#### B. Update on PROJECT GAP

Community involvement is essential for the success of PROJECT GAP (Graffiti Abatement Program). The Superintendent attended a meeting with the Jurupa Chamber of Commerce members on October 8. Board member Mary Burns is serving as a community volunteer to assist schools in their efforts to eliminate graffiti.

The 2nd edition of GRAFFITI WATCH for use by newspapers, school newsletters, and other agencies in the community has been distributed districtwide and includes graffiti costs for July, August and September. The first public service announcement informing radio stations of PROJECT GAP has been issued.

#### C. Discuss Request from Van Buren School PTSA President

At the October 5, 1992 regular Board meeting, Mr. J. R. Hertz, PTSA President of Van Buren Elementary School, requested that air conditioning of six classrooms at the school be placed on the agenda. The State Education Code provides that members of the public may place matters directly related to school district business on a board agenda and address the Board as such items are taken up.

Major progress toward providing air conditioning for classrooms has been made in the Jurupa District over the years. Since 1986, 165 rooms have been air conditioned through a combination of lottery money and the school modernization program funded by the State School Building Program.

The Jurupa District is on the list to receive State funds for modernizing Van Buren Elementary and Rubidoux High School. Unfortunately, Troth Street Elementary and Pedley Elementary are not yet eligible.

The November 3 ballot will include Proposition 155, an \$800,000,000 school bond issue. If this bond issue passes, there is a good chance that modernization funds for Van Buren Elementary and Rubidoux High School will be available.

#### MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

#### **OCTOBER 5, 1992**

#### **OPENING**

CALL TO ORDER The Regular Meeting of the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education was called to order by President David Barnes at 7:13 p.m. on Monday, October 5, 1992, in the Education Center Board Room, 3924 Riverview Drive, Riverside, California. Members of the Board present were: ROLL CALL Mr. David Barnes, President Mrs. Betty Folsom, Clerk Mrs. Mary Burns, Member Mr. John Chavez, Member Mrs. Sandra Ruane, Member Staff Advisors present were: STAFF PRESENT Dr. John P. Wilson, Superintendent Mrs. Benita Roberts, Assistant Superintendent Education Services Mr. Rollin Edmunds, Assistant Superintendent Business Services Mr. Kent Campbell, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services Mr. Jim Taylor, Director of Education Services Mrs. Barbara Reul, Director of Business Services FLAG SALUTE Mrs. Marge Steinbrinck, principal of Mission Bell Elementary School, led the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America. **INSPIRATIONAL** Board member John Chavez made an inspirational comment. COMMENTS COMMUNICATIONS SESSION **RECOGNIZE VAN BUREN** The Superintendent announced that Van Buren Elementary School was the only SCHOOL one selected in Riverside County to receive a restructuring grant out of 139 schools approved for funding statewide. Congratulations were expressed to staff and parents for developing the plan. The school will receive partial funding for a SB 1274 Demonstration of Restructuring program which will begin January 1, 1993.

> Carmen Hernandez, principal, noted the accomplishments of teachers such as implementing programs to meet the needs of bilingual students, assessing 96 kindergarten students through Early Intervention for School Success, assessing all non-English proficient students, and instituting Reading is Fundamental. Appreciation was expressed to the PTSA for supporting the Homework Hotline and paying the \$50 monthly fee. The Riverside County Office of Education has also asked staff members to participate in a variety of educational events.

RECOGNIZE VAN BUREN SCHOOL (Cont'd) Ms. Hernandez stated that students were highly represented at Back to School Night. Several board members also attended the event. Other highlights of the new school year were: Over 100 students per day participate in the Breakfast Program; The PTSA has increased its membership by over 50%; Fifty students were recognized at the first Student of the Month Assembly; Teachers are planning programs for the 500th anniversary of Columbus' voyage and 100th anniversary of the Pledge of Allegiance; A successful connection with UCR has resulted in three student teachers and twelve tutors to assist children.

Ms. Hernandez indicated that she was looking forward to implementing the restructuring plan and requested continuing support for additional grants. She concluded that, "The only ones who make it to the stars are the ones who think they can."

The Director of Education Services announced that a new Adopt-A-School partnership was being formed between Mission Bell Elementary School and Carl's Jr. on Ben Nevis Blvd. Although the manager Frank Arbizu was unable to attend this meeting, principal Marge Steinbrinck was present to share plans for the partnership. A signed adoption certificate will be on display at the school and at Carl's Jr. Restaurant.

