a. Recognize AVID Graduating Students at Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley High Schools

- b. Recognize 1999/2000 Inland Science Fair Winners

 The eighteenth annual Inland Science and Engineering Fair was held at the National Orange Show Fair Grounds, San Bernardino during April 25-27, 2000. Twenty students from grades 4-12 represented the Jurupa Unified School District. Two students at the secondary level won awards and are eligible to participate in the California State Science Fair to be held at the Sports Arena in Los Angeles on May 22-23, 2000. Students eligible for participation are Scott Chavez and Michael Swager, Jurupa Valley High School. Administration and the Board are pleased to recognize these science fair winners and supports their efforts in entering the California State Science Fair. Information only.
- c. Recognize Outdoor Science Camp for West Riverside Elementary Students (Mrs. Roberts) The District recently received notification from "The Wildlands Conservancy" of their plan to sponsor the tuition and transportation for every sixth grade student at West Riverside Elementary to attend Outdoor Science School (OSS). The school is run by the Orange County Department of Education and is located in the San Bernardino Mountains. Schools receiving sponsorships were selected based on the percentage of students receiving free and reduced price meals and not already participating in an overnight outdoor science school program. 6. Approve Resolution #00/22, Authorization to Conduct Surplus Sale (Mr. Edmunds)

Throughout the year the Warehouse accumulates surplus items from throughout the

District, which are old, obsolete, non-repairable or uneconomical to repair. A list of such items is included in the supporting documents. Education Code Section 39520 requires that items, whether one or more, having a value in excess of \$2,500 be sold to the highest responsible bidder. Education Code Section 39521-a allows that items, whether one or more, which do not exceed a value of \$2,500, may be sold at private sale without advertising. Section 39521-b allows that any items having previously been offered for sale pursuant to Section 39520 for which no qualified bid was received, may be sold at private sale without advertising; and Section 39521-c allows that property of insufficient value to defray the cost of arranging for a sale may be either donated to a charitable organization or disposed of in the local public dump.

The list of items included in the supporting documents exceeds \$2,500 in value, and Administration recommends that the Board approve Resolution #00/22, Authorization to Conduct Surplus Sale. Administration further recommends that the Board direct the Director of Purchasing to dispose of unsold items at private sale pursuant to Education Code Section 39521-a and that any item remaining after previous attempts at sale be donated to a recognized charitable organization or disposed of in the local dump pursuant to Education Code Section 39521-c.

* 7. Resolution No. 00/23, Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds (Mrs. Lauzon)

Throughout the school year, the Business Office monitors and adjusts the District's various budgets with respect to both revenue and expenditures. Changes in revenue result from grant applications, increased funding, adjustments to ADA, apportionment reductions, etc.

The method by which the revenue side of the budget is adjusted is to adopt a Resolution for Expenditure for Excess Funds. In this action the Board approves adding revenue to the budget for various purposes. Since the budget was revised on March 20, 2000, the District has received revenue adjustments in the amount of \$1,618,882, as identified below. This funding is restricted in its use and offsetting expenditures are budgeted in these funds.

Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request for State Science Fair Participants (Dr. Mason) Mr. Terry Snell, Mentor Teacher, is requesting approval for two students to travel to Los Angeles on Monday, May 22 through Tuesday, May 23, 2000. The purpose of the trip is to participate in the State Science Fair. Staff members will provide supervision, travel will be by district vehicles, and lodging and meal costs will be provided by Eisenhower funds. Staff members and parents will provide supervision, and accommodations will be at the Wild Wild West Hotel in Las Vegas. Administration has indicated that no eligible student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this field trip due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Mr. Sam Gee to travel to Henderson, Nevada with approximately thirty-five students on Friday, September 8 through Sunday, September 10, 2000.

12. Approve Non-Routine Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High

Mr. Sam Gee, Rubidoux High School Cross Country Coach, is requesting approval to travel to Oahu, Hawaii with approximately twenty-eight students on Thursday, October 5 through Monday, October 9, 2000. The purpose of the trip is to provide students an opportunity to participate in a cross country invitational. Staff members will provide supervision and travel will be by district vehicles and Continental Air Lines. Travel costs will be paid through fundraisers and donations. Administration has indicated that no eligible student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this field trip due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip request is included in the supporting documents.

* B. Approve High School Instructional Materials for Review

(Dr. Kinnear)

The following instructional materials were presented to the Instructional Council at its regular meeting on May 8, 2000 for review, and approved unanimously. The supporting documents contain information regarding the cost of the instructional materials, other instructional materials considered by the selection committees, and information regarding the rationale for selection. These instructional materials will be available for public review at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon public libraries for the time period specified in Board Policy 6200. After the thirteen day review period, the books will be presented to the Board for approval.

The following textbooks have been reviewed and recommended for submittal by the Instructional Council:

High School

- 1. America: Pathways to the Present for grade 11.
- 2. <u>Economics: Principles and Practices</u> for grade 12.
- 3. Modern Carpentry for grades 10-12.
- 4. <u>United States Government: Democracy in Action</u> for grade 12.
- 5. World History: The Modern Era (California Edition) for grades 10.

All five recommended books are listed in the <u>List of Authorized Textbooks</u> - Los Angeles Unified School District.

It is recommended that the Board approve for review the following instructional materials: America: Pathways to the Present; Economics: Principles and Practices; Modern Carpentry; United States Government: Democracy in Action; World History: The Modern Era (California Edition).

C. Review Investment Report – Quarter Ending December 31, 1999 (Mr. Edmunds) Section 53656 of the California Government Code requires public agencies to render quarterly reports to the Governing Board. Included in the supporting documents is the Investment Report for the quarter ending December 31, 1999. Administration recommends that the Board accept this Investment Report for Quarter Ending December 31, 1999.

