b. Adopt Resolution 97/16, Commitment to a Drug-Free Community

(Mr. Taylor)

Californians for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. (CADFY) and the State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs have announced that its annual California RED RIBBON CELEBRATION will be held October 23 - October 31, 1996.

Other sponsors include the State Department of Education, the California Parent-Teacher Association and the Attorney General's Crime Prevention Center.

In 1985, Federal Agent Enrique Camarena was murdered by drug traffickers and the Red Ribbon Celebration was begun in support of a drug-free nation. The red ribbon is a visible support for the value "Be Healthy and Drug Free." The Red Ribbon Celebration provides the framework for a positive prevention strategy.

The Jurupa Unified School District and school site PTA groups plan to coordinate a program encouraging employees and community members to wear a red ribbon during this week as visible support for a drug-free community.

This is an opportunity to create districtwide positive peer pressure, provide educational drug-free activities and engage community support. All school sites have personalized Red Ribbon Week objectives in support of this campaign. A copy of Resolution 97/16 is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution 97/16. Commitment to a Drug-Free Community.

* B. Approve Creation of the Jurupa Educational Enrichment Fund, A Donor Advised Fund in the Riverside Community Foundation (Mrs. Roberts)

For many years, school districts across the county have created local foundations to raise extra money to fund programs and projects which are beyond the scope of district budgets. A foundation is a plan which is established to receive gifts and donations from persons, businesses and organizations, and to distribute funds to appropriate educational programs. Donations and gifts are typically invested and then money is distributed to related programs from the interest earned, although money can also be distributed from the principal in some cases. Jurupa Unified School District could choose to set up an independent foundation to accomplish this, but there are numerous legal requirements to establish, operate and maintain such a foundation as a non-profit agency, and it is a complicated, time-consuming process.

* B. <u>Approve Creation of the Jurupa Educational Enrichment Fund, A Donor Advised Fund in the Riverside Community Foundation</u> (Cont'd) (Mrs. Roberts)

The Riverside Community Foundation, which was introduced to the Board on April 15, 1996 by Executive Director, Mr. Maurice Hodgen, was established in 1941 as a non-profit organization to receive permanent gifts and to distribute earnings in the form of grants for charitable purposes. The Foundation now has assets of over sixteen million dollars held in nearly 40 separate funds, each established for specific purposes. One of these funds is a Donor Advised Fund called Riverside Educational Enrichment Fund, and established for the benefit of projects and programs within the Riverside Unified School District. This fund, created over three years ago, now distributes several thousand dollars annually in the form of mini-grants to staff and students for worthy educational projects selected by the Fund's own Fund Advisory Board.

Supportive individuals and the Jurupa Unified School District can solicit funds and begin a similar fund with the Riverside Community Foundation. The advantages to the District are:

- The Riverside Community Foundation is already established as a non-profit organization and has the knowledge and resources to manage permanent funds for a very low fee (about 0.9%) and extensive experience in grant administration.
- A Donor Advised Fund with the Riverside Community Foundation for Jurupa Unified School District relieves the district of the need for the district to separately establish and maintain a non-profit foundation.
- Donors will willingly support an endowment for enrichment projects that are otherwise not available without the existence of an independently managed endowment.
- The Riverside Community Foundation handles all transactions and responds to the recommendations of the specific Fund Advisory Board set up by the contributing agency, in this case, a separate broadly representative board created within the Jurupa Unified School District to solicit funds and make recommendations for distribution of earnings.

Dr. Ron Needham has been given the responsibility for follow-up on this matter and has worked with the Riverside Community Foundation Executive Director to establish a Donor Advised Fund. This fund requires the creation of a Fund Advisory Board. The agreement is included in the supporting documents.

The Administration recommends that the Jurupa Unified School District enter into an agreement with the Riverside Community Foundation to establish a Donor Advised Fund to be called the Jurupa Educational Enrichment Fund.

C. Adopt Resolution #97/17, Authorizing Application for Class Size Reduction Program
 Funds
 (Mr. Edmunds)

The 1996/1997 State Budget Act provides incentive funding for a Class Size Reduction Program to lower class sizes to 20 students or fewer in grades K-3. The Budget Act appropriated \$771 million for this program, and specific implementation language is contained in SB 1777 (Ed. Code 52120 et. seq.).

