a. Recognize Peralta Elementary School as 2001/02 California Distinguished School Nominee (Mr. Edmunds)

On March 1, 2002, the California Department of Education announced that Peralta Elementary School was selected as a 2001-02 California Distinguished School Nominee after their program application was judged to be exemplary in both regional and state level competitions. Peralta Elementary School was one of six schools in Riverside County selected out of a total of 706 applications statewide to receive this recognition. State Department representatives visited the site on March 26, 2002 to validate information provided in their application. At the conclusion of all site visits, the 2002 Distinguished School award winners will be announced by State Superintendent Eastin in a statewide news release on approximately April 17, 2002. * B. <u>Approve Submittal of Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) "Intent to Participate"</u>
(Dr. Mason)

Mr. Paul Jensen, Principal, Adult/Alternative Education, is requesting approval to submit a Notice of Intent to Participate in the Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) program for the fiscal year 2002-2003. A copy of the application is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the submittal of a Notice of Intent to Participate in the Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) program during the fiscal year 2002-2003.

C. Approve Purchase of 19 Dell PowerEdge Computer Servers (Mr. Duchon) On November 19, 2001, the Governing Board approved and certified the Jurupa Unified School District Library Plan required by (AB 862) California Public School Library Act of 1998. The vision of the Jurupa Unified School District library program is to build dynamic and accessible library media centers that (a) teach information literacy, (b) enhance learning through technology, (c) build reading literacy, and (d) collaborate with teachers in the design of instruction. As the District continues to focus on the vision of the library program, items (a) and (b) become important elements because libraries are blending electronics/technology with print; for example, e-books, Web Collection, EBSCO Online Reference Database, Web-based encyclopedia, and so forth. In order to meet the technological demands of the libraries and the goals and objectives of the library plan, which includes making library resources available on the Internet, the Education Technology Department requests the purchase of 19 Dell PowerEdge 1400 SC with Pentium III, 1.13 GHZ, 512 K Cache Processor computer servers to upgrade the Follett system at the District's sixteen elementary and three middle schools. Funding for the equipment will come from the California Public School Library funds. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #40404 to Dell Computers in the amount of \$48,177.12 (including tax) for the purchase of 19 Dell PowerEdge 1400 SC with Pentium III Processor computer servers for the District's sixteen elementary schools and three middle schools.

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

REVOKE - SUSPENDED EXPULSION:

** 1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the May 21, 2001, Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #01-104 and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. Pupil violated Education Code Sections 48900 (f) and (k). The pupil will be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 17, 2002.

EXPULSIONS:

- ** 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-064 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (a2), (k) and (.4) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- ** 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-085 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002. There are 88 of these employees and they make up approximately 4.2% of the district workforce.

Administration recommends that the salary schedules for Management Confidential, Management Classified, and Management Administrative Employees be increased by two percent (2%) effective January 30, 2002.

As a result of these adjustments, the Unrestricted Reserve is now projected to be \$4,968,152 or 3.73% of total expenditures. He noted that the 2002/03 Budget projection is based on a 1.8% COLA, an increase of 485 students, and some additional teaching positions. He noted that salary increases are not included in the projections. In addition, although the projections are tentative in nature, they should be used as a tool for assessing the general financial condition of the District over the next two fiscal years. MR.
