#### 1. Recognition

\* a. Recognize Receipt of Grant Award for Jurupa Valley High School's *Institute of Agribusiness, Communications, and Technology* (Mr. Mendez)

The district was recently notified that a one-time augmentation in the amount of \$7,500 had been awarded to Jurupa Valley High School's *Institute of Agribusiness, Communications, and Technology*. This award brings the grant total to \$107,500. This augmentation will be used to expand or enhance professional development activities related to the Specialized Secondary Program (SSP). \* 5. Approve Out-Of-State Travel Request from Rubidoux High School Teacher (Mr. Mendez) Ms. Patricia Prosser, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Dallas, Texas on Friday, July 12 through Monday, July 15, 2002. The purpose of the trip is to attend the 2002 National Renaissance Conference. Workshops will be offered to assist staff members in obtaining information to develop a connection between academic achievement, career awareness, and career planning to allow students to understand the relevance of their educational experience. Lodging for Ms. Prosser will be at the conference hotel, the Wyndham Anatole; travel will be by air flight; and all costs will be paid through II/USP funds. A copy of the travel request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Out-Of-State Travel Request from Ms. Patricia Prosser to attend the 2002 National Renaissance Conference in Dallas, Texas on Friday, July 12 through Monday, July 15, 2002.

Ms. Jenelle Benson and Mr. Paul Wakefield, teachers at Jurupa Valley High School, are requesting approval to travel to the Florida Keys with six students on Saturday, August 17 through Saturday, August 24, 2002. The purpose of the trip is to participate in a Coral Reef Survey and Research project to determine the amount of healthy coral left at Looe's Key National Reef Preserve. Students will travel by American Airlines; lodging will be at the Looe's Keys Resort; costs will be paid through fundraisers and an environmental award; and supervision will be by staff members. Administration has been assured that no eligible student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Ms. Jenelle Benson and Mr. Paul Wakefield to travel to the Florida Keys with six students to participate in the Coral Reef Survey and Research project on Saturday, August 17 through Saturday, August 24, 2002.

B. Approve at First Informational Reading Revised Board Policy 6161, High School Graduation Requirements, Revised Board Policy 6162, Graduation Requirements for Continuation High School, and New Board Regulation 5123, High School Grade-Level Promotion

(Mr. Edmunds)

Higher State expectations for student performance and State accountability systems such as the Academic Performance Index (API) and California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) have led administration to reconsider our high school promotion policies and our district requirements for graduation. During several discussions this year in various meetings such as the Alternative Education Committee, Principals, Core Team, and Education Services Committee, administrators have discussed ways to raise secondary student achievement. While our discussions are ongoing and will likely result in additional future recommendations for policy and program changes, this evening we recommend two changes that we think will immediately facilitate improved student achievement as measured by our API and CAHSEE results: (1) a High School Grade-Level Promotion Regulation and (2) a change in our graduation requirements from 230 credits and 30 credits in mathematics to 220 credits and 20 credits in mathematics.

Reducing Math Requirement to 20 Credits and Graduation Requirements to 220 Credits

Because the District's proposed High School Promotion Regulation is based on the number of credits required for graduation, Administration is asking the Board to first consider the recommended change in graduation requirements (see revised policy 6161 in supporting documents). In line with new State regulations that require Algebra for graduation in 2004, eighth-grade State standards focused on Algebra, and requirements for passing the CAHSEE which include Algebra, our high schools have raised expectations for students graduating in 2004 by disallowing high school mathematics credit for courses at a level lower than Algebra. Without an amendment to our graduation requirements, however, this change would require students to not only pass Algebra I but also pass two additional mathematics courses (e.g., Geometry, Algebra II, Pre-Calculus).

B. Approve at First Informational Reading Revised Board Policy 6161, High School Graduation Requirements, Revised Board Policy 6162, Graduation Requirements for Continuation High School, and New Board Regulation 5123, High School Grade-Level Promotion (Continued) (Mr. Edmunds)

Given that the District's current secondary students (similar to most of the State's secondary students) have not had a mastery-oriented and standards-based approach to their education (and hence, many students are currently not mastering such basics as fractions, place value, and averages), two implications are paramount: (1) a mathematics requirement of three courses is likely to be inappropriate for a large number of students, and (2) remedial courses focused on basic skills will need to be formed that do not bear mathematics graduation requirement units. These remedial courses will ensure the fundamental and prerequisite skills necessary to succeed in Algebra and on the CAHSEE. Each of these implications point to the need to reduce the graduation requirements in mathematics from three courses (30 credits) to two courses (20 credits) and the overall graduation credits from 230 to 220 credits—actions that would correspond more closely with area districts such as Riverside, Alvord, and Moreno Valley (see supporting document entitled *Various Benchmark and Area District Graduation and Mathematics Requirements*).

It should be noted that, while it may look like the District is lowering expectations for student learning by reducing the credit requirements, these changes would actually add more of a focus on mastery and quality learning. Under this new approach to ensuring mastery and prerequisite skills necessary to succeed in Algebra, students would be required to show basic skills prior to entering Algebra. This would require more tutorial mathematics classes that gain elective credit but not mathematics credit for graduation. Hence, the District is raising the bar for mastery of the essential mathematics skills. Students will be held to higher standards and required to attain needed skills to enter the Algebra or higher math courses. In many cases students will take more mathematics than before. The difference is that mathematics will focus on the essential skills to pass Algebra and the California High School Exit Exam. This policy, if approved, would be put into effect immediately. However, per the new State law, the Algebra requirement would be applied beginning with the 2003-2004 school year.

### **High School Promotion Regulation**

The second proposal is to establish a regulation that delineates credit standards for the promotion of high school students from grade to grade. Administration believes that a regulation requiring a specific number of credits for students to move from grade to grade would better motivate students to attain credits in a timely fashion, establish clearer expectations for satisfactory academic progress, and create a greater programmatic focus on students deficient in skills and/or credits (e.g., guidance, tutoring, ELO, Basic Skills Academies, Summer School, Opportunity Schools, Independent Study, and so forth). We also believe that this promotion regulation would increase the likelihood of students' future success by requiring passage of certain prerequisite courses and mastery of certain prerequisite skills. Board Regulation 5123, High School Grade-Level Promotion, requires that students earn a specified amount of credits prior to being afforded status at the next grade level. For example, to move from freshman to sophomore status, students would need to earn no less than 45 credits. The Regulation provides three periods for adjusting grade-level status: (1) at the semester, (2) at the end of the school year, and (3) after the summer school session has been completed.

