5. Adopt Resolution No. 00/25, Year-End Budget Transfers/Revisions (Mrs. Lauzon) Each year at this time, the Riverside County Office of Education requests each school board to authorize budget revisions which may be necessary to correct imbalances in any major account at the end of the year. During the year, from October through May, the Board receives regular reports on appropriation transfer requests and resolutions for expenditure of excess funds.

The process of closing the financial records for the 1999/00 fiscal year has begun, and when all revenues and expenditures have been accrued, it may be necessary to process transfers in various funds to balance these accounts. This does not involve additional expenditures; rather, the budget is revised by transferring to an account which has a negative balance from one which has a positive balance, so that the final financial records of the District meet all legal requirements.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution No. 00/25, Year-End Budget Transfer/Revisions.

 Records that are no longer required by the District are listed in the supporting documents.

 The Jurupa Council PTA Parliamentarian, Ms. Pamela Hogan, and the Principal, Mr. Gary Temkin, are endeavoring to applying for grant funds to purchase and install barrier-free, accessible playground equipment at Sky Country Elementary School. Through this unique funding opportunity, staff and parents hope to add to the playground environment a variety of areas that give physically challenged students additional socialization on the playground. Funds for the equipment are being requested through two grant applications submitted to the Community Foundation of Riverside County and the Employees Community Fund of Boeing California. According to Ms. Hogan, in order to complete the application process, Sky Country Elementary is asking for letters signed by the Board President, indicating the Board's support and that the district will act as the fiscal agent if grant funds are awarded.

B. Hear Report on National Youth Sports Program

(Mrs. Roberts)

The University of California, Riverside has been awarded a \$58,500 grant to conduct a summer National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) for economically disadvantaged youth ages 10-16. Dr. E. M. Abdulmumin, UCR's Project Director, indicated that UCR's grant funds do not cover busing. At the request of President Knight, Dr. Abdulmumin is present this evening to present a proposal requesting the District to cover the cost for busing for Jurupa's students participating in the National Youth Sports Program. Ms. Diana Fox, Jurupa's AsCent Program Director, has been working with Dr. Abdulmumim and Ms. Laurie Hudnall, Director of Transportation, to determine the availability of the District's buses and combine the National Youth Sports Program with the District's summer Ascent program.

The National Youth Sports Program will be held from June 26 through July 29, 2000 Monday through Friday. Ms. Fox issued a flyer inviting students to participate in a full day of activities during this time period. Students may begin at 8:00 a.m. with the UCR Sports Program, remain at UCR until 2:00 p.m., and return to Mission Middle School for the Ascent program until 6:00 p.m. There is the possibility that grant funds through the AsCent program may be used to assist with transportation costs. A copy of the flyer is included in the supporting documents.

Following discussion, the Board may wish to provide direction concerning the request from the University of California, Riverside's National Youth Sports Program for assistance with transportation costs.

* C. <u>Approve Course Plans: Algebra A Tutorial (Remediation); Reading and Language Development Tutorial</u> (Dr. Mason)

Attached in the supporting documents are the newly developed course plans for the following courses:

Algebra A Tutorial (Remediation)

Algebra A Tutorial will provide additional help to accomplish the basic skills necessary to learn eight of the twenty-five objectives listed under Goal 2 of the Algebra I standards.

Reading and Language Development Tutorial

This course addresses the language development needs of the low achieving student in reading through the development of phonemic awareness, semantic development, and syntactic development. All language development is accomplished within real language contexts involving content relevant materials including reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills required in content courses.

The course plans were also reviewed and approved by the Instructional Council at its regularly scheduled meeting on March 13, 2000.

Administration recommends approval of the following course plans: Algebra A Tutorial (Remediation) and Reading and Language Development Tutorial.

The following textbook was presented to the Instructional Council at its regular meeting on May 8, 2000 for review and approved unanimously. The supporting documents contain information regarding the cost of the textbook, other textbooks considered by the selection committee, and information regarding the rationale for selection. This textbook will be available for public review at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon public libraries for the time period specified in Board Policy 6200. In order to provide these electrical facilities, Edison will need an easement about six (6) feet wide extending the length of the district's property adjacent to both Jurupa Road and Pedley Road.

Administration recommends the Board grant Southern California Edison Company an easement extending the length of the district's property adjacent to both Jurupa Road and Pedley Road for both electrical and maintenance facilities.

