#### **COMMUNICATIONS SESSION**

#### I. Recognition

#### a. Recognize 1993 California Distinguished Schools

(Mrs. Roberts)

The district and the local news media were recently notified that Sunnyslope and Van Buren Elementary Schools have been designated as 1992/93 California Distinguished Schools. In January, schools throughout California were invited to submit applications to be considered for this award.

#### Recognition

#### a. Recognize 1993 California Distinguished Schools (Cont'd)

The applications consisted of the staffs' responses to questions concerning school programs and processes in the following eight areas:

1. The processes for developing goals and priorities;

2. a description of exemplary practices and recent changes which contributed to a meaning-centered, thinking curriculum for all students;

3. the processes for providing academic support to ensure that students acquire important

learnings;

4. the processes by which teachers will provide "access to the best current thinking about curriculum and instructional practices";

5. the processes by which language minority students and special education students are

ensured access to the core curriculum;

6. a description of student assessment approaches, including performance standards, grading practices, assessment of LEP students and performance based assessment;

- 7. a description of the approaches used to ensure both students and parents feel a sense of connection and commitment to the school and how the school is moving toward coordinating health, mental health and social services for students; and,
- 8. a description of the outcome measures used to assess the program.

Several hundred schools submitted their applications to regional centers and these applications were then scored by a committee of educators throughout the region. Successful applications were sent to the State Department of Education for further review; these evaluations were followed by a one-day visit to each site to determine whether or not the practices described in the applications were in fact being implemented in the schools. Sunnyslope and Van Buren became two of only four schools in Riverside County designated as California Distinguished Schools.

#### d. Recognize Rubidoux High School's AFJROTC

(Mrs. Roberts)

The Rubidoux High School AFJROTC has been selected by the Department of the Air Force as an AFJROTC Honor School for the academic year 1992/93. According to Brigadier General, USAF Commandant Robin Tornow, "This distinction was earned through the accomplishments and efforts of the school's Aerospace Science Instructors, their students and the school administration." At the May 3, 1993 Board meeting, the Board approved for review the K-6 Macmillan Science Program and the Prentice Hall Program for the 7th and 8th grade levels. A description of the materials is included in the supporting documents. These materials were on display at local schools for teachers' review for at least two months and have been on public display at the Instructional Media Center, Rubidoux and Glen Avon libraries for the period required by Board Policy 6200.

It is recommended that the Board approve for adoption the K-6 Macmillan Science Program and the Prentice Hall Program for the 7th and 8th grade levels.

C. Approve for Adoption <u>Conceptual Physics</u>, <u>Pre-Algebra</u>, <u>Biology-An Everyday Experience</u> and <u>Globe Literature</u>, <u>Silver Level</u> (Mrs. Roberts)

At the May 3, 1993 Board meeting, the Board approved for review <u>Conceptual Physics</u>, <u>Pre-Algebra</u>, <u>Biology-An Everyday Experience</u> and <u>Globe Literature</u>, <u>Silver Level</u> for use at Jurupa Valley High School contingent upon sufficient funding from the Secondary Instructional Materials Funds or the site's regular instructional allocation. The books have been on display at the Instructional Media Center, Rubidoux and Glen Avon libraries for the period required by Board Policy 6200. A description of the textbooks is included in the supporting documents.

- E. Award Bid #93/11L for Fire Access Lanes at Five (5) District Sites (Mr. Edmunds)

At the April 19, 1993 Board meeting, the Board authorized the Development of Specifications and Advertisement for bids to install fire access lanes at Pacific Avenue Elementary school, Rustic Lane Elementary School, Troth Street Elementary School, West Riverside Elementary School and Sunnyslope Elementary School. These fire lanes are required by the local fire department and are budgeted in the 1992/93 budget.

Bids were sent or picked up by nine (9) potential bidders. Three (3) companies submitted bids as follows:

Universal Asphalt Santa Fe Springs \$28,700

Robert J. Ball Construction Riverside \$40.500

Administration recommends the Board award Bid #93/11L for construction of Fire Access Lanes at Five (5) District Sites to Mission Paving and Sealing, Inc. of San Gabriel and that Purchase Order #75326 in the amount of \$27,490 be issued to cover this work.

#### Approve Resolution for Certificated Employee Medicare Coverage

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Collective Bargaining Agreement between the District and NEA-Jurupa requires the District to make medicare coverage available to unit members who are not presently covered.

