## b. Hear Report on New Programs at Ina Arbuckle Elementary School

(Mrs. Roberts)

Although the basic mission of the public schools remains unchanged, educating our children for productive, healthy lives as citizens in a democracy, changes in major economic, social and political institutions have resulted in changes in the way that many schools must operate. During the past two years, Ina Arbuckle principal, Diana Asseier, and her staff have continued to work on obtaining funding for a variety of programs to meet the educational, health and social service needs of the children and families in their attendance area. A recent addition to the campus is a Healthy Start Center staffed by personnel from the Department of Public Social Services. In addition, a new Head Start Center funded by a federal grant will double the size of the preschool program. This evening, Ms. Asseier will talk about how these and other programs serve the students at Ina Arbuckle.

# \* B. Adopt CSBA Policy Statement Regarding Proposition 187, the "Save Our State" (Mrs. Roberts)

At the September 6 Board meeting, Mr. Chavez requested that the California School Boards' Association (CSBA) policy statement regarding Proposition 187 be placed on this agenda for Board's consideration. Proposition 187, or the Save Our State (SOS) initiative, will appear on the November 8, 1994 ballot. On September 7, 1994, the California State Department of Education issued an "Analysis of Proposition 187." The analysis outlines the provisions of Proposition 187 and discusses the initiative's relationship to existing law, and describes the fiscal impact. This analysis is included in the supporting documents.

In developing a policy statement regarding 187, CSBA recognized that there are broader issues included in the SOS; however, they also contend that the provisions related to K-12 education and health services are in direct opposition to their organization's position. Therefore, at the December 1993 meeting of the CSBA Delegate Assembly, the following policy statement was adopted regarding the provision of public services to the children of undocumented immigrants:

"The California School Boards' Association believes that all children who reside in California have a right to a high quality public education. To the extent that health and social services affect children's ability to learn, we believe children should have access to critical services in these areas. Immigrant children and their descendants may be residing in this country for generations to come, and it is in the interest of all citizens to continue to ensure that they are productive and responsible members of our society. The enforcement of the immigration policy is a federal responsibility. Educators shall not be placed in the position of serving as agents of the Immigration and Naturalization Services."

It is recommended that the Board adopt the California School Boards' Association policy statement regarding Proposition 187.

## C. Award Bid #95/02L for Food Service Truck

The District currently has four warehouse delivery trucks. (Two trucks are assigned to the Food Service Department. The other two are used by the District Warehouse staff with the understanding that the third Food Service truck may be needed to deliver lunches in an emergency.)

Because of their age, these trucks require frequent maintenance and are often out of service. Two of these trucks are seventeen years old. One is twelve years old, and the newest we purchased in 1989. According to records kept by the Transportation Department, the cost to maintain our four warehouse vehicles has been increasing as the vehicles age. Since 1988 we have spent an average of about \$14,000 per year to maintain the vehicles. When one breaks down, significant delays and scheduling problems result.

The addition of new schools over the past few years has placed an added workload on the Food Service Stock Clerk/Deliver Drivers. Delivery schedules have become very tight, and we are sometimes not able to make all necessary deliveries of groceries and meals with only two trucks. Food Service has used their third truck many days this past year. Although we have added a part-time employee for the Food Service Warehouse, this person cannot help with deliveries without a truck.

Last year, \$200,000 was placed in a Food Service equipment reserve fund. This money is restricted, and may only be used to purchase equipment for the Food Service program.

Ann Hale, Director of Food Services, has requested some of these funds be used to purchase a new truck for the Food Service operation.

The District advertised in the Riverside Press Enterprise on July 15 and 22, 1994 for bids to supply one truck for the District Food Service Department. Bid packages were sent to four (4) potential suppliers. One (1) company submitted a bid as follows:

Dietrich International Truck Sales, Colton

\$50,293.39 (including tax)

The purchase of this truck will be paid from the Food Service Equipment Reserve Fund.

Administration recommends the Board award Bid #95/02L for the purchase of one Food Service truck to Dietrich International Truck Sales of Colton and authorize the issuance of Purchase Order #81455 in the amount of \$50.293.39.

In November of 1979, California voters adopted Proposition 4, commonly called the Gann amendment. This amendment was incorporated into the State Constitution as Article XIIIB. It requires all public agencies, including school districts, to compute an appropriations limit each year, based on a formula provided by the State. The District limit changes each year, depending on increases in pupil attendance and the Consumer Price Index.

On September 20, 1993, the Board approved the calculation of the 1993-94 appropriations limit based on estimated revenue and pupil attendance. At this time, the District is required to submit to the State a recalculation for 1993-94, based on actual figures, and a calculation for 1994-95, based on budget projections.

These appropriation limits, also known as the "Gann Limit," have to do with how much tax money the State may appropriate. They do not affect the amount of money the District may spend. The 1993-94 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District was recalculated and increased from \$50,381,879; to \$50,446,223; the 1994-95 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District is \$50,059,543. Calculations are as shown in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 95/04, Appropriations Limits for 1993-94 and 1994-95.

7. Resolution #95/05, Authorization to Destroy Records

(Mr. Edmunds)

Records which are no longer required by the District are listed in the supporting documents. These records have been retained for the minimum required period of time and include both Class 3 (disposable records) and Class 1 (permanent records) that have been microfilmed and are now ready for destruction. All records are eligible for disposal in accordance with Education Code criteria.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #95/05, Authorization to Destroy Records.