C. Adopt Resolution #97/17, Authorizing Application for Class Size Reduction Program Funds (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

The Class Size Reduction Program provides two options for funding the operations side of class size reductions. School districts may apply for Option One, which provides full funding of \$650 per pupil enrolled in a class that does not exceed 20; or Option Two, which provides 1/2 funding of \$325 per pupil for students enrolled in reduced size classes for only 1/2 of the instructional minutes offered per day. The legislation sets grade level priorities for implementing reduced class sizes. At each school site, if only one grade level is implemented, it must be first grade. Once all first grade classes are reduced, second grade classes may be reduced and finally, if three grade levels are implemented, either kindergarten or third grade may be included in the program after both first and second grade class sizes have been reduced. The application for the Class Size Reduction Program is due November 1, 1996.

Board members may recall that on September 3, 1996, the Board authorized an application for Class Size Reduction Facilities Funding for up to 40 additional classrooms in the Option One program. Since that time, principals and District administrative staff have been developing a specific class by class implementation plan to reduce class size for first grade districtwide. The District's class size reduction implementation plan is to reduce class sizes in first grade this year, second grade in 1997/1998, and kindergarten in 1998/1999. Kindergarten was selected as the third grade for implementation because most research suggests that student achievement is enhanced by lower class sizes at this grade level (as opposed to grade 3).

Although the goal for the current year is to implement first grade class size reduction districtwide, there will be a number of second grade students in reduced size classes as well. This is because in order to house all first graders in reduced size classes and optimize funding, it is necessary at a number of schools to form combination classes with first and second grade students.

In addition, second grade class sizes will be reduced where space and staffing allow. At Camino Real Elementary School, 3 second grade classes will operate with 20 students or less. At Peralta Elementary School, enough vacant classrooms are available to fully implement reduced size classes for kindergarten, as well as first and second grades.

Districtwide, there will be 78 first grade classes, 11 first/second grade combination classes, 6 second grade classes and 2 kindergarten classes in the Reduced Class Size Program. The estimated revenue that will be received by the District for the operations funding is \$1,233,700. Administration estimates that 38 new teachers will be required to implement the program for 1996/1997, at an estimated cost of \$1,459,200. In addition, classroom teacher furniture, maps and globes, and teacher edition textbook materials will cost about \$114,000, for a total estimated program cost of \$1,573,200. The total unfunded cost for the Class Size Reduction Operations Program is estimated to be \$339,500. This estimated unfunded cost will be paid from the District's general fund.

It should be emphasized that the figures presented here coincide with the application for the Class Size Reduction Operational funding; however, the intent of the application at this point in time is simply to provide the State with an estimate of program funding so that the State can begin to plan for the release of program funds. The District's actual program certification date is not until February 1, 1997, and the figures presented here may change due to enrollment growth or shifting enrollment patterns. Final State funding will be determined by filing a year-end enrollment certification by May 1, 1997.

* C. Adopt Resolution #97/17, Authorizing Application for Class Size Reduction Program Funds (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

The Education Code contains certain conditions which school districts must comply with in order to receive Class Size Reduction funding. By authorizing the Class Size Reduction application and adopting Resolution #97/17 in the supporting documents, the Board certifies that the following conditions have been met:

- 1. The number of classes on the application form is correctly identified;
- 2. The pupil counts on the application do not include SDC students, Independent Study or Home Study students, and pupil counts are based on enrollment as of October 10 of the previous year;
- 3. Each class reported on the application will not have more than 20 pupils; and the District has, or will have, a certificated teacher for each class;
- 4. The District intends to maintain class sizes of not more than 20 pupils per class contained in the application.
- 5. The District will implement a staff development program for any teacher participating in the Class Size Reduction Program. The training shall include methods for: (a) individual instruction; (b) effective teaching, including classroom management in small classes; (c) identifying and responding to student needs and (d) opportunities to build on the individual strengths of the pupils.
- 6. The District will collect and maintain data required by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for evaluation of the Class Size Reduction Program.
- 7. For the 1997/1998 and subsequent school years, each reduced size class will be housed either in a separate self-contained classroom, or the average square footage per pupil enrolled in reduced classes is not less than existed in the 1995/1996 school year.
- 8. The priority for reducing class sizes at each site will be first priority for first grade, second priority for second grade and third priority for kindergarten or third grade. No more than 3 grade levels per school will be reduced.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #97/17, A Resolution of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District Authorizing An Application for Funding Under the 1996/1997 Class Size Reduction Program.

