* B. <u>Approve at Informational First Reading Proposed Policy on Pesticide Management</u> (Dr. Wilson)

At the September 8, 1992 Board of Education meeting, the management of pesticide use in Jurupa Unified School District was discussed. At that time the Board indicated that administration should develop a policy along the lines suggested in the annotation and that emerged in the ensuing discussion.

A policy has been developed as shown in the supporting documents. It has the full support of the Supervisor of Grounds who is responsible for managing the use of pesticides in the District.

Recommendation: <u>The Board approve at informational first reading proposed policy on Pesticide Management.</u>

C. Budget Adoption Process for the 1993/94 Fiscal Year

(Mr. Edmunds)

AB 1200, the legislation which made many changes in school financial operations, requires a school district to notify the County Office of Education when the district plans to use the single adoption budget cycle in the succeeding fiscal year. This cycle was used for the 1992-93 Budget, and Administration proposes to use it again for 1993-94.

Administration recommends the Board approve submission of notification to the County Office of Education for use of the single adoption budget process for the 1993-94 fiscal year.

D. Adopt Resolutions in Connection with Community Facilities District No. 2

(Mr. Edmunds)

On September 21, 1992, the Board adopted a series of resolutions establishing Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District and calling for a special election for the issue of bonds and annual levy of special taxes for bond repayment. The special election was conducted by the Registrar of Voters on October 13, 1992. The supporting documents contain a Statement from the Clerk of the Board disclosing the election results. All votes cast by the property owner were in favor of all propositions contained in the ballot. Accordingly, the propositions carried.

In order to complete the proceedings for the establishment of CFD No. 2, two resolutions should be adopted at this Board Meeting. Resolution No. 93/24 declares the favorable results of the special election. Resolution No. 93/25 authorizes bond counsel to commence a Superior Court proceeding to validate the bonds and levy of the special taxes. This is a standard procedure with regard to community facilities districts where bonds and special taxes have been authorized on the basis of a landowner vote. Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution Numbers 93/24 and 93/25.

E. Approve District Advisory Committee Members

(Mrs. Roberts)

State regulations governing Consolidated Application programs mandate that schools receiving state Compensatory Education Funds consult with parents regarding the planning of programs and the expenditure of funds. In addition, state regulations require that school districts with fifty-one or more limited English proficient pupils establish a district Bilingual Advisory Committee. Federal Chapter 1 regulations also require consultation with parents, as do the state regulations for the Gifted and Talented program.

In response to the mandates of these various programs, the district has traditionally formed a District Advisory Committee composed of parent representatives from each school site receiving categorical funds. School sites have submitted names of candidates to serve on these committees. Procedures for selecting members and operating such committees are outlined in District Policy 1221.3.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the 1992/93 members of the District Advisory Committee for the Consolidated Application and District Bilingual Advisory Committee.

The District stocks xerographic and printing paper in the Warehouse to cover most of the needs of the District's Print Shop, schools, and Education Center for use in copiers and other duplicating machines.

The last time the District solicited bids was in December of 1991. Since the District had to purchase paper in addition to the two (2) carloads awarded on Bid #92/02L and delivered in February and August of 1992, Administration proposes to solicit bids based on an annual volume of at least three (3) carloads of 8 1/2" x 11" 20 lb. bond paper.

The first trip includes an overnight stay for sixty-eight students to participate in the 18th annual Heritage Festival "Bandfest 92", which is scheduled for Saturday, November 28, 1992 and the East Los Angeles Christmas Parade on Sunday, November 29, 1992. Transportation will be by district vehicles and lodging will be at Hollywood/Los Angeles Sheraton, Universal Hotel.
- 2. The second trip involves permission for forty-four students in the Jurupa Valley High School Silver Brigade to participate in the 1993 Winter Guard International Regional Championships in San Jose, CA. This event has been scheduled on Friday, March 12 through Sunday, March 14, 1993. Transportation will be by Delta Airlines and lodging will be at the Holiday Inn, Milpitas, CA.
- 3. The third field trip also involves permission for forty-four students to travel to Dayton, Winter Guard International Colourguard and Percussion Championships. Transportation will be arranged by commercial air flight and lodging will be at the Embassy Hotel in Dayton, Ohio.