D. Approve Revision of the Site Grant Expenditure Plan for Jurupa Valley High

(Mr. Edmunds)

Jurupa Valley High School is requesting to revise their Site Grant spending plan to cover the cost of a tennis storage unit instead of the tennis court lighting previously approved by the Board. The cost for the storage unit is \$3,329.13. This expenditure revision has been approved by their School Site Council. <u>Administration recommends approval of the revised Site Grant Expenditure Plan for Jurupa Valley High School</u>.

E. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

- 1. Award of Contract for Bid #00/07L, Landscape Improvements for Jurupa Valley High School (Mr. Edmunds)
 On May 9, 2000, the District received and opened bids for Bid #00/07L, Landscape Improvements for Jurupa Valley High School. This project is being jointly funded by the District and the Riverside County Redevelopment Agency. Due to the timelines involved in the bidding process, it was not possible to have the results of the bid available at the time the Board agenda was prepared. The Assistant Superintendent Business Services will present results of the bid and make a recommendation of bid award for the Board's consideration.
- 2. <u>Delegation of Authority to Award Bid #00/08L, Site Work for Forty (40) Portable Buildings at Sixteen (16) District Sites; and Bid #00/10L, Reconstruction of Pedley Elementary Office (Mr. Edmunds)</u>

Administration intends to solicit bids for the installation of forty portable buildings at sixteen District sites and for the reconstruction of the office at Pedley Elementary School. Plans and specifications for these projects are anticipated to be approved by the Division of the State Architect on May 11, 2000. Administration intends to advertise for public bidding on May 19 and May 26, 2000 and will open bids on June 5, 2000. There is a need to start the work prior to the time when the Board would normally award a contract for this project, which would be June 19, 2000.

Education Code Section 17604 states, in part, "Wherever in this code the power to contract is invested in the governing board of the school district or any member thereof, the power may be a majority vote of the board delegated to its district superintendent, or to any persons that he or she may designate." The code goes on to require that "no contract made pursuant to the delegation and authorization shall be valid or constitute an enforceable obligation against the district unless and until the same shall have been approved or ratified by the governing board, the approval or ratification to be evidenced by a motion of the board duly passed and adopted."

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the Superintendent or designee to award the contracts for Site Work for Forty (40) Portable Buildings at Sixteen (16) District Sites – Bid #00/08L, and the Reconstruction of Pedley Elementary School Office – Bid #00/10L. Administration will bring the results of the bidding and request ratification at the June 19, 2000 Board meeting.

3. Approve Change Order #1 to Bid #00/05L, Re-Painting at Rubidoux High School

(Mr. Edmunds)

At the January 3, 2000 Board Meeting, the Board confirmed award of Bid #00/05L – Re-Painting at Rubidoux High School in the amount of \$143,900. After work commenced, Administration determined that the originally chosen color was undesirable and requested that it be changed at a cost of \$5,781. Additionally, the District requested that the contractor skim-coat areas that were left uneven by lead and asbestos abatement at a cost of \$8,604.

Administration recommends approval of Change Order #1 for Bid #00/05L, Re-Painting at Rubidoux High School, to JFP Company in the amount of \$14,390 for color change and patch work. This will bring the total of the project to \$158,290.

4. Approve Change Order #3 for Bid #00/02L — Jurupa Unified School District's New Education Center (Mr. Edmunds)
On August 26, 1999, the Board awarded contracts for the construction of Jurupa Unified School District's New Education Center — Bid #00/02L, in the amount of \$6,162,294. As construction progresses, additions, changes and/or deletions to the original plans have become necessary in order to accommodate existing conditions or to clarify inconsistencies in the plan documents. Administration recommends the following additions, deletions, and/or changes to the contract for the category indicated:

(a) Category 1-Grading - Ortiz Enterprises

After the start of construction, changes to the grading plan required an additional 250 cubic yards of excavation that was necessitated during plan review by the Riverside County Transportation Department at an additional cost of \$905.54 and no extension of time.

(b) Category 3-Concrete - A.S.R. Constructors

At the time of bidding, the Riverside County Transportation Department had not completed its review of the off-site improvement plans. During the review process the County increased the thickness of the road base and asphalt paving required in the roadway; the additional cost of the asphalt was \$9,454.16.

Also, concrete provided for the added covered walkway at the Board Room cost an additional \$4,530.00.

Upon review of the plans, the Construction Manager requested a thickened foundation at the utility crossing to provide protection and stability at an additional cost of \$3,571.61.

Concrete footings, which were omitted from the original plans but which are required for the installation of gates, were added at an additional cost of \$937.92.

A required walkway, which was omitted on the original plans, was added at an additional cost of \$296.18.

The total increase for A.S.R. Constructors is \$18,799.87 and no extension of time is required.

F. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mrs. Roberts)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

EXPULSIONS:

- ** 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #00-067 for violation of Education Code 48900 (a2 & k) for the remainder of the current semester and the semester following; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 16, 2001.
- ** 2. 4. Approve Change Order #3 for Bid #00/02L - Jurupa Unified School District's New Education Center (Continued) (Mr. Edmunds)

(c) Category 4-Masonry - Kretschmar & Smith

In order to accommodate conduit runs between buildings it is necessary to provide "block-outs" in the masonry walls. The original plans and specifications omitted the necessary 'block-outs.' The omission was detected upon further plan review at an additional cost of \$637.00 and no extension of time.

(d) Category 5-Structural Steel - ML Steel Constructors

After the start of construction, administration determined that a covered walkway was desirable adjacent to the Board Room structure. The canopy will provide aesthetic appeal and protection from weather elements for over-flow attendance at Board Meetings. The additional cost is \$22,943.00 and no extension of time.