* D. Affirm Submittal of 1996-97 Vocational Education Application

(Mr. Méndez)

The district has received Vocational Education funding for high school programs for several years. The current application is for the sixth year of vocational education funds per our previously state approved Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Education Act grant. This application entitles the district to \$86,780 under Title II, Part C. A copy of the application and budget is included in the supporting documents. The timeline for submittal of the application conflicted with Board Agenda preparation deadlines and, therefore, had to be submitted prior to receiving Board approval.

Administration recommends that the Board of Education affirm submittal of the application for sixth year funding of the 1996-97 Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Education Act funds.

(Mr. Méndez)

E. Appointment to Fill Mentor Teacher Vacancy

A Mentor Teacher vacancy occurred as a result of the promotion of Lucinda Kane to Assistant Principal at Jurupa Middle School. The district has been allocated funds for this position to provide assistance to new teachers during the 1996-97 school year.

The Board has the authority to make an appointment to fill this vacancy. Mr. Pat Thompson, teacher at Rubidoux High School, has indicated his willingness to serve in this assignment. He previously served as a Mentor Teacher in the area of U. S. History and Independent Study during the 1992-93 school year. He has also been a Master Teacher for student teachers and has worked with the Comprehensive Teacher Institute (CTEI) program.

Administration recommends the appointment of Mr. Pat Thompson to fill the Mentor Teacher vacancy to provide assistance to new teachers for the 1996-97 school year.

F. <u>Authorize Agreement with Utility Resource Management Group for Consulting Services</u> Related to Public Utilities Rate Monitoring and Refunds (Mr. Edmunds)

One of the major annual expenditures of the District is for utilities, including natural gas, electricity, and telephone.

The rate tariffs established for each of the utilities are very technical in nature and require experts to analyze them to be sure that the proper rate is being charged. Most consumers can only recheck the arithmetic and make sure that the beginning and ending readings are correct. A popular misconception is that the public utility is required to offer the lowest rate or that they will monitor the rates and alert the consumer that they are eligible for a lower rate.

In recent years, several consulting companies have formed to address the problem and to advise clients of the various options available in rates, and also to assist clients in obtaining refunds of improperly applied rates. The administration has interviewed two such companies. They are Eddy and Associates of Upland, CA and Utility Resource Management Group of Newport Beach, CA. Both companies utilize computer programs to assist in determining the proper rate tariff and to determine if any refunds are due from past billings. The administration feels that Utility Resource Management Group is best suited to offer the District assistance in obtaining any refunds due and in ongoing monitoring of future billings to insure that the District is not "bumped" into an inappropriate rate tariff.

Utility Resource Management Group has offered an agreement that includes a structured fee schedule which is based upon cumulative savings and which corresponds to roughly fifty percent of the savings. URM has tentatively identified approximately \$40,000 in refunds due the District based on a review of recent utility billings. The proposed agreement is for five years, but includes a guarantee clause that allows for cancellation by the District if the retained savings, based on current rates, falls below \$25,000 per year.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize entering into an Agreement with Utility Resource Management Group for services related to public utility rate monitoring.

Change Order #9 for Peralta Elementary School is for an addition to the construction contract in the amount of \$25,516.63, for the following items:

1) Additional Doors and Louvers; 2) additional mesh and flex patch; 3) additional fire extinguishers; 4) provide interior ramp handrails; 5) replace electric breaker trip units; 6) foundation flashing at ramp; 7) add speaker and lights at library; 8) add floor vent; 9) add guardrails; 10) additional fire alarm devices; 11) add GFI circuits; and 12) add floor joist bracing.

