Ms. Rhonda Fuller, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting permission to travel to Indio, CA on Monday, February 16 through Sunday, February 22, 1998 with approximately thirty (30) students to participate in the annual Indio National Date Festival and Livestock Show. Accommodations and meals will be arranged by the FFA boosters, travel will be by district vehicles, and supervision will be provided by staff members. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. Ms. Marie Mains and Mr. Scott Steinbrinck, teachers at Jurupa Valley High School, are requesting permission to travel to Albuquerque, New Mexico on Wednesday, March 18 through Sunday, March 22, 1998 to attend the National Council of Teachers of English Spring Conference.

The focus of this conference will be on the use of Native American literature, teaching techniques for low-level readers, techniques to deal with paper load in combination literature and composition classes, and enrichment ideas for the teaching of composition. In addition, workshops will focus on standards in the English curriculum and cross-curricular connections between English and other disciplines. A partial list of workshops included in the workshop offerings are: (1) One Set of Standards, Many Voices - Putting English Language Arts State Standards at the Heart of Professional Development, (2) Ready for Surprises: Helping Students Find Their Literate Voices, (3) Celebrating the Multilingual, Multi-cultural Classroom, and (4) Integrating Literature and Writing with Science. All costs for this trip will be paid through Staff Development, Categorical funds, which was approved by the site's School Site Council on November 20, 1997.

It is recommended that the Board approve the out-of-state travel request to Albuquerque, New Mexico from Ms. Marie Mains and Mr. Scott Steinbrinck, teachers at Jurupa Valley High School on Wednesday, March 18 through Sunday, March 22, 1998 for the purpose of attending the National Council of Teachers of English Spring Conference.

**8. Approve An Additional Staff Development Day for All Schools**

(Dr. Mason)

At the November 17, 1997 Board meeting, the PreK-12 curriculum standards were approved by the Board of Education. The next phase in this curriculum development process was to develop criterion-reference tests to assess student progress and achievement toward those standards. Each school selected a representative to serve as a facilitator on the Districtwide Assessment Committee. Three meeting days were established and designed to train teachers in the development of high quality test items. Dr. Robert Burns, a Professor of Curriculum and Instruction at the University of San Francisco, was brought in to facilitate the workshops.

During late January and early February, 1998, facilitator(s) are meeting with grade-level representatives in order to complete the next phase of the assessment process -- training all teachers to develop valid and reliable items linked to our new curriculum standards. Administration is recommending an additional Staff Development Day for the 1997/98 school year, which would bring the total to six days for each school. This day would be used to bring grade-level staff members together to develop pilot test items for final face validity and reliability. It is anticipated that eight elementary schools would meet on March 13, eight elementary schools on March 20, and all secondary schools on March 27, 1998.

Administration recommends that the Board approve one (1) additional Staff Development Day for the 1997/98 school year to facilitate in the development of criterion-reference tests matching district curriculum standards.

**B. Certification of AB 3482 Training Certification**

(Dr. Mason)

The Riverside County Office of Education received a Comprehensive Reading Leadership Program (CRLP) grant under AB 3482 which would provide training to district personnel throughout the County. As part of the AB 3482 grant requirements, the names of teachers and administrators who have participated in training through the Comprehensive Reading Leadership Program are to be presented to the Board for certification.

The Comprehensive Reading Leadership Program includes training on the structure of the English language, prevention of reading failure, instructional needs of students acquiring English, spelling, instruction, planning and delivery of appropriate instruction, and diagnosis of student progress.

It is recommended that the Board certify the listed staff members as having attended and completed the Comprehensive Reading Leadership Program training.

\* **C. Certify Implementation of the 1997/98 Class Size Reduction Program** (Mr. Edmunds)

The Board has previously approved applications to the State Department of Education for facilities funding and operational funding for the Class Size Reduction Program. The final step in implementing the Class Size Reduction Program for 1997/98 is certification that the program has been implemented by February 23, 1998. The District's application for operational funding was for 194 reduced classes in grades K through 3, with most of the classes being in first and second grade. As of this date, administration estimates that we are operating 205 reduced size classes:

In order to comply with the February 23, 1998 certification date, the Board must authorize the Superintendent to sign the Certification of Implementation form contained in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the Superintendent to sign the Certification of Implementation form for the 1997/98 Class Size Reduction Program.