(e) Category 15-Painting - Simmons & Wood

After the beginning of construction, the District accepted an additive alternate to the plans to construct a covered walkway at Building A. The additional cost to paint the walkway is \$782.00 and no extension of time.

(f) Category 17-HVAC - West-Tech Mechanical, Inc.

The specified air conditioning unites from Trane Company were thought to include barometric relief dampers which will provide pressure equalization as doors are opened and closed throughout the building. It was determined, after the bidding, that the dampers were not included with the specified equipment. The additional cost for the dampers is \$455.80 and no extension of time.

(g) Category 18-Plumbing - Benel Mechanic, Inc.

During construction of the off-site storm drain, unanticipated conditions were encountered with the existing sewer line. The unanticipated change was a concrete encasement that was required to be removed and replaced by the contractor. The difficulty of the removal and replacement of the concrete encasement requires the extension of time to the contract of fourteen days and an additional cost of \$10,255.00.

(h) Category 20-Electrical - R.I.S. Electric, Inc.

After the start of construction, it was determined that plans provided by Pacific Bell required the addition of a 3' x 5' x 4' pull box in order to provide security controls to the site gates. The additional cost for the installation of the pull boxes is \$1,033.00 and no extension of time.

Administration recommends approval of Change Order #3 for Jurupa Unified School District's New Education Center – Bid #00/02L for categories and amounts indicated for a total project cost increase of \$55,811.21. This will bring the total of the project, including Change Order #1 and #2, to \$6,242,111.17.

 The Board will recall that one of the major components of Governor Davis' program for education is implementation of a "peer assistance and review" program (AB 1x). The purpose of such a program is to permit exemplary teachers to assist certain permanent and beginning teachers in the areas of teaching methods and instruction. It was required that the program be negotiated with the teachers' union and certain financial incentives were offered to encourage quick resolution. The program will replace the Mentor Teacher Program.

A tentative agreement has been reached with NEA-J on the details of a Peer Assistance and Review Program. A copy is included with the supporting documents. NEA-J leadership has informed us that ratification by its membership should have been completed by tonight's Board meeting.

Assuming that we have received notice of union ratification, it is recommended that the Board ratify the tentative agreement with NEA-J on Implementation of a Peer Assistance and Review Program.

* 3. Adopt Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators.

Each year, the Board must adopt a "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" as a prerequisite to the issuance of emergency teaching permits for the District. This declaration is one of the state requirements of the Commission on Teacher Credentialing governing the issuance of emergency permits and the orientation, guidance, and training of emergency permit holders. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits, particularly to fill partial assignments, specialized areas of instruction such as math and science, or areas of statewide shortage such as bilingual education and special education. With the addition of the K-3 class size reduction program, it is also necessary to employ some emergency permit teachers for the District. The information shown in the supporting documents accounts for all these needs for next school year. It is recommended that the Board adopt the "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" for 2000-01.

G. Approve Personnel Matters (Continued)

4. Approve CBEST Waiver for Day-to-Day Substitute Teachers

(Mr. Campbell)

Because of the impact that the Class Size Reduction Program has had on district substitute pools throughout California, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing is allowing districts to temporarily waive the CBEST exam requirement for day-to-day (2000-2001) substitute teachers. The district-wide waiver would be for a maximum of one year. Substitute teachers would have one calendar year to take and pass CBEST, rather than having to pass prior to beginning work. The Commission has developed and it is recommended that the following statement be submitted to the Board for approval.

It is recommended that the Board declare that teachers were hired from the district substitute pool to implement class size reduction and, as a consequence of this action, the district is unable to recruit substitutes who have had an opportunity to take and pass the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST). The district anticipates employing fifty substitutes on various term CBEST waivers.

A VOTE WAS TAKEN FOR BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBERS; THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

RECOGNIZE SCHOOL & DISTRICT E-RATE FUNDING

The Superintendent stated that four of the district's elementary schools were selected to receive federal E-Rate funding for internal wiring connections. In addition, the District will receive telecommunications E-rate funding in the amount of \$130,203.00. She noted that the highest need schools were selected to receive 90% funding based on free and reduced price recipients. The Superintendent commented that the district will continue to apply for federal E-Rate funding as soon as the funding cycle begins again so that all schools will be connected to the internet.

HEAR REPORT ON S.C.O.R.E. TEAM'S "STOP TRUANCY" PROGRAM The Superintendent thanked S.C.O.R.E. representatives for being present this evening to report on the Student Truancy Offender Program (S.T.O.P.): Deputy Phil Sanchez, Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station; Mr. John Malloy, District Attorney's Office, and Mr. Ralph Martinez, district representative. She noted that the team works diligently with the school sites to increase student attendance.

Deputy Phil Sanchez noted that Mr. Malloy serves in the Juvenile Division for Riverside County, he is a member of the western county School Attendance Review Board (S.A.R.B.), and he also serves as a member of the Youth Accountability Team (YAT). He stated that this evening's presentation will include a status/analysis report from Mr. Malloy on the S.T.O.P. program as well as two student success stories provided by Mr. Martinez.

Mr. Malloy reviewed that the S.T.O.P. program was implemented in response to the County curfew Ordinance and involves a warning, citation, and Community Court program designed to return students to an acceptable attendance pattern. He noted that students are first given an opportunity to participate in the First Offender Program and complete hours of community service; those not successful in the First Offender Program are fined; those students not successful in either measure will have their driving privileges suspended until the court receives verification of completion. Mr. Malloy referred to the charts distributed to Board members and reported that while students are being monitored in the program statistics indicate success in significantly raising regular student attendance. He noted that students assigned to the S.C.O.R.E. team receive personal, individual attention and are assisted in connecting back into the public school setting.

