B. Approve Instructional Materials for Review

Board Policy #6201 defines various categories of instructional materials and requires that teachers and administrators be involved in the selection of these materials consistent with the Education Code. The district adopts basic instructional materials for the K-8 level by subject area on a seven-year cycle, and at the high school level, the cycle is determined by the various departments. In addition, the Board has adopted a list of supplemental textbooks for use in the schools. On occasion, a school, or a group of schools, submits a request for approval for basic or supplemental core books which must be approved by the Board as well.

"Perspectives on Health." and "American Government" for use at the high school level.

C. Approve Proposed Secondary Course Offering - Mexican-American/Chicano Studies

(Mr. Méndez)

Last year the board directed administration to investigate the possibility of offering a course in Chicano Studies in the Jurupa Unified School District. In order to develop a course with academic rigor and meeting the needs of our students and community a number of events have taken place. An advisory committee was formed consisting of parents, students, teachers and community members. This committee met with Dr. Carlos Cortes, Professor Emeritus of History, UC Riverside, to discuss the general content and design of the course. The results of these discussions provided the framework for the development of the course. The actual course outline was developed by classroom teachers with the assistance of several students who conducted research in this area. The one semester course is to be offered to students in grades 9-12 as an elective. It will be submitted to the UC system for approval to meet the A - F requirements for admission to the University of California.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the Mexican-American/Chicano Studies course of study for secondary students.

D. <u>Approve Replacement of Mobile Home for Watchman in the Rubidoux High School Agriculture Area, Continuance of Motion #255</u> (Mrs. Roberts)

Background:

At the April 5,1996 meeting, Board member John Chavez requested that the Board delay action on authorizing the staff to replace the leased mobile home used by the watchman in the agriculture area at Rubidoux High School. This request was made in order to allow the staff time to provide evaluative data on the program before spending funds on a new unit.

The Board originally authorized the purchase of a mobile home for this area in April, 1993. A used mobile home was purchased the following June, a lease contract was developed and a watchman was selected to live on campus. The primary goal of the program was to minimize the loss of animals belonging to students as well as to reduce vandalism and theft in the farm area which is in an isolated part of the campus. Three responsibilities were outlined for the person serving in this capacity. These included conducting inspections of the grounds, reporting unauthorized individuals or suspicious activities and assisting in maintaining the landscaping in the farm area.

Currently, each comprehensive high school campus has a mobile home for a watchman and each pays the district a monthly rental fee of \$400.00. A lease agreement was revised by our law firm and both parties appear to be adhering to the terms and conditions. The rental payments are used to reimburse the general fund and to pay for the upkeep of these units.

The staff is requesting that the mobile home on the Rubidoux campus be replaced because of the uninhabitable condition of this unit. Some of the damage has been attributed to the previous tenant while the other is a result of normal wear and tear that one might reasonably expect on a used mobile home. The current tenant has complained about electrical and structural problems including outdated electrical wiring, a non-functioning oven, a lack of smoke alarms, a leaking swamp cooler, a leaking roof and walls, an inoperable dishwasher and a furnace and water heater that are in very poor condition. The district Maintenance staff has made many attempts to repair this facility, and they estimate that it would take about \$9,600 to bring the mobile home to standard. This unit was purchased for \$14,363. Thus, it does not appear to be cost effective to expend more funds on repair. The Purchasing Department staff estimates that a replacement unit would cost approximately \$15,000 if a used mobile home were purchased again.

Evaluation of Current Program:

In order to provide information on the effectiveness of the watchman program on our two high school farms, a member of the district's research and evaluation staff designed several questions and conducted interviews with site administrators and agriculture teachers. Interviews were conducted on sites during the week of April 21, 1996. Three site administrators and three agriculture teachers were interviewed. In addition, a tour of each farm area was arranged. Questions were grouped into four major categories: (1) the number of student project animals housed on a campus at various times during the year; (2) the value of the animals; (3) the nature and incidence of vandalism and theft in the agriculture area prior to implementing the watchman program; the current incidence of vandalism and theft, and (4) the nature of any residual value to the campus, if any, of implementing the watchman program.

