#### 1. Recognition

a. Recognize Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District's 3<sup>rd</sup> of July Celebration (Mr. Edmunds)

Mr. Dan Rodriguez, General Manager for the Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District (JARPD), requested to be present this evening to thank District administration and the Board of Education for their support of JARPD's 3<sup>rd</sup> of July Community Celebration 2002. The District provided the use of the open grassy area at Jurupa Middle School as well as parking facilities at the Education Center. According to Mr. Rodriguez, the use of the school grounds was a tremendous help in making the event enjoyable for the community, and he wishes to express his appreciation for the District's assistance in this collaborative effort. #### \* b. Recognize Receipt of Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute Grant Award (Dr. Mason)

The district has been notified that a local assistance grant for the Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute (CTEI) Program has been awarded in the amount of \$43,000. #### **HEARING SESSION**

### I. Hold Public Hearing on Intent to Adopt Increased Statutory School Facility Fees (Level I Fees) (Mr. Bowers)

In January 2002, the State Allocation Board authorized an inflation increase in statutory school facilities fees, also known as "Level I Fees", levied pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 et seq. of nine cents per square foot on new residential construction, and one cent per square foot on new commercial/industrial construction. Our current Level I Fees are \$2.05 per square foot on new residential construction and \$0.33 per square foot for commercial/industrial.

David Taussig & Associates, Public Finance and Planning Consultant, prepared a "School Fee Justification Study," to update both the residential and commercial/industrial statutory school facilities fees which substantiates the continuing need to collect such fees in the maximum allowable amount. Both the residential and commercial/industrial Fee Justification Studies are available for review in the office of the Director of Facility Planning and Development.

The purpose of this public hearing is to receive input and testimony on levying Level I Fees as proposed in Resolution 03/04, which would adjust the fee from the current \$2.05 to \$2.14 per square foot on new residential construction and from the current \$0.33 to \$0.34 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction.

President Mary Burns should formally open and close the public hearing on this matter. The Board will consider action on the Resolution under Agenda Item C, #03/04 Establishing and Adopting "Increasing Statutory School Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development."

#### II. Hold Public Hearing on Intent to Adopt Level II and Level III Alternative School Facility Fees

(Mr. Bowers)

The District currently levies Level I Developer Fees in the amount of \$2.05 per square foot. Under current law, the District may levy a higher Level II fee if certain conditions are met and the amount of the fee is justified.

David Taussig & Associates, consulting firm, prepared a School Facilities Needs Analysis, which provides the required justification for the District's eligibility to levy Level II and Level III Fees. As required by the law, the District satisfied two (2) of the four (4) requirements. (1) At least 20% of the teaching stations within the School District are relocatable classrooms; and (2) the District has placed at least one (1) general obligation bond measure on the ballot in the last four (4) years, and the measure received at least 50% plus one (1) of the votes cast.

The purpose of this public hearing is to receive input and testimony on adopting alternative school facility fees as proposed in Resolution 03/05, specifically a Level II Fee in the amount of \$3.07 per square foot on new residential construction and a Level III Fee in the amount of \$6.14 per square foot for new residential construction in the event the State is no longer approving apportionments for new construction or there are no funds available.

President Mary Burns should formally open and close the public hearing on this matter. The Board will consider action on the Resolution under Agenda Item D, Resolution #03/05, Adopting a School Facilities Needs Analysis and Establishing and Adopting Alternative School Facility Fees.

\* 6. Certify Authorized Agents for Business Functions

(Mrs. Lauzon)

The County requires a list of Board members and school district employees authorized to transact various business functions for the school district. Several changes were made to the Authorized Agents list.

It is recommended the Authorized Agents list in the supporting documents be approved.

\*\* 7. Adopt 2002-03 "Student Discipline Handbook"

(Mr. Edmunds)

Included in the supporting documents for Board members is a copy of the September 2002 "Student Discipline Handbook". This handbook serves as the district's official Board Policy for matters of student discipline. Each time the handbook is revised, it is necessary for the Board to adopt the new revision. This revised edition is current with new legislation that pertains to student discipline matters. A copy of this handbook is provided to all certificated staff members per their contract as well as to parents whenever a student is recommended for expulsion by a school principal.

Administration recommends adoption of the 2002-2003 "Student Discipline Handbook."