# B. Approve at First Informational Reading Revised Board Policy 6161, High School Graduation Requirements, Revised Board Policy 6162, Graduation Requirements for Continuation High School, and New Board Regulation 5123, High School Grade-Level Promotion (Continued) (Mr. Edmunds)

Students who do not maintain their appropriate grade-level status will not only be required to make up core courses prior to advancing on to courses that are more advanced, but they will also lose certain privileges (e.g., participation in certain regular or extracurricular activities with like-age peers, inclusion in yearbook pictures with their age mates). We believe such actions will better motivate students toward immediately working toward regaining their credits through taking summer school classes, better engaging in tutorial classes, and so forth. The High School Grade-Level Promotion Regulation will provide a comprehensive communication system that informs parents and students about this regulation, the rationale for it, and the consequences involved. Moreover, the regulation promotes the creation and use of a greater variety of intervention and alternative education programs aimed at credit recovery and developing key skills in reading, writing, and mathematics. These programs might include (1) computer-assisted instruction, (2) elective tutorial classes, (3) reading intervention programs, (4) opportunity schools, (5) independent study, (6) continuation school, (7) summer school, (8) extended learning opportunities, (9) zero hour, (10) seventh hour, (11) evening school, and (12) Saturday Academies.

In order to accommodate students already attaining junior and senior status and certain junior and senior year privileges, this regulation, if adopted, would be phased in next year, as appropriate, by all high schools.

Administration recommends approval at first informational reading of revised Board Policy 6161, High School Graduation Requirements, Revised Board Policy 6162, Graduation Requirements for Continuation High School, and new Board Regulation 5123, High School Grade-Level Promotion.

## \* C. Approve at First Informational Reading New Board Policy & Regulation 5167, Use of Drug-Detecting Dogs (Mr. Edmunds/Ms. Sheppy)

Suspension and crime statistics indicate unacceptable levels of student drug use. Furthermore, students report in an annual survey that a much larger number are using drugs on campus than are evident from discipline statistics. Due to this growing concern over the presence of drugs on school campuses by staff, parents, and students, district administration seeks stronger interventions to help schools maintain a safe and secure learning environment. Therefore, the District is seeking approval to use trained dogs to detect the presence of substances prohibited by law and/or District policy. The Safe Schools Committee received information about the use of drug-detecting dogs and after discussion, came to consensus that such a program would not only intervene with those bringing drugs on campus, but would act as a deterrent. Subsequently, a group visited Baldwin Park Unified School District and observed a handler and dog in action, demonstrating effectiveness of this type of program and allying any concerns that might arise over protecting students, staff, and their constitutional rights.

\* C. Approve at First Informational Reading New Board Policy & Regulation 5167, Use of Drug-Detecting Dogs (Continued) (Mr. Edmunds/Ms. Sheppy)

Other districts also use drug-detecting dogs such as Riverside Unified, Corona/Norco, Fontana, and Perris Union High School District. Our attorneys were consulted for a legal opinion and the results are sample policy and regulations to assist the District in the implementation of this program in consistency with statutory and case law. It is anticipated that random searches would occur on a monthly basis at a cost of approximately \$200.00 for half-day services or \$400.00 for full-day services; **Violence Prevention funds would be used to cover the cost of these services.** Key points of the policy are as follows:

- 1. Annual notification to parents, students, and staff will occur and includes the posting of signs at main entrances.
- 2. The program will utilize a trained dog and handler in a manner that protects students, staff, and the dog.
- 3. No individuals will be present in the immediate vicinity during a search except authorized staff, and dogs will never be used on an individual unless there is reasonable suspicion of drug use.
- 4. Each time dogs are employed, staff will document appropriately.

Administration recommends approval at first informational reading of new Board Policy & Regulation #5167, Use of Drug-Detecting Dogs.

\* D. Approve Instructional Materials for Adoption

(Mr. Mendez)

At the June 17, 2002 Board meeting, the Board approved for review the textbooks listed below. The books have been on display at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon libraries for the period required by Board policy.

#### Middle School

- 1. Essential Elements for Choir, Musicianship, Level I for grades 7 and 8.
- 2. Essential Elements for Choir, Mixed Voices, Level II for grades 7 and 8.

#### High School

- 3. Algebra 2 with Trigonometry for grades 9-12.
- 4. Chemistry The Central Science for grades 11-12.
- 5. College Physics for grades 11-12.
- 6. Geometry for grades 9-12.
- 7. Nuevas Vistas Uno for grades 9-12.
- 8. Nuevas Vistas Dos for grades 9-12.

It is recommended that the Board approve for adoption the following instructional materials: Essential Elements for Choir, Musicianship, Level I; Essential Elements for Choir, Mixed Voices, Level II; Algebra 2 with Trigonometry; Chemistry; College Physics; Geometry; Nuevas Vistas Uno; Nuevas Vistas Dos.

E. Adopt Urgency Ordinance No. 02/05 Levying Special Taxes (Mr. Duchon) Attached for first reading is Urgency Ordinance No. 02/05 Levying Special Taxes which, if adopted will levy a special tax (the "Special Taxes") in Community Facilities Districts No. 3. The Special Taxes to be levied against each assessor's parcel within this community facilities districts were approved by the owner's of two-thirds of the property within the district at the time of its formation.

It is necessary at this time to levy the Special Taxes to pay the principal and interest on bonds of the community facilities district and to pay for the administrative expenses of the community facilities district. The ordinance further permits the Tax Collector of the County of Riverside to levy and collect the Special Taxes in the same manner as other *ad valorem* property taxes are levied and collected within the County of Riverside. This means each landowner will receive a property tax bill reflecting their portion of the Special Taxes.

In order to pay principal and interest on the bonds of the above-mentioned community facilities district, District counsel, *Kim Byrens*, has prepared the ordinance for levying assessment on these parcels, and recommends that the ordinances be introduced for the first reading, and that further reading be waived.

Administration recommends that Ordinance No. 02/05, Urgency Ordinance Levying Special Taxes to be Collected During Fiscal Year 2002/2003 for Payment of Principal and Interest on and Administrative Expenses with Respect to the Bonds of Community Facilities District No. 3 of Jurupa Unified School District be introduced for the first reading, that further reading be waived; and that the Board adopt Ordinance No. 02/05.