**D. Authorize Implementation of an Employee Assistance Program** (Mr. Edmunds)

Many school districts, public entities, and private corporations have established Employee Assistance Programs (EAPs) to assist employees with a variety of personal problems that may affect on-the-job performance. Such problems may include marital problems, parenting problems, drug or alcohol problems, problems with ill or elderly parents, etc. The purpose of an EAP is to provide crisis intervention, counseling and referral guidance to assist employees with these problems. An estimated 13% of employees experience lower morale, reduced productivity, loss of energy, and decreased interest in work due to personal problems that affect their ability to perform effectively at work.

As a result of the lack of resources available to people to resolve these problems, districts often experience a higher incidence of:

Use of sick leave	Chronic absenteeism in addition to sick leave
Reduced morale	Lower threshold of tolerance on the job
Grievances	Filing of Workers' Comp. claims
Reduced quality of work	Carelessness/inattention causing accidents
Chemical dependency	Higher level of attrition, training costs for new staff

Studies have found that organizations that have EAP programs have experienced reductions in absenteeism rates, workers' compensation claims, and improved morale. In dollar terms, the Rutgers University School of Economics in 1994 estimated the cost of "employee disability" as 7.54% of payroll, broken down as follows: 3.71% direct disability cost (including sick leave, short- and long-term disability, disability pensions, workers' compensation claim costs, the disability portion of Social Security taxes, and miscellaneous accident insurance fees); 3.03% indirect cost (including replacement staff salaries, additional supervisory time in addressing related workplace concerns, time for hiring and training temporary and new permanent workers, and effects on worker morale); and .80% disability management. If this estimate were applied to the District's annual classified and certificated payrolls, the costs relating to disability would equal slightly more than \$4 million per year.

Employee Assistance Programs (EAPs) are a cost-effective way in which to provide support and early intervention 24 hours a day, to all employees and their families going through a variety of situations not covered by traditional health insurance, such as:

During the past ten years or so, Administration has considered EAP programs on several occasions with several different providers of such programs. We were unable to find a provider that seemed to provide effective programs at a reasonable rate. Last spring, in a meeting of the Benefits Task Force, representatives of both CSEA and NEA-J expressed an interest in establishing an EAP for the District. Administration contacted our insurance broker for a recommendation as to an EAP provider, and a firm called Community Action EAP was recommended. Administration met with Bob Bruner, who is the President of Community Action EAP, and found the program to be very impressive. Subsequently, Mr. Bruner was invited to a Benefits Task Force meeting to give a presentation that was very well received by representatives of both bargaining units as well as Administration.

The Community Action EAP offers a wide variety of programs, including: supervisory and management training, employee orientation, a publicity program, wellness seminars, ongoing management consultation on how to work with troubled employees, crisis intervention support services, and a 24-hour help/crisis line and program administration which includes the intake, assessment, referral process, follow-up, record keeping, program evaluation, and utilization review. Finally, the EAP will assist the District's drug and alcohol testing program by providing follow-up services in the event of a positive test result.

Supervisory training is targeted at a dual goal: 1) orienting supervisors on how to work with employees who are experiencing a deterioration of work performance, and 2) helping supervisors to integrate EAP assistance into the improvement process for helping the employee remediate work performance issues.

Wellness seminar topics range from drug/alcohol use in the workplace to problems of parenting, conflict resolution with family or peers, smoking cessation, coping with stress at work, or at home, etc.

Crisis intervention includes 24-hour toll-free telephone access; intervention at the employee's worksite, home, etc.; a mobile trauma team to provide critical incident debriefing for workplace trauma. This program component includes the development of a comprehensive psychological disaster plan, consultation to management at the time of the critical incident, and debriefing for employees who have experienced a traumatic event.