Principal, Carmen Hernandez, along with staff members Pauline Knox and Maureen Dalimot, are requesting permission to travel to Washington D. C. on Tuesday, October 4 through Saturday, October 8, 1994 to attend the National Blue Ribbon Award Ceremony. Van Buren School will be on intersession and substitutes will not be needed. The principal has indicated that Board members Mary Burns and Sandra Ruane will accompany them to Washington D.C. to receive this prestigious award. All expenses will be paid from Van Buren School's restructuring grant money.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the request from Carmen Hernandez. Pauline Knox and Maureen Dalimot to travel to Washington D.C. on October 4 through 8. 1994 to participate in the National Blue Ribbon Award Ceremony.

## \* 9. Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High School

(Mr. Taylor)

Mr. Pat Thompson, Larry Sturm and Ms. Cindy Evans, Teachers at Rubidoux High School, are requesting permission to travel to Washington D.C. on Saturday, May 27 through Saturday, June 3, 1995 with approximately forty-five (45) students. The purpose of the trip is to provide students with first-hand knowledge of American history and government. Supervision will be provided by staff members and parents. Costs for the transportation, meals and lodging will be paid through fundraisers. Administration has indicated that students will not be denied the opportunity to attend the activity due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip/Excursion Request for Approval form is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request by Mr. Pat Thompson, Teacher at Rubidoux High School, to travel to Washington D.C. on Saturday, May 27 through Saturday, June 3, 1995.

## \* 10. Out-Of-State Travel Request from Rubidoux High School

Mr. Larry Sturm, Teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting permission to travel to Lexington, Kentucky on Wednesday, November 2 through Saturday, November 5, 1994. #### G. Review Routine Information Reports

## 1. Adult Education Citizenship Classes

(Dr. Lenertz)

During the Board meeting on Tuesday, September 6, 1994, Mr. Chavez asked why our Adult Education Department currently does not offer citizenship classes. In response to this question, the Adult Education principal, Mr. Don Vail, offered the following information:

- a. At one time the demand for citizenship classes was high and those courses were offered.
- b. The "window" for unlimited applications for citizenship closed some time ago, and the demand for that course in our district decreased significantly.
- c. Currently, we receive about three requests per semester for the course. Those individuals are referred to Riverside Unified School District Adult Education, where the course is offered yearly.
- d. Because we have recently experienced a significant increase in the number of individuals enrolling in English-As-A-Second-Language (ESL) classes, we will be surveying those adult education students to determine if there is an interest in taking a citizenship class. If there is enough interest to support a citizenship class, our program will offer the class.
- e. Our district's adult education course in citizenship has already been approved by the state, and we have an appropriately credentialed teacher in place who could teach the course.

## MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING SEPTEMBER 6, 1994

#### **OPEN PUBLIC SESSION**

CALL TO ORDER

The Regular Meeting of the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education was called to order by President Sam Knight at 6:01 p.m. on Tuesday, September 6, 1994, in the Education Center Board Room, 3924 Riverview Drive, Riverside, California.

#### **CLOSED SESSION**

RECESS TO CLOSED SESSION -Motion #36 MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD RECESS TO CLOSED SESSION IN THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE FOR THE FOLLOWING PURPOSES: TO CONSIDER STUDENT DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS PURSUANT TO EDUCATION CODE SECTIONS 48900 AND 48915; PERSONNEL REPORT #4; AND TO DISCUSS ITS POSITIONS REGARDING ANY MATTER WITHIN THE SCOPE OF REPRESENTATION AND INSTRUCTING ITS DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVES FOR NEGOTIATIONS WITH EMPLOYEE GROUPS. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

At 6:02 p.m. the Board recessed to Closed Session in the Superintendent's office.

At 6:35 p.m. the Board adjourned from Closed Session.

**CALL TO ORDER** 

At 7:00 p.m. President Knight called the meeting to order in Public Session.

**ROLL CALL**

President Knight led the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of

America.

INSPIRATIONAL COMMENT

President Knight made an inspirational comment.

RECOGNIZE CANDIDATES FOR NOVEMBER 8 GOVERNING BOARD ELECTION President Knight introduced candidates for the Board of Education: (Trustee Area #1) David H. Barnes (Incumbent), present; Holly A. Hanke, not present; (Trustee Area #3) Mary L. Burns (Incumbent), present; Gerald Lee Hanshaw, present; Carlos A. Sepulveda, present.

The Superintendent stated that on August 23, 1994 she received the following letter from Delfina E. Franco, Chief Deputy Registrar of Voters, regarding the General Governing Board Member Election scheduled for November 8, 1994:

"There will be an election in your district because the number of qualified candidates exceeds the number of offices to be filled for Trustee Area 1 and 3. Please refer to the enclosed list on which names of the qualified candidates appear.

There will not be an election in Trustee Area 5 because Sam Knight, Sr. is the only candidate that filed nomination documents. Since the number of qualified candidates does not exceed the number of offices to be filled and a petition was not filed with the Registrar of Voters by August 17 requesting that the election be held, the candidate's name will not appear on the ballot. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5328, the qualified person nominated shall be seated at the organizational meeting of the Board. "

The Superintendent concluded by stating that Sam Knight's name, therefore, will not appear on the November ballot.

STATUS OF THE DISTRICT/OPENING OF TRADITIONAL SCHOOL YEAR

#### **OPENING DAY OF SCHOOL**

The Superintendent reported that once again, according to principals district-wide, Jurupa Unified School has experienced a smooth opening of the traditional school year. In terms of enrollment for the district, all looks well for meeting the projected enrollment. Enrollment figures for Tuesday, September 6, 1994 were 15,616 regular education students and 445 special education students, totaling 16,061, which is 661 less than the projection. Historically, the district has exceeded or met the projected enrollment figures by the sixth week of school. Most elementary schools are still below the level of projected enrollment. Comprehensive high schools are above their projected enrollment figures.