HEAR REPORT ON S.C.O.R.E. TEAM'S "STOP TRUANCY" PROGRAM (CONTINUED) Mr. Ralph Martinez thanked those Board members who were able to attend a recent court session, and he invited other Board members to contact him regarding upcoming court sessions scheduled for May and June to see firsthand how the program works. He provided two examples of student success stories in the S.T.O.P. program. He noted that in the two sample cases, the S.C.O.R.E. team made personal parent contacts at the students' homes, Guidance Counselors provided assistance with academic information; S.C.O.R.E. team members regularly contacted each student to ensure daily school attendance, and social skills were reinforced. Mr. Martinez noted that in both cases, the students were able to achieve regular school attendance.

The Superintendent thanked each member of the S.C.O.R.E. team for the personal attention that they provide to at-risk students. President Knight commented that members of the S.C.O.R.E. team and the Community Court are doing an excellent job reinforcing the importance of student attendance.

HEAR REPORT ON ASCENT PROGRAM

The Assistant Superintendent Education Services introduced Mr. Paul Jensen and Ms. Diana Fox, project coordinators for the District's after-school AsCent partnership program, to outline the specific activities designed for middle school students.

Mr. Jensen reported that the AsCent program, funded through a state three year grant, received overwhelming support at the three middle schools for the high-quality environment that is provided for students after the regular school day ends. He noted that students receive academic enrichment activities along with health and safety information. Mr. Jensen commended Glen Avon Principal, Ms. Lucinda Sheppy, for the success of the District's grant application, and he indicated that the outstanding teachers involved in the program contribute to the program's success.

Ms. Diana Fox, AsCent program director for the three middle schools, reported that the goal of the program is to increase student academic achievement in language arts, mathematics, and to assist in linking standards to service learning and community activities. The program provides for students a safe haven during after school hours; homework and tutoring help, computer opportunities; counseling; school-to-career activities, sports programs, and student leadership training.

Ms. Lynne Hill, site coordinator at Mira Loma Middle School, commented that teachers working in the program have the opportunity to communicate with parents daily as they pick up their students, they ensure that homework is completed, and form a bond with families and businesses in the area as they see the success of the program demonstrated in the lives of students. Mira Loma Middle student, Leslie Klein, reported that she enjoys having a safe after-school environment; she reviewed a variety of field trips that students participated in, and she remarked that her grades have gone up as well. Ms. Hill invited Board members to visit the program at any of the district's three middle schools.

Mr. Jensen reported that plans for next year are to expand the program to include adult education opportunities and a parent program, and he commended the middle schools and their site coordinators for providing a safe haven for middle school students. He distributed sample copies of the AsCent After School "Staff Handbook" for Board members to review the detailed training manual for teachers involved in the program.

Mrs. Burns commented that she plans to be on the Mira Loma Middle campus on May 8, 9, and 10 and will stop by to visit the program.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS:

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS President Knight opened the Public Verbal Comments session; there were no comments from the public.

Mrs. Adams commented that last week she visited several schools; she was particularly impressed with the English learners first grade class at Van Buren Elementary School; she visited another first grade class at Stone Avenue Elementary where she viewed a rehearsal for the play, "The Three Bears," which she has been invited back to see on May 19.

Mrs. Burns thanked the group of Jurupa students that participated in the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center's renovation of the dinosaurs that will benefit children in the area. She noted that she plans to provide her "Rock and Mineral Show" for Mira Loma Middle students on May 8, 9, and 10.

Mr. Chavez reviewed his attendance at the Tomas Rivera Conference that provided outstanding information for students in terms of using the university system. He thanked Mrs. Barbara Godoy, West Riverside Elementary kindergarten teacher, for the invitation to visit her class and hear students read. Mr. Chavez commented that he was pleased to participate in the Project B.E.A.R. reception at the Glen Avon Library to honor those participating in the program to help students become better readers. He noted that he will be attending the CSBA Delegate Assembly this weekend, May 6-8, 2000; he reminded Board members to contact him regarding any questions concerning the CSBA Agenda.

President Knight also noted his attendance at the "Project B.E.A.R." (Building and Encouraging Active Readers) reception on April 25. He thanked Project B.E.A.R. coordinator, Ms. Sylvia Boyd, for encouraging public support of this program to help increase the number of books that students read. President Knight reviewed his visit to the Spring Extended Learning Opportunity program at Van Buren Elementary and Indian Hills Elementary, and he reported that both schools are ontask in terms of student learning. His visit to the Saturday School program also found that students were provided with an opportunity to make up missed homework for days they were not able to attend school. President Knight thanked the Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent Education Services, and certificated and classified staff for their support of student learning in the various programs. He asked for information on the University of California, Riverside's "National Youth Sports Program."

She indicated that the meeting will be officially posted, the media, representatives from the certificated and classified bargaining units, and administrators will also be invited to attend this full-day session to review the status of the District's Strategic Plan, Mission Statement, and six goals. The Superintendent noted that the date selected, June 22, 2000, follows the closing of the 1999-2000 school year and is prior to the beginning of the summer session.

Mrs. Burns indicated that due to a previously scheduled legal commitment involving the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center she is unavailable on June 22; however, June 21 or June 23 is available on her calendar.

The Superintendent indicated that the Board does have the option of scheduling the Study Session on June 21, 2000 if members are agreeable with this date change.

President Knight, Mrs. Burns, Mrs. Adams, and Mr. Chavez were all agreeable to the June 21, 2000 date for the Study Session. Mr. Teagarden remarked that he planned to abstain from voting due to a possible prior commitment on June 21.

