b. Recognize Dennis Gates as a Recipient of the "Jurupa Hero" Award

Members of the Board of Education periodically recognize outstanding community members who have volunteered their time and support to various school programs. Board members submit names of community volunteers to an ad hoc committee which selects the honoree based upon established criteria, such as performance of positive activities on behalf of students and are a recognized volunteer in school related programs.

Mr. Dennis Gates volunteers many hours of his time to the youth of the Jurupa community. After graduating from Rubidoux High School in 1977, he assisted with the upgrading and construction of new facilities on the vocational education school farm. ** B. Approve Submittal of Goals 2000 Planning Grant Application

(Mrs. Roberts)

For decades, district and school site administrators have worked with their staffs school site councils and various advisory committees to develop plans to meet the mandates of federal and state categorical aid programs. Generally, these improvement efforts target specific segments of the population with the goal of providing a supplement to the general education program for a specific purpose. What has emerged from these efforts is a somewhat fragmented, rather than a systematic, approach to school improvement.

In an effort to bring all the school improvement pieces together to form a comprehensive strategy, several federal, state and local initiatives have been launched. The most ambitious of these efforts is the Goals 2000: Educate America Act signed into law last year. This act challenges states, school districts and local schools to join with their communities to work toward achieving the following National Goals for Education:

- (1) All children in America will start school ready to learn.
- (2) The high school graduation rate will increase to at least 90 percent.

- (Mrs. Roberts)
- All students will leave grades 4, 8, and 12 having demonstrated competency over (3)challenging subject matter including English, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography, and every school in America will ensure that all students learn to use their minds well, so they may be prepared for responsible citizenship, further learning, and productive employment in our Nation's modern economy.
- United States students will be first in the world in mathematics and science (4) achievement.
- Every adult American will be literate and will possess the knowledge and skills (5) necessary to compete in a global economy and exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.
- Every school in the United States will be free of drugs, violence, and the unauthorized (6) presence of firearms and alcohol and will offer a disciplined environment conducive to learning.
- The Nation's teaching force will have access to programs for the continued improvement (7) of their professional skills and the opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills needed to instruct and prepare all American students for the next century.
- Every school will promote partnerships that will increase parental involvement and (8) participation in promoting the social, emotional, and academic growth of children.

Secretary of Education, Richard Riley, has said, "We must set high expectations--challenging academic and skill standards--for all children. We must do whatever it takes to help every child reach these expectations." California State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Delaine Eastin, has invited schools and communities to apply for Goals 2000 planning grant funds to assist in bringing a myriad of human material and financial resources together to support a community effort for improved schooling.

We believe that our district is well along the path toward achieving these goals, since last spring the Board approved a mission statement and six goals that are closely aligned with the eight national goals. Further, each school formed a staff and community committee to develop an action plan designed to support work toward the district's goals. These action plans form the base for each site's portion of the Goals 2000 application.

The focus of the district's portion of the application is on the school as a community center where all efforts are directed toward helping students attain the necessary academic, skill training and support services to become productive members of society. In planning this portion of the application, the staff used the district's mission and goals and suggestions from a community forum. While minimal funding is available to districts (\$5,000, plus \$10.00 per participating pupil), the value of varied segments of the community coming together in a concerted effort to improve our schools is immeasurable.

** B. Approve Submittal of Goals 2000 Planning Grant Application (Cont'd)

(Mrs. Roberts)

In order to make this effort manageable, district schools have been divided into two consortia. During Phase 1, nine schools will participate. These schools include Jurupa Valley High, Mira Loma Middle and the feeder elementary schools (Pedley, Troth, Sky Country, Van Buren, Granite Hill and Mission Bell); the latter two schools have a small portion of their population attending these secondary schools. In addition, West Riverside will participate to serve as a link between Phase 1 and Phase 2 schools. Schools in the second phase include Rubidoux High School, Mission Middle, Jurupa Middle and the remaining elementary schools.

When complete, Jurupa's Goals 2000 plan will need to describe changes the school, community and the district aim to make in at least ten areas: "(1) teaching and learning, standards and assessments; (2) opportunity to learn strategies and program improvement and accountability; (3) use of technology; (4) governance, accountability and management; (5) parent and community support and involvement; (6) making improvements system-wide; (7) promoting grassroots efforts; (8) strategies for preventing dropouts; (9) coordination with school-to-work programs, and (10) benchmarks and timelines."

In determining what changes to make, the Goals 2000 planning committee will want to build on our strengths and identify obstacles to our success.

Administration recommends that the Board approve submittal of the 1995-96 Goals 2000 Planning Grant Application.

C. Review Third Interim Financial Report and Multi-year Budget Projection (Mr. Edmunds)

The Second Interim Financial Report was presented to the Board on March 20, 1995 and then submitted to the Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE) as required by Education Code §42130. RCOE staff have reviewed the report, and the district received a response from Mr. Jerry Kurr, Assistant Superintendent, Division of Administration and Business Services. Mr. Kurr's response noted a deficit spending trend is projected in the current fiscal year, as well as 1995/96; and his recommendation was to prepare a third financial report, including a multi-year projection through 1996/97. The Business Office has prepared this information, and it is included in the supporting documents for the Board's review.

Third Interim Financial Report

The Third Interim Financial Report includes adjustments to revenue and expenditures through March 31, 1995, as shown below.

REVENUE ADJUSTMENTS:

Unrestricted Increase

+ \$199.590

This is a net result of increased ADA Revenue Limit Sources (\$48,896), Mandated Cost Reimbursement (\$50,000), Pregnant Minor ADA Revenue (\$19,111) and Revenue from Donations (\$81,583).

