* 5. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from S.C.O.R.E. Team

Mr. George Monge, Rubidoux High School Assistant Principal, and five members of the S.C.O.R.E. Team are requesting approval to attend the California State Juvenile Officers Association 51st Annual Training Conference in Laughlin, Nevada February 29 - March 3, 2000. The conference is designed to address such topics as abolishing chronic truancy; student discipline, school safety, investigation procedures, and guidelines for handling missing children.

Ms. Rhonda Batterton, Mr. Andrew Elliott, and Ms. Emily Terry, teachers at Pedley Elementary School, are requesting approval to travel to Alpine Meadows in the San Bernardino Mountains. The purpose of the trip is to provide an opportunity for sixth grade students to attend a science camp. Each sixth grade class would be attending, accompanied by their teacher. The dates scheduled are Monday, March 6 through Friday, March 10, 2000. All costs for this trip will be paid by donations through the Wildlands Conservancy. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. The program, for five days and four nights, includes activities designed to meet the *Science Framework of California Public Schools* and the new *Science Standards*.

* 9. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Granite Hill Elementary

(Dr. Mason)

Mr. Otis Allmon, Ms. Jennifer Collier, Mr. Joseph Ramer, and Ms. Leah Luck, teachers at Granite Hill Elementary School, are requesting approval to travel to Cedar Crest and Ponderosa Pines Science Camp in Running Springs. The purpose of the trip is to provide an opportunity for sixth grade students to attend a science camp. Each sixth grade class would be attending, accompanied by their teacher. The dates scheduled are Monday, March 13 through Friday, March 17, 2000. All costs for this trip will be paid by donations through the Wildlands Conservancy. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. The program, for five days and four nights, includes activities designed to meet the *Science Framework of California Public Schools* and the new *Science Standards*.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip request for Granite Hill Elementary School's sixth grade students to attend the Cedar Crest and Ponderosa Pines Science Camp in Running Springs on Monday, March 13 through Friday, March 17, 2000.

B. Consider Governance Team Self-Evaluation

(Mrs. Roberts)

At the last Board meeting, President Knight indicated his desire for the Board to conduct a second Governance Team Self-Evaluation. Members will recall that during January 1999, the Board completed a Self-Study followed by a Self-Evaluation workshop led by a consultant from the California School Boards Association (CSBA). Following discussion, the Board should determine whether it wishes to engage CSBA consultants in a second Governance Team Self-Evaluation and direct administration to move forward and make appropriate arrangements.

* C. Consider Technical Change to Board Policy #9250, Compensation for Board Member Services (Mrs. Roberts)

At the last Board meeting, Mrs. Burns asked administration to bring forward for review Board Policy #9250, Compensation for Board Member Services. Her concern was that the Policy calls for Board compensation to be tied to attendance at all "regular" and "special meetings." However, it does not specifically state that Study Sessions are considered special meetings of the Board and should be a part of this consideration when determining monthly compensation. Following review, the Board should direct administration as to its desire to add the phrase, "Study Session" as a technical change to Board Policy #9250.

* D. Approval at First Reading New Board Policy #3130 - Investments

(Mr. Edmunds)

Section 53646 of the California Government Code requires public agencies to (1) annually provide to the Governing Board a statement of the district's investment policy which is to be considered at a public meeting and (2) render quarterly reports to the Governing Board. This new policy has been adapted from CSBA.

Administration recommends approval at first reading of the above listed new Board Policy #3130-Investments.

E. Authorize Purchase of Half-Ton Pick-Up Truck for the Maintenance Department

(Mr. Edmunds)

The 1999/2000 Budget included an additional position for the Maintenance Department in order to keep up with an increasing workload. We have recently hired a Carpenter to fill this position, and it will be necessary to purchase a truck so the carpenter can perform his job. The fleet currently consists of Ford Motor Company products, and the Senior Building Inspector, Mr. Bill Elzig, has requested that uniformity be maintained.

The Purchasing Department estimates that the new pick-up costs will not exceed \$20,000. The most advantageous method of purchasing the pick-up, since the cost will not exceed the bidding limit, is to negotiate with several dealers and then purchase the truck on the spot rather than order from the factory. Ordering from the factory requires eight to twelve weeks delivery lead-time. If the Board approves, the Purchasing Department will purchase the truck by this method and submit the Purchase Order at a later Board meeting for ratification.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the Purchasing Department to purchase a half-ton pick-up truck for the Maintenance Department.