PRESIDENT KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE CHANGING THE DATE OF THE SPECIAL STUDY SESSION FROM JUNE 22, 2000 TO JUNE 21, 2000 TO BE HELD AT MIRA LOMA MIDDLE SCHOOL TO UPDATE THE DISTRICT'S STRATEGIC PLAN AND DISTRICT GOALS. She clarified for student members that they are invited to attend the Study Session as well since their terms do not end until June 30, 2000.

The Superintendent reviewed the sequence of student preferential voting. She explained that according to the Education Code, student preferential votes are cast first and recorded, followed by the casting and recording of the votes by the Governing Board. Preferential votes do not change the outcome of the vote by the Governing Board.

APPROVE INTENT TO PARTICIPATE IN 2000-2002 CBET PROGRAM -Motion #199 The Assistant Superintendent Education Services stated that in the 1999-2000 school year, the District received \$325,100 for their Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) program to provide adult education, tutoring components, and workshops, with a special emphasis on working with parents of entering kindergarten students. He indicated that the District's "Intent to Participate" for the 2000-2001 school year is included in the supporting documents, and if approved by the California Department of Education, will allow for the expansion of these services in the CBET program.

He noted that the projects will be paid from State Deferred Maintenance funds, with the exception of the Jurupa Valley swimming pool, which will be paid for out of the General Fund.

The Superintendent reviewed that at the last meeting, Mr. Chavez indicated that for the past 3-5 years as he served in the Delegate Assembly, he has paid for his own travel expenses. He requested that this year, with the Delegate Assembly being held May 6-8, 2000, that his travel and related expenses (approximately \$600.00) be borne by the District.

Mrs. Burns reviewed that she receives all of the appropriate material that she needs from local legislators, the Riverside County Office of Education, CSBA, newspapers, and Legislative Alerts, and she commented that Mr. Chavez was aware that the District did not cover his travel expenses when he took on the responsibility of serving in the CSBA Delegate Assembly. Further, she stated that extensive discussion at several Board meetings has indicated that Board members agreed to pay for their own traveling expenses to attend conferences.

President Knight reviewed that it is one of the primary roles of the governing board to remain up-to-date on educational issues and be informed on strategies to enhance student achievement. He remarked that Mr. Chavez has focused on this area through the important work of CSBA statewide and he provides feedback to the Board on what is happening at the State level. President Knight recalled that the decision to limit conference expenses to registration was made during financially difficult times; however, with times changing, and the emphasis being placed on accountability, it is important to be supportive of conference and seminar attendance. He noted that surrounding districts do support Board conference attendance by designating \$3,000 to \$4,000 per Board member and he felt that it was time to reconsider the District's position on this matter in terms of improving the Board's knowledge on educational issues.

Mrs. Adams noted that she was firm in her position; she has always paid for her traveling expenses and she continues to support the practice that Board members pay for their own traveling expenses.

Mr. Chavez emphasized that he is performing the business of the District at the State level when he attends the CSBA meeting in May, and as such, the District should cover his traveling expenses. He pointed out that the Board voted for him to fill this position, and as an elected member of Subregion 18A, he is a working member of the Delegate Assembly.

The Superintendent recalled that for the past five years, recognizing difficult financial times in the District, Board members elected for the District to eliminate paying for conference travel expenses; only registration expenses for conference attendance would be paid by the District. She noted that since this topic was being reviewed once again by the Board, three districts were contacted concerning Board conference expenses; their responses indicate that amounts ranging from \$2,000 to \$4,000 per Board member are set aside in their budgets annually.

MR. TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE BOARD CONFERENCE EXPENSES FOR THE 2000/2001 BUDGET. PRESIDENT KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mrs. Burns commented that there is a limited value in traveling to far-away locations to attend conferences; she stated that they can be quite expensive, and attending conferences locally is much preferred and less expensive to obtain materials on educational issues. She remarked that if student members receive paid conference expenses as well, this could be an expense of possibly \$30,000. She stated that in her opinion, Board stipends are sufficient to cover local conference registration fees, and she could not, in good conscience, spend these additional funds when they could be used to support classrooms, to staff libraries, or to increase custodial staff at the school sites. In addition, Mrs. Burns reviewed that all important information concerning educational issues is not only available at local conferences, but it is included on the internet as well.

Mr. Chavez spoke in support of student members' involvement in attending conferences. He stated that for the past 7-8 years, the district has been one of the few districts that has not sent a student representative to the State conference. He welcomed student involvement. Mr. Chavez outlined that board member involvement at the State level is critical through CSBA; he noted that this is how the organization runs and is able to work with legislators on important educational issues. He explained that the Delegate Assembly works on behalf of local boards to bring forward the business for the state and place it into the system for distribution. Mr. Chavez stressed the importance of educated school boards which is expected as an elected official.

Ms. Hadden asked if the amount of \$2,000 is a sufficient amount to set aside for Board conference expenses since some conferences can be up to \$1,000 for one event.

President Knight responded that this is the decision that the Board will need to make, an amount to place in the budget per Board member.

Mr. Teagarden and President Knight rescinded their motion and second respectively, and Mr. Teagarden asked if the motion could be altered to include the figure of \$4,000 per Board and student member?