2. Non Public School Placements

(Mrs. Roberts)

The District is responsible for serving all handicapped children who are at least three years of age, but not over twenty-two years of age, under the Education of All Handicapped Children Act of 1975 (PL 94-142). When no appropriate public school placement is available either within the local school district or the County Office of Education, then it is necessary to place these pupils in a non-public school. The law requires that we advise the Board of such placements.

J. Review Routine Information Reports

2. Non Public School Placements (Cont'd)

One Severely Emotionally Disturbed (SED) pupil has been placed at **Advocate School.** This pupil resides in a Licensed Care Institution (LCI) operated within the district and is therefore 100% reimbursed by the State.

Two Severely Handicapped Pre-School pupils have been placed at **Children's Center** and these pupils are within the district. The cost is \$57.25 per day; 70% of the cost, or approximately \$40.07 a day will be refunded by the State. An additional, four Severely Emotionally Disturbed (SED) pupils have been placed at **Somerset School**. One resides in an LCI operated within the district and is therefore 100% reimbursed by the State and three are district pupils. The cost is \$94.50 per day; 70% of this cost, or approximately \$66.43 will be refunded by the State. Information only.

3. Status of Rejected Claim

(Mr. Edmunds)

Board Members will recall that on September 8, 1992, the Board rejected a claim from Robin Blain Schwebs alleging injuries and damages sustained on April 27, 1992 in a traffic accident. On Tuesday, October 27, 1992, the school District was served with a Summons and is being sued by Robin Schwebs and Linda Schwebs. Administration is working with legal counsel in its defense.

INSPIRATIONAL COMMENTS

Clerk of the Board Betty Folsom made an inspirational comment.

ADOPT RESOLUTION 93/23, DRUG-FREE COMMUNITY -Motion #85 The Director of Education Services introduced Cynthia Johnson, resource teacher, who is coordinating the annual California Red Ribbon Campaign to be held October 24 - November 1, 1992. This annual event is sponsored by Californians for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. (CADFY) and the State Department of Alcohol and Drug Program. Ms. Johnson noted that she addressed the Jurupa PTA Council last week and presented a packet of ideas to promote awareness.

Some of the activities planned at schools during Red Ribbon Week, which symbolizes a commitment to a healthy drug-free lifestyle, were: employees will wear red ribbons; students will be asked to sign pledge cards to be drug-free; PTAs are purchasing articles that carry the drug-free message; essay contests are in process; the Sheriff will address students at assemblies.

Ms. Johnson reported that enough funds were available to work with the Riverside County Office of Education to partially support a substance abuse officer to work with 4th grade students at five elementary schools: Ina Arbuckle, Pacific Avenue, Rustic Lane, West Riverside, and Sunnyslope. She concluded that the Great American Smoke Out will be held in November.

The Director of Education Services also noted that the staff and Board member Mary Burns were assisting with PROJECT GAP (Graffiti Abatement Program).

REPORT FROM RUBIDOUX STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE Donavan Alberga, Rubidoux High School student representative, made the following report on current events:

Homecoming parades, half-time show, coronation, and dance were a great success. The Falcon Football Team was victorious for the sixth consecutive time this season. Winners of major Homecoming events were: Club Car, Music Club; Club Float, Visual Arts Club; Class Float, the Class of 1993; Spirit Stick, which is a cumulative score based on dress up days and lunch time activities, the Class of 1993; and Rubidoux's 1992 Homecoming Queen was Aileen Lauritzen.

Congratulations to the FFA for a successful Farmer's Fair. They will be attend the Southern California's Leadership Conference October 24.

Madrigals presented a fine first performance at the Homecoming game and are preparing for Christmas concerts.

The Band will host its 5th Annual Field Show on October 20 at Rubidoux, and will attend the Mt. Carmel Band Review and Field Show on October 24.

AFJROTC is preparing for its annual Haunted House at Memorial Park on October 31.

Yearbook staff is finalizing the theme for the 1992/93 yearbook. Former RHS Valedictorian Shelley Rodrigo was chosen as editor of the frosh section of West Point's yearbook.

Board members were invited to attend Octoberfest next week. All clubs will participate during lunch to raise funds.

A sports recap was given.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Barnes noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

COMMENTS ON BUDGET

Karen Bell, teacher at Rubidoux High School, recalled that in 1978 when she was president of NEA-J, the Board dealt with a similar problem. Proposition 13 had just passed and teachers were in the middle of their contract. Summer school classes were canceled and salaries frozen. The proposal then was only to freeze salaries and let the state bailout the district because that was unconstitutional. This year there was no bailout. Ms. Bell felt more effort should have been made to restructure the budget for the district's programs.