F. Ratify Purchase of 30 Dell Optiplex 240 Computers for Rubidoux High
Rubidoux High School requests the purchase of 30 Dell Optiplex 240 computers with a
Pentium 4 Processor, 1.7 GHz, 256 Cache, INT NIC and Sound. Funding for the equipment
will come from the II/USP funds and will be purchased on the Western State Contracting
Alliance Program Contract #92-00151. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of
\$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for Approval. The II/USP funds need to be encumbered
prior to June 30, 2002, therefore Administration requests ratification of issuance of a purchase
order prior to Board approval. These funds will be lost to the District if not encumbered by the
June 30<sup>th</sup> date.

Education Code Section 17604 states, in part, "Wherever in this code the power to contract is invested in the governing board of the school district or any member thereof, the power may be a majority vote of the board delegated to its district superintendent, or to any person that he or she may designate." The code goes on to require that "no contract made pursuant to the delegation and authorization shall be valid or constitute an enforceable obligation against the district unless and until the same shall have been approved or ratified by the governing board, the approval of ratification to be evidenced by a motion of the board duly passed and adopted." Administration recommends the Board ratify Purchase Order #41939 to Dell Computers in the amount of \$33,219.76 (including tax) for the purchase of 30 Dell Optiplex 240 computers for Rubidoux High School.

### \* G. Approve Increase for California Multiple Award Schedule (CMAS) Contract (Mr. Bowers)

On April 15, 2002 the Board authorized administration to pursue a CMAS contract with Spectrum Communications to complete the network infrastructure by installing data conduit at Mission Bell, Mission Middle, Troth, Van Buren, Indian Hills, Sky Country, and Camino Real by the end of summer 2002. At that time the preliminary cost estimate was \$75,000. Spectrum was contacted to prepare a detailed cost estimate per site.

District staff, including representatives from the Information Technology Department, the Communications Department, and the Maintenance and Operations Department participated in several site visits with Spectrum to confirm the preliminary design and scope of work identified by district staff. Additional needs were identified during this detailed process. The cost for the scope of work at Camino Real is \$26,328.42; Indian Hills is \$12,872.52; Mission Middle is \$7,526.00; Sky Country is \$17,233.58; Troth is \$94,093.34, and Van Buren is \$41,008.58. The detailed cost proposals total \$199,062.44.

This is a Measure "C" Phase I project and conforms to the Implementation Program as well as the Master Plan that includes \$278,626.00 of Measure C funds, Internal Connection E-Rate 4 funds of \$7,586.35 at Mission Middle and approximately \$5,000.00 at Troth, and a Telecommunications E-Rate 4 credit of \$43,000.00.

Administration recommends the Board authorize District staff to increase the \$75,000.00 Spectrum Communications Cabling Services CMAS contract by \$124,062.44 due to design changes, for a total of \$199,062.44 to install the additional data conduit needed to complete the Phase I Measure C project at the identified sites.

## H. Approve Purchase of 22 Toshiba Satellite 1800-S207 Laptop Computers for Van Buren Elementary School (Mr. Duchon)

Van Buren Elementary School requests the purchase of 22 Toshiba Satellite 1800-S207 Laptop Computers with an Intel Celeron processor, 1.1 GHz active matrix display, 256 MB SDRAM, and 20GB hard drive. Funding for the equipment will come from Gate (\$1,395.22), SIP (\$9,766.48), and Title I (\$19,532.96) funds and will be purchased on C-MAS Contract #3-99-70-0793B. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #41955 to CDW-G in the amount of \$30,694.66 (including tax) for the purchase of 22 Toshiba Satellite 1800-S207 Laptop Computers for Van Buren Elementary School.

## I. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

1. Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Phase I and Phase II Bids for High School #3
(Mr. Bowers

To maintain our current schedule and to take advantage of industry conditions, Administration intends to advertise and solicit bid proposals for two Phase I Bid Packages for the construction of High School #3. Bid Package 1 is for onsite rough grading and Bid package 2 is for structural steel. The estimated cost of Bid package 1 is \$950,000.00 and includes all clearing, grading, and preparation of the site for building construction within the property lines, as well as fine grading of the site for landscape and sidewalks. The estimated cost for Bid Package 2 is \$6,100,000.00 and includes all building shop drawings, procurement of materials, fabrication and erection of the steel building frames, steel decks and roofs, building and site stairs and/or railings.

The bid date for these two packages is set for August 20, 2002. Administration intends to request award at the September 3, 2002 Board Meeting. Phase 1 construction is scheduled to begin in late September. Phase 2, which is the remainder of the project, is scheduled to bid on October 22, 2002. Administration intends to request award at the November 18, 2002 Board Meeting. Phase 2 construction is scheduled to begin in December of 2002 and is valued at approximately \$34,950,000.00.

Administration recommends the Board approve staff to advertise and solicit contractors for Phase 1 Bid Package #1 (Clearing, Mass Grading, Fine Grading), and Bid Package #2 (Structural and Miscellaneous Steel), and all Phase 2 (remaining) Bid Packages for High School #3.

2. Award Bid #02/05L, Asphalt Repair/Replacement of Eleven (11) District Sites (Mr. Duchon) At its March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2002 Meeting, the Board authorized Administration to advertise for bids for summer projects. One of the projects was for asphalt repair at 11 sites: Education Center, Glen Avon, Ina Arbuckle, Mission Bell, Pacific Avenue, Rustic Lane, Sky Country, Troth Street, and West Riverside Elementary Schools; Jurupa Middle School; and Jurupa Valley High School. This project will be funded from the State Deferred Maintenance Fund.

On June 18, 2002 bids were received and publicly opened for Bid #02/05L, Asphalt Repair/Replacement at Eleven (11) District Sites. Bid documents were delivered to seven (7) prospective bidders and responses were received from the following five (5) bidders:

After the Department of State Architects (DSA) approved the plans for Jurupa Portables 2001, Contract #C-20064, Perkins & Will, Architect, it was determined that the numbers of the portables installed differed from those approved by DSA. Therefore, a change order has been issued to submit a new set of drawings representing installed portables (A#102724 and A#101268) used in place of the previously submitted and approved set (A#65839 and A#65839.

- 4. Approve Award of Horse Barn and Corral at Jurupa Valley High School (Mr. Bowers) Three proposals were requested and received by the Agricultural Department at Jurupa Valley High School to furnish and install a horse barn and arena or corral. The following proposals were received:
  - 1. California Livestock Supply, Inc., in the amount of \$25,206.03 (proposal includes horse barn and arena).
  - 2. M Bar C Carports Inc. in the amount of \$27,090.00 (proposal includes horse barn and horse corrals in lieu of arena).
  - 3. MH Enterprise in the amount of \$28,457.66 (proposal includes horse barn and arena).

Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) is currently available through a previous Cooperative Agreement between the Redevelopment Agency and the District. These funds are restricted for this specific use. **The remaining \$206.03 will be funded through redevelopment revenue.**

The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for their Summer School Program and Rubidoux High School for Fall Semester 2002 and Spring Semester 2003. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 16, 2003.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

#### K. Act on Personnel Matters

\* 1. Ratify Tentative Agreement with CSEA

A tentative agreement has been reached with CSEA on items subject to reopener negotiations for the 2001-2002 school year. Specifically, it has been agreed to increase the Classified Salary Schedule by two percent (2%) effective February 1, 2002 and increase the Health and Welfare Benefit Allowance by \$100 per qualified unit member effective July 1, 2002. Additionally, modifications have been agreed to in three other areas. These areas are Transfers, Application of Classified Salary Schedule (including Longevity Increments), and Health and Welfare Benefits. A copy of the tentative agreement including these articles is included in the supporting documents with the changes highlighted.

CSEA membership ratified the tentative agreement on June 12, 2002. Public disclosure requirements have been satisfied. <u>It is recommended that the Board ratify the tentative agreement with CSEA.</u>





### HIGH SCHOOL GRADE-LEVEL PROMOTION

Recognizing the important role that clear expectations, parent communication, accountability, and intervention programs play in promoting student learning, the Governing Board believes that a high school promotion policy will increase the likelihood of students' future success by requiring passage of certain prerequisite courses and mastery of certain prerequisite skills.

High School Grade-Level Promotion requires that students earn credits prior to being afforded status at the next grade level as follows:

### Promotion Periods

Grade level status will be determined at three times during the year:

- (1) at semester,
- (2) at the end of the school year, and
- (3) after the summer school session has been completed.

### Privileges/Consequences

Students who do not maintain their appropriate grade-level status will not only be required to make up core courses prior to advancing on to courses that are more advanced but also lose certain privileges (e.g., participate in certain regular or extracurricular activities with like-age mates, be included in yearbook pictures with their age-mates, right to select electives). Schools should clearly communicate the privileges students attain for achieving status at the various grade levels.

### Role of Parent Communication, Feedback to Students

The Board recognizes that a High School Grade-Level Promotion Policy focuses on the important role of developing thorough and comprehensive communication systems that inform parents and students about this policy, the rationale for it, and the consequences involved. Examples of communications that should be used include the following:

Regular communication regarding credits accrued shall be developed for students (e.g., guidance coordinator letters to deficient students, credits earned on report cards and progress reports).

### HIGH SCHOOL GRADE-LEVEL PROMOTION

### Role of Remediation, Alternative Education, Interventions

Schools will be challenged to create a greater variety of intervention and alternative education programs aimed at credit recovery and developing key skills in reading, writing, and mathematics. These programs may include (1) computer assisted instruction, (2) elective tutorial classes, (3) reading intervention programs, (4) opportunity schools, (5) independent study, (6) continuation school, (7) summer school, (8) extended learning opportunities, (9) zero hour, and (10) seventh hours, (11) evening school, and (12) Saturday Academies.

### USE OF DRUG-DETECTING DOGS

The Board finds that the growing presence of drugs in schools threatens the District's ability to maintain safe and secure school campuses, to preserve appropriate discipline on school campuses, and to enable effective learning environments.

In an effort to keep schools free of drugs, the District may use trained dogs to detect the presence of substances prohibited by law and/or District policy.

The Superintendent, or his or her designee, shall establish requirements for implementation and utilization of drug-detecting dogs.

The use of drug-detecting dogs shall be administered in compliance with all applicable laws, constitutional limitations and requirements regarding searches and seizures, and related District Regulations.

The dogs may be used to detect drugs in or around lockers, hallways, classrooms, desks, bags, items, or vehicles on District property or at District sponsored events if it is confirmed that no individuals are present in the immediate vicinity of the investigation.

The dogs may not be used to directly sniff the person of an individual unless individualized and reasonable suspicion that the particular student to be searched has engaged, or is engaging, in a prohibited activity has been obtained as determined by the appropriate official on duty.

### USE OF DRUG-DETECTING DOGS

The use of trained drug-detecting dogs shall only be administered in compliance with Board Policies and Regulations.

All parents and students shall be notified of the District's use of drug-detecting dogs. Such notification is to be included in the annual student packets sent to all parents/guardians of students at the beginning of the academic school year or at the time of enrollment. Appropriate and visible signs shall also be posted at points of entry to any school site using drug-detecting dogs. Signs shall state that the dogs may be used to detect drugs in or around lockers, hallways, classrooms, desks, bags, items, or vehicles on District property or at District sponsored events if it is confirmed that no individuals are present in the immediate vicinity of the investigation.

Drug detecting dogs shall only be utilized after a determination of need to do so has been made by an appropriate law enforcement agency and school site administrator. However, the school site administrator shall notify and confer with the Superintendent, or his/her designee, prior to any actual utilization of the dog for drug detecting purposes. The following are examples of use criteria:

- Known incidents of drug possession indicate an increased use.
- Students, parents, or staff report concerns regarding drug use.

All dog handlers are to be familiar with this Regulation and its corresponding Board Policy and are required to review and acknowledge such in writing.

All dogs to be used shall be previously trained for drug detecting purposes.

All dogs are to remain in the care, custody, and control of their handlers while on any school campus. The safety of students, staff, and the animal will be maintained at all times.

The use of drug-detecting dogs shall be scheduled in a manner that is least disruptive to the academic learning process on the school campus.

The use of drug-detecting dogs shall be administered in compliance with all applicable statutory and case law.

The drug-detecting dogs may only be used to sniff in or around lockers, hallways, classrooms, desks, bags, items, or vehicles on District property or at District sponsored events if it is confirmed that no individuals are present in the immediate vicinity of the investigation.

The drug-detecting dogs may not be used to directly sniff the person of any individual unless individualized and reasonable suspicion that the particular student to be searched has engaged, or is engaging, in a prohibited activity has been obtained as determined by the appropriate official on duty.



### USE OF DRUG-DETECTING DOGS

Only a particular dog's handler may determine what constitutes an "alert" or "hit" as indicated by the dog. Only after such determination has been made, may staff complete a search in a manner consistent with Board Policies, Regulations, and all applicable statutory and case law.

School site administration shall complete a brief post activity use report upon completing the use of a drug-detecting dog. The report shall specify the manner of use and the results and be submitted to the Superintendent, or his/her designee. On a quarterly basis, the Superintendent, or his/her designee, shall provide a report of such use to the Board of Education. The report shall review any and all use of drug-detecting dogs and the results.

