# \* a. Recognize 2001-2002 Inland Science Fair Winners

The twentieth annual Inland Science and Engineering Fair was held at the National Orange Show Fair Grounds, San Bernardino during April 23 and 24, 2002. Twenty-three students from grades 4-12 represented the Jurupa Unified School District. # b. Recognize Academy Grant Awards for Jurupa Valley High School

Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High School (Dr. Mason) Ms. Diane Parker, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Ceres, California on Saturday, June 1 through Monday, June 3, 2002 with approximately fifteen (15) students in the FFA program. The purpose of the trip is to provide students with an opportunity to learn about the subsistence agriculture practiced in developing countries. Students will volunteer to participate in the Heifer Project International by working on a farm for two days. Staff members and parent volunteers will provide supervision; travel will be by district vehicles; costs will be paid through the FFA account; and accommodations will be provided at the Ceres Center. \* 9. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from Pacific Avenue Elementary School (Dr. Mason)

Ms. Lisa Martinez and Ms. Myra Esteban, teachers at Pacific Avenue, are requesting approval to travel to Edinburgh, Scotland to attend the 19<sup>th</sup> World Congress on Reading from July 27 through August 2, 2002. The purpose of the trip is to obtain ideas on enhancing the instructional program. Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP) funds will be used to cover the cost of registration, and Ms. Martinez and Ms. Esteban will pay for all other associated expenses. Travel will be by air flight, accommodations and meals will be at the Edinburgh University Hall of Residence, and the conference will be conducted at the Concourse of the Appleton Tower, University of Edinburgh. A copy of the Travel Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Out-of-State Travel Request from Ms. Lisa Martinez and Ms. Myra Esteban, teachers at Pacific Avenue Elementary School, to travel to Edinburgh, Scotland to attend the 19<sup>th</sup> World Congress on Reading.

\* B. Adopt Resolution Nos. 02/58 and 02/59, Issuance of Bonds - Community Facilities

(Mr. Duchon)

The School District has recently completed the proceedings to form Community Facilities District No. 3 (CFD #3) for the purpose of funding the construction and acquisition of public K-12 school facilities of benefit to the property within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District. In connection with the formation of the Community Facilities District, some additional parcels of real property were included within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District; those properties should be removed from the boundaries of the Community Facilities District, and the lien of the special taxes should be released from the additional property. Resolution #02/58 approves the amended boundary map and amendment to the notice of special tax lien to release the additional property from the Community Facilities District.

Resolution #02/59 approves the issuance of special tax bonds for the purpose of funding school facilities for the School District. In addition, the resolution approves the necessary documents to issue the special tax bonds, which include: a Fiscal Agent Agreement; a Bond Purchase Agreement; a Continuing Disclosure Agreement; and an Official Statement to be used by the underwriter in connection with the sale of the special tax bonds. Further, the resolution makes additional findings with respect to the security for the Bonds and the compliance with the Board's policy on land secured financings. An attorney from the District's legal counsel of Best, Best & Krieger will be present to address any questions concerning the Resolutions.

In order to proceed with the financing, <u>Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 02/58 Approving and Authorizing the Recording of a Map Amending the Boundaries of Community Facilities District No. 3; and Resolution No. 02/59 Authorizing the Issuance of Special Tax Bonds for Community Facilities District No. 3 of the Jurupa Unified School District in an Aggregate Principal Amount Not to Exceed \$2,200,000 and Approving Certain Documents and Taking Certain Other Actions in Connection Therewith.</u>

# C. Adopt Resolution Nos. 02/60 and 02/61, Issuance of Bonds of Community Facilities District No. 1, Improvement Area Nos. 1 and 2 (Mr. Duchon)

In 1990, the School District issued special tax bonds for Community Facilities District No. 1. The bonds were issued as \$2,500,000 Community Facilities District No. 1 of Jurupa Unified School District Improvement Area No. 1, Special Tax Bonds, 1990 Series A, and \$4,440,000 Community Facilities District No. 1 of Jurupa Unified School District, Improvement Area No. 2, Special Tax Bonds, 1990, Series A (together, the "1990 Bonds"). The proceeds of the 1990 Bonds funded the construction of public school facilities of the School District and funded public improvements owned and maintained by the Rubidoux Community Services District.

