3. Administrative Reports and Written Communications

a. Hear Report on Governor's Proposed Initiative for Middle Schools
For the 2001-02 Budget, the Governor is proposing a series of initiatives designed to continue the improvements in student performance begun over the last two years. The Governor's office staff notes that these initiatives "all center on improving classroom instruction and measuring student performance to assure that students are meeting the State's academic standards." One of the Governor's initiatives proposes a longer year for middle schools.

Longer Year for Middle School – The primary grades have been a recent priority for additional investments, principally through class size reduction. The Board will recall that last year, we fully implemented class size reduction in grades K-3. In recognition that middle schools provide the critical transition from primary grades to secondary education, the Governor's Budget proposes to increase instructional time in middle schools "to improve educational performance and assist students with the transition to high school." Accordingly, the Budget proposes \$100 million as the first step in a three-year effort to increase the length of the instructional year by 30 days for all middle schools.

The budget proposal includes a per-student incentive of proportional funding (approximately \$770 per pupil) in exchange for adding the additional days and meeting other requirements of the program. Governor Davis will propose legislation appropriating \$450 million for the second year and \$900 million for the third year to ensure the opportunity for all schools to meet the 210-day instructional year goal. We have not, as yet, received information on counter proposals. The added days will be used for additional instructional time for all students in participating schools, and schools must also agree to align their textbooks to State standards. First-year funding is sufficient to extend the school year for approximately 130,000 middle school students in schools that are ready to participate in 2001-02—a figure that will increase in future years as other middle schools develop plans and schedules to meet the incentive requirements.

a. <u>Hear Report on Governor's Proposed Initiative for Middle Schools</u> (Continued)

Scores in this district as well as statewide on the Stanford 9 and our local criterion-referenced tests suggest that students in middle schools have not progressed as rapidly as in primary grades. SAT-9 reading scores drop dramatically after the 8th grade and remain consistently low until the 11th grade. In an effort to reverse this trend in Jurupa schools, presently, a district middle school committee is studying options for improving the structure and curriculum for these grades. As we obtain more information, administration will keep the Board apprised of the various issues that emerge from Governor Davis' new initiative and from the work of the District's Middle School Restructuring Committee. <u>Information only</u>.

Policy and Regulation 3415 – Sex Offender Information. This new policy is in response to the federal "Megan's Law" legislation (AB 1562 and AB 1378) which requires the release of relevant information to protect the public from sexually violent offenders. Developed with assistance of legal counsel, it describes reasonable parameters for district notification procedures and is designed to work closely with law enforcement agencies.

<u>Policy 5000 – Concepts and Roles.</u> This new policy was developed to support the Governing Board's expectations of maintaining a safe, positive, and nurturing school environment that promotes meeting the diverse educational needs of all students.

<u>Policy 5021 – Noncustodial Parents</u>. This new policy is intended to help clarify parental rights as it pertains to access of student records, participation in school activities, and school visitation.

Regulation 5110.1 – Residency of Students With Caregiver. This new regulation was developed to support Education Code 48204 and Family Code 6552.

Regulation E 5110.1 (a) and (b) – Caregiver's Authorization Affidavit. This caregiver's authorization affidavit form has been revised to reflect revisions to comply with law.

Regulation 5110.2 – Residency Based on Parent/Guardian Employment. This new regulation was developed to support Board Policy 5110 and Education Codes 48204 and 48980.

Regulation 5110.3 – Residency for Homeless Children. This new regulation helps to define enrollment of students in district schools who do not reside in a permanent, fixed residence.

<u>E 5110.3 – Declaration of Residency.</u> This "Declaration of Residency" form is currently being utilized within the district and is included as support for Regulation 5110.3.

Regulation 5110.4 – Nonresident Foreign Students. This new regulation was written to clarify admission of nonresident foreign students within district schools.

<u>Policy and Regulation 5111 – Admission to School.</u> The current policy has been revised to reflect a policy and regulation to help clarify admission and placement of students.

<u>Policy and Regulation 5150 – Child Abuse Reporting.</u> This policy and regulation have been updated with the assistance of legal counsel to reflect recent changes in California law.