All inquiries that arise as a result of the use of a drug-detecting dog shall be referred to the school site administration for appropriate response. The school site administration shall notify the Superintendent, or his/her designee, as to all such inquiries received.

# ORDINANCE NO. 02/05

AN URGENCY ORDINANCE LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES TO BE COLLECTED DURING FISCAL YEAR 2002-03 FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON AND ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES WITH RESPECT TO THE BONDS OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 3 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Findings. It is necessary that the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District (the "Board") levy special taxes pursuant to Sections 53340 and 53358 of the Government Code for the payment of the principal of and interest on the outstanding bonds of Community Facilities District No. 3 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "District"), and for the payment of administrative expenses incurred in connection with the levy and collection of said special taxes and the payment of such principal and interest.

Section 2. Levy of Special Taxes. Special taxes shall be and are hereby levied for the fiscal year 2002-03 on all parcels of real property within the District which are subject to taxation, which are identified in Exhibit "A" attached hereto, and in the amount set forth for each such parcel in said Exhibit "A". Pursuant to said Sections 53340 and 53358, such special taxes shall be collected in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem property taxes are collected and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure, sale, and lien priority in case of delinquency as is provided for ad valorem taxes.

Section 3. Transmittal to County. The Clerk of the Board of Education shall immediately following adoption of this ordinance transmit a copy hereof to the Board of Supervisors and the County Auditor of the County of Riverside together with a request that the special taxes as levied hereby be collected on the tax bills for the parcels identified in Exhibit "A" hereto, along with the ordinary ad valorem property taxes to be levied on and collected from the owners of said parcels.

Section 4. <u>Authorization to Publish Ordinance</u>. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this ordinance and the Clerk shall attest thereto and shall, within fifteen days of its adoption, cause it or a summary of it to be published in a newspaper circulated in Jurupa Unified School District.

Section 5. Urgency and Effective Date. This ordinance is an urgency ordinance relating to taxes for the usual and current expenses of the District, *i.e.*, the levy of special taxes to pay the principal of and interest on the outstanding bonds of the District. Accordingly, pursuant to Sections 36937 of the Government Code, this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

### TRANSFER

# Section 1 - Definition.

"Transfer" means a change in work location between schools or other facilities without a change in the unit member's classification or salary range. For purposes of interpreting this Article, a "day" will be considered any day during which the District Office is open for business.

# Section 2 - Voluntary Transfer.

- A. A unit member may request in writing a transfer at any time whether or not there is an existing vacancy. Such request will be filed with the Personnel Office and shall remain active for a one (1) year period. At the end of one (1) year, the request shall become invalid.
- B. The definition of a transfer includes equal consideration of a voluntary transfer request from a current or former unit member who promoted out of the bargaining unit and for whom the transfer would result in a voluntary demotion. No such voluntary demotion shall cause the displacement of any bargaining unit member.
- C. When three (3) or more fully qualified unit members have applied for a transfer to a position at a different work site in the same classification which the District has declared vacant, the District shall select one (1) of these unit members to be transferred to the new location. Such a transfer shall not alter the seniority rights of any unit member. A successor vacancy created by such transfer shall not be subject to this provision except in the case of appropriate applications already on file when the successor vacancy occurs.
- D. If a unit member has a request to transfer on file in the Personnel Office when a vacancy occurs, the District shall grant the unit member an interview for the position.

# Section 3 - Involuntary Transfer.

A unit member may be transferred from one (1) position to another in the same classification at the discretion of the District provided that such action shall be taken neither for punitive nor preferential reasons nor be otherwise inconsistent with applicable law. Unit members will be notified of an impending involuntary transfer by use of the Classified (K-1) (K-1) (M-1) (M-

# Involuntary Transfer Notification Form (See Appendix).

If requested in writing prior to an involuntary transfer, a unit member shall be given written reasons for the impending transfer. Transfers shall not be used as a device to alter the sequence of impending layoff. Transfers shall not change the unit member's anniversary date, accumulated vacation credit, or in any other manner reflect adversely upon his/her rights.

Unit members shall receive a minimum of three (3) five (5) days notice prior to the effective date of their involuntary transfer unless there is mutual consent between the District and Association for an immediate transfer. Upon written request of the unit member, a conference will be held with the unit member, his/her chosen representative, and the appropriate supervisor to discuss the transfer.

# Section 4 - Vacancy Announcements.

- A. When the District determines that it is going to fill a vacant position, open a new position and/or create an eligibility list for a classification, a vacancy notice will be posted for at least seven (7) days at each school or work site before the application deadline. At least one additional method will be used to communicate such vacancies, opening of new positions, or establishment of eligibility lists.
  - 1. Prior to posting and filling a vacant Activity Supervisor position, the supervising site administrator shall offer the position to regular Activity Supervisors who work fewer hours at the site in order of seniority. A seniority tie shall be broken by lot. Only after the position has been offered to each current Activity Supervisor at the site shall the resulting vacant position be opened to application from other candidates.
- B. A copy of each vacancy or job opening notice shall be provided to the Association President and his/her designee. Such courtesy notice shall not be interpreted as placing the burden of notice to unit members on the Association.

# APPLICATION OF CLASSIFIED SALARY SCHEDULE

# Section 1 - Initial Placement.

A new unit member shall be assigned the job classification title for which he/she has qualified and be placed on the first increment step of the designated range for that classification. A new unit member having experience directly related to his/her job classification may be assigned to a higher increment step of the salary schedule with specific District approval.

# Section 2 - Salary Placement on Promotion.

A unit member who is promoted to another bargaining unit classification shall receive a minimum salary increase of five percent (5%), except that he/she may be placed on the last step of the new salary range if that is the maximum salary for the classification.

# Section 3 - Work Temporarily Assigned Out of Classification.

### A. Intent.

It is the intent of this Section to permit the District to temporarily assign duties to unit members which are not prescribed for their job classifications, but in so doing to require that some reasonable additional compensation be provided when that assignment is of significant duration.

# B. Application.

Where the duties assigned and performed are not fixed and prescribed for the unit member's job classification or reasonably related thereto, whether or not such duties are fixed and prescribed for a higher paid classification, the unit member shall be entitled to an upward adjustment of salary paid retroactively from the first day provided the assignment was for a period of more than five (5) working days

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during any fifteen (15) calendar day period. The minimum upward adjustment shall be five percent (5%). The upward salary adjustment for a unit member who is assigned out-of-class work shall be five percent (5%) or temporary placement at Step 1 of the salary range for that classification, whichever is greater, and shall be paid retroactively to the first day of the assignment. (Note: District latitudes in the assignment of out-of-class work are quite extensive and unit members are advised to review them with the Association.)