D. Approve Replacement of Mobile Home for Watchman in the Rubidoux High School Agriculture Area, Continuance of Motion #255 (Cont'd) (Mrs. Roberts)

At Jurupa Valley High School, there are 342 students enrolled in the agriculture program, and Rubidoux High School's enrollment stands at 250 students. Approximately 200 Jurupa Valley High School students regularly attend fairs and exhibits and at Rubidoux High School, 150 regularly attend these events. According to the staff, at various times of the year, there are between 100 and 200 animal/agriculture projects near the watchman trailers at each site. At any given time, there may be up to 200 animals which include poultry, goats, sheep, pigs, and cows. In addition, eighteen horses have been loaned by local citizens to the agriculture programs for horsemanship classes for Jurupa Unified students. These animals are also housed at the school sites. The conservative estimate of the value of all animals would exceed \$50,000, much of which is student invested money. In addition to animals, the agriculture facilities have tens of thousands of dollars of equipment, nursery plants, feed, and other essential items that are needed to operate a successful program. Before the watchman trailers were set up at Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High Schools, animals were stolen, turned loose, injured and in several cases, destroyed. Equipment was stolen and buildings were vandalized on a regular basis. These losses incurred over several years and amounted to tens of thousands of dollars.

Since the mobile homes with watchman have been placed on sites, the staff noted that between 95% and 98% of the theft and vandalism problems have ceased. In a number of cases, the tenants called police who then apprehended both young people and adults who were in the act of vandalizing other parts of the campus. In recent months, a number of students who were truant were reported by the watchman to activity supervisors and these students were apprehended as well. Because of their proximity to the livestock pens, tenants are available to help round up an animal in case a student may leave a gate open. Every person interviewed stated that this was a positive approach to reducing vandalism and theft and offered that this concept might work in other areas of the district as well.

A request is before the Board at this time for a vote on Motion #255, "Consider Replacing the Watchman Mobile Home at Rubidoux High School," which has been brought back for appropriate action following a request for further study at the April 15, 1996 Board meeting. The Motion was moved and seconded, to purchase a mobile home for a live-in watchman to provide security to the agricultural farm at Rubidoux High School.

E. <u>Authorize Issuance of Purchase Order #89796 for Computers for Van Buren Elementary School</u> (Mr. Edmunds)

The Purchasing Department has received requisitions from Van Buren Elementary School for two (2) Early Language 4-Station Macintosh Computer Classroom Bundles with the following equipment:

One Teacher Station (Macintosh LC580 w/CD ROM & Standard Keyboard), Three Student Stations (Macintosh LC580 w/CD ROM and Standard Keyboard), One Color Stylewriter 2500 Network Printer, One Apple Color One Scanner, One Scholastic Inc. Kit, One Early Language Connection Learning Kit, and Two Days of Training

E. <u>Authorize Issuance of Purchase Order #89796 for Computers for Van Buren Elementary School</u> (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

The equipment will be purchased with SIP, Title I and Restructuring Funds. A bidding opportunity does not exist for the purchase of Apple Macintosh Computers, since Apple markets their education line of computers directly to school districts. Glendale Unified School District specifically names Jurupa Unified School District, along with all other districts in the State, as eligible to utilize the Glendale bid. As such, administration intends to utilize the pricing from this bid to purchase the requested equipment.

Board Policy states that all purchases in excess of \$12,000 must be approved by the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education before issuing a purchase order, therefore a request is being made for this approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #89796 to Apple Computer in the amount of \$28,443.85 (including tax) for the purchase of this equipment.

F. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Approve Change Order No. 7 for Peralta Elementary School

(Mr. Edmunds)

Change Order No. 7 for Peralta Elementary School is for the following, with a change in the contract sum of \$30,678.94 and a time extension of 14 days:

Storm drain laterals; electrical additions; fire sprinkler enclosures; grounding bonds; furred wall; fire alarm/fire sprinkler interface; projection screen circuit; and electrical additions.

This Change Order will be submitted to the Office of Public School Construction, and it is anticipated that the State will fund these changes.

Administration recommends the Board approve Change Order No. 7 on Legal Bid #94/08L/09L for \$30.678.94 with a time extension of 14 days for Peralta Elementary School.

