## B. Approve Ground Lease Agreement for Felspar Riding Arena

(Mr. Edmunds)

On September 3, 1991, community member Janet May presented to the Board an idea for establishing a riding arena on District property adjacent to Pedley Elementary School, at the corner of Felspar and 58th Streets. At that time, the Board requested that Administration pursue the concept of a riding arena in conjunction with the Jurupa Area Recreation and Parks District.

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services has been working with Chuck Logan, Manager of the Park District, to develop an agreement for the riding arena. A copy of the proposed Agreement is included in the supporting documents. This Agreement has been approved by the Park District Board, subject to approval by the Board of Education. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services will review the proposed Agreement and answer any questions the Board may have.

Administration recommends the Board approve the Ground Lease Agreement for Recreational Purposes, as contained in the supporting documents.

## C. Review Information Regarding Van Buren's Year-Round Education Parent Survey

(Mrs. Roberts)

At the last Board meeting, the staff agreed to provide further information regarding the desire of Van Buren's parents to place their student(s) in a year-round program. Additional information provided by the Van Buren Principal, Carmen Hernandez, indicated that the surveys received represent the opinion of parents of 577 students in the attendance area. ## D. Approve Participation in The Middle Grades Mathematics Renaissance Program

(Mrs. Roberts)

The Mathematics Renaissance is a long-term professional initiative aimed at total reform of mathematics programs in the middle grades. This program involves mathematics teachers at middle schools taking part in regional and local staff development activities. Participating teachers also are given two instructional units (five to six weeks in length) which require students to conduct investigations of mathematics topics by applying previously learned mathematics concepts and skills in an integrated fashion.

## D. Approve Participation In The Middle Grades Mathematics Renaissance Program (Cont'd)

Mission Middle School has been involved in the program for two years with five to seven teachers. Jurupa Middle School had two participants this year. Each school plans to include at least six teachers in the program during the 1993/94 school year. The primary funding for support of the project, from \$8,000 to \$9,000 for released time, hourly compensation and materials will come from the School Improvement budget at each site. District support, not to exceed \$6,000 will be extended from federal Eisenhower funds which are designed to promote staff development in science and mathematics for elementary and middle school teachers.

Administration recommends that the Board approve participation in the Mathematics Renaissance program for the 1993/94 school year.

## E. Approve for Review Elementary and Middle School Science Textbooks (Mrs. Roberts)

In November, 1992 the Board received a report concerning the district's intent to implement the new State <u>Science Framework</u> by adopting materials which support the concepts outlined in this document. For most of this school year, a committee representing each school in the district met on a monthly basis to examine materials recommended by the State's Curriculum Commission. The new <u>Framework</u> on which these materials are based emphasizes seven major themes and recommends that teachers concentrate science teaching on active learning and use performance based assessment. A K-12 Science Concept Matrix was developed to guide teachers in their selection of materials.

Instructional Council members reviewed the process of evaluation and the plans for implementation of the programs at their meeting on April 26, 1993 and approved recommending for Board approval for review, the K-6 Macmillan Science Program and the Prentice Hall Program for the 7th and 8th grade levels. A description of the materials is included in the supporting documents. These materials have been on display at local schools for teachers' review for at least two months and will be available for public review at the Glen Avon and Rubidoux libraries and the district's Instructional Media Center from 1:00 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. for the thirteen day period between Board meetings.

Administration recommends that the Board approve for review the K-6 Macmillan Science Program and grade 7-8 Prentice Hall Science Program.

# F. <u>Approve 1993 Mandated</u>, <u>Core Academic and Special Education Summer School Program</u> (Mr. Taylor)

The State of California provides funds for 7% of a school district's enrollment to receive summer school instruction. We are mandated to provide classes at the high school level first. Eighth graders needing to pass core academic subjects in order to be promoted to the ninth grade along with K-12 special education students will be included. Because of the 7% cap, elementary summer school classes will not be offered.

Our plan is to operate core academic programs at both comprehensive high schools. Because of the remodeling project at Rubidoux High School all K-12 special education classes will be conducted on the Jurupa Valley High School campus.

# F. <u>Approve 1993 Mandated, Core Academic and Special Education Summer School Program</u> (Cont'd)

Summer school offerings are limited to the following eight programs:

- Secondary Proficiency Classes Courses offered include: Secondary Reading Skills, Fundamentals of Writing and Math Essentials. These classes are offered to high school students who need to pass one or more proficiency examinations. (Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley)
- 2. <u>Core Academics</u> State law defines core academic areas as mathematics, social studies, science, English, foreign language, fine arts and computer education. The following chart displays courses proposed for comprehensive high schools:

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- 3. <u>Individualized Program IPI</u> This program is designed for graduating seniors and 8th graders needing to make-up credits for graduation or promotion.
- 4. <u>Special Education</u> Special Education classes for K-12 students are offered to students requiring such instruction.

# F. <u>Approve 1993 Mandated, Core Academic and Special Education Summer School Program</u> (Cont'd)

- 5. <u>Independent Study</u> Students assigned to independent study who desire to complete courses in summer school may enroll in this program.
- 6. **Work Experience** This program is provided for students to earn credit while working in the community. Students receive related instruction in career awareness and job survival skills.
- 7. **AVID Program** This program assists incoming ninth graders by preparing them to be successful at the high school level.
- 8. <u>Nueva Vista</u> This will be an independent study program for currently enrolled Nueva Vista students.