<u>Policy 5156 – Interrogation/Release of Students.</u> This policy has been revised with input from legal council, law enforcement officials, and site level administrators to update procedures as they relate to interrogation and release of students by staff members, peace officers, school resource officers, representatives of a child protective agency, and/or other individuals.

B. Accept Education Technology Grant Award for High Schools (SB2882) (Mrs. Roberts)

Mr. Neil Mercurius, Administrator of Technology, received notification in late January that the State has awarded \$1,008,000 one-time funding to the high schools. The Education Technology Grant Program for High Schools, funded under SB 2882, provides one-time funding to reduce the student-to-computer ratio in California high schools to 4.75-to-1. By accepting the award, the district agrees to purchase multimedia computers in order to reduce the student-to-multimedia-computer ratio.

This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2002.
- ** 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #01-044 for violation of Education Code 48900 (a1, a2 & k) for the Spring Semester 2001 and Fall Semester 2001; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2002.

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #13 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

2. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request
State credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, Language Services, Mathematics or Science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a vacancy for a Mathematics teacher at Rubidoux High School as well as a temporary vacancy for a Resource Specialist at Jurupa Valley High School.

The individuals being recommended are Mr. Stephen Pricer and Mr. Derek Reid. Mr. Pricer earned a Bachelors Degree in Mathematics & Biology from the University of California, Irvine. Mr. Pricer is in the process of enrolling in the Single Subject Credential program at the University of California, Riverside. Mr. Reid earned his Bachelors Degree in Religion and History from Oakwood College in Huntsville, AL; he is currently enrolled in a credential program at Cal State San Bernardino. Mr. Reid has been a substitute teacher with the Jurupa Unified School District since June 1998. Recruitment efforts have not identified stronger candidates.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Stephen Pricer and Mr. Derek Reid be approved for temporary employment through the end of this school year as a Mathematics Teacher and a Resource Specialist under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.

	Mr. Chavez questioned whether there is a plan in place in case of power shutdowns? The Superintendent responded that the District has a Safe School Plan that
	schools follow; however, a power shutdown plan, as such, will depend on what Southern California Edison advises. She commented that she will request an update from the Safety Committee in terms of site readiness, and noted that the Crisis Management Plan kept at all sites does address what to do in case of power outages. In terms of closing schools, and handling a crisis in the area, the District does belong to a consortium with the Jurupa Valley Sheriff's Station serving as a Command Station. In addition, the Riverside County Office of Education has kept the District informed concerning Stage 3 alerts and what to expect in our area. Further, she reviewed that most classrooms have windows that provide sufficient light during daytime hours, and school sites are being asked to check their flashlight supplies for unlighted areas.
	Mr. Chavez suggested notification to parents communicating what might happen if students are released from school due to a power outage. The Superintendent stated that, typically, only as a last resort would students be released prior to the close of school, and this would occur only with proper notification. She will keep the Board apprised of potential power shutdowns and any actions that the District is taking to notify parents, children, and teachers.

SEX OFFENDER INFORMATION

In order to protect students while they are traveling to and from school, attending school or at a school-related activity, the Board of Education believes it is important that the district respond appropriately when a law enforcement agency contacts the district about registered sex offenders who may reside or work within district boundaries.

Pursuant to Penal Code section 290, a law enforcement agency may advise the public of the presence of high-risk sex offenders in its community. Furthermore, when a peace officer reasonably suspects that a child or other person may be at risk from a registered sex offender, a law enforcement agency may notify the District. The Superintendent or designee shall establish an ongoing relationship with law enforcement officials to coordinate the receipt of such information. The Superintendent or designee also shall notify appropriate staff as necessary.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually notify parents/guardians of the availability of information from law enforcement officials regarding registered sex offenders who may be living in the area.