Presented for consideration are two resolutions that approve the issuance of new bonds to refinance the 1990 Bonds and provide some new money for the purpose of funding additional school facilities. The issuance of new bonds represents a savings in debt service and provides a slight reduction in special taxes levied on property within Community Facilities District No. 1. The resolutions provide approval for the preparation and delivery of an official statement to be used in connection with the offering of the new bonds. In addition, the resolutions approve all of the necessary legal documents relating to the issuance of the Bonds. Further, they make additional findings with respect to the security for the Bonds and the compliance with the Board's policy on land secured financings. An attorney from the District's legal counsel of Best, Best & Krieger will be present to address any questions concerning the two resolutions.

In order to proceed with the financing, <u>Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution Nos. 02/60 and 02/61 Authorizing the Issuance of Special Tax Bonds and Approving Certain Documents and Taking Certain Other Actions in Connection Therewith, for Community Facilities District No. 1, Improvement Area Nos. 1 and 2.</u>

# D. Approve Cooperative Agreement with Riverside County for Joint Use of Facilities Located at the Future Rubidoux Public Library (Mr. Duchon)

The Riverside Economic Development Agency (EDA) in conjunction with the Riverside County Library System is currently securing property and developing plans to construct a 36,000 square foot Public Library and Administration Facility on a six-acre parcel between Mission Boulevard and Riverview Road adjacent to West Riverside Elementary School. This is a Rubidoux Revitalization District project. Funds will be secured through a Library Bond Act (Prop 14) grant. To fulfill one of the grant requirements, the Riverside County Library System is required to have a cooperative agreement in place with a local school district.

The cooperative agreement requires the District to design and implement a Family Literacy Program to enhance student performance by training parents to be the primary teacher for their children. An Ad Hoc Rubidoux Committee has been working on this project. The members include: Mr. Elliott Duchon, Dr. DeWayne Mason, Ms. Teri Moreno, Ms. Sonia Porter, Ms. Norie Garavito, Mr. Paul Jensen, and Mr. Greg Bowers. Education Services staff members have drafted the initial Family Literacy Program.

# D. Approve Cooperative Agreement with Riverside County for Joint Use of Facilities Located at the Future Rubidoux Public Library (Continued) (Mr. Duchon)

The program was reviewed and revised several times before being unanimously approved by the Committee. In addition, a Family Literacy Survey was developed by the Committee and administered by Ms. Porter and Mr. Jensen. The survey supports a family literacy program and will enhance the performance of the children as well as the relationship with the parents. Mr. Bowers continues to represent the District at the coordination meetings with Riverside County Library System, EDA, Krosh/Broeske (Architect), Library System & Services (Library Consultant), and Community Works (Landscape Architect).

The District's only financial commitment is to staff the program. One Family Literacy Specialist will be hired and paid for from Title I Categorical Funds to administer the program. The District will have a twenty-year commitment to this program. The Riverside County Librarian, Gary Christmas, along with Bill Brown from the Economic Development Agency, will provide a brief presentation on the project.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the District to enter into a Cooperative Agreement with the County of Riverside for a Joint Use of Facilities on the future Rubidoux Public Library.

# \* E. Approve Instructional Materials for Review

(Dr. Mason)

The following instructional materials were presented to the Instructional Council at its regular meeting on May 13, 2002 for review, and approved. The supporting documents contain information regarding the cost of the instructional materials, other instructional materials considered by the selection committees, and information regarding the rationale for selection. These instructional materials will be available for public review at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon public libraries for the time period specified in Board Policy 6200. After the thirteen-day review period, the books will be presented to the Board for approval. The following textbooks have been reviewed and recommended for submittal by the Instructional Council:

It is recommended that the Board approve for adoption the following instructional materials: Focus on Life Science; Focus on Physical Science; Exploring Visual Design: The Elements and Principles; Allez, Viens! Level I; En Español II; En Español III.

