*** a. Recognize the "Day of the Teacher" May 11, 1994**

Wednesday, May 11, 1994 the district will recognize and celebrate the annual Day of the Teacher. Each school site celebration will be unique. This year's theme, "You Touched and Enriched my Life" is noted in the letter in the supporting documents from Acting Superintendent of Public Instruction William Dawson.

1. Recognition

a. Announce Initial Board Proposal on Reopener Negotiations with CSEA Chapter #392

The Board will have reviewed in Closed Session a preliminary proposal for 1993/94 reopener negotiations with CSEA. If the Board is prepared, this proposal will be publicized at this time to permit public comments in the verbal hearing session at the regular Board meeting on May 16, 1994, after which the Board will adopt a response proposal to CSEA and begin negotiations.

c. Written Communications and Administrative Reports

*** Hear Information on Changes in the Administration of the CLAS Test (Mrs. Roberts)**

Friday morning, the district learned that Acting State Superintendent of Public Instruction William Dawson sent a message to local school districts notifying them that they may allow parents to request that their children be exempted from the CLAS testing program. This action was initiated in response to the California School Board's request and in light of judges' decisions in San Bernardino and Sacramento counties. The State Department of Education has reiterated its position that districts are mandated to administer the test. A letter to parents regarding their right to ask that their children be exempted is included in the supporting documents.

The California Learning Assessment System (CLAS) is part of the State's comprehensive effort to change the way in which students are tested. It requires that students provide written responses to questions about literature to assess their reading comprehension. It also requires that students write essays in response to "prompts" or questions related to this same piece of literature. The mathematics portion of the test continues to have some multiple choice questions; however, students are also asked to respond to several problem solving questions as well.

Students in grades 4, 8 and 10 take reading, writing, and math tests. Students in grades 5 and 8 are required to take science and social studies tests. There has been considerable media coverage of the new assessment system which is the State's effort to provide accountability to the Legislature regarding the performance of public school students. The intent is to determine what students know and are able to do by having them provide their own answers to questions rather than selecting from a list provided by the test developer as in the old multiple choice formats.

Many parents have objected to the tests because there is no provision for parent preview. In order for the results of any test to have validity in terms of determining how well students are achieving, there must be some security surrounding the actual questions on the test. Otherwise there would be "teaching to the test" and the results would be questionable. While it is not appropriate for this district to defend the State Department of Education's testing program, for they must do this themselves, it is appropriate to provide as much information as is available to the Board and public to dispel some of the misinformation that has been disseminated concerning the contents of these tests.

The Superintendent will make a brief presentation using sample questions from the CLAS and other information from the State Department of Education. The Board may wish to engage in discussion regarding their position on this matter.

3. Report of Student Representatives

The Board welcomes Jennifer Strona, Jurupa Valley High School Student Representative, and Christina Reyes, Rubidoux High School Student Representative. They may wish to address the Board regarding student achievements, interests, or other matters.

4. Public Verbal Comments

This communication opportunity is included on the agenda of each regular Board meeting so citizens can make suggestions or identify concerns about matters affecting the school district, or request an item on a future agenda. **California law states that there shall be no action on items not shown on the published Board agenda.**

The Board President will call on speakers who have completed cards requesting to be heard. Comments should be limited to five minutes. The Board may not have complete information available to answer questions and may refer specific concerns to the staff for appropriate attention.

B. Approve 1994 Mandated, Core Academic and Special Education Summer School Program (Mr. Taylor)

The State of California provides funds for 7% of a school district's enrollment to receive summer school instruction. We are mandated to provide classes at the high school level first. Eighth graders needing to pass core academic subjects in order to be promoted to the ninth grade, along with K-12 special education students, will be included. Because of the 7% cap, elementary summer school classes will not be offered.

Our plan is to operate core academic programs at both comprehensive high schools. Special education classes will be conducted on the Rubidoux High School campus.