SEX OFFENDER INFORMATION

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a plan for receiving and communicating information about registered sex offenders residing within district boundaries. He/she shall ensure, at a minimum, that the following components are part of the plan:

- 1. The Superintendent or designee shall appoint a staff member to serve as liaison with law enforcement regarding these matters.
- 2. The Superintendent or designee shall, at the beginning of each school year, contact local law enforcement to coordinate the receipt of information. Law enforcement shall be informed that all notifications and correspondence should be directed to the district liaison as well as the individual school sites. A letter shall be sent annually to local law enforcement, identifying the name, phone number, and address of the district liaison.
- 3. The Superintendent or designee and the district liaison shall collaborate with law enforcement in order to alert children to the dangers of sex offenders and develop a system for distributing information about sex offenders to staff members.
- 4. The Superintendent or designee shall, at the beginning of each school year, notify parents/guardians of the district's willingness and intention to work with law enforcement on this matter.
- 5. If and when law enforcement notifies the district of the residency or employment of a sex offender within district boundaries, the Superintendent or designee shall determine which central office and school staff need to be notified. This determination shall be done on a case-by-case basis. Notification may be made to the following staff:
 - a. The principal or designee of the school which is in the attendance area of the sex offender's residence or place of employment
 - b. Teachers and classified personnel at that school including staff responsible for visitor registration
 - c. Principals or designees at adjacent schools, as appropriate
 - d. School Resource Officers
 - e. Bus drivers
 - f. Campus supervisors

6. Any staff who receives information directly from law enforcement regarding registered sex offenders shall immediately contact the Superintendent or designee in order to help ensure that the district is able to respond appropriately.

Notification to Parents/Guardians

If the district believes that parents/guardians should be notified of the presence of either a "high risk" or "serious" sex offender in the community, the liaison shall contact local law enforcement and ask the agency to conduct a broader notification.

CONCEPTS AND ROLES

The Governing Board shall make every effort to maintain a safe, positive school environment and student services that promote student welfare and academic achievement. The Board expects students to make good use of learning opportunities by demonstrating regular attendance, appropriate conduct, and respect for others.

The Board is fully committed to providing equal educational opportunities and keeping the schools free from discriminatory practices. The Board shall not tolerate the intimidation or harassment of any student for any reason.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish and keep parents/guardians and students well informed about school and district rules and regulations related to attendance, health examinations, records, grades, and student conduct. When conducting hearings related to discipline, attendance, and other student matters, the Board shall afford students their due process rights in accordance with law.

NONCUSTODIAL PARENTS

Noncustodial parents generally retain the same rights as custodial parents unless a court order restricts the rights of the noncustodial parent. These rights include, but are not limited to, accessing his/her child's student records, participating in school activities, and visiting the child at school. If a completed or pending legal action curtails the noncustodial parent's rights, the parent/guardian with custody shall provide evidence of this action to the Superintendent or designee.

Upon request, the district shall provide noncustodial parents with announcements and notices that are sent to the custodial parent.

While both parents can visit the child at school, only the custodial parent has the right to remove the child from school property. Only a verified note or an emergency card from the custodial parent will be cause for exception to this provision.

Note: A child custody order binds only the parties to the proceeding, not the district or its staff. Therefore, the district is not required to enforce the court order. If a court order conflicts with Education Code statutes that give noncustodial parents the right to access student records, the district should seek legal counsel to determine whether the court order or the statutes should prevail. If a court order restricts access to the child, it is recommended that staff contact the custodial parent and local law enforcement officials in the event of an attempted violation of the court order. If a court order restricting access to a child is not issued by a California court, staff should allow local law enforcement officials to determine its validity.

In the event of an attempted violation of a court order that restricts access to a student, staff shall contact the custodial parent and local law enforcement officials and shall make the student available only after one or both of these parties consent.

RESIDENCY OF STUDENTS WITH CAREGIVER

Students shall qualify as district residents if placed within the district in a regularly established licensed children's institution, a licensed foster home, or a family home pursuant to a commitment or placement under Welfare and Institutions Code 200-987. The agency placing a student in such a home or institution shall provide evidence to the school that the placement or commitment is pursuant to law. (Education Code 48204)

Students shall qualify as district residents if they reside in the home of a care-giving adult within district boundaries. (Education Code 48204)

Upon enrollment, the care-giving adult shall execute, under penalty of perjury, the affidavit specified in Family Code 6552.

When their whereabouts is known, parents/guardians of students living with a caregiver or in foster care shall receive all parental notifications required by law. They shall be contacted for all major educational decisions concerning enrollment, discipline and final grades.

