* d. Recognize "Black History Month" Activities

(Mr. Mendez)

Traditionally, February is designated as "Black History Month" throughout the United States in commemoration of the achievements and contributions of African-Americans to the growth of this nation. Schools within the Jurupa Unified School District have joined in celebrating the importance of African-American culture and contributions through a wide variety of programs and activities such as poster contests, art contests, school assemblies, library displays, classroom presentations, guest speakers, poetry recitals, evening programs, research papers, oral presentations, and lessons featuring African-American writers and the role and contributions of African-Americans to American society and history. * e. Adopt Resolution #02/35, Week of the School Administrator
The State of California, under Education Code 44015.1, encourages public recognition of the contribution that school administrators make to successful achievement. Additionally, they have declared the week of March 3rd through March 9 as "The Week of the School Administrator." Approximately 20,000 certificated and classified administrators work in California's public schools providing support for the educational programs at school sites. These include staff that develop and implement curriculum; select textbooks and instructional materials; recruit, train, and evaluate classified and certificated staff; manage and monitor budgets; implement school board policies and comply with federal, state, and local regulations and laws; plan and maintain school facilities; and provide transportation, nutrition, and social service programs to pupils and their families as well as many other duties. Included in these administrative teams are confidential employees who perform and assist in many critical functions.

Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #02/35, Week of the School Administrator, March 3-9, 2002.

* f. Adopt Resolution #02/36, Family Night - Commitment to Strong Families and Communities (Mr. Edmunds)

Research data shows that children raised in homes where the family is strong are much less likely to be involved in juvenile delinquency or victims of child abuse, less likely to be affected by the ills of poverty, more likely to have lower rates of teenage pregnancy, and more likely to have higher school grade point averages. Many community groups, social service organizations, and religious and political leaders encourage families, whatever their makeup, to spend at least one night a week together to teach family values, share family activities, reinforce academic learning, discuss accomplishments and goals, and simply spend quality time together. Following the lead of Riverside Mayor Ronald Loveridge who adopted a similar resolution in November, the Safe Schools Committee is requesting the Board's support of a family night by adopting Resolution #02/36. A copy of the proposed resolution is included in the supporting documents. This resolution encourages Jurupa students and their families to spend at least one night a week together in the above suggested activities in order to strengthen our schools and community.

Throughout the year, the Warehouse accumulates surplus items from throughout the District, which are old, obsolete, non-repairable or uneconomical to repair. A list of such items is included in the supporting documents. Education Code Section 17545 requires that items, whether one or more, be sold to the highest responsible bidder. Education Code Section 17546-a allows that items, whether one or more, which do not exceed a value of \$2,500 may be sold at private sale without advertising. Section 17456-b allows that any items having previously been offered for sale pursuant to Section 17545, for which no qualified bid was received, may be sold at private sale without advertising; and Section 17546-b allows that property of insufficient value to defray the cost of arranging for a sale may be either donated to a charitable organization or disposed of in the local public dump.

The list of items included in the supporting documents exceeds \$2,500 in value and Administration recommends that the Board approve Resolution #02/32, Authorization to Conduct Surplus Sale. Administration further recommends that the Board direct the Director of Purchasing to dispose of unsold items at private sale pursuant to Education Code Section 17546-a and that any item remaining after previous attempts at sale be donated to a recognized charitable organization or disposed of in the local dump pursuant to Education Code 17546-b.

7. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request for Rubidoux High School Teacher
Ms. Patricia Prosser, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Reno, Nevada on Tuesday, February 26 through Saturday, March 2, 2002. Mr. Donald Wade, teacher at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting approval to travel to Las Vegas on Friday, March 8 through Sunday, March 10, 2002 with nine students. The purpose of the trip is to provide students an opportunity to participate in the Winter Guard International Southwest Regional Competition. Travel will be by private vehicles, staff members and parent volunteers will provide supervision, and costs will be paid through the band booster club. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. *10. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from Food Services Department (Mr. Duchon) Ms. Robin Coutu, Computer Network Technician for Education Technology and Food Services, is requesting approval to travel to Logansville, Georgia on Sunday, March 10th through Friday, March 15th, 2002. Idyllwild with fourteen (14) students on Friday, May 10 through Sunday, May 12, 2002. The purpose of the trip is to provide students an opportunity to study and learn about the history of the area, various fauna and flora, and to develop interpersonal social responsibility. Instruction will be provided by teachers at Nueva Vista, travel will be by district vehicles, staff members will provide supervision, accommodations will be at Lawler Alpine Lodge (a County facility), and costs will be paid through donations. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Field Trip request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip Request submitted by Mr. Jeff Jacobs, Mr. Doug Torbert, Mr. Rich Torbert, and Mr. Terry Prosser to travel to Mt. Idyllwild with fourteen (14) students on Friday, May 10 through Sunday, May 12, 2002 to study and learn about the history of the area.