#### **PERSONNEL**

The Superintendent stated that the Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services is keeping an eye on enrollment and its effect on staffing. There are approximately 1,522 full-time and part-time employees, 726 of which are regular permanent certificated employees, and 796 of which are classified employees. Newly hired employees include two psychologists, two program specialists, 40 teachers and two language and hearing and speech specialists.

#### **BUDGET**

The Superintendent referred the Board to item "C" in the Agenda, the budget information prepared by the Assistant Superintendent of Business Services. This year the district will be working on a variety of ways to save money; an example is the goal to save \$100,000 by controlling thermostats.

STATUS OF THE DISTRICT/OPENING OF TRADITIONAL SCHOOL YEAR - (Cont'd) The savings generated primarily will be used to open Mira Loma Middle to reduce overcrowding at Jurupa and Mission Middle Schools. Currently, the district is renting two portables at Mission Middle School to house additional students.

#### **FACILITIES**

Rubidoux High School modernization will continue throughout this year and next summer, with a completion date scheduled prior to the start of the 95-96 school year. This past summer, work proceeded on the gym and library. The boys' and girls' locker rooms and the kitchen and cafeteria modernization is finished. Work will continue on the gym and library. The Van Buren modernization is moving along this year, as well.

The Peralta Elementary School ground breaking officially occurred and construction will begin this year. The School Bond issue has not been placed on the November ballot. However, the district will proceed with the applications for modernizations of Pacific Avenue and Mission Middle, and the modernization of another section of Rubidoux High School. The district will also complete applications for remaining sections of Pedley Elementary School and Troth Street Elementary School so that if bonds become available, we will be in line for funding.

#### **CURRICULUM**

This year, the district will adopt K-8 mathematics materials as part of the seven year cycle. The Superintendent also mentioned the need to consider a district testing system, since the state does not seem to be moving forward in this area.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN

Last spring, a Mission Statement was developed along with six goals for the district by a Strategic Planning Committee, which was comprised of community members, administrators and staff. Principals have been assigned responsibility for developing action plans to meet the following goals:

Goal #1: Jurupa schools will develop an environment that is physically and emotionally safe and that promotes positive character traits.

Goal #2: Jurupa schools will have parents and community actively participate in positive school and or learning experience.

Goal #3: Jurupa schools will help all students experience measurable success in any program.

Goal #4: Jurupa schools will increase the number of students eligible for college and other powerful post-secondary options.

Goal #5: Jurupa schools will increase the quality of interaction between teachers and students.

Goal #6: Jurupa students will learn, in their schools, to live and work in a culturally diverse society where staff is representative of the cultures in the community.

STATUS OF THE DISTRICT/OPENING OF TRADITIONAL SCHOOL YEAR - (Cont'd) The Superintendent commented on new legislation and/or policies.

#### **UNIFORMS**

Districts considering this option, will have to meet a series of hurdles. A district may adopt school-wide uniforms for the health and the safety of school environment. Principals, staff and parents of local schools must give a six month notice of the intended implementation of such a policy.

#### TABACCO-FREE DISTRICT

This summer, the Board passed the Tobacco-Free Policy, effective January 1, 1995. The district is now in the process of notifying staff to prepare them for implementation.

#### SCHOOL OF CHOICE

The Superintendent reported that 812 Intra-District Transfers have been granted to date. 136 Intra-District transfer requests are pending. The new law regarding Inter-District transfers will become effective in 1995-96.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Mr. Barnes questioned the information regarding transfers, as to how the total of 812 Intra-District transfer requests compared with the number of Intra-District transfer requests for the previous year. The Superintendent responded that the numbers are about the same. Some transfer requests are pending and a determination of available space will be made within the month.

MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION. Mr. Chavez questioned the amount of money spent on the 6th grade end-of-the year party. The Assistant Superintendent of Business Services reported that Sky Country Elementary plans a trip to Oasis Water Park each year and pays for all expenses, including transportation and food. There is also a dance; Sky Country goes all out and pays for the entire event. Mr. Chavez offered thanks to each person that donated. A VOTE WAS THEN TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

**SCHEDULED AT** SCHOOL SITES

FIVE BOARD MEETINGS The Superintendent reported that five schools have been chosen as sites for the regular board meetings during the 1994-95 school year: Ina Arbuckle, Monday, September 19, 1994; Van Buren Elementary (at the Mira Loma Middle School site), November 21, 1994; Glen Avon Elementary, Tuesday, January 17, 1995; Pedley Elementary, Monday, April 17, 1995, and Jurupa Valley High, Monday, June 5, 1995.

INTRODUCTION/ **REPORT OF NEW 94/95** STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES

President Knight reported that there are two new student representatives for the 1994-95 school year. The Superintendent formally introduced the student representatives as Julie Warne, Jurupa Valley High School, and Ronda Robinson, Rubidoux High School.

Julie Warne is currently enrolled in college prepatory classes and is actively involved in the agriculture/FFA program. She is also a member of the Jurupa Valley High School softball team.

Rhonda Robinson is a senior and has attended Jurupa schools since kindergarten. She has served as ASB Chief Justice and on various committees; she has been a Rubidoux High School cheerleader for the past four years and enjoys skiing and dance where she participates in tap, jazz and ballet. Ronda plans on attending the University of Colorado or UC San Diego to major in communications.

President Knight indicated that the Board welcomed their comments at this time.

## JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL

Julie Warne stated that the yearbooks presented to each Board member and to the Superintendent are from the Predator Staff; and the T-Shirts are from Mr. Brockman, head of the Cheer Leading Squad. Mr. Martinez, Assistant Principal, and Mr. Young, Principal, wanted Board members and the Superintendent to have passes to see the Jurupa Valley High School teams in action. Also presented to the Board were football game schedules and passes.