1. Review and Act on Other Timely School Facility Matters

(Mr. Edmunds)

Due to frequent changes taking place in facility improvement programs, items which require Board discussion or action may arise between agenda preparation and meeting times. Administration may provide such items as verbal information reports or recommendations for action.

G. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mrs. Roberts)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

EXPULSIONS:

- ** 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #00-028 for violation of Education Code 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 15, 2001.
- ** 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #00-029 for violation of Education Code 48900 (c & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. February 25, 2000 Mrs. Margaret Wesson, parent volunteer, is coordinating a Black History Month Assembly. Students will sing songs, recite poetry, and pay homage to famous and influential Black leader @ 8:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m.

Mission Bell Elementary School

Displays in Multi-purpose room, specific lessons in classrooms regarding the contributions of African-Americans. Several classes honoring specific historical figures who impacted American life, e.g., George Washington Carver, Martin Luther King, Jr., Rosa Parks, Harriet Tubman, and others. Book reports in classes centering on biographies of important African-Americans.

Pacific Avenue Elementary School

Classrooms will be celebrating Black History Month with various activities that emphasize the achievements and excellence of African-Americans. There will be classroom plays, lessons, and stories, etc. All 2nd grade classes participated in Random Acts of Kindness through the internet in celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King.

Pedley Elementary School

Primary Grade will be studying African American literature, Mr. Lincoln the Great Emancipator, and reading mini books on Martin Luther King, Jr. Upper Grades will be studying famous black heroes/heroines, famous black Americans in history and Abraham Lincoln's role in ending slavery.



Peralta Elementary School

Display in library of important black contributors to our society, with emphasis on black inventors. Parents have been invited to visit our library. Videos have been purchased describing the lives of these inventors, and they have been shown to each class. Anita Terrell, Peralta's custodian, has met with each class, discussing her heroes and favorite inventors with the students.

Rustic Lane Elementary School

Students will learn about Black History through music and song. There will be videos shown on famous African-Americans in various classrooms. The African-American Historical calendar will be used to tell the story of African-Americans and their role in history. There are many different activities going on during the month focusing on African-Americans and will be tied into their classroom curriculum.

Sky Country Elementary School

There will be bulletin boards focusing on Black History. Students will be reading literature on Martin Luther King, Jr. and "The Gold Cadillac" a story about a closely knit Black family's encounter with ignorance and prejudice in the South during the 1950's. Classes will be researching historic figures: Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Jr., Harriet Tubman, Rosa Parks, Ruby Bridges, Jackie Robinson, Buffalo Soldiers, and Tiger Woods. Classes will be writing essays, doing activity sheets, and discussing many different subjects relating to Black History.

Stone Avenue Elementary School

All students have been learning about Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and poetry by Langston Hughes has been part of the language arts program. Students in 2nd grade are performing a patriotic program February 24 @ 6:30 p.m. Students in 4th grade have been studying Harriet Tubman and the Underground Railroad.

Sunnyslope Elementary School

Kindergarten-Reading books about Martin Luther King, Jr., "Grand Daddy's Gift", "Aunt Flossies Hat", and "All the Colors We Are – The Story of How We Get Our Skin Color".

1st Grade-Studying a unit on black inventors and will watch a video on Martin Luther King, Jr. Learning songs and poetry regarding black history.

2nd Grade-Classes will be study one of the first black teachers, Mary McLeod Bethune and her role in starting a school for black girls, booker T. Washington and George Washington Carver.

3rd Grade-Classes will be discussing segregation and non-violent protests. They will read and discuss the speech: "I Have a Dream..." Martin Luther King, Jr., and Thurgood Marshall.

4th Grade-Classes will be discussing what life was like living in the south where Dr. Martin Luther King grew up. Students are to write what Brotherhood means to them, and are reading the book "Ashanti to Zulu-African Traditions", which tells the story of the different tribes in Africa.

5th Grade-Classes will be having discussions on violence and non-violent solutions. Students were asked to write a personal essay starting with "I Have a Dream". Classes are reading "Faith Ringold" and discussing the influence on the artist's life: African culture, music, dance, etc.

6th Grade-Classes are reading materials on accomplishments of Martin Luther King and Rosa Parks. Classes are also discussing the Civil Rights movement and were asked to write a "I Have a Dream" essay for their community, country and world.

