d. Recognize "Better Speech and Hearing Month"

(Dr. Hendrick)

The month of May has been designed as, "May Is Better Speech and Hearing Month" by the American Speech and Hearing Association. This is the national professional organization for speech pathologists.

As Board members are aware, the district currently employs 17 speech pathologists, who are technically known in the field of education as Language, Speech and Hearing Specialists. However, in most school districts these professionals are more commonly referred to as "speech therapists" or "speech teachers." Of the 17 employed in our district, 7 work part-time and 10 are employed on a full time basis. Our speech therapists are credentialed by the State Department of Education to provide services to school children, and they are also licensed by the State of California to provide Clinical Rehabilitative Services. Most hold at least a Masters Degree in Communicative Disorders and many also possess what is known as their "CCCs" or Certificate of Clinical Competence" issued by the American Speech and Hearing Association.

Jurupa speech therapists provide a variety of services to approximately 780 children ranging in age from 3 to 21 years old, who have been diagnosed and identified as having one or more communication disorders. All of these children are identified as being in need of special education, as speech therapy provided in a school district is a special education service. Speech therapists provide services not only to children enrolled in public schools, but also in private schools in our area as required by federal and state law.

Ms. Melody Paulsen, Special Education Program Specialists, who is also a credentialed speech therapist, will be present to describe in more detail services provided by the speech therapists. <u>Information only.</u>

At its May 5, 1997 Meeting, the Board directed Administration to prepare a resolution in support of maintaining the Mira, Hart, and Murrieta court cases. These court cases enable local planning jurisdictions to require that developers mitigate impacts on school facilities in situations where the development requires a legislative land use change. The supporting documents contain a resolution that was prepared from the model developed by the California School Board Association.

b. Hear Report on Governor's Response to Class Size Reduction Letter

(Mrs. Roberts)

In response to requests by superintendents, boards of education and members of the community throughout the State of California, Governor Wilson's new budget proposes to fully implement Class Size Reduction in kindergarten through third grade. He also proposes to fund an additional grade in the 1997-98 school year. This year, our district has implemented Class Size Reduction in first grade at each school and in kindergarten and second grades at selected sites where feasible. During the 1997-98 school year, we plan to fully implement Class Size Reduction in the second grade, followed by the kindergarten in 1998-99. The letter from Governor Wilson indicating his commitment to Class Size Reduction for the 1997-98 school year is included in the supporting documents.

At the Board Meeting of May 5, 1997, the Board approved Policy 4218, Uniforms for Employees, at first reading. The major issue addressed by the uniform sub-committee was in consistency in the appearance of employees who are required to wear uniforms. In order to address this inconsistency, it was decided that one of the two uniform allowance payments made by the District (the uniform allowance is paid twice annually: once in December and once in June) will be in the form of a voucher to a vendor who provides uniforms. This would insure that employees spend at least half of the District allotted uniform allowance each year for uniforms. It would also promote consistency in that employees will only be able to buy standardized articles of clothing that are selected in advance by the District. This voucher system will begin with the June 1997 voucher uniform payment. The December uniform allowance payment will continue to be in cash to be used for uniform replacement at the employee's discretion.

Another major issue discussed by the uniform sub-committee was the importance of the uniform in assisting identification and recognition of District employees and the jobs they perform. Out of these discussions, administration is recommending that Maintenance, Grounds, and Custodial employees have different colored uniforms to distinguish the departments which they represent. The major proposed change in Regulation 4218 consists of identifying a uniform for maintenance workers that consists of a light brown or beige shirt and dark brown pants, and for grounds personnel a light green shirt and dark green pants. Custodial, warehouse, and automotive personnel will continue wearing light blue shirts and dark blue pants. Administration is also recommending changes in the uniform for campus supervisors so they are more readily recognizable as figures of authority on campus.

The change in Policy 4218 removes the exception of management personnel assigned to school sites from the requirement to wear uniforms. The effect of this change is to require head custodians at secondary schools to wear uniforms so that they too are easily recognizable as District employees.