RECOGNIZE DISTRICT "TEACHER OF THE YEAR" RECIPIENTS Following the site "Teacher of the Year" presentations, the Superintendent announced and presented plaques to the District "Teacher of the Year" winners at each level: Ms. Sherry Bockman, Sunnyslope Elementary; Mr. Ed Mills, Mission Middle, and Mr. Mike Dohr and Ms. Ellen Finan, Rubidoux High. He noted that the four teachers will represent the District in the Riverside County competition and County "Celebration of Education" to be held next spring.

RECESS

At 7:55 p.m., President Knight called for a short recess to congratulate "Teacher of the Year" recipients. At 8:14 p.m., President Knight reconvened the meeting.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS:

President Knight opened the Public Verbal Comments session and asked that comments be limited to five minutes.



CLASSIFIED CONCERNS

Ms. Ellen Vanta, President of CSEA, Jurupa #392, and Instructional Aide at Rubidoux High School, stated that she represents the over 750 classified employees in the district who provide effective, behind the scenes services for the school district. She referred to statements made at the May 1, 2000 Board meeting, and thanked Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Adams for their concerns relative to the level of staffing for the custodial and library positions. Ms. Vanta indicated that since the cutbacks in the early 1990's, individuals serving in library positions had their hours reduced from 6 hour to 4 hour positions; however, their job responsibilities have increased to handle textbooks, school enrollment continues to rise, and the number of classes that they serve has dramatically increased due to the Class Size Reduction program. In addition to library staffing hourly cutbacks. four new schools have opened and hundreds of new portable classrooms have been added for the custodial staff to maintain without increasing the number of custodians assigned these responsibilities. Ms. Vanta asked the Board when considering the budget for 2000/2001, to remember the daily contributions of classified employees to the educational process of Jurupa's children and address their needs in terms of wages, benefits, and staffing.

CLASSIFIED CONCERNS

Ms. Sandra Mason, CSEA Chief Job Steward, asked the Board to consider classified employees and the fact that the number of custodians maintaining district sites has not increased since the district added 230 new portable classrooms and four new schools. She noted that the custodial staff continues to work with one less person since before the 1990 cutbacks, and they are now responsible for maintaining 46 to 60 rooms per night. In addition, although the number of instructional aides has doubled, this is only due to the fact that their hours were cut back from six per day to three per day to save the District the expense of paying benefits.

CLASSIFIED ISSUES

Ms. Diana Strona, CSEA Public Relations Officer, also commented on statements made at the May 1, 2000 Board meeting concerning improved economic conditions in the State; however, she indicted unfortunately, these economic improvements have not filtered down to classified employees. Ms. Strona reviewed the rising out-of-pocket health expenses that classified employees must pay, and asked for an affordable health insurance coverage plan that extends to families; she asked for fairness, parity, and respect for classified employees as the "health" of the District continues to improve.

Ms. Sophie Gonzalez, Food Services Clerk, invited Board members to attend the CSEA dinner on Wednesday, May 24, 2000 in the Rubidoux High School Library to celebrate Classified School Employees Week.

NEGOTIATIONS

Ms. Fran Rice-Laabs, NEA-J President, stated that negotiations are completed concerning the Peer Assistance and Review program and the Association looks forward to improved negotiations in light of the extra dollars districts may receive in State funding with no strings attached. She indicated that she submitted to the Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services the Association's intent concerning the funding.

THANK YOU

Ms. De'Ann McWilliams, teacher at Mission Bell, expressed her special thanks to the Board for their support of the AVID program. As a former student and graduate of Rubidoux High School, she recalled that there were several important teachers that had a tremendous impact on her life and helped her to become what she is today, a teacher at Mission Bell Elementary School. Ms. McWilliams encouraged the Board to continue to support this vital program.

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SCHOOL DISTRICT COOPERATION

Mr. Robert Craig, parent, noted that he is involved with the Jurupa Community Partnership to improve awareness in the community of the importance of Disaster Preparedness. He indicated that tomorrow evening, the Jurupa Community Partnership, in a cooperative venture with the Mira Loma Middle School Principal, Ms. Diana Asseier, will provide a Red Cross Training on this topic for community members, staff, and parents. He thanked the District for allowing this cooperative venture to occur at one of their school sites.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS Board member Mr. John Chavez reviewed his involvement in the West Riverside Elementary Career Day presentations with speakers from a variety of professions; he discussed his previous position in the aerospace industry. Mr. Chavez indicated that he and Mr. Teagarden had the opportunity to participate in the Academic Olympics awards program. He thanked Ms. Diana Asseier for hosting the Board meeting at her site, with the Mira Loma Middle Jazz Band under the direction of Ms. Patricia Cruz; he congratulated the AVID Class of 2000 as they go on to attend colleges and universities in the fall; he congratulated Science Fair winners, Scott Chavez and Michael Swager, and he recognized Alvord School Board member present, Mr. Phil Stokoe.