2. Hear and or Approve Other School Facility Matters

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

- ** 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #96-075 for violation of Education Codes 35291 and 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following.
- ** 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #96-076 for violation of Education Codes 35291 and 48900 (a, h & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following.
- ** 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #96-077 for violation of Education Codes 35291 and 48900 (a & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that he be allowed to enroll and participate in the Steps to Success Program operated at the Learning Center.
- ** 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #96-078 for violation of Education Codes 35291 and 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above.

* 2. Adopt Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators

(Mr. Campbell)

Title V Regulation 80026, which went into effect less than two years ago, requires that a document entitled "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" be submitted to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing as a prerequisite to the issuance of any emergency permit for that district. This declaration is one of the new requirements governing the issuance of emergency teaching permits and the orientation, guidance and training of emergency permit holders. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits, particularly to fill partial assignments, specialized areas of instruction such as math and science, or areas of statewide shortage such as bilingual education and special education. An estimate of our needs in 1996-97 is included on the document included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board adopt the Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators for 1996-97.

Mr. Jeff Jacobs, teacher at Nueva Vista High School, is requesting permission to travel to Lone Pine, CA on Thursday, May 16 through Sunday, May 19, 1996 with approximately fourteen (14) students. The purpose of this trip is to introduce students to camping/hiking/star gazing and the study of historical significance of the region, as well as animal and plant life of the Sierra Mountains. Transportation will be by district vehicles and supervision will be provided by staff members. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to attend this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Mr. Jeff Jacobs to travel to Lone Pine, CA on Thursday, May 16 through Sunday, May 19, 1996 with approximately fourteen (14) students.

* 6. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request for Three Secondary Students (Mrs. Roberts)

The Jurupa Unified School District has been invited to send a team of representatives to the "Riverside County Children and Youth Summit" on May 9 and 10, 1996 sponsored by the Board of Supervisors and the Executive Council for Children and Families of Riverside County. The Jurupa Unified School District will field two teams of representatives. Mr. Vail, Dr. Needham and Mr. Hutchins have selected a student from each of their respective high schools to be a part of the two Jurupa teams. The cost of registration, lodging and meals will be paid from a grant to the Youth Summit. Transportation will be provided by adult chaperones.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request for three secondary students to attend the Riverside County Children and Youth Summit. May 9 through May 10, 1996.

Eighth Grade visitations at Mission Middle School are ongoing this week, as the new incoming ninth graders are preparing for high school.

WELCOME TO PACIFIC AVENUE

The Superintendent thanked Pacific Avenue Elementary School Principal, Ms. Donna Henderson for welcoming the Board to Pacific Avenue Elementary School. She noted that a Board meeting has not been held in the Pacific Avenue multipurpose room since the facility was first built six years ago.

Ms. Henderson presented Board members with individualized packets concerning Pacific Avenue Elementary School; she highlighted the school's goal, "Aiming for Success," and listed several "Measures for Success," developed at Pacific Avenue to help "every student achieve success in life by achieving positive self-esteem, academic and physical excellence, and good citizenship." She noted that through training received from teacher, Ms. Ocilla, at lunch and after school, students learn how to resolve conflicts. Ms. Henderson introduced Student Council members to demonstrate for the Board through a skit how students at Pacific Avenue participate in "conflict resolution."

Several Pacific Avenue students effectively demonstrated through a "skit" presentation, how students at Pacific Avenue peacefully resolve their differences. Ms. Henderson noted that this program has really made a difference in the lives of students, and acknowledged that she is very proud of Pacific Avenue student accomplishments.

RECOGNIZE 1995 UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects highlighted Jurupa's 1995 United Way campaign and thanked those employees at each site who served as United Way site coordinators. He introduced Director of Resource Distribution and Planning for United Way, Ms. Mary Ann Stalder, to recognize Jurupa's campaign.

Ms. Mary Ann Stalder acknowledged the generosity of Jurupa's employees in United Way giving, and the Superintendent for her leadership and support of United Way efforts in the district. She thanked district Campaign Coordinator, Mr. Memo Mendez, Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects, and all site coordinators, as noted on the Agenda. Ms. Stalder reported that Jurupa's giving this year totaled approximately \$24,000, an 8% increase over last year's giving. She noted that site coordinators received certificates for their participation, and presented framed certificates to the Superintendent and Mr. Mendez.