APPROVE BOARD MEMBER CONFERENCE EXPENSE FOR 2000/2001 BUDGET -Motion #209 (CONTINUED) PRESIDENT KNIGHT RESPONDED AFFIRMATIVELY AND MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE A \$4,000 PER YEAR CONFERENCE EXPENSE FOR EACH BOARD MEMBER AND STUDENT BOARD MEMBER TO BEGIN WITH THE 2000/2001 BUDGET. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION. PREFERENTIAL VOTES WERE CAST BY STUDENT BOARD MEMBERS: NAYE, CRYSTAL HADDEN, JOSHUA JOHNSON. A VOTE WAS TAKEN FOR BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBERS: AYE, MR. CHAVEZ, MR. TEAGARDEN, PRESIDENT KNIGHT; NAYE, MRS. ADAMS, MRS. BURNS. THE MOTION CARRIED 3-2.

APPROVE PERSONNEL REPORT #19 W/INSERT -Motion #210 The Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services requested approval of Personnel Report #19, with Insert J, Pages 7-14. PRESIDENT KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE PERSONNEL REPORT #19, WITH INSERT J, PAGES 7-14. MR. TEAGARDEN SECONDED THE MOTION WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

REVIEW ROUTINE INFORMATION REPORTS

Board members reviewed the following Routine Information Reports: "Approval of 1999-00 Second Interim Financial Report" and "Schedule to Conduct Board Meetings for the 1999-00 School Year." The Assistant Superintendent noted that the 1999-00 Second Interim Financial Report received positive certification from the Riverside County Office of Education; the Superintendent commented that the next Board meeting will be held at Mira Loma Middle School on May 15, 2000.







FOR THE PERIOD ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1999



The Parties agree to amend, augment and/or modify the current Collective Bargaining Agreement as follows:

- 1. Replace Article XXII, Mentor Teacher Program, with Peer Assistance and Review Program (PAR) described on the attached document.
- 2. Revise Article IX Evaluation Procedures, Section 1.C concerning elements for evaluation of Teaching Unit Members; add Section 3.C concerning PAR referrals; and revise Teaching Unit Member Evaluation Forms. All of the referenced revisions, changes or additions are specified in the attached document.
- 3. The above changes shall be effective on July 1, 2000.

PEER ASSISTANCE AND REVIEW.COM

Section 1 - Purpose

- A. The Peer Assistance and Review Program (Program) allows exemplary teachers to assist certain permanent and beginning teachers in the areas of teaching methods and instruction.
- B. The Program shall not involve the participation in nor the conducting of the annual evaluation of certificated unit members as set forth in Article IX of the Collective Bargaining Agreement (Agreement) and Education Code 44660, et seq., except for making available to the evaluator the results of some teachers' participation in the Program.

Section 2 - Definitions For Purposes of this Document

A. "Classroom Teacher" or "Teacher"

Any member of the certificated bargaining unit who is defined by Article IX, Section 1, Part C of the Agreement (Evaluation Procedures/Teaching Unit Members). Unit members defined by Article IX, Section 1, Part D are not teachers for purposes of this document.

B. "Participating Teacher"

A permanent teacher who either volunteers or is required by this document to participate in the Program.

C. "Voluntary Participating Teacher"

Any permanent teacher not required to participate in the Program and who wants to engage in a professional growth activity utilizing a Consulting Teacher's assistance.

D. "Participating Teacher With An Unsatisfactory Evaluation"

A classroom teacher with permanent status whose most recent performance evaluation contains two or more unsatisfactory ratings in the areas of teaching methods and instruction.

E. "Consulting Teacher"

An exemplary teacher with permanent status who meets the requirements of Section 7, Paragraph A of this document and who is selected by the Joint Panel to provide Program assistance/review to a Participating or Beginning Teacher.

F. "Beginning Teacher"

Any classroom teacher having probationary or temporary status, or any District teaching intern participating in a program established according to Education Code Sections 44305, et seq. and 44325, et seq.

G. "Teaching methods and instruction"

Those areas of a teacher's performance evaluation represented by Standards #1,3 and 4 as described in Article IX, Section 1, Part C of the Agreement and on the Teaching Unit Member Evaluation Form.



H. "Principal" or "Evaluating Principal"

The certificated administrator appointed by the District to evaluate a certificated teacher.

Section 3 - Program Outline For Participating Teachers With An Unsatisfactory Evaluation (Refer also to Diagram "1")

- A. Any permanent teacher with two or more unsatisfactory ratings on the standards listed in Section 2, Paragraph G of this document must participate in the Program.
- B. The Consulting Teacher's assistance and review shall focus on the specific areas targeted for improvement by the Participating Teacher's principal after the Participating Teacher receives the unsatisfactory rating.
 - 1. The principal's recommendations shall be written, aligned with student learning, clearly stated, and consistent with Education Code Section 44662. These recommendations shall be considered as the performance goals required by Education Code Sections 44664(a) and 44500(b)(2).
 - 2. The Principal and the Consulting Teacher assigned to the Participating Teacher shall meet and discuss the targeted areas of improvement outlined by the Principal and the assistance they shall endeavor to provide.
 - 3. The Consulting Teacher and the evaluating Principal are expected to establish a cooperative relationship regarding the Program For Participating Teachers With An Unsatisfactory Evaluation.
 - 4. The Consulting Teacher and the Participating Teacher shall meet to discuss the plan for assistance in the targeted areas. After that meeting, the Consulting Teacher will provide the assistance set forth in Section 7, Paragraph F of this document, which shall also involve conducting multiple classroom observations of the Participating Teacher.
- C. The Consulting Teacher shall submit to the Joint Panel a written report evaluating the teacher's participation in the Program consisting solely of: (1) a description of the assistance provided by the Consulting Teacher; and (2) a description of the results of the assistance in the targeted areas. This report shall be submitted to the Joint Panel before April 1 each year, with a copy provided to the Participating Teacher.
- D. Before May 1 of each year the Joint Panel will make available the results of the teacher's participation in the Program for use as part of the teacher's evaluation. The results may be placed in the teacher's personnel file if included by the Principal as part of the annual evaluation.
- E. The teacher will continue participating in the Program until the Joint Panel determines the teacher no longer benefits from participation in the Program, or the teacher meets or exceeds evaluation standards, or the teacher is separated from the District.
- F. The Joint Panel will make an Annual Report to the Governing Board regarding Program participants, including forwarding the names of the permanent teachers with unsatisfactory evaluations who, after sustained assistance, are unable to demonstrate satisfactory improvement.