Marilyn Gallagher, teacher at Mission Middle School, quoted a former superintendent as stating students generate the only money a school district receives. Teachers and site personnel such as nurses, principals, custodians, etc. are key personnel directly involved. Several years ago, cultural activities such as art and drama were limited, but teachers tried to incorporate them into the curriculum. When supplies were cut, teachers dug into their pockets and purchased materials. Mrs. Gallagher felt any additional cuts should be made away from the district to preserve the children's education. Mrs. Gallagher also noted that as a former board member, she felt the Board's benefits as approved by law could be reviewed.

Francine Rice, president of NEA-J, stated that many people in the community do not understand what is happening between the district and teachers' association. The first phase of the impasse procedure is called mediation and that will begin October 20. The only issue that has not been resolved is the teachers' salaries. The Public Employees Relations Board has appointed a mediator who will work between both groups to find a common ground. Ms. Rice stated that she felt the Board has not questioned the budget options in depth. The Los Angeles Unified School District is planning to take a strike authorization vote October 20. She would be concerned if the Jurupa District were to ride those same coattails.

COMMENTS FROM PARENT OF VAN BUREN SCHOOL J. R. Hertz, president of PTSA at Van Buren School, stated that he was addressing the Board as a private individual. At the last board meeting he mentioned lack of air conditioning in six classrooms and asked for a discussion under the item Facility Matters, but that did not occur. Mr. Hertz also requested that the next agenda include a discussion of meeting laws related to format for giving the public a right to ask questions and raise concerns about board policy in general.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

Board member Sandra Ruane announced that she attended many Back to School Nights and was very pleased with the tremendous turnout. She also has been attending the high school football games and noted that a celebrity at the meeting was Donavan Alberga, kicker for the Rubidoux Falcons. Mrs. Ruane noted that she had the pleasure of spending the day with Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley FFA students at the Farmers Fair.

Board member Mary Burns stated that most people were appalled by the graffiti problem in the community and on school campuses. Mr. Taylor, Director of Education Services, has four volumes of graffiti incidents catalogued by paperwork and photos. Mrs. Burns has been reviewing the damages firsthand and was amazed at the time consuming process for graffiti removal. The four books will be available for public review at board meetings. The problem continues to grow and losses to the taxpayers for 1991/92 were \$60,026.35. Mrs. Burns emphasized the importance of the whole community working on this problem.

Mrs. Folsom commended the staff at both high schools for their time and effort in developing restructuring proposals. She regretted that the government reduced funding for this program and the high schools would not have an opportunity to institute their plans. Mrs. Folsom stated that she supported restructuring and was available to provide assistance. Van Buren Elementary School was congratulated for being selected for a grant to begin January 1, 1993.

Mrs. Folsom welcomed teacher Cynthia Johnson and noted the importance of her role in coordinating the drug-free program and serving the special needs of Jurupa's children.

MRS. RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 5,1992 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

UPDATE ON PROJECT

The Superintendent noted that community involvement was essential for the success of PROJECT GAP (Graffiti Abatement Program). This topic will appear on the agenda for the second meeting in each month to re-energize the community and emphasize the importance of reporting incidents and assisting schools in their efforts to eliminate graffiti. Mrs. Burns has been serving as a community volunteer in this effort. The Superintendent also noted that one objective of accurately recording incidents in the books was to link them to other acts of vandalism. Community support was encouraged. Dr. Wilson concluded that cost to the district for the first three months of this school year was \$13,779.69.

DISCUSS REQUEST FROM VAN BUREN PTSA PRESIDENT The Superintendent stated that J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren School, indicated at the last board meeting a high interest in air conditioning six classrooms at the school. The agenda includes a detailed report of the district's progress over the years. Since 1986, 165 rooms have been air conditioned through a combination of lottery money and modernization funds from the State School Building Program. Currently 33 classrooms remain un-air conditioned: West Riverside 3, Van Buren 6, Troth Street 6, Pedley 4, Rubidoux High 14. Van Buren, West Riverside, and Rubidoux High are on the list to receive State funds for modernization. Passage of Proposition 155, the \$800,000,000 school bond issue, on the November 3 ballot, provides a good chance that funds will be available.