The first step in the process of securing coverage is the adoption of a Board Resolution to be submitted to the Public Employees' Retirement System, which is the administering agency. The resolution must indicate the effective date of coverage, the District's intention to follow the required process of employee notification of a division election, and submission of all necessary documents. November 1, 1993, is the effective date designated by the Certificated Bargaining Unit for the division election. Management staff members of the State Teachers' Retirement System will also be eligible to vote in the division election.

Administration recommends the approval of Resolution No. 93/39 to Provide Medicare Coverage for Qualified Members of the State Teachers' Retirement System.

Janet May, community member, expressed appreciation to administration and the Board for supporting the establishment of a riding arena on District property adjacent to Pedley School at the corner of Felspar and 58th Streets, in conjunction with the Jurupa Area Recreation and Parks District. Mrs. May read a recap of events that led to the recommendation before the Board to approve the Ground Lease Agreement for Recreational Purposes at the site.

She also gave special thanks to Mrs. Burns, Dr. Wilson, Mr. Edmunds and Mr. Taylor of the school district, and Mr. Logan of the Parks District. If the proposed agreement is approved, a ribbon cutting ceremony will be scheduled.

COMMENTS FROM NEA-J PRESIDENT ON RESTRUCTURING AT VAN BUREN SCHOOL Fran Rice-Laabs, NEA-J president, read a letter addressed to certificated bargaining unit members on restructuring as it relates to year-round education at Van Buren School. It has been summarized as follows: On April 21, 1993, the NEA-J president and three members met with the site representative to discuss year-round education at Van Buren School. Specific information on restructuring and the year-round concept was requested by April 28. On May 5 the Executive Board will meet to discuss the issue. On May 12 the NEA-J Rep Council, which is a larger group, will meet on the YRE concept. Members of Van Buren staff were invited to the NEA-J office on May 19 to discuss concerns, ideas, etc. Mrs. Laabs further noted that alternative contract language would be developed by the Van Buren Staff. According to the Restructuring Article of the contract, alternatives must be reviewed by the Contract Administrative Committee, which consists of members from NEA-J and administration, prior to negotiations. Any agreement would be submitted to the Board and NEA-J membership for ratification.

Mrs. Laabs stated the letter also included the following concerns as expressed to the site representative at the April 21 meeting: 1) Does consensus exist for year-round education at Van Buren School? This will be discussed at the May 19 meeting. 2) Time constraints to make decisions on year-round come at a time when NEA-J is preparing an initial proposal on contract reopeners for the Board. 3) Unit members need information about the YRE program because contract changes require ratification by the Association. A cover letter from NEA-J should accompany Van Buren's letter to unit members. 4) Education Code provisions regarding the establishment and operation of a continuous year-round education program needs to be reviewed.

Mrs. Laabs stated this was new ground for everyone and the Association would not want to stand in the way of site-based decision making which ultimately may be good for children. However, the Association will take as much time as needed to make sure the implementation is done right and may not meet the July 1 timeline proposed for year-round implementation at Van Buren School.

## CITIZEN COMMENTS ON SEVERAL TOPICS

J. R. Hertz, PTSA president at Van Buren School, stated that he was looking forward to NEA-J's full cooperation on the implementation of the restructuring program. Year-round single track schedule is best for the children.

Mr. Hertz stated that he did not oppose the Felspar Riding Arena but had some concern about its location near a 55 mph speed zone. He also noted the district has a desperate need for money and should lease or sell the land at full market value rather than lease it to the Park District for the sum of one dollar per year.

Mr. Hertz referred to the agenda topic, Proposed Summer School Schedule, and said the district was leaning too heavily on high school courses as opposed to offering elementary subjects.

Mr. Hertz referred to the agenda topic, Authorize Air Conditioning of Classrooms, and asked if there was sufficient redevelopment revenue to complete all schools as noted in the annotation and a timeline for implementation.

## BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

Board member John Chavez stated that a major issue facing school districts is the School of Choice Initiative which has qualified for the June 1994 ballot. A statewide network will be formed to explain the affects of the initiative on public education. Mr. Knight referred to a document on Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 30A, School of Choice, and asked that it be distributed to Board members. The proposed legislation would have a tremendous impact on the public school system.