Intake and assessment provides a troubled individual with one initial meeting and, if appropriate, two additional sessions at no cost to the employee. If greater assistance is determined necessary to resolve a problem, the individual will be directed to the most appropriate professional to continue their care. Example: a person with health insurance will be channeled into their health program and the EAP administrator will ensure maximum benefits with the least difficulty for the patient. If the employee, family member, or retiree does not have medical insurance, the EAP will assist them into a community-based program appropriate for them and their financial situation.

The EAP administrator will remain in contact with the patient and the therapist to ensure maximum benefit and outcome for our employees, families, and retirees. This is a voluntary, 24-hour referral program intended to provide an avenue of remedy for people with problems, before the problem becomes a crisis, and before job performance deteriorates.

**D. Authorize Implementation of an Employee Assistance Program** (Cont'd) (Mr. Edmunds)

**Expected Results** - Other employers report impressive results after providing EAP services to employees. For example, Safeway Stores found that their EAP reduced absenteeism by more than 60%, cut union grievances by 95%, and eliminated lost work days due to accidents. Utah's Kennecott Copper Company, after one year in an EAP, found absenteeism reduced by 49.50%. Employees not involved in the EAP showed a 2.90% increase in absenteeism. Neighboring school district administrators typically make the following comments about the EAP: "It's the best thing we've ever done for our employees", and "I don't know what we would do without it."

**Cost of Program** - The cost for this program is \$3,000 a month for a total of \$36,000 annually. This fee includes EAP services as described above for all Jurupa Unified School District employees, their families (even those not living with the employee) and Jurupa Unified School District retirees. We believe that this price is very reasonable in comparison with other programs we have reviewed, and we believe that the District will reap benefits far beyond this cost in terms of reduced absenteeism rates and improved employee morale.

Administration recommends the Board approve a contract with Community Action EAP to administer and provide professional services to our employees, their extended families, and our retirees, at a cost of \$36,000 per year.

**E. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters**

1. Hear and or Approve Other School Facility Matters (Mrs. Roberts)  
Due to frequent changes taking place in facility improvement programs, items which require Board discussion or action may arise between agenda preparation and meeting times. Administration may provide such items as verbal information reports or recommendations for action.

**F. Act on Student Discipline Cases** (Dr. Needham)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

**ADMISSION:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the admission of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-050 to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District.

**READMISSION:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the readmission of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-046 to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District.

**SUSPENDED EXPULSION:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-054 for violation of Education Code 48900 (a, b & k) for the remainder of the current semester. However, the Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the student be expelled but that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended and the student be placed on school probation for the term of the expulsion order. This case will be referred to the **S**chool and **C**ommunity **O**ut **R**Each Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 1, 1998.

**EXPULSIONS:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-049 for violation of Education Code 48900 (b, j, c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following and that the student be allowed to enroll and participate in the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the **School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)** for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 19, 1999.
- \*\* 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-055 for violation of Education Code 48900 (b & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following and that the student be allowed to enroll and participate in the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the **School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)** for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 19, 1999.
- \*\* 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-056 for violation of Education Code 48900 (a, b & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following and that the student be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside Office of Education, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the **School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)** for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 19, 1999.
- \*\* 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-057 for violation of Education Code 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following and that the student be allowed to enroll and participate in the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the **School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)** for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 19, 1999.
- \*\* 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #98-058 for violation of Education Code 48900 (a & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that the student be allowed to enroll and participate in the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the **School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)** for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 1, 1998.

2. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request (Mr. Campbell)  
Recent changes in state credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, bilingual education, mathematics or science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a Special Day Class position at Peralta Elementary School. The person being recommended is Nathan Martin. Mr. Martin is a graduate of Cal State Fullerton and is currently a substitute teacher in our district. He is a well received substitute teacher by the students and the staff and is judged to be very competent. Recruitment efforts have not identified stronger candidates.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Nathan Martin be approved for employment as a Special Day Class Teacher through the end of this school year under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.