HEAR RIVERSIDE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION REPORT The Superintendent introduced Mr. Maurice Hodgen, Executive Director of the Riverside Community Foundation, to present information to the Board concerning permanent trusts created for charitable purposes, primarily in Riverside County, to invest and distribute funds made in the form of a gift. She noted that the Foundation provides an opportunity for members of the community, through the use of a trust fund, to support programs for children that the General Fund cannot support.

Mr. Hodgen outlined the history of the Riverside Community Foundation; he presented his topic, "Funds for Enrichment - The Endowment Concept," and answered the number one question, "What's in it for me?" He emphasized that the moneys received by the Foundation provide "above budget" income for organizations. The funds are permanent, are an attractive focus for a gift, are kept at "arms length" with donor involvement in spending. Mr. Hodgen reviewed the materials distributed to each Board member, which listed the Foundation's annual report; Mission Statements, and the names of donors and how funds are distributed. In response to questions by Mr. Chavez, Mr. Hodgen replied that management fees are estimated at .9%, and added that no gift is too big or too small, as gifts to the Foundation can begin with as little as \$1.00. He recommended that Mr. Chavez speak with Ms. Bonnie Polis of Riverside Unified School District, as a reference for the success and benefits of The Riverside Community Foundation. He explained that funds are used in Riverside for such projects as mock trials, awards for special achievement in academic subjects, etc., as planned by their Advisory Board.

The Superintendent noted that no action is required by the Board at this time as this is an informational Agenda item for review and discussion of the materials presented concerning the Foundation. The Superintendent commented that because the Foundation is independent of the school district, this allows members of the community to give to specific projects such as the arts, scholarships, student special events, etc.

Mr. Hodgen indicated that for seniors, a testamentary gift is sometimes a way to give back to the community, and noted that "great oaks come from little acorns."

President Burns commented that on Page 7 of the Foundation's booklet, the Jurupa Mountain Cultural Center was named as a participant. She indicated that they spoke well of the Foundation.

The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects reviewed the development of the "Passport to College" program, which began with a pilot program for fifth grade students at West Riverside Elementary during the 1994-95 school year. This year, two additional schools joined implementation of the program, Granite Hill and Stone Avenue Elementary Schools, and in the 1996-97 school year, all fifth grade students within the Riverside Community College District are to be included. He introduced John W. Andrews, Vice President, Student Services, Riverside Community College, to present RCC's plan to increase the college-going rate.

Mr. Andrews outlined through the use of an overhead projector and a brief video, the "Passport to College" concept, and the meeting of the two Boards, Riverside Community College District Board and the Jurupa Unified School District Board, through the leadership of RCC's President, Dr. Salvatore Rotella, to discuss a plan to increase the college-going rate. Mr. Andrews listed the 1994-95 and 1995-96 extensive timeline that has been underway at West Riverside Elementary to include planning meetings; parent meetings and correspondence in both Spanish and English, classroom presentations; parent and student visitations to RCC, and many special events to promote college attendance to the fifth grade students and their families.

Mr. Andrews indicated that the concept of the "Passport to College" program is to provide tuition and fees for those fifth grade students in the Riverside Community College District who begin in the program, successfully complete it, and go on to attend Riverside Community College in the year 2004. He estimated the cost of the seven-year programmatic elements at \$1.5 million, to include resource guides for parents and students, journals, targeting underrepresented groups, a comprehensive curriculum for grades 5-12 emphasizing the importance of college attendance, assessment, and family correspondence/workshops. Mr. Andrews was pleased to note that in the start-up phase of the "Passport to College" program, there has been more parent participation than ever anticipated.

Mr. Andrews recognized the Superintendent and the Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects as founding partners of the "Passport to College" program, and thanked them for welcoming and allowing the program to begin in the Jurupa Unified School District. An engraved desk set was presented to both individuals. He noted that due to their cooperative efforts and the "open door" welcome he received from West Riverside Principal, Dr. Ellen Kinnear, and Mr. David Doubravsky, teacher at West Riverside, the "Passport to College" program has been well received.