Mr. Chavez noted that a program under consideration would utilize parents as tutors. It seems if parents get involved, everything gets better for children.

Mr. Chavez complimented Shelley Guerrero, substituting for Rubidoux High School student representative, for a very informative report.

Board member David Barnes reported that proposed legislation to prevent the County from charging a school district to assess property taxes has passed committee.

In response to Mr. Barnes' question, the Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services confirmed that a proposal was pending to change the deadline for issuing certificated layoff notices from March 15 to June 15. Often deadlines do not have any logic when compared to budget requirements.

Mr. Barnes stated that he attended the celebration in honor of the district's bus drivers. Several employees were recognized for having more than twenty-five years of service with the district. He also commended Curtis Thomas, Director of Transportation, for his dedicated service.

Mr. Barnes congratulated Jennifer Strona from Jurupa Valley High School for earning the Sweepstakes Award in the senior division at the Inland Counties Science and Engineering Fair.

#### **HEARING SESSION**

## PUBLIC HEARING ON CSEA INITIAL PROPOSAL

The Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services stated that prior to initiating negotiations on CSEA's proposal, the law requires the Board to conduct a public hearing. President Knight opened and closed the public hearing on the proposal without comment.

APPROVE MINUTES

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE APRIL 19, 1993 REGULAR MEETING AS PRINTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE GROUND LEASE AGREEMENT FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES FOR RIDING ARENA -Motion #259 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that community member Mrs. Janet May has been working with the School District and Chuck Logan of the Park District to develop an agreement for the riding arena. The Park District has approved the agreement subject to approval by the School Board. A conceptual diagram of the riding arena on property adjacent to Pedley School was on display. The arena is approximately 120' x 250'. Two steel entrance gates will be installed with a tie-up rail adjacent to entrance gate. The Park District agrees to pay the school district a sum of one dollar per year with automatic renewal. Either party may terminate the agreement upon 120 days written notice to the other party. The Park District shall hold harmless and indemnify the district against any and all liability claims, and costs for injury or death of any person, loss or damage of property, maintenance of property, etc.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE GROUND LEASE AGREEMENT FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES, AS CONTAINED IN THE SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION. In response to Mr. Chavez' question, the Assistant Superintendent Business Services replied that if the district's property were damaged, the Park District would repair it. Mr. Chavez asked whether the agreement should include a provision regarding alcoholic beverages on school property. Mrs. Ruane noted the importance of the Park District maintaining the property and keeping it free from tumbleweeds, etc. In response to Mr. Hertz' earlier statement opposing the sum of one dollar a year, Mrs. Burns stated that she supported the leasing concept in the agreement. The arena was an investment for children and a safe place for wholesome activities. Mrs. May added that they would be working on slowing down traffic in the area. She was also developing a brochure on arena etiquette. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

REVIEW VAN BUREN PARENT SURVEY

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that at the last meeting several Board members expressed interest in more information on Van Buren parents' desire to enroll students in a year-round education program. She also referred to an Education Code provision which states the district must notify parents in the attendance area of its desire to implement the program. Additional information provided by Van Buren School on April 28, represented surveys from parents of 577 students in the attendance area: 474 students would enroll in year round; 36 students said no; 50 students were undecided because of the calendar and/or child care; 39 students would transfer to Stone Avenue because of boundary changes; 8 students would move. The Superintendent said about 86 students would not enroll in the year-round program next year. This should impact the school in two ways. The projected staff of 20 teachers for 1993/94 would be reduced by 3. Although there may be some bus problems, 86 students can be accommodated with one bus. The Superintendent noted that there were three more board meetings to work through the issues of implementing year-round at Van Buren School beginning in July 1993.

GRADES MATH PROGRAM -Motion #260

PARTICIPATE IN MIDDLE MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE PARTICIPATION IN THE MATHEMATICS RENAISSANCE PROGRAM FOR THE 1993/94 SCHOOL MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

**REVIEW ELEMENTARY &** MIDDLE SCIENCE TEXTS -Motion #261

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reported that the State has a seven-year cycle for adoption of new instructional materials. This year a committee representing each school in the district met on a monthly basis to determine the materials which support the concepts outlined in the new State Science Framework. These materials will be available for public review at the Glen Avon and Rubidoux libraries and the district's Instructional Media Center for the thirteen day period between board meetings.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE FOR REVIEW THE K-6 MACMILLAN SCIENCE PROGRAM AND GRADE 7-8 PRENTICE HALL SCIENCE PROGRAM. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE 1993 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM -Motion #262