Mrs. Steinbrinck noted that Mr. Arbizu was planning a tour of the restaurant for students to observe its operation. Other activities include displaying student artwork, assisting in Career Day activities involving other local businesses, and presenting awards for outstanding achievement.

PATTERSON'S 4TH GRADE CLASS AT SKY COUNTRY SCHOOL; \$4,050 FROM TROTH STREET SCHOOL PTA FOR FIELD TRIPS AND \$1,050 FOR GOOD GUYS PROGRAMS AT THE SCHOOL; \$350 FROM PACIFIC AVENUE SCHOOL PTA FOR AN ASSEMBLY PRESENTATION OCTOBER 21. MRS. FOLSOM SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

COMMENTS ON RESTRUCTURING GRANT FOR VAN BUREN SCHOOL	J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren Elementary School, congratulated the principal, teachers, parents, and students that participated in a successful bid for a restructuring grant. Mr. Hertz felt the selection of Van Buren School indicated the State recognizes that ambitious goals could become a blueprint for meeting primary education needs. He acknowledged it will be challenging to make a difference, and asked for continued support.
COMMENTS ON NON-AIR CONDITIONED ROOMS AT VAN BUREN SCHOOL	Mr. Hertz also noted that a year ago he commented on lack of air conditioning in six classrooms at Van Buren Elementary School. Since then he has spoken to several board members about possible solutions and thanked several board members and administrators for being in contact with him on this concern.
•	Mr. Hertz noted the district should be providing a learning environment that encourages children to come to school. When the temperature exceeds 80° this becomes unusally difficult. He had several ideas to resolve the problem and was willing to discuss them after the meeting or during the week. Mr. Hertz requested that air conditioning at Van Buren School be a topic on the next board agenda.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member John Chavez attended a Youth Conference at the Hispanic Caucus in Sacramento last week. Approximately 130 students in grades 10-11 discussed the importance of continuing their education. Mr. Chavez' grandaughter who is an 8th grader was pleased to have the opportunity to attend. A workshop on an effective relationship between the board and superintendent was also held.

Clerk of the Board Betty Folsom attended several Back to School Nights and also had the pleasure of being present for the formation of the new Granite Hill School PTA.

PROJECT GAP

The Superintendent stated that PROJECT GAP, Graffiti Abatement Program, would be on the agenda regularly to keep the issue in front of the public. The lst edition of "Graffiti Watch" states that graffiti abatement in the 1991/92 year alone cost the taxpayers of this community \$60,016.35. That's as much as the entire annual classroom supply budget of four elementary schools.

The Superintendent said he sensed an urgency in the community to work together on this problem. The Jurupa Chamber of Commerce indicated this would be a topic for discussion at their next Chamber meeting. The attitude in the community is there should be no plea bargaining and people responsible should be tried and convicted. Beginning with the next agenda, a monthly cumulative report of graffiti costs will be included.

The Superintendent stated that Proposition 155 is the \$800 million school construction bond measure that will be on the November 3, 1992 election ballot. He encouraged everyone to support this proposition which would benefit pending construction projects in the Jurupa District.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT RESOLUTION 93/20 WHICH PROMOTES THE PASSAGE OF PROPOSITION 155 ON THE NOVEMBER 3, 1992 ELECTION BALLOT. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that Proposition 4, known as the Gann Amendment, requires all public agencies including school districts, to compute an appropriations limit annually. It is based on a formula provided by the State and has to do with how much tax revenue the state can collect. This does not affect the amount of money the district may spend.

ACTION ITEMS

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services reviewed that at the September 21, 1992 meeting, the Board approved extending the deadline for response to budget disapproval by the County Office of Education to October 2, 1992. The initial response approved by the Board would remain the same except that the provisions of the State Budget Act has increased the district's revenue projection by \$1,281,084 and the unrestricted reserve to \$3,182,473, or 5.16%.

Basically, the information we would like to impart is this. During the 1991-92 school year, graffiti removal expenses amounted to \$60,016.35. To put this in perspective, \$60,000 provides classroom supplies for over 2,800 elementary students for an entire school Another way of looking at this is, \$60,000 buys classroom vear. supplies for 4 elementary schools for an entire year. But in this case, that money is being wasted to remove graffiti. This year we are offering a reward program to members of our community who assist us by providing information resulting in an arrest and conviction in court of persons doing graffiti. We are offering a \$500 reward for information resulting in a court conviction, and a \$50 reward for information resulting in successful discipline procedures of students that results in restitution of damages.