# C. <u>Unit Member Responsibility.</u>

If a unit member feels that he/she has been assigned duties which are not prescribed for his/her classification or reasonably related to such duties, it shall be the unit member's responsibility to provide clear and immediate written notice to his/her supervisor, with a copy to the Director of Classified Personnel, that such has occurred. Failure to provide such notice may weaken any future claim for out-of-class compensation. The immediate supervisor shall acknowledge, in writing, receipt of such notice within five (5) days.

# Section 4 - Position Reclassification.

## A. Intent.

It is the intent of this Section to provide for the upgrading of a position to a higher job classification where there has been significant change, required by the District, in the duties assigned to and performed by the incumbent(s) in such position(s), where such changes are not temporary in nature, and where the changes require a level of skill and responsibility higher than that required for the existing classification. Position reclassification is neither a reward to a unit member for excellent performance or high seniority within a job classification nor



is it intended to circumvent regular promotion practices or the procedures specified in the above Section.

# B. Application.

Where a gradual increase over an extended period of time in the level of required skills and responsibilities assigned to a position results in a significant change of duties being performed by a unit member, and where it is the intent of the District to extend such duties on a continuing and permanent basis, the position shall be upgraded to a higher classification.

# C. <u>Unit Member Responsibility.</u>

If a unit member feels that he/she has been assigned duties which are not prescribed for his/her classification or reasonably related to such duties, it shall be the unit member's responsibility to provide clear and immediate written notice to his/her supervisor that such has occurred. Failure to provide such notice may weaken any future claim that the position should be reclassified.

# D. <u>Position Reclassification Claims.</u>

Instead of using the grievance procedure, the following steps shall be used for processing formal claims for position reclassification:

1. Unit member claims for position reclassification must be submitted to the appropriate supervisor on a District-developed form(s) obtained from the District Personnel Office or the Association. Such claim must be certified on the form as reviewed, approved and supported by the Association. Within five (5) days after the claim is filed, a conference must be scheduled if requested by either party.

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- 2. The District will have twenty-two (22) work days from the date the claim is submitted or from the date of the conference, whichever is later, to respond to the claim. Timelines may be extended by mutual agreement.
- If the District's response is deemed unsatisfactory by the Association, and 3. the District and the Association are unable to achieve a resolution, the Association, with written approval of the unit member(s) involved, may choose to submit the claim for study to a mutually selected independent outside agency specializing in reclassification studies and related matters. The agency's recommendation(s) regarding the position(s) being studied will be treated by the District in the same manner that an arbitrator's decision would be treated. Any upward salary adjustments resulting from a reclassification study or involving reclassification between already existing classifications, shall not be less than the first step on the salary range for the higher classification. The agency may recommend (1) that the position(s) be reclassified, (2) that out-of-classification compensation be awarded, or (3) that the claim be rejected and no change occur. All such changes shall be effective on the date of the reclassification. All costs associated with such a reclassification study shall be shared equally by the parties.

# E. Filling of Reclassified Position(s).

When all the positions in a classification are reclassified, the incumbents in the position shall be entitled to serve in the new classification. When a portion of the



positions within a class are reclassified to a higher job classification, an incumbent who has a continuous employment record of one (1) or more years in the position being reclassified shall be reclassified with his/her position. If the incumbent does not have one (1) or more years of such continuous employment, the reclassified position first will be offered in order of seniority to unit members in the same class who do meet the continuous employment requirement.

# F. Salary Placement.

A unit member whose salary range placement changes as a result of a position reclassification shall be initially placed on the same step of the new range as his/her step placement in the position in the previous classification.

# Section 5 - Anniversary Date.

The work year for classified unit members shall be the July 1 to June 30 fiscal year irrespective of the beginning date of service; thus, the anniversary date for all classified unit members shall be July 1. The first anniversary date for a new unit member who began service between July 1 and January 15 shall be the following July 1. The first anniversary date for a new unit member who began service after January 15 and on or before June 30 shall be the second July 1 of his/her employment.

# Section 6 - Increment Advancement.

Annual experience increment advancement recognizes service in the District and not necessarily in the current position. Such increment will be awarded in addition to any upward change in classification and irrespective of time served in the position. Increment advancement for experience shall be made across the designated classification salary range each year on the unit member's anniversary date. No unit member shall advance more than one (1) anniversary increment step per year.

# Section 7 - Longevity Increment.

Effective July 1, 2000, 2001, a unit member who has completed twenty (20) years of employment in the District shall receive a two thousand three hundred and ten (\$2,310) two thousand three hundred and sixty-five dollar (\$2,365) longevity increment salary allowance each subsequent year in addition to his/her placement on the Classified Salary Schedule. This amount The longevity increment shall increase to three thousand one hundred and thirty five (\$3,135) three thousand two hundred and sixteen dollars (\$3,216) for unit members who have completed twenty-five (25) years. This amount The longevity increment shall increase to three thousand nine hundred and sixty (\$3,960) four thousand and sixty-eight dollars (\$4,068) for unit members who have completed thirty (30) years.

Effective July 1, 2002, whenever the Classified Salary Schedule is increased, each longevity increment shall be increased by a minimum of the same percent amount. This shall not limit the Parties from negotiating a higher longevity increment.

The longevity increment shall be paid at the completion of the <u>fiscal</u> year in which it is earned by a warrant separate from <u>on</u> the unit member's regular payroll warrant.

Section 8 - Payroll <u>Errors</u>.

Proper salary class and step placement is a joint responsibility of the unit member and the District. All unit members are to review their salary placement data as supplied by the District each October. Should they believe that they are improperly placed on the salary schedule, they are to immediately bring this information to the attention of the District. Any District error resulting in insufficient payment to a unit member shall be corrected, and a special payroll revolving fund check issued not later than five (5) working days



after the Payroll Department has received both a written request from the unit member and verification of the error. Otherwise the supplemental amount will be included in the next regular paycheck following verification of the error. Should the incorrect salary placement result in an overpayment, the unit member shall, upon realizing the fact or upon notification from the District, repay the full amount of such overpayment. Repayment shall be from the unit member's next regular check or upon unit member request, pursuant to the terms of a repayment extension schedule approved by the Superintendent/designee and unit member. The unit member shall be notified of any necessary recovery of an overpayment prior to any District initiated recovery and in sufficient time to schedule a meeting regarding a repayment schedule as referenced above.