C. Review Third Interim Financial Report and Multi-year Budget Projection (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

Restricted Increase

+ \$22,849

This increase is a combination of increased revenue for Special Projects (\$42,849), and decreased funding for Special Education Units (-\$19,959) and a prior year adjustment on GATE funding (-\$41).

NET INCREASE IN REVENUE

+ \$222,439

EXPENDITURE ADJUSTMENTS:

Unrestricted Decrease

- \$87,805

This is the net result of decreased cost for salaries, due to employee turnover, and decreased expense for repairs.

Restricted Decrease

- \$79,408

This is due to decreased costs for the Severely Handicapped Chargeback from the Riverside County Office of Education.

NET DECREASE IN EXPENDITURES

- \$167,213

ESTIMATED RESERVE:

As a result of these adjustments, the Unrestricted Reserve is projected to increase \$381,118 to a total of \$2,694,100 or 4.03% of total expenditures. The Restricted Reserve is projected to be \$563,999, composed of \$460,526 in the State Textbook fund; most of which is reserved for the Mathematics Adoption; \$44,465 for GATE; and \$59,008 for the Severely Handicapped Chargeback to the County Office of Education.

Multi-year Budget Projection

Following the third Interim Financial Report in the supporting documents is the Multi-year Budget Projection for fiscal years 1994/95, 1995/96 and 1996/97. These projections were prepared using methodology developed by School Services of California--the premier school business consulting firm in the State. The assumptions for revenue and expenditures are listed immediately preceding the projected budget figures.

To summarize, the significant "bottom line" figures are presented here. A trend of deficit spending is evident, as the unrestricted expenditures exceed revenues by \$548,443 in 1994/95, \$499,338 in 1995/96 and \$674,674 in 1996/97. The unrestricted reserve is projected to decrease from \$2,694,100 (4.03%) in 1994/95 to \$2,408,762 (3.48%) in 1995/96. By 1996/97, the unrestricted reserve decreases to \$1,734,088 (2.46%), or \$381,706 below the required 3% level.

C. Review Third Interim Financial Report and Multi-year Budget Projection (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

The reason for the projected deficit spending trend is simply that State funding for education continues to be inadequate. The projected COLA's of 2.21% in 1995/96 and 1.5% in 1996/97 are not sufficient to keep pace with inflation. And, of course, opening Mira Loma Middle School with its additional operating cost of over \$720,000 places a heavy burden on the budget.

These projections should be viewed as a tool for the Board to use in assessing the general financial condition of the District. It is extremely difficult to project out as far as two years with precision, because too many variables are unknown. For example, the 2.21% COLA used to project 1995/96 revenue will really not be known until the State Budget is adopted in (hopefully) early July. And so it goes with many other variables that will affect these projections. Nonetheless, it is vitally important to realize that the picture in the crystal ball, as best we can see now, is of a budget that continues to present fiscal challenges to the District. D. <u>Authorize Issuance of Purchase Orders for Computers for Pacific Avenue School.</u>

Apple Computer is the sole-source supplier of Macintosh computers, and was recognized as such by Board Resolution #87/45 on April 20, 1987.

Glendale Unified School District bid #P-1693, awarded to Apple Computer, specifically names Jurupa Unified School District, along with all other districts in the State, as eligible to utilize the Glendale bid under PCC 20652 and 20118.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the issuance to Apple Computer of Purchase Order #85147 in the amount of \$36,831.11 (including tax) for the purchase of eighteen (18) computers for the GATE Program. (districtwide): Purchase Order #85148 in the amount of \$45,059.97 (including tax) for the purchase of thirty-four (34) computers for Pacific Avenue School. Chapter 1: and Purchase Order #85149 in the amount of \$49,263.00 (including tax) for the purchase of nineteen (19) computers and eighteen (18) printers for Granite Hill School. Chapter 1.

Throughout the school year, the Business Office monitors and adjusts the District's various budgets with respect to both revenue and expenditures. Changes in revenue result from grant applications, increased funding, adjustments to ADA, apportionment reductions, etc.

The method by which the revenue side of the budget is adjusted is to adopt a Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds. In this action the Board approves adding revenue to the budget for various purposes. Since the budget was revised on April 19, 1995, the District has received revenue adjustments in the amount of \$141,009 as identified below. Of this total, \$79,388 is unrestricted and will increase the unrestricted reserve. The balance remaining, \$61,621, is restricted in its use and offsetting expenditures are budgeted in these funds.

Mr. Chavez asked that prior to the Board recessing to Closed Session, he was in need of clarification concerning the goal of the meeting. He wanted to be certain that the Board was not going to set district goals. Mr. Chavez felt that if this were so, it should be done in Open Session. The Superintendent responded that according to the Brown Act, it is permissible to meet in Closed Session concerning the Superintendent's evaluation, and that the purpose of the evaluation is to set targets that the Board believes are priorities. Under these guidelines, a closed session meeting is acceptable. She emphasized that goals will not be set for the district, but for the Superintendent only. A VOTE WAS THEN TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

At 6:03 p.m. the Board recessed to Closed Session in the Superintendent's Office.

President Ruane led the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

INVOCATION

Mr. Chavez made an inspirational comment.

COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

RECOGNIZE THE DAY OF THE TEACHER

The Superintendent recognized May 10 as the Day of the Teacher, as proclaimed by Governor Pete Wilson, when all educational institutions will commemorate teachers and their profession. She commented that PTA's and principals will uniquely celebrate and honor their teachers at individual sites, as has been the practice in the district for the past several years.