## G. Approve Submittal of Proposal for Homeless Education Grant

(Mr. Taylor)

Through the McKinney Homeless Education Grant, monies are being made available to Riverside County to fund educational programs for homeless students. Nine districts in Riverside County have been invited to apply for funding of \$10,000 each for programs that provide tutorial, remedial or other education services to homeless children or youth. The grant application for the Jurupa Unified School District proposes an after-school program at two schools, Ina Arbuckle and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools. Related activities that augment the educational component such as counseling, provision of supplies, health services, inservice for parents, etc. are included in the proposal. If funded, the program would begin operation in September, 1993.

It is recommended that the Board approve the submittal of an application for funding of a homeless education grant program for Ina Arbuckle and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools.

## H. Authorize Air Conditioning of Classrooms

(Mr. Edmunds)

Information was presented to the Board on April 5, 1993, concerning classrooms in the District that are not air conditioned. A list of these classrooms and the estimated costs for air conditioning them appears below.

This cost can be paid for with Redevelopment money, which is restricted in use to capital expenditures.

Administration recommends the Board authorize installation of air conditioning units in the above classrooms to be funded from Redevelopment revenue.

# I. Approve Purchase Order #75266 to Nationwide Paper for Xerographic/Duplicating Paper (Mr. Edmunds)

At the Board of Education meeting on January 19, 1993, the Board awarded Legal Bid #92/03L to Nationwide Paper for xerographic/duplicating paper. The bid included a special condition allowing the District to place an additional order for paper at the bid price within six (6) months from the date of the initial award. This additional order will give us the required inventory for the balance of the school year and fall startup. The option clause in Legal Bid #92/03L will save the District \$3,435.07, as the current price for white paper is \$1.90 per ream and \$2.65 per ream for colored paper; our bid price is \$1.56 per ream for white paper and \$2.37 per ream for colored paper.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the issuance of Purchase Order #75266, in the amount of \$16,579.50, to Nationwide Paper for 9500 reams of 8 1/2" x 11" white and colored xerographic/duplicating paper.

The following textbooks from the Jurupa Valley High School staff were presented to the Instructional Council at its regular meeting on April 26, 1993 for review, and approved. Donn Cushing, Auto Shop Instructor at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting permission to travel to Pasadena with two students on Wednesday, May 12 through Thursday, May 13, 1993. The purpose of the trip is to participate in the 1993 Chrysler-AAA Trouble Shooting Contest. Transportation will be provided by district vehicle and costs for all lodging and meals will be paid by the Chrysler-AAA-Southern California. Administration has indicated that students will not be prohibited from attending the activity due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

## N. Review Routine Information Reports

## 1. Review Report on Annual Language Census

(Mrs. Roberts)

Each spring, districts throughout California are required to conduct a language census and report this information to the State Department of Education. The data in this report becomes the basis for determining the types of instructional services to be provided for limited English proficient (LEP) students. The 1993 census shows that there are 2,629 LEP students in the district. This figure represents a 21% increase above last year's report when the staff identified 2,169 LEP students.

## N. Review Routine Information Reports

## 1. Review Report on Annual Language Census (Cont'd)

In addition to these students, the census contains data on the number of students who are redesignated as fluent English proficient (FEP). Redesignation requires that the staff examine a student's oral and, when appropriate, written English language proficiency as well as their performance in reading and mathematics. A student must score above the 36th percentile on a standardized test in these two subject areas to be reclassified. At the time of the census, thirty three students were redesignated as FEP.

The majority of the LEP population continues to be Spanish speakers. Twenty-four other languages are also reported. Most of these students speak Vietnamese or Korean. The supporting documents contain charts showing the number of LEP students in each school by grade and by primary language. Information only

#### **APPROVE 1992/93 BUDGET**

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services noted that the Riverside County Office of Education has approved the 1992/93 Budget as presented in the Second Interim Report. The Superintendent added that the 1993/94 Budget should be without any additional reductions and he was extremely grateful to all members of the school district. President Knight also expressed gratitude to employees for making this year's budget approval possible.

#### REPORT FROM JURUPA VALLEY STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE

Mike Brown, substituting for Joel Morgan of Jurupa Valley High School, made the following report on current events:

The 1993 Nominating Convention was held on April 8 to select candidates for next year's student body officers. The election will be held on April 23.

FFA is preparing for the state finals at Cal Poly on May 1.

RUBIDOUX REP ABSENT Donavan Alberga, Rubidoux High School student representative, was absent.

#### PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Knight noted that Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

#### COMMENTS ON YEAR ROUND EDUCATION AT VAN BUREN SCHOOL

J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren School, stated that he and most parents support year round education on single track at the school. There may be some inconvenience to parents and some financial expense to the district, but it would be worthwhile for the children. He noted the recommendation states any excess cost generated by the program would be paid out of the restructuring grant. However, capital outlay items such as air conditioning cannot be subsidized from the restructuring grant. Mr. Hertz referred to the February 16 minutes in which the Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that twelve rooms in the district need air conditioning. Since the redevelopment fund can only be used for capital outlay expenditures, air conditioning could fall into that category. Mr. Hertz requested an amendment to the year-round proposal which states that \$25,000 would be allocated from the Redevelopment Fund for air conditioning at Van Buren School, or from state funding when it becomes available.

COMMENTS ON 1992/93 BUDGET Mr. Hertz referred to a breakdown of expenditures in the 1992/93 Budget which showed that secondary schools receive a higher allocation of funds than elementary schools. Therefore, instructional money should not be spent on air conditioning Van Buren's classrooms and the district should resolve the problem as noted in the February 16, 1993 board minutes.

COMMENTS ON YEAR ROUND EDUCATION AT VAN BUREN SCHOOL Karen Bell, substituting for Fran Rice, President of NEA-J, referred to page 4, Act on Van Buren School's Year-Round Proposal. As noted in the annotation, NEA-J would have to receive a formal request to initiate negotiations for changing or amending the contract. She asked how much of the additional costs would be covered by the restructuring grant. Ms. Bell stated there was very little time to negotiate for year-round to take effect on July 1, 1993, and questioned if there was a necessity to begin on that date.