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that a few years ago administration offered summer school on a limited basis to elementary students. The State provides funds for seven per cent of a school district's enrollment to receive summer school instruction. The district is mandated to provide classes for high school students and special education students. Because of remodeling Rubidoux High School, all K-12 special education classes will be held at Jurupa Valley High School. Only the special education students will be bused.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE 1993 SUMMER SCHOOL OFFERINGS AS PRESENTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

SUBMIT PROPOSAL FOR **HOMELESS EDUCATION** GRANT -Motion #263

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that Mr. Jim Taylor and Mrs. Jana Twombley have applied for \$10,000 through the McKinney Homeless Education Grant. The application for Jurupa proposes an after-school program at Ina Arbuckle and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools that includes counseling, supplies, nursing assistance, etc.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE SUBMITTAL OF AN APPLICATION FOR FUNDING OF A HOMELESS EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM FOR INA ARBUCKLE AND RUSTIC LANE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

**AUTHORIZE AIR** CONDITIONING CLASSROOMS -Motion #264

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE INSTALLATION OF AIR CONDITIONING UNITS IN THE ABOVE CLASSROOMS TO BE FUNDED FROM REDEVELOPMENT REVENUE. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE PURCHASE ORDER TO NATIONWIDE PAPER -Motion #265

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #75266, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$16,579.50, TO NATIONWIDE PAPER FOR 9500 REAMS OF 8-1/2" x 11" WHITE AND COLORED XEROGRAPHIC/DUPLICATING PAPER. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

UPDATE ON CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS The Superintendent reported that he spent three days (April 27-29) in Sacramento meeting with various legislators and state representatives for support to reinstate the Peralta project on the August 12, 1992 funding list for Phase III. Lyle Smoot of the State Allocation Board had received a message from Senator Leroy Greene in support of funding the project. At the April 28 meeting, the SAB Committee agreed to consider the project for funding on the May 12 agenda.

Mira Loma Middle School Addition #1 has been approved and funded.

Jurupa Valley High School Addition #2 was funded approximately \$4 million. Administration was waiting for the official Go to Bid letter.

Mission Bell and West Riverside Elementary School modernizations have low bids. After the state approves the contractors, the Board will be requested to award the bids.

All bids for Rubidoux High School modernization were over the limit. This project will have to be re-bid.

Plans for Van Buren modernization were at the Office of the State Architect for approval.

The Superintendent stated that Sandy Silberstein of Murdoch Walrath & Holmes has been invaluable in this process. Mr. Barnes reported that pending legislation reduces the cost of leasing portables from \$4,000 to \$2,000. The Superintendent added that the district has 77 State Emergency portables at a cost of \$4,000 each per year.

WHEREAS, Jurupa Unified School District, hereinafter designated as "Public Agency", desires to establish a "deemed" retirement system pursuant to Section 218(d)(6) of the Federal Social Security Act composed of positions of members, including members as defined in Section 22015 of the Government Code, of the State Teachers' Retirement System, hereinafter designated as "Present Retirement System", desiring "Medicare Only" coverage, and to include services performed by individuals employed by the "Public Agency" in positions covered by said "deemed" retirement system, as members of a coverage group established by Section 218(d)(4) of said Act, in the California State Social Security Agreement of March 9, 1951, providing for the coverage of public employees under the insurance system established by said Act as amended; and

WHEREAS, State and Federal law and regulations require, as a condition of such coverage, that Division be authorized by the Board of Administration, Public Employees' Retirement System; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the "Public Agency" now designate any services which it desires to exclude from coverage with respect to such coverage group under said insurance system; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the "Public Agency" to set forth the modification, if any, of the benefits and contributions under the Present Retirement System that may result from coverage under the said insurance system with respect to such coverage group;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Administration, Public Employees' Retirement System, be and hereby is requested to authorize the foregoing Division; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon receipt of authorization from the Board of Administration a Division shall be conducted in accordance with the requirements of Section 218(d) of the Social Security Act, and applicable State and Federal laws and regulations; that each member of the Present Retirement System at the time of the Division shall be furnished a form to permit the member to elect whether his services should be excluded from or included under the said California State Social Security Agreement as herein before provided; with such "Medicare Only" coverage effective as to services performed on and after November 1, 1993; and

Mr. Gary Hale, principal at Sunnyslope Elementary, welcomed everyone to his school.