Mr. Andrews presented to Dr. Ellen Kinnear and Mr. Doubravsky a permanent plaque to display at West Riverside Elementary noting the school as a founding partner and the first school to pilot the "Passport to College" Program. He expressed RCC's gratitude to Dr. Kinnear, Mr. Doubravsky, Mr. David Freeman, teacher on special assignment, through a presentation of engraved desk sets, and thanked fifth grade teachers, Mr. Thomas Buchanan, Mr. Maurice Castro, Ms. Marilyn Martinez, and Mr. Daniel Moore, for their excellent fifth grade students. Mr. Andrews acknowledged that Jurupa Unified School District's staff has been understanding, cooperative and wonderful to work with during the entire process of piloting the program.

ACCEPT DONATIONS -Motion #244

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services requested that the Board accept several donations as listed in the supporting documents.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD ACCEPT THE FOLLOWING DONATIONS WITH LETTERS OF APPRECIATION TO BE SENT: \$1,525.00 FROM THE MISSION BELL PTA TO BE USED FOR MATH MANIPULATIVES AND BOOKS IN THE RIF PROGRAM; \$78.00 FROM MS. SANDERSFELD, OF "IN STITCHES" MIRA LOMA, TO BE USED FOR INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS AT SKY COUNTRY; \$493.00 FROM SKY COUNTRY BOOSTERS AND \$30.00 FROM MR. MUNOZ FOR THE SKY COUNTRY SIXTH GRADE SCIENCE CAMP; \$25.00 FROM BARR'S FURNITURE, \$25.00 FROM CLEANERS PLUS, AND \$50.00 FROM UNION BANK, GLEN AVON, FOR THE VOLUNTEER READING PROGRAM AT STONE AVENUE; A ZENITH COMPUTER W/EQUIPMENT (VALUE UNDETERMINED) FROM THE NAVAL WARFARE ASSESSMENT DIVISION OF CORONA, FOR JURUPA MIDDLE SCHOOL. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS AND WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS The Superintendent stated that she was asked by the Riverside County Board of Supervisors to form two teams in Jurupa to participate in the upcoming Riverside County Children & Youth Summit, May 9 and 10, a collaborative effort to build networks of support to benefit children, youth and families in our County. She explained that Jurupa's team is comprised of individuals from the YMCA, the Youth Service Center, the Family Service Association, the PTA, the high schools, and district office administrators.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS AND WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS (CONTD) The Superintendent noted that the law offices of Best, Best & Krieger provided grant funds to partially fund Jurupa's team. The cost is \$150.00 per person, which includes registration, meals and hotel expenses. The Superintendent asked for representation on the team of one or two Board members. Mr. Chavez agreed to represent the Board on Jurupa's team at the Riverside County Children & Youth Summit.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

President Burns opened the Public Verbal Comments section as an opportunity for citizens to address the Board.

COMMENT: EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS Ms. Stephanie Dingman, teacher at Sky Country Elementary, noted that April is "Earthquake Preparedness Month," and expressed her grave concern for the safety of over 700 children at Sky Country Elementary, as, she stated, "Sky Country Elementary does not have a Disaster Preparedness Plan." She noted that the informal complaint procedure was followed concerning this matter.

COMMENT: DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Ms. Betty Ast, teacher at Sky Country Elementary, restated the concern of the former speaker, Ms. Dingman, that Sky Country Elementary School does not have a Disaster Preparedness Plan. She noted that she also brought this concern to the attention of district administrators.

COMMENT: RHS BAND

Mr. Harold Glick, proud Rubidoux High School band parent, thanked the Board for voting to allow the Rubidoux High School band to travel to Europe to perform. He expressed is enthusiasm, support and appreciation for the program and noted that he will return with a follow-up report once the band returns.

BOARD MEMBER
REPORTS & COMMENTS

Ms. Hanke thanked Pacific Avenue Principal, Ms. Donna Henderson, for her hospitality and great "Conflict Resolution" skit performed by students. She noted that the program is similar to the Peace Builders Program.

Ms. Hanke asked for the name of the person to contact concerning earthquake preparedness in the district?

The Superintendent noted that Ms. Jana Twombley, Pupil Services Assistant, is the individual handling the district's Disaster Preparedness. She noted that Ms. Twombley has been ill for several months.