RECOGNIZE WEST RIVERSIDE ELE. PROGRAMS The Superintendent introduced Dr. Ellen Kinnear to present information on programs at West Riverside Elementary, a school with an enrollment of over 900 students, ranging from Preschool through sixth grades. She thanked Dr. Kinnear for sharing her campus for Board meetings on many occasions.

Dr. Kinnear welcomed the Board to West Riverside and stated that her staff, students and community are very dedicated and supportive. She highlighted their aligned curriculum and programs such as PRICE; parenting classes, science fair inservices, family math workshops (in both English and Spanish); school site council, and PTA, all of which have encouraged family and community involvement and shared responsibility.

Dr. Kinnear stated that through her staff's cohesiveness and commitment to a positive learning environment, students have learned to act in leadership roles at site, district and county events, as well as working toward improving their academic achievement, social growth and positive citizenship. She shared that following their regular school day, students are provided with an Extended Day Program which, during the fourth quarter, includes over 400 Kindergarten-sixth grade students. This program promotes academics, the fine arts and health and fitness programs, and is taught by fifteen teachers, seven instructional aides and four students from Rubidoux High School's 3.0 club. Dr. Kinnear stated that through these positive programs, students are encouraged to achieve lifelong learning.

President Ruane thanked Dr. Kinnear for her hospitality.

REPORT FROM JVHS STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE (CONT'D) Top Ten

The top ten graduating seniors are (in random order): Anne Marie Budica, Esperanza Garcia, Erik Hicken, Janae Jones, Jason Lynch, Gina Mangiapelo, Jamie Mendoza, Sergio Navarro, and Wendy Terry.

President Ruane noted that Janae Jones, Jurupa Valley High School substitute student representative, was listed in the top ten students.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS:

President Ruane noted that the Public Verbal Comments section was an opportunity for citizens to address the Board. She indicated that comments should be limited to five minutes.

COMMENT: SUPPORT OF JURUPA SCHOOL TEACHERS In support of Jurupa Unified School District teachers, Mkenzie Wheeler, a student that will be graduating this June, related that her Aunt, a teacher in the district, had promised her a few years ago that she would assist in paying for Mkenzie's college education. Ms. Wheeler stated that now, with the 6% in salary reductions, her Aunt will be unable to keep her promise. She asked that the school district keep their promise of restoring teacher salaries, so that her Aunt, in turn, will be able to keep her promise to Ms. Wheeler.

COMMENT: REQUEST FOR CLARIFICATION

Due to the fact that he had been unable to attend the last few Board meetings, Mr. Carlos Sepulveda wished to comment and request clarification on several issues. He expressed his disappointment that the Board voted against paying for conference expenses, and did not see the importance of staying educated. Mr. Sepulveda was unclear on the status of Ms. Hanke's ownership of Rebel Sports; in her campaign and on her disclosure statement with the district, he said that she had stated that she was part-owner. However, at a recent Board meeting she stated that she did not own a business. Mr. Sepulveda asked her which statement was correct.

Mr. Sepulveda commented on Mrs. Burns and President Ruane's conference expenses. He indicated that they had criticized Mr. Chavez for his conference expenditures of \$2,081.21, and yet in one trip to Washington, D.C. they had already reached 50% of what Mr. Chavez spent. He indicated that Mrs. Burns and President Ruane had said that they would reimburse the district for money used out of Van Buren Elementary's restructuring funds. He noted that, as yet, Mrs. Burns had only repaid the district for her flight; President Ruane had not repaid anything. He asked that they keep their word on this matter, and reimburse the district for their expenses.

Mr. Sepulveda commented that he realized that relinquishing Board member stipends, a topic discussed at a previous Board meeting, was not meant to solve the district's long-term budgetary needs concerning teacher salaries. However, he felt that it would have been a good-faith effort on the part of the Board to vote in favor of this, and he was saddened that they could not find it in their hearts to do so.

COMMENT: REINSTATEMENT OF PAY & BENEFITS Lenore Boykin, a teacher in the district for nine years, stated that she was "black and blue" this evening, due to being bruised morally by the lack of commitment from the district to re-instate salary and health and welfare benefits to teachers. Ms. Boykin referred to the statement made by the Assistant Superintendent Business Services at the March 20th Board meeting, that salaries made up 84.76% of the district's budget. She commented that she was not sure how he came up with this amount. Figures that were calculated, in her estimation, should have totaled 79.35% of the district's budget, which amounted to a \$3,500,000 difference. Ms. Boykin asked, where is this amount in the budget? She then referred to top district administrators receiving pay raises and the mandated 3% reserve, and questioned, "Where is the integrity of Jurupa Unified School District."

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS: (CONT'D)

COMMENT: TEACHER SALARIES

Judith Pronovost, a kindergarten teacher at Mission Bell Elementary School, reminded the Board that Jurupa teachers are impatient concerning the 1991-92 salary schedule they are working under. Ms. Pronovost referred to the Chicano Studies class offering for this September, and stated that she understood that there would be no new programs added until teacher salaries were restored. She referred to the small amount that is allowed per child for supplies in each classroom, and listed the supplies that she has bought at her own expense. Ms. Pronovost voiced that "teachers are the heart and soul" in education, and asked that they be shown priority in district spending and treated as valued individuals.

COMMENT: MONEY

Paul Strain, Rubidoux High School teacher for twenty-three years, and Jurupa resident since 1938, shared about his experiences while attending the Glen Avon 100th year celebration. He recalled that it brought back many memories when he attended the school. Mr. Strain remembered being one of the poorest families in his neighborhood and how this instilled in him his moral values to pay back what he owed. On the other hand, Mr. Strain recalled that his brother was just the opposite. When his brother borrowed something from him, he did not pay it back. Mr. Strain shared that this is a good example of how teachers are feeling in this district about the 6% that was taken from them; morally it should be repaid and the district should not be like his brother who did not repay his debts, but continued buying new things and increasing his debts. Mr. Strain stated that the Board should investigate every way possible to repay the teachers, and he encouraged the district to do the right thing.