Caregivers and foster parents who have filed the affidavit specified in Family Code 6552 may authorize school-related medical care.

Caregivers and foster parents shall receive a copy of all school notices.

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RESIDENCY BASED ON PARENT/GUARDIAN EMPLOYMENT

District residency status may be granted to a student if the student's parent/guardian works within the district boundaries. Proof of the parent/guardian's employment within the district shall be required prior to initial enrollment. (Education Code 48204)

The Superintendent or designee shall review each proposed or continued enrollment and determine whether it would result in additional costs to the district in excess of state funds. If it is determined that excess costs would be incurred by the district, the Board may deny the student's admission.

The Board also may deny any proposed or continued enrollment which would adversely affect the existing desegregation plan of either the current or proposed district. (Education Code 48204)

Students enrolled in the district on the basis of parent/guardian employment shall not be obliged to reapply for enrollment the next school year. They may continue to attend school in the district through the 12th grade, subject to restrictions specified in law related to excess costs and negative impact on desegregation plans. (Education Code 48204)

If more than one percent of the district's ADA or 75 students, whichever is greater, are admitted to other districts on the basis of parent/guardian place of employment, the Board may deny any further transfers out of the district on this basis. (Education Code 48204)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the district of residence of all children requesting admittance into the district on the basis of parent/guardian place of employment. Unless approved by the student's current district of attendance, no student shall be admitted into the district on the basis of a parent/guardian place of employment in excess of the limits imposed by law.

The student's parent/guardian shall be notified in writing of the Board's decision to deny admission or transfer out of the district. The notice shall include specific reasons for the denial. (Education Code 48204)

Notifications sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each year shall include information about employment-based school attendance options. (Education Code 48980)

NONRESIDENT FOREIGN STUDENTS

Definitions

F-1 Visa Students: An F-1 Visa student is a nonimmigrant visa category intended for use by nonresident aliens whose primary purpose for visiting the United States is to study at an academic school. (8 USC 1184)

J-1 Visa Students: A J-1 visa student is a nonimmigrant exchange student who has come to the United States to study for a specific period of time under the sponsorship of a government-approved agency. (8 USC 1184)

Nonimmigrant foreign students may be admitted to the United States for a temporary stay for the purpose of study.

F-1 Visa Students

On a case-by-case basis, students with or seeking an F-1 visa designation shall be accepted for admission to district schools in grades 9-12.

In determining whether to admit the student, the Superintendent or designee shall consider whether the following conditions exist: (8 CFR 214.3, 22 CFR 41.61)

- 1. A suitable program exists at the school the student has selected.
- The student's English proficiency is sufficient for successful study at that school.
- 3. Space is available
- 4. The student has provided proof of financial responsibility

In addition, the student shall also submit evidence that he/she has been fully immunized in accordance with California law.

A student shall be admitted for a maximum of one year. In addition, a student granted admission under this program shall pay the district the full, unsubsidized per-student cost of attendance at the secondary school.

ADMISSION TO SCHOOL

All children, between the ages of 6-18 years, residing within the boundaries of the Jurupa Unified School District shall be admitted to the schools of this District unless excluded or excused under specific sections of the Education Code.

All parents over 16 years and under 18 years of age who have not graduated, or who are exempted from full-time attendance under provisions of the Education Code; are not legally employed full time, and are not attending full-time day or evening school, shall attend continuation education classes; alternative school or program classes for the minimum time required by the Education Code. Persons employed full time shall attend legally approved continuation or alternative classes.

With approval of the superintendent or designee, students enrolled in other programs may be concurrently enrolled in district Adult Education classes.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the verification of all entrance requirements specified in law and in Board policies and regulations.

ADMISSION TO SCHOOL

Verification of Age:

Parents shall be required to furnish documentary proof of age of the child at the time of enrollment. The legal evidences of age, in order of desirability, are a birth certificate, baptismal certificate, passport, immigration certificate, Bible record, or affidavit from the parent/guardian.

Admission to Kindergarten:

Pupils who shall have his/her fifth birthday on or before December 2, that year may be admitted to kindergarten during the first month of school. (Education Code 48900)

Admission to First Grade:

Pupils who shall have his/her sixth birthday on or before December 2 that year may be admitted to first grade during the first month of school.