### 5. Report on Patriotic Observances

(Mr. Méndez)

At a previous Board meeting, Mr. Chavez indicated an interest in having staff prepare a report informing the Board of the various patriotic observances and programs throughout the district. To gather data and information for this report, a survey was conducted districtwide. The results show that the Pledge of Allegiance is conducted at every school in the district. In addition, some of the secondary schools include positive thoughts or "words of wisdom" broadcast over the public address system. Many of these inspirational messages contain patriotic themes and thoughts regarding civic duties and responsibilities.

Other events listed by schools are as follows:

- Lessons on patriotic Americans and patriotism integrated into the curriculum.
- Thematic projects that revolve around the various national holidays. These projects include information on the meaning and significance of each holiday.
- Patriotic songs and music sung in classrooms and at assemblies.
- Patriotic assemblies and programs.
- Historical reenactments and role playing.
- Guest speakers.
- Field trips to local historical sites.
- Creation of three dimensional models of historical sites such as Plymouth, Boston and the California missions.
- Displays of replicas of historical documents and artifacts.
- Classroom discussions of current events.
- Readings of historical fiction depicting the lives and times of famous Americans.
- Congressional and legislative simulations.
- Debates.
- Special celebrations and programs highlighting specially designated months by the California State Department of Education such as Hispanic Month and Afro-American Month.
- Special celebrations of significant days and events such as Thanksgiving, Cinco De Mayo, etc.
- Programs that enhance civic duties and responsibilities such as PeaceBuilders.
- Participation in various speech and essay contests sponsored by local service clubs and organizations such as the American Legion.
- Bulletin board displays.
- Pledge of Allegiance at meetings and events such as School Site Council and PTA meetings and sporting events.
- ROTC and Scout groups display of colors at various school and district events.

In addition to the items listed above, many elementary schools teach upper grade students the proper care, folding and display practices for the American flag. These students then have the responsibility of raising the flag each morning and taking it down at the end of the school day. Information only.

## RESPONSE TO NEA-J COLLECTIVE BARGAINING PROPOSAL

FEBRUARY 2, 1998

The 1995-98 Agreement between the Jurupa Unified School District and the National Education Association-Jurupa was the product of many hours of good faith bargaining.

Although the resulting Agreement represented compromises between the original proposals of each side, District operations in accord with its provisions have not created significant problems. Both the quality of the Agreement and mutual efforts by the parties to comply with its terms have contributed to this success.

The Board of Education therefore proposes that the 1995-98 Agreement be continued as it stands with only the following changes:

1. Improve salaries and health and welfare benefits by amounts to be determined once the district's financial condition for 1998-99 is known.
2. Revise the Article on Completion of Meet and Negotiation so as to provide for a three year Agreement expiring on June 30, 2001.
3. Work with the Association to clarify the Hours of Duty Article that deals with the responsibilities of unit members to attend traditional meetings such as faculty meetings, department meetings, etc.
4. Work with the Association to develop a work year schedule/school calendar(s) that meets state standards for instructional time and has sufficient time allocated for staff development and training.

Additionally, an overriding interest of the District is to be sure that any potential Agreement does not hamper the District's ability to maintain a District budget in which expenditures do not exceed revenues and which provides an adequate contingency reserve.





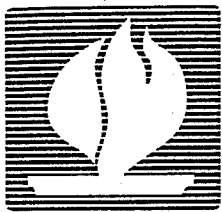

We have received and reviewed your 1997-98 First Interim Financial Report. The governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

Our analysis of the report included the multi-year financial projections reviewed by the board. The report indicates that expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$1,651,489 in the current fiscal year. However, the multi-year financial projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 1998-99 and 1999-2000 fiscal years.

Our office recommends that the board continue to review updated multi-year financial projections which reflect current and anticipated changes in the district's operational programs, debt service obligations and/or enrollment and attendance trends. This process will assist the board in providing for the long range financial stability of the district. Please provide our office with a copy of any updated multi-year financial projections reviewed by the board.

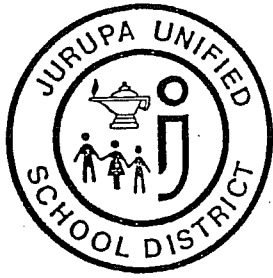

### NOTIFICATION OF OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR SCHOOLS OF CHOICE

Dear Parent/ Guardian:


The Jurupa Unified School District has an open enrollment policy for schools within the district. Our sixteen elementary, three middle schools and two comprehensive high schools offer a variety of programs designed to meet the needs of children and their families. There are situations which make it desirable for a family to select a school outside of the attendance area designated for their residence. As such, we offer this transfer opportunity through the Open Enrollment process.