The Regular Meeting of the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education was called to order by President David Barnes at 7:07 p.m. on Monday, October 19, 1992, in the Multipurpose Room of Granite Hill Elementary School, 9371 Granite Hill, Riverside, California.

FLAG SALUTE President of the Board David Barnes led the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

INSPIRATIONAL COMMENTS Clerk of the Board Betty Folsom made an inspirational comment.

ADOPT RESOLUTION 93/23, DRUG-FREE COMMUNITY -Motion #85 The Director of Education Services introduced Cynthia Johnson, resource teacher, who is coordinating the annual California Red Ribbon Campaign to be held October 24 - November 1, 1992. This annual event is sponsored by Californians for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. (CADFY) and the State Department of Alcohol and Drug Program. Ms. Johnson noted that she addressed the Jurupa PTA Council last week and presented a packet of ideas to promote awareness.

Some of the activities planned at schools during Red Ribbon Week, which symbolizes a commitment to a healthy drug-free lifestyle, were: employees will wear red ribbons; students will be asked to sign pledge cards to be drug-free; PTAs are purchasing articles that carry the drug-free message; essay contests are in process; the Sheriff will address students at assemblies.

Ms. Johnson reported that enough funds were available to work with the Riverside County Office of Education to partially support a substance abuse officer to work with 4th grade students at five elementary schools: Ina Arbuckle, Pacific Avenue, Rustic Lane, West Riverside, and Sunnyslope. She concluded that the Great American Smoke Out will be held in November.

The Director of Education Services also noted that the staff and Board member Mary Burns were assisting with PROJECT GAP (Graffiti Abatement Program).

Winners of major Homecoming events were: Club Car, Music Club; Club Float, Visual Arts Club; Class Float, the Class of 1993; Spirit Stick, which is a cumulative score based on dress up days and lunch time activities, the Class of 1993; and Rubidoux's 1992 Homecoming Queen was Aileen Lauritzen.

Congratulations to the FFA for a successful Farmer's Fair. They will be attend the Southern California's Leadership Conference October 24.

Madrigals presented a fine first performance at the Homecoming game and are preparing for Christmas concerts.

The Band will host its 5th Annual Field Show on October 20 at Rubidoux, and will attend the Mt. Carmel Band Review and Field Show on October 24.

AFJROTC is preparing for its annual Haunted House at Memorial Park on October 31.

Yearbook staff is finalizing the theme for the 1992/93 yearbook. Former RHS Valedictorian Shelley Rodrigo was chosen as editor of the frosh section of West Point's yearbook.

Board members were invited to attend Octoberfest next week. All clubs will participate during lunch to raise funds.

A sports recap was given.

President Barnes noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

REPORT FROM RUBIDOUX STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COMMENTS ON BUDGET

Karen Bell, teacher at Rubidoux High School, recalled that in 1978 when she was president of NEA-J, the Board dealt with a similar problem. Proposition 13 had just passed and teachers were in the middle of their contract. Summer school classes were canceled and salaries frozen. The proposal then was only to freeze salaries and let the state bailout the district because that was unconstitutional. This year there was no bailout. Ms. Bell felt more effort should have been made to restructure the budget for the district's programs.

Marilyn Gallagher, teacher at Mission Middle School, quoted a former superintendent as stating students generate the only money a school district receives. Teachers and site personnel such as nurses, principals, custodians, etc. are key personnel directly involved. Several years ago, cultural activities such as art and drama were limited, but teachers tried to incorporate them into the curriculum. When supplies were cut, teachers dug into their pockets and purchased materials. Mrs. Gallagher felt any additional cuts should be made away from the district to preserve the children's education. Mrs. Gallagher also noted that as a former board member, she felt the Board's benefits as approved by law could be reviewed.

Francine Rice, president of NEA-J, stated that many people in the community do not understand what is happening between the district and teachers' association. The first phase of the impasse procedure is called mediation and that will begin October 20. The only issue that has not been resolved is the teachers' salaries. The Public Employees Relations Board has appointed a mediator who will work between both groups to find a common ground. Ms. Rice stated that she felt the Board has not questioned the budget options in depth. The Los Angeles Unified School District is planning to take a strike authorization vote October 20. She would be concerned if the Jurupa District were to ride those same coattails.