Administration recommends that proposed Board Policy 4218. Uniforms for Employees, be adopted at second reading.

A. Approve Routine Action Items by Consent (Cont'd)

7. Resolution No. 97/36. Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds (Mrs. Lauzon)
Throughout the school year, the Business Office monitors and adjusts the District's various budgets with respect to both revenue and expenditures. Changes in revenue result from grant applications, increased funding, adjustments to ADA, apportionment reductions, etc.

The method by which the revenue side of the budget is adjusted is to adopt a Resolution for Expenditure for Excess Funds. In this action the Board approves adding revenue to the budget for various purposes. Since the budget was revised on March 17, 1997, the District has received revenue adjustments in the amount of \$919,960, as identified below. Of this total, \$571,031 is unrestricted and will increase the unrestricted reserve. The balance remaining, \$348,929 is restricted in its use and offsetting expenditures are budgeted in these funds.

8. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Nueva Vista High School

Mr. Jeff Jacobs, Teacher at Nueva Vista High School, is requesting permission to travel to Lone Pine, CA on Friday, May 23 through Tuesday, May 27, 1997 with approximately fourteen (14) students. The purpose of this trip is to introduce students to outdoor activities such as camping, hiking, star gazing and to study the historical significance of the region. Supervision will be by staff members and transportation will be by district vehicles. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Mr. Jeff Jacobs. Teacher at Nueva Vista High School, to travel to Lone Pine, CA with approximately fourteen (14) students on Friday, May 23 through Tuesday, May 27, 1997.

B. Adopt Board Proposal to CSEA, Chapter #392

(Mr. Campbell)

In prior meetings, the Board has received and reviewed a proposal from Chapter #392, California School Employees' Association, regarding 1996-97 reopener negotiations. The Board has also reviewed and announced its proposal in response. Subject to any changes directed by the Board after public comments in the verbal hearing session, administration recommends adoption of the Board's proposal as printed in the supporting documents as a basis for negotiations.

C. Approve 1997/98 Mentor Teachers

(Mr. Taylor)

The Mentor Teacher Program has been in operation since the 1984/85 school year. Funding is provided by the legislature and does not encumber the general fund. Mentor teachers provide assistance to new teachers and are recommended for appointment based on their expertise as teachers, their commitment to the profession and their ability to share their subject matter knowledge, or other teaching expertise, with their colleagues.

C. Approve 1997/98 Mentor Teachers (Cont'd)

During the past few weeks, the Mentor Teacher Selection Committee reviewed applications of several candidates, interviewed each candidate and interviewed administrators and teachers familiar with the candidates' qualifications. A list of candidates endorsed by the Mentor Teacher Selection committee will be reviewed by the Board during Closed Session.

After consideration in Closed Session, it is recommended that the Board appoint thirteen (13) and one (1) alternate 1997/98 Mentor Teachers from the list of candidates endorsed by the Mentor Teacher Selection Committee.

D. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Award Bid #97/08L, Asphalt Repairs at Seven (7) District Sites (Mr. Edmunds) At the March 3, 1997 Board Meeting, the Board authorized Administration to solicit bids for summer maintenance projects, which included asphalt repairs at seven (7) district sites: Camino Real, Indian Hills, Pedley, Stone Ave., Sunnyslope, and Van Buren Elementary Schools, and Mira Loma Middle School. The district advertised for bids on April 7 and April 14, 1997 in "The Riverside Press Enterprise." Bidding documents were delivered to eight (8) prospective bidders. Bids were received and publicly opened on April 29, 1997. Results of the bidding are presented below, as well as a recommendation for award.

Administration recommends that the Board award the contract for Bid 97/08L. Asphalt Repairs at Seven (7) District Sites to Pacific Asphalt Services in the amount of \$31,900.