Again this year, parents may choose to have their children attend a school, other than the school of residence, provided there is space. The district staff determines how many transfer spaces are available at each school. Some schools have very few spaces; others can accommodate a number of new students. If there are more requests for transfers to a particular school than available spaces, district policy requires the use of a random selection procedure.

If you wish to have your child continue to attend the school serving your residence, you do not need to notify the school. Students currently attending a school on an open enrollment transfer need not complete a new application for the 1998/99 school year. However, if you wish your child to attend a school other than the one he/she is currently attending, please follow the instructions on page three.

Your involvement in your child's education is one of the most critical factors in his/her school success. I urge you to visit your child's school and talk to the staff; volunteer when you have time and join the PTA or other parent organization.

## **BEFORE YOU APPLY, PLEASE CONSIDER:**

Parents who wish incoming kindergartners to attend the same transfer school as other siblings must apply for a transfer.

If you are anticipating a move before the next school year which will change your school of residence, and you wish your child to remain at the present school, you must apply for a transfer.

Parents of secondary students should decide about transfers during the open enrollment period. In September, it is difficult to transfer high school students because of matching class schedules, and the potential for credit loss. For students in athletics, CIF eligibility may be in jeopardy if transferring after the opening of school. Contact the Assistant Principal for Athletics at the high school to check on the status of your student.

## **Meeting Residency Requirements: (Education Code 48204)**

A student shall be deemed to have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance provided he or she:

- a. is living with a parent/guardian or caregiver within the district, or
- b. is an emancipated minor living in the district, or
- c. is living in a licensed foster home, family home, state hospital, or licensed children's institution with the district, or
- d. is granted an interdistrict transfer based on the parent/guardian being employed within the boundaries of the school district.

## **Program Options in the District:**

A variety of programs are available in the Jurupa Unified School District. A description of each program is provided below. The directory pages that follow list which programs are offered at each school site.

Special Education - Programs and services are available at each school for students with exceptional needs. Enrollment in these classes will be based on Individualized Education Program placement and space availability.

School Improvement - This state-funded program supports and guides schoolwide improvements to help meet the needs of all students and is offered at all elementary and middle schools.

Title I/EIA - These state and federally-funded programs serve grades one through six students who need additional academic support in the areas of reading, language, or math and are available at specific schools.

Bilingual Classrooms - English language learners receive daily English-as-a-Second Language instruction, academic instruction in English, or the primary language based on oral language assessment results. They also receive positive reinforcement for student's self-esteem, and cross-cultural awareness.

Bilingual Tutorial Program - Students who are acquiring English receive English Language instruction and primary language support through a bilingual language tutor.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) - This program serves eligible students in grades kindergarten through twelve at each school, who have been identified as gifted and talented.

Title IV - These federal funds assist each school (K-12) to provide prevention of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, early intervention, referral or rehabilitation as necessary.

Title VI - These federal funds assist the school in purchasing library books and instructional materials and also provides counseling for each elementary school through the Youth Service Center of Riverside. Crisis counseling, classroom presentations, and conflict management is available to students one day a week.

Instrumental Music/Elementary - Three instrumental music teachers provide band instruction at each elementary school, each week.

Math Renaissance Project - The foundations of pre-algebra, pre-geometry, algebra and geometry are taught through emphasis on hands-on activities and practical application at the middle school level.

Class-Size Reduction - This state program for grades K-3 allows all elementary schools to reduce class size to 20 pupils per K-3 classroom by 1999.