DISCUSS REQUEST FROM VAN BUREN PTSA PRESIDENT (Cont'd) Mr. Hertz noted that the district has been working on air conditioning classrooms for the past six years and still has 33 rooms. He asked for a plan to implement air conditioning in these classrooms which involves almost 300 children. In his opinion, when the heat reaches 80", it is equivalent to one child losing one year's education. He was not convinced the bond issue would pass or that it should be used for air conditioning rather than building new schools. Mr. Hertz noted the district spent \$30,000 on graffiti removal which could have air conditioned at least the six classrooms at Van Buren School. He suggested reviewing priorities and providing a healthy learning environment for children. Mrs. Folsom pointed out that research has proven uncovered graffiti promotes more vandalism. The law enforcement requires that graffiti be painted over as soon as possible. In response to Mr. Hertz' concern about un-air conditioned classrooms, Mrs. Folsom said she felt administration was making progress.

The Superintendent added that the election will occur in two weeks. If the bond issue passes, Van Buren School has a good opportunity that air conditioning will be funded. He also noted that the district continues to work with developers on the impact of residential construction on school facilities and with the county on developer fees. However, last month the Governor signed a law which canceled out the Mira and Murietta decisions and created a setback for the district's building program. To air condition the remaining classrooms at this time would require general fund money and that is not practical at this time in terms of priorities for the district.

Mrs. Ruane noted that she has done everything possible to accommodate Mr. Hertz' request but she could not make false promises and did not know where to get the money. Mrs. Burns said she checked with the Assistant Superintendent Business Services on air conditioners in storage for temporary use at schools. He indicated there were several old units in storage that were not operable.

PESTICIDE MANAGEMENT

The health and safety of all students and staff members is a primary concern of the Board of Education and the administration of the Jurupa Unified School District.

Therefore, the control of structural and landscape pest problems shall be accomplished with the least possible hazard to people and the environment.

Specifically, this policy commits the Jurupa Unified School District to the following:

- 1. Maintenance of a low level of pesticide use with the elimination of its use wherever reasonably possible.
- Application of pesticides only after monitoring indicates the need instead of applications purely pursuant to a fixed schedule.
- Landscape designs for new schools that minimize the need for the use of pesticides.
- 4. Modification of landscape designs at existing schools so that the need for the use of pesticides is reduced over time and as finances permit.
- 5. Modification of food service equipment and facilities to minimize the use of pesticides.
- Prohibition of the use of pesticides personally purchased or brought from home.
- 7. Annual reports to the Board of Education of the kind and amount of pesticide use by location.

Procedures for implementing pesticide management in the areas of buildings, food service buildings, and grounds shall be developed.

- I, Betty A. Folsom, Clerk of the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District, acting as the election official pursuant to Resolution No. 93/14 of the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District"), make the following statements regarding the Consolidated Special Elections held on October 13, 1992 on (i) the proposition with respect to incurring a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 for financing public facilities within and for Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District"), (ii) the proposition with respect to the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District for payment of principal of and interest on the bonds thereof, and (iii) the proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District, and hereby certify that:
- (1) A signed written waiver entitled "Waiver of Certain Election Procedures with Respect to Landowner Voter Elections within and for Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California" was received from Summit Series II, Ltd., the owner of all of the land within the Community Facilities District.

- compliance with the provisions of Section 53326 of the California Government Code to the effect that a special election with respect to the levy of special taxes within the Community Facilities District must be held at least 90 days, but not more than 180 days, following the adoption of the resolution of formation establishing the Community Facilities District (Resolution No. 93/12 adopted by the Board of Education on September 21, 1992) and consented to the holding of such consolidated special elections on October 13, 1992.
- (3) On September 15, 1992, I received a written certification from the Registrar of Voters of the County of Riverside dated August 12, 1992 that there were no registered voters residing within the Community Facilities District. Accordingly, pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, and as determined by the Board of Education in Resolution No. 93/14, the vote in said consolidated special elections was to be by the landowners of the Community Facilities District, with each landowner having one vote for each acre, or portion thereof, of land that he or she owns within the Community Facilities District.
- (4) On August 28, 1992, I received a certificate from Patrick J. Van Daele, the Executive Vice-President of Van Daele Development Corporation. Van Daele Development Corporation is the general partner of Summit Series II, Ltd., a California limited partnership, the owner of all of the property within Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District, County

of Riverside, State of California, certifying that there are 31.19 acres of land within the Community Facilities District.