# G. Approve Expenditure of School Site Performance Bonus Award Funds for Indian Hills [Dr. Mason]

As the Board will recall, Indian Hills Elementary School was allocated \$26,449.72 through the Governor's School Site Performance Bonus Award. Ms. Jackie Monestero, Principal, is requesting approval for the expenditure of these funds (\$26,449.72) to be used for computers, printers, printer cables, carts, and software. The Indian Hills Elementary School Site Council at its regular meeting on April 4, 2002 approved this expenditure. It is recommended that the Board approve the request from Ms. Jackie Monestero, Principal, Indian Hills Elementary School, to spend an amount not to exceed \$26,449.72 of the Governor's School Site Performance Bonus Award funds on technology equipment.

# H. Approve Expenditure of School Site Performance Bonus Award Funds for Peralta Elementary School (Dr. Mason)

Ina Arbuckle Elementary School requests the purchase of 12 Dell Optiplex GX 240 Desktop Computers, with a Pentium 4 Processor, 1/6 GHz, and 256K cache, for Ina Arbuckle Elementary School. The purchase of these computers will be paid for with Nell Soto (Parent Involvement Grant) funds and will be "piggyback" purchased on the Los Angeles Unified School District Bid #70562. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #41200 in the amount of \$12,391.85 to Dell Computer for the purchase of 12 Dell Optiplex GX 240 Desktop Computers.

L. <u>Approve Purchase of Scanning and Recording Assessment Upgrades for the IDMS System</u>

(Mr. Duchon)

The Director of Research and Categorical Projects requests the purchase of scanning and recording upgrades for the Instructional Database Management System (IDMS). The software will be used in conjunction with the Pulliam IDMS software, which provides an analysis of test scores for students districtwide. **The purchase of this equipment will be paid for with Mega-Item funds**. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval. Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #41204 in the amount of \$25,587.35 (including tax) to Cardiff Software, Inc. for the purchase of scanning and recording upgrades for the Categorical Projects IDMS Program.

M. Approve Purchase of 21 Dell Optiplex GX 240 Desktop Computers for 16 Elementary Schools, 3 Middle Schools, and Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High Schools (Mr. Duchon) On November 19, 2001, the Governing Board approved and certified the Jurupa Unified School District Library Plan required by (AB862) California Public School Library Act of 1998. The vision of the Jurupa Unified School District library program is to build dynamic and accessible library media centers that (a) teach information literacy, (b) enhance learning through technology, (c) build reading literacy, and (d) collaborate with teachers in the design of instruction. As the district continues to focus on the library program, items (a) and (b) become important elements because libraries are blending electronics/technology with print; for example, e-books, Web Collection, EBSCO Online Reference Database, Web-based encyclopedia, and so forth. In order to meet the technological demands on the libraries and the goals and objectives of the library plan, the Education Technology Department requests approval to purchase 21 Dell Optiplex GX 240 small desktop computers, with a Pentium 4 Processor, 1.6 GHz, and 256K Cache, to upgrade the Media Center Clerks' and Library Technicians' work stations at the District's 16 elementary, 3 middle, and 2 high schools. The purchase of these computers will be paid for with California Public School Library Act (K-12) funds, and will be "piggyback" purchased on the Los Angeles Unified School District Bid #70562. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #41208 in the amount of \$26,715.84 to Dell Computers for the purchase of 21 Dell Optiplex GX 240 Desktop Computers for 16 elementary schools, 3 middle, and 2 high schools.

N. Approve Purchase of Seven In Focus LP500 Projectors and Seven Ceiling Mounts for Mission Middle School (Mr. Duchon)

Mission Middle School requests the purchase of seven In Focus LP500 Projectors and seven Ceiling Mounts. The purchase of this equipment will be paid for from Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP) funds, and will be purchased on CMAS Contract 3-99-70-0793B. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #41214 in the amount of \$18,244.48 to CDW-G for the purchase of seven In-Focus Projectors and seven Ceiling Mounts for Mission Middle School.