2. Award Bid #97/09L for Painting at Two (2) District Sites (Mr. Edmunds) At the March 3, 1997 Board Meeting, the Board authorized Administration to solicit bids for summer maintenance projects, which included painting at two (2) district sites: Jurupa Middle School and Rustic Lane School. The district advertised for bids on April 7 and April 14, 1997 in "The Riverside Press Enterprise." Bidding documents were delivered to eleven (11) prospective bidders. Bids were received and publicly opened on April 22, 1997. Results of the bidding are presented below, as well as a recommendation for award.

The district advertised for bids on April 7 and April 14, 1997 in "The Riverside Press Enterprise." Bidding documents were delivered to ten (10) prospective bidders. Bids were received and publicly opened on April 22, 1997. Results of the bidding are presented below, as well as a recommendation for award.

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #97-092 for violation of Education Code 48900 (c) for one calendar year and that the student be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside Office of Education, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Youth Accountability Team for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before May 19, 1998.
- ** 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #97-093 for violation of Education Code 48900 (c) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following and that the student be allowed to enroll and participate in the "Steps to Success" program and/or Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Youth Accountability Team for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 1998.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT IN SUPPORT OF THE MIRA, HART, MURRIETA DECISIONS

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Unified School District ("District") recently has experienced and anticipates future significant residential growth within the boundaries of the School District; and

WHEREAS, in order to accommodate the students generated from the residential projects relating to such growth, the School District has entered into mitigation agreements with the developers of such residential projects; and

WHEREAS, the School District has relied upon the <u>Mira Development Corporation v. City of San Diego</u>; <u>William S. Hart Union High School District v. Regional Planning Commission of the County of Los Angeles</u>; and <u>Murrieta Valley Unified School District v. County of Riverside</u> decisions ("<u>Mira Decisions</u>") for the authority to enter into such mitigation agreements; and

WHEREAS, the Governor and some development interests are supporting legislation to repeal the <u>Mira</u> Decisions; and

WHEREAS, if the <u>Mira</u> Decisions are repealed, the School District would be unfairly burdened to provide the necessary school facilities for the students generated from the residential development within the boundaries of the School District; and

WHEREAS, without the <u>Mira</u> Decisions, the School District would lose approximately \$42,500,000 with respect to funding of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, the State of California currently has a backlog of \$5 billion to \$6 billion with respect to school facility construction and a projected need of \$30 billion over the next 10 years; and



WHEREAS, the codification of the <u>Mira</u> Decisions will ensure that cities and counties continue to have the right to consider school facility impacts when making certain land use decisions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Jurupa Unified School District does hereby resolve, determine and order as follows:

Section 1. That the School District opposes any attempts to repeal the Mira Decisions.

Dear Ms. Roberts:

Thank you for your letter regarding class size in California public schools. I appreciate you sharing your thoughts with me on this issue.

As you are well aware, many of the classrooms in California's more than 7,700 public schools have been overcrowded for years. Unfortunately, classes containing younger students, between grades 1 and 3, were the most heavily impacted. Two years ago, it was not uncommon to have 30 or more students packed into a classroom. Recognizing the need for smaller classes, I signed the educational provisions of last year's State budget to ensure that young students receive individualized attention early, in their most impressionable stages.

Specifically, the budget directed \$771 million in incentive funds to reduce class size to 20 students in grades 1-3 in every California school wishing to participate. The class size reduction program emphasized flexibility as well: schools were given two options in how they would achieve the fixed reduction. Under option one, schools could claim \$500 per pupil in any class which was reduced in size to a 20:1 student/teacher ratio. Under the second option, districts could claim \$250 per pupil in any class in which the ratio was reduced to 20:1 for one-half the instructional minutes per day -- with all periods of math and reading instruction occurring in the more individualized setting.

The positive impacts of our class size reduction program are indisputable. Today almost one million children are learning to read in classes of no more than 20, and nearly 95 percent of the school districts are participating. Despite all of our successes, we must ensure the continuation of these efforts; and we must maintain adequate funding for facilities and programs. My new budget proposal for 1997-98 education spending directs \$488 million to fully implement class size reduction in kindergarten through the third grade. Of this amount, \$304.3 million will go towards implementing the statewide program in one additional grade.