A. <u>Limitation</u>. Errors such as mentioned above shall only be corrected during the fiscal year in which they are discovered, and such corrections shall not be retroactive beyond a twelve (12) month period from the date of discovery of said error.

# Section 9 - Substitute Coverage.

If the District is engaged in a procedure to hire a permanent employee to fill a vacant bargaining unit position, the District may fill the vacancy through the employment, for not more than sixty (60) calendar days, of one (1) or more substitute employees.

# Section 10 - Modifications to Job Descriptions.

If the District decides to modify an existing bargaining unit job description in a manner which will substantially change the nature of duties the incumbent(s) shall perform, the District shall appropriately provide the Association with notice of said change and the

# Section 11 - PERS Pay Conversion.

# A. District Contribution.

Effective July 1, 1987, and each month thereafter during the term of this Agreement, the District shall pay each participating unit member's contribution to the Public Employees' Retirement System (commonly referenced as 7%).

# B. <u>Increases.</u>

The District contribution toward any increase in the current statutory PERS contribution rate, (gross salary \$133.33 x .07) seven percent (7%) of gross salary shall not be automatically adjusted upward unless mutually agreed to by the Parties.

Any PERS related savings shall be automatically subject to the negotiations process, upon request of either Party.

# C. <u>Salary Comparability/Cost Studies.</u>

Since the District's PERS contribution is made in lieu of a salary increase, both parties agree that future calculations of the cost of a one percent (1%) increase of the Classified Salary Schedule shall include District PERS contribution costs. It is also agreed that the District PERS contribution costs should be included in any salary comparability study of benchmark districts

# D. Hold Harmless Clause.

The Association shall defend and hold the District harmless against any claims by a unit member or on behalf of a unit member arising out of implementation of this Section.

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# Section 12 - Designated Translator

Effective beginning July 1, 1998, 2001 any unit member(s) who agrees to be designated by a site administrator as a translator shall receive a yearly stipend of \$100 \$275 for foreign language translation services provided for the District during the regular work day. Written notification from Personnel Services to the unit member will confirm this designation. This stipend shall increase to \$200 effective beginning July 1, 1999, and to \$250 annually effective July 1, 2000. Administratively requested or authorized translation service, including sign language, performed outside of the regular work day shall be compensated at the appropriate hourly rate.

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# **ARTICLE 14**

# CLASSIFIED SALARY SCHEDULES AND RANGES

For the 2001-2002 fiscal year, the "Classified Salary Schedule" shall be increased by two percent (2%) effective February 1, 2002.

If any confidential, management, administrative, or certificated employee group receives a salary increase for the 2001-2002 fiscal year, on or off-schedule, which exceeds the percentage increase contained within this Agreement, the difference shall be paid to unit members, following meeting(s) between the Parties to determine the basis for the distribution.

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# **HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS**

# Section 1 - Health and Welfare Benefit Allowance.

# A. Maximum Allowance.

- 1. The District will pay annually a maximum allowance of four thousand six hundred dollars (\$4,600) per qualified unit member for specified health and welfare benefits.
- 2. Effective July 1, 2002, the District will pay annually a maximum allowance of four thousand seven hundred dollars (\$4,700) per qualified unit member for specified health and welfare benefits. This does not limit the Parties from negotiating a higher unit member allowance.
- 3. All costs for benefits exceeding the maximum allowance shall be paid by the unit member. A "qualified" unit member is a member of the bargaining unit whose employment was regularly four (4) or more hours per day on or before July 1, 1977 or, if approved by the District for employment after that date, whose employment is regularly eight (8) hours per day.
- 4. If the maximum allowance for any confidential, management, administrative, or certificated employee group is increased for the 2001-2002 fiscal year so that it exceeds the unit member allowance in this Agreement, the classified unit member allowance shall be raised to an equal amount.

# B. Pro-rated Allowance.

Unit members whose employment is regularly less than eight (8) hours per day will receive annually a maximum allowance in the same proportion of the current maximum District dollar contribution amount that their regular daily hours of . employment bear to eight (8) hours, with the following exceptions:

1. Unit members whose employment was regularly four (4) or more hours per day on or before July 1, 1977 (See Section 1, A above).

Bg.18 Han March Dg.18 Han March 2. Unit members hired on or after January 1, 1994 whose employment is regularly three or fewer hours per day shall not receive any allowance for health and welfare benefits.

# Section 2 - Specified Health and Welfare Benefits.

Subject to the provisions and requirements of the jointly approved insurance carriers, the following benefit options are available to unit members under a "Section 125 Premium Only Plan" effective October 1, 1992. Payroll deductions will be made for costs of coverage beyond the District allowance for approved plans.

# A. Mandatory Coverages

- 1. All unit members who are eligible for health and welfare benefits shall have mandatory American United Life insurance coverage of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
- 2. All unit members who are eligible for health and welfare benefits shall have mandatory group disability (income protection) coverage beginning on October 1, 1986.

# B. Optional Coverages

- 1. Unit members, at their option, may select health coverage from the providers administered by CalPERS Health Program for themselves, or for themselves and their dependents. Effective January 01, 2003, the Riverside Employer-Employee Partnership for Benefits (REEP) will replace CalPERS for medical insurance coverage for Classified unit members.
- 2. Unit members, at their option may select membership in MetLife Dental
  Plan or Reach the Tooth Dental Plan, or Reach the Tooth Gold Dental
  Plan, or Delta Dental-Delta Care for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.
- 3. Unit members, at their option, may select American United Life or

- Insurance Company of North America/CSEA life insurance for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.
- 4. Unit members, at their option, may select a supplemental American Fidelity income protection plan.
- 5. Unit members at their option, may select membership in Safeguard Vision Plan or Vision Service Plan for themselves or for themselves and their dependents.

# Section 3 - Deductions and Payments.

Any necessary deductions authorized by unit members shall be deducted from September through June payrolls.

# Section 4 - Insurance Period.

- 1. District Health and Welfare benefit insurance policies (with the exception of medical insurance) are in effect from October 1 through the following September 30.
- 2. District Health and Welfare benefit medical insurance policies Blue Cross California Care C1 and Kaiser are in effect October 01, 2001 through December 31, 2001. Effective January 1, 2002, District Health and Welfare benefit medical insurance by CalPERS shall be in effect January 1 through December 31, 2002.
- 3. District Health and Welfare benefit medical insurance through the Riverside Employer-Employee Partnership for Benefits (REEP) shall be in effect from January 01, 2003 through June 30, 2006.

# Section 5 - Special Conditions.

Subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carriers, the following special conditions are available to unit members.