A copy of Change Order #9 is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends that the Board approve Change Order #9 on Legal Bid #94/08L/09L for Peralta Elementary School in the amount of \$25.516.63

5. Award Bid #97/04L for Asphalt Improvements Work at Peralta and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools (Mr. Edmunds)

At the September 3, 1996 Board meeting, the Board authorized the solicitation of bids for asphalt work at Rustic Lane and Peralta Elementary Schools. This work is necessary due to the portable classroom relocation at Rustic Lane Elementary School and the unfinished, and potentially unsafe, strip of asphalt at the perimeter of the Peralta Elementary School property that bounds Riverview Drive.

The Purchasing Department delivered bidding documents to four prospective bidders. The bids were received and publicly opened on October 8, 1996. A re-cap of the bids received appears below.

Administration recommends the Board award Bid 96/04L to Mission Paving and Sealing in the amount of \$32,082 and authorize the issuance of Purchase Order #92722 for asphalt work at Peralta and Rustic Lane Elementary Schools.

G. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters (Cont'd)

6. Authorize Solicitation of Bids for the Renovation of Sky Country Playground

(Mr. Edmunds)

Sky Country Elementary School was the first new school on which the district used rubber matting on the playground. After more than a dozen years of use, the playground matting is badly deteriorated and needs to be replaced. Normally, when playground matting is replaced, the District redesigns the playground to eliminate unwanted equipment, to ensure handicapped access compliance, and to minimize extensive use of very expensive playground matting material.

The proposed renovation of the Sky Country playground will involve the following:

- Replace playground matting in the kindergarten area;
- Remove play equipment that represents a potential falling hazard for students, such as horizontal bars, rings, monkey bars, etc.;
- Cut out asphalt under the swing set and replace with sand;
- Install a new playground play structure, similar to the one at Peralta Elementary School, over sand.

Handicapped access to the swing set and playground structure will be provided by rubberized playground matting landings to each piece of equipment.

The estimated cost of renovating the Sky Country playground is \$50,000, which will be paid from the district's Redevelopment Fund.

Administration recommends the Board authorize solicitation of bids for the renovation of Sky Country Elementary School playground.

7. <u>Authorize Agreement with Kendall/Adams Group for Consulting Services Related to Suspected Underground Contamination</u> (Mr. Edmunds)

During the removal and replacement of the fuel tanks at the Maintenance Yard, testing by an independent laboratory determined that underground contamination of soil had occurred, that the contamination extended to the depth of the water table, and that the ground water may have been affected.

During the course of the removal and replacement of the tanks, all of the contaminated soil was excavated, removed from the site, and later thermally treated. Thermal treatment was chosen because it renders the soil free of all of the type of contamination detected, and allows it to be returned to the environment, rather than being stockpiled in a hazardous materials landfill.

Environmental regulations require that the suspected ground water contamination be investigated, and if necessary, remediated by a licensed professional. The investigation includes the preparation of an approved work plan, the installation of a ground water monitoring well and drilling for soil samples to determine the extent of contamination. If contamination is confirmed, the regulations require that the remediation be supervised by a properly licensed professional.

7. <u>Authorize Agreement with Kendall/Adams Group for Consulting Services Related to Suspected Underground Contamination</u> (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

Administration has interviewed four geo-environmental Consultants. The consultants were interviewed regarding their experience, methodology relative to the contamination at the Maintenance Yard, and fees. Administration feels that Kendall/Adams Group is best suited to offer the District the comprehensive services necessary to investigate the suspected contamination and to produce the work plan that will enable the remediation of any ground water contamination found to be present.

Administration recommends the Board authorize entering into an agreement with the Kendall/Adams Group for services related to underground soils and water contamination.

