cost for the holidays. pointed out that the classified group has asked to negotiate for the holidays included in the Education Code and collective bargaining contract.

REQUEST FOR SOCCER TEAM AT RUBIDOUX HIGH

Alfonso Esparza, parent, stated that he has been in the community for ten years and asked why Rubidoux High School did not have a soccer team. President Barnes replied that he understood the desire for the program but the state's financial crisis has also affected other programs.

Cathie Meyer, parent of two students at Rubidoux High School, stated that she was one of many parents who want a soccer program. coaches have volunteered their time to develop a team. after school activities encourage students to excel and maintain a certain grade point average. If freshman sports were eliminated, the athletic program for sophomores and the upper grades could be Mrs. Meyer stated that she had about 180 signatures of students who were interested in soccer. Fundraisers would help with financial assistance but she asked the Board to consider providing some funds toward transportation expenses.

REQUEST FOR SOCCER TEAM AT RUBIDOUX HIGH (Cont'd) John Bennyworth, parent and member of the U.S. Youth Soccer Association, stated that he also represented parents interested in providing a soccer program at Rubidoux High School. In addition to the academic environment, students need other activities such as sports, choir, band, drama, etc. to stimulate their educational growth. 180 students have expressed a desire to have all sports represented at the high school level. In his opinion, all teams should pay their share of transportation costs.

VAN BUREN SCHOOL RESTRUCTURING PROPOSAL J. R. Hertz, parent, commended principal Carmen Hernandez and the educational program at Van Buren Elementary School. He had an opportunity to review the school's restructuring plan under SB 1274, and encouraged the Board and administration to give its full support. Mr. Hertz stated that the key was to capture the attention and imagination of all elementary students before they advanced to middle school.

AFTER SCHOOL LATE BUSES

Tina Mihin, teacher at Jurupa Middle School, stated that a letter was sent to the Board regarding the staff's concern about the well being of the students since after school activities were almost non-existent. The letter and petition signed by 68 staff members supported reinstating late buses so students can participate in after school activities. The increase in attendance should pay for the buses.

Sherry Zelenka, teacher at Jurupa Middle School, added that providing late buses would also give students an opportunity to receive needed assistance with homework after school.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member John Chavez announced that two board members and the superintendent planned to attend the RCSBA Dinner Meeting on May 14, and he invited others to join them. The agenda will include an election of officers for the next year, and revision of bylaws.

Mr. Chavez stated that Rustic Lane Elementary School recently held a symposium for parents on gang suppression and drug prevention. He felt this was a positive direction for the elementary schools.

Board member Betty Folsom expressed appreciation to Melva Morrison, Choir Director at Jurupa Valley High School, for a delightful evening performance by the Jurupa Valley Chamber Singers. Professional musicians from the Riverside and Los Angeles areas also performed.

HEAR REPORT ON CTEI The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that for several years Rubidoux High School has participated in the Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute. The CTEI project has combined the best of all worlds to create a teacher training program that prepares student teachers for the realities of a career in the education field. Dr. Judith Sandholtz, Director of the program at UCR, and Ellen Finan, Rubidoux High School Language Arts Department Chairperson, reviewed the benefits of the program as a result of successful collaboration.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reported that in 1990 SB 1274 (Senator Gary Hart) was enacted and signed into law to restruct and revitalize education. Public schools were invited to submit proposals for the restructuring of public education.

Jurupa Valley High School was one of 210 schools initially funded in the state. The high school has received a second invitation to apply for a demonstration restructuring grant to assist students to be more successful.

Principal Alan Young of Jurupa Valley High School reviewed the process by which the restructuring proposal was developed over the last couple of years. The organization structure consisted of a Curriculum Team, an Involvement Team, a Marketing Articulation Team, a Staff Development Team and a Steering Team. included staff, administrators, parents, students, and representatives of the business community. Mr. Young reviewed the primary goals for students to meet within a five year period: 1) All students will be working hard to learn because they want to; 2) All students will be working toward self-chosen education goals; 3) All students will be achieving at their potential. Mr. Young commented on each category in the plan and recognized Dr. Ron Needham who has been intensely involved in its development.

Principal Carmen Hernandez of Van Buren Elementary School stated that restructuring worth doing will result in powerful learning outcomes for all students. The six required elements of SB 1274 were reviewed. President of the School Site Council stated that she was in support of the plan which addressed many difficult areas to meet the needs of all students. Several students noted their enthusiasm for the plan which would allow children to be "seekers of meaning." Teachers commented that preparing students for the future should start at the elementry level. Changes as noted in the plan would allow teachers to provide new experiences for students. The outcome of restructuring should be to help students achieve.