# PROGRAM QUALITY REVIEW (PILOT) AT SUNNYSLOPE ELEMENTARY

Mr. Gary Hale and Mr. Gregg Nelsen, the principal and resource teacher at Sunnyslope Elementary, showed a video recently made by the State Department of Education as a pilot film for the new Program Quality Review process, "The New PQR a Powerful Tool for Reform." With the help of the staff and PQR consultant, student work was compared and analyzed to help form instructional strategies for a continuing program improvement process at the school site. The leadership team, including the consultant who validated their work, identified areas that needed strengthening and developed program goals. The school site staff felt it was an effective, positive and beneficial process that incorporated input from support staff, parents and administration.

#### YOUTH SERVICE CENTER SERVICES

Ms. Ginger Bevan, a representative from the Youth Service Center counseling staff, presented a video outlining the prevention, intervention, and treatment services offered through the Center's two primary programs: Outreach and Counseling. She distributed a "Year End Summary" for 1992-93 outlining the services their program provided to schools in our district along with an overview of their Outreach Program. She stressed that all their services were provided on a voluntary and confidential basis. One of our new district counselors currently working at Sunnyslope Elementary was introduced, Ms. Mandy McLeod-Weiser.

Some of the workshops conducted last year were on the following topics: peer relations, self-esteem, substance abuse, decision making, problem solving skills and conflict management.

# COMPENSATORY EDUCATION PROGRAM FUNDING ALLOCATION

The district receives State and Federal Compensatory Education funding for schools that are ranked according to State guidelines by the percentage of low-income students in their attendance area. Ms. Roberts reviewed with advisory members the State mandated guidelines used to rank schools based on free and reduced lunch percentages. The report indicated that the following schools qualify for these funds for the 1993-94 school year: Ina Arbuckle, Glen Avon, Granite Hill, Pacific Avenue, Rustic Lane, Troth Street, Van Buren and West Riverside.

The report also showed that Sunnyslope Elementary is being "grandfathered" for one additional year since their percentage of students receiving free and reduced priced lunches fell below the district average this year.

For the 1994-95 school year, the district will examine whether the current way we are ranking for compensatory education provides programs of sufficient size and scope to meet the needs of low-achieving students.

#### NEW STATE ASSESSMENT SYSTEM (CLAS)

Ms. Roberts gave an overview of the new CLAS assessment system. In the past, students in grades 3, 6 and 12 were tested using the CAP; and in 1991, the Govenor deleted CAP funds from the budget. In the fall of 1992, the Govenor authorized a new state assessment system (CLAS) to be administered in grades 4, 8 and 10 in Language Arts and Mathematics. In the future, History-Social Science and Science will be added along with Curriculum-Embedded Assessment, Portfolio Assessment, Career Technical Assessment, Golden State Exam and Physical Performance Testing.

A Sample Elementary Prompt in Reading/Language Arts and a Sample Open-Ended Problem for Mathematics were distributed to demonstrate examples of the new testing format to committee members. A state-selected scoring committee of teachers will be scoring the tests during the summer.

#### **HEARING SESSION**

The following questions were addressed: Is the test that different? Yes, the test has gone from a multiple choice type format to prompts that students read and answer questions. Will the students be prepared for this test? Yes, depending on the school site various preparation materials are being given as well as weekly staff meetings on how to administer and prepare their students to take the test. There will still be problems moving away from a multiple test to a open ended question format.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

The meeting was adjourned at 10:45 a.m. with a tour of the school site. The next meeting will be on May 12, 1993 at Troth Street Elementary from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that to have this number of winners in a two-county fair was exceptional and she congratulated them for their efforts.

RECOGNIZE RUBIDOUX HIGH AFJROTC

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that Rubidoux High School AFJROTC was having a wonderful experience under the leadership of Colonel Carroll and Sgt. Cohens. The swim team went to CIF. Paul Reader claimed the 1993 CIF 200 Freestyle championship. Paul Reader, Chad Wilburn, Brian Kendall and Jason Kearney were CIF All American winners. President Knight congratulated the students for an outstanding job of representing the community.