COMMENTS ON 1992/93 BUDGET Chuck Dunn, teacher, noted that administration came to a wise decision to rollover unexpended class moneys to discourage unnecessary purchases and encourage savings. However, the teachers who saved the money should be rewarded by getting it back in their budgets.

COMMENTS ON DUE PROCESS HEARINGS

Veronica Darby, mother of a student at Jurupa Valley High School, stated the school district should provide more information on due process hearings. Ms. Darby said that Chuck Dunn referred her to TASK in Anaheim.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS AND COMMENTS Board member John Chavez thanked Board members for supporting the CSBA Delegate Assembly and casting a vote for the nominees. CSBA plays an important role in supporting legislation that affects school districts, and needs input from Boards of Education.

Mr. Chavez said the Board should approve the year-round proposal for Van Buren School so that administration can begin resolving the issues to implement the program in July.

Mr. Chavez expressed appreciation for everyone's efforts and support to obtain approval of the 1992/93 budget from the County Office of Education.

Board member David Barnes announced that the Jurupa Valley High School Silver Brigade Percussion Line recently participated in the Winterguard International competition in Dayton, Ohio. The Percussion Line ranked 7th in the Open Class Division out of 243 high schools. It was also the only group to make the top 15 in the nation that did not use some type of electrical instrument. Mr. Barnes commended the Silver Brigade Percussion Line for their outstanding performance.

Board member Mary Burns welcomed Press-Enterprise reporter Joe Gutierrez. She noted that the Board recently took action to strongly oppose Assembly Bill 107 which would permit unlimited transfer of off-sale general alcoholic beverage licenses without regard for existing restrictions by reducing the fee from \$6000 to \$100. Mrs. Burns encouraged the reporter to print articles of newsworthy actions by the school district.

APPROVE MINUTES

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE APRIL 5, 1993 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

PRESENTATION ON CIEI AT RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the Press-Enterprise had recently published "A Nation at Risk" series which was originally printed in 1983. Ten years later, Rubidoux High School has an exemplary project for training of student teachers.

Kathy Gentry, teacher at Rubidoux High School, introduced members of the Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute (CTEI) project, which was a collaborative effort between the high school and the University of California, Riverside.

The representative from UCR stated that the university has a very successful placement rate for those student teachers who have participated in the CTEI program. In addition, the program has received statewide recognition and the university has been chosen an outstanding teacher education site in the State of California.

The short video, developed on the Rubidoux High School campus by Jim Brown of UCR with cooperating teachers, was presented at the National Conference for College and University Educators in San Diego earlier this year. The video was shown at the Board meeting. President Knight and Mr. Barnes commended the joint effort of the school district and UCR to provide a highly successful training program for student teachers.

HEAR & ACT ON VAN BUREN SCHOOL'S YEAR-ROUND PROPOSAL The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that the board agenda includes an extensive historical background on the selection of Van Buren School for the "Demonstration of Restructuring" grant. The school's plan includes the provision of a single track year-round program to be implemented in July 1993.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that several changes associated with year-round programs could have implications on the district budget. The supporting documents include a chart prepared by the principal which lists issues that require resolution, and copies of correspondence to parents in the school's attendance area noting the intent to offer a year-round schedule.

Carmen Hernandez, principal of Van Buren School, stated that the year-round single track 45-15 plan was developed to help students be more successful academically by shortening the long period off in the summer. Students would be in school for nine weeks and off for three weeks. She was hopeful the program could be implemented at the beginning of the 1993/94 school year. Parents were first notified of the staff's intent to offer a year-round schedule at Parent Conference Days, November 5-6, 1992. It was mentioned again at the March 27, 1993 parent meeting. On April 7, prior to spring break, a survey was sent to all parents for their input on year-round education. Of the 62% that did respond to the survey, 92% were in favor and 7% were opposed to the plan. Parents will be contacted and requested to return the survey to the school. Local child care agencies were contacted and they saw no problem with providing care to students during time off. Mrs. Hernandez noted that administration could not proceed with negotiations until the Board approves year-round education at Van Buren School for 1993/94.

In response to Mr. Barnes' question, Mrs. Hernandez noted that the staff developed the plan and was 100% in agreement on its implementation. Van Buren could serve as a pilot program for other schools.

HEAR & ACT ON VAN BUREN SCHOOL'S YEAR-ROUND PROPOSAL (Cont'd) Mrs. Hernandez reviewed the issues remaining to be resolved such as negotiations with bargaining units, air conditioning for six classrooms through redevelopment funds, scheduling of specialists, approval of YRE Calendar to include four additional staff development days, preschool schedule, allow parents of Van Buren the option of intradistrict transfers to other schools in district and approval from the Board to proceed with plan for YRE at Van Buren School. She noted that 20-30 parents have indicated they would request an intradistrict transfer.

Mr. Chavez asked if more meetings will be held with parents. Mrs. Hernandez replied that all parents would be contacted by phone starting tomorrow to make sure they return the survey. Mr. Barnes noted that the principal and PTSA president have indicated the necessity for air conditioning the six remaining classrooms. He pointed out that since 1989 the district budget has been cut \$10 million in instructional programs, salaries, etc. He appreciated the hard work of the Van Buren staff and parents, but suggested they eliminate such expenses as consultants in the first year.

