d. Recognize Technology Literacy Challenge Grant Award
In September, 1998, Mr. Neil Mercurius, Administrator of Education Technology, submitted a Technology Literacy Challenge Grant. We were notified on January 12, 1999, that the District will receive \$178,000 each year for a three-year period to implement this project. The primary goal of the project is to demonstrate how technology and web-based resources can improve student achievement of standards in reading/language arts and mathematics. The second goal is to implement a school district model that assists teachers and other staff members to use technology to structure learning experiences for students as they work to achieve the standards. Finally, the project has as a goal to demonstrate how parents and other adults can be involved in helping achieve standards. Parents and other adult community members will be involved in after-school community computing centers and school labs, and during school hours, in the district Parent Center. Four Title I Elementary Schools (Ina Arbuckle, Pacific Avenue, Rustic Lane, and West Riverside) and one middle school (Mission) will participate in the Challenge Grant. Information only.

* B. Certify Site Support of Digital High School Technology Installation Grant (Mrs. Roberts)

Last fall, the District was notified that Rubidoux High School and Nueva Vista Continuation High School were eligible to receive grants up to \$300.00 per pupil to implement the Digital High School program. For several months, the principals and selected staff members along with community partners have been engaged in reviewing the application requirements and the status of technology implementation at both sites. In order to receive funding, the local Governing Board must certify that a majority of the certificated staff of the high school(s) have indicated support of participation in the program. The Principals of Rubidoux High School and Nueva Vista Continuation High School submitted certification that confirms that a majority of the certificated staff at their sites will support the Digital High School program if funding is made available.

Administration recommends that the Board certify that a majority of the certificated staffs of Nueva Vista Continuation High School and Rubidoux High School indicate their support for participation in the Digital High School Program.

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

EXPULSIONS:

- ** 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-030 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.
- ** 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-031 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c, d & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.
- ** 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-032 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 1999.
- ** 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-033 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 1999.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above.

Announce Provisions of Tentative Collective Bargaining Agreement with California School Employees' Association, Chapter #392 (Mr. Campbell)
 A tentative agreement has been reached with CSEA on the terms and conditions of the collective bargaining agreement to cover the period July 1, 1998 through June 30, 2001.
 We have been advised that CSEA membership is scheduled to vote on ratification of the tentative agreement on January 23, 1999.

If the District receives timely notice of ratification, we will make available for public review the terms and conditions of this Agreement as required by Government Code Section 3547.5. A copy will also be provided to the Riverside County Office of Education along with a copy of the required "Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreement" form. A ratification vote by the Board should be scheduled for its February 16, 1999 meeting.

6 KEYS TO HELPING A CHILD BECOME A GOOD READER.

STARTING EARLY

The ideal time to begin sharing books with children is during infancy, even with children as young as six weeks. From early on, children should own books, be read to often and see others reading and writing. Also, children should be encouraged to talk about books they already know and to elaborate or add their story lines or create new endings.

- SURROUNDING YOUR CHILD WITH A READING RICH ENVIRONMENT
 The home environment is critical. Make it a print rich one. Make sure to put up some signs around the house that use the child's name. Have toys like alphabet refrigerator magnets, writing materials and high quality books. The New York Public Library publishes a list of great children's stories on the Internet at www.nypl.org/branch/kids/gloria.html
- TALKING WITH YOUR CHILD

 There's no substitute for a caring adult who takes time with the child. Vocabulary, language skills and knowledge about the world are acquired during interesting conversations with responsive adults. In fact talking to adults is children's best source of exposure to new vocabulary and ideas. In daily life, parents should point out and read print in the environment. With your toddlers, share in making and using grocery lists, sing songs and tell stories.
- TEACHING YOUR CHILD WHILE YOU READ ALOUD

 When you read with your child, help them learn the basic rules of print. Point out how spaces separate words. Occasionally run your finger along with the words as you read so your child can learn that sentences start on the upper left and go to the right. Point to the period at the end of sentences and say, "that's the end."
- HELPING YOUR CHILD TO DEVELOP CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS

 As children move from being toddlers to school age, they should increasingly be able to grasp the meaning of language. When you read, stop to discuss unfamiliar words so your child will learn what they mean. Pause to ask questions to help the child predict what is coming next. Help children understand the main characters of stories and encourage them to talk about why these characters act the way they do.
- **▲ FINDING A GOOD PRESCHOOL SETTING**

Things to look for in a high quality pre-school include:

- · A well-supplied, well-designed space.
- · A regular daily routine
- Strong parent-teacher communications
- Strong teaching methods and teamwork among teachers
- A varied curriculum
- Language experiences
- Literacy Experiences

The Rubidoux Madrigals' Beauty Shop Quartet performed the song, "Side By Side," and the Barber Shop Quartet performed the song, "Standing On The Corner, Watching All the Girls Go By," under the direction of Ms. Staci Della-Rocco, teacher.