* B. 2001/02 Revised Budget and 2002/2003 Preliminary Budget Projection (Mr. Duchon)

2001/02 Revised Budget

On December 10, 2001, the Board approved the First Interim Financial Report, and as the Board may recall, at that time it was estimated that the impact to Jurupa's Budget, based on the Governor's proposed mid-year cuts, was a loss of \$1,046,723. On February 2, 2002, Governor Davis signed legislation (SB1) to cut more that \$2 billion from the 2001/02 fiscal year budget, including in excess of \$850 million from K-12 education. This legislation incorporates the reductions that the Governor proposed in November 2001 and amendments by both houses of the Legislature. This legislation did not include reductions in funding for Equalization, PERS Reduction, or the Categorical Mega-Item Block Grant for a total of (\$421,002). The Energy Grant funding was reduced from \$625,721 to an estimated \$125,144, resulting in a loss of \$500,577 in unrestricted funding for the District.

As a result of the proposed cuts, the Core Team analyzed district budgets in an effort to reduce expenditures. The Core Team identified and implemented \$1,415,593 in budget revisions to help offset reduced revenues and balance the budget. The following is a list of these revisions:

As a net result of decreased revenue and the budget revisions noted above, the Unrestricted Reserve increases \$915,016. Included in the supporting documents is a summary report that reflects these revisions.

2002/03 Preliminary Budget Projection

On January 9, 2002, Governor Davis released his budget proposal for the 2002/2003 fiscal year. The Governor's budget proposal includes a 2.15% COLA and growth funding for Revenue Limits and Special Education. Categorical programs will receive a proposed 2.15% increase for COLA plus growth. Class-size reduction for grades K-3 is continued with a COLA increase of 2.15%, for a funding level of \$911 per student.

The 2002/2003 Preliminary Budget Projection has been prepared using the 2001/2002 Budget as a base, then rolling the budget forward and modifying it using a set of assumptions concerning revenue (based on the Governor's Proposed Budget) and expenditures for next year. The preliminary budget projection and the assumptions used to generate it are included in the supporting documents.

The first step in developing the 2002/2003 Preliminary Budget Projection was to project a Beginning Balance, which essentially consists of the 2001/2002 Ending Balance carried over into the next fiscal year. The Ending Balance estimate is prepared by analyzing and revising current year revenues and expenditures. As a result of this analysis, the Unrestricted Beginning Balance for 2002/2003 is estimated to be \$4,951,037 and the estimated Restricted Beginning Balance is \$440,856.

Revenue has been estimated using a projected enrollment of 20,598 students, which represents an increase of 487 students (2.42%) over the current year. As noted above, the Revenue Limit funding includes a 2.15% COLA. Special Education and Class Size Reduction funding includes growth and a 2.15% COLA. All other sources of funding are assumed to remain the same as this year with the exception of the Energy Block Grant, which was one-time funding. Based on these assumptions, revenue for 2002/2003 is estimated to be \$133,022,242. Adding this figure to the Beginning Balance results in Total Resources of \$138,414,135.

Expenditures have been projected by applying standard budget allocation formulas for staffing and supplies to the projected enrollment. In addition, assumptions have been made concerning anticipated expenditure increases in the areas of payroll costs, personnel, utilities, and capital outlay. Using this method, the Estimated Expenditures for 2002/2003 are \$131,762,340. Comparing Total Resources to Total Expenditures, the District's **Unrestricted Reserve** is estimated to be \$6,651,795 or 5.04% of total expenditures. The District is required to carry a 3% Unrestricted Reserve or \$3,952,870. It is important to note that any negotiated salary increases for 2001/2002 are not known at this time, and therefore have not been included in the projection.