Troth Street Elementary School

Each classroom is celebrating Black History Month through a variety of instructional activities: Reading and discussing "The Story of Ruby Bridges", "They Won't Let Me Play With Them", The Story of Rosa Parks", "How One Person Made a Difference", and "Five Brave Explorers". Students will be writing essays about Abraham Lincoln, Slavery, Emancipation, Martin Luther King Jr., Rosa Pards, Prejudice, Tolerance and Multiculturalism. Classes will be having group discussions regard the Civil Rights movement.

The material consists of the ballot on red paper, the required biographical sketch, and if submitted, a resume for each candidate. In addition we are including a "copy" of the ballot on white paper so that it may be copied for inclusion in board agenda packets. However, only the ballot on red paper is to be completed and returned.

The board as a whole votes using the red ballot. The board may vote for up to the number of vacancies in the region or subregion, as indicated on the ballot. For example, if there are three vacancies in the region or subregion, the board may vote for up to three individuals. Regardless of the number of vacancies, each board may cast no more than one vote for any one candidate. The ballot also contains a provision for write-in candidates; their name and district must be clearly printed in the space provided.

The ballot must be signed by the clerk or secretary to the board and returned in the enclosed envelope. Only the members of the CSBA Elections Committee may open the envelopes, which is why it is important to use the envelope provided. If for some reason the envelope is misplaced, please write DELEGATE ELECTION prominently on your envelope. Envelopes with the ballots must be postmarked on or before Wednesday, March 15. No exceptions are allowed.

All districts and candidates will be notified following the counting of the ballots. If there is a tie vote, a run-off election shall be held within 30 days. All re-elected and newly elected delegates are eligible to attend the Delegate Assembly on May 6-7, 2000 in Sacramento.

PRESIDENT KNIGHT ADJOURNED THE BOARD TO CLOSED SESSION IN THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE FOR THE FOLLOWING PURPOSES: TO DISCUSS ITS POSITIONS REGARDING ANY MATTER WITHIN THE SCOPE OF REPRESENTATION AND INSTRUCTING ITS DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVES FOR NEGOTIATIONS WITH EMPLOYEE GROUPS; PERSONNEL REPORT #13; PUBLIC EMPLOYEE DISCIPLINE/ DISMISSAL/ REASSIGNMENT/RELEASE/RESIGNATION/RETIREMENT/COMPLAINTS, AND EXPULSION CASES #98-119, #00-027, #00-031. At 6:03 p.m., the Board recessed to Closed Session in the Superintendent's Office. At 6:55 p.m., the Board adjourned from Closed Session.

OPENING OF REGULAR BOARD MEETING

At 7:03 p.m., President Knight called the meeting to order in Public Session.

FLAG SALUTE

President Knight led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

INSPIRATIONAL COMMENT

Mrs. Adams made an inspirational comment.



REPORT: RHS STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE Crystal Hadden, Rubidoux High student representative, reported the following: Annual events during the month of February will include Valentine's Day and Black History Month celebrations. The Madrigal Singers will deliver Val-o-grams and the ASB is sponsoring a Valentine's Pep Rally. The next issue of *The Talon* will be distributed on Wednesday. The wrestling team beat North last week 53-20. The Delta Alliance Corps is hosting the Drum Line Show on February 12. The Mock Trial Competition is scheduled for next Wednesday against Poly. The Black History Celebration will be held at Mission Middle on February 29 with Rubidoux High, Mission and Jurupa Middle choirs participating. Black History Week will be celebrated during the week of February 22-25, with a special assembly held on the 24th sponsored by the BSU.

REPORT: JVHS STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE Joshua Johnson, Jurupa Valley High student representative, reported the following: The ROTC inspection is scheduled for February 9. The band is sponsoring a fundraiser on February 10 at the Sizzler restaurant on Clay and Limonite. The annual Science Fair will be held on February 15, 16, and 17. Mock Trial competitions begin on February 16. The Cal-State San Bernardino High School Collaboration grant was approved and will provide an opportunity for students to receive tutoring and ELM/EPT test services and faculty members to receive direct access to the faculty at the college. Golden State Exams are complete with results made available in June of this year. With a minimum day schedule planned for February 8, students are invited to attend the WASC accreditation focus group meetings to provide their input as well. The ASB will be sponsoring an event for incoming freshman on February 29 to acquaint them with club and sports activities. Several students attended the opening day of the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center garden and shared their ideas on the future of the Center. A thank you was offered to Mr. John Chavez, Mrs. Mary Burns, and Mrs. Benita Roberts for attending the Winter Pep Rally and luncheon on February 1.