Jurupa Valley High School will have their first football game of the season this Friday at 7:30 p.m. at Rubidoux High School vs. Ramona. ASB will be promoting the game Friday at lunch. Also on Friday, the water polo season begins against Ramona at 3:15 p.m. at the Jurupa Valley High School pool. The Jurupa Valley FFA had eight members receive American FFA degrees which is the highest degree a FFA member can receive and is difficult to obtain.

ASB is busy working on the Back-to-School Pep Rally, which is one week from Friday; from there, work will begin on Homecoming. Class Councils are busy working on their floats for Homecoming.

## RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL

Ronda Robinson stated that the ROTC exhibition team competed at the National Drill Team championship in Las Vegas. They came back as the Air Force ROTC National unarmed drill team champions and the National Champion ROTC unit.

During August, the yearbook staff attended a camp which prepared them for the production of this year's book. Lisa Lacriola, Editor in Chief, and Tasha Burke, copy editor, were honored by being accepted on the All Star Team. Mario Gallegos, photographer, was awarded the "Most Improved Photographer."

INTRODUCTION/
REPORT OF NEW 94/95
STUDENT
REPRESENTATIVES

Two members of the Associated Student Body attended the 58th Annual National Association Student Council this summer in St. Louis, Missouri. They, along with students from all fifty states, attended workshops and listened to guest speakers about leadership. The 94-95 Pep Squad members attended the Universal Spirit Association Cheerleading Camp this summer at UC San Diego. Many spirit awards were distributed among the squads, Varsity Cheer-Most Improved Squad, Varsity Songleaders-Most Spirited Squad, Junior Varsity-Award of Excellence, Freshman Cheer-Outstanding Performance, Mascots-Superior Award. All four squads and mascots came home with ribbons, plaques, and spirit sticks. The camp gave the pep squad new ideas and material for games and pop events.

This year at Rubidoux High School, there is alot of reconstruction in process. The gym and classrooms are being remodeled, students have been relocated to portables, and space is limited throughout the campus for safety. Taking all of this into account, Ronda Robinson reported, in her own opinion, beyond the dirt and dust, students have managed very well in staying out of the way and repositioning themselves in substitute classrooms.

During the week of September 6, the ASB will put on orientations for each class. The assemblies include speeches given by the principal, ASB and class presidents, yearbook editor and pep chairperson. Along with a crowd involvement, cheer and a game, the students learned about the upcoming events and important information for the entire year. Today, the Class of '95 Assembly was held. Even though the temperature was hot, and students had to meet on the field due to reconstruction of the gym, all went extremely well.

The SAT test will be given at Rubidoux during October and June. Last year Rubidoux hosted 300 students, and this year, hopefully more.

In conclusion, Ronda reminded the Board that the first Falcon Football game is this Friday, at San Gorgonio High School.

President Knight offered his thanks to the student representatives.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Knight noted that Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

BUDGET AND PAY RAISES

Ms. Sandy Mason, "expressed her disappointment and disillusionment with top administrators that is felt by both classified and certified employees with the wage freeze." "Administrator's should have the best interest of students in mind; however, it is now apparent that their main concern is themselves and their salary increases." Board members are paid \$80.00 to \$100 per meeting. By the many actions of the Board and administration, it is being heard loud and clear. Ms. Mason stated that she would like to think that they care; however, if they did care the needs of students, certificated and classified staff would be met first.

SUMMER SCHOOL

Mr. J. R. Hertz addressed the Board regarding his concern that the district is misguided in their policy of only including high school students in the summer school program to ensure that they graduate. He asked that middle and elementary school students be included, as well. Mr. Hertz feels that K-8 students "fall through the cracks." He would like to bring the idea of including K-8 students for the upcoming summer session to mind now, at the beginning of the school year, when the Board will have plenty of time to plan for the future. He asked that the Board invest money for students to attend summer school in their early years to make sure that younger children are able to read, write and are capable in math, rather than wait until students are 15, 16 or 17 and then try to help them.

#### SAVE OUR STATE AND POSITION PAPER

Mr. Butch Guzman, President of Mexican-American Political Association (MAPA), stated that the Jurupa MAPA Chapter would like to know the position of the district on Proposition 187, the Save Our State (SOS) initiative. The California School Boards' Association opposes Proposition 187.

Secondly, Mr. Guzman referred to a letter dated March 3, 1994, addressing areas of concern on The Position Paper handed to the Superintendent. Members of the community would like to meet with the board regarding issues where goals have not been reached. Mr. Guzman submitted a file containing packets for each Board member regarding Proposition 187 and The Position Paper.

#### DISCIPLINARY **GUIDELINES**

Mrs. Angie Armenta stated, "that in this district she was compelled to bring forward the district's disciplinary guidelines so that what happened to her daughter on the second day of school, would not happen to other students." "When sites send home to parents district guidelines, school personnel should abide by them." Mrs. Armenta felt that school administrators violate these guidelines, change rules, pass judgment on students, and have double standards. This is dishonest and disrespectful to families and to honest, responsible students.

## **BOARD MEMBER**

Mrs. Burns expressed her thanks for the T-Shirts and the lovely yearbooks from REPORTS & COMMENTS Jurupa Valley High School. She welcomed the two competent student ambassadors from Jurupa Valley High and Rubidoux High, and said that she looks forward to a good year.

> Mr. Barnes offered his congratulations to Rubidoux High School for winning the national championships in Las Vegas by their 1994 Junior ROTC. Jurupa Valley High School Water Polo Team is ranked third in the CIF Division. Rubidoux High School is ranked 6th in their Cross Country boys and girls teams in their Division. Another honor, Rubidoux High School football pre-season rankings in the CIF Division 4 place them in the #10 spot in football in Southern California; Barnes commended the Jurupa Valley High School Cheer Leading team; the yearbook staff at Jurupa Valley High School, and student team efforts throughout the district for accomplishing so much with school only being in session for three days.