COMMENT: JVHS BAND BOOSTER

Matt Mize stated that teachers should get back the 6% that they deserve. Matt praised the Silver Brigade and said that he felt that Mr. Works was a great teacher, who cared about each of his students. Matt commented that as a member of the Silver Brigade, he has seen the Silver Brigade move from the "C" division to the "A" division under the leadership of Mr. Works, and that the Color Guard won the Bronze Medal in the championships.

COMMENT: SILVER BRIGADE BAND BOOSTERS

Mike Headrick agreed with the former speaker, and stated that without the Silver Brigade, he would more than likely have been a "loser." Mike stated that the Silver Brigade has been his family throughout his high school years, and he wondered why people were trying to tear such a good thing apart, instead of supporting it.

COMMENT: SILVER BRIGADE

Christopher Thornberry stated that as a member of the Silver Brigade for one year, he had learned about commitment, and felt that it was a wonderful program.

COMMENT: JVHS BAND BOOSTERS

Alison Cherry, an eleventh grade student at Jurupa Valley High, shared that the band has been her family, and that through working with Mr. Works, she has learned about commitment. She stated that Mr. Works has also helped students to think about how they are going to live in the real world; how to handle mistakes, and how to relate to life. Alison felt that there was nothing better that she could have done than to have been involved in band.

COMMENT: COLOR GUARD

Stephanie Dieckman, an eleventh grade student at Jurupa Valley High School and a member of the Color Guard for two years, stated that through the leadership of Mr. Works and a lot of work and practice, the Color Guard has come from last place to placing twelvth out of eighteen participants. Stephanie felt that Mr. Works has taught students how to live in the real world and to work hard for what they want to achieve.

COMMENT: SILVER BRIGADE

Tina Meza, Silver Brigade member, stated that Mr. Works does a lot for students and that they put in a great deal of time at the school, and spend more time there than they do at home.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS: (CONT'D)

COMMENT: RESOLUTION FROM NEA-J Francine Rice-Laabs read the NEA-J Resolution of Dissatisfaction, passed unanimously by the General Membership of the NEA-J on Wednesday, April 26, 1995, which cited decreased morale, undue stress, and hardship on the over 700 certificated bargaining unit members in the district, due to the reduction in health and welfare benefits and the negotiated salaries and benefits reduction to 1991 levels. The Resolution called upon the Board of Education, along with the Superintendent, to resolve these issues, and repair damaged employee morale.

COMMENT: SUPPORT OF TEACHERS

Becky Amio, tenth grade student at Jurupa Valley High, member of the varsity softball team and FFA officer, asked to speak concerning the Jurupa Unified School District teachers. She had read in her school newspaper that teachers spent a lot of their own money in their classrooms on materials and supplies and they work long hours coaching students. She assured the school district officials that teachers are not doing this for the money, but for the students, and it is not an easy task, as some students are incorrigible and not easy to deal with. Becky expressed that teachers make a difference in the lives of students and they should be paid like professionals.

COMMENT: MIDDLE SCHOOL SPORTS

Phil Stokoe emphasized the need for more activities for students at the middle school level. He stated that at the ages of 12 and 13, students need positive activities to motivate them. Mr. Stokoe cited the cut in funding which has resulted in the dismissal of sewing, cheer leading and woodshop class offerings. He asked that after-school sports be reinstated into the budget for middle school students.

COMMENT: PROMISES

Linda Monge reminded the Board of promises that they made when they were elected. She stated that she expected and demanded that the teachers be given back all that was promised.

COMMENT: SUPPORT OF TEACHERS

Rebecca Graffice stated that three years is a long time for teachers to have to wait for their salaries to be restored, and that in the mean time the cost of living has continued to increase. She asked that the Board somehow give the teachers back their money.

COMMENT: TEACHER SUPPORT

J.R. Hertz, parent in the community, and supporter of teacher salary re-instatement, stated that Carlos Sepulveda seemed to be a poor loser this evening, and that Mr. Chavez, at the last Board meeting, was embarrassing by suggesting that Board members give up their stipends, and then refused to give up his stipend. He felt that character assassination had no place at Board meetings, and that some of the comments made were disgusting. Mr. Hertz felt that teachers should be shown respect and commitment and that the Board should keep their promise to them.

COMMENT: FUND RAISER

Mr. Saunders referred to the Press Enterprise article concerning the funding of \$50,000 that the district will receive for rubber matting to be placed at three school sites. He stated; however, that this amount will not cover the total cost of the matting. Therefore, Mr. Saunders announced a fundraiser that is being promoted on behalf of Ina Arbuckle Elementary. A Las Vegas Night is planned for May 12th from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. at the Club Metro in Rubidoux at \$15.00 per person to offset the amount that the \$50,000 does not cover for the playground matting. Mr. Saunders emphasized the importance of safety for the children and the importance of teachers. He commended the students that were present in support of teachers. Mr. Saunders stressed the significance of supporting children, and listed the many businesses in the community that were sponsoring the fundraising event.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

Mr. Knight expressed his appreciation to Principal Ellen Kinnear for her wonderful presentation of information about what is happening at West Riverside Elementary. He commented that it is wonderful to see students, teachers and the community fostering pride in their students' education. He thanked the Jurupa Valley High and Rubidoux High student representatives for their fine report on participatory extracurricular activities at each school and asked that they report back to their respective schools that they should be commended for their positive involvement in activities.

