The Pedley Elementary School PTA wishes to donate \$3,795.92 to purchase one 8 ft. x 20 ft. cargo storage container (\$3,000.00), and four sets of an Elmo HP-L11 Overhead Projector and a Luxor OHT-30 Overhead Projector Table (at \$198.98 each for a total of \$795.92).

Ms. Johanna Downs, a teacher at Stone Avenue Elementary School, wishes to donate \$20.00, with the request it be used to purchase instructional materials for Room 12 at the school.

a. Review Decision Concerning Board Member Travel and Conference Expenses

(Mrs. Roberts)

Mr. Chavez was ill at the last meeting, and since revisiting Board member travel and conference expenses was placed on the Agenda at his request, the Board voted to postpone this item until he could be present. Historically, travel expenses (registration, meals, lodging and travel) were paid from the district's General Fund conference budget. However, at the April 3, 1995 Board meeting, a motion was approved for the district to restrict conference expenses to any required registration fees. This decision was viewed as a good-faith effort on the part of the Board to demonstrate their willingness to cut their expenses until certificated employees received the reinstatement of the certificated salary schedule. The subject was reviewed again on November 20, 1995 with a four member Board. The motion to restore full conference reimbursement resulted in a 2-2 vote, which meant the motion was defeated. At the February 3, 1997 meeting, the Board voted 4-1 to maintain the status quo. After discussion, the Board may wish to take action regarding Board member travel and conference expenses.

It is sometimes necessary to issue purchase orders for the new fiscal year before the year begins. This ensures that necessary materials will be on hand when needed; for example: for summer school, for athletic equipment needed for early practice sessions, or for items which have a lead time of several months. The County Office of Education requires the adoption of a resolution, which is included in the supporting documents, for districts that use the automatic purchase order program and wish to commit funds before the approval of the Budget for 1998/99.

- Mr. Paul Wakefield, Teacher at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting permission to travel to Morro Bay with twelve students on Thursday, April 23 through Sunday, April 26, 1998. The purpose of the trip is to give students an opportunity to observe some of the marine organisms that inhabit the region north of Point Conception, and participate in activities comparing the various regions of the Morro Bay area. This is a culminating activity of the Oceanography class at Jurupa Valley. Transportation will be through district vehicles and costs will be paid through fund-raisers. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to attend the event due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Mr. Paul Wakefield to travel to Morro Bay with twelve students on Thursday, April 23 through Sunday, April 26, 1998 to provide students an opportunity to observe marine organisms as a culminating activity of the Oceanography class.
- *10. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Jurupa Valley High School (Dr. Mason) Ms. Melva Morrison, Teacher at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting permission to travel to San Diego with twenty-five students in the Chamber Singer program on Wednesday, April 29 through Friday, May 1, 1998. The purpose of the trip is to participate in workshops and practices with other high schools; work with Dr. Keith Pagan, choral director at Point Loma College; observe college choir rehearsals; and participate in an informal performance at Seaport Village. Transportation will be by H & L Charter Company and supervision will be by staff members and parent volunteers. Costs will be paid through the choir auxiliary and fund-raisers. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to attend the event due to the lack of funds. *11. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High School
Rubidoux High School's AFJROTC Unarmed Drill Teams and Color Guards have been invited to participate in the annual VFW National Drill and Color Guard Championships on Friday, August 28 through Thursday, September 3, 1998 at the Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas. Colonel William Carroll and Chief Franklin Cohens are requesting Board approval to travel to San Antonio, Texas with twenty-eight students to participate in this event. Colonel Carroll and Chief Cohens will serve as supervisors, as well as instructors, for the participating students. All costs for this trip are being paid through fundraisers and the ROTC ASB account. A copy of the Travel Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Chief Cohens and Colonel Carroll to travel to San Antonio, Texas on Friday, August 28 through Thursday, September 3, 1998 with twenty-eight students to participate in the VFW National Drill and Color Guard Championships.

B. Approve 1998 Mandated, Core Academic, and Special Education Summer School Program (Dr. Mason)

The State of California provides funds for 7% of a school district's K-12 enrollment to receive summer school instruction. The district is mandated to provide classes at the high school before offering them at the middle and elementary schools. Eighth grade students needing to pass core academic subjects in order to be promoted to the ninth grade, along with K-12 special education students, will be included in the schedule. Because of the 7% cap, elementary summer school classes will not be offered.