As is customary, the Business Office will monitor State finance trends, as well as District revenues and expenditures. This information will then be used to develop the 2002/2003 Budget that will be presented to the Board for adoption in June. <u>Information only.</u>

C. Adopt Resolution #02/34, Authorization to Donate Surplus Property to Jurupa (Mr. Edmunds)

Ms. Lucinda Sheppy, Administrator of Student and Community Services, is requesting the Board to adopt Resolution #02/34, Authorization to Donate Surplus District Property to Jurupa Community Partnership, Inc. At a previous Board meeting, the Board accepted a donation of approximately 300 computers from Carl Karcher Enterprises to be used at Mira Loma Middle School. After examining this equipment, it has been determined that some of the computers do not meet the District's technology requirements and are of little use to the school. Adoption of the Resolution would allow approximately 75 of the computers that do not meet the District's technology requirements and are no longer being used by school site staff, to be donated to the Jurupa Community Partnership, Inc. (JCP). The Partnership would use the computers in classes that teach students computer repair in the AsCent program and the after-school programs at the three middle schools. Students will learn computer repair skills, as well as utilizing them for homework, reports, research projects, and other activities. After completing the class, several of the computers will be given to students through random drawings as rewards for completing the program. The remaining computers would be used over the summer in the same capacity and given away at the end of the summer program. Many of the students in this program do not have access to computers at home. The AsCent program is funded through the After Schools Learning and Safe Neighborhood Partnership Program and the 21st Century Community Learning Center grants. JCP plans to give all computers that are repaired to students.

Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #02/34, Authorization to Donate Surplus District Property to Jurupa Community Partnership, Inc.

D. Approve Sale of Surplus Property to Southwest Transportation JPA (Mr. Duchon)

At the meeting of June 18, 2001, the Board declared a number of diesel school buses to be obsolete personal property of the District. That action was a result of the District receiving grants and financial support from the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) to replace the buses with units that burn CNG fuel. One of the requirements of the financial support is that the District certifies to SCAQMD that the buses will be removed from service within the boundaries of the SCAQMD.

The District has received a tentative offer, pending Board approval, from the Southwest Transportation JPA to purchase surplus school Bus #111 for \$42,000.00. The JPA is comprised of ten school districts in Fresno County. Education Code 17540 allows the school district to sell to other political sub-divisions any personal property or supplies without advertisement for or receipt of bids or compliance with any other provisions of the Education Code related to the sale or disposal of personal property. The Southwest Transportation JPA boundaries are outside of the boundaries of the SCAQMD, so the District is able to sell the buses without violating the terms of the agreement between SCAQMD and Jurupa Unified School District.

Administration recommends the Board approve the sale of diesel school Bus #111 to the Southwest Transportation JPA for \$42,000.00.

(Mr. Duchon)

At its meeting of January 7, 2002, the Board approved the purchase of five 84-Passenger CNG Fueled Buses on a 60-month lease purchase with Baystone Financial Group. Due to changes in the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) program, through which the buses were being purchased, the transaction approved by the Board on January 7, 2002 needs to be terminated.

The Transportation Department is now requesting the purchase of four of the Thomas 84-passenger CNG (Compressed Natural Gas) fueled buses for \$130,138.90 each (including tax and use fee) for a total of \$520,555.60. The SCAQMD is providing grants in the amount of \$50,000.00 per bus. Additionally, the District is trading in one used 1999 Collins/Ford 12-passenger bus, vehicle identification number 1FDSE37F2XHA17783, for a credit of \$24,000.00 bringing the total lease amount to \$296,555.60. This amount will be paid for out of the General Fund. By shopping the lease, the Purchasing Department was able to secure a better lease rate through Tatonka Capital Corporation with an annual payment of \$68,019.47. Additionally, the District will expend \$150,000 in Redevelopment funds to offset the cost of the CNG refueling station. This will fulfill the District's \$500,000 commitment to SCAQMD.

Administration recommends the Board rescind its January 7, 2002 approval for five 84-passenger CNG fueled buses on a 60-month lease purchase with Baystone Financial Group; and approve the lease purchase of four Thomas 84-passenger CNG buses on a 60-month lease with Tatonka Capital Corporation for an annual payment of \$68,019.47 each for a total cost of \$340,087.45, which includes interest.

F. <u>Approve Purchase of Six Thomas 84-Passenger CNG Fueled Buses</u> (Mr. Duchon)
The Transportation Department requests the purchase of six Thomas 84-passenger CNG fueled buses to add to the existing CNG fleet.

As part of the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) grant the District has received to replace its fleet of diesel buses, money has been earmarked to purchase six additional 84-passenger buses. The buses are 2002 model year; Thomas model 1415S that are powered by 250HP John Deere CNG engines and all the buses have Allison MD350 automatic transmissions. The buses will be purchased from the State of California General Services Contract through California Bus Sales of Fresno, California, and the <u>funding is from the grant received from South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD).</u> The cost of the buses is \$130,138.90 each (including tax and use fee) for a total cost of \$780,833.40.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #39580 for the purchase of six 84-passenger CNG fueled buses in the amount of \$780,833.40 (including tax and use fee).