The Superintendent added that the General Fund budget should be protected from further strains on regular programs to enhance new programs such as Van Buren's Year-Round School proposal. Another complex issue was successful negotiations with both parties. At some point implementation of year-round education may need a new goal of 1994/95 instead of 1993/94. The approximate cost for air conditioning remaining classrooms in the district was \$150,000 which included \$25,000 to complete Van Buren School. There was the option of covering the cost with Redevelopment money. The Superintendent expressed admiration for the principal and staff of Van Buren School for their dedication to the program.

Mrs. Hernandez commented on the amount of hours and work the staff has contributed to preparing the restructuring grant which will allocate funds to the school for the next four years. She also asked that the motion be amended to provide funds for air conditioning of the remaining classrooms.

APPROVE YEAR-ROUND AT VAN BUREN SUBJECT TO SUCCESSFUL NEGOTIATIONS -Motion #246 Mr. Chavez stated that he has not been a proponent for year-round school, but the Van Buren staff has worked diligently and it appears that parents have given their approval. MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE YEAR-ROUND EDUCATION AT VAN BUREN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL FOR 1993/94 SUBJECT TO SUCCESSFUL NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE BARGAINING UNITS AS REQUIRED AND WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT ANY EXCESS COST GENERATED BY THE PROGRAM WILL BE PAID FOR OUT OF THE RESTRUCTURING GRANT. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION. Mrs. Burns noted she has attended several conferences on restructuring with teachers of Van Buren School. She supported a single track 45-15 schedule but would not be a major proponent for multitrack year-round. Mrs. Burns noted that the motion does not prevent the principal from requesting funds for air conditioning at a future meeting. Mr. Chavez stated that there was a consensus of the Board to find some options for paying the air conditioning costs. Mrs. Ruane stated she also attended conferences on year-round education and supported single track. She felt the Van Buren staff received the restructuring grant and should have an opportunity to implement their plan. She also asked administration to consider air conditioning all remaining classrooms in the district. Mr. Barnes agreed that air conditioning should be addressed for the entire school district and not as a separate issue. He supported year-round education. President Knight stated that he supported any academic program that enhances the performance of students in the THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

## **GROUND LEASE AGREEMENT FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES**

JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, herein called DISTRICT, and JURUPA AREA RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT, herein called PARK DISTRICT, hereby agree as follows:

#### WITNESSETH:

- The DISTRICT agrees to lease ground space to the PARK DISTRICT for the purpose of providing a neighborhood riding arena for youth and adults. This space is that portion of DISTRICT property located adjacent to Pedley Elementary School; and, at the corner of said property on Felspar and 58th Streets.
- 2. The DISTRICT agrees to permit the PARK DISTRICT to make appropriate site improvements for Felspar Neighborhood Riding Arena as outlined in this agreement and as shown on Attachment "A", Felspar Arena Site Improvement Plans.
  - A. Arena will be located approximately forty (40) feet in from the edge of roadway from Felspar and 58th Streets.
  - B. The riding arena will be approximately one-hundred twenty (120) feet in width and two-hundred fifty (250) feet in length. Fencing shall consist of peeler core logs installed into the ground utilizing native dirt and rock soil as a compacted backfill material.
  - C. Two (2) steel entrance gates shall be installed, with a tie-up rail adjacent to entrance gate.
  - D. Any alterations, improvements, or installation of fence material and gates to be undertaken by PARK DISTRICT shall have the prior written consent of the DISTRICT after PARK DISTRICT has submitted plans for any such proposed improvements for the Felspar Neighborhood Riding Arena to DISTRICT in writing. PARK DISTRICT shall be responsible for any costs incurred by PARK DISTRICT relative to the Felspar Neighborhood Riding Arena. All improvements made to the Felspar Neighborhood Riding Arena by PARK DISTRICT shall be constructed so as not to interfere with the DISTRICT'S educational priorities.
- 3. The DISTRICT agrees to permit access to the leased space for local neighborhood residents to utilize this informal riding arena as a place for rider and horse to participate in a safe environment.
- 4. Title to said property will at all times remain with the DISTRICT.
- 5. Prior to entry into this lease, the PARK DISTRICT will provide to the DISTRICT a current Certificate of Insurance with liability limits of at least one million dollars naming the Jurupa Unified School District as an additional insured.

- 6. The PARK DISTRICT shall save, defend, hold harmless and indemnify the DISTRICT against any and all liability, claims, and costs of whatsoever kind and nature for injury to or death of any person or persons and for loss or damage to any property occurring in connection with or in any way incidental to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operations, or performance of work under the terms of this contract, resulting in whole or in part from the negligent acts or omissions of PARK DISTRICT, and subcontractor, or any employee, agent or representative of PARK DISTRICT or subcontractor.
- 7. For and in consideration of the ground space, the PARK DISTRICT agrees to pay the DISTRICT the sum of one dollar per year.
- 8. This agreement may only be amended in writing by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, except that the DISTRICT may amend the contract to accomplish administrative changes or changes that may be required by law.
- 9. DISTRICT shall give written notice to PARK DISTRICT of any use being made of District Property by PARK DISTRICT not in conformity with this lease. PARK DISTRICT shall have forty-five (45) days from date of such notice to correct any such non-conforming use.
- 10. PARK DISTRICT shall maintain the riding arena premises in a neat and orderly fashion, and in good repair.
- 11. The Felspar Neighborhood Riding Arena will be limited to neighborhood resident/equestrian enthusiasts who wish to exercise, practice, and ride their horses; and will be limited to organized events by the neighborhood resident/equestrian enthusiasts only. The intended use for this arena is not for scheduling major events, i.e. rodeos, gymkhanas, or other related sanctioned events which may have an impact on the neighborhood.
- 12. Any notice required or desired, to be served by either party upon the other shall be addressed to the separate parties as set forth below:

## Part I - Needs Statement

The Jurupa Unified School District is located in the unincorporated western end of Riverside County. The area of the district targeted for this project is the old Rubidoux section, an area that is dominated by run-down buildings, frequent vandalism and crime, and mainly low income housing. In recent years, the district has observed an increase of immigrants moving into the area often living in sub-standard housing conditions such as converted garages, or multiple families living in small houses.