Summer school offerings are limited to the following eight programs:

- 1. <u>Secondary Proficiency Classes</u> Courses offered include: Fundamentals of Language Arts and Math Essentials. These classes are offered to high school students who need to pass one or more proficiency examinations. (Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley).
- 2. <u>Core Academics</u> New state law permits high schools to offer more classes than the previous core academic regulation. The following chart displays courses proposed for both comprehensive high schools:

C. <u>Authorize Issuance of Purchase Order #11310 to Dell Computers, Inc. for the Purchase of Twenty-Three (23) File Servers</u>

At the April 6, 1998, Board Meeting, the Board authorized bidding for twenty-three file servers. The Purchasing Department was able to secure the file servers through the use of a CMAS Cooperative Contract. CMAS contracts were reviewed from the following three (3) competing vendors:

Dell Computer, Inc.

\$129,538.13

Compaq Computer Corporation

\$191,816.55

Dell Computer, Inc., was not the low bidder but is able to supply equipment which best suits the District's needs. The cost of comparable features from the next lowest bidder, Government Computer Sales, Inc., exceeds the price provided by Dell Computer, Inc. In addition, Dell Computer, Inc. offers a three year limited warranty; next day on-site service; minimal server downtime; compatibility with the Microsoft WindowsNT operating system and a 12% faster processor. Public Contract Code 20118.1 allows the governing board to accept the bid of any one of the three (3) lowest bidders for their procurement of electronic data - processing systems.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the issuance of Purchase Order #11310 to

Dell Computer, Inc. of Round Rock, Texas, in the amount of \$129,538.13.

3. Review Report on Annual Language Census

Each spring, districts throughout California are required to conduct an annual language census and report this information to the State Department of Education. This census must include an accounting of all students with a home language other than English, and a count of all pupils redesignated since the last census. Students are reported as either limited English proficient (LEP) or fluent English proficient (FEP). In order to be classified as either LEP or FEP, students are identified by their parents as having a home language other than English, and must be given a test to determine their oral proficiency in English; Spanish speaking students are also given a test of oral Spanish proficiency. In addition, the language classification for students in grades 3-8 is determined by an analysis of their performance on a standardized achievement test in reading comprehension. The data in this report becomes the basis for determining the types of instructional services to be provided for limited English proficient (LEP) students.

The 1998 Language Census indicates that there are 4,002 students who are limited English proficient. This figure represents a 5.6% increase above last year's report. At the time of the census, 129 LEP students were redesignated as FEP. While the majority of the LEP population continues to be Spanish speakers, seventeen other languages are reported. The largest number of these students speak Vietnamese, Rumanian, and Tongan, in that order.

Grades K-6 LEP students who are Spanish dominant are enrolled in bilingual classes when there are sufficient numbers at a given grade level to make this a feasible option. Other students, K-12, are given instructional support services, and all students receive regular English as a Second Language instruction to support them in becoming fluent English proficient. Schools with more than 100 LEP students include: Glen Avon (140), Granite Hill (212), Ina Arbuckle (382), Mission Bell (137), Pacific Avenue (129), Pedley (152), Rustic Lane (271), Sunnyslope (193), Troth Street (334), Van Buren (159), West Riverside (291), Jurupa Middle School (142), Mira Loma Middle School (184), Mission Middle School (244), Jurupa Valley High School (294), and Rubidoux High School (427). RECOGNIZE RHS **EDITOR-IN-CHIEF** The Superintendent asked Rubidoux High School Editor-in-Chief, Ms. Jennifer Medina, to stand for recognition for being named Southern California Journalist of the Year by the Journalism Education Association of Southern California for her portfolio of news and feature stories. She noted that this is quite an honor for Ms. Medina, since the Rubidoux High School student newspaper has only been in existence for a few years.

Ms. Medina stated that she will be competing at the national level in mid-April in Seattle, Washington.

RECOGNIZE DISTRICT SCIENCE FAIR WINNERS

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services congratulated the 226 students who competed in the District Science Fair on March 10, and the nineteen student project winners listed on the Agenda that were selected for the next level of competition at the Inland Science and Engineering Fair in San Bernardino April 28-30, 1998. He thanked District Science Fair Coordinator, Mr. Terry Snell, for organizing the project, and judges and staff for their participation in this successful event.

The Assistant Superintendent Business Services announced that every year, on the fourth Tuesday in April, the State Legislature has proclaimed the celebration of "School Bus Driver's Recognition Day." He noted that on April 28, a celebration will be held in the Transportation Department at 9:15 a.m. An invitation was extended to Board members to join in this important celebration.



RECOGNIZE 1997 UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN The Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects acknowledged district employees for increasing contributions to United Way of the Inland Valleys by 11.1% over last year's giving. He noted that employee donations benefit local non-profit agencies in the Riverside area. The Director offered words of thanks to the site coordinators listed on the Agenda, for their assistance in promoting this annual team effort on the part of the district's employees.