Summer school offerings are limited to the following eight programs:

- 1. Secondary Proficiency Classes** - courses offered include: Secondary Reading Skills, Fundamentals of Writing and Math Essentials. These classes are offered to high school students who need to pass one or more proficiency examinations. (Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley)

3. **Individualized Program IPI** - This program is designed for graduating seniors and 8th graders needing to make-up credits for graduation or promotion.
4. **Special Education** - Special Education classes for K-12 students are offered to students requiring such instruction.
5. **Independent Study** - Students assigned to independent study who desire to complete courses in summer school may enroll in this program.
6. **Work Experience** - This program is provided for students to earn credit while working in the community. Students receive related instruction in career awareness and job survival skills.
7. **AVID Program** - This program assists incoming ninth graders by preparing them to be successful at the high school level.
8. **Nueva Vista** - This will be an independent study program for currently enrolled Nueva Vista students.

**** C. Affirm Submittal of School-Based Educational Technology Grants Application**

(Mr. Taylor)

Van Buren Elementary School requested permission to apply for a School Based Educational Technology Grant in the amount of \$15,850. The money will be used to purchase various technology educational aides; such as, laser disks, CD ROM and various programs that deal with establishing a drug free environment

A copy of the grant application is included in the supporting documents for Board members.

Administration recommends that the Board affirm administration's decision to allow Van Buren Elementary School to submit an application for this grant.

D. Award Bids #94/08L and #94/09L Construction for Peralta Elementary School

(Mr. Edmunds)

Bid #94/08L for the Construction of Peralta Elementary School and Bid #94/09L for Peralta Elementary School Site Work were advertised, per State Codes and OLA Regulations, on September 11 and 18, 1993. Separate bids for construction and site work were required since the cost of site work was projected to be more than ten percent (10%) of the estimated construction cost. The public opening was held on Wednesday, January 12, 1994. The bids included the requirement for all bidders to submit Minority/Women/Disabled Veterans Business Enterprise documentation.

After reviewing all submitted bids for both construction and site work, the lowest overall cost resulted in combining both bids into one project by one contractor, Chartered Construction Corporation, of Los Angeles.

Bid data and M/W/DVBE documentation was forwarded to OLA in Sacramento for review and acceptance. The State Allocation Board approved the bid as submitted at their public meeting on Wednesday, April 13, 1994. This project will be funded from Leroy Greene Lease-Purchase funds as approved by the State Allocation Board.

D. Award Bids #94/08L and #94/09L Construction for Peralta Elementary School (Cont'd)

The low bid was below the State Allocation for the project, thereby allowing award of the project without utilizing any of the deductive alternates.

Administration recommends the Board award Bids #94/08L and #94/09L for Construction and Site Work of Peralta Elementary School to Chartered Construction Corporation.

* **E. Adopt Resolution #94/31. Authorization to Encumber Funds for the 1994/95 Fiscal Year**
(Mr. Edmunds)

It is sometimes necessary to issue purchase orders for the new fiscal year before the year begins, so that necessary materials will be on hand when needed; for example: for summer school, for athletic equipment needed for early practice sessions, or for items which have a lead time of several months.

The County Office of Education requires the adoption of a resolution, which is included in the supporting documents, for districts that use the automatic purchase order program and wish to commit funds before the approval of the Budget for 1994/95.

Administration recommends the adoption of Resolution 94/31. Authorization to Encumber Funds for the 1994/95 fiscal year.

F. Review Concept of a Agriculture Area Security for Jurupa Valley High School

(Mrs. Roberts)

Board member Mary Burns has received a request from a citizen to have the Board consider the concept of providing housing for a person to serve as a resident watchman in Jurupa Valley High School agriculture area to minimize theft and vandalism. This arrangement would be similar to the one at Rubidoux High School.

Presently a family is renting a mobile home near the agriculture area at Rubidoux High School for \$400 a month which offsets the cost of the mobile home to the district. The staff at the high school report that a loss of animals and damage to property in the area of the farm has decreased significantly since this arrangement was made.