Two school sites have been selected for this project. Ina Arbuckle Elementary School is located near the Santa Ana River bottom and encompasses a local park that is used by homeless families. The transiency rate at the school is 63%; 96% of the students are provided with free or reduced lunches, and 33% of its families are on AFDC. Rustic Lane Elementary School is located in a high crime area and has an inexpensive motel located within its boundaries. The transiency rate at the school is 75%; 69% of the students are provided with free or reduced lunches, and 25% of its families are on AFDC.

## Part II - Homeless Education Plan

A. There are an estimated 35-55 elementary age children who would qualify as homeless living within the boundaries of the Jurupa Unified School District. These children are most likely to live in one of three conditions: a motel, in cars, or camping in vacant lots or local parks. None of these conditions provide an acceptable atmosphere for learning.

Often homeless children are left without any provision for child care in the after school hours, or an adequate location to complete home and study assignments. This grant would enable homeless children to stay after school three days per week to work with a teacher, instructional aide and counselor.

- B. The District has a wide range of services available to assist all students, including homeless children. The children targeted for service by this grant will be provided with the breadth of these services which include: before school breakfast program, health services (Healthy Start Program), assistance with clothing (Operation School Bell), after-school tutoring, counseling services (Youth Service/Outreach), testing and evaluation services.
- C. The grant funds would be utilized to provide an after school program so that homeless children may receive additional assistance in completing homework or remedial activities. One teacher, one instructional aide, and one mental health counselor would provide services three days per week at each location. As appropriate, the teacher and aide may schedule home visits or more convenient locations to provide services, i.e., in the motel's lounge. In addition, the funds would provide school and personal supplies, curriculum packets, and information to parents.
- D. At each of the targeted schools, one certificated teacher, one instructional aide and one mental health counselor would have direct contact with students. With this staffing plan, the teacher would be available one hour for three days per week; the instructional aides available for one hour three days per week, and the counselor one hour every other week. As such, for three days per week for one hour after school, instructional assistance would be available to homeless students.



The teacher's role would be to develop a rapport with each student and determine where assistance is needed. This would include contact with the student's regular classroom teacher.

The instructional aide's role would be to enhance the instructional plan as outlined by both the classroom teacher and the after-school teacher.

Students often need the availability of a counselor to discuss personal and family matters. In addition to the counselor available through the regular school program, a counselor would be available for one-on-one counseling with homeless students. Through this contact, additional needs of the student may become known and met.

Support staff for these students would include the school nurse, the principal and clerical staff. Through these individuals, personal and school supplies may be provided, communications with parents may occur, and additional needs may become known.

E. The selected project staff would receive training in working with homeless children and families. The concept of providing an environment where students can feel safe and successful in completing their assignments would be stressed. Staff would be trained to be sensitive to the unmet needs, both educational and social, of the students.

## Part III - Project Goals and Objectives

The major goal of this project is to identify homeless students at the target schools, to inform parents that special assistance is available, and to enhance the educational programs of participants.

## Objectives:

- 1. Students will be identified by the following methods
  - a. During the registration process
  - b. Through advertisement of the after-school program
  - c. Through outreach materials left at the local motels, parks, etc.
- 2. Parents will be informed of the project through regular school communications channels (i.e., newsletters, PTA notices, etc.) or by direct contact from school personnel.
- 3. An outreach component will provide information at local parks and motels concerning school attendance, how to enroll, special programs for homeless children, and who to call for assistance.
- 4. Participants in the after-school program will receive tutorial, remedial and counseling services. Support services will also be provided as needed, i.e., clothing, school supplies, hygiene kits, or referrals for other community-based services.

## Part IV - Overcoming Barriers

One of the most common stumbling blocks to school attendance for homeless children is transportation. If a family is living in an automobile in the local park, they are often late to school, unkept and hungry. Community referrals for social services are provided so a family may find appropriate shelter.

In other cases, a family's homelessness is often unknown because the parent hides the fact by giving false information concerning a residence. When such a case is discovered, school personnel try to assure the parent that school attendance is the important factor not the homelessness. Flexibility is given for riding buses and making arrangements for delivery and pick-up of students.

Finally, a wide range of other social services are often needed by homeless families. The schools attempt to make referral information and services available in order to assist the child and the family in meeting basic needs.

## Part V - Evaluation

A final evaluation of the project will include review of the number of participants, survey of parents, and evaluation by teachers and site principals.





A unit member who suffers from a catastrophic injury or illness that is expected to incapacitate the unit member for an extended period of time (more than ten days), or who is required to take time off from work to provide care for an immediate family member who suffers from a catastrophic injury or illness, shall be eligible to receive Catastrophic Leave (donated sick leave) subject to the restrictions and conditions outlined below.

- A. The unit member to receive donated sick leave must have exhausted all entitlement to sick leave or any other form of paid leave and must be on unpaid status. He/she must be in a true catastrophic condition.
- B. The unit member must be a permanent, not probationary, employee.

Section 2 - Purpose. The sole purpose of this leave is to provide an infusion of monetary support. The purpose of the leave is not to extend leave timelines, increase entitlement to health and welfare benefits, or to supplement or enhance any related benefit.