- (5) On October 20, 1992, I received from Best, Best & Krieger, the District's bond counsel regarding the Community Facilities District and the issuance and sale of the bonds thereof, a preliminary title report from First American Title Insurance Company dated May 21, 1992, reporting that title to all property within the Community Facilities District is vested in Summit Series II, Ltd.
- (6) On October 2, 1992, a notice of the adoption of Resolution No. 93/13 of the Board of Education containing a summary of the content of said resolution was published in the Jurupa This Week, and on October 2, 1992 a notice of the holding of the consolidated special elections for the Community Facilities District and the date thereof was published in the Jurupa This Week.
- (7) On September 30, 1992, I caused to be delivered to a representative of Summit Series II, Ltd. an Official Ballot in the form attached to Resolution No. 93/14 together with a Ballot Pamphlet and Instructions to Voter containing Instructions to Landowner Voter and a Sample Ballot. Copies of said Official Ballot and said Ballot Pamphlet and Instructions to Voter are on file in my office. I also delivered to such representative on said date, together with such other matters, an official identification envelope, with return postage affixed thereto, for returning the voted Official Ballot.

- (8) Pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, for purposes of said consolidated special elections, each owner of land within the Community Facilities District was entitled to one vote for each acre or portion thereof of land within the Community Facilities District which it owned.
- (9) According to the aforementioned certificate received from Patrick J. Van Daele, the acreage of land owned by Summit Series II, Ltd. within the Community Facilities District, and the number of voters to which it is entitled are:

- (10) The voted Official Ballot was returned to me by Summit Series II, Ltd. sealed in the aforementioned identification envelope prior to 5:00 p.m. on October 13, 1992. The Official Ballot which was returned was voted with a cross marked in the box after the word "YES" following each proposition set forth on the Official Ballot and had a signed statement attached that the signer was entitled to vote such ballot on behalf of Summit Series II, Ltd. and that it was the intent of Summit Series II, Ltd. to vote all votes to which it was entitled in the manner marked on the ballot.
- (11) I have canvassed the ballots returned in such consolidated special elections, being the Official Ballot above referenced, and determined that the results of the elections with respect to each proposition set forth in said Official Ballot are as follows:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE CONSOLIDATED SPECIAL ELECTIONS FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ON THE PROPOSITIONS WITH RESPECT TO (i) INCURRING A BONDED INDEBTEDNESS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1,500,000, (ii) THE ANNUAL LEVY OF SPECIAL TAXES TO PAY PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON BONDS, AND (iii) THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT

WHEREAS, on September 21, 1992, the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") adopted Resolution No. 93/13 determining the necessity for Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District"), to incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 and calling a special election on the proposition of incurring such a bonded indebtedness for October 13, 1992, and providing for the consolidation of that election with the election on the propositions with respect to the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay principal of and interest on such bonds, and the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District; and

WHEREAS, on September 21, 1992, the Board also adopted Resolution No. 93/14 calling a special election for October 13, 1992, for submitting to the voters of the Community Facilities District the proposition with respect to the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds thereof, and the proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District, and providing for the consolidation of that election with the election on the proposition of the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, the Board has received a statement from the Clerk of the Board of Education (the "Clerk of the Board"), who pursuant to Resolution No. 93/14 was authorized to conduct the consolidated special elections and act as the election official therefor, with respect to the canvass of the ballots returned in and the results of the consolidated special elections, certifying that more than two-thirds of the votes cast upon the propositions submitted to the voters in the consolidated special elections were cast in favor of approving all such propositions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, CALIFORNIA, AS FOLLOWS:

The Board finds that: (i) there Section 1. Findings. were no persons registered to vote within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District at the time of the close of the protest hearing on September 21, 1992, and pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code ("Section 53326") the vote in the consolidated special elections was, therefore, to be by the landowners owning land within the Community Facilities District, with each landowner having one vote for each acre or portion of an acre of land that he or she owned within the Community Facilities District which would have been subject to the special tax if levied at the time of the consolidated special elections; (ii) On October 13, 1992, the date of the consolidated special elections, Summit Series II, Ltd., a California limited partnership, was the owner of all the land within the Community Facilities District; (iii) pursuant to Section 53326 and Resolution No. 93/14, the Clerk of the Board distributed the ballots for the consolidated special elections to Summit Series II, Ltd. (the "Property Owner") by personal delivery; (iv) the Property Owner waived the time limits for holding the consolidated special elections and the election dates specified in Section 53326, and consented to the calling and holding of the consolidated special elections on October 13, 1992; (v) the consolidated special elections have been properly conducted in accordance with all statutory requirements and the provisions of Resolution No. 93/14; (vi) pursuant to Section 53326, Summit Series II, Ltd., which owned approximately 31.19 acres, was entitled to a total of 32 votes; (vii) the ballot was returned to the Clerk of the Board prior to 5:00 p.m. on October 13, 1992, by the Property Owner; (viii) the ballot returned to the Clerk of the Board by the Property Owner voted all votes to which it was entitled in favor of all propositions set forth therein; (ix) more than two-thirds of the votes cast in the consolidated special elections on each such proposition were cast in favor thereof, and pursuant to Sections 53328, 53329 and 53355 of the California Government Code, all such propositions carried; (x) the Board, as the legislative body of the Community Facilities District, is therefore authorized to take the necessary action to have the Community Facilities District incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000, and to annually levy special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District in amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District; and (xi) an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District has been established in the amount of \$500,000.

Section 2. Declaration of Results. All votes voted in the consolidated special elections on the propositions with respect to the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000, the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds thereof, and the establishment of an appropriations limit in the amount of \$500,000 for the Community Facilities District were voted in favor thereof, and all such propositions carried.

Section 3. Effect of Elections. The effect of the results of the consolidated special elections, as specified in Section 2 hereof, is that the Board, as the legislative body of the Community Facilities District, is authorized to have the Community Facilities District incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 for the purposes set forth in Proposition A of the Official Ballot for the consolidated special elections, and, after the Community Facilities District has incurred a bonded indebtedness and issued bonds therefor, to annually levy special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds at the special tax rates and pursuant to the methodology for determining and apportioning such special taxes which are set forth in Exhibit "C" to Resolution No. 93/12 adopted by the Board on September 21, 1992, and an appropriations limit has been established for the Community Facilities District in the amount of \$500,000.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AUTHORIZING COMMENCE-MENT OF ACTION TO DETERMINE THE VALIDITY OF THE BONDS OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND OF THE SPECIAL TAXES TO BE LEVIED TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SUCH BONDS

WHEREAS, on September 21, 1992 the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") adopted Resolution No. 93/12 establishing Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, (the "Community Facilities District") and the boundaries thereof; and

WHEREAS, on that date the Board also adopted Resolution No. 93/13 determining the necessity for the Community Facilities District to incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 for the purpose of providing public facilities including: (1) school sites, the acquisition, construction and rehabilitation of permanent and portable classroom buildings, the construction and installation of schoolsite improvements, and the purchase of school buses and educational furniture and equipment; (2) water production, transmission and distribution facilities, or capacity in such facilities; (3) sewage and wastewater collection, transmission, treatment and disposal facilities, or capacity in such facilities; (4) fire protection and suppression facilities; and (5) acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for any of the facilities and costs incidental thereto; and

NOVEMBER 2, 1992

OPENING

CALL TO ORDER

The Regular Meeting of the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education was called to order by President David Barnes at 7:02 p.m. on Monday, November 2, 1992, in the Education Center Board Room, 3924 Riverview Drive, Riverside, California.

INSPIRATIONAL COMMENTS

Board Member John Chavez made an inspirational comment.

COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

BOARD MEMBER ABSENT President David Barnes noted that Mrs. Ruane was absence because of illness.

ACCEPT DONATION -MOTION #92

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD ACCEPT TWO ELECTRONICS ASSEMBLY KITS AND LESSONS VALUED AT \$400; AND HORSE BOOKS, MAGAZINES, AND ENGINEERING BOOKS VALUED AT \$800 FROM ELEANOR NIELSEN FOR USE IN THE SCIENCE AND AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENTS AT JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY BY THE FOUR BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT.

UPDATE ON IMPASSE

The Superintendent announced that a memo dated October 30, 1992, Update on Impasse, was sent to all certificated employees. It clarified the district's position on salaries during mediation. The Superintendent read the memo for input to Board and community members at the meeting.