RECOGNIZE NATIONAL SCHOOL NURSE'S DAY JANUARY 26, 2000 In order to recognize January 26, 2000 as "National School Nurse's Day," Ms. Kathy Carter, School Nurse Coordinator, presented a PowerPoint presentation with pictures and biographical sketches of each of the District's seven school nurses. She emphasized that the chief goal of the school nurse is to promote the health and wellbeing of children. Ms. Carter reviewed that the work of a school nurse involves a variety of tasks such as vision and hearing screening; distributing student medications; working in the area of crisis management; addressing the needs of pupils with special needs; assisting with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs); arranging for staff inservices; helping to reduce absences by educating students on universal health related precautions, and emphasizing the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle. She invited school board members to visit school nurses at their sites and obtain a free blood pressure reading. Ms. Carter expressed her appreciation for the Board's support with the recent addition of the School Health Aide position to assist with specialized student health needs. In addition, she thanked Dr. Terry Tibbetts, Administrator of Education Support Services, for his support of the District's nursing staff. Ms. Carter explained to Mr. Chavez that trained staff and volunteers assist with pediculosis screening during the annual season when infestations are frequent.

RECOGNIZE 1999/2000 SPELLING BEE PARTICIPANTS The Assistant Superintendent Education Services congratulated participants of the 23rd annual Spelling Bee held at Mira Loma Middle School on January 20, 2000. He recognized Spelling Bee winner, Ms. Ashley Johnson, 5th grade student at Stone Avenue Elementary, and runner-up, Ms. Manmit Singh, 6th grade student at Rustic Lane Elementary. He noted that Ms. Johnson will represent the District at the 1999/2000 Riverside County Spelling Bee at Martin Luther King High School on March 21, 2000.

RECOGNIZE INLAND EMPIRE MAGAZINE'S "TEACHERS WHO MAKE A DIFFERENCE The Superintendent reported that Ms. Rhonda Batterton, Pedley Elementary teacher, and Ms. Lois Clark, Mission Middle teacher, were among the "Ten Teachers Who Make A Difference for 2000" recognized in the January issue of the *Inland Empire* magazine for parents. She commended the two teachers for this special selection and noted that congratulatory letters will be sent on behalf of the Board of Education.

RECOGNIZE "COLLEGE AWARENESS MONTH"

The Superintendent stated that Ms. Delaine Eastin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, sent information to school district's indicating that the month of February is designated as "College Awareness Month." She noted that the District is on target with Board adopted goal #4, "Jurupa schools will increase the number of students eligible for college and other powerful post-secondary options," by including this year's eighth grade class at all three middle schools in Riverside Community College's 'Passport to College" college readiness tour and the University of California, Riverside's Early Academic Outreach program. She noted that this year's eighth grade class, the Class of 2004, will also be the first class to participate in the State's High School Exit Exam.

HEAR REPORT ON ENRICHMENT, ACCELERATED, & CORRELATED STANDARDS The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that this evening, the Director of Research and Categorical Projects, Mr. Memo Mendez, will review the higher level of curriculum standards that the Education Services Division has moved to over the last two years with major assistance from teachers serving on the committees.

Mr. Mendez reviewed the terms "core essential standards" vs "differentiated standards" (minimum standards) and how they are developed and used to address the varied needs of students. He outlined the detailed work of the Curriculum Standards Correlation Committee to review minimum standards and work on the correlation of the State and Jurupa standards with the STAR 9 and the augmented STAR 9.

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services expressed his thanks and appreciation to Mr. Memo Mendez and his staff along with the large group of teachers for serving on the various curriculum standards committees.



ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT: CLASS SIZE REDUCTION UPDATE

The Superintendent reported that the District received a memorandum dated Friday, February 4, 2000 from School Services of California indicating that, "at its January 26th meeting, the State Allocation Board approved funding to meet the projected 2000-01 growth in the Class-Size Reduction Program (CSR)." She noted that Districts must show eligibility under existing criteria, and are reimbursed with \$40,000 grants for each new classroom according to the formula. Superintendent stated that based on the Board's directive to aggressively seek available funding to expand the Class Size Reduction program, the Assistant Superintendent Business Services and his staff will move forward to apply for these funds with the District funding the additional \$10,000 per portable needed for portable installation. She noted that the Assistant Superintendent Business Services identified a need for approximately 25 portables to expand the program to the third grade; however, at certain school sites it may be difficult to place additional portables due to spacing limitations. Additionally, due to regular growth projections, there is a need for approximately 20 portables, and principals are being asked to review all available existing space to determine if it can be used for other purposes. Based on these factors, the Superintendent requested the Board President to select two Board members to serve on a committee to work with administration on budget priorities for the 2000-01 school year.