Section 4 - Program Outline For Beginning Teachers (Refer also to Diagram "2")

- A. A Consulting Teacher will be assigned to one or more Beginning Teachers to provide assistance and mentoring, including that provided under the Marian Bergeson Teacher Support and Assessment System (BTSA) according to Education Code Sections 44279.1, et seq.
- B. During the Beginning Teacher's first year the Consulting Teacher shall include assistance in the area of the District's Teaching Standards. During the second year and subsequent years, the Consulting Teacher will focus the assistance in the areas listed by the evaluating Principal as needing improvement and/or assistance.
- C. A Beginning Teacher may request assistance from the Consulting Teacher in additional area(s) of perceived need.
- D. The Consulting Teacher and the evaluating Principal shall have a cooperative relationship regarding the Program for Beginning Teachers.
- E. Beginning Teacher participation in the Program is not legally mandated. Therefore, neither the Consulting Teacher nor the Joint Panel will make written reports regarding individual Beginning Teachers, nor forward to the Board the names of individual Beginning Teachers who participated in the Program.

Section 5 - Program Outline For Voluntary Participating Teachers (Refer also to Diagram "3")

- A. Voluntary Participating Teachers are individuals who wish to grow and learn with the assistance from a peer, or who may be seeking assistance due to a change in assignment or the institution of new curriculum. The Program for Voluntary Participating Teachers will focus on practical application of certain teaching skills or the acquisition of new subject matter.
- B. The Joint Panel will accept requests from volunteers and determine if they will be accepted into the Program.
- C. The Joint Panel shall determine the type and scope of any assistance to be provided to a Voluntary Participating Teacher.
- D. The Consulting Teacher and the Voluntary Participating Teacher's Principal shall have a cooperative relationship regarding the Program for Voluntary Participating Teachers.
- E. Permanent teachers with satisfactory performance are not mandated by law to participate in the Program. Therefore, neither the Consulting Teacher nor the Panel will forward to the Governing Board the names of volunteer teacher participants.
- F. A Voluntary Participating Teacher may terminate his/her participation in the Program at any time.

Section 6 - Joint Panel

A. The Peer Assistance and Review Program will be administered by a Panel consisting of seven (7) members, four (4) certificated classroom teachers appointed by the Association, and three (3) administrators appointed by the District. A Panel member's term shall be no more than three (3) years. Panel members may be reappointed once their term has expired.



- B. The Joint Panel shall establish its own meeting schedule. Five (5) Panel members will constitute a quorum for purposes of meeting and conducting business. Except for the selection of Consulting Teachers, actions of the Joint Panel shall require an affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.
- C. The Joint Panel is responsible for:
 - Establishing internal operating procedures and regulations necessary to carry out the requirements of the Education Code and this document, including a procedure for selecting the Joint Panel's chair;
 - Developing the annual Program;
 - Developing a Program budget for Board approval;
 - Selecting, assigning, and overseeing the Consulting Teachers;
 - Coordinating training for Consulting Teachers, for Panel members, and where appropriate, for Participating Teachers;
 - Sending written notification of participation in the Program as needed;
 - 7. Reviewing Consulting Teachers' reports on Participating Teachers with permanent status referred to the Program because of unsatisfactory evaluations;
 - 8. Providing the results of a teacher's participation in the Program for use as part of the teacher's annual evaluation. This provision applies only to a Participating Teacher with an unsatisfactory evaluation.
 - 9. Assessing the effectiveness of the Consulting Teachers;
 - 10. Submitting to the Governing Board an Annual Evaluation on the Program's impact and effectiveness, including recommendations regarding Participating Teachers with unsatisfactory evaluations, and if necessary, forwarding names of individuals who, after sustained assistance, are unable to demonstrate satisfactory improvement.
- D. The Panel shall use the following procedure for developing the annual Program plan and recommending a budget:
 - By March 1st of each fiscal year the Panel will develop a Program and recommend a budget for the succeeding year, which will include:
 - (a) The estimated state revenues for the Program.
 - (b) The estimated expenditures, involving:
 - (1) Projected number of Participating Teachers;
 - (2) Projected number of Beginning Teachers;
 - (3) Projected (full and part-time) number of Consulting Teachers needed to service the projected need;
 - (4) Released time for the Panel and Consulting Teachers;



- (5) Pay for Panel members and Consulting Teachers that is consistent with the pay parameters established by the negotiating parties; and
- (6) Projected costs for training, administrative overhead, secretarial support and if necessary, legal and consulting assistance.
- E. The Joint Panel will immediately take appropriate action should a panel member receive an unsatisfactory evaluation.
- F. An administrative member of the Joint Panel will abstain from all Joint Panel matters concerning a Participating Teacher who he/she has given an unsatisfactory evaluation.