A child who has been lawfully admitted to kindergarten as defined by the State of California, in California or any other state, and who has completed one year therein, shall be admitted to the first grade of an elementary school regardless of age.

Grade Placement:

A new pupil enrolled in grades above grade one will be placed in the grade commensurate with maturation and achievement based on records of transfer, report cards, standardized test results, and personal information from previous schools.

The Jurupa Unified School District Board of Education recognizes that the district has a responsibility to facilitate the prompt reporting of incidents of child abuse and neglect. As such, all employees shall report known or suspected incidences of child abuse pursuant to the provisions of the accompanying district regulation and state law. Employees shall fully cooperate with the child protective agencies responsible for reporting, investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse.

To assist employees in carrying out this reporting responsibility, the Superintendent or designee shall provide training in the duties of child abuse identification and reporting for all certificated personnel. The Superintendent or designee shall also provide training in the duties of child abuse identification and reporting to instructional and teacher aides, teacher assistants and other classified employees. (Penal Code 11165.7)

As part of their training in child abuse identification and reporting, employees shall receive written notice of state child abuse reporting requirements and employees' confidentiality rights. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Under California law, certain persons are mandated to report reasonable suspicion of child abuse and neglect. Information concerning child abuse may be received by school personnel from a variety of sources, including, but not limited to, the victim, other students, parents, teachers, administrators or concerned citizens.

Mandated Reporters

Mandated reporters working for the Jurupa Unified School District are:

- . All administrative staff
- All certificated staff
- All classified staff

"Reasonable suspicion" is the standard used for reporting. Reasonable suspicion is defined as "it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain such a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse."

Criminal Liability for Mandated Reporters

A mandated reporter who fails to report an instance of child abuse, which he/she knows to exist or reasonable should know to exist, could be prosecuted for failure to report as required by law. If found guilty, a person could be punished with "confinement in a county jail for a term not to exceed six months, by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by both that imprisonment and fine." (Penal Code 11172, subd. e)

Legal Protection

Even though the California Legislature has provided immunity from liability to mandated reporters, that immunity does not eliminate the possibility that actions may be brought. No one is precluded from bringing suit against another.

However, the law protects a mandated reporter against a financial hardship faced by such legal action. A mandated reporter may present a claim to the State Board of Control for reasonable attorney's fees incurred in the action if he or she prevails in the action or the court dismisses the action upon a demurrer or motion for summary judgment made by that person. The maximum hourly rate for recovery of attorney's fees is that charged by the Attorney General at the time of the award and the maximum recovery is \$50,000.

Civil Negligence for Mandated Reporters

Under the law of civil negligence, violation of a statutory duty, such as mandatory reporting of suspected child abuse and neglect cases, is negligence per se, "in itself." That means that if it can be proven that a person willfully or negligently failed to report known or suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she can be sued for the injuries that occurred after the time when the report should have been made.

Access

Any mandated reporter who receives a request from a child protective agency to provide access to the victim of a known suspected instance of child abuse shall not incur civil or criminal liability as a result of permitting that access.

Non-mandated Reporters

A non-mandated reporter is not liable criminally or civilly unless it can be proven that a false report was made and the person knew that the report was false. It is a misdemeanor to make a false report.

How to Make a Report

California law has made provision for schools to have internal procedures for reporting suspected child abuse cases. Whenever school personnel receive information concerning suspected child abuse, the person receiving the information shall comply with these procedures.

Reporting duties are individual. No supervisor or administrator may impede or inhibit reporting duties and no person who makes a report can be subject to any sanction for making a report.