Section 3 - Sick Leave Bank. Unit members may donate accumulated sick leave (as opposed to "advanced") to a Sick Leave Bank. This donation shall be irrevocable. In order to make a donation a unit member must file a "Sick Leave Bank Deposit Form" in the payroll department of the Business Office. This form shall be developed and approved by the District. The payroll department staff shall then deduct the specified sick leave and deposit it in the Sick Leave Bank. Donations to the Sick Leave Bank shall be from prior years' accumulations and shall not be donated to a specific unit member.

- A. The sick leave donor may not donate sick leave that would cause his/her personal accrued sick leave balance to fall below ten (10) days.
- B. Donated sick leave may not be used for industrial illness or injury absences.
- C. Donations to the Bank will be made in full or half-day increments. Withdrawals will also be made in full or half-days.

Section 4 - Requests for Sick Leave Donation. A unit member who meets the eligibility requirements for Catastrophic Leave may request donation of sick leave from the Sick Leave Bank by submitting a "Sick Leave Bank Request for Donation Form" to the payroll department in the Business Office. The request shall clearly specify the circumstances of the catastrophe and the amount of sick leave requested. Appropriate written verification of the catastrophic illness or injury must be included with the request. The unit member should be prepared to provide additional documentation on the nature and severity of the illness or injury, if requested.

- A. A committee consisting of one District representative and two representatives appointed by the Association President shall be established each fiscal year. One member shall be selected as chairperson, another shall serve as recorder. Minutes shall be kept. The committee shall consider all requests for sick leave donation. The committee may grant, partially grant, or reject a request. Decisions shall require a majority vote. The decision of the committee is final and not grievable. A written copy of the committee's decision shall be provided to the payroll department so that the sick leave can be transferred from the Sick Leave Bank to the member's account, if necessary. Donated sick leave will not be applied retroactive to the current available pay period.
- B. The maximum number of sick leave days that the committee can approve for use by a unit member shall not exceed ninety (90) per individual per catastrophe. Unused sick leave shall be returned to the Sick Leave Bank.
- C. A unit member who uses a donated sick leave day shall be paid at his/her regular daily rate. No distinction shall be made as to the differing pay rates of the donors or recipients.
- D. A unit member may not receive the benefits of this leave while receiving monies from Workers' Compensation.
- E. Each year the Business Office shall provide the Association with a statement of the number of days in the Bank as of September 1 of that year and the number of days used in the previous fiscal year.

### USE OF TIME CARDS

All employees of the Jurupa Unified School District must report time worked on individual time cards. Responsibility for proper completion and submission of these forms rests with the Building Principal, District Administrator or Supervisor directly responsible for each employee. Each form must be signed by the employee and signed approved by the supervisor.

The Regular Classified and Certificated time cards are exception reporting forms. Only time not worked need be reported. Absences should be coded in accordance with instructions on the card. If an absence requires explanation, the facts and initialed approval should be shown on the reverse side of the card. The Classified Employee Form also requires the number of daily hours of the assignment.

The Extra Time and the two Substitute forms are positive reporting forms. These forms require the reporting of time worked, type of assignment and, if substitute, the person replaced. A careful distinction must be made between a substitute assignment and an extra time assignment. The differentiating fact is that a substitute assignment is one replacing an <u>absent</u> employee normally assigned to fill the position.

All extra compensation assignments must be submitted by the responsible administrator in writing to the Personnel Office for appropriate listing on the Personnel Report. Assignments are authorized by the Board of Education upon approval of the Personnel Report.

Page 2 of this procedure is a chart showing the general categories of employment, examples of positions, and the form to be used. Any questions should be directed to the Assistant Superintendent of Business Services.

ARTICLE IN LOCAL NEWSPAPER

The Superintendent referred to a recent article on graffiti in the Jurupa This Week and felt that it implied the school district was pulling back from joining in any community effort. He clarified that the Jurupa District stands ready to cooperate with any community agency to resolve the problem of graffiti.

### REPORT FROM JURUPA VALLEY STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE

Joel Morgan, Jurupa Valley High School student representative, made the following report on current events:

Sports will be active for the next couple of weeks. The varsity baseball team will compete against Elsinore High School May 4 and 7 for first place in the division. The winner will go to CIF playoffs.

Jurupa Valley's swim team is preparing to go to CIF as the #1 seed.

School events: Class Officer voting starts on May 7; ROTC Military Ball is at MAFB on May 8; Pep Rally is May 14; Senior Prom is May 14.

### REPORT FROM RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE

Shelley Guerrero, substituting for Donavan Alberga of Rubidoux High School, made the following report on current events:

45 ROTC cadets assisted disabled personnel at the Air Show held at the El Toro Air Station on April 30. 51 cadets participated in a Rocket Model firing on May 1.

The ROTC Color Guards performed for the ACSA Region 12 Educators Spring Conference in San Bernardino. They also participated in the 28th Annual Southern California Invitational Drill Meet in Anaheim and earned three first places and two second places.

The ROTC Color Guard provided colors for the Riverside County School Boards Association in Palm Springs.

Cadet Rachael Mony received a four-year AFJROTC scholarship valued at \$67,000, to attend the University of California in Los Angeles. She will initially major in nursing and then transfer to pre-med.

The AFJROTC Military Ball is scheduled for June 4 at March Air Force Base Officer's Club.

The Band concert will be held on May 6 at Jurupa Valley High School. A "Pops" concert will be held on May 8 at Rubidoux High School.

The men's track team is in first place and the women's track team is in second place in the Ivy League.

The annual Rubidoux Golf Tournament was held on April 24. Over 100 golfers participated in the successful event which made approximately \$5,000. Appreciation was extended to Mr. Barnes for his support and participation.

Two teachers received over \$1,000 in a grant for AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program for college bound students.