O. Approve Resolution No. 02/62, Approving and Electing to be Subject to the Public Employee's Medical and Hospital Care Act for Less than Half Time Employees (Non-PERS) Designating the Employer's Contribution at the Same Amount as Full Time Employees

[Mr. Duchon]
In order for Part Time (Non-PERS) staff that work less that four hours a day to participate in CalPERS, the Board must pass a resolution. Administration recommends that the Board approve Resolution No. 02/62, Approving and Electing to be Subject to the Public Employee's Medical and Hospital Care Act for Less than Half Time Employees (Non-PERS) Designating the Employer's Contribution at the Same Amount as Full Time Employees.

P. Approve Resolutions No. 02/63, 02/64, 02/65, 02/66, 02/67, 02/68, 02/69, Approving and Electing to Cease to be Subject to the Public Employee's Medical and Hospital Care Act (Mr. Duchon)

The CalPERS health insurance renewal rates have increased an average of 25% for next year. The District has compared benefits and rates for CalPERS and the Riverside County Employer/Employee Partnership for Benefits (REEP), determined that REEP's benefits are comparable, and the rates are lower than CalPERS. To withdraw from CalPERS effective January 1, 2003 the Board must approve resolutions and submit them to CalPERS by June 1, 2002. The groups represented by these resolutions include Confidential/Management, the Board of Trustees, and CSEA, Chapter #392.

Administration recommends that the Board approve Resolutions No. 02/63, 02/64, 02/65, 02/66, 02/67, 02/68 and 02/69, Approving and Electing to Cease to be Subject to the Public Employee's Medical and Hospital Care Act.

# Q. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

\* 1. Approve Resolution No. 02/70, Establish Building Fund 21 to Record the Financial Transactions for 2001 Measure "C" Bond Proceeds
In November 2001 the Measure "C" Bond was approved in the amount of \$58,000,000. The first issuance of Measure "C", Series 2002, General Obligation (G.O.) Bonds in the amount of \$30,800,000 was completed on May 1, 2002. Proceeds from the sale of bonds (E.C. 17462) must be accounted for separately in a Building Fund. Board approval is requested for the establishment of the Building Fund to record the financial transactions for Measure "C", Series 2002, proceeds.

Administration recommends that the Board approve Resolution No. 02/70, Establishing Building Fund 21 to Record the Financial Transactions for Measure "C" Bond Proceeds.

\* 2. Review and Approve Submittal of State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan (Mr. Duchon) The State Deferred Maintenance Program provides State-matching funds to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, floor systems, etc. The District has participated in the State Deferred Maintenance Program for many years. Legislation (Education Code Section I7584.1) requires that the Governing Board review and discuss proposals and plans for expenditure of funds for the deferred maintenance of school district facilities at a regularly scheduled public hearing.

)

\* 2. Review and Approve Submittal of State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan (Mr. Duchon) (Continued)

The Deferred Maintenance Five Year Plan is now due, and it is included in the supporting documents. This plan provides a listing of eligible items of major repair or replacement to be considered by the district over a five-year period. The State Allocation Board does not fund the projects from the five-year plan but rather approves the plan as being eligible for the district to expend funds from its "District Deferred Maintenance Fund." Projects listed on the five-year plan are limited to those school facility components that have approached or exceeded their normal life expectancy. This plan may remain in effect for the full five years, or the district may amend its plan once per fiscal year. Actual work completed will be based on the amount of funding available from the State combined with the District's matching contribution.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the submittal of the State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan.