The principal at Jurupa Valley and the chairman of the Agriculture Department Mr. Gary Lesh are very much in favor of this concept. If the Board is interested in having the staff pursue offering this protection at Jurupa Valley High School, the Maintenance staff would need to determine the cost for hookup, plumbing and electrical, and the current cost to provide a mobile home for the site. Administration recommends the Board give direction regarding placing a mobile home on the Jurupa Valley High School campus to provide housing for a resident watchman.


Dear Parents:

For several years, the State Department of Education has administered basic skills tests to students in selected grades. This test was formerly called the California Assessment Program (CAP). Two years ago the State Department of Education, with legislative direction, developed a new testing program called the California Learning Assessment System (CLAS). The California Learning Assessment System is part of the State's comprehensive effort to change the way in which students are tested. It requires that students provide written responses to questions about literature to assess their reading comprehension. It also requires that students write essays in response to "prompts" or questions related to this same piece of literature. The mathematics portion of the test continues to have some multiple choice questions; however, students are also asked to respond to several problem solving questions as well.

Students in grades 4, 8 and 10 take reading, writing and math tests. Students in grades 5 and 8 are required to take science and social studies tests. There has been considerable media coverage of the new assessment system which is the State's effort to provide accountability to the legislature regarding the performance of public school students. The intent is to determine what students know and are able to do by having them provide their own answers to questions rather than selecting from a list provided by the test developer as in the old multiple choice formats.

In recent weeks, there has been considerable press coverage about the content of this assessment system. It is not the district's intent to defend the program; this is the responsibility of the State Department of Education. However, we had previously been notified that the Education Code mandates that all students in grades 4, 5, 8 and 10 be given this test and that the district was not allowed to exempt any student. TODAY the district was notified by the Acting Superintendent of Public Schools, Dr. William Dawson, that while districts are mandated to administer the test, we may allow parents to exempt their children from this program. If this is your choice, please notify the principal of your school in writing.

- ADDITION TO STUDENT DISCIPLINE MATTERS
-Motion #226
- President Knight stated that in Closed Session it was determined that special circumstances made it necessary to add one item to Student Discipline Matters.
- MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD ADD ONE DISCIPLINE CASE TO ITEM D, ACT ON STUDENT DISCIPLINE MATTERS. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.
- RECOGNIZE PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK
- The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that Public Schools Week in the State of California was scheduled April 18-22, 1994. The supporting documents include a list of various events to be held in the schools. Parents and members of the community were invited to visit the schools.
- DISTRICTWIDE DISASTER PREPAREDNESS DRILL
- The Assistant Superintendent Education Service also mentioned that the Districtwide Disaster Preparedness Drill will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 19. The District Office will serve as the command center and Board members were welcome to attend. Jana Twombly, responsible for disaster preparedness, has placed scenarios in sealed envelopes at several locations to be opened at 10:00 a.m. The Superintendent added that it was critical to have practice drills in light of the recent earthquake in the Los Angeles area, and important to check that systems were working properly at all sites.
- Mr. Chavez asked if the district's plan was coordinated with local businesses. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services replied that the district was coordinated with the Riverside County Office of Emergency Preparedness and the local fire departments but not with local businesses. In addition, the district has been in contact with the Red Cross regarding use of school facilities. Guidelines were available in the districtwide plan. The Assistant Superintendent said he did not know to what extent private business was aware of public agencies' plans in a natural disaster. It was suggested that this be explored with the Chamber of Commerce.

- The Assistant Superintendent Business Services announced that School Bus Driver's Recognition Day is April 26, 1994. He invited administrators and board members to the Transportation Department at 9:15 a.m. on April 26 to honor the district's bus drivers for their special contributions.
- CAST BALLOT CSBA DELEGATE ASSEMBLY
-Motion #227
- The Superintendent noted that the supporting documents included biographical sketches of the candidates for the 1994 CSBA Delegate Assembly Election. The Board may vote for up to three candidates in Subregion 18-A. All delegates will serve a two-year term.
- MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD NOMINATE YVETTE CHAVEZ EVERHART, ALVORD UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, AND INCUMBENT DAN FIGUEROA, PALO VERDE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. MRS.