Ms. Mary Ann Stalder, United Way Director of Resource Distribution and Planning, recognized district employees for their increased generosity to a broad cross section of local non-profit agencies. She announced that this year, under the coordination of Mr. Memo Mendez, Director of Curriculum and Categorical Projects, employee donations totaled \$28,798. Ms. Stalder thanked the Superintendent for her support of the campaign, "Still Caring;" Mr. Mendez, for coordinating the campaign for the third consecutive year, and his secretary, Ms. Kathleen Johnson, for her assistance. She presented a plaque of appreciation to the Superintendent, Mrs. Benita Roberts, for the district's "active involvement and enthusiasm in the 1997-98 Campaign," and to Mr. Mendez, a plaque of appreciation thanking him for his leadership and support of this year's campaign. Ms. Stalder asked Mrs. Roberts to communicate to district employees her appreciation on behalf of United Way of the Inland Valleys.

President Knight announced that he would move to Agenda Item 4, Public Verbal Comments, to allow members of the public to speak, since Closed Session went longer than anticipated. He asked that comments be limited to five minutes.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS

Mr. Chuck Dunn, community member, felt that preferential treatment was given to the son of a teacher and the grandson of a Board member during the expulsion process; therefore, the policy of "zero tolerance" for everyone equally, was violated and the district permitted a relative of an employee to be protected.

Mr. Matt Nagle, Peralta Elementary Teacher, stated that he wished to address the Board concerning a letter he received today by Certified Mail from the Superintendent, which noted that copies were sent to Board members. He first cited his rights as an American citizen to speak in public meetings; his right to question the performance of the Superintendent and others, as well as being allowed the freedom to make visits to offices of administrators. Mr. Nagle stated that he did not understand the statement in the Superintendent's letter, "...if you continue your pattern of making calls and visits to my office to schedule a meeting, I would consider such conduct to border on harassment..." He stated that he has not broken any laws, and as an American, he plans to exert his right to speak in public meetings and he will not be censored or denied access to administrators.

Mr. Cook Barela, former Board member, expressed his concern regarding the need for additional teachers due to the implementation of the Class Size Reduction Program and the importance of hiring qualified teachers to fill these positions in the classroom. In addition, he requested the Board, when reviewing Agenda Item 3b., Review Decision Concerning Board Member Travel and Conference Expenses, to reinstate full travel expenses for Board members to attend conferences so that the Board remains educated on current issues and district business affairs. He commended Mrs. Adams for completing the Master of Boardsmanship Program out of her own funds.

Mr. Ray Teagarden presented a Certificate of Recognition plaque to Mrs. Adams for earning the Master of Boardsmanship Award. The Certificate noted that Mrs. Adams completed over sixty hours of intensive training through the CSBA Master of Boardsmanship program which demonstrated her commitment to learning and leadership.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS

Mrs. Burns submitted a packet of material to the Superintendent from a conference she attended April 3-5, 1998, "Beyond Pesticides, Empowering Communities for Change," in Watsonville, California. She asked that copies of the following documents be distributed to the Board: "Rancher Won't Use Toxin Near Schools;" "Schools Adopt New Pest Policy;" "Tough New Policy on Pesticides in Schools;" "Parents Want Warning if Schools Use Pesticides," and "Teachers Confront Pesticide Issue at Ohlone." In addition, Mrs. Burns requested that an item be placed on a future Board Agenda to review the Board Policy relating to Integrated Pest Management. She stated that the Board may want to consider updating and refining the Policy concerning the use of pesticides as a last resort and adding to the Policy: (1) the posting of notices at school sites one to two days prior to the spraying of pesticide chemicals, to warn those parents who have students that are sensitive to this type of spraying; (2) developing a Master Plan to promote on-going pest preventative measures (caulking, cement repairs, relocating trash dumpsters, etc.).

Mrs. Adams expressed her appreciation to the Board and the district for her Certificate of Recognition plaque for completing the Master of Boardsmanship Program. She noted that last week she attended the EdSource Conference and will bring a tape recording of the event to share with interested Board members. Mrs. Adams stated that she is planning to attend the upcoming PTA Conference in May. She commented that she will do anything she can to assist the district in hiring quality teachers for the implementation of the Class Size Reduction program, and she will attend conferences and remain educated on current educational issues.

He explained that bid documents were not ready at the time of the printing of the Agenda, and indicated that bids received are for the necessary sitework needed prior to the arrival of the portables for the Class Size Reduction program for 1998. The Assistant Superintendent noted that bids opened on March 31, 1998 in the seven categories listed with the low bids highlighted in bold print. He noted that in Category 4, a clerical error was made on the bid from Dalke & Sons, and they have requested withdrawal of their bid amount of \$21,650. Therefore, the low bid in this category is from Econo Fence Company in the amount of \$53,496. The project total in all seven categories is \$881,713.