RECOGNIZE ACE EXAMINATION SCHOLARS The Assistant Superintendent Education Services extended congratulations to Jurupa Valley High scholars, Donnadee Thrall, Kyle M. Klimenko, Maurine M. Frey, and Michael E. Swager, for their outstanding agriculture core scores on the Assessments in Career Education (ACE) examination. These students received high honors, honors or school recognition, and he wished them well in their future endeavors.

RECOGNIZE SCHOOL HEALTH WEEK The Administrator of Education Support Services commended district nursing staff for their outstanding work in the district with students and staff. He noted that district nurses earn a dual credential to become a school nurse, and this school year their extensive duties involve TB tests for students and staff; Hepatitis B injections; scoliosis testing; family life programs; student referrals to Project Kind, and I.E.P. participation. He introduced district school nursing staff present, Ms. Virginia Schanz, Ms. Irene Allen, Ms. Donna Perricone, Ms. Kathy Carter, and Mr. Bryan Smith.

Ms. Kathy Carter, School Nurse Coordinator, distributed posters and packets of materials on "School Health Week," and announced that it will be observed beginning January 25, 1999, and provided a viewing of the Riverside County Office of Education video in support of the varied duties of the school nurse in today's educational programs.

President Knight, on behalf of the Board of Education, thanked school nurses for their dedication to youth.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS:

President Knight opened the Public Verbal Comments session and asked that comments be limited to five minutes.

DISTRICT AGRICULTURE PROGRAM

Mr. Marty Hundley, President of the Jurupa Valley Parent Agriculture Boosters, asked to speak as a representative of this parent group. He stated that approximately 90 parents are currently meeting with the Principal to discuss the importance of the agriculture department at Jurupa Valley High. Mr. Hundley reviewed the significance of the agricultural industry in California and, specifically, the Chino Basin, and he asked for the Board's consideration of the need to continue supporting the students in the agriculture programs as they move forward in pursuing an agricultural career.

COLLEGIALITY

Ms. Margery Ashwood, a teacher in the district for the past twenty-five years, recalled that in the past, she felt valued as a teaching professional and as a person. However, presently, teacher salaries are such that teachers are not being paid what is right for their accomplishments and expertise, they are only being paid what is left over.

PARENT VOLUNTEERS

Ms. Sandra Mason, Chief Job Steward for CSEA, spoke to the Board about the misunderstanding of facts concerning the use of parent volunteers at West Riverside Elementary. She indicated that CSEA has now learned that the parent volunteers will be hired for "peak load assistance." Ms. Mason questioned the district administrators' actions taken to resolve this concern.

STATE OF THE DISTRICT

Mr. Carl Zitik, teacher, recalled that even seven years ago, the district was #1 concerning teacher salaries, and teachers from outside the district were anxious to work in Jurupa because teachers were a valued resource. He commented that now, he no longer takes pride in the fact that he works for the Jurupa Unified School District. The District has slipped to the #3 or #4 position in the area of teacher salaries. Mr. Zitik indicated that demands on teachers are increasing and they are not being compensated appropriately, with salary increases equivalent to the State's COLA.

NEGOTIATIONS

Ms. Francine Rice-Laabs, NEA-Jurupa President, spoke to the Board concerning the accuracy of step and column computations and under projecting the unrestricted reserve in the General Fund. She stated that there has been no parallel COLA adjustment per ADA with an equal percentage change in salaries. In addition, Ms. Rice-Laabs indicated that teachers have not received a "simply COLA" salary increase in over five years, and this is not an unreasonable request.

LABOR NEGOTIATIONS

Mr. Armando Muniz, teacher at Rubidoux High School, asked the Board to keep in mind that students are the heart and soul of the community. He added that with surrounding districts offering their teachers salary increases of 4% to 5%, how can the District offer a 2% salary increase?