3. Approve a Piggyback Contract Agreement with National Carport Industries, Inc. for Seven Lunch Shelters (Mr. Bowers)

To complete the Lunch Shelter Project scheduled for completion in September of 2002, the District intends to enter into a piggyback contract agreement with National Carport Industries, Inc., for seven lunch shelters. One lunch shelter will be installed at each of the following schools: Glen Avon, Ina Arbuckle, Mission Bell, Rustic Lane, Stone Avenue, and Van Buren Elementary Schools, and Jurupa Valley High School. This project is in conformance with the Measure "C" Implementation Program and Master Plan. District staff, with the assistance of the architect Perkins & Will, are currently developing design drawings and specifications.

The District has received a proposal for seven lunch shelters in the amount of \$103,950.00. The piggyback agreement intended for use is currently between Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District and National Carport Industries, Inc. This is a Measure "C" Phase I project scheduled for the summer of 2002, and **Measure "C" Project Funds will be used to pay for the lunch shelters.** 

Administration recommends the Board authorize Administration to enter into a piggyback contract agreement with National Carport Industries, Inc., to purchase and install a total of seven lunch shelters at the schools listed above for a total cost of \$103,950.00.

4. Review and Act on Other Timely School Facility Matters

Due to frequent changes taking place in facility improvement programs, items that require Board discussion or action may arise between agenda preparation and meeting times. Administration may provide such items as verbal information reports or recommendations for action.

## R. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

## **EXPULSIONS:**

- \*\* 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-120 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended for the Fall Semester 2002 and the pupil be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Spring Semester 2002 and the Steps Summer School Program. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement, for the Fall Semester 2002 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- \*\* 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-122 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- \*\* 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-123 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (b), (k) and 48915 (a2) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- \*\* 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-125 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- \*\* 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-126 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.

- \*\* 6. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-128 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002; and that the pupil be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of the expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.
- \*\* 7. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #02-129 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k) for the Spring Semester 2002 and Fall Semester 2002. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended for the Fall Semester 2002 and the pupil be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Spring Semester 2002. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement, at Jurupa Valley High School, for the Fall Semester 2002 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 21, 2003.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

## S. Approve Personnel Matters

1. Approve Personnel Report #20

(Ms. French)

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #20 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

\* 2. Adopt Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators.

(Ms. French)

Each year, the Board must adopt a "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" as a prerequisite to the issuance of emergency teaching permits for the District. This declaration is one of the new state requirements of the Commission on Teacher Credentialing governing the issuance of emergency permits and the orientation, guidance, and training of emergency permit holders. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits, particularly to fill partial assignments, specialized areas of instruction such as math and science, or areas of statewide shortage such as bilingual education and special education. With the addition of the K-3 class size reduction program, it is also necessary to employ some emergency permit teachers for the District. The information shown in the supporting documents accounts for all these needs for next school year. It is recommended that the Board adopt the "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" for 2002-2003.

## S. <u>Approve Personnel Matters</u> (Continued)

## 3. Approve CBEST Waiver for Day-to-Day Substitute Teachers

(Ms. French)

Because of the impact that the Class Size Reduction Program has had on district substitute pools throughout California, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing is allowing districts to temporarily waive the CBEST exam requirement for day-to-day (2002-2003) substitute teachers. The district-wide waiver would be for a maximum of one year. Substitute teachers would have one calendar year to take and pass CBEST, rather than having to pass prior to beginning work. The Commission has developed and it is recommended that the following statement be submitted to the Board for approval.

It is recommended that the Board declare that teachers were hired from the District substitute pool to implement class size reduction and, as a consequence of this action, the District is unable to recruit substitutes who have had an opportunity to take and pass the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST). The district anticipates employing approximately fifty substitutes on various term CBEST waivers.

## 4. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request

(Ms. French)

State credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, Bilingual Education, Mathematics or Science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a temporary vacancy for a High School Math Teacher at Rubidoux High School. The person being recommended is Mr. Joe Maggio. Mr. Maggio received his bachelor's degree from CSU Los Angeles in 1969 as well as his MBA in 1977 from Loyola Marymount University; he is a Substitute Teacher with the Jurupa Unified School District, as well as a Community College Instructor. Mr. Maggio began substituting in a math position since April that has had much turnover during this school year and has performed quite well in a difficult situation. Recruitment efforts have not identified a stronger candidate.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Maggio be approved for employment through the end of this school year as a Substitute Teacher under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.