> Mrs. Ruane offered her welcome to Julie Warne and Ronda Robinson, and thanked Jurupa Valley High School for the T-Shirt and beautiful yearbook. She stated that she had never seen a yearbook quite like this one.

> Mr. Chavez stated that he hopes the two new student representatives really enjoy meeting with the Board. Mr. Chavez thanked Jurupa Valley High School representative, Julie Warne, and Mr. Martinez for the T-Shirt and yearbook. Mr. Chavez was also very impressed with the function held at Indian Hills Elementary for the 40 new teachers hired by the district. He stated, "we are glad that Jurupa Unified School District is their district of choice, and it is great to be a part of such a fine district."

> Mr. Chavez referred to the Peralta ground breaking ceremony, held on August 24, 1994, and stated he has been happy to be involved in the building projects over the many years that he has been a member of the Board. Our district has been able to to be successful, he believes, due to precedent, set by former employees and hard working people, such as Bill Anderson.

> Mr. Chavez commented on the Press Enterprise article regarding Jurupa SAT scores. Mr. Chavez was contacted by individuals asking him where were the Jurupa SAT scores.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS (Cont'd) Mr. Chavez requested that the California School Boards' Association's (CSBA) policy statement regarding Proposition 187 be placed on the September 19, 1994 Board Agenda for consideration.

Mr. Chavez commented that work at the CSBA Delegate Assembly, of which Mr. Chavez had made a previous report at the August 1, 1994 Board meeting, regarding the Save our State initiative, coincided with the statement made during comments from the public, by Mr. Butch Guzman. Mr. Chavez went on to say that the district must continue in their efforts to set strict guidelines to make schools a safe place for students and employees. The Superintendent voiced her agreement that as a district we are moving toward doing more regarding the campus safety issue.

President Knight thanked the two student representatives for the T-Shirts and the fantastic job done on the yearbook. He stated that the yearbook is a fabulous piece of work by the Journalism staff. He thanked the Assistant Superintendent of Personnel Services for all of the efforts that went into hiring the forty new teachers. He commented that the Jurupa Unified School District's Mission Statement and six goals adopted by this Board, will help the staff, community and parents, to look out for students' welfare and the enhancement of our youths' education. He concluded by stating, "as a district, we will continue to work positively, within the district's budget, to make a better community and a better school district."

#### **ACTION SESSION**

APPROVE MINUTES
-Motion #38

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF AUGUST 1, 1994 AS PRINTED. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

READOPT REGULATION 3510, APPROVED BUS STOP SAFETY EXCEPTIONS -Motion #39 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that there have been no changes to the current safety exceptions in Regulation #3510, included in the supporting documents. Students qualify for transportation when they live more than one mile from school and students attending grades 9-12 qualify when they live more than two miles from school. Board action is necessary to implement the existing safety exceptions for the 1994-95 school year.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD READOPT REGULATION 3510 AT SINGLE READING IN ORDER TO MAINTAIN THE EXISTING BUS STOP SAFETY EXCEPTIONS FOR THE 1994-95 SCHOOL YEAR. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION. Mrs. Burns stated that the railroad tracks listed in the safety exception for Jurupa Valley on Urbana Avenue and Iberia Avenue have now been removed; however, she still believes that the safety condition exists and should remain on the safety concern list. Mr. Chavez asked if the district foresees any more additions that will need to be added and brought up the crossing guard issue. The Superintendent stated that the district pays for 1/2 of the crossing guard fees and that all crossing guards are in the same locations as last year. Next year the district will pay the full amount. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that there are no further additions to the safety exceptions. THE BOARD THEN VOTED, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE ACTUAL REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES FOR 1993-94 -Motion #40 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that the budget development process requires that figures be presented to the board at the second board meeting in June. As the school year comes to a close, and throughout the summer, final expenditures and revenues are determined. The numbers are refined; however, usually the estimates are close. Adjustments are made with the actual revenues and expenditures that change the ending balance. Those figures are then carried over as the starting balance for the 1994-95 budget. The difference between the estimated and actual in revenue is \$544,788.82. This is due in a large part to the Lottery, categorical funds, Interagency funds for the construction of the Learning Center at Rubidoux High School, and a decrease in interest.

Expenditures plus other sources of income leave a balance of \$348,476.63. The Agenda listed the major reason for the adjustments. The Ending Balance is \$196,000 of which \$128,000 is unrestricted, and \$67,000 is restricted, with supporting documents of 112 pages, which outlines these figures in great detail. Mr. Edmunds, therefore, recommended that the Board approve the certification of J-201 report.

Mr. Barnes questioned the lottery income of \$89. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that the district ended up receiving \$97 per pupil.

Mr. Chavez stated that he would first like to thank the Assistant Superintendent Business Services for the assistance and clarification he had received to understand how the district arrived at the ending balance.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE CERTIFICATION OF THE ACTUAL REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES AND THAT THE J-201 REPORTS, INCLUDED IN THE SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS, BE FILED WITH THE COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE REVISIONS TO THE 1994-95 BUDGET -Motion #41 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that the district is required, according to Education Code, to make revisions in the budget of revenue and expenditures available for public review after the State signs the Annual Budget Act. The reasons for these revisions are listed in the Agenda in the areas of Salary Adjustment, which were primarily due to substitute drivers and overtime in the transportation department; Carryover Adjustments were due to instructional supplies from a subsequent year; the biggest item, the Special Education chargeback increase, was \$73,000 more than was previously budgeted. The district received word on the chargeback after the budget was adopted. The expenditure adjustments resulted in \$188,000 added into the beginning balance information. The Beginning Balance for 1994-95, which includes the 1993-94 unaudited actuals is \$196,000. With the adjustment of the \$35,000 reduction in the Stores Account, the Unrestricted Reserve balance will be \$78,000 more than the required 3%.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE REVISIONS TO THE 1994-95 BUDGET AS LISTED. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE AGREEMENT FOR RESOURCE OFFICERS -Motion #42

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that the district has received an agreement from the County of Riverside for School Resource Officers for Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley High Schools. The district is responsible for the full cost of the Resource Officers, which is not to exceed \$124,000. The Superintendent commented that the Resource Officers working at the high schools also make visits to the middle schools, as well as the elementary schools, if any problems occur. School Resource Officers are available to serve all schools in the district.