Mr. Chavez discussed the business conducted at the CSBA Delegate Assembly held on May 6; he highlighted several of the key topics to include Conflict of Interest requirements; their work on the Policy Platform for approval in December; the deadline of June 9 for submitting names for CSBA nominations, and several Senate and Assembly Bills that are being supported or opposed by the Association. She commented that it was delightful to attend the orchestra performance, and asked for follow-up to determine the number of students that continue playing an instrument after participating in the Riverside Philharmonic program.

Student Board member Joshua Johnson spoke in support of the positive impact of the AVID program; he invited the Board to attend the Theater performances on Thursday and Saturday, and he thanked Jurupa Valley Assistant Principal, Ms. Lorraine Dyson, for her successful work on the Academic Achievement and Improvement Grant for the school.

ARTICLE 17

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

Section 1 - Health and Welfare Benefit Allowance.

A. Maximum Allowance.

The District will pay annually a maximum allowance of four thousand four hundred dollars (\$4,400) \$4600 per qualified unit member for specified health and welfare benefits. All costs for benefits exceeding the maximum allowance shall be paid by the unit member. A "qualified" unit member is a member of the bargaining unit whose employment was regularly four (4) or more hours per day on or before July 1, 1977 or, if approved by the District for employment after that date, whose employment is regularly eight (8) hours per day.

B. <u>Pro-rated Allowance.</u>

Unit members whose employment is regularly less than eight (8) hours per day will receive annually a maximum allowance in the same proportion of the current maximum District dollar contribution amount that their regular daily hours of employment bear to eight (8) hours, with the following exceptions:

- 1. Unit members whose employment was regularly four (4) or more hours per day on or before July 1, 1977 (See Section 1,A above).
- Unit members hired on or after January 1, 1994 whose employment is regularly three or fewer hours per day shall not receive any allowance for health and welfare benefits.

Section 2 - Specified Health and Welfare Benefits.

Subject to the provisions and requirements of the jointly approved insurance carriers, the following benefit options are available to unit members under a "Section 125 Premium Only Plan" effective October 1, 1992. Payroll deductions will be made for costs of coverage beyond the District allowance for approved plans.

A. <u>Mandatory Coverages</u>

(G-2 (P)4)

- 1. All unit members who are eligible for health and welfare benefits shall have mandatory American United Life insurance coverage of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
- 2. All unit members who are eligible for health and welfare benefits shall have mandatory group disability (income protection) coverage beginning on October 1, 1986.

B. Optional Coverages

- Unit members, at their option, may select health coverage with either Reach II (Eclipse and Trilogy), Blue Cross – California Care C1 or Kaiser for themselves, or for themselves and their dependents.
- Unit members, at their option may select membership in MetLife Dental Plan or Reach the Tooth Dental Plan, or <u>Delta Dental-Delta Care</u> for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.
- Unit members, at their option, may select American United Life or Insurance Company of North America/CSEA life insurance for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.
- 4. Unit members, at their option, may select a supplemental American Fidelity income protection plan.
- 5. Unit members at their option, may select membership in Safeguard Vision Plan for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.

Section 3 - Deductions and Payments.

Any necessary deductions authorized by unit members shall be deducted from September through June payrolls.

Section 4 - Insurance Period.

District <u>Health</u> and <u>Welfare</u> benefit insurance policies are in effect from October 1 through the following September 30.

Section 5 - Special Conditions.

Subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carriers, the following special conditions are available to unit members.

- A. The optional coverages of the prior year are automatically continued for each qualified unit member. Adjustment of any necessary payroll deductions will automatically be made to reflect rate changes and/or a change in the amount of District contribution.
- B. A unit member who was qualified the prior year but elected no optional insurance coverage may initiate such coverage which is effective October 1 annually during or before the designated sign-up period each September or by mutual agreement if negotiations have not been completed by October 1.
- C. A new unit member may select optional health and welfare benefits within the first thirty (30) days of employment.
- D. A unit member may discontinue optional <u>H</u>ealth and <u>W</u>elfare benefits and any related payroll deductions at any time.
- E. Newly authorized or discontinued deductions will be processed on the next payroll occurring fifteen (15) or more days after written notice by the unit member. Insurance coverage becomes effective on the first of the month following the first payroll deduction.
- F. In the event a unit member is granted a long-term unpaid leave of absence to perform paid duties for the District in a non-bargaining unit position, the unit member's health and welfare benefits shall continue for the duration of the leave unless duplicated in the non-unit position.
- G. Unit members who are absent because of illness and who have exhausted their accumulated paid leave shall continue to receive full insurance coverage paid by the District for that period of illness not to exceed twelve (12) months following exhaustion of said leave.