President Knight appointed Mr. Ray Teagarden and Mrs. Mary Burns to serve on an Ad-Hoc Budget Review Committee. He referred to the supporting documents Agenda Item G-1, Review Approval of 1999-00 First Interim Financial Report, indicating continued deficit spending, and noted that the Budget Review Committee would be helpful in reviewing budgetary concerns regarding this topic as well.

The Superintendent stated that she will notify the two Board members selected to serve on the Budget Review Committee with the dates and times of committee meetings.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

President Knight opened the Public Verbal Comments session and requested that comments be limited to five minutes.

Ms. Penny Newman extended an invitation to administrators, board members, teachers, staff members, and parents, to attend the upcoming informational forum, "Safe Schools, Smart Schools," scheduled for Saturday, March 11, 2000 at the Riverside County Office of Education. She stated that the event is sponsored by "The Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice" in cooperation with US EPA Region 9 and will address such topics as pesticide use, indoor air pollution, lead poisoning, and radon contamination in an effort to "Improve the Learning Environment of our Schools by Reducing Environmental Hazards." Mrs. Burns indicated that she plans to attend this event.

Ms. Mary Teagarden, Van Buren parent, thanked Mrs. Roberts for providing an update on facility funding for the Class Size Reduction program and extended her appreciation for her efforts. She asked for a workable timetable for implementing the Class Size Reduction program at the third grade level for the 2000-2001 school year, and asked for a reoccurring Board Agenda item on Class Size Reduction to track the progress of the facility funding for the program; report on any obstacles encountered along the way, and to take appropriate action when needed.



PUBLIC COMMENTS: (CONTINUED)

The Superintendent commented that the Board Agenda item "Other Facility Matters" is placed on each Board Agenda for this purpose; it allows the Board to handle emergency information received following Board Agenda preparation and requiring immediate action by the Board. She reviewed that the District is eligible to apply for Class Size Reduction funding for teacher salaries; however, it will be critical to move forward immediately in the area of facilities to let suppliers know of the District's intent to purchase portables pending approval of funding. The Superintendent also noted that the portables located at the current Education Center site are under review to determine which portables can be relocated to school sites with staff temporarily relocated pending the completion of the new Education Center. She indicated that she plans to meet with the Assistant Superintendent Business Services and the Assistant Superintendent Education Services mid-month to begin to analyze district facilities and make determinations as to where portables need to be placed and where to use existing space to house students.

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

Board members individually thanked Ms. Kathy Carter, Nurse Coordinator, for her presentation on "National School Nurse's Day" and Mr. Memo Mendez for his presentation on standards; they congratulated Spelling Bee winners and participants, and reviewed recent events that they attended to include the Jurupa Valley Pep Rally, the Community Dialogue on Education at Riverside Community College, and the attendance by four Board members at the Masters in Governance Program Policy session held on February 4, 2000.

Mr. Teagarden, on behalf of his wife, Ms. Carolyn Teagarden, expressed thanks and appreciation to her coworkers at the District Office and students at Jurupa Valley High for the beautiful cards and flowers that she received following her recent surgery.

Mr. John Chavez reported that at the recent Lions Club Speech Contest five students from Jurupa Valley High School participated. He encouraged students from Rubidoux High School to participate in the future in order to be eligible for up to \$19,000 in scholarship awards. Mr. Chavez reviewed his participation on February 5 in the "Partner's in Change, the Challenges Facing Non-Profit Governing Boards" session.

Mrs. Burns thanked Jurupa Valley Student Representative to the Board, Joshua Johnson, for his recent tour of the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center. She thanked the various principals and administrators who were able to attend the Cultural Center's recent Vision Planning meeting on January 29, 2000. Mrs. Burns requested administration to bring forward at the next Board meeting for review and discussion Board Policy 9250, Compensation for Board Member Services. She asked that the Board consider including in this Policy a link between Board member compensation and total participation for meetings requiring Public Notice, i.e., Study Sessions. Mrs. Burns commended Ms. Penny Newman for her efforts in the community, and she encouraged participation in the "Safe Schools, Smart Schools" conference.

Mrs. Adams thanked Dr. Mason and Mr. Mendez for their extensive work on curriculum standards and raising student test scores.



BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS (CONTINUED) President Knight provided a copy of the materials from the Masters in Governance workshop for Mr. Ray Teagarden and the Superintendent. He requested that a copy of "The Effective Governance Model" that Board members received at the Masters in Governance session be framed and placed on the wall in the Board Room. Mr. Knight referred to the letter in the supporting documents from the Riverside County Office of Education on the approval of the 1999-00 First Interim Financial Report, and expressed his concern regarding the continuing trend of deficit spending. He asked that the newly developed committee to review budgetary priorities include a review of this topic as well. Mr. Knight recognized Mrs. Carolyn Adams and her family for receiving "Citizen of the Year" recognition at the Jurupa Chamber of Commerce annual community awards ceremony on January 22, 2000; he congratulated the CSEA officers for the year 2000, and he expressed his support of the efforts of the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center.

HEARING SESSION

President Knight formally opened the Public Hearing to allow comments from the public on the CSEA Initial Negotiating Proposal. There were no comments from the public; President Knight formally closed the Hearing Session.

COMPENSATION FOR BOARD MEMBER SERVICES

Each member of the Board of Education who actually attends all meetings, both regular and special, held in a calendar month, shall receive as compensation for his/her services \$400.00 for that month.

A member may be paid for any meeting when absent if the Board, by resolution duly adopted and included in its minutes, finds that at the time of the meeting s/he was performing services outside the meeting for the school district, that s/he was absent due to illness, jury duty, bereavement, or a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board.

Any member who does not attend all meetings held in any month, and not excused under the second paragraph above, shall receive as compensation for his/her services, an amount not greater than \$400.00 divided by the number of meetings held and multiplied by the number of meetings actually attended.

INVESTMENTS

Education Code Section 41015 authorizes the governing board of a school district which has funds in a special reserve fund of the district or any surplus moneys not required for the immediate necessities of the district to invest any or any part of the funds in any of the investments specified in Sections 16430 or 53601 of the Government Code.

Investment Objectives

The Governing Board is primarily concerned with the preservation of the principal balances of all district funds. Therefore, the board establishes the objectives of district investments with the following priority:

- 1. Safeguarding of investment principal
- Maintain sufficient liquidity within the portfolio to meet daily cash requirements
- 3. Maximize returns on the portfolio consistent with these objectives

Prior to the investment of any District funds, the Governing Board must find and determine that the funds to be invested are not required for the immediate necessities of the District.

Management Responsibility

The Governing Board of the Jurupa Unified School District delegates the management of the District's Investment Policy to the Superintendent. The Superintendent may delegate to the Assistant Superintendent of Business Services the authority to establish written procedures for the operation of the investment plan consistent with this Investment Policy. No person may engage in investment activities except as provided under the terms of this policy and the written procedures developed by the Superintendent or designee.

The Superintendent, or designee, may invest, as permitted by law and this policy, all or part of the surplus moneys of the district not required for immediate district use. Investment of district funds shall be limited to the following specific investments.

- 1. The Riverside County Investment Pool
- 2. FDIC Insured or Collateralized Bank Accounts
- 3. The Local Agency Investment Fund
- 4. United States Treasury Bills
- 5. Prime Commercial paper having an "AA" rating or better
- 6. Certificates of Deposit
- 7. Guaranteed Investment Contracts

Investments other than those stated above may be made only with specific authorization of the Governing Board.

Business and Non-Instructional Operations Policy 3130 Page 2 of 2

The Governing Board recognizes that the Superintendent or designee has fiduciary responsibility and is subject to prudent investor standards for all investment decisions. As such, district investments must be made with skill, prudence, and diligence.

Reporting

Government Code Section 53646 establishes the criteria for reporting of district investments. In accordance with law, the superintendent or designee shall annually provide to the Board a statement of the district's investment policy. This policy shall be reviewed at a public meeting.

The Superintendent shall also provide the Board with quarterly reports, which will include, at a minimum:

- 1. The state of compliance of the portfolio to the District investment policy, and/or an explanation of the extent the portfolio is not in compliance.
- 2. A statement denoting the ability of the District to meet its pool expenditure requirements for the next six months.
- 3. The type of investment, issuer, date of maturity, par and dollar amount invested on all securities, investments, and moneys held by the District.

The report of portfolio activity shall be presented no later than 30 days after the end of the calendar quarter.