Mr. Chavez and Mr. Barnes commented that with elections coming up, it would be a good time to remember that the County is not funding School Resource Officers and School Crossing Guards; both are very necessary services in the community.

Mr. Barnes then indicated the concern for the pressure point in the community in the downtown Rubidoux area by Mission Boulevard on weekends, as high school football begins. The Superintendent stated that the directive will be given not to turn right toward this area, but to use the Valley Way entrance and exit from the freeway instead of the Rubidoux exit.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE AGREEMENT NUMBER 95-8-C BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE AND THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. MRS. RUANE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT AT SINGLE READING REG. 6002 1994-95 DAILY SCHOOL SCHEDULE -Motion #43 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services referred to the supporting documents for the 1994-95 Daily School Schedule for preschool through 12th grade.

MRS. RUANE MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT AT SINGLE READING OF REGULATION 6002, 1994/95 DAILY SCHOOL SCHEDULE. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE AGREEMENT WITH JURUPA YMCA FOR CHILD CARE SERVICES -Motion #44 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reported that the Jurupa YMCA is requesting to conduct before and after school child care at Camino Real, Glen Avon, Indian Hills and Van Buren Elementary schools for the 1994/95 school year. For the past nine years, the Jurupa YMCA has provided after school child care services to working parents in the Jurupa community at a reasonable rate. The YMCA assumes responsibility for proper licensing, insurance and all liability for the children and the school property, as stated in the contractual agreement.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE REQUEST BY THE JURUPA YMCA TO OPERATE A BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL CHILD CARE PROGRAM AT CAMINO REAL, GLEN AVON, INDIAN HILLS AND VAN BUREN ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS DURING THE 1994/95 SCHOOL YEAR, UPON RECEIPT OF A CURRENT CHILD CARE LICENSE BY THE DISTRICT. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE ADULT ED PROGRAM FOR 1994/95 -Motion #45 The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects submitted the Adult Education schedule of offerings for the 1994/95 school year recommended by Don Vail, Principal. The most growth has appeared in the English as a Second Language course offering.

Mr. Chavez questioned why the district does not offer citizenship classes. The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects stated that she would look into this matter and report back to the Board with the information.

MRS. RUANE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE 1994/95 ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM OFFERINGS. MR. BARNES SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

## STATUS OF DISTRICT'S RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services reported that the district has had a Recycling Program since 1991. Items recycled in high volume are paper, corrugated cardboard, tin cans, styrofoam lunch trays and aluminum cans. Recycling is handled by the school sites. Materials are recycled primarily by district employees in their normal course of duties. Cardboard is packed up by grounds crews and brought back to the maintenance yard. Styrofoam lunch trays are picked up in the afternoon by Food Services. The district pays an additional amount to recycle the styrofoam lunch trays. However, the effectiveness of the recycling program is the reduction in the number of district-wide trash collection bills. Trash materials are very bulky to store in trash bins. Recycling eliminates the number of trash bins required and the number of scheduled pickups to dispose of these materials. Recycling has saved the district approximately \$30,000 per year, which has made this a successful program.

This contractor met all bid requirements.

Mr. Barnes questioned which district staff member determines whether a bid meets district requirements. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services responded that the Senior Building Inspector thoroughly checks out each bid according to the Business and Professions Code.

MR. BARNES MOVED THE BOARD AWARD BID #95/04L, TO SUPPLY AND INSTALL PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT AND MATTING AT THE INA ARBUCKLE HEAD START PORTABLE, TO ED ZASUETA CONTRACTING, OF SPRING VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #81559 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$27,788.00 TO COVER THE WORK. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

# Analysis of Proposition 187 (Unauthorized Immigrants and Public Services)

## California Department of Education

Proposition 187 would add and revise a number of California statutes in order to exclude undocumented or unauthorized immigrants¹ from receiving most public services, including education, health care, and welfare. The initiative would also require or encourage various state and local government officials to identify and report persons suspected of being unauthorized immigrants to the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). Unlike some initiatives, Proposition 187 makes changes only to statutory law and would not amend the California Constitution. Proposition 187 is also known as the "Save Our State: SOS Initiative" or the "Nelson-Ezell Undocumented Immigration Initiative."

The specific provisions of the initiative would amend California codes to:

- Make the manufacture, distribution or sale of false immigration documents a felony punishable by five years in prison or a \$75,000 fine. [SEC. 2]
- . Make use of false immigration documents a felony punishable by five years in prison or a \$25,000 fine. [SEC. 3]
- Require that all law enforcement agencies in California fully cooperate with the INS, verify the immigration status of persons who are arrested, and report suspected unauthorized immigrants to the INS and the State Attorney General. [SEC. 4]
- Require verification of legal immigration status before receiving public social services (welfare etc.), and require reporting of suspected unauthorized immigrants.