## PROCEDURE FOR APPLYING FOR A TRANSFER:

1. Applications may be obtained in the office of any school in the District, and are due FEBRUARY 27, 1998.
2. Completed applications must be mailed to the Jurupa Unified School District, Room #10, 3924 Riverview Drive, Riverside, CA 92509 no later than FEBRUARY 27, 1998. Meeting the application deadline of February 27, 1998 is critical due to the rapid pace of growth in the District. If your application is received after the close of the open enrollment period, your chances of receiving a transfer are greatly reduced.
3. Transfer and admission to a school of choice shall be granted if the space is available, and as established by the Jurupa Unified School District.
4. Parents will be notified by mail after the close of the enrollment period as to the status of their request.
5. Transportation to the school of choice is the responsibility of the parent.

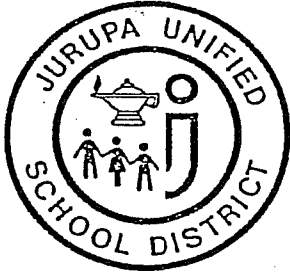

Estimado Padre/Guardián:


El Distrito Escolar Unificado de Jurupa tiene una poliza de registración activa para las escuelas colocadas dentro del distrito. Nuestras diez y seis escuelas elementarias, tres escuelas medianas y dos escuelas comprensivas de secundaria, ofrecen una variedad de programas designados para satisfacer las necesidades de los niños y sus familias. Hay situaciones, en que una familia desea escoger una escuela que queda fuera de la área de asistencia que fue designada para su domicilio residencial. Así es que, ofrecemos esta oportunidad por medio del procedimiento de Registración Activa.

Este año, de nuevo, los padres pueden escoger que sus hijos asistan a una escuela, que no sea la de su domicilio residencial, con la condición de que haiga lugar. El personal del distrito determinará cada año, la cantidad de espacios que las escuelas tienen disponibles. Algunas escuelas tienen muy poco lugar; otras escuelas tienen amplio lugar y pueden complacer el número de nuevos estudiantes. Si hay más peticiones que espacios disponibles a una escuela en particular, la poliza del distrito requiere que se administre el procedimiento de selección al azar.

Si usted desea que su niño/a siga asistiendo a la escuela de su domicilio residencial, usted no necesita notificarle a la escuela. Aquellos estudiantes que ya están asistiendo a una escuela, con una petición del año anterior, no necesitan completar una nueva aplicación. Sin embargo, si usted desea que su niño/a asista a una escuela diferente a la que está asistiendo, por favor siga las instrucciones de la página tres.

Su involucrimiento en la educación de sus hijos es uno de los factores más importantes en el suceso escolar de sus hijos. Yo le urgó que visité a la escuela de su niño/a y que platique con el personal; que se ofresca de voluntario/a cuando el tiempo le permita y que tome parte en las reuniones de «PTA» (La Asociación de Los Padres y Los Maestros) o otra organización para los padres.

## **ANTES DE APLICAR, POR FAVOR CONSIDERE LO SIGUIENTE:**

Si usted desea que sus hijos del grado kinder asistan a la misma escuela que sus hermanos mayores, debe aplicar para una transferencia.

Si usted anticipa una mudancia, antes del próximo año escolar, que cambie la escuela de su domicilio residencial y si usted desea que su hijo/a permanezca en la escuela a la cual asiste presentemente, usted debe aplicar para una transferencia.

Los padres de los estudiantes de escuela secundaria deben hacer una decisión antes del período de registración activa. En septiembre, es difícil hacer una transferencia para los estudiantes de las escuelas secundarias porque es difícil igualar el horario de sus clases y porque se pueden perder créditos escolares. Los estudiantes involucrados en deportes, corren el riesgo de perder su elegibilidad de «CIF» (Federación Entre Ligas de California), si son trasladados después de que haya empezado la escuela. Comuníquese con el Asistente del Director, encargado de los Deportes en la escuela secundaria, para comprobar si será afectado su estudiante.

### **El Cumplimiento de Requerimientos Residenciales: (Código Educativo 48204)**

Un estudiante debe comprobar que cumple con los siguientes requerimientos residenciales para asistir a una escuela:

- si está viviendo dentro del distrito, con su padre/guardián o la persona responsable de él/ella, o
- si es un menor emancipado que vive dentro del distrito, o
- si está viviendo en una casa adoptiva, casa familiar, hospital del estado, o una institución licenciada, o
- si se le ha otorgado una transferencia de entre-distrito, por razón de que el padre/guardián está empleado dentro de las fronteras del distrito escolar.