A representative of the business community and supporter of the Van Buren restructuring proposal referred to a survey which indicated that many students in the United States need assistance in such areas as solving complex problems. He felt the proposal offered an opportunity for the business community to work with the school. He requested that the Van Buren restructuring plan receive an unqualified approval.

Ben Bunz, Assistant Principal of Instruction at Rubidoux High School, stated that in order for restructuring to be successful, it must be supported from the hearts and minds of teachers, students, parents and the community. Rubidoux High School has already made a commitment to staff development by its partcipation in two major programs: CTEI as mentioned earlier and the SB 1882 grant. combined efforts have generated a broad base of interest and support for restructuring from the teaching staff as well as many volunteers. Bunz introduced two teachers who have played a key role in developing the restructuring proposal, Sharon Dimery and Richard They indicated that a survey of students showed that the plan should have clear connections to the futures and career goals of students. Major components of the plan were designed to further connect the staff and students to each other and their goals as well as to the academic program. Another component was to work more closely with Mission Middle School. Students have been enthusiastic and supportive about the proposed changes.

Carol Smith, teacher at Rustic Lane Elementry School, represented principal Walt Lancaster, who was unable to attend the meeting this evening. Ms. Smith stated that the staff has a strong vision of focusing its restructuring efforts on student learning. Key components of the vision were: personalized learning, teacher empowerment, parental involvement, community participation, and a comprehensive use of new learning technologies. Ms. Smith noted that a goal was to have every student become a successful lifelong The plan includes an instruction program known as HOSTS learner. (Help One Student to Succeed) which is designed to promote student success by focusing on an instructional strategy that promotes interaction and thought. HOSTS will promote business, community and parent participation. It will create an educational experience which prepares students for the future and complements their interests and learning styles.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the people involved have been very supportive of restructuring. She pointed out that if the proposals were approved by the State, schools may be asking for waivers of district policy or contractual obligations. Administration would work closely with those involved on each waiver. The Assistant Superintendent recommended the Board move forward with submittal of the four applications as presented this evening.

The Superintendent pointed out that all proposals focus on teaching and the relationship between the student and teacher. Van Buren's proposal was being recommended for submission although it contained some far reaching goals. Administration plans to work closely with all groups involved on those applications that receive approval from the state.

It will be called Rio Vista Continuation High School and has the approval of the State Department of Education. The plan will be to hire two teachers to staff the program and for Mr. Hutchins to be the principal of both continuation high schools. The district will receive about \$112,200 start-up income from the state. Administration requests board approval to move forward in opening the new school.

Mr. Hutchins stated that the additional program is needed at a time when the district has raised graduation requirements and reduced the size of Nueva Vista because of the state's budget crisis. This was an exciting opportunity to establish other programs as part of a restructuring process and consider some assistance for middle school children.

XII. AMENDMENTS TO THIS AGREEMENT

A. Any amendments to this Agreement shall require the consent of two thirds (2:3) of the participating parties hereto subject to the procedures herein provided.

Any amendment to this Agreement shall require that once a majority of the parties to the Agreement have responded to a proposed amendment properly approved by the SELF Board, approval by two-thirds of the respondents shall be sufficient to enact the proposal.

- B. Proposed Amendments: Any party to this Agreement may at any time propose amendments to this Agreement. Any proposed amendment shall first be submitted to the Board for study and recommendation. The Board shall have a reasonable time within which to make such study and to submit its recommendations to the parties. Recommendation for adoption of an amendment shall occur at a meeting wherein two-thirds (2/3) of the members are present and at least three-fourths (3/4) of such members vote for adoption. A copy of the proposed amendment, together with the Board's report and recommendation, shall be sent to all parties for action by their governing bodies either approving or rejecting the amendment. If the proposed amendment does not receive approval by vote of the Board, no further action is required.
- C. Action on a Proposed Amendment: When the Board submits to the parties a proposed amendment for action, the Board shall specify thereon the deadline for action by the party or parties. Within the deadline specified, each party shall consider the proposed amendment and take action, either approving or rejecting it, and a copy of such action shall be filed with the Board. Any party that does not file a copy of such action with the Board within fifteen (15) working days following the specified deadline shall be deemed to have rejected the proposed amendment. Responses must be postmarked on or before the deadline to be counted.
- D. Effective date of Amendment: Unless otherwise stated in the amendment, the effective date of any amendment shall be on July 1 following its adoption.