  [SEC. 5]
- Exclude unauthorized immigrants from eligibility for publicly funded health care (except federally required emergency care) and require reporting of suspected unauthorized immigrants. [SEC. 6]
- . Prohibit the public elementary and secondary school attendance of children who are not citizens or legally resident aliens. [SEC. 7]
- Require that school districts verify the immigration status of each child enrolling in school for the first time commencing January 1, 1995, and verify the status of all enrolled children and their parents by January 1, 1996. [SEC. 7.]

- Require that school districts notify the State Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), California Attorney General, and the INS of any student, parent or guardian who has been determined to be or is "reasonably suspected" to be in violation of federal immigration laws. School districts are required to provide this notice within 45 days of "becoming aware of an apparent violation" and suspected pupils are allowed to continue to attend school for no more than 90 days following the notification. [SEC. 7]
- prohibit the attendance of unauthorized immigrants in public post-secondary educational institutions (including the University of California, California State University, California Community Colleges, and California Maritime Academy). Also requires that post-secondary institutions verify the legal status of all students commencing with the first semester or term that begins after January 1, 1995. [SEC. 8]
- Require that post-secondary institutions notify the SPI, Attorney General of California and the INS of any student who has been determined to be or is "reasonably suspected" to be in violation of federal immigration laws. Notice is required to be provided within 45 days. [SEC. 8]
- Require the California Attorney General to notify the INS of suspected unauthorized immigrants who are reported to the Attorney General. Also requires the Attorney General to maintain records of all such reports. [SEC. 9]

## Proposition 187 and K-12 Schools

This analysis examines the potential impact of Proposition 187 on public elementary and secondary schools ("K-12 education"). Consequently, this analysis does not explore the effects of the initiative on other public services such as health or higher education.

## · Conflict with existing law

If enacted, the initiative's provisions would almost certainly be challenged as violating various parts of the state and federal constitutions. In 1982, the United States Supreme Court ruled, in <u>Plyler v. Doe</u>, that unauthorized immigrant children are entitled to "equal protection of the laws" and are thus not to be excluded from public schools. The California Constitution also guarantees equal protection of the laws, and additionally

provides for free public education and privacy, which might be the basis for further challenge. Proposition 187 proponents acknowledge <u>Plyler v. Doe</u> and declare that part of their purpose is to cause a reconsideration of that decision. The proponents further argue that Proposition 187 has been written so that it might survive challenge, either due to differences from the <u>Plyler</u> circumstances and law, or by causing <u>Plyler</u> to be overturned.

The Legislative Analyst and the Senate Office of Research, their analyses of this initiative, have expressed strong doubt that the Constitutional impediments to its K-12 education provisions could be overcome. These analysts also point out that various federal statutes might conflict with the initiative. state statute, the initiative's provisions would be subordinate to state and federal constitutions. Also, in the event of conflict with federal grant laws, those laws would control the The Legislative Analyst points out that the receipt of funds. federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) "generally prohibits schools that receive federal funds from disclosing information in student records without Since all public schools in California receive some federal funding, the parts of the initiative that require reporting family information to the INS and state officials could, if implemented, jeopardize continued receipt of federal funding.

## · Exception to policy of universal public education

Proposition 187 seems to reflect an assumption that education and other state-provided social and health services are of value primarily, and perhaps exclusively, to the persons who receive Viewed this way, Proposition 187 would save tax the services. resources and have no deleterious effect on society at large. fact and policy, however, the benefits of many governmental services are not exclusive to the recipient. It can be readily understood that public health services, which may assist the individual, are also of great value in preventing the spread of disease in the community at large. So too with education. While the education of individuals undeniably improves their employment prospects, public education is also aimed at "a general diffusion of knowledge" which benefits the whole community in various ways. In delivering the opinion of the Court in Plyler v. Doe, Justice Brennan writes: "By denying these children a basic education, we deny them the ability to live within the structure of our civic institutions, and foreclose any realistic possibility that they will contribute in even the smallest way to the progress of our Nation."



Through public education we prepare the people in our society to participate in our democratic processes and be economically Deliberately excluding a significant number of students from education will not only damage their individual prospects, but deprive society of a fully prepared population. In the Plyler opinion, Justice Brennan speaks of creating "... a permanent caste of undocumented resident aliens, encouraged by some to remain here as a source of cheap labor, but nevertheless denied the benefits that our society makes available to citizens The existence of such an underclass and lawful residents. presents most difficult problems for a Nation that prides itself adherence to principles of equality under law." proponents of Proposition 187 would undoubtedly argue that these persons will not be allowed to remain in the United States long enough to create an "underclass", but the history of immigration suggests that once persons have come to this country, legally or otherwise, they are likely to remain whether or not they receive services.

#### Fiscal Impact

Assuming that Proposition 187 is enacted and allowed to take effect, several aspects of the initiative would have fiscal consequences for school districts. First, if students are excluded from school attendance, schools would not receive financial support that would have been associated with the excluded enrollment. In addition to the loss of income, school districts would incur substantial new costs related to the investigation of immigration status of students and their parents. Finally, there would be costs associated with excluding already enrolled students and transferring these students to schools in the students' "country of origin."

#### Revenue Loss

To estimate the fiscal impact of excluding unauthorized immigrant children from California schools, it is necessary to estimate the number of such students who are already enrolled. No actual count of unauthorized immigrant students currently exists and, since it is currently illegal for school districts to inquire into the immigration status of students, no actual count can be compiled. Using statistics on known legal immigrants and the growth of language minority populations, we estimate that between 300,000 and 410,000 unauthorized immigrant students currently attend K-12 schools in California.