- 8. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from AsCent Program (Dr. Mason) Mr. Richard Franz, Mr. Juan Salas, Mr. Ralph Garcia, and Mr. Chris Franz, AsCent Program coordinators at Jurupa and Mission Middle Schools, are requesting approval to spend Friday, August 9 through Sunday, August 11, 2002 with 100 students at the Rancho Jurupa Regional Park. Students, staff members, and parent volunteers will camp at the Regional Park; meals will be prepared in a co-op manner. The purpose of the trip is to celebrate the students' accomplishment during the summer. Costs for this event will be paid through the 21st Century Community Learning Center Grant; staff members and parent volunteers will provide supervision; and the student's family will provide Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this event due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request by Mr. Richard Franz, Mr. Juan Salas, Mr. Ralph Garcia, and Mr. Chris Franz to travel to the Rancho Jurupa Regional Park with 100 students August 9-11, 2002 to celebrate the students' accomplishment during the summer.
- Mr. Sam Gee, Rubidoux High School coach, is requesting approval to travel to Henderson, Nevada on Friday, September 13 through Sunday, September 15, 2002 with 35 students. The purpose of the trip is to participate in an annual Cross Country Invitational at Basic High School in Henderson, Nevada. Lodging for students will be at the Wild Wild West Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada; travel will be by district vehicles, costs will be paid through fundraisers and donations; and staff members will provide supervision. Administration has been assured that no eligible student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for thirty-five (35) Rubidoux High students to travel to Las Vegas, Nevada September 13-15, 2002 to participate in a Cross Country Invitational.
- \*10. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from Jurupa Valley High School
  Mr. Jeff Rhiner, teacher, and Ms. Pam Gates, Agriculture Assistant, Jurupa Valley High School, are requesting approval to travel to Louisville, Kentucky on Saturday, October 26 through Saturday, November 2, 2002. The purpose of the trip is to attend the 2002 National FFA Convention. Travel will be by airline and accommodations and meals are included in the registration fee. Costs will be paid for through the use of Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program funds. It is recommended that the Board approve the out-of-state travel request from Mr. Jeff Rhiner and Ms. Pam Gates to travel to Louisville, Kentucky October 26 through November 2, 2002 to attend the 2002 National FFA Convention.
- B. Adopt Resolution No. 03/03 In Support of Proposition 47, The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2002-2004 (Mr. Edmunds) Proposition 47 is on the November state Ballot. This Proposition is The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2002-2004. The Master Plan for Facilities for Schools in the Jurupa Unified School District is based upon matching \$58 million of our local Measure C bond funds with \$60 million of state funds. The availability of these state funds is dependent upon the passage of Proposition 47. Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 03/03 In Support of Proposition 47, The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2002-2004.

C. Adopt Resolution No. 03/04, Increasing Statutory School Facilities Fees (Level I Fees) Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development (Mr. Bowers)
The District currently assesses a school facilities fees ("Level I Fees") in the amount of \$2.05 per square foot on new residential construction and \$0.33 per square foot for commercial/industrial. In January 2002, the State Allocation Board authorized an inflation increase in the Level I Fees to \$2.14 per square foot for new residential construction and \$0.34 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction.

In order to increase fees to the new statutory level, the District must justify that the fee is reasonable, and demonstrate that it bears a relationship to impact new housing and commercial/industrial construction. The District retained David Taussig & Associates, a consulting firm, to update the current School Facilities Studies that establish a connection between new residential, commercial/industrial construction, and the need for new school facilities. The proposed increase of the fee to its statutory maximum bears a reasonable relationship to the need for new school construction. The fee justification studies are available for review in the office of the Director of Facility Planning and Development.

In order to collect the proposed increased Level I Fees, the Board would need to adopt Resolution #03/04 provided in the supporting documents. Even if the Board passes Resolution #03/05, it is still necessary for the Board to pass Resolution #03/04.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 03/04, Increasing Statutory School Facilities Fees (Level I Fees) Imposed on Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development.

### D. Adopt Resolution No. 03/05, Adopting School Facilities Needs Analysis and Establishing and Adopting Alternative School Facility Fees (Level II and Level III Fees) (Mr. Bowers)

The District retained David Taussig & Associates, a consulting firm, to prepare a School Facilities Needs Analysis that justifies the collection of alternative school facility fees. The School Facilities Needs Analysis demonstrates that Level II Fees in the amount of \$3.07 per square foot, and Level III Fees in the amount of \$6.14 per square foot are justified. Level III fees can only be charged when the State Allocation Board has declared there is no state money available for facilities. The School Facilities Needs Analysis has been available for public review for the last 45 days in the office of the Director of Facility Planning and Development and at the Glen Avon Regional Library. All statutory requirements, including notification to the County of Riverside Planning Commission, Local Building Associations and developers, as well as advertisement and public notice have been complied with. In order to collect the Alternative School Facility Fees, the Board would need to adopt a resolution such as Resolution No. 03/05 provided in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #03/05, Adopting a School Facilities Needs Analysis and Establishing and Adopting Alternative School Facility Fees.

E. <u>Approve Site Grant Expenditure Plan Revision for Jurupa Valley High</u> (Mrs. Lauzon) Jurupa Valley High School is requesting to revise their Site Grant spending plan to reallocate a portion of the funds set aside for benches (\$1,800.00) to purchase a portable sound system. The Jurupa Valley High School Site Council approved this expenditure revision.

Administration recommends approval of the revision for the Site Grant Expenditure Plan for Jurupa Valley High School.