I have also included a \$2 billion school construction bond in this year's budget proposal, which would include significant reforms to simplify the current, overly cumbersome approval process, provide for additional facilities and accommodate our continuing growth in enrollment.

We are investing heavily in our public schools because healthy young minds are the keys to a healthy future for California.

COMMUNICATIONS SESSION

JVHS STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORT Judy Chang, Jurupa Valley High student representative, reported the following:

Advanced Placement Testing began today, May 5, with tests continuing in various categories over the next two weeks. Sports Update - The baseball team, as of last Friday, May 2, improved their phenomenal record to 10-1, with four games left to play. The team is scheduled to play in the CIF playoffs in the extremely tough Division 1 Category. The boys' swim team defeated Centennial 108-62 on May 1; the girls' swim team defeated Centennial 121-49 on the same day. He noted that the foremost topic discussed by the Assembly was the Class Size Reduction program and adequate State funding.

In response to Mrs. Adams request, the Superintendent indicated that administration will provide a report concerning the review of the district's goals and their status as it relates to achievement of the goals. She reviewed the development of the district's Mission Statement, six goals and the Action Plans for each school site.

UNIFORMS FOR EMPLOYEES

It is the intent of the Board of Education that certain classified employees of the Jurupa Unified School District wear uniforms while performing their general duties. All Food Service, Maintenance, Operations, Transportation, Warehouse personnel and campus supervisors regularly assigned to schools are required to wear uniforms while on duty. These uniforms will aid in identification and recognition of personnel and add an aura of authority to school employees. Bus driver and cafeteria uniforms also promote safety and health factors.

For this purpose, the District will pay a uniform allowance to employees employed on a regular status. Employees who are required to wear uniforms must be in uniform daily no later than the second week of employment.

If jackets are a required portion of the uniform, the District will bear the costs of the jacket in addition to the uniform allowance. Such District-furnished jackets are considered as equipment and must be returned or paid for at termination of employment.

Name tags and/or identification patches furnished by the District shall be worn as part of the required uniform.

Employees who fail to wear the required uniform to work will be sent home to change into their uniforms. Employees are responsible for maintaining their uniforms in a neat and clean appearance. Employees who fail to maintain their uniforms as required will be sent home to change. Their work day will not commence until they return to work properly attired. Time spent by employees securing the proper or clean uniform will not be compensated.

RESPONSE TO CSEA COLLECTIVE BARGAINING PROPOSAL (May 5, 1997)

The current 1995-98 Agreement between the Jurupa Unified School District and California School Employees' Association, Chapter #392 was the product of many hours of good faith bargaining.

Although the resulting Agreement represented compromises between the original proposals of each side, District operations in accord with its provisions have not created significant problems. Both the quality of the Agreement and mutual efforts by the parties to comply with its terms have contributed to this success.

One part of the current Agreement is to reopen negotiations in 1996-97 on Article XIV- Basic Compensation and Article XVII- Health and Welfare Benefits. Additionally, either party may select up to two additional Articles to reopen.

The Board of Education therefore makes the following proposal in regard to reopener negotiations:

- 1. Improve the Classified Salary Schedule and the District contribution to Health and Welfare Benefits in amounts and at times that do not hamper the District's ability to maintain a District budget in which expenditures do not exceed revenues and which provides an adequate contingency reserve.
- 2. Revise <u>Article XXIV</u>, <u>Duration</u> so that the existing contract will remain valid through June 30, 1999. The Agreement should provide for reopener negotiations on the Classified Salary Schedule and Health and Welfare Benefits for the 1998-99 school year.
- 3. Make specific additions, changes or deletions as listed below:

*page 53, line 11 - Delete <u>Section 4 - Position</u> <u>Reclassification</u>

*page 53, line 11 - Add "The District shall comply with the requirements of the Education Code regarding position reclassification.