#### RESOLUTION NO. 02/59

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL TAX BONDS FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 3 OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,200,000 AND APPROVING CERTAIN DOCUMENTS AND TAKING CERTAIN OTHER ACTIONS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District (the ("School District") has heretofore undertaken proceedings and declared the necessity to issue bonds on behalf of the Community Facilities District No. 3 of the Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District") pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, being Chapter 2.5, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 02/48 adopted by the Board of Education on April 15, 2002, the questions of whether bonds should be issued to finance the costs of construction and acquisition of certain public facilities and a special tax levy in order to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds were submitted to the qualified electors within the Community Facilities District and were approved by a two-thirds majority of the qualified electors at an election held on April 15, 2002; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education by its Resolution No. 02/49 adopted on April 15, 2002, declared that the propositions authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levy of special taxes, presented to the qualified electors of the Community Facilities District on April 15, 2002, received a two-thirds majority vote of the qualified electors voting at said election and each carried, and, accordingly, the Community Facilities District is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as determined by the Board of Education, bonds for the benefit of the Community Facilities District and to take the necessary steps to levy the special tax; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education is now considering the issuance of Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$2,200,000 designated as the "Community Facilities District No. 3 of the Jurupa Unified School District Special Tax Bonds, 2002 Series A (the "Bonds") as permitted by the Act and Resolution No. 02/46; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has determined in accordance with Section 53360.4 of the California Government Code that a negotiated sale of the Bonds with Stone & Youngberg LLC (the "Underwriter") in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Purchase Contract (the "Purchase Contract") approved as to the form by the Board of Education will result in a lower overall cost to the Community Facilities District than a public sale; and

(B)

WHEREAS, the School District on behalf of the Community Facilities District, has caused to be prepared a Preliminary Official Statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") containing certain information with respect to the Community Facilities District.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District resolves as follows:

Section 1. <u>Findings</u>. The Board of Education finds as follows: (1) each of the above recitals is true and correct; (2) that the sale of the Bonds at a private sale will result in a lower overall cost to the Community Facilities District; and (3) based upon the appraisal report for the land within the Community Facilities District prepared by Bruce W. Hull & Associates, Inc. hereby finds and determines that:

- (a) the Bonds do not present any unusual credit risk due to the provisions governing the Fiscal Agent Agreement defined herein;
- (b) The value of the real property subject to the Special Tax and the improvements thereon is more than three times the aggregate principal amount of Bonds; and
- (c) the Bond issue should proceed for the following public policy reasons: (i) orderly development of the land within the Community Facilities District; and (ii) there are significant public benefits contained within the project.

Section 2. Approval of Issuance of Bonds and Fiscal Agent Agreement. The issuance of the Bonds in a principal amount of not to exceed \$5,000,000 is hereby authorized pursuant to the Act. The Bonds shall mature on the dates, pay interest at the rates and shall be substantially in the form set forth in the Fiscal Agent Agreement presented at this meeting. All other provisions of the Bonds shall be governed by the terms and conditions set forth in such Fiscal Agent Agreement, which form of agreement is hereby approved and the Fiscal Agent Agreement, and the President of this Board of Education, the Superintendent or the Deputy Superintendent Business & Governmental Relations are authorized to execute and deliver said Fiscal Agent Agreement for and in the name of the School District on behalf of the Community Facilities District with such additions thereto and changes therein as are recommended or approved by Bond Counsel to the Community Facilities District and the officers executing the same, with such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery of the Fiscal Agent Agreement.

Section 3. <u>Execution of Bonds</u>. The Bonds shall be executed on behalf of the Community Facilities District by the manual or facsimile signature of the President or the Superintendent and attested with the manual or facsimile signature of the Secretary of the Board of Education.