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS (CONTINUED) TEACHER SALARIES & NEGOTIATIONS Mr. Jeff Jacobs, teacher in the district for eighteen years, stated to the Board that it is in their hands as to whether the District "gets back to the way it once was," with teachers being a valued commodity.

TEACHERS - DISTRICT FOCUS

Mr. Jerry Bowman, teacher at Jurupa Valley High, stated that teachers' morale is down and experienced teachers are looking elsewhere for positions because they are being offered the leftovers in the negotiations process.

JANUARY 16, 1999 ALERT Ms. Lupe DeLaRosa, parent, asked for a revision of the process for notifying parents concerning a possible predator in the area. She stated that a piece of paper sent home with a young child can easily be missed. Ms. DeLaRosa suggested the formation of a parent volunteer group to alert parents of a dangerous individual in the area, or the use of a brightly colored paper typed in bold print, "Parent Alert," to notify parents of an unsafe person in the area.

RUBIDOUX HIGH DAC

Mr. Jim Richey, Rubidoux High School parent, recalled that the last time he spoke before the Board he talked about making funds available for the band a priority in the District's budget. He reviewed that Mr. Gray had prepared a letter to the Board listing their needs. Mr. Richey indicated that he looks forward to hearing from the Board concerning their support of these deserving students.

NEGOTIATIONS

Ms. Karen Stokoe, a teacher in the District since 1970, stated that dedicated teachers work before and after their scheduled workday as well as on weekends to improve the curriculum for students. Ms. Stokoe commented to the Board that if this is what they want teachers to continue to do, they must pay teachers what they are worth. She read a letter printed in a local newspaper from a former School Board member, asking the Board to take her advise and give teachers at least a 3.95% salary increase.

TEACHER SALARIES

Ms. Wendy Kerby, teacher, asked the Board to show more respect to teachers by negotiating a salary increase at least equal to COLA.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board members individually thanked Mr. Kuns, Ms. Della-Rocco and the Madrigal Singer Quartets for welcoming the Board to Rubidoux High School.

Mr. Chavez stated to those presenting information on teacher salaries, that the Board is listening. Mr. Chavez talked about the upcoming Lions Club Speech Contest on February 3, 1999, for high school students to compete for scholarship funds locally, and at the state and national levels, with the theme, "Cloning; Has it Gone Too Far?" He noted his participation on the Graduation Requirements Committee with meetings held at Rubidoux High School, and Rubidoux's Student Executive Committee with students interested in school board responsibilities.

Mrs. Burns commented on the importance of after school programs for students, and indicated that she will provide information from another school district's successful programs at a later date.

Mrs. Adams stated that she has additional information from the "Reading by 9" Summit that she recently attended as well as handouts from CSBA concerning policy making. She noted her participation as a judge in Pacific Avenue Elementary School's Spelling Bee, and issued an invitation to attend the District Spelling Bee on January 21, 1999 at 3:30 p.m. at Mira Loma Middle. Mrs. Adams invited Mr. Fernando Alvarez to the podium to issue an invitation for an upcoming event.



BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS (CONTINUED) Mr. Fernando Alvarez, Pacific Avenue parent, expressed his enthusiasm for the "Parent Institute," implemented at four of the district's schools during 1998, which helps parents understand and improve their students' education. He invited teachers, parents, administrators and School Board members to a follow-up meeting on Saturday, January 23, 1999 at 10:00 a.m. in the Rubidoux High School cafeteria.

President Knight commended the two Boy Scouts and their father, Mr. Bryan Smith, for attending the Board meeting, and he encouraged other parents to bring their students to Board meetings to observe the School Board process. He thanked school nurses, as health professionals, for their service to students. President Knight noted his attendance at a District Technology Standards Committee meeting, under the direction of Mr. Neil Mercurius, Administrator of Educational Technology, and noted his interest in a future report in the area of technology. He thanked Mrs. Anne Swick, Principal at Peralta Elementary, for her welcome as he visited several classrooms on her campus that included the classroom of Ms. Lopez. President Knight indicated that Ms. Lopez specifically impressed him with her excellent teaching skills with Hampton Brown and Houghton Mifflin reading materials. He thanked classified and certificated staff for providing a safe academic environment for students.

SET DATE, TIME AND PLACE FOR STUDY SESSION: GOVERNANCE TEAM SELF-EVALUATION The Superintendent stated that following the Board's decision to conduct a Governance Team Self-Evaluation, CSBA contacted the district with two dates available for this training to occur: February 22, 1999 and March 8, 1999. She noted that the process includes the Team's completion of a questionnaire sent directly to CSBA prior to the training, as well as a telephone interview. The Superintendent indicated that since the training usually involves a four to six hour time commitment, the Board may wish to begin as early as 3:00 p.m. on the date selected, and a location must be designated as well.

Following discussion, by a consensus decision, the Board determined to schedule a Special Study Session of the Board, Governance Team Self-Evaluation, on Monday, February 22, 1999, at 3:00 p.m. in the Board Room. The Superintendent indicated that she will contact CSBA tomorrow with the date, time, and location selected. She clarified that the Study Session will be a workshop for the Board to be held in public, with 72-hour notification of the meeting, and she noted that it is critical for each Governance Team member to participate completely in each phase of the evaluation process.

HEAR REPORT ON DISTRICT "FUTURES" CONFERENCE" The Superintendent recalled that the Jurupa Unified School District held a "Futures' Conference" in November, 1998, involving a broad spectrum of stakeholders including PTA Presidents, parents, business owners, teachers, administrators, and local officials. She stated that the conference served as a "kick-off event" to begin updating the District's Strategic Plan, Goals, and Five Year Facilities Master Plan. The Superintendent reviewed the many challenges that the district has faced over the past five years, including School Choice, Class Size Reduction, a District Safety Plan, Curriculum Standards, Pupil Testing, and a comprehensive policy concerning Promotion/Acceleration/Retention.

The Superintendent reviewed that during the conference, the approximately 100 participants listened to three speakers, and were divided into nine small groups for three discussion sessions. She indicated that the resulting report, "Conference Proceedings," distributed to Board members, lists the three questions addressed by participants in the small groups sessions, along with their suggestions for the educational future of Jurupa's students. The Superintendent noted that the document also contains an evaluation of the day's events, which were favorable due to the outstanding organization of her secretarial staff, participants' comments, and unedited notes from each group session relative to the future and how the learning environment should look. She indicated that the report will be submitted to the Blue Ribbon Committee forming this spring, and the demographer hired to anticipate growth in the area, as one source of information for planning the future of the school district, with recommended changes to be brought forward to the Board. The Superintendent confirmed for Mrs. Adams that the "Conference Proceedings" report will be sent to all participants.

Mr. Chavez and President Knight commended the Superintendent's Secretary, Ms. Colleen Munds, and the Board Records Secretary, Ms. Dolly Radovich, for this well-organized event.

We have received and reviewed your 1998-99 First Interim Financial Report. The governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

Our analysis of the report included the multi-year financial projections reviewed by the board. The report indicates expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$1,294,207 in the current fiscal year. However, the multi-year financial projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 1999-2000 and 2000-2001 fiscal years.

The report indicates that salary negotiations have not been concluded for the current fiscal year. Government Code Section 3547.5 requires that the major provisions of a proposed collective bargaining agreement, including the projected cost of the agreement, be disclosed at a public meeting prior to governing board approval. Please provide a copy of this information to our office ten days prior to board approval.

NOTIFICATION OF OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR SCHOOLS OF CHOICE

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The Jurupa Unified School District has an open enrollment policy for schools within the district. Our sixteen elementary, three middle schools, and two comprehensive high schools offer a variety of programs designed to meet the needs of children and their families. There are situations which make it desirable for a family to select a school outside of the attendance area designated for their residence. As such, we offer this transfer opportunity through the Open Enrollment process.

Again this year, parents may choose to have their children attend a school, other than the school of residence, provided there is space. The district staff determines how many transfer spaces are available at each school. Some schools have very few spaces; others can accommodate a number of new students. If there are more requests for transfers to a particular school than available spaces, district policy requires the use of a random selection procedure.

If you wish to have your child continue to attend the school serving your residence, you do not need to notify the school. Students currently attending a school on an open enrollment transfer need not complete a new application for the 1999/2000 school year unless they are moving up to the 7th or 9th grade, and the school of residence is different than the school which they wish to attend. If you wish your child to attend a school other than the one he/she is currently attending, please follow the instructions on page three.

Your involvement in your child's education is one of the most critical factors in his/her school success. I urge you to visit your child's school and talk to the staff; volunteer when you have time and join the PTA or other parent organization.

BEFORE YOU APPLY, PLEASE CONSIDER:

Parents who wish incoming kindergartners to attend the same transfer school as other siblings <u>must apply</u> for a transfer.

If you are anticipating a move before the next school year which will change your school of residence, and you wish your child to remain at the present school, you must apply for a transfer.

Parents of secondary students should decide about transfers during the open enrollment period. In September, it is difficult to transfer high school students because of matching class schedules, and the potential for credit loss. For students in athletics, CIF eligibility may be in jeopardy if transferring after the opening of school. Contact the Assistant Principal for Athletics at the high school to check on the status of your student.

Meeting Residency Requirements: (Education Code 48204)

A student shall be deemed to have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance provided he or she:

- a. is living with a parent/guardian or caregiver within the district, or
- b. is an emancipated minor living in the district, or
- c. is living in a licensed foster home, family home, state hospital, or licensed children's institution with the district, or
- d. is granted an interdistrict transfer based on the parent/guardian being employed within the boundaries of the school district.

Program Options in the District:

A variety of programs are available in the Jurupa Unified School District. A description of each program is provided below. The directory pages that follow list which programs are offered at each school site.

Special Education - Programs and services are available at each school for students with exceptional needs. Enrollment in these classes will be based on Individualized Education Program placement and space availability.

School Improvement - This state-funded program supports and guides schoolwide improvements to help meet the needs of all students and is offered at all elementary and middle schools.

<u>Title I/EIA</u> - These state and federally-funded programs serve grades one through six students who need additional academic support in the areas of reading, language, or math and are available at specific schools.

Structured English Immersion Program - English language learners (ELL) receive direct instruction and materials in a Structured English Immersion Program that includes content-based English Language Development (ELD). This English language development is given primary language support by authorized teachers and/or tutors.

Bilingual Spanish Program - This program serves eligible students in kindergarten through grade eight at selected schools. (School sites with this program will vary from year to year, depending upon space and the number of approved parent requests.) Students in this program, placed upon parent request and an approved waiver under Education Code 311 (c), receive primary language instruction, English Language Development (ELD) that is content based, Specially Designed Academic Instruction in English (SDAIE) from authorized teachers. According to law, such instruction may begin after 30 days in an English Immersion Program.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) - This program serves eligible students in grades kindergarten through twelve at each school, who have been identified as gifted and talented.

<u>Title IV</u> - These federal funds assist each school (K-12) to provide prevention of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, early intervention, referral or rehabilitation as necessary.

<u>Title VI</u> - These federal funds assist the school in purchasing library books and instructional materials and also provides counseling for each elementary school through the Youth Service Center of Riverside. Crisis counseling, classroom presentations, and conflict management is available to students one day a week.

<u>Instrumental Music/Elementary</u> - Three instrumental music teachers provide band instruction at each elementary school, each week.

Math Renaissance Project - The foundations of pre-algebra, pre-geometry, algebra and geometry are taught through emphasis on hands-on activities and practical application at the middle school level.

<u>Class-Size Reduction</u> - This state program for grades K-3 allows all elementary schools to reduce class size to 20 pupils per K-3 classroom by 1999. Not all 3rd grade classes in all schools will have class size reduced to 20 pupils in 1999-2000.



PROCEDURE FOR APPLYING FOR A TRANSFER:

- 1. Applications may be obtained in the office of any school in the District, and are due FEBRUARY 26, 1999.
- 2. Completed applications must be mailed to the Jurupa Unified School District, Room #10, 3924 Riverview Drive, Riverside, CA 92509 no later than FEBRUARY 26, 1999. Meeting the application deadline of February 26, 1999 is critical due to the rapid pace of growth in the District. If your application is received after the close of the open enrollment period, a decision on your application may be delayed until after school starts in the Fall, and your chances of receiving a transfer are greatly reduced.
- 3. Transfer and admission to a school of choice shall be granted if the space is available, and as established by the Jurupa Unified School District.
- 4. Parents will be notified by mail after the close of the enrollment period as to the status of their request.
- 5. Transportation to the school of choice is the responsibility of the parent.