8. Hear and or Approve Other School Facility Matters

(Mrs. Roberts)

Resolution #97/16 Commitment to a Drug-Free Community

- WHEREAS, Alcohol and other drug abuse has reached epidemic stages in the Unifed States; and,
- WHEREAS, It is imperative that community members launch visible substance abuse prevention education efforts to reduce the demand for drugs; and,
- WHEREAS, California for Drug-Free Youth, Inc. is coordinating the California Red Ribbon Celebration in cooperation with the National Red Ribbon Campaign to offer our citizens the opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to drug-free lifestyles; and,

Ms. Linda Gonzales, Jurupa Chapter Chair for the Mexican American Political Association, thanked the Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education for placing on the Adenda a resolution in opposition to Proposition 209, following M.A.P.A.'s formal request at the September 16, 1996 Board meeting. ACCEPT GRANT AWARD FOR GRANITE HILL'S ASTRO READING PROGRAM -Motion #88 The Superintendent stated that several weeks ago, she announced that notification was received indicating that Granite Hill Elementary was selected to receive \$15,000 through the Academic Volunteer and Mentor Service Grant. The Governor's office has since contacted the district and requested that the Board formally accept the grant funds so that they may proceed with their timelines. She congratulated Granite Hill Principal, Ms. Michelle Johnson, for submitting the grant application and providing an opportunity for her school to become a model for other schools to follow. The Superintendent noted that the decision of the Board will be FAXed to the Governor's office tomorrow.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD ACCEPT THE GRANITE HILL ELEMENTARY ACADEMIC VOLUNTEER AND MENTOR SERVICE GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$15,000.00. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION. WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT AT 2ND READING, BOARD POLICY #6400, SATURDAY STUDY/ DETENTION PROGRAM -Motion #89 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that at the last Board meeting, a first reading of this Policy was approved; at this time the Board is being asked to adopt Board Policy and Regulation 6400, "Saturday Study/Detention Program" at second reading.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT AT SECOND READING BOARD POLICY AND REGULATION 6400, "SATURDAY STUDY/DETENTION PROGRAM." MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT AT 2ND READING BOARD POLICY #6600, "GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ADULT SCHOOL -Motion #90

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services asked for the Board's approval at second reading, Board Policy and Regulation 6600, "Graduation Requirements for Adult School," following their review of the Policy at the September 16, 1996 Board meeting.

PRESIDENT BURNS MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT AT SECOND READING BOARD POLICY AND REGULATION 6600, "GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ADULT SCHOOL." MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE SUBMITTAL OF GRANT AGREEMENT -Motion #91 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that based on the October 1996 CBEDS count, districts are eligible to apply for AB 3482 funding to inservice K-3 teachers and provide core reading materials through the Teacher Reading Instruction Development Program. Together with the funds received for Class Size Reduction and School Site Block grants, AB 3482 is a further step to improve the early acquisition of literacy for students in grades K-3. The Assistant Superintendent Education Services noted that Board members will receive invitations to the inservice meetings.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE SUBMITTAL OF AB 3482 FOR TEACHER READING INSTRUCTION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FUNDS. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AFFIRM SUBMITTAL OF PRESERVICE READING PARTNERSHIPS GRANT PROPOSAL -Motion #92 The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects stated that due to the September 13 deadline, the Board is being asked to affirm the submittal of a Preservice Reading Partnerships Grant proposal for Jurupa, along with other districts in the RIMS region, to form a partnership with a consortium of three institutes of higher learning, Cal Baptist, Cal State San Bernardino and UC Riverside. Grant funds requested (\$158,980) will provide for increased preparation, connection and support for beginning teachers.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD AFFIRM SUBMITTAL OF AN APPLICATION FOR THE PRESERVICE READING PARTNERSHIPS GRANT. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