Mr. Knight recognized Governor Wilson's appropriate proclamation of May 10 as "Day of the Teacher." He commended the teachers for their dedication. He stated that the Board of Education will do everything that they can to fulfill their commitment, seeking out supportive information, while staying within the budgetary restraints mandated by the State.

Mr. Chavez thanked Principal Ellen Kinnear for her hospitality at West Riverside Elementary. He congratulated Mrs. Fran Rice-Laabs for again being nominated as President of NEA-J, as she begins her sixth year. Mr. Chavez responded to the teachers' comments concerning salary restoration by referring to the COLA funds over the past four years, which has placed the district in a very difficult position.

Mr. Chavez commented that he enjoyed the performance of "Amadeus" at Jurupa Valley High School. Mr. Chavez reported that the Jurupa Hispanic Association fundraiser for student recognition was very successful and was a great opportunity to bring people together in support of students. Mr. Chavez invited everyone to attend the eighth annual bilingual recognition program in San Bernardino on June 2, 1995. He mentioned for the record that the conference he attended recently, was paid for out of his own pocket, except for the registration, which the district paid for. The information he received from the conference was very important to the future of education in the State of California. Mr. Chavez thanked those who helped to make the fundraiser a success and expressed that he will continue to do what he thinks is right and in the best interest of education for students.

Ms. Hanke responded to the remarks made about her half ownership of Rebel Sports. She indicated that she learned that ownership was not "all it was cracked up to be." Ms. Hanke stated that she has no part of Rebel Sports. She is a member of the Board of Education and she attends school. She indicated that she had not had time to file the abandonment of her half ownership due to her work schedule. However, she was aware that Rebel Sports had donated \$100 to Las Vegas Night.

Ms. Hanke referred to her visit to Jurupa Middle School, and meeting Mr. Walt Lancaster; and her visits to Rio Vista and Nueva Vista, under the leadership of Dave Hutchins. She spoke of her changed views of Rubidoux High School since visiting and touring the campus with Mr. Don Vail, Mrs. Mary Burns and the Assistant Superintendent of Education Services. Ms. Hanke was very impressed with student programs and the modernization of the facility. She commented that she had heard many comparisons between the Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux campuses, since Jurupa Valley was the newer of the two schools. She stated that people should not make judgments against Rubidoux High School until they have seen for themselves what a good campus it is. She also spoke in support of Jurupa Valley High and its fine teachers.

BOARD MEMBER (CONTD)

Mrs. Burns wished to respond to the statements made by Mr. Carlos Sepulveda. REPORTS & COMMENTS She wanted to make clear that she was never against Mr. Chavez attending conferences. Mrs. Burns expressed that she was against district-paid conferences; however, she was in favor of Board members attending conferences. She reaffirmed the importance of conferences and referred to environmental conferences she has attended. Mrs. Burns stated that she has learned and worked on issues of this nature within the district that have been very beneficial. She emphasized that she has not attacked Mr. Chavez and that there is not a war among Board members.

> Mrs. Burns referred to the "Day of the Teacher," and emphasized that teachers are the heart of the district and that everything they do is very much appreciated. She wanted to make certain that the teachers realized that the Board is listening to their concerns and they do understand. Mrs. Burns stated that during her tour of the district she may have missed visiting some classrooms and she apologized for this. She explained that there was only so much time that could be spent on each campus. Mrs. Burns welcomed a very special anonymous guest in the audience.

> President Ruane congratulated Mrs. Fran Rice-Laabs, and stated that she does her job very well. 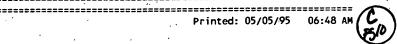

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

I. Subject of Compulsory Education

Minors between the ages of six and eighteen shall attend public full-time day school or the full time designated as the length of the school day by the governing board unless exempted for reasons listed in Section II below (<u>Education Code</u> Section 48200).

- II. Students under the following classifications may be exempt from attending public school full time when requested by the parent.
 - A. Students who are being instructed in licensed private full-time day schools by persons capable of teaching. Such schools must be taught in English language and must offer instruction in the branches of study required to be taught in the public schools of the state. (Education Code Section 48222)
 - B. Students who are being instructed in study and recitation for at least three hours a day for 175 days each calendar year by a private tutor or other person in the several branches of study required to be taught in the public schools for this state, and in the English language. The tutor or other person must hold a valid state credential for the grade taught. The instruction must be offered between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. (Education Code Section 48224)
 - C. Students Attending Continuation School
 - All students between fifteen years of age or older and under eighteen years of age, not attending full-time day school and not otherwise exempted, shall attend special continuation classes. Persons exempted from continuation classes include the following: (1) High school graduates; (2) pupils attending public or private full-time day school; (3) pupils disqualified because of physical or mental condition or because they must render personal services to their dependents; (4) pupils satisfactorily attending a regional occupational program; (5) pupils who met high school equivalency or proficiency standards; and

- (6) regularly employed pupils who attend adult school classes at least four hours per week. (Education Code Section 48410)
- 2. If employed, the continuation student shall attend not less than four 60-minute hours per week for the regularly established annual school term. Such minimum attendance requirement may be satisfied by any combination of attendance upon special continuation education classes and regional occupational centers or program. (Education Code Section 48230, 48400)
 - Whenever a minor cannot give satisfactory proof of regular employment, he/she shall have any work permit revoked and attend for not less than I5 hours per week special continuation education classes during the period of unemployment. The minimum attendance requirement of I5 hours per week may be satisfied by any combination of attendance in special education classes, regional occupational programs, or approved independent study programs. Education Code Section 48402) The person responsible for the continuation education program is also charged with follow-up to ensure the student is indeed working.
- D Minor (under 18) attending Adult School Classes