G. Approve Purchase of 14 Dell Intel Celeron Computers for Rustic Lane Elementary

(Mr. Duchon)

Rustic Lane Elementary School requests the purchase of 14 Dell Optiplex GX50 Small Desktop Intel Celeron computers with a 17" monitor, 1.1/100 GHZ, 128 Cache, INT Sound, NIC and video. Funding for the equipment will come from the School Site Bonus Award and will be "piggyback" purchased on Los Angeles Unified School District Bid #70562. The cost per computer is \$903.68. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #39587 to Dell Computers in the amount of \$12,651.49 (including tax) for the purchase of 14 Dell Desktop Intel Celeron computers for Rustic Lane Elementary School.

H. Approve Revision of Site Grant Expenditure Plan for Rubidoux High Rubidoux High School is requesting to revise their Site Grant spending plan to reallocate the remaining funds (\$9,412) for the items listed below. The Rubidoux High School Site Council approved this expenditure revision.

This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed in June for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2002 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- ** 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-061 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2) and (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Spring Semester 2002. 



THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that if any property remains from the private sale, it will be disposed of at the discretion of the Director of Purchasing, either by subsequent private sale, donation to a charitable organization, or disposal at a local public dump pursuant to Education Code Section 17546.

A RÉSOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ADOPTING DETERMINATIONS AND FINDINGS PURSUANT TO PUBLIC RESOURCE CODE 21151.8 AND EDUCATION CODE 17213 ON FUTURE THIRD HIGH SCHOOL

WHERAS, per Public Resource Code 21151.8 and Education Code Section 17213, the Jurupa Unified School District consulted, in writing, with the South Coast Air Quality Management District, the California Department of Toxic Substances Control and Riverside County administering agencies to identify any facilities within ¼ mile of the proposed Third High School site; which might reasonably be anticipated to emit hazardous or acutely hazardous air emissions, or to handle hazardous or acutely hazardous materials, substances, or waste. The Board determines that this consultation indicated that there are no facilities reasonably anticipated to emit hazardous air emissions, or to handle hazardous or acutely hazardous materials, substances or wastes within ¼ mile of the proposed school site.

WHEREAS, based upon the above referenced consultation and a Phase I Environmental Assessment Report prepared for this site, and per PRC 21151.8 and Education Code 17213, the Board determines that the proposed school site:

- 1. is not a current or former hazardous waste disposal site or solid waste disposal site, and
- 2. is not identified as a hazardous substance release site identified by the State Department of Health Services in a current list adopted for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 (commencing with Section 25300) of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code; and
- does not contain one or more pipelines situated under or above ground which carry hazardous substances, acutely hazardous materials, or hazardous wastes, unless the pipeline is a natural gas line which is used only to supply natural gas to the school or neighborhood.

WHEREAS, based upon District consultation with the California Department of Fish and Game, and because the Third High School project 49 acres, and will comply with mitigation measures identified in the project's initial study, the Board finds that there is no evidence before the lead agency that the proposed project will have any potential for adverse effect on wildlife resources as defined in Section 711.2 of the California Fish and Game Code.



WHERAS, the documents or other materials that constitute the records of proceedings upon which this resolution approving the mitigated negative declaration is based on, is located at Jurupa Unified School District's Facilities Planning & Development Department, 4850 Pedley Road, Riverside, California, 92509.

- 21151.8. (a) No environmental impact report or negative declaration shall be approved for any project involving the purchase of a schoolsite or the construction of a new elementary or secondary school by a school district unless all of the following occur:
- (1) The environmental impact report or negative declaration includes information which is needed to determine if the property proposed to be purchased, or to be constructed upon, is any of the following:
- (A) The site of a current or former hazardous waste disposal site or solid waste disposal site and, if so, whether the wastes have been removed.
- (B) A hazardous substance release site identified by the State Department of Health Services in a current list adopted pursuant to Section 25356 for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 (commencing with Section 25300) of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (C) A site which contains one or more pipelines, situated underground or aboveground, which carries hazardous substances, acutely hazardous materials, or hazardous wastes, unless the pipeline is a natural gas line which is used only to supply natural gas to that school or neighborhood.
- (2) The lead agency preparing the environmental impact report or negative declaration has notified in writing and consulted with the administering agency in which the proposed schoolsite is located, and with any air pollution control district or air quality management district having jurisdiction in the area, to identify facilities within one-fourth of a mile of the proposed schoolsite which might reasonably be anticipated to emit hazardous emissions or handle hazardous or acutely hazardous materials, substances, or waste. The notification by the lead agency shall include a list of the locations for which information is sought.
- (3) The governing board of the school district makes one of the following written findings:
- (A) Consultation identified no such facilities specified in paragraph (2).
- (B) The facilities specified in paragraph (2) exist, but one of the following conditions applies:
- (i) The health risks from the facilities do not and will not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who would attend or be employed at the proposed school.
- (ii) Corrective measures required under an existing order by another agency having jurisdiction over the facilities will, before the school is occupied, result in the mitigation of all chronic or accidental hazardous air emissions to levels that do not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who would attend or be employed at the proposed school. If the governing board makes such a finding, it shall also make a subsequent finding, prior to occupancy of the school, that the emissions have been so mitigated.
- (4) Each administering agency, air pollution control district, or air quality management district receiving written notification from a lead agency to identify facilities pursuant to paragraph (2) shall provide the requested information and provide a written response to the lead agency within 30 days of receiving the notification. The environmental impact report or negative declaration shall be conclusively presumed to comply with this section as to the area of responsibility of any agency which does not respond within 30 days.