School events: Nominating Convention is May 7 and the theme is "Quantum Leap"; ASB elections are May 6-7; Cinco de Mayo Assembly is May 5.

### PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Knight noted that Public verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

INVITATION TO CINCO DE MAYO FROM VAN BUREN PRINCIPAL Carmen Hernandez, principal of Van Buren School, reviewed activities planned for the Cinco de Mayo celebration on May 8. She extended a personal invitation to visit the school as students learn about the history and culture of Mexico. Mrs. Hernandez also noted that along with Rubidoux High School, Van Buren has received a Step Up to Education grant from Southern California Edison Co.

### COMMENTS ON FELSPAR RIDING ARENA

Janet May, community member, expressed appreciation to administration and the Board for supporting the establishment of a riding arena on District property adjacent to Pedley School at the corner of Felspar and 58th Streets, in conjunction with the Jurupa Area Recreation and Parks District. Mrs. May read a recap of events that led to the recommendation before the Board to approve the Ground Lease Agreement for Recreational Purposes at the site.

She also gave special thanks to Mrs. Burns, Dr. Wilson, Mr. Edmunds and Mr. Taylor of the school district, and Mr. Logan of the Parks District. If the proposed agreement is approved, a ribbon cutting ceremony will be scheduled.

COMMENTS FROM NEA-J PRESIDENT ON RESTRUCTURING AT VAN BUREN SCHOOL Fran Rice-Laabs, NEA-J president, read a letter addressed to certificated bargaining unit members on restructuring as it relates to year-round education at Van Buren School. It has been summarized as follows: On April 21, 1993, the NEA-J president and three members met with the site representative to discuss year-round education at Van Buren School. Specific information on restructuring and the year-round concept was requested by April 28. On May 5 the Executive Board will meet to discuss the issue. On May 12 the NEA-J Rep Council, which is a larger group, will meet on the YRE concept. Members of Van Buren staff were invited to the NEA-J office on May 19 to discuss concerns, ideas, etc. Mrs. Laabs further noted that alternative contract language would be developed by the Van Buren Staff. According to the Restructuring Article of the contract, alternatives must be reviewed by the Contract Administrative Committee, which consists of members from NEA-J and administration, prior to negotiations. Any agreement would be submitted to the Board and NEA-J membership for ratification.

Mrs. Laabs stated the letter also included the following concerns as expressed to the site representative at the April 21 meeting: 1) Does consensus exist for year-round education at Van Buren School? This will be discussed at the May 19 meeting. 2) Time constraints to make decisions on year-round come at a time when NEA-J is preparing an initial proposal on contract reopeners for the Board. 3) Unit members need information about the YRE program because contract changes require ratification by the Association. A cover letter from NEA-J should accompany Van Buren's letter to unit members. 4) Education Code provisions regarding the establishment and operation of a continuous year-round education program needs to be reviewed.

Mrs. Laabs stated this was new ground for everyone and the Association would not want to stand in the way of site-based decision making which ultimately may be good for children. However, the Association will take as much time as needed to make sure the implementation is done right and may not meet the July 1 timeline proposed for year-round implementation at Van Buren School.

### CITIZEN COMMENTS ON SEVERAL TOPICS

J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren School, stated that he was looking forward to NEA-J's full cooperation on the implementation of the restructuring program. Year-round single track schedule is best for the children.

Mr. Hertz stated that he did not oppose the Felspar Riding Arena but had some concern about its location near a 55 mph speed zone. He also noted the district has a desperate need for money and should lease or sell the land at full market value rather than lease it to the Park District for the sum of one dollar per year.

Mr. Hertz referred to the agenda topic, Proposed Summer School Schedule, and said the district was leaning too heavily on high school courses as opposed to offering elementary subjects.

Mr. Hertz referred to the agenda topic, Authorize Air Conditioning of Classrooms, and asked if there was sufficient redevelopment revenue to complete all schools as noted in the annotation and a timeline for implementation.

### BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

Board member John Chavez stated that a major issue facing school districts is the School of Choice Initiative which has qualified for the June 1994 ballot. A statewide network will be formed to explain the affects of the initiative on public education. Mr. Knight referred to a document on Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 30A, School of Choice, and asked that it be distributed to Board members. The proposed legislation would have a tremendous impact on the public school system.

Mr. Chavez noted that a program under consideration would utilize parents as tutors. It seems if parents get involved, everything gets better for children.

Mr. Chavez complimented Shelley Guerrero, substituting for Rubidoux High School student representative, for a very informative report.

Board member David Barnes reported that proposed legislation to prevent the County from charging a school district to assess property taxes has passed committee.

In response to Mr. Barnes' question, the Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services confirmed that a proposal was pending to change the deadline for issuing certificated layoff notices from March 15 to June 15. Often deadlines do not have any logic when compared to budget requirements.

Mr. Barnes stated that he attended the celebration in honor of the district's bus drivers. Several employees were recognized for having more than twenty-five years of service with the district. He also commended Curtis Thomas, Director of Transportation, for his dedicated service.

Mr. Barnes congratulated Jennifer Strona from Jurupa Valley High School for earning the Sweepstakes Award in the senior division at the Inland Counties Science and Engineering Fair.

### HEARING SESSION

### PUBLIC HEARING ON CSEA INITIAL PROPOSAL

The Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services stated that prior to initiating negotiations on CSEA's proposal, the law requires the Board to conduct a public hearing. President Knight opened and closed the public hearing on the proposal without comment.