Mr. Chavez thanked Pacific Avenue Principal, Ms. Donna Henderson, for her hospitality. He thanked Mr. Andrews, Mr. Hodgen and Ms. Stalder for their outstanding presentations. Mr. Chavez complimented the Parks District on their new facility at Avalon Park. He commended the Los Angeles Music Center Education Division Programs for their very worthwhile functions, and noted that he plans to attend a program offered by the Center on June 9, 1996. Mr. Chavez submitted a copy of the "CSBA Policy Platform, 1996 Revisions," to reproduce and distribute for Board members.

Mr. Knight complimented the Rubidoux High School representative for reporting on campus activities. He acknowledged Pacific Avenue Principal, Ms. Donna Henderson, for her magnificent presentation, and the Pacific Avenue students for their demonstration through a skit, the "conflict resolution" process. Mr. Knight asked for the number of students that manage the program each day.

Ms. Henderson responded that each day, four students are present on the playground to resolve conflicts, along with other students that are being trained in the process.

Mr. Knight commended Mr. John Andrews for the "Passport to College" presentation, and Dr. Ellen Kinnear and her staff for piloting the program at West Riverside Elementary. He noted that the program provides a significant benefit for Jurupa's students and has a tremendous impact on the community. Mr. Knight thanked Mr. Maurice Hodgen for the information concerning foundations, and noted that administrative staff will follow through on the concerns expressed regarding a Disaster Preparedness Plan at Sky Country Elementary.

President Burns agreed with the accolades given to the community by her colleagues, and thanked Pacific Avenue Principal, Ms. Donna Henderson, for the packet of materials presented to each Board member.

Mr. Knight encouraged the community to visit and support the beautiful, new Avalon Park facility.

APPROVE MINUTES -Motion #245

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING APRIL 1, 1996. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE TERMINATION OF RIDESIIARE PROGRAM -Motion #246 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services remarked that following the district's submittal of an updated Rideshare Program to AQMD for approval, notification was received that school districts are no longer required to participate in the Rideshare Program. He noted that although the Program could be terminated immediately, in the best interest of employees that may have planned for the Rideshare Program to be in effect, the request is being made to allow a period of notification to employees and to terminate the program as of June 30, 1996, which will provide a savings of approximately \$17,780.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE TERMINATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT'S RIDESHARE PROGRAM EFFECTIVE JUNE 30, 1996 AND DIRECT THAT APPROPRIATE NOTICE BE GIVEN TO EMPLOYEES AT THE RIDESHARE SITES. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION. President 1 urns asked for the number of district vehicles allocated to the Rideshare Program. The Assistant Superintendent indicated that approximately 5-6 cars are currently in use. President Burns asked if the Rideshare vehicles could be sold in order to purchase a new van for field trips? Ms. Hanke asked what the cars will be used for once the Rideshare Program is discontinued, and wondered if they might be used by the auto shop classes at each high school? The Superintendent issued a brief history of the vehicles used in the Rideshare Program; explained that the \$17,780 savings is a result of the district no longer having to provide incentives for the Program as well as insurance for the vehicles, and noted that due to the sudden change in AQMD requirements, a recommendation to the Board for the use of the vehicles has not been discussed. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE 1996 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM -Motion #247 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services commented that this is an annual Agenda item to plan for the upcoming Summer School schedule. He indicated that the district receives funding for Summer School for only 7% of its enrollment. Therefore, Summer School is only offered at the high school level, with priority placed first at the 12th grade level, to make certain that students meet their graduation requirements. The Assistant Superintendent noted that Rubidoux High School Summer School will be conducted on the Mission Middle School campus due to extensive landscape work that will occur on the Rubidoux High School campus. He thanked NEA-J President, Ms. Francine Rice-Laabs, for her assistance in establishing a workable agreement with teachers for this move.