The state and local general purpose revenue that is allocated to school districts on the basis of students being in average daily attendance is known as "revenue limit" funding. Using an average



revenue limit of \$3,200 per pupil in average daily attendance, we can estimate that excluding 300,000 to 410,000 students from our public schools would reduce general purpose funding allocated to schools by an amount between \$960 million to \$1,312,000,000. This loss of revenue would probably be offset by a similar reduction in costs, although some districts would undoubtedly have difficulty matching rapid enrollment losses with opportunities for savings. So-called "basic aid" districts, where state aid is already at constitutionally minimal levels, would be able to keep the property tax savings, but less than ten percent of California school districts enjoy "basic aid" status.

The statewide impact of excluding students may be even greater than the sum of revenue limit losses to school districts, affecting program services for students who remain in public schools and community colleges. The amount of funding guaranteed to K-12 schools and community colleges under the California Constitution (as amended by Propositions 98 and 111) is approximately \$4,500<sup>2</sup> per K-12 pupil. The guarantee is not automatically reduced by this \$4,500 each time a student is excluded, but to the extent that the loss offsets increasing enrollments in other schools, the guarantee is also not increased to accommodate the new students. The potential impact on the statewide funding guarantee would be between \$1.35 billion and \$1.845 billion. 3 Subtracting the revenue limit loss to school districts (calculated above) suggests that public schools and community colleges would lose entitlement to between \$445 million and \$533 million more funding4 than would be lost to school districts by normal loss of revenue limit funding. This potential loss might be avoided if the State appropriated more school funding than absolutely required under the guarantee, but to date, the minimum has usually been treated as the maximum. The more likely result is that schools will receive nothing beyond revenue limit funding (ie. \$3,200 per student) for 300,000 to 410,000 new students who enroll after excluding unauthorized immigrant students. The additional funding would normally be allocated as general aid to community colleges and as categorical aid to K-12 schools to address the high costs of students with special needs. In sum, the loss of revenue associated with the exclusion of unauthorized immigrant students would not be completely offset by reduced costs.

Another potential revenue loss that should be considered relative to Proposition 187 is the federal funding that might be withheld if California school districts are forced to violate the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Since California elementary and secondary schools currently receive approximately \$2.3 billion in federal funding, this sum may be considered in jeopardy. The exact amount of federal funding that would be



withheld cannot be determined with precision since grant amounts vary from year to year and some aid, such as nutrition funding administered by the federal Department of Agriculture, might not be subject to sanction under the FERPA. Still, all federal education aid for a given program would be threatened, not just the aid related to excluded students.

#### New Costs

Substantial new costs would be imposed on school districts if they are required to verify and report the immigration status of students and their parents in accordance with the initiative. Such costs would be automatically reimbursable if they were imposed by mandate of the Legislature or an executive agency. However, mandates imposed by initiative are not required to be reimbursed and costs would have to be absorbed by school districts if they are not otherwise paid by the State. Several school districts have estimated the costs of verification of student and parent immigration status. One district estimated the cost of reporting suspect individuals to the INS and State officials and two districts estimated the costs of hearings that would be needed as part of the process to exclude suspect individuals from school. These estimates range as follows:

District A also estimates that 6% of the records checked will reveal inadequate documentation and thus result in referral to the INS and exclusion of students.

There are approximately 5.2 million students in California schools. The initiative requires that all of these students,

along with their parents, would have to be verified as legal residents of the United States or reported to the INS if verification could not be accomplished. The initial verification would have to be completed by January 1, 1996. After January 1, 1996, verification of legal residency status would have to be made each time a student enrolled in a new school. We estimate that 15% to 18% of students (780,000 to 936,000) enroll in public schools that are new to them every year. This estimate includes students enrolling for the first time in any California school, as well as those students who have moved from another school, within or outside of California.

To estimate the cost of verifying residency status we can look to the similar, if somewhat simpler, experience of verifying student Schools are currently required to verify vaccination records. vaccination records and the State has recognized a mandated cost of \$4.18 per record. If we take this experience as a quide and assume that each enrollment requires verification of that student and two parent records, then we can estimate a verification cost of \$12.54 per pupil (3 X \$4.18 = \$12.54). This is somewhat lower than the Proposition 187 verification costs estimated by the school districts, but then vaccination records should be easier to check than immigration status. Noting that district estimates ranged from \$11 to \$32 per pupil, we estimate that verification of residence (for the student and parents) will cost between \$15 and \$20 per pupil enrolled. This would make the total cost of this process \$78 million to \$104 million. After 1995, when only newly enrolled students need to be verified, the annual cost would fall to between \$12 million and \$19 million.

Our estimate that between 300,000 and 410,000 unauthorized immigrant students are currently attending K-12 schools suggests that between 5.8% and 7.9% of California students are unauthorized. District A estimates that 6% of their records checks will result in referrals to immigration authorities and expulsion hearings. The 6% estimate seems reasonably within the 5.8% to 7.9% range. Applying this 6% estimate to the statewide population, we can assume that 312,000 referrals and hearings will be required at a cost of \$15 per notice and \$500 per hearing (based on estimates of districts A and B). The initial screening should thus cost \$161 million (312,000 X \$515) and annual hearing and notification costs should range between \$24 million and \$29 million (6% of annual verification X \$515).

In summary, if allowed to take effect, Proposition 187 is likely to have the following fiscal effects on K-12 public schools in California:

- 1. The term "unauthorized immigrant" refers to a person who is not a citizen, legally resident alien, alien lawfully admitted to residence for a temporary period of time or an alien otherwise authorized by federal law to be in the United States.
- 2. The \$4,500 per pupil exceeds the often quoted \$4,187 of K-12 funding per pupil because it represents K-14 funds divided by K-12 enrollment. \$4,500 is the impact on the guaranteed funding caused by the addition of one K-12 student.
- 3. Calculation of the potential impact on the Proposition 98 guarantee is:
