## 6. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request

(Dr. Mason)

Mr. Terry Snell and Mr. Vince Rosse, Mentor Teachers, are requesting permission to travel to Los Angeles with seven students on Monday, May 24 through Tuesday, May 25, 1999. The purpose of the trip is to allow the students to participate in the State Science Fair. Travel will be provided by district vehicles, and lodging and meal costs will be paid for by Eisenhower funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

# 7. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Jurupa Valley High School

(Dr. Mason)

Mr. Gary Hanson, teacher at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting permission to travel to Catalina Island with approximately sixty students on Friday, June 11 through Sunday, June 13, 1999. The purpose of the trip is to attend the annual Friday Night Live Catalina Retreat. Students will have the opportunity to participate in workshops to gain information on the promotion of a drug-free and sober life style, and leadership skills. Transportation to the boat landing in Long Beach will be by private vehicle and the trip to Catalina will be by boat. Supervision will be provided by staff members and parent volunteers, and costs will be paid through ASB funds and fund-raisers. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Mr. Gary Hanson to travel to Catalina Island with approximately sixty students on Friday, June 11 through Sunday, June 13, 1999 to participate in the annual Friday Night Live Catalina Retreat.

# B. Change Date for Regular Meeting of Governing Board

(Mrs. Roberts)

At the May 3, 1999 meeting, Board members determined by a consensus decision to request that the Monday, June 7, 1999 Board meeting be changed to Tuesday, June 1, 1999. This change is being requested to allow for Board member participation in the Nueva Vista Continuation High School graduation ceremony and the Rubidoux High School Awards Night celebration, which are both scheduled for the evening of June 7, 1999.

The Board also asked for administration to incorporate into the Tuesday, June 1, 1999 regular Board meeting, a Study Session on the bills recently passed by the California Legislature: SB 1X, "Public Schools Accountability Act of 1999;" SB 2X, "High School Exit Examination;" AB 1X, "California Peer Assistance and Review Program for Teachers," and AB 2X, "Reading Programs."

Administration recommends that the June 7, 1999 regular meeting be changed to Tuesday, June 1, 1999 to allow for Board member participation in the Nueva Vista Continuation High School graduation ceremony and the Rubidoux High School Awards Night celebration.

# C. Adopt Resolution #99/26, Amending and Adopting Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (Mrs. Roberts)

The California Resources Agency adopted a substantial number of revisions to the State CEQA Guidelines which became effective October 26, 1998. These changes are reflected in a number of provisions in the District's Guidelines for implementing CEQA.

The District's counsel, Best, Best & Krieger LLP, prepared the 1999 Local Guidelines for Implementing CEQA provided in the supporting documents for Board members. The Guidelines are available for public review in the Superintendent's office.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #99/26, Amending and Adopting Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act.

# D. Consider Elimination of Co-payment for Reduced Price Breakfast and Lunch Programs

(Mr. Edmunds)

The National School Lunch Program is a federally assisted meal program established under the National School Lunch Act, signed by President Harry Truman in 1946. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, through its Food and Nutrition Service, administers the program at the Federal level. At the State level, the program is administered by state education agencies, which operate the program through agreements with local school districts.

The National School Lunch Program provides school districts with cash subsidies and donated commodities from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for each meal we serve. In return, we must serve lunches that meet Federal requirements, and we must offer free or reduced-priced lunches to eligible children.

Current regulations require schools to meet the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, which recommend that no more than 30 percent of an individual's calories come from fat, and less than 10 percent from saturated fat. Regulations also establish a standard for school meals to provide one-third of the Recommended Daily Allowances of protein, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, Iron, calcium, and calories.

Our Food Services department operates solely on revenues derived from food sales. Revenues come from the Federal government, State government and/or direct customer sales. All revenue sources are based on customer participation. The money from the Federal and State agencies depends on two criteria:

- •Number of meals served
- Category of served meals
  - a. Free
  - b. Reduced
  - c. Paid

We receive the most money from students who qualify for Free meals, then Reduced meals, and finally, Paid meals.

Mike Bynum, Director of Food Services, recently conducted a study comparing participation levels of students in the Reduced Price Lunch Program and the Free Lunch Program. This study shows that only 48.2% of students eligible for reduced price lunches participate in that program, as compared to a 59.8% participation rate in the free lunch program. Similarly, for breakfast, the participation rates are 8.3% versus 26.4% for reduced versus free breakfast.

D. <u>Consider Elimination of Co-payment for Reduced Price Breakfast and Lunch Programs</u>
(Continued)

(Mr. Edmunds)

The difference between qualifying for reduced or free is often a very small amount and a lot of the reduced pay students are under the same financial strain as those qualifying for free lunches. Because of this, these children often go without breakfast or lunch.

Administration believes that by eliminating the co-payments for reduced price meals (30 cents for breakfast; 40 cents for lunch), participation would increase to about the same level as the free program. The proposed change is not expected to cost the Food Service department any money because of the projected increase in participation, and subsequently, the increase in revenue from Federal and State agencies.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the elimination of co-payment for Reduced Price Breakfast and Lunch Programs.

E. <u>Authorize Purchase of New Telephone System for Glen Avon Elementary</u> (Mr. Edmunds) The telephone and intercom system at Glen Avon Elementary School is approximately 15 years old, has become increasingly expensive to repair, and is unserviceable. The Maintenance Department has determined that the best course of action is to replace the telephone system.

The District standard for phone systems is the Norstar System. The system acts as both a telephone and intercom system. Additionally, the system can be programmed to either restrict or allow outside telecommunication from each telephone set or classroom. Additional features include the ability to block long distance and/or '900' numbers.

As part of the 1998/99 Site Block Grant Proposal, the new telephone system was identified as Glen Avon Elementary School's only item of expenditure. The Purchasing Department has obtained a quote from Norstar Telephone System for the new system in the amount of \$13,336.22, which includes sales tax. Board Policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of one Norstar Telephone System for Glen Avon Elementary School from Co-Matrix of Anaheim, California, in the amount of \$13,336.22 (including tax), on Purchase Order #17267.

F. <u>Authorize Purchase of New Copier for Mission Bell Elementary</u> (Mr. Edmunds) As part of the 1998/99 Site Block Grant Proposal, Mission Bell Elementary School has requested that a new copier be purchased for their school. The principal has identified an OCE 3045 Copy System as the copier that best suits their needs. The copier is available for purchase from the Los Angeles County Cooperative Bid at a cost of \$12,957.84 (including tax). Board Policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #17268 to Oce-USA, Inc. of Chicago, IL in the amount of \$12,957.84 (including tax) for the purchase of one OCE 3045 Copier for Mission Bell Elementary.

# G. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Authorize Solicitation of Bids for Replacement of Jurupa Valley High Kitchen Floor

(Mr. Edmunds)

The kitchen floor at Jurupa Valley High School is an epoxy coated concrete surface. Over the past few years, it has deteriorated and become difficult to maintain, with holes and chips creating safety hazards, and is in need of replacement. The Senior Building Inspector has determined that quarry tile is best suited for this purpose. The approximate cost for the project is \$45,000 and the work could be accomplished during the summer. The cost of the project would be paid for with Food Service funds. Administration recommends the Board approve the solicitation of bids to replace the Jurupa Valley High kitchen floor at an approximate cost of \$45,000.

2. Act on Other Timely School Facility Matters

Due to frequent changes taking place in facility improvement programs, items which require

# H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Dr. Needham)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

#### **EXPULSIONS:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-061 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before September 7, 1999.
- \*\* 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-062 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b, c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before September 7, 1999.
- \*\* 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-064 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1, k & .4) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.

# H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Dr. Needham)

- \*\* 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-065 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.
- \*\* 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-067 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.
- \*\* 6. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #99-068 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2000.

# I. Approve Personnel Matters

Approve Personnel Report #20

(Mr. Campbell)

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #20 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

\* 2. Adopt at Second Reading Revised Board Policies #4567 And #4567. Extended Health and Dental Benefits. (Mr. Campbell)

Periodically, it is necessary to revise existing policies for managers so that they are the same as those that apply to other employees. This recommended policy revision is intended to bring our Extended Health and Dental Benefits policy for certificated managers in line with the benefits currently available to other certificated employees. Included in the supporting documents is a copy of Article XVIII from the certificated employees' contract which has been appropriately rewritten as recommended Board Policy #4567 and #4552 to cover certificated managers. Administration recommends adoption at second reading of Revised Board Policies #4567 and #4552

# I. Approve Personnel Matters (Continued)

3. Adopt Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators.

Each year, the Board must adopt a "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" as a prerequisite to the issuance of emergency teaching permits for the District. This declaration is one of the new state requirements of the Commission on Teacher Credentialing governing the issuance of emergency permits and the orientation, guidance and training of emergency permit holders. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits, particularly to fill partial assignments, specialized areas of instruction such as math and science, or areas of statewide shortage such as English language learner and special education programs. With the addition of the K-3 class size reduction program, it is also necessary to employ some emergency permit teachers for the District. The information shown in the supporting documents accounts for all these needs for next school year. It is recommended that the Board adopt the "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" for 1999-00.

4. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request
Recent changes in state credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, Bilingual Education, Mathematics or Science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a vacancy for a Resource Specialist position at Rubidoux High School due to the recent illness of the current teacher, who has undergone emergency bypass surgery. The person being recommended is Mr. Todd Chard. Mr. Chard earned his Bachelors degree from Boston University. He has worked in the district as a substitute teacher since August 1996 and has become a very valuable substitute teacher. Mr. Chard is received well by the students and is often requested by teachers. Recruitment efforts have not identified a stronger candidate.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Todd Chard be approved for temporary employment through the end of this school year as a Resource Specialist under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.

5. Approve CBEST Waiver for Day-to-Day Substitute Teachers (Mr. Campbell)

Because of the impact that the Class Size Reduction Program has had on district substitute pools throughout California, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing is allowing districts to temporarily waive the CBEST exam requirement for day-to-day (1999-2000) substitute teachers. The district-wide waiver would be for a maximum of one year. Substitute teachers would have one calendar year to take and pass CBEST, rather than having to pass prior to beginning work. The Commission has developed and it is recommended that the following statement be submitted to the Board for approval.

It is recommended that the Board declare that teachers were hired from the district substitute pool to implement class size reduction and, as a consequence of this action, the district is unable to recruit substitutes who have had an opportunity to take and pass the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST). The district anticipates employing fifty substitutes on various term CBEST waivers.

REVIEW APPROVAL OF 1998-99 2ND INTERIM REPORT The Superintendent stated that notification was received from the Riverside County Office of Education that the District's 1998-99 Second Interim Financial Report has received positive certification, and notification was sent to the California Department of Education accordingly. She noted that the Assistant Superintendent Business Services will provide updated multi-year financial projections at the time of the annual adoption of the district's Budget in June.

SET STUDY SESSION FOR JUNE 1, 1999 The Superintendent recommended that due to the four recently passed bills by the California Legislature, and the wide-ranging implications of these bills for school districts, the Board may wish to schedule a Study Session for a thorough review of the bills on either Tuesday, May 25, 1999 or Tuesday, June 1, 1999.

THE BOARD BY A CONSENSUS DECISION, AGREED TO SET THE DATE OF JUNE 1, 1999 FOR A BOARD STUDY SESSION TO ASK QUESTIONS AND REVIEW THE IMPLICATIONS TO THE SCHOOL DISTRICT ON THE FOLLOWING BILLS RECENTLY PASSED BY THE CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE: SB 1X, "PUBLIC SCHOOLS ACCOUNTABILITY ACT OF 1999;" SB 2X, "HIGH SCHOOL EXIT EXAMINATION;" AB 1X, "CALIFORNIA PEER ASSISTANCE AND REVIEW PROGRAM FOR TEACHERS," AND AB 2X, "READING PROGRAMS."

HEAR REPORT ON SCHOOL SAFETY

The Superintendent commented that this School Safety item was placed on the Agenda for the Board to have an opportunity to review the safety procedures currently in place districtwide. She indicated that in light of the recent tragedy in Littleton, Colorado, it may be helpful to briefly outline the physical safety measures that are currently provided, as well as the assignments of personnel to address the personal, social, and emotional needs of students. The Superintendent highlighted the responsibilities of campus supervisors, activity supervisors, School Resource Officers, S.C.O.R.E. team members, Guidance Coordinators, administrative support, and various school-wide programs to be responsive in every department and school site to the importance of school safety.

President Knight commended the Youth Service Center for their collaborative counseling services provided for students as well. He referred to the "Riverside County Kids with Guns Protocol" prepared by the District Attorney's Office and the Probation Department to apprise those who work with youth on response procedures. He asked that additional copies be obtained for Board members and to share with school sites.

PRESENT DISTRICT PLAQUE FROM ASSEMBLYMAN PACHECO The Superintendent presented to the Board a framed Resolution for the District from the office of Assemblyman Rod Pacheco. She noted that the Resolution was presented on April 22, 1999 at a special Open House, and draws special attention to the Jurupa Unified School District, its students, teachers, staff, and administrators for the outstanding success of their educational programs, and extends best wishes for the District's continued success.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS:

President Knight opened the Public Verbal Comments session and asked that comments be limited to five minutes.

PEER COUNSELING

Ms. Diana Brock, Jurupa Valley High PTSA, spoke in favor of the Peer Counseling Course Plan being presented to the Board under Agenda Item C. She indicated that this outstanding program is not only an excellent addition to the high school curriculum, but this successful program can be implemented at all grade levels to train students to be tolerant of other's differences. Ms. Brock stated that the program will improve campus life and will help students deal with the pressures of youth. She noted that State grant funds are also available to districts with Peer Counseling programs. In addition, Ms. Brock presented a letter from Scott Bigler, Jurupa Valley High ASB President, expressing the desire of students to have a Peer Counseling Class at both high schools.

STUDENT REQUEST TO POST INFORMATION

Ms. Vanessa Freire, Jurupa Valley High student, asked for the Board to review their Board Policy relating to their request to post information on their campus on teen pregnancy and sex education.

The Superintendent noted that a response to this request will be addressed to the students by letter.

THANK YOU TO THE BOARD

Mr. Carl Zitik, teacher, thanked Mrs. Burns for visiting his school site and presenting her "Rock Show" to students and for reading to students during the "Read Across America" celebration. He thanked the Board for their efforts concerning the contract for teachers and for making Jurupa teachers number one. Mr. Zitik reported that in a recent meeting that he attended, he found that Jurupa's teachers are well-versed in curriculum standards compared to teachers in other districts. In addition, Mr. Zitik found that other districts did not involve their teachers in the curriculum standards development process.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Mr. Chavez reviewed his attendance at the recent CSBA Delegate Assembly meeting, and noted the dilemma of filling the CSBA Presidency, since the President-Elect lost in the recent election. He noted that hopefully, the situation will be resolved by December. He submitted copies of the Resolution passed by CSBA on May 1, 1999 extending sympathies to the Jefferson County School District school board members and community in response to their recent tragedy. Mr. Chavez also presented a copy of the CSBA introduction of the "K-12 Master Plan" to address the major reforms of the educational system in the last three years. He asked for the Superintendent to follow-up with an invitation for Attorney General Bill Lockyer to visit and talk to Jurupa's high school students.

Mr. Teagarden spoke on behalf of the outstanding Jurupa Valley Theater Department and their recent performance of "The Man Who Came to Dinner." He noted upcoming performances on May 6, 7, and 8 with an outstanding cast of students.

Mrs. Burns requested a report in the near future on a drug-sniffing dog program which is being successfully implemented on several Riverside County school campuses.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS (CONTINUED) Mrs. Adams noted her visits to Jurupa Middle and Camino Real Elementary Schools. She recognized and expressed her appreciation to a Jurupa Middle School Campus Supervisor, Mr. Darel Hansen, who raised funds in the community to pay for a new fenced iron gate and bench area to house the school's mascot.

President Knight offered words of thanks to Assemblyman Pacheco for the beautiful plaque presented to the District. He noted that he was able to visit several schools during "Public Schools Week," and he thanked sites for their various planned activities for the community. President Knight highlighted his visits to Camino Real Elementary School's garden area; Troth Street Elementary School's English Learner class as they prepared their Mother's Day cards; a Pacific Avenue Elementary English learner class, and Mira Loma Middle to judge the Academic Olympics, with finals to be held on May 18, under the leadership of teachers, Ms. Margie Forward, and Ms. Linda Goedhart.

Mrs. Burns asked to be informed in the Friday Letter on the time of the Academic Olympics finals.

Mr. Teagarden remarked that it would be a positive factor for Jurupa to be a leader in the area of technology, and he stated that it is time for the Board to be brought into the world of computers and internet access with administrators and the community.

TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE FOR ADMINISTRATION TO OBTAIN QUOTATIONS FROM PROSPECTIVE BIDDERS FOR THE PURCHASE OF FIVE INDIVIDUAL COMPUTERS, EITHER MACINTOSH OR IBM AT THE BOARD MEMBERS' CHOICE, WITH A COMPUTER MONITOR, FOR A TOTAL COST PER COMPUTER NOT TO EXCEED \$3,000.00 PER BOARD MEMBER SYSTEM, WITH THE DISTRICT FURNISHING THE APPROPRIATE COMPUTER SOFTWARE & ISP SERVER WITH REMOTE ACCESS TO THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT SERVER. Mrs. Burns spoke in opposition to this request, as she felt it to be unnecessary due to the fact that she already has her own computer, she is on-line, and she has been accessible by Email for at least five years. She stated that the cost for the computer system, installation, software, virus protection, etc., would be better spent on other educational purposes.

Mrs. Adams stated that she did not agree with this request, because there are other more pressing needs for students, and most Board members already own a personal computer to receive Email and faxed messages.

Following this discussion, President Knight asked for the Board's vote on the matter. A VOTE WAS TAKEN: AYES, MR. CHAVEZ, MR. TEAGARDEN; NAYES, PRESIDENT KNIGHT, MRS. ADAMS, MRS. BURNS; MOTION LOST, 2-3.

APPROVE HIGH SCHOOL COURSE PLANS -Motion #173 The Superintendent recalled that at the April 5, 1999 meeting, Board action was tabled concerning the approval of the high school course plan, Peer Counseling I and II, until liability issues could be addressed. She stated that the Jurupa Valley High School Principal, Ms. Jan Moorehouse, did an outstanding job contacting other high schools with a history of successful Peer Counseling programs, and principals indicated that they have never experienced a situation where a peer counselor was placed in a situation involving liability for their districts. The Superintendent further noted that according to staff at the two comprehensive high schools, some of the goals for students involved in the Peer Counseling program include, "building life skills of personal and social competency, and the development of responsibility in our students." She commented that the Peer Counseling I and II Course Plans are contained in the supporting documents with a program description by author, Bonnie Bernard.

MRS. BURNS MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE COURSE PLANS FOR PEER COUNSELING I AND II FOR THE COMPREHENSIVE HIGH SCHOOLS. MRS. ADAMS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.



APPROVE 1999 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM -Motion #174

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services reviewed the proposed 1999 Summer School program provided by State funds for 7% of the school district's K-12 enrollment. He noted that according to State mandates, students at the high school level receive first priority, followed by core academic classes for eighth grade students needing to promote, and a program for K-12 special education students must be included as well. Course offerings include: (1) Secondary Proficiency Classes; (2) Core Academics; (3) Individualized Program IPI; (4) Special Education; (5) Independent Study; (6) Work Experience; (7) AVID Program and, (8) Nueva Vista. The Assistant Superintendent indicated that the dates and times of each program are listed on the Agenda, with transportation provided for special education students only.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE 1999 SUMMER SCHOOL OFFERINGS AS LISTED ON THE AGENDA. MR. TEAGARDEN SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE PURCHASE OF 33 COMPUTERS & 6 LASER PRINTERS FOR SECONDARY STUDENT DATA SYSTEM -Motion #175 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services requested the Board's approval to purchase thirty computer systems from Primary Computer Services, Inc. for \$34,399.19 and six printers from Macwarehouse for \$9,038.07 through the issuance of Purchase Orders #16988 and #16989 respectively. He indicated that the purchases are necessary in order to complete the installation of the Netel student data system at the secondary level, with the equipment paid for out of One-Time Block Grant funds.

MR. TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #16988 TO PRIMARY COMPUTER SERVICES, INC., IN THE AMOUNT OF \$34,399.19 (INCLUDING TAX) FOR THE PURCHASE OF THIRTY COMPUTER SYSTEMS, AND PURCHASE ORDER #16989 TO MACWAREHOUSE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$9,038.07 (INCLUDING TAX) FOR THE PURCHASE OF SIX HEWLETT PACKARD LASER PRINTERS. MRS. ADAMS SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE PURCHASE OF 1 MOWER -Motion #176 The Assistant Superintendent Business Services asked that the Board authorize the purchase of a new lawnmower from AA Equipment at a cost of \$15,320.97, due to the high cost of repairing the existing 12-13 year old lawnmower which is estimated at \$9,000.

The Assistant Superintendent replied to Mrs. Burns that the District does not have the amount of green waste being placed in District dumpsters per month; however, he assured her that the District does have mulching mowers. ### RESOLUTION NO. 99/26

A RESOLUTION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AMENDING AND ADOPTING LOCAL GUIDELINES FOR IMPLEMENTING THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (PUB. RESOURCES CODE §§ 21000 ET SEQ.)

WHEREAS, the California Legislature has amended the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") (Pub. Resources Code §§ 21000 et seq.) and the State CEQA Guidelines (Cal. Code of Regs, tit. 14, §§ 15000 et seq.) and the California courts have interpreted specific provisions of CEQA;

WHEREAS, Section 21082 of CEQA requires all public agencies to adopt objectives, criteria and procedures for the evaluation of public and private projects undertaken or approved by such public agencies, and the preparation, if required, of environmental impact reports in connection with that evaluation; and

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Unified School District ("School District") must revise its local guidelines for implementing CEQA to make them consistent with the current provisions and interpretations of CEQA.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:



SECTION 1. The Board of Education adopts "Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (1999 Revision)," a copy of which is on file at the offices of the School District and is available for inspection by the public.

SECTION 2. All prior actions of the Board of Education enacting earlier guidelines are hereby repealed.

EXTENDED HEALTH WA DENTAL BENEFITS

Section 1 - Health and Dental Benefit. District health and dental benefits for a retiree and dependent(s) shall be carried at the same rate and same District contribution as though a full-time unit member until the retiree reaches age 65 or until such time as Federal or State

medical insurance covers the retiree, whichever comes first.

- A. This benefit applies only to unit members who elect to retire under the STRS program prior to age sixty-five (65).