REPORT FROM JURUPA VALLEY STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE Joel Morgan, Jurupa Valley High School student representative, made the following report on current events:

Silver Brigade participated in the Rubidoux Field Show and Mt. Carmel Field Show held in October.

AFJROTC held two activities in October: first Dining In which was very successful, and a Camp Out at March AFB.

The Choir's concert on October 29 was very impressive.

Theater Club organized a Haunted House in celebration of Halloween.

Friday Night Live made presentations at six elementary schools during Red Ribbon Week on "Say No to Drugs".

Water Polo was in second place in the league and fourth place in CIF.

Rubidoux High School Varsity Football Team was congratulated for the #l ranking.

REPORT FROM RUBIDOUX STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE Donavan Alberga, Rubidoux High School student representative, made the following report on current events:

Delta Alliance Corps won overall sweepstakes and Colorguard won first in its division at the recent Valencia Field Show Tournament. The Band will participate in the Lester Oaks Memorial Band Review and Field Show Tournament on November 7.

AFJROTC held its annual Haunted House at Memorial Park.

Madrigals will perform for the Lioness Club on November 17.

Rubidoux's Varsity Football Team will play undefeated Poly High November 6 at home.

Back to School Night on October 29 went very well.

Activities Day during this week provides an opportunity for clubs and classes to promote membership.

Recap of sports events was given.

COMMEND FIRST DINING IN AT JURUPA VALLEY

The Superintendent commended the recent AFJROTC's first Dining In at Jurupa Valley High School. 150 students were present representing various high schools. It was a very impressive event.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Barnes noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

COMMENTS ON IMPASSE

Darrel Walker, teacher, stated that another kind of graffiti was that which is affecting the morale of teachers by drawing impasse into negotiations. He said that NEA-J gave some ground but there has been none from the Board and administration who want to cut 6% along with 3%, and then another reduction next year.

COMMENTS ON IMPASSE (Cont'd)

Brenda Penny, teacher, stated that four years ago the district was a family. Now teachers have been asked to take a cut in salary which would create a hardship. A 6% or 8% cut is a car or insurance payment. Ms. Penny said that teachers spend money out of their own pocket and put in extra time that is not compensated.

Fran Rice, NEA-J President, referred to Paragraph 5 of the October 30 memo, Update on Impasse, for clarification. She stated that in mediation the district proposed a multiyear agreement of 3% cut for 1992/93 and 8% cut for 1993/94. NEA-J took that concept and extended it over three years for the district to develop a long-term plan.

Chuck Dunn, teacher, referred to a memo from the Accounting Department. He noted that in the past special education budgets could not be carried over to the next year, but the memo indicates otherwise and he did not want anyone to override it. Richard Lamborn, parent, asked if the memo from the Accounting Department was still in effect and if it would be upheld. The Superintendent asked Mr. Lamborn to contact him so they could discuss what would be involved with crediting accounts for 600 teachers.

De'Ann McWilliams, teacher and PTA president, reviewed her figures that indicated babysitters receive more pay per month per child than teachers. When administration began the discussion on cutting salaries 6-8%, she felt they were sending a message that teachers were not worth it but she did not want to believe that was true. Ms. McWilliams said she graduated from Rubidoux High School in 1969 and became a teacher in the Jurupa District because people like Barbara Duff, Ron Needham, Kent Campbell, and Bob Gray saw her potential and encouraged her to achieve it. She was concerned who would help the children of tomorrow if teachers cannot afford to teach.

Karen Bell, teacher, urged everyone to vote for the issues and candidates of their choice.

Debbie Buckhout, teacher, stated that she has always been proud to teacher in this district. The benchmark of this district has always been to hire the best teachers with the understanding that good teaching is the ingredient for student success. She felt that teachers in this district were widely known for dedication and skills. Hundreds of volunteer hours were spent at both high schools preparing proposals for restructuring grants to improve education. Ms. Buckhout stated that teachers were willing to shoulder some of the responsibility, but only so much financial security can be taken away before they lose morale. The quality of teachers' work was an essential ingredient for student success. When you sacrifice teachers, you sacrifice students.