Section 4. <u>Appointing of Fiscal Agent</u>. U.S. Bank, N.A. is hereby appointed to act as Fiscal Agent for the Bonds and to assume the duties and obligations of Fiscal Agent under the Fiscal Agent Agreement. Payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be made at the principal offices of the Fiscal Agent.

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Section 5. Approval of Purchase Contract. The form of Purchase Contract presented at this meeting and the sale of the Bonds pursuant thereto upon the terms and conditions set forth therein is hereby approved and, subject to the provisions of Section 6 hereof, the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent Business Services and Governmental Relations is authorized to execute and deliver the Purchase Contract in the name of and on behalf of the Community Facilities District and the School District in said form with such changes therein as the officer executing the same may approve and such matters as are authorized by Section 6 hereof, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

Section 6. Superintendent Authorized to Establish Final Terms of the Sale of the Bonds. The Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent Business Services and Governmental Relations, upon such advice of staff as they may deem necessary, is hereby authorized and directed to act on behalf of the School District to establish and determine (i) the final principal amount of the Bonds, which amount shall not exceed \$2,200,000 including Bonds which may be issued at an original issue discount, (ii) the final amounts of the various maturities and sinking fund payments of the Bonds the final maturity of such Bonds to be no later than September 1, 2033, (iii) the final interest rate on the Bonds, which rate shall not exceed seven percent (7%) per annum for any maturity of the Bonds, and (iv) the Underwriter's discount for the purchase of the Bonds, which shall not exceed three percent (3%) of the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds including any original issue discount.

Section 7. Approval of Preliminary Official Statement; Preparation of Final Official Statement. The Preliminary Official Statement is approved, and the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent Business Services and Governmental Relations, is authorized to consent to and assist in the preparation of such modifications thereto as may be specified by Disclosure Counsel. WHEREAS, Government Code Section 22850.3 provides that a contracting agency may elect upon proper application to participate under the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 22754 (g) defines any Special District as a contracting agency; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 22857 provides that a contracting agency may fix the amount of the employer's contribution for retired employees and survivors at different amounts provided that the monthly contribution for retired employees and survivors shall be annually increased by an amount not less than 5 percent of the monthly contribution for employees, until such time as the amounts are equal; and

WHEREAS, a Special District is hereby defined as a nonprofit, self-governed public agency within the State of California, and comprised solely of public employees performing a governmental rather than proprietary function; and

WHEREAS, <u>Jurupa Unified School District</u>, hereinafter referred to as Special District is an entity meeting the above definition; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 22878.2 allows a school or public agency to obtain health coverage for less than half time employees; and

WHEREAS, the Special District desires to obtain for less than half time employees who are members of <u>California School Employees Association Chapter 392</u> and who are active and retired employees and survivors of the agency, the benefit of the Act and to accept the liabilities and obligations of an employer under the Act and Regulations; now, therefore, be it

### INSTRUCTION TO THE EMPLOYER

The Statement of Need must be filed at the school district office each school year when employing holders of Emergency 30-Day Substitute Permits. The employing agency will complete a single Statement of Need form (on reverse) and retain the form at the school districts office.

The form must be completed annually. It indicates that either no credentialed person is available or that those available are not deemed qualified for substitute teaching and details of the circumstances that necessitate the use of emergency permit holders rather than fully credentialed teachers.

The Statement of Need form does not list a specific employee or their position. It does not need to be co-signed by the County Superintendent of Schools, but only signed by the Superintendent of the Employing School District.

A copy of the form does not need to be submitted to the county or the Commission with each Emergency 30-Day Substitute Teaching Permit application. However, the County Superintendent of Schools whose responsibilities include areas such as district payroll or district substitute placement, may request a copy of the district's Statement of Need form to accurately fulfill these duties.

County Superintendent of Schools Offices employing holders of the Emergency 30-Day Substitute Teaching Permit are also required to annually file, at their office, a completed Statement of Need form. The County Superintendent of Schools will sign the form.

The Commission is not requiring that the school boards approve the Statement of Need. Each individual school district may establish its own policy regarding this.