APPROVE 1996 SUMMER SCHOOL **PROGRAM** -Motion #247 (CONTD)

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE 1996 SUMMER SCHOOL OFFERINGS AS PRESENTED. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION. Ms. Hanke questioned the difference in instructional days at Jurupa Valley High and Rubidoux High School. The Assistant Superintendent replied that after working on the schedule with Ms. Rice-Laabs, the days were adjusted to make certain that instructional minutes will be equal at both high schools. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE INTENT TO SUBMIT HOMELESS **EDUCATION GRANT** -Motion #248

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that this is the third year that a request has been presented to the Board to submit the Homeless Education Grant. He explained that this year's application includes the addition of Mira Loma Middle School, at the request of Principal, Ms. Diana Asseier. The Assistant Superintendent noted that Mira Loma Middle School qualifies for inclusion in the grant, as several of its students reside in homes with 2-3 families living in a singlefamily dwelling.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE INTENT TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION FOR THE STEWART MCKINNEY HOMELESS EDUCATION GRANT. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE SUPPLEMENTAL. **TEXTBOOKS** -Motion #249

As a last step in the procedure for the Board to approve the use of four supplemental textbooks, the Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects requested the Board's adoption of Freak the Mighty; Fuel Systems and Emissions Control; The Egypt Game and Rifles for Watie. He noted that the books completed the required display at the IMC and the Libraries, and the supporting documents contain a description of each textbook.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE FOR ADOPTION AS SUPPLEMENTAL TEXTBOOKS, "FREAK THE MIGHTY," "FUEL SYSTEMS AND EMISSIONS CONTROL," "THE EGYPT GAME," AND "RIFLES FOR WATIE." MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE NEW HIGH **SCHOOL COURSE: ELECTRONIC MUSIC** & VOCAL LAB -Motion #250

The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects stated that the staff at Jurupa Valley High requested this new course, "Electronic Music & Vocal Lab." It is expected that the course will only be offered at Jurupa Valley High. He noted that the course plan is included in the supporting documents.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL COURSE, ELECTRONIC MUSIC & VOCAL LAB, AS DESCRIBED IN THE SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION. Ms. Hanke asked that if Rubidoux High School students wish to take the course, will they be transported to Jurupa Valley High School? The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects replied that students will not be transported, they must be enrolled at Jurupa Valley High in order to take the class. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

OF TWO BUSES -Motion #251

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that in order to accommodate the transportation needs for Peralta Elementary School, two new buses are needed. an 84-passenger bus and a 20-passenger minibus. He amended the annotation to read that the repaired 1978 minibus should only be used as a backup, and will not continue to operate full-time. The Assistant Superintendent noted that the Beaumont Unified and the Bret-Harte Union School District bids will be utilized at a cost of \$36,000 for the mini-bus and \$87,547 for the 84-passenger bus.

OF TWO BUSES -Motion #251 (CONT'D)

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #89666 TO A-Z BUS SALES, INC., IN THE AMOUNT OF \$123,396,38 TO PAY FOR THE PURCHASE OF TWO BUSES. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION. President Burns asked the Assistant Superintendent if he had an opportunity to inquire concerning AQMD's air incentive program? He responded affirmatively, and noted that the district is not in a position to participate in the program as the cost for a natural gas or electric bus is significantly higher, and the AOMD requires that a bus must be placed out of service when it is replaced with the energy-efficient bus; the district is not in a position to do this. President Burns asked if the AOMD would allow the smaller bus to be put out of service? The Assistant Superintendent Business Services indicated that it is not clear whether districts can choose which bus can be taken out of service; however, it would still remain cost prohibitive, as AQMD's timeline of February, 1997, would not meet the need for additional buses to open Peralta Elementary.

> President Burns inquired whether the bus that is planned for use as a backup may be utilized for other student uses, such as for field trips? The Assistant Superintendent replied that this is a possibility to consider which he will discuss with the Director of Transportation; however, the driver would be required to have a Class A License to use the bus for field trips. President Burns noted that this could be a problem; however, she asked that he investigate her request for informational purposes. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE OF PERALTA **FURNITURE** -Motion # 252

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that it is now time to purchase furniture for Peralta Elementary School through the state-funded furniture and equipment allocation. He noted that the 1993 Chino Unified School District bid prices can be utilized for the furniture, which comply with the OPSC requirements, at a cost of \$17,474.70.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASING DEPARTMENT TO UTILIZE THE PIGGY-BACK CLAUSE OF PUBLIC CONTRACT CODE 20118 TO PURCHASE THE FURNITURE NEEDED FOR PERALTA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND TO ISSUE PURCHASE ORDER #89670 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$17.474.70 TO VIRCO MANUFACTURING TO COVER THIS TRANSACTION. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE OF 8 PORTABLES FOR 1996-97 SCHOOL YEAR -Motion #253