In exceptional cases, sixteen- and seventeen-year old students working in regular employment shall be permitted to attend adult school classes for not less then four hours per week. A letter must be filed by the principal of the pupil's regular school authorizing such attendance, and the attendance must be approved by the Adult School Principal. [Education Code Section 48410 (f)]

- E. Persons 16 or 17 years of age may be exempted from any requirement to attend school if they pass the State proficiency examination. (Education Code Section (48412) Verified approval of the parent or guardian is required before the exemption may be allowed.
- F. Independent Study

Persons properly enrolled in Independent Study pursuant to District policies and state law are exempt from the requirement to attend full-time day school. (<u>Education Code</u> Section 51745) This includes students exempted from school per <u>Education Code</u> 48232, who are considered to be "on leave" for supervised travel or study.



III. Exclusion from School

- A. Health and Safety Code Section 3118 requires a Superintendent, Principal or Teacher to exclude a student suffering from an infectious, contagious or communicable disease, or a student living in any household in which such a disease exists. Pursuant to this section, when a principal/designee determines that the continued presence of the pupil would constitute a clear and present danger to the life, safety, or health of pupils or school personnel, the Board of Education shall not be required to send prior notice of the exclusion to the parent or guardian. (Education Code Section 48213)
- B. The Governing Board may exclude students from school for filthy or vicious habits, or students suffering from contagious or infectious diseases. (Education Code Section 48211)
- C. Procedure for Exclusion by the Governing Board
 - 1. Prior to Board action pursuant to Section 48211 and in accordance with Education Code 48213, the Superintendent/designee shall follow the process described in Administrative Procedure #307, "Contagious or Infectious Disease."

IV. Medical Service Referrals.

From time to time students may request special assistance from teachers, counselors, guidance coordinators, psychologists, nurses or school administrators in locating and obtaining medical service referrals.

- A. In assisting students with medical services information, staff should adhere to the following guidelines:
 - 1. Whenever possible, staff should encourage the student to obtain services with the assistance and involvement of his/her parent or guardian. However, by law, students may request and seek assistance with or without the involvement or notification of their parents;
 - 2. Staff will not approve the dismissal of students for confidential medical purposes without parent knowledge and consent;
 - 3. When providing medical services information, more than one referral source and preferably three sources should be given;



- District Resource/Referral Lists should be used when making referrals:
- 5. While staff may provide information on providers, they cannot guarantee the quality of outside medical referral services;
- 6 Staff shall not make specific appointments for students requesting medical services:
- 7 Staff shall not transport students to medical services facilities unless an emergency situation exists that is so severe in nature the student's life may be at risk;
- 8. School authorities my excuse any student from the school for the purpose of obtaining confidential medical services without the consent of the student's parent or guardian. The Governing Board shall so notify students in grades 7 to I2 and their parents or guardians each academic year. (Education Code Section 46010.1)
- B. In the event that students request special assistance from guidance coordinators, counselors, nurses or psychologists in locating and obtaining confidential medical services involving pregnancy, birth control or the care/control of venereal disease, the following additional guidelines should be adhered to:
 - 1. Guidance coordinators, counselors, nurses and psychologists must by law maintain student confidentiality. This confidentiality must be waived only in cases of clear and present danger to the student or others, or in cases of child abuse.

V. Student, Parent and Staff Responsibilities in Attendance

- A. Student Responsibilities
 - 1. Students shall be regular and punctual in attendance. (California Code of Regulations, Title V, Section 300)
 - 2. Students shall be required to provide a satisfactory explanation for their absence or tardiness from the parent or guardian of the student, either in person or by written note. The explanation shall not be required until the day following. (C.C.R., Title V, Section 306)
 - 3. Students shall remain on the school grounds during the entire school



day unless permission to leave has been granted by proper school authority. (C.C.R., Title V, Section 303)

Parent Responsibilities

- 1. Parents shall ensure that student(s) do attend school, and arrive on time, unless the student is absent for legal reasons. (Education Code Section 48200)
- 2. Parents are required to provide prompt explanations for all student absences for part or all of a school day. (C.C.R., Title V, Section 306)
- Parents shall instill in students the values of good attendance, 3. punctuality and high achievement.
- Parents may obtain and supervise make-up work from student's 4. teachers when a student is legally absent.
- 5. Whenever possible, parents shall support and comply with all requests to attend school conferences designed for the exchange of information on student progress and planning for its continued maintenance and/or improvement.

C. School Staff Responsibility

- Teachers and principals shall record attendance information as prescribed by Education Code Section 44809, and C.C.R., Title V, Section 400. Section 400: provides that records of attendance of every pupil in the public schools shall be kept for the following purposes:
 - "For apportionment of State Funds." a.
 - "To ensure general compliance with the compulsory education b. law, and performance by a pupil of his duty to attend school regularly."
- Teachers and principals shall ensure the classroom attendance and 2. class participation are considered part of the minimum academic standard a student must attain in order to meet course requirements.



Teachers shall include, with other criteria for minimum academic standards for the successful completion of a class, classroom participation and recitation sufficient to attain the aims and objectives of the course.