### **ACTION SESSION**

APPROVE MINUTES
-Motion #258

APPROVE GROUND LEASE AGREEMENT FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES FOR RIDING ARENA -Motion #259 MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE APRIL 19, 1993 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that community member Mrs. Janet May has been working with the School District and Chuck Logan of the Park District to develop an agreement for the riding arena. The Park District has approved the agreement subject to approval by the School Board. A conceptual diagram of the riding arena on property adjacent to Pedley School was on display. The arena is approximately 120' x 250'. Two steel entrance gates will be installed with a tie-up rail adjacent to entrance gate. The Park District agrees to pay the school district a sum of one dollar per year with automatic renewal. Either party may terminate the agreement upon 120 days written notice to the other party. The Park District shall hold harmless and indemnify the district against any and all liability claims, and costs for injury or death of any person, loss or damage of property, maintenance of property, etc.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE GROUND LEASE AGREEMENT FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES, AS CONTAINED IN THE SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION. In response to Mr. Chavez' question, the Assistant Superintendent Business Services replied that if the district's property were damaged, the Park District would repair it. Mr. Chavez asked whether the agreement should include a provision regarding alcoholic beverages on school property. Mrs. Ruane noted the importance of the Park District maintaining the property and keeping it free from tumbleweeds, etc. In response to Mr. Hertz' earlier statement opposing the sum of one dollar a year, Mrs. Burns stated that she supported the leasing concept in the agreement. The arena was an investment for children and a safe place for wholesome activities. Mrs. May added that they would be working on slowing down traffic in the area. She was also developing a brochure on arena etiquette. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

REVIEW VAN BUREN PARENT SURVEY

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that at the last meeting several Board members expressed interest in more information on Van Buren parents' desire to enroll students in a year-round education program. She also referred to an Education Code provision which states the district must notify parents in the attendance area of its desire to implement the program. Additional information provided by Van Buren School on April 28, represented surveys from parents of 577 students in the attendance area: 474 students would enroll in year round; 36 students said no; 50 students were undecided because of the calendar and/or child care; 39 students would transfer to Stone Avenue because of boundary changes; 8 students would move. The Superintendent said about 86 students would not enroll in the year-round program next year. This should impact the school in two ways. The projected staff of 20 teachers for 1993/94 would be reduced by 3. Although there may be some bus problems, 86 students can be accommodated with one bus. The Superintendent noted that there were three more board meetings to work through the issues of implementing year-round at Van Buren School beginning in July 1993.

GRADES MATH **PROGRAM** -Motion #260

PARTICIPATE IN MIDDLE MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE PARTICIPATION IN THE MATHEMATICS RENAISSANCE PROGRAM FOR THE 1993/94 SCHOOL MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

REVIEW ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCIENCE TEXTS -Motion #261

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reported that the State has a seven-year cycle for adoption of new instructional materials. This year a committee representing each school in the district met on a monthly basis to determine the materials which support the concepts outlined in the new State Science Framework. These materials will be available for public review at the Glen Avon and Rubidoux libraries and the district's Instructional Media Center for the thirteen day period between board meetings.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE FOR REVIEW THE K-6 MACMILLAN SCIENCE PROGRAM AND GRADE 7-8 PRENTICE HALL SCIENCE PROGRAM. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE 1993 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM -Motion #262

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that a few years ago administration offered summer school on a limited basis to elementary students. The State provides funds for seven per cent of a school district's enrollment to receive summer school instruction. The district is mandated to provide classes for high school students and special education students. Because of remodeling Rubidoux High School, all K-12 special education classes will be held at Jurupa Valley High School. Only the special education students will be bused.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE 1993 SUMMER SCHOOL OFFERINGS AS PRESENTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

SUBMIT PROPOSAL FOR HOMELESS EDUCATION GRANT -Motion #263

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that Mr. Jim Taylor and Mrs. Jana Twombley have applied for \$10,000 through the McKinney Homeless Education Grant. The application for Jurupa proposes an after-school program at Ina Arbuckle and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools that includes counseling, supplies, nursing assistance, etc.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE SUBMITTAL OF AN APPLICATION FOR FUNDING OF A HOMELESS EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM FOR INA ARBUCKLE AND RUSTIC LANE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

**AUTHORIZE AIR** CONDITIONING CLASSROOMS -Motion #264

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE INSTALLATION OF AIR CONDITIONING UNITS IN THE ABOVE CLASSROOMS TO BE FUNDED FROM REDEVELOPMENT REVENUE. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE PURCHASE ORDER TO NATIONWIDE PAPER -Motion #265

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #75266, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$16,579.50, TO NATIONWIDE PAPER FOR 9500 REAMS OF 8-1/2" x 11" WHITE AND COLORED XEROGRAPHIC/DUPLICATING PAPER. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

UPDATE ON CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS The Superintendent reported that he spent three days (April 27-29) in Sacramento meeting with various legislators and state representatives for support to reinstate the Peralta project on the August 12, 1992 funding list for Phase III. Lyle Smoot of the State Allocation Board had received a message from Senator Leroy Greene in support of funding the project. At the April 28 meeting, the SAB Committee agreed to consider the project for funding on the May 12 agenda.

Mira Loma Middle School Addition #1 has been approved and funded.

Jurupa Valley High School Addition #2 was funded approximately \$4 million. Administration was waiting for the official Go to Bid letter.

Mission Bell and West Riverside Elementary School modernizations have low bids. After the state approves the contractors, the Board will be requested to award the bids.

All bids for Rubidoux High School modernization were over the limit. This project will have to be re-bid.

Plans for Van Buren modernization were at the Office of the State Architect for approval.

The Superintendent stated that Sandy Silberstein of Murdoch Walrath & Holmes has been invaluable in this process. Mr. Barnes reported that pending legislation reduces the cost of leasing portables from \$4,000 to \$2,000. The Superintendent added that the district has 77 State Emergency portables at a cost of \$4,000 each per year.