Mr. Barnes announced that the Jurupa Valley Jaguar varsity baseball team captured the Mountain View League Title and earned a position in the upcoming CIF playoffs. The Jaguars will enter the playoffs May 21 versus Palo Verde of Blythe at Jurupa Valley High School.

# PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Knight noted that Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

#### COMMENTS ON RESTRUCTURING INSERVICE

Pauline Knox, resource specialist, stated that she attended a very special inservice on restructuring that involved teachers, principals, and administrators. The discussions were very informative and provided an opportunity to share information. Comments from teachers of schools on the 45-15 track were very positive and enthusiastic. Ms. Knox expressed appreciation to the Jurupa staff for their support.

Mission Middle School was one of the schools being recognized for three years of partnership accomplishments. Mr. Chavez stated that the 7th Annual Celebrating Educators at Riverside Community College on May 19 was a very enjoyable event. The Jurupa District was represented by its nominations for the various categories: Don Vail, Principal of the Year, Jim Beckley of Mission Bell and Lois Clark of Mission Middle as Teachers of the Year; and Bernardine Brown, Support Person of the Year.

Board member Sandra Ruane congratulated Van Buren and Sunnyslope Elementary Schools for a job well done. Mrs. Ruane also announced that Board member Mary Burns attended a ceremony in Washington, D.C., honoring outstanding achievements for a safe environment. Mrs. Burns was inducted into the "Grass Roots Movement for Environmental Justice Honor Roll and Hall of Fame" this past weekend. Congratulations to Mrs. Burns for her many contributions.

Board member David Barnes commended the principals of Sunnyslope and Van Buren who received "distinguished schools" awards. He also stated the Safety Drill at Rubidoux High School was outstanding and was being scheduled at other high schools in the county. Mr. Barnes congratulated Jurupa staff members who participated in the Celebrating Educators.

Board member Mary Burns stated she was proud of Sunnyslope and Van Buren receiving "distinguished schools" awards. She also noted that the Cinco de Mayo celebration at Van Buren was a very pleasant event.

Mrs. Burns announced that she was invited to Washington, D.C. May 14-17 to participate in the recognition program honoring over 600 people who have contributed to the safety of the environment. TERMINATE CONTRACT WITH RJW ON STONE AVENUE SCHOOL -Motion #275 The Superintendent stated that as a result of discussion in Closed Session with the district's attorneys, administration would need a motion to terminate the contract with RJW Construction Company at the Stone Avenue Elementary School construction site.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE ADMINISTRATION TO TERMINATE THE CONTRACT WITH RJW CONSTRUCTION COMPANY AT THE STONE AVENUE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION SITE. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AWARD BID FOR FIRE ACCESS LANES -Motion #276 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated three companies submitted bids for construction of fire access lanes at five districts sites. The low bid was submitted by Mission Paving and Sealing, Inc. in the amount of \$27,490. These fire lanes were required by the local fire department and were budgeted in the 1992/93 budget.

MRS. RUANE MOVED THE BOARD AWARD BID #93/11L FOR CONSTRUCTION OF FIRE ACCESS LANES AT FIVE (5) DISTRICT SITES TO MISSION PAVING AND SEALING, INC. OF SAN GABRIEL AND THAT PURCHASE ORDER #75326 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$27,490 BE ISSUED TO COVER THIS WORK. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION. Mrs. Burns asked if other schools will need fire lanes and should administration be seeking a waiver from this requirement. The Superintendent explained that it emerges as portables are placed on a campus. There is a potential for placing a portable at Jurupa Valley High School for 1993/94. He also noted that several communications were on file with the local fire department and county. As the problem emerges again, administration will continue to negotiate for a change of this particular requirement. Mr. Barnes pointed out that fire trucks rush up hills through brush and yet cannot drive across school grounds. He would vote no on this motion. The Superintendent pointed out that failure to pass the motion would expose the district to substantial liability. Mrs. Ruane stated that she would vote yes on the motion but administration should study the issue further for the future as it was very costly to construct fire lanes. THE BOARD VOTED ON THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED 4 TO 1, MR. BARNES NAY.

ADOPT RESOLUTION FOR CERTIFICATED MEDICARE COVERAGE -Motion #277

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that one of the provisions of the collective bargaining agreement with NEA-J was to implement the process to make medicare coverage available to those individuals who elect it.