Teachers shall allow a legally absent student the opportunity to make up all missed work that can be reasonably provided in order to receive grades and credits. The make-up assignment should be reasonably equivalent to work missed. Make-up work should be given to students when the absence was excused for justifiable personal reasons. (Education Code Section 48205). In addition, teachers may require students who have been suspended to make up missed work. Teachers may deny make-up and credit to students who are found to be truant, and if because of his/her absence the student was not able to achieve the teachers' course objectives, the student may be failed. (Education Code Section 49067)

VI. Attendance Accounting

- A. Absences Excused and Counted for Apportionment (C.C.R., Title V, Section 420, Education Code Section 46010)
 - Illness of the student.
 - 2. Quarantine under the direction of a County or City Health Officer.
 - 3. Medical, dental, optometrical, psychological or chiropractic treatments. Students returning from medical service referral appointments with a verification slip may be credited as excused absence(s) for medical appointments. (<u>Education Code</u> Section 46010.1)
 - 4. Attendance at a funeral service of an immediate family member, as long as such absence is not more than one day, if the service is conducted in California, and not more than three days, if the service is conducted outside California. Immediate family includes mother, father, grandmother, grandfather of the student or of the spouse of the student, and the spouse, son, daughter, brother, sister, or any person "in loco parentis" of the student, or any relative living in the immediate household of the student. (Education Code Section 45194)
 - 5. Jury duty in the manner provided for by law.



- 6. Exclusion from school pursuant to Section 3381 of the Health and Safety Code, as long as such absence is not more than five school days, provided (Education Code Section 46010.5):
 - a. The parent/guardian of the student has been notified that they have two weeks to supply evidence either that the student has been properly immunized, or that the student is exempted from the immunization requirement pursuant to Section 3385 or Section 3386 of the Health and Safety Code;
 - b. In such notice, (outlined above) the District shall refer the parent or guardian of the student to the student's usual source of medical care to obtain the immunization. If no usual source exists, the parent or guardian will be referred to the County Health Department.
- 7 Religious instruction away from school property may be permitted as an excused absence under the following conditions (<u>Education Code</u> Section 46014):
 - a. Written consent of the parent or guardian is provided;
 - b. Outside attendance includes religious exercises or moral and religious instruction;
 - c. The pupil shall attend school at least the minimum school day while attending outside instruction;
 - d. No pupil shall be excused from school for this purpose for more than four days per school month.
- B. Absences-Excused and <u>NOT</u> Counted for Apportionment (<u>Education Code</u> Section 48205)
 - 1. A student shall be excused from school for justifiable personal reasons. The absence request must be submitted by the student's parent/guardian <u>prior</u> to the absence in <u>writing</u>, and approved by the principal or his/her designee. The request and subsequent approval documents shall be retained in the attendance office of the school. The principal may require reasonable evidence to verify the reasons for the absences described below and may establish reasonable limits on the number of such absences allowed the student.



- a. Appearance in Court;
- Observance of a holiday ceremony of his/her religion. A student may be excused for religious retreats for up to but no more than four hours per semester;
- c. A student employment conference;
- d A student hardship situation, as authorized by the principal or his/her designee;
- e. When the student is the custodial parent of a child who is ill or has a medical appointment during school hours; or
- f. Attendance at a funeral service not excused under VI.A. 4 above.
- 2. Any student absent from school for one of the above reasons shall be allowed to complete all assignments and tests missed during the absence which can be reasonably provided, and upon satisfactory completion, shall be given full credit.
- 3. An entry in attendance accounting documents that designates an excused or otherwise allowed absence for which state school apportionment is not claimed shall be used to indicate the reason for an absence.
- C. Absences Unexcused and Not Counted for Apportionment. The following absences are unexcused:
 - Family vacation, unless an independent study short-term contract has been approved by the principal, parent and student. This absence may be included as an "excused absence" for apportionment purposes once the correct procedures for independent study have been followed: The student's attendance reporting shall be completed by staff at the district Learning Center;
 - 2. Baby-sitting;
 - 3. Shopping;



- 4. Helping parents at home;
- Studying;
- 6. All other absences not covered in VI. A. and B above.

D. Field Trips

- 1. Average daily attendance shall be credited only while student is "engaged in educational activities required of such students and under the immediate supervision and control of a certificated employee." (Education Code Section 46300)
- 2. Attendance during an educational field trip or excursion is limited to the amount that would have accrued in a regular school day, but is also limited to ten (10) school days per student per trip except in the case of a field trip or excursion in connection with courses of instruction, or school-related educational activities which are not special, cultural, athletic or school band activities. (Education Code Section 35330)
- If fees and charges are assessed to students to participate in any school sponsored activity, only the student's actual attendance upon regular school day or class shall be counted. (C.C.R. Title V, Section 405)
- E. Verification of All Absences (<u>Education Code</u> Sections 46010, 46010.2, 46010.3, 46010.5, 46012)
 - 1. Whenever a student is absent from school or class, the actual reason for the absence shall be determined by a qualified school employee.
 - 2. Verification of an absence should occur within four weeks of the date of the absence.

Any of the following persons are deemed qualified and may verify a student absence (C.C.R. Title V, Section 421):

- a. School nurse;
- b. Attendance supervisor, guidance coordinator or counselor,



- c School administrator;
- d. Teacher;
- e. Any other qualified employee of the District assigned to make such a verification.
- 3. The verification shall be made in accordance with any reasonable method. These methods shall include any one or more of the following:
 - a. Written, telephone or personal contact with the parent, guardian, or other person having charge or control of the student.
 - (1) If written, the following information should be included:
 - the absent pupil's name
 - the name and signature of the person who wrote the note (and relationship to the pupil if other than parent/guardian)
 - the date of the note
 - the date of the absence to which the note refers
 - the reason for the absence
 - (2) If by telephone, the following information should be included:
 - the absent pupil's name
 - the name of the person reached, and his/her relationship to the pupil
 - the name of the verifying school employee
 - the date of the call
 - the date of the absence to which the call refers
 - the reason for the absence
 - b. Written communication from a physician, public health nurse, or school nurse;
 - c. Personal observation and/or inspection at the home or school by any of the persons authorized to verify student absence.
- The absence verification should be kept on file for three years and may be destroyed at the beginning of the fourth year.