Si usted anticipá una mudancia antes del próximo año escolar, que cambiará la escuela de su domicilio residencial y si usted desea que su hijo/a permanesca en la escuela a la cual asiste presentemente, usted debe aplicar para una transferencia.

Los padres de los estudiantes de escuela secundaria deben hacer una decición durante el período de registración activa. El Cumplimiento de Requerimientos Residenciales: (Código Educacional 48204)

Un estudiante debe comprobar que cumple con los siguientes requerimientos residenciales para asistir a una escuela:

b. si es un menor emancipado que vive dentro del distrito, o

c. si esta viviendo en una casa adoptiva, casa familiar, hospital del estado, o una institución licenciada, o

d. si se le ha otorgado una transferência de entre-distrito, por razon de que el padre/guardián esta empleado dentro de las fronteras del distrito escolar.

Opciones de Programas en el Distrito:

El Distrito Escolar Unificado de Jurupa disponé de una variedad de programas. Abajo esta proveida una descripción de cada programa. Las siguientes paginas directorias anuncian los programas que ofrecé cada escuela.

Educación Especial - En cada escuela estan disponibles programas y servicios para los estudiantes con nececidades excepcionales. La inscripción en estas clases sera basada en la colocación del Programa de Educación Individual y en el espacio disponible.

Reforma Escolar - Este programa, apoyado por el estado, sostiene y güiá una amplia cantidad de reformas escolares, para poder satisfacer las nececidades de todos los estudiantes y se ofrece en todas las escuelas primarias y mediantes.

<u>Título I/EIA</u> - Estos programas, con apoyo federal y estatal, le ofrecen servicios a los estudiantes del primer al sexto grado, que necesitan un apoyo académico adicional en el área de lectura, leguaje, o matemática y estan disponibles en escuelas particulares.

Programa de Estructura de Imersión en Inglés - Principantes del idioma inglés (ELL) reciben instrucción directa y materiales en un programa de Estructura de Imersión en Inglés que incluye un contenido basado en el Desarrollo del Idioma Inglés (ELD). Este desarrollo del idioma inglés es apoyado por el idioma primario por maestros y tutores que han sido autorizados.

Programa Bilingue en Español - Este programa es servicial a estudiantes de escuelas seleccionadas de los grados kinder al octavo que sean elegibles. El local escolar con este programa sera variable de un año a otro, segun el espacio disponible y la cantidad de peticiones que se reciban de los padres. El estudiante que sea colocado en este programa a petición de sus padres y con una renuncia aprobada bajo el código de Educación 311 (c), recibirá instrucción en su primer idioma, desarollo de lenguage en inglés <<ELD>> que se basa en contenido, Instrucción Diseñada Especialmente en Ingles (SDAIE) por medio de maestros autorizados. Segun la ley, tal instrucción puede empezar despues de haber estado en un progama de inmersión de inglés por 30 dias.

(«GATE») La Educación de Don y Talento - Este programa le provee servicio, a los estudiantes del grado kinder al grado 12, que han sido identificados con tener un don y un talento excepcional.

Título IV - Estos fondos federales asisten a las escuelas, los grados (K-12), para que proveen la prevención de las drogas, el alcohol, el uso de tabaco, intervención prematura, y la referencia o rehabilitación como sea necesaria.

<u>Título VI</u> - Estos fondos federales asisten en la compra de libros para la biblioteca y en la compra de materias intruccionales. Tambien proveen asesoramiento por medio del Centro de Servicio Juveníl de Riverside. Un día de la semana se les provee y estan disponibles para los estudiantes, asesoramientos en casos de una crisis, para la comprención de las presentaciones dentro de los salones de clase, y para el manegamiento de conflictos.

Musica Instrumental de Primaria - Cada semana, tres maestros de musica instrumental les proveen instrucciónes a cada escuela primaria.

Proyecto de Matemáticas Epoca de Renacimiento - Las fundaciones de pre-algebra, pre-geometría, algebra y geometría se enseñan por medio de un enfasis en las actividades por obra de mano y una aplicación practica al nivel escolar mediante.

La disminución del Tamaño de la Clase - Este Programa estatal para los grados K-3, permite que para el año 1999, todas las escuelas primarias disminuan el tamaño de las clases en los grados K-3, a 20 alumnos.