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that as the district plans for the 1996-97 school year, several portable classrooms may be needed in various locations throughout the district. He noted that although it is difficult to be definite on the exact number needed and their locations, several sites and funding possibilities are being investigated: Rustic Lane, paid for from Title I funds; the MOT, paid for from Food Service and developer fee funds; the Learning Center, paid for from alternative program funding; and Troth Street Elementary, paid for from developer fees or redevelopment revenue. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services commented that although this is somewhat of a preliminary step, the Board's latitude is being requested in order to anticipate and move on portable classroom needs, at a cost of \$25,000 to \$30,000 per unit for the beginning of school.

OF 8 PORTABLES FOR 1996-97 SCHOOL YEAR -Motion #253 (CONTD)

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASE OF UP TO EIGHT PORTABLE CLASSROOMS. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION. President Burns stated that at \$25,000 to \$30,000 per portable classroom, a difference of \$5,000 per unit could add up to a \$40,000 difference, which is a significant amount. She asked for the amount of the purchase that must come before the Board for approval? The Assistant Superintendent Business Services responded that amounts over \$12,000 must be brought before the Board, and if she so desired, he could bring this item back to the Board when a final determination is made. President Burns stated that she felt the difference was rather high; however, she did not wish to hold up the district from being ready for the upcoming school year. The Assistant Superintendent assured her that the district would seek the least expensive units to be paid for out of restricted funds, developer fees and redevelopment revenue. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AUTHORIZATION TO SOLICIT BIDS FOR FUEL TANKS -Motion #254

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that the district is required to replace three fuel tanks at the MOT with new double walled fuel tanks in order to comply with State and Federal Regulations, at an estimated cost of \$125,000. He noted that it is in the best interest of the district to replace the tanks this summer, rather than waiting for a date closer to the deadline, since prices have already increased by \$25,000 since the original estimate was received.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE STAFF TO SOLICIT BIDS FOR THE REPLACEMENT OF THE UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS AT THE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION. President Burns asked if there are any existing leaks? The Assistant Superintendent Business Services replied that leaks have not been detected through the measuring device that is used. A VOTE WAS TAKEN WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

CONSIDER REPLACEMENT OF RHS MOBILE HOME -Motion #255

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services noted that the mobile home purchased for the watchman at Rubidoux High School, at a cost of \$14,000 approximately 2-3 years ago, has developed several problems and it is more cost effective to replace the unit instead of continuing to administer repairs. He noted that the cost for a used replacement unit is estimated at \$15,000.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD AUTHORIZE PURCHASING A REPLACEMENT MOBILE HOME FOR THE WATCHMAN AT RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mr. Chavez asked if an evaluation of the Watchman Program has been performed to determine if it continues to be successful.

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services noted that a formal evaluation of the program has not occurred; however, principals have commented that there has been a reduction in vandalism and it has become almost non-existent.

President Burns commented that several very positive remarks have been made by those involved in the Agriculture Program at Jurupa Valley High School since the implementation of the mobile home and the live-in watchman.

Mr. Chavez requested an evaluation of the program prior to approving the purchase of a replacement mobile home for the watchman at Rubidoux High School, and a postponement of the item until the next Board meeting.

Following the Board's direction, the Superintendent submitted the motion for further study to include an evaluation of the effectiveness of the mobile home in providing security for the agriculture programs at both comprehensive high schools. The motion will be brought back for appropriate action at the next Board meeting.

This course will focus on the history and cultures of Mexican-American and Chicano people, both within and outside the Unified States. It is intended for students of all backgrounds and cultures. Students will examine the paths that led to the formation of the Chicano culture by analyzing ancient civilizations and studying the creation of a new civilization that came about from the European conquest. Through a humanistics approach, using literature, art, poetry, dance, drama, music, and video, students will establish links between historical, contemporary, and personal events. Chicano figures will be recognized for their contributions to Chicano legacy and American culture. Students will develop an awareness of how American society is and has been pluralistic and multicultural. Students will ultimately develop an appreciation and greater understanding for the richness and diversity of our society.