ACTION SESSION

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR MEETING #2 Ms. Judy Wigg moved for approval of the minutes for Meeting #2 on January 29, 1992.

Ms. Patty Stark seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

INFORMATION SESSION

FLAG SALUTE

The committee members and staff attending participated in the flag salute to the United States of America.

CHAPTER 2 REPORT

Ms. Ginger Bevan, a representative from the Youth Service Center counseling staff, outlined the prevention, intervention, and treatment services offered through the Center's two primary programs: Outreach and Counseling. She distributed a "Year End Summary" for 1990-91 outlining the services their program provided to schools in our district along with an overview of their Outreach Program. She stressed that all their services were provided on a voluntary and confidential basis. Some of the workshops conducted last year were on the following topics: peer relations, self-esteem, substance abuse, decision making, problem solving skills and conflict management.

Ms. Roberts distributed a Chapter 2 priorities ranking sheet for 1992-93. She asked the committee to rank the five items they felt were of highest priority for Chapter 2 funding for next year. See attached chart for results. The highest responses were in the areas of:

- 1. Acquiring library resources and published instructional materials to support curriculum.
- 2. Developing programs to address educational problems such as educationally deprived children and GATE children.
- 3. Comprehensive guidance, counseling and testing programs.4. Programs to assist in teacher training and staff development.
- 5. In-school partnership programs and preschool partnership programs designed to involve parents in the schools.
- 6. Work preparation--bringing academic skills development and work experience together.
- 7. Career education.
- 8. Establishment of proficiency standards, administration of proficiency examinations, and implementation of programs to increase students' proficiency.

The district receives federal Chapter 2 categorical funds which are presently being used to purchase Young Reader Medal Award books, provide a portion of salary for the one required district certificated librarian, counseling services provided at every elementary school in conjunction with the Youth Service Center and the remaining funds are allocated to each site for library books.

NEW TESTING PROGRAM

Dr. Luana Bauman, consultant from the Psychological Corporation, explained the purposes of assessment: program evaluation, program participation and proficiency assessment. Jurupa Unified will be administering the Stanford 8th Edition, abreviated edition, to all Compensatory Education participants this spring.

Why a new test? Curriculum changes, new technology and new norms for comparison across the nation.

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Why the Stanford is appropriate? Reduces testing time, satisfies Chapter 1 evaluation requirements, describes trends in achievement, and produces the most accurate achievement information.

The K-6 testing program testing format is easier to read, larger type with more space, entertaining and contains fun illustrations.

EXPANSION OF STATE PRESCHOOL PROGRAM

Ms. Roberts announced that Jurupa Unified has received additional funding to start three additional preschool classes. These classes will be at West Riverside, Pedley and Mission Bell elementary schools. The program is limited to low-income and handicapped students. INFORMATION SESSION

LANGUAGE CENSUS REPORT - SCHOOL DATA/SPRING, 1992

Lupe López, Coordinator of Bilingual Education, reported on the results of the R30-LC. Each spring, districts throughout California are required to conduct a language census and report this information to the State Department of Education. The data in this report becomes the basis for determining the types of instructional services to be provided for limited English proficient students. The 1992 census shows that there are 2,186 LEP students in the district. The figure represents a 20% increase above last year's report when the staff identified 1,742 LEP students.

The majority of the LEP population continues to be Spanish speakers. Twenty-three other languages are also reported. The second highest number of students speak Vietnamese. Charts showing the number of LEP students in each school by grade and by primary language were distributed to parents.



PARENT WORKSHOP ON "BUILDING YOUR CHILD'S SELF-ESTEEM María Escudé Reifler presented the second in a series of three parent workshops. The focus of the inservice was "Building Your Child's Self-Esteem." Maria emphasized that in order to live a meaningful creative life, we need to help ourselves and others to develop self-esteem. Mrs. Reifler thoroughly discussed the following four guidelines.

- 1. Develop your sense of belonging.
- 2. Develop your sense of uniqueness.
- 3. Develop your sense of power.
- 4. Develop your sense of purpose.

Parents became completely involved in the activities and discussion.

HEARING SESSION

This item is included on the agenda to allow members of the District Bilingual Advisory Committee or others attending to ask questions about matters affecting the education of Limited English Proficient students.