COMMENTS FROM PARENT OF VAN BUREN SCHOOL J. R. Hertz, president of PTSA at Van Buren School, stated that he was addressing the Board as a private individual. At the last board meeting he mentioned lack of air conditioning in six classrooms and asked for a discussion under the item Facility Matters, but that did not occur. Mr. Hertz also requested that the next agenda include a discussion of meeting laws related to format for giving the public a right to ask questions and raise concerns about board policy in general.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member Sandra Ruane announced that she attended many Back to School Nights and was very pleased with the tremendous turnout. She also has been attending the high school football games and noted that a celebrity at the meeting was Donavan Alberga, kicker for the Rubidoux Falcons. Mrs. Ruane noted that she had the pleasure of spending the day with Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley FFA students at the Farmers Fair.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS (Cont'd) Board member Mary Burns stated that most people were appalled by the graffiti problem in the community and on school campuses. Mr. Taylor, Director of Education Services, has four volumes of graffiti incidents catalogued by paperwork and photos. Mrs. Burns has been reviewing the damages firsthand and was amazed at the time consuming process for graffiti removal. The four books will be available for public review at board meetings. The problem continues to grow and losses to the taxpayers for 1991/92 were \$60,026.35. Mrs. Burns emphasized the importance of the whole community working on this problem.

Mrs. Folsom commended the staff at both high schools for their time and effort in developing restructuring proposals. She regretted that the government reduced funding for this program and the high schools would not have an opportunity to institute their plans. Mrs. Folsom stated that she supported restructuring and was available to provide assistance. Van Buren Elementary School was congratulated for being selected for a grant to begin January 1, 1993.

Mrs. Folsom welcomed teacher Cynthia Johnson and noted the importance of her role in coordinating the drug-free program and serving the special needs of Jurupa's children.

UPDATE ON PROJECT GAP

MRS. RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 5,1992 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

The Superintendent noted that community involvement was essential for the success of PROJECT GAP (Graffiti Abatement Program). This topic will appear on the agenda for the second meeting in each month to re-energize the community and emphasize the importance of reporting incidents and assisting schools in their efforts to eliminate graffiti. Mrs. Burns has been serving as a community volunteer in this effort. The Superintendent also noted that one objective of accurately recording incidents in the books was to link them to other acts of vandalism. Community support was encouraged. Dr. Wilson concluded that cost to the district for the first three months of this school year was \$13,779.69.

DISCUSS REQUEST FROM VAN BUREN PTSA PRESIDENT The Superintendent stated that J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren School, indicated at the last board meeting a high interest in air conditioning six classrooms at the school. The agenda includes a detailed report of the district's progress over the years. Since 1986, 165 rooms have been air conditioned through a combination of lottery money and modernization funds from the State School Building Program. Currently 33 classrooms remain un-air conditioned: West Riverside 3, Van Buren 6, Troth Street 6, Pedley 4, Rubidoux High 14. Van Buren, West Riverside, and Rubidoux High are on the list to receive State funds for modernization. Passage of Proposition 155, the \$800,000,000 school bond issue, on the November 3 ballot, provides a good chance that funds will be available. DISCUSS REQUEST FROM VAN BUREN PTSA PRESIDENT (Cont'd) Mr. Hertz noted that the district has been working on air conditioning classrooms for the past six years and still has 33 rooms. He asked for a plan to implement air conditioning in these classrooms which involves almost 300 children. In his opinion, when the heat reaches 80°, it is equivalent to one child losing one year's education. He was not convinced the bond issue would pass or that it should be used for air conditioning rather than building new schools. Mr. Hertz noted the district spent \$30,000 on graffiti removal which could have air conditioned at least the six classrooms at Van Buren School. He suggested reviewing priorities and providing a healthy learning environment for children. Mrs. Folsom pointed out that research has proven uncovered graffiti promotes more vandalism. The law enforcement requires that graffiti be painted over as soon as possible. In response to Mr. Hertz' concern about un-air conditioned classrooms, Mrs. Folsom said she felt administration was making progress.

The Superintendent added that the election will occur in two weeks. If the bond issue passes, Van Buren School has a good opportunity that air conditioning will be funded. He also noted that the district continues to work with developers on the impact of residential construction on school facilities and with the county on developer fees. However, last month the Governor signed a law which canceled out the Mira and Murietta decisions and created a setback for the district's building program. To air condition the remaining classrooms at this time would require general fund money and that is not practical at this time in terms of priorities for the district.

Mrs. Ruane noted that she has done everything possible to accommodate Mr. Hertz' request but she could not make false promises and did not know where to get the money. Mrs. Burns said she checked with the Assistant Superintendent Business Services on air conditioners in storage for temporary use at schools. He indicated there were several old units in storage that were not operable.