Procedures to Follow:

- 1. Make an immediate telephone report to a child protective agency (Child Protective Services (CPS), county probation department, or sheriff's department). CPS is the preferred first call. The telephone report must include:
 - a. Name of the reporter (which is confidential with limited exceptions);
 - b. Name of the child;
 - c. Present location of the child;
 - d. Nature and extent of the injury; and
 - e. Any other information, including that which led the person to suspect child abuse, requested by the child protective agency. (Penal Code 11167, subd. a)
- Note in writing on the written report the name of the person to whom the telephone report was made.
- 3. When a principal or other school official releases a minor pupil to a peace officer for the purpose of removing the minor from the school premises, the school official shall take immediate steps to notify the parent, guardian, or responsible relative of the minor regarding the release of the minor to the officer; and regarding the place to which the minor is reportedly being taken, except when a minor has been taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse, as defined in Section 11165 of the Penal Code, or pursuant to Section 305 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. In those cases, the school official shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number

of the minor's parent or guardian. The peace officer shall take immediate steps to notify the parent, guardian, or responsible relative of the minor is in custody and the place where he or she is being held. (Education Code 48906)

Before releasing a child who is suspected of being abused by a parent or guardian to a peace officer or agent, the school should obtain the officer's/agent's name, badge number and telephone number for the parents or guardians inquiring about their child's removal.

- 4. Within 36 hours, a written report must be filed. There is a special form developed by the Department of Justice that must be used. The form confirms the nature of the information provided in the telephone report. These forms are available in each school office, from law enforcement agencies and from child protective services.
- 5. When two or more persons are required to report and they jointly have knowledge of a suspected instance of child abuse, a telephone report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement. A single written report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. If the other member of the team later determines that the report was not made, it becomes the member's responsibility to make the report.
- 6. Report injuries factually and objectively.
- 7. Avoid allegations regarding a suspected offender, other than allegations that are a part of the minor's explanation.
- 8. Record minor's explanation of injuries as nearly verbatim as possible.

Whenever a school employee is notified by a parent or legal guardian that the parent or legal guardian wishes to file a child abuse report in which a school employee is suspected of abusing a child under the jurisdiction of the school, the school employee shall forward that information immediately to the principal of the school and/or refer the parent or legal guardian to the principal of the school.

Whenever the principal of a school is advised by a parent or legal guardian that a school employee is suspected of child abuse, the parent will be provided with the appropriate Suspected Child Abuse Reporting forms currently available to school personnel for reporting child abuse. Whenever possible, this information should be provided in the parent's primary language.

Confidentiality

The identity of a reporter is confidential and can be disclosed only between child protective agencies, to the District Attorney's Office or the County Counsel when the party waives confidentiality in a formal disciplinary procedure, or by a court order.

The legal mandate to report is not excused or barred by the professional privilege of confidentiality. Knowledge of child abuse acquired through



communication with a patient or a client, whether the patient or client is a victim or the abuser, must be reported.

INTERROGATION/RELEASE OF STUDENTS

It is the intent of the Board of Education that Principals or designees shall cooperate within the defined limits in the interrogation of students by law enforcement officers or the release of students to the custody of law enforcement officers.

I. Questioning of Students

In order to maintain a safe and secure school environment, school administrators and other staff are required to thoroughly investigate any allegations or suspicions of a violation of school rules, District policy or local/State law.

In the course of such investigation and, as allowed by law, school administrators and other staff are empowered to interview and otherwise question students regarding such allegations or suspicions. As used in this section, "other staff" shall include District office staff, campus security staff, teachers, and any other employee of the Jurupa Unified School District whose job duties may make it necessary and appropriate to be involved in such investigation. While school Resource Officers are not District employees (but rather an employee of the hiring law enforcement agency), they shall be afforded the same access to pupils and staff at their assigned school as a campus security staff.

While parental involvement or knowledge or school activities is a high priority in all aspects of school operations, prior parental notification or permission for interviewing or questioning a student is not required. Parents/guardians, however, should be notified and involved as soon as is reasonable and practicable.

On occasion, representatives of outside agencies, such as law enforcement officers, not assigned to the school as a school resource officer, or representatives from Child Protective Services, may request the opportunity to question a student regarding a school or non-school matter. When this occurs, the following procedures shall apply:

II. Questioning by a Peace Officer Other Than the School Resource Officer

- 1. Ascertain the officer's identity, official capacity, and the authority under which he/she acts, and the reason for such action.
- When necessary in the performance of duty, and upon proper idenfification, a peace officer may question a minor while such minor is in attendance at school.
- 3. Accommodate the process in a way that causes the least possible disruption to the school, gives the student appropriate privacy, and models exemplary cooperation with community law enforcement authorities by bringing the student to the office. A law enforcement officer shall

not be permitted to go the classroom to get a student unless the administrator or designee believes it necessary to do so.