### **Opciones de Programas en el Distrito:**

Están disponibles una variedad de programas en el Distrito Escolar Unificado de Jurupa. Abajo está proveído una descripción de cada programa. Las páginas directorias que siguen, anuncian los programas que ofrece cada escuela.

Educación Especial - En cada escuela están disponibles programas y servicios para los estudiantes con necesidades excepcionales. La inscripción en estas clases será basada en la colocación del Programa de Educación Individual y en el número de lugares disponibles.

Reforma Escolar - Este programa, apoyado por el estado, sostiene y guía una amplia cantidad de reformas escolares, para poder satisfacer las necesidades de todos los estudiantes y se ofrece en todas las escuelas primarias y medianas.

Título I/EIA - Estos programas, con apoyo federal y estatal, le ofrecen servicios a los estudiantes del primer al sexto grado, que necesitan un apoyo académico adicional en el área de lectura, lenguaje, o matemática y están disponibles en escuelas particulares.

Clases Bilingües - Los estudiantes que están aprendiendo el idioma de inglés reciben diariamente instrucciones de Inglés-como-Segundo Idioma, instrucción académica en inglés, o en el idioma primario, y depende en los resultados del aseso oral de idioma. También reciben un refuerzo positivo en aprecio propio, y la comprensión de diversas culturas.

Programa de Tutoría Bilingüe - Los estudiantes que están adquiriendo inglés reciben instrucción del idioma inglés y apoyo del idioma primario por medio de un tutor de idioma bilingüe.

(«GATE») La Educación de Don y Talento - Este programa le provee servicio, a los estudiantes de los grados kinder a los grados 12, que han sido identificados con tener un don y un talento excepcional.

Título IV - Estos fondos federales asisten a las escuelas, los grados (K-12), para que proveen la prevención de las drogas, el alcohol, el uso de tabaco, intervención prematura, y la referencia o rehabilitación como sea necesaria.

Título VI - Estos fondos federales asisten en la compra de libros para la biblioteca y en la compra de materias instruccionales. También proveen asesoramiento por medio del Centro de Servicio Juvenil de Riverside. Un día de la semana se les provee y están disponibles para los estudiantes, asesoramientos en casos de una crisis, para la comprensión de las presentaciones dentro de los salones de clase, y para el manejo de conflictos.

Música Instrumental de Primaria - Cada semana, tres maestros de música instrumental les proveen instrucciones a cada escuela primaria.

Proyecto de Matemáticas Época de Renacimiento - Las fundaciones de pre-álgebra, pre-geometría, álgebra y geometría se enseñan por medio de un énfasis en las actividades por obra de mano y una aplicación práctica al nivel escolar mediante.

La disminución del Tamaño de la Clase - Este Programa estatal para los grados K-3, permite que para el año 1999, todas las escuelas primarias disminuyan el tamaño de las clases en los grados K-3, a 20 alumnos.

## EL PROCEDIMIENTO PARA APLICAR POR UNA TRANSFERENCIA:

1. Usted pueden obtener una aplicación en la oficina de cualquier escuela en el Distrito, y se vencen el día 27 de febrero, 1998.
2. Las aplicaciones completadas deben ser enviadas a Jurupa Unified School District, Room #10, 3924 Riverview Drive, CA 92509 a no más tardar que el día 27 de febrero, 1998. **El cumplir con la fecha de vencimiento del día 27 de febrero, 1998 es crítico**, dado al rápido crecimiento del Distrito. Si su aplicación se recibe después del período de registración activa, la probabilidad de que reciba una transferencia esta reducida.
3. La transferencia y la admisión a una escuela de preferencia debe ser otorgada si el espacio esta disponible si haci lo determina el Distrito Escolar Unificado de Jurupa.
4. Se le notificara el estado de su petición, por correo, después del período de registración activa. **La transportación a la escuela de preferencia es la reponsabilidad de los padres.**