Section 6 - Unit Member Responsibility.



Each qualified unit member is responsible for initiating, revising, or discontinuing optional fringe benefits and authorizing any necessary related payroll deductions by personally completing written forms in the District Business Office during regular working hours. Arrangements will be made to accommodate unit members whose work day is the same as that of the Business Office personnel.

Section 7 - Cash Option.

Health and Welfare benefit money not expended on the unit member's other health and welfare coverage shall be available for cash payment at the unit member's option. Such cash payments shall be reduced by 4.27% to offset District costs associated with providing this benefit.

Section 8 - Carriers and Coverages.

Specific carriers and coverages of all unit members' insurance plans paid by payroll deductions or specified Health and Welfare benefits shall be mutually agreed to by the Association and District. Requests by either party to change existing insurance plans must be made on or before July 15 annually for October 1 implementation.

Section 9 - Life Insurance for Certain Part-Time Unit Members

Effective October 1, 1999 the District shall purchase a \$5,000 Life Insurance Policy for each permanent unit member whose regular hours equal or exceed fifteen (15) per week, and who are not covered by the mandatory insurance coverage referenced in Section 2 of this Article. Reasonable procedures for implementing this Section will be developed in the Business Office. This Section shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carrier(s).

Section 10 - Medical Coverage After Age 65.

Unit members retiring after June 30, 1991 shall be eligible to continue to purchase coverage in a District group medical insurance plan after reaching the age of 65, provided that these conditions exist:

a. The retiree has been employed in the District for no less than ten (10) years.



- b. The plan carrier allows such participation.
- c. The retiree is otherwise eligible for enrollment in the plan.
- d. The entire cost of such coverage shall be paid by the retiree.

Section 11 - District Responsibility,

The District's full and complete obligations under this Article are limited to payment of the premiums through payroll deduction as indicated above and assisting unit members in resolving problems with carriers.

However, it is expressly understood that all terms and conditions of the various programs available pursuant to this Article are the insurance carriers' responsibility. Therefore, all disputes with respect to the carriers' administrations of such programs are not the responsibility of the District, and are not subject to the grievance procedure(s) in this Agreement.

ACTION SESSION

APPROVE MINUTES MEETING #2

Mr. Bill Stallard made a motion to approve the minutes of Meeting #2 of the District Advisory Council. Mr. Ray Teagarden seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

Mr. Gregg Nelsen, Research and Evaluation, gave a summary of the statewide testing program and the district-developed criterionreferenced tests.

He provided the council with the 1997-98 and 1998-99 Stanford 9 (STAR) test results in reading and mathematics from second grade to 11th grade. In second grade, the first year district average was the 30th percentile in reading. This means that 70% of students in the state scored better than our students in reading. The second year, we scored at the 37th percentile which was a good gain in one year.

In mathematics, the gains in 1998-99 were 15 percentile points higher than 97-98. We expect to see greater gains as the district standards are utilized in the classroom.

Mr. Nelsen also shared information on the Criterion Referenced Test (CRT). The CRT is a test that is administered each year in May and is based on the district standards. He shared the results of the May 1999 CRT (overhead). The graph gave results by percentage correct for language arts and mathematics. Last year was the first year of testing so we expect to see a great improvement this year. The district goal is 95% correct in both language arts and math.

COMITE

Ms. Sonia Porter, Coordinator of Language Services, gave an overview of the Comité process.

She stated that at one time a lawsuit was filed against the State Department of Education alleging that they were not monitoring the English Learner program. As a result, the state now has a process known as "Comité" to review school districts for compliance within the English Learner program. Jurupa Unified School District was selected along with nine others to be reviewed this year.

Ms. Porter reviewed the Comité process (handout) and the goals and objectives for Jurupa District as submitted by a district task force to ensure that English learners achieve high levels of academic performance leading to successful high school graduation and opportunities for post-secondary education. There are three main goals which are: 1) develop knowledge, skills, and understanding of effective programs for English learners and attain appropriate credentials, 2) develop an instructional program that enables English learners to have full access to the core



curriculum, and 3) develop an accountability process which monitors and evaluates the EL program so that English learners are acquiring English and mastering district standards.

As with our district self-review two years ago, we will now be conducting a self-review for the English Learner program at all school sites to look at the program and areas that need improvement.