- 3. Prior to the questioning of a pupil by a police officer, the principal/ designee shall make the following attempts to contact the parent(s): They shall call the parent(s) home phone number, and they shall call the parent(s) work phone number(s). Exceptions to this are in cases of suspected child abuse, when the peace officer requests the principal/ designee not to contact the parent/guardian, or when being questioned by the School Resource Officer.
- 4. The principal/designee shall be present during the interview between the peace officer and the pupil. Exceptions to this are in cases of suspected child abuse (see below) when the peace officer requests that the principal/designee not be present, or when being questioned by the School Resource Officer.
- 5. Except in cases of suspected child abuse, the principal/designee shall make an effort to notify the parent/guardian if the pupil is released to a peace officer for the purpose of removing the pupil from the school premises.
- 6. Write up a brief description of the incident and retain it appropriately.

III. Questioning by Representative of a Child Protective Agency

- 1. When a representative of a child protective agency deems it necessary, a suspected victim of child abuse may be interviewed during school hours on school premises concerning a report of suspected child abuse.
- 2. The child shall be afforded the option of being interviewed in private or selecting any adult who is a member of the school staff to be present at the interview. The principal need not be present unless selected by the child. A representative of the child protective agency shall inform the child of the right prior to the interview.
- 3. A school staff member selected by a child may decline the request to be present at the interview. If the staff person agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time when it does not involve an expense to the school. The staff member who has agreed to be present shall not participate in the interview process.
- 4. The staff member of the school present shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child. The member is subject to the confidentiality requirements of Penal Code Section 1117.3 (a).

- 5. If the minor is taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse, the principal/designee is required to provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the parent/guardian, and the notification of the parent/guardian is the responsibility of the peace officer or the representative of the child protective agency.
- IV. Questioning by Individuals Other Than Peace Officers, Child Protective Agency Representatives or School Employees

Questioning of students by individuals other than school employees, peace officers, or child protection agency representatives shall not be permitted except as expressly authorized by law or court order.

V. <u>Subpoenas</u>

Although subpoenas may legally be served at school, the Board believes that serving officials should be strongly urged to serve subpoenas at the home of the student whenever possible. In these situations, steps should be taken to ensure a minimum of embarrassment or loss of class time.

2000-2001 FIRST INTERIM FINANCIAL REPORT

We have received and reviewed your 2000-2001 First Interim Financial Report. The governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

Subsequent to the district's certification of the First Interim Report, the board approved a collective bargaining agreement with the certificated unit. Our analysis of the First Interim Financial Report included the updated multi-year financial projections reviewed by the board, which includes the cost of this agreement. The projections indicated expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$2,449,158 in the current fiscal year. The projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 2001-2002 and 2002-2003 fiscal years.

Our office recommends that the board continue to approve updated multi-year financial projections which reflect current and anticipated changes in the district's operational programs, debt service obligations and/or enrollment and attendance trends. This process will assist the board in providing for the long-range financial stability of the district. Please provide our office with a copy of the updated multi-year financial projections, including assumptions, with the submission of your Second Interim Financial Report.

NOTIFICATION OF OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR SCHOOLS OF CHOICE

Dear Parent/Guardian:

For the eighth year, the Jurupa Unified School District is implementing its open enrollment policy for schools within the district. Our sixteen elementary, three middle schools, and two comprehensive high schools offer a variety of programs designed to meet the needs of children and their families. There are situations which make it desirable for a family to select a school outside of the attendance area designated for their residence. As such, we offer this transfer opportunity through the Open Enrollment process.

Although we are experiencing considerable enrollment growth at most of our schools, once again this year parents may choose to have their children attend a school other than the school of residence, provided there is space. After reviewing data on projected enrollment for the new school year, the District staff determines how many transfer spaces are available at each school. You may find that some schools are unable to accommodate new students because of student growth; others have a few spaces, while others can accommodate a number of transfer requests. If there are more requests for transfers to a particular school than available spaces, district policy requires the use of a random selection procedure.