A. The optional coverages of the prior year are automatically continued for each qualified unit member. Adjustment of any necessary payroll deductions will automatically be made to reflect rate changes and/or a change in the amount of

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District contribution.

- B. A unit member who was qualified the prior year but elected no optional insurance coverage may initiate such coverage during the designated sign-up periods.
- C. A new unit member may select optional health and welfare benefits within the first thirty (30) days of employment.
- D. A unit member may discontinue optional Health and Welfare benefits and any related payroll deductions at any time.
- E. Newly authorized or discontinued deductions will be processed on the next payroll occurring fifteen (15) or more days after written notice by the unit member. Insurance coverage becomes effective on the first of the month following the first payroll deduction.
- F. In the event a unit member is granted a long-term unpaid leave of absence to perform paid duties for the District in a non-bargaining unit position, the unit member's health and welfare benefits shall continue for the duration of the leave unless duplicated in the non-unit position.
- G. Unit members who are absent because of illness and who have exhausted their accumulated paid leave shall continue to receive full insurance coverage paid by the District for that period of illness not to exceed twelve (12) months following exhaustion of said leave.
- H. Unit members hired after January 15, 2001 may decline any optional coverage(s) by signing a District waiver form subject to any requirement to provide proof of insurance coverage. However, unit members hired after January 15, 2001 may not waive coverage if such action would hinder the District's ability to provide group insurance coverage as determined by insurance providers.

# Section 6 - Unit Member Responsibility.

Each qualified unit member is responsible for initiating, revising, or discontinuing optional fringe benefits and authorizing any necessary related payroll deductions by

(K-1) Alm tour 5-21) Alm tour personally completing written forms in the District Business Office during regular working hours. Arrangements will be made to accommodate unit members whose work day is the same as that of the Business Office personnel.

# Section 7 - Cash Option.

Health and Welfare benefit money not expended on the unit member's other health and welfare coverage shall be available for cash payment at the unit member's option. Such cash payments shall be reduced by 4.27% to offset District costs associated with providing this benefit. Effective July 1, 2002, such cash payments shall be reduced by 4.27% 2.60%, to offset District costs associated with providing this benefit. Unit members hired after January 15, 2001 will not be afforded this option.

# Section 8 - Carriers and Coverages.

Specific carriers and coverages of all unit members' insurance plans paid by payroll deductions or specified Health and Welfare benefits shall be mutually agreed to by the Association and District. Requests by either party to change existing insurance plans must be made seventy-five (75) days prior to proposed implementation.

# Section 9 Life Insurance for Certain Part Time Unit Members

# A. Life Insurance.

Effective October 1, 1999 the District shall purchase a \$5,000 Life Insurance Policy for each permanent unit member whose regular hours equal or exceed fifteen (15) per week, and who are not covered by the mandatory insurance coverage referenced in Section 2 of this Article. Reasonable procedures for implementing this Section will be developed in the Business Office. This Section shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carrier(s).

# B. Medical Insurance.

Effective January 1, 2002 unit members hired on or after January 1, 1994 whose employment s regularly three (3) or fewer hours per day may purchase medical insurance subject to provisions and requirements of the insurance carrier(s).



# Section 9 – Life Insurance.

Effective October 1, 2002 the District shall provide at District expense, a \$10,000 Life Insurance Policy for each permanent unit member whose regular hours equal or exceed fifteen (15) per week. Reasonable procedures for implementing this Section will be developed in the District Business Office This Section shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carrier(s).

<u>Section 10 – Insurance for Certain Part-Time Unit Members.</u>

Effective January 1, 2002 unit members hired on or after January 1, 1994 whose employment is regularly three (3) or fewer hours per day may purchase medical insurance subject to the provisions and requirements of the insurance carrier(s).

# Section 10 11- Medical Coverage After Age 65.

- A. Effective January 1, 2002 CalPERS shall become the medical insurance carrier for retired unit members. All PERS retired unit members may purchase medical coverage in accordance with the provisions and requirements of the CalPERS Health Program.
- B. Effective January 1, 2003, the Riverside Employer-Employee Partnership for Benefits (REEP) will replace CalPERS as the medical insurance carrier for retired unit members. All retired unit members may purchase medical coverage in accordance with the provisions and requirements of REEP.
- B. In the event CalPERS is not the carrier, unit members retiring after June 30, 1991 shall be eligible to continue to purchase coverage in a District group medical insurance plan after reaching the age of 65, provided that these conditions exist:
  - 1. The retiree has been employed in the District for no less than ten (10) years.
  - 2. The plan carrier allows such participation.
  - 3. The retiree is otherwise eligible for enrollment in the plan.
  - 4. The entire cost of such coverage shall be paid by the retiree.
- C. Unit members retiring after June 30, 1991 shall be eligible to continue to purchase

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coverage in a District group medical insurance plan after reaching the age of 65, provided that these conditions exist:

- 1. The retiree has been employed in the District for no less than ten (10) years.
- 2. The plan carrier allows such participation.
- 3. The retiree is otherwise eligible for enrollment in the plan.
- 4. The entire cost of such coverage shall be paid by the retiree.

# Section 11 12 - District Responsibility.

The District's full and complete obligations under this Article are limited to payment of the premiums through payroll deduction as indicated above and assisting unit members in resolving problems with carriers.

However, it is expressly understood that all terms and conditions of the various programs available pursuant to this Article are the insurance carriers' responsibility. Therefore, all disputes with respect to the carriers' administrations of such programs are not the responsibility of the District, and are not subject to the grievance procedure(s) in this Agreement.

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# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN CALIFORNIA SCHOOL EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION AND JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Parties acknowledge that the actual cost to the District to implement Health and Welfare plans for other employee groups for the 2001-2002 fiscal year may exceed the District contribution. In the event that this occurs and the District pays to offset increased insurance rates for any employee group, this would result in an additional benefit to that employee group. In the event that this occurs, the Parties agree to extend similar benefit to the Classified Bargaining Unit by use of the following formula.

Any overage amount will be determined on June 30, 2002 or upon Board ratification of agreements with all other employee groups for the 2001-2002 fiscal year, whichever is later. The overage will then be divided by the number of Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees within that employee group and the resulting amount per FTE will be multiplied by the number of qualifying classified bargaining unit members on a pro-rated basis, pursuant to Article 17 of the Agreement. The resulting amount will be held in a CSEA Health and Welfare benefit account to be used beginning July 1, 2002 for qualified unit members as defined by Article 17.

It is further agreed, this Memorandum of Understanding is not applicable to any classified employee hired on or after July 1, 2002.