Les Brown, teacher, stated it has been expressed that the economy was responsible for teacher pay cuts which were chosen over cutting programs important to the schools. Mr. Brown said by cutting programs the district would spend less and get less. However, by cutting salaries, the district would have the same number of teachers and same extra hours for less money.

Suzanne Mestas, parent, stated that she strongly opposed a salary cut for teachers. Cutting their pay would ruin it for students. She felt Jurupa teachers were the best in Southern California.

COMMENTS ON IMPASSE (Cont'd)

The Superintendent stated that he would clarify an apparent misunderstanding. What was considered in mediation was not a pay cut for any teacher this year over what was received last year. It was a continuance of the salary actually received last year. The Jurupa District has a high caliber of teaching staff which is paid a salary as high as any other school district. The Superintendent noted that he was aware that the lack of money tears at the fabric of a family, but the fact is there is not enough money to do the many things desired in this district.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member John Chavez urged everyone to vote whether it was for existing board members or not.

Clerk Betty Folsom commended Nueva Vista High School's Back to School Night. The turnout was outstanding and the evening exciting. Mrs. Folsom emphasized that the teachers in Jurupa were very special and worthy.

President David Barnes thanked the teachers for coming to the meeting and noted their comments were not falling on deaf ears. Everyone has been carrying a very heavy burden for the past three years as state funding has deteriorated, either because of the economy or politics, putting education in the back seat. Mr. Barnes stated that he also views the proposed voucher system as another crushing blow to public education. During his school years he benefited from a whole range of ethnic and social experiences. He expressed hope that the differences in Jurupa could be resolved and thanked teachers and parents for addressing the Board.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 19, 1992 REGULAR MEETING AND OCTOBER 21, 1992 SPECIAL MEETING AS PRINTED. MRS. FOLSOM SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE 3401, PESTICIDE MANAGEMENT -Motion #94 The Superintendent stated that there was a growing sensitivity to pesticides and its impact on schools throughout California. He expressed appreciation to Supervisor of Grounds Steve Dickinson, and Board member Mary Burns whose interest led to an in-depth study and the proposed policy. A procedure or regulation for implementing pesticide management in the areas of buildings, food services, and grounds shall be developed. Mrs. Burns noted this issue was close to her heart. She thanked the Superintendent for reviewing her concerns, and the staff for doing a terrific job of providing information.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE AT INFORMATIONAL FIRST READING PROPOSED POLICY 3401, PESTICIDE MANAGEMENT. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

SUBMIT NOTIFICATION OF SINGLE ADOPTION BUDGET PROCESS -Motion #95 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that AB 1200 requires a school district to notify the County Office of Education when it plans to use the single adoption budget cycle in the succeeding fiscal year. Jurupa District used this cycle for 1992/93 Budget and proposes to use it again for 1993/94. He explained that a couple of years ago the district developed a tentative budget, and then a final budget which was adopted by September 15. AB 1200 gives the option of adopting a single budget on or before July 1 and also one on September 1. However, the latter date does not allow sufficient time to produce the information in a timely fashion. Therefore, administration is again recommending the single adoption budget process for 1993/94.

SUBMIT NOTIFICATION SINGLE ADOPTION BUDGET PROCESS -Motion #95 (Cont'd) PRESIDENT BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE SUBMISSION OF NOTIFICATION TO THE COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION FOR USE OF THE SINGLE ADOPTION BUDGET PROCESS FOR THE 1993/94 FISCAL YEAR. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT RESOLUTION FOR CFD NO. 2 -Motion #96 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services reviewed that on September 21, 1992, the Board adopted a series of resolutions establishing Community Facilities District No. 2 of Jurupa District. A special election was held and passed as required for the issuance of bonds and annual levy of special taxes for bond repayment. To complete the proceeding for the establishment of CFD No. 2, the Board should adopt two resolutions: 93/24 which declares favorable results of the special election; and 93/25 which authorizes bond counsel to commence a Superior Court proceeding to validate the bonds and levy of the special taxes.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT RESOLUTION NUMBERS 93/24 AND 93/25. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERS -Motion #97 MRS. FOLSOM MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE 1992/93 MEMBERS OF THE DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR THE CONSOLIDATED APPLICATION AND DISTRICT BILINGUAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

SCHOOL FACILITY MATTERS

The Superintendent noted the importance of voting "yes" on Proposition 155, state school construction bond, which would provide an opportunity for modernization projects to be funded.