If you wish to have your child continue to attend the school serving your residence, you do not need to notify the school. Students currently attending a school on an open enrollment transfer need not complete a new application for the 2000-2001 school year unless they are moving up to the 7th or 9th grade, and the school of residence is different than the school which they wish to attend. If you wish your child to attend a school other than the one he/she is currently attending, please follow the instructions on page three.

Your involvement in your child's education is one of the most critical factors in his/her school success. I urge you to visit your child's school and talk to the staff; volunteer when you have time and join the PTA or other parent organization.

BEFORE YOU APPLY, PLEASE CONSIDER:

Parents who wish incoming kindergartners to attend the same transfer school as other siblings must apply for a transfer.

If you are anticipating a move, which will change your school of residence, and you wish your child to remain at the present school, you must apply for a transfer.

Secondary students may receive transfers during Open Enrollment, however, it is difficult to obtain a transfer in September because of schedules, and possible for credit loss. Students in athletics, are required to follow CIF eligibility guidelines.

Meeting Residency Requirements: (Education Code 48204)

Students shall have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance provided he or she:

- a. is living with a parent/guardian or caregiver within the district, or
- b. is an emancipated minor living in the district, or
- is living in a licensed foster home, family home, state hospital, or licensed children's institution with the district, or
- d. is granted an interdistrict transfer based on the parent/guardian being employed within the boundaries of the school district.

Program Options in the District:

A variety of programs are available in the Jurupa Unified School District. A description of each program is provided below. The directory pages that follow list which programs are offered at each school site.

Special Education - Programs and services are available at each school for students with exceptional needs. Enrollment in these classes will be based on Individualized Education Program placement and space availability.

School Improvement - This state-funded program supports and guides schoolwide improvements to help meet the needs of all students and is offered at all elementary and middle schools.

<u>Title I/EIA</u> - These state and federally-funded programs serve grades one through six students who need additional academic support in the areas of reading, language, or math and are available at specific school.

Structured English Immersion Program - English language learners (ELL) receive direct instruction and materials in a Structured English Immersion Program that includes content-based English Language Development (ELD). This English language development is given primary language support by authorized teachers and/or tutors.

<u>Gifted and Talented Education (GATE)</u> - This program serves eligible students in grades kindergarten through twelve at each school, who have been identified as gifted and talented.

<u>Title IV</u> - These federal funds assist each school (K-12) to provide prevention of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, early intervention, referral or rehabilitation as necessary.

Title VI - Federal funding provided to carry out effective approaches to class-size reduction in the early elementary grades.

<u>Class-Size Reduction</u> - This state program for grades K-3 allows all elementary school to reduce class size to 20 pupils per classroom.

<u>Instrumental Music/Elementary</u> - Three instrumental music teachers provide band instruction at each elementary school, each week.

<u>Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE)</u> - State funding for tobacco-specific student instruction, reinforcement activities, special events and cessation programs for students in grades 4-8.

10th Grade Counseling - This state program provides funds to assist in providing counseling and guidance services to high school students.

<u>Elementary Counseling Program</u> - Through the use of a model Student Assistance Program and life skills training, students and families receive an array of services at the school site. The program also links parents and students to other needed services in the community.

AsCent (middle schools) F.A.N. Club (elementary schools) - Staff from YMCA and Recreation and Parks Department work with school staff to plan and implement an after school program which includes clubs, homework assistance, tutoring, sports, speakers and field trips.

PROCEDURE FOR APPLYING FOR A TRANSFER:

- 1. Applications may be obtained in the office of any school in the District, and are due FEBRUARY 28, 2001.
- 2. Completed applications must be mailed to the Jurupa Unified School District, 4850 Pedley Road, Riverside, CA 92509 no later than FEBRUARY 28, 2001. Meeting the application deadline of February 28, 2001 is critical due to the rapid pace of growth in the District. If your application is received after the close of the open enrollment period, a decision on your application may be delayed until after school starts in the Fall, and your chances of receiving a transfer are greatly reduced.
- 3. Transfer and admission to a school of choice shall be granted if the space is available, and as established by the Jurupa Unified School District.
- 4. Parents will be notified by mail after the close of the enrollment period as to the status of their request.
- 5. Transportation to the school of choice is the responsibility of the parent.