Public Resource Code 21151.8. (Continued)

- (b) If a lead agency has carried out the consultation required by paragraph (2) of subdivision (a), the environmental impact report or the negative declaration shall be conclusively presumed to comply with this section, notwithstanding any failure of the consultation to identify an existing facility specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a).
- (c) As used in this section and Section 21151.4, the following definitions shall apply:
- (1) "Hazardous substance" means any substance defined in Section 25316 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (2) "Acutely hazardous material" means any material defined pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 25532 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (3) "Hazardous waste" means any waste defined in Section 25117 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (4) "Hazardous waste disposal site" means any site defined in Section 25114 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (5) "Hazardous air emissions" means emissions into the ambient air of air contaminants which have been identified as a toxic air contaminant by the State Air Resources Board or by the air pollution control officer for the jurisdiction in which the project is located.

As determined by the air pollution control officer, hazardous air emissions also means emissions into the ambient air from any substances identified in subdivisions (a) to (f), inclusive, of Section 44321 of the Health and Safety Code.

- (6) "Administering agency" means an agency designated pursuant to Section 25502 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (7) "Handle" means handle as defined in Article 1 (commencing with Section 25500) of Chapter 6.95 of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code.



Education Code 17213.

- The governing board of a school district shall not approve a project involving the acquisition of a schoolsite by a school district unless all of the following occur:
- (a) The lead agency, as defined in Section 21067 of the Public Resources Code, determines that the property purchased or to be built upon is not any of the following:
- (1) The site of a current or former hazardous waste disposal site or solid waste disposal site unless, if the site was a former solid waste disposal site, the governing board of the school district concludes that the wastes have been removed.
- (2) A hazardous substance release site identified by the State Department of Health Services in a current list adopted pursuant to Section 25356 for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 (commencing with Section 25300) of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (3) A site which contains one or more pipelines, situated underground or aboveground, which carries hazardous substances, acutely hazardous materials, or hazardous wastes, unless the pipeline is a natural gas line which is used only to supply natural gas to that school or neighborhood.
- (b) The lead agency, as defined in Section 21067 of the Public Resources Code, preparing the environmental impact report or negative declaration has consulted with the administering agency in which the proposed schoolsite is located and with any air pollution control district or air quality management district having jurisdiction in the area, to identify facilities within one-fourth of a mile of the proposed schoolsite which might reasonably be anticipated to emit hazardous air emissions, or to handle hazardous or acutely hazardous materials, substances, or waste. The lead agency shall include a list of the locations for which information is sought.
 - (c) The governing board of the school district makes one of the
- following written findings: (1) Consultation identified none of the facilities specified in
- (2) The facilities specified in subdivision (b) exist, but one of subdivision (b). the following conditions applies:
- (A) The health risks from the facilities do not and will not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who would attend or be employed at the school.
- (B) The governing board finds that corrective measures required under an existing order by another jurisdiction which has jurisdiction over the facilities will, before the school is occupied, result in the mitigation of all chronic or accidental hazardous air emissions to levels that do not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who would attend or be employed at the proposed school. If the governing board makes this finding, the governing board shall also make a subsequent finding, prior to the occupancy of the school, that the emissions have been mitigated to these levels.
 - (d) As used in this section:
- (1) "Hazardous air emissions" means emissions into the ambient air of air contaminants which have been identified as a toxic air contaminant by the State Air Resources Board or by the air pollution control officer for the jurisdiction in which the project is located.

As determined by the air pollution control officer, hazardous air emissions also means emissions into the ambient air from any substance identified in subdivisions (a) to (f), inclusive, of Section 44321 of the Health and Safety Code.