ADOPT REVISED REG. #3510, HOME-SCHOOL BUS RIDING ELIGIBILITY -Motion #93 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that as Board members are aware, Board Policy 3510 determines the eligibility of students to receive transportation by the distance that they live from the school. For students in grades K-8, the distance must be at least one mile and for students in grades 9-12 the distance must be at least two miles. He noted that at this time, the request is for two bus riding eligibility exceptions to be added at Ave. Juan Diaz and Moraga for Peralta and Jurupa Road and Camino Real for Jurupa Middle, as noted on the updated list in the supporting documents.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE REVISED REGULATION 3510, "HOME-SCHOOL BUS RIDING ELIGIBILITY. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE REVISED REG. #3520, BUS STOP LOCATIONS -Motion #94 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services stated that Board Policy 3520 compliments Board Policy 3510, as it determines that the location of bus stops cannot be closer that three miles for students in grades 9-12; two miles for students in grades 7 and 8, and one mile for students in grades K-6. He noted that the last bus stop location exceptions approved by the Board occurred on October 3, 1994; since that time provisional stops are needed at Etiwanda and 50th and Lindsay and Mission Boulevard to reduce the number of students getting on at one bus stop.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE REVISED REGULATION #3520, BUS STOP LOCATIONS. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT FOR CAL TRANS -Motion #95 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services announced that Cal Trans has engaged in a project to construct high occupancy vehicle lanes and sound walls between Valley Way and the I-215 freeway. They have offered the district \$1,350.00 to place a temporary easement on the back of the Mission Middle school property with construction beginning on January 1, 1997. He indicated that the length and width of the easement is noted in the supporting documents.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE TEMPORARY EASEMENT FOR CAL TRANS TO CONSTRUCT A SOUND WALL ALONG THE BACK SIDE OF MISSION MIDDLE SCHOOL. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Mr. Knight asked to be briefly excused from the Board meeting.

APPROVE NOC, REPLACEMENT OF FUEL TANKS AT MOT -Motion #96 PRESIDENT BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE NOTICE OF COMPLETION FOR REPLACEMENT OF FUEL TANKS AT THE MAINTENANCE, OPERATIONS AND TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT - BID #96/11L. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY, 3-0.

APPROVE NOC, RHS STADIUM LIGHTING RETROFIT -Motion #97 PRESIDENT BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE NOTICE OF COMPLETION FOR THE RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL STADIUM LIGHTING RETROFIT-ESA #1. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY, 3-0.

APPROVE NOC, AIR CONDITIONING AT MMS -Motion #98 PRESIDENT BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE NOTICE OF COMPLETION FOR REPLACEMENT OF AIR CONDITIONING EQUIPMENT AT MISSION MIDDLE SCHOOL - BID #97/01L. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY, 3-0.

Mr. Knight returned and again took his seat to vote for the next Agenda item.

APPROVE IRRIGATION WATER AGREEMENTS W/JCSD -Motion #99 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services commented that at the September 3, 1996 meeting, the Board considered an agreement from the Jurupa Community Services District to provide irrigation water for three schools. At that time, there was a concern about the possibility of the irrigation system becoming inoperative and the district having to pay for irrigation water at a higher cost during that time. He noted that as per the Board's request, the agreements are being brought back with added language indicating that the cost for an alternative source of irrigation water if the Irrigation System becomes inoperative for more than 48 hours be at the current non-potable water rates (see supporting documents, paragraph 4.4).

APPROVE IRRIGATION WATER AGREEMENTS W/JCSD -Motion #99 (CONTD) PRESIDENT BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE AGREEMENTS WITH JURUPA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT TO PROVIDE IRRIGATION WATER FOR INDIAN HILLS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, SUNNYSLOPE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND NUEVA VISTA HIGH SCHOOL. MS. HANKE SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AWARD CONTRACT TO UPGRADE RHS BLEACHERS -Motion #100 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services reported that on September 3, 1996 the Board also authorized the solicitation of bids for upgrades to the Rubidoux High School bleachers for handicapped accessibility compliance. He noted that one bid was received from Herk Edwards, Inc., the sole distributor, in the amount of \$25,310.00, which is less than the estimated cost previously presented to the Board.

MS. HANKE MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #92367 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$25,310.00 TO AWARD A CONTRACT TO HERK EDWARDS, INC. OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, FOR UPGRADES TO THE TELESCOPIC BLEACHERS AT RUBIDOUX HIGH SCHOOL. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

HEAR OTHER SCHOOL FACILITY MATTERS

The Superintendent reported that the district is still in the process of analyzing various site needs for the placement of portables for the Class Size Reduction Program and the replacement of worn playground matting. Information will be provided for the Board following the completion of the analysis.