Ms. Porter also shared the R-30 Language Census (handout) from March 1993-99 for the district for all limited English proficient students from grades K-12. The population of these students has risen from 2629 in 1993 to 4188 in 1999. She also shared a handout showing the languages that have been reported in our district. Spanish is the highest with 4,083 students out of the total of 4,188.

ALLOCATION OF FUNDS FOR COMPENSATORY EDUCATION PROGRAMS Ms. Terri Moreno, Categorical Project Manager, provided information on the rank order of schools that receive compensatory education funding during the 2000-01 school year.

She shared a chart, "Consolidated Application Planning for 2000-2001", which showed the breakdown of schools by the number and percentage of Free and Reduced Lunch recipients by school. This percentage is used to rank schools for distribution of Title 1 funds. As shown on the chart, there are currently 13 elementary schools which receive these funds. Five are designated Title I Schoolwide schools and the remaining eight are Targeted Assistance Schools. Granite Hill has moved up in ranking position and will receive increased Title I funding for 2000-01 school year. This will reduce the funding for all other schools. Ms. Moreno stated that current plans are to take all of the eligible Targeted Assistance schools through the Schoolwide planning process next year.

She then shared an overhead from the California Department of Education showing the step-by-step ranking process and the options available for distribution of funds.

UPDATE ON ACCELERATED STANDARDS Mr. Memo Méndez, Director of Research and Categorical Projects, gave an update on the status of the accelerated standards being developed by the district.

At the last District Advisory Council meeting he reported that the Accelerated Standards Committee was in the process of developing and refining the standards and stated they would be in place by the end of the 2000 school year.

He was happy to report that the standards were in <u>draft</u> form and shared copies with the council. The standards will be used as a guide for students who can go beyond the district core curriculum standards. The next major task will be to develop strategies that teachers can use to diversify and launch a system of delivery of instruction.

MARCH 18, 2000 STAFF DEVELOPMENT DAY Mr. Méndez stated that prior to 1999 staff development days were held during the school day. Districts were allowed to take up to eight days. The state law changed in the 1999-2000 school year and now



district's must conduct staff development outside of the school calendar which means that prior to school starting in the fall, Saturdays and evenings are being utilized to provide staff development opportunities.

This year we had a Staff Development Day on Saturday, March 18, 2000. It was held at four elementary and two middle school sites. Over 500 classroom teachers participated with approximately 150 instructional aides and language tutors.

The program included elementary, secondary, and special education teachers reviewing curriculum standards (math, language arts, social studies, science, minimum standards and accelerated standards) as appropriate. Language tutors received training on English Language Development (ELD) and Literacy for English Learners. Special Education Instructional Aides received Crisis Prevention Intervention (CPI) training.

Since Saturday is out of the regular work day, the Staff Development Day was voluntary, but all in attendance received compensation.

SUMMER EXTENDED LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES (ELO) PROGRAM Ms. Moreno gave an overview of the upcoming summer ELO program.

She stated that the district is in the planning stages of the summer program and teaching positions for the program have been posted. Class will begin on June 26 through August 2, Monday through Thursday. A list of students each site submitted for the SELO program will be sent to each school. From that list, schools can re-prioritize, identify retainees, and include additional at-risk students. The assessment for those at-risk students includes Pre-CRTs and Post CRTs, mastery of Minimum Standards Checklists, and Reassessment of Retention. Assessment for ELD students at-risk of retention includes ELD Placement Chart/ELD Standards, ELD Profile Card/ELD Standards, and ELD Assessments.

The feeder schools for the K-5 program will be Camino Real for students attending Stone Avenue, Indian Hills, Van Buren, and Peralta; West Riverside for those attending Ina Arbuckle and Pacific Avenue; Sky Country for those attending Troth Street, Pedley, and Mission Bell, and Sunnyslope for those attending Granite Hill, Glen Avon, and Rustic Lane. There will also be a Grades 6-7 program at Mission Middle School.

HEAR PRESENTATION ON ASCENT PROGRAM

Ms. Diana Fox, AsCent Program Director, gave an overview of the program being provided to students at the three middle schools.

It is made possible through a grant from the State of California Department of Education and is specially funded through the "After School Learning and Safe Neighborhoods Partnerships Program".

The program is a partnership with the Jurupa Unified School District, the Jurupa Recreation and Parks District, the YMCA, YWCA, and PTAs.



n consists of two components: An educational and literacy component to provide tutoring or homework assistance, and an educational enrichment component, which may include, but is not limited to, recreation and prevention activities.

The hours of operation are Monday through Friday on all days school is in session from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Ms. Fox stated that a grant has been submitted to the State for expansion of the program at four elementary schools and an outreach program for incoming 6th graders to help them succeed in middle school.