- 5. In the case of an emancipated minor, or adult student, communication shall be with the student.
- Pefinition of Truancy: Any student subject to compulsory full-time education or to compulsory continuation education who is absent from school without a valid excuse for more than three days or tardy in excess of 30 minutes on each of more than three days in one school year is considered to be truant. (Education Code Section 48260)

VII. Closed Campuses and Leaving School Grounds

All campuses in the Jurupa Unified School District are considered closed campuses; however, students may be permitted to obtain an off-campus lunch pass. Otherwise, students are not permitted to leave school grounds before the close of school except by a written request countersigned by the principal/designee and submitted to the students's teacher or other specified school official, per school rules that apply at each school.

VIII. Consequences of Excessive Absences (Truancies, Excessive Unexcused Absences, Period Cuts, Tardies).

A. Parental Negligence

1. If it appears, upon investigation, that any parent, guardian or other person having control or charge of any student has violated the compulsory education laws, the student's principal, or designee, may submit a referral to the School Attendance Review Board (SARB).

In the event that any such parent, guardian, or other person continually and willfully fails to respond to directives of the School Attendance Review Board or services provided, the School Attendance Review Board shall direct the school district to make and file in the proper court a criminal complaint against the parent, guardian, or other person, charging the violation, and shall see that the charge is prosecuted by the proper authority. In the event that a criminal complaint is not prosecuted by the proper authority as recommended, the official making the determination not to prosecute shall provide the School Attendance Review Board with a written explanation for the decision not to prosecute. (Education Code Section 48291)

When the absences seem excessive in the opinion of the person authorized to verify excused student absence, the site administrator may require medical verification for all future absences due to illness



during the remainder of the current school year.

B. Student Negligence

The following is a list of consequences and alternatives which may be considered should a student's unexcused absenteeism be excessive. Such alternatives to suspension or expulsion should be imposed against students for truancy, tardiness or unexcused absenteeism. (Education Code Section 48900)

- 1. Possible loss of privilege to participate in school activities, including such activities as attendance at dances and athletic contests and membership in performing groups such as band or drill team, et cetera:
- Removal or denial of work permit;
- 3. Referral to the School Attendance Review Board;
- 4. Referral to the Probation Department;
- 5. Requirement that all work missed (except for truancies) must be made up before receiving grades and credit, which, if not completed, may result in a loss of credit or reduction in grade due to poor achievement;
- 6. Change in school assignment, including, but not limited to, placement into an alternative program such as Continuation School or the like;
- A student may be assigned to the district Home Bound program when a student is required to remain at home for more than four consecutive weeks due to an illness or an injury per Administration Procedure #217, "Home Bound Instruction."
- 8 Temporary placement in the on-campus detention program until parent conference and appropriate program changes can be made.
- 9. Referral to the Jurupa Community School operated by the Riverside County Office of Education for students determined to be minors on probation within the meaning of Welfare and Institutions Code Section 602, or court wards under Sections 654, 601, 602 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.



10. Alternative program classes for grades 7 and 8.

C Saturday School Program

An additional alternative available to students who demonstrate attendance problems is the Saturday School Program described in Administrative Procedure #224.

- 1 While the Governing Board may maintain classes on Saturday these classes shall be at the election of the studentl or, in the case of a minor studentl, the parent or guardian of the studentl.
- 2. However, the Governing Board may require truants, as defined by Education Code Section 48260, to attend makeup classes conducted on Saturdays.
- 3. A truant student who may be required to attend Saturday School class is defined as:
 - "Any pupil subject to compulsory full-time education or to compulsory continuation education who is absent from school without valid excuse three days in one school year or tardy without valid excuse in excess of 30 minutes on each of more than three days in one school year..." (Education Code 48260)
- 4. Classwork offered in Saturday School must be similar to the regular Monday through Friday school week and must support the student's regular program.
- 5 Students who do not complete their required weekend school attendance, in a satisfactory manner, may be subject to disciplinary measures and may be considered insubordinate or in defiance of valid school authority.

IX. Enrollment and Placement of Adult Students

- A student is not required to attend school beyond the age of compulsory attendance, i.e., eighteen years of age. (Education Code Section 48200)
- B. A student who attains 18 years of age while currently enrolled may continue in enrollment but is required to comply with all District and school regulations, pursue the required course of study and submit to the authority of school officials. Such student is subject to the same disciplinary



requirements and alternatives as all other students.

- C. An 18-year-old student who exhibits poor attendance patterns or who is not earning the necessary credits for graduation shall be counseled to explore other District options, e.g., adult school.
- D. An 18-year old person desiring to enroll in the district as a new student shall meet with the principal or designee and a guidance counselor to determine the appropriate placement. Criteria to be considered shall include:
 - The student's prior attendance record and whether or not the student has attended school on a regular basis for the preceding 45 consecutive school days.
 - o The student's current educational standing. Is the student making satisfactory progress toward graduation?
 - The student's behavior history. Is there a history of discipline problems and inappropriate behavior?
 - The most appropriate educational setting for the student, e.g., comprehensive high school, continuation high school, adult school, or other alternative educational program.
 - Whether or not the student qualifies as an individual with exceptional needs and is thereby perhaps eligible for placement into a districtoperated special program.
- E. An 18-year-old student who returns for a fifth year at a high school shall secure permission from the principal or designee to attend an additional year.