AGREEMENT ESTABLISHING AN ENRICHMENT FUND FOR THE BENEFIT OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT STUDENTS

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District proposes that the Foundation establish a Fund to receive tax exempt gifts from themselves, businesses, individuals, and grants from governmental and other sources to supplement services benefiting District students;

WHEREAS, the Foundation exists for the benefit of the residents of the County of Riverside and institutions of higher education within the State of California and carries out such public educational and charitable uses and purposes as will enhance well-being;

WHEREAS, the Foundation may make grants to and support tax exempt organizations organized for charitable, educational and other exempt purposes as defined in Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Foundation hereby agrees to accept contributions to the Jurupa Education Enrichment Fund and to hold same as a component fund of the Foundation for the following uses and purposes and subject to the terms and conditions herein set forth:

FIRST: The Fund hereby created shall be known as the "Jurupa Education Enrichment Fund".

SECOND: The Foundation shall hold, manage, invest and reinvest the Fund, and shall collect the income and shall pay and disburse the net income and principal thereof, subject to paragraph FOURTH below exclusively for general charitable uses and purposes in accordance with the provisions specified in the Declaration of Trust of the Riverside Community Foundation (as amended and restated), all of which provisions are hereby incorporated by reference and conclusively assented and adopted. (The phrase "charitable uses and purposes" shall be defined as all of those activities, uses, and purposes which are described in Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the Code).)



THIRD: The Fund is initiated on the date first written above and may be increased thereafter through other gifts and earned interest.

FOURTH: A Fund Advisory Committee may be appointed by the District Superintendent with the advice and consent of the District Board of Education. The Fund Advisory Committee may, from time to time, through its chairman, or such other person as the Fund Advisory Committee may specify in writing, submit suggestions to the Foundation concerning the distribution of income and principal of the Fund exclusively for general charitable purposes and particularly for educational support activities. Such recommendations may be accepted or rejected, in whole or in part, by the Foundation in its sole and absolute discretion.

FIFTH: With respect to suggestions made by the Fund Advisory Committee, the Foundation shall make its own independent investigation to determine whether the Committee's advice is consistent with the Foundation's views of charitable needs, and shall determine that suggested distributions or recipients are similar to those, or to areas of need, otherwise benefited by or receiving distributions from the Foundation. The Foundation shall not be bound by such Committee advice.

SIXTH: The Foundation shall charge income to the extent sufficient, for reasonable and proper compensation for services and expenses.

SEVENTH: It is intended that the Fund shall be a component part of the Foundation as defined in Section 1.170A-9 (e) (11) of the Income Tax Regulations and that nothing in this Agreement shall affect the status of the Foundation as an organization (i) described in Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and (ii) which is not a private Foundation within the meaning of Section 509 (a) of the Code. This Agreement shall be interpreted in a manner consistent with the foregoing intention and to conform with the requirements of the foregoing provisions of the Federal tax laws and any regulations issued thereunder.

EIGHTH: At such time as the Fund Advisory Committee shall obtain its own tax-exempt status as an organization described in Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c) (3) which is not a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509 (a) of the Code, and the Fund Advisory Committee declares itself an independent agency with a name of its own choosing and requests that the Foundation transfer holdings in the Educational Enrichment Fund to the direct control of the new organization, with fund management by a trustee of its own choosing, the Foundation shall thereupon deliver the holdings in said Fund to such organization and shall exercise no further control or responsibility therefore.

NINTH: All transfers of property to the Fund shall be subject to the condition that the Foundation, as of the date of transfer, is classified in good standing by the Internal Revenue Service as an organization (i) described in Section 501 (c) (3) of the Code and (ii) which is not a private Foundation as defined in Section 509 (a) of the Code.

TENTH: The Fund created hereunder shall be administered in and under the laws of the State of California, and this Agreement and the validity thereof shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

ELEVENTH: The Fund is protected from obsolescence. Should the purposes for which it was created ever become obsolete or incapable of fulfillment, it is the responsibility of the Foundation to use the funds for a purpose as similar as possible to those set forth in this Resolution and Agreement.

The Contractor was directed to provide a cost/credit for providing additional louvers and adding, deleting and exchanging some metal for

wood doors.

Justification: The door schedules, as bid, did not indicate all required louvers for proper

air circulation. Upon closer review, some interior metal doors were

substituted with wood doors.