Section 7 - Consulting Teachers

- A. Minimum qualifications for Consulting Teacher:
 - A credentialed classroom teacher with permanent status and a minimum of five years recent teaching experience, at least three (3) years of which have been in the District;
 - Demonstrated exemplary teaching ability, as indicated by, among other things, effective communication skills, subject matter knowledge, and mastery of a range of teaching strategies necessary to meet students' needs in different contexts;
 - 3. Ability to work cooperatively and effectively with others.
- B. A Consulting Teacher may be assigned on a full-time, part-time, or extra-work basis, depending on the needs of the Program as determined by the Joint Panel.
- C. The recruitment and selection of Consulting Teachers shall be coordinated by the Joint Panel. Consulting Teacher vacancies shall be posted at each work site. Each applicant will be required to submit an application, which shall include at least two (2) references from individuals who have direct knowledge of the applicant's abilities for the position. A reference from a Principal is preferred, although not necessary. All applications and references will be treated with confidentiality and will not be disclosed except as required by law. The Joint Panel will make the selection(s) by majority vote (Education Code Section 44500,c, (1)). The Panel's procedures for selecting Consulting Teachers shall include provisions for classroom observation of Consulting Teacher candidates. The selections of the Panel are final and not subject to the grievance procedure.
- D. The Joint Panel will determine the process for assigning Consulting Teachers each year. Consideration shall be given to the additional workload assumed by Consulting Teachers assigned to provide Support Provider assistance under the BTSA Program. Within the first six (6) weeks of the regular school year, either the Consulting Teacher or the Participating Teacher may petition the Panel for an assignment change for good reasons. The Participating Teacher shall be allowed only one change per year.
- E. A Consulting Teacher's term will be no more than three (3) years. A Consulting Teacher may reapply and be reappointed once his/her term has expired.



- F. After completing service as a full-time Consulting Teacher, the teacher shall be placed in the same assignment previously held or in a comparable assignment.
- G. Consulting Teachers shall provide assistance to Participating Teachers which may include, but not be limited to, the following activities:
 - 1. Providing consultative assistance to improve in the specific areas targeted by the evaluating Principal, the District Teaching Standards, or other areas of agreed upon perceived need.
 - Serving as a BTSA Support Provider when assigned an appropriate Beginning Teacher(s);
 - Observing the Participating Teacher during periods of classroom instruction;
 - 4. Allowing the Participating Teacher to observe the Consulting Teacher or other selected teachers;
 - Attending specific training in specified teaching techniques or in designated subject matter;
 - 6. Demonstrating good practices to the Participating Teacher.
- H. Consulting Teachers shall maintain appropriate written records of each Participating Teacher's activities and progress and shall complete a written report as prescribed in Section 3,C, of this document.

Section 8 - Budget Priorities and Considerations

- A. The Program resources (i.e. the budget) shall be utilized in the following priority: first, for Participating Teachers with an unsatisfactory evaluation; second, for Beginning Teachers; third, for Voluntary Participating Teachers.
- B. The District shall not be required to allocate funds for the programs set forth in this document in addition to those funds provided by the legislature for implementation. Continuation of the PAR Program is subject to continued funding under AB X1.
- C. For purposes of budgeting, the cost of releasing Consulting Teachers for service in the Program shall, at the maximum, be computed on the basis of a Column B, Step 1 replacement temporary teacher plus benefits and fixed costs.
 - D. During the 2000-2001 school year, Joint Panel members shall receive an annual stipend of four thousand three hundred dollars (\$4,300) and work up to five (5) additional days; the chairperson of the Joint Panel shall receive an annual stipend of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) and shall work five (5) additional days. In subsequent years, Joint Panel members shall receive an annual stipend of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) and work an additional two (2) days; the chairperson shall receive five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and work an additional two (2)days.
 - E. Consulting Teachers shall receive a minimum yearly stipend of four thousand three hundred dollars (\$4,300) and shall work up to five (5) additional days each year on Program related matters as assigned by the Joint Panel. The Joint Panel will attempt to balance the work load of Consulting Teachers as it deems practical.



F. The Joint Panel may appropriately prorate stipends for partial year service.

Section 9 - Other Provisions

- A. Functions performed by certificated unit members under this document shall not constitute either management or supervisory functions as defined by Government Code Section 3540.1(g) and (m).
- B. Unit members who perform functions as Consulting Teachers or Panel members under this document shall have the same protection from liability and access to appropriate defense as other public school employees pursuant to Division 3.6 (commencing with Section 810) of Title 1 of the California Government Code.
- C. All documents and information relating to the participation in this Program will be regarded as a personnel matter and subject to the personnel records exemption of the California Public Records Act (Government Code Section 6250, et seq.). The annual evaluation of the Program's impact, excluding any information on identifiable individuals, shall be subject to disclosure under the Public Records Act.
- D. All parts of the selection process of Consulting Teachers will be treated as confidential and will not be disclosed except as required by law.
- E. All the confidential Documents for the Peer Program shall be maintained in the personnel office separately from the individual personnel records, except as set forth in Section 3, Paragraph F above.
- F. Nothing herein shall modify, or in any manner affect the rights of, the Governing Board/District under provisions of the Education Code relating to the employment, classification, retention or non-reelection of certificated employees. Likewise, nothing herein shall modify or affect the District's right to issue notices of unsatisfactory performance and/or unprofessional conduct pursuant to Education Code Section 44938.
- G. A Participating Teacher shall have the right to appear with representation by NEA-J before the Joint Panel to present his/her point of view concerning any report being made.
- H. Grievances concerning the Program shall be limited to a claim that the procedures specified in this document have not been followed. No grievance shall challenge the Joint Panel's judgment in implementing the Program.
- I. The Program may be revised by the mutual consent of the District and Association.
- J. This Program shall be effective July 1, 2000. Article XXII of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, concerning Mentor Teachers, shall terminate effective June 30, 2000.

Program Structure for Participating Teachers With Unsatisfactory Evaluations






- e. Working with colleagues to improve professional practice.
- f. Following District policies and regulations.
- g. Fulfilling adjunct duty responsibilities (as defined by the Collective Bargaining Agreement).