#### F. Approve Purchase of One 7155 Konica Digital Copier for Pedley Elementary School

(Mrs. Lauzon)

Pedley Elementary School requests the purchase of one 7155 Konica digital copier with 128MB memory. Funding for the equipment will come from Title I funds. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #42677 to Burtronics in the amount of \$16,382.31 (including tax) for the purchase of one 7155 Konica Digital Copier for Pedley Elementary School.

### G. Approve Purchase of One Thomas 84-Passenger Saf-T Liner Bus for the Transportation Department (Mr. Edmunds)

Currently, District buses are full on most routes, and there are several new developments, either recently completed, or in some phase of building. Due to these circumstances, additional routes and at least one new bus are needed. The District is able to take advantage of state grant money and trade in six buses netting an additional cost of \$60,138.91.

The Transportation Department requests the purchase of one Thomas 84-passenger Saf-T Liner bus and will use the following buses as trade-ins:

The cost of the new bus is \$130,138.91 (including tax) and the value of the trade-in buses is \$20,000.00. Also, the District will receive \$50,000.00 from MSRC funds for the purchase of this bus; therefore, the District's cost for the bus is \$60,138.91 (including tax), which will be paid for by a five-year finance/ownership lease with Baystone Financial Group. General Fund monies will be used to make lease payments.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #42451 for the purchase of one Thomas 84-passenger Saf-T Liner school bus to California Bus Sales in the amount of \$60,138.91 (including tax) and approve the trade-in of 6 buses for a total value of \$20,000.00. Additionally, administration recommends the Board approve a five-year finance/ownership lease in the amount of \$60,138.91 (including tax) with Baystone Financial Group.

#### H. Review and Act on Timely School Facility Matters

#### 1. Award Bid #03/02L, Replacement of Roofing at Two District Sites

(Mr. Bowers)

At its March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2002 Meeting, the Board authorized Administration to advertise for bids for summer projects. One of the projects was for replacement of roofing at two sites: Rustic Lane Elementary School and Rubidoux High School.

On July 16, 2002 bids were received and publicly opened for Bid #03/02L, Replacement of Roofing at Two District Sites. Bid documents were delivered to eight (8) prospective bidders and responses were received from the three (3) bidders listed below. This project will be funded from the **State Deferred Maintenance Fund.**

Administration recommends the Board award Bid #03/02L, Replacement of Roofing at Two District Sites to Bell Roofing in the amount of \$209,267.00.

#### 2. Award Bid #03/01L, Exterior Painting at Four District Sites

(Mr. Bowers)

At its March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2002 Meeting, the Board authorized Administration to advertise for bids for summer projects. One of the projects was for exterior painting at four sites: Glen Avon, Pedley, and Stone Avenue Elementary Schools; and the Learning Center at Rubidoux High School. The bids were initially rejected due to irregularities in the bid process. The project was bid again.

On July 16, 2002 bids were received and publicly opened for Bid #03/01L, Exterior Painting at Four District Sites. Bid documents were delivered to nine (9) prospective bidders and responses were received from the eight (8) bidders listed below. This project will be funded from the **State Deferred Maintenance Fund.**

Administration recommends the Board award Bid #03/01L, Exterior Painting at Four District Sites to Painting & Décor in the amount of \$117,390.00.

3. Authorize Lease of One Portable Classroom

(Mr. Bowers)

The Board authorized the lease of eight portable classrooms on June 17, 2002, due to growth in the District. An additional Department of Housing (DOH) approved portable classroom is needed at Jurupa Valley High School for their Agriculture Vocational Education program for the start of school in September.

The building is available for a short-term lease from Williams Scotsman, Inc. through a piggyback bid with the Beardsley School District of Bakersfield, California. The classroom is in stock and available at their Riverside branch. The short-term lease will save considerable money as compared to the cost of purchasing the building. The cost of the building is \$450.00 (plus tax) per unit per month for 24-months; the cost of handicap ramps is \$150.00 (plus tax) per ramp per month plus a one-time delivery and pick-up charge including installation and knockdown charges of \$9,152.12 per unit.

Jurupa Valley High School Agriculture Vocational Education Grant funds will contribute \$11,655.00, with the balance of approximately \$13,000.00 to be paid from other Agriculture funds of Jurupa Valley High School.

Administration recommends that the Board of Education authorize the lease of one portable classroom from Williams Scotsman, Inc. through the Beardsley School District of Bakersfield, California, bid at a cost of \$450.00 (plus tax) per unit per month, \$150.00 (plus tax) per ramp per month, plus a one-time charge of \$9,152.12 per unit, for a total cost of \$24,668.12.

4. Review and Act on Other Timely School Facility Matters

#### J. Review Routine Information Reports

\* 1. Review Report on 2001/2002 Inter/Intradistrict Attendance Permits (Mr. Edmunds) The 2001/2002 Intradistrict (Open Enrollment) Attendance Permit Summary provides information on incoming and outgoing transfers within the District, and the number of students involved at each school. Total students involved in district open enrollment transfers were 1,478.

The 2001/2002 Interdistrict Attendance Permit Summary provides information on outgoing and incoming transfers to and from other districts, reasons for the transfers, number of students involved, and identifies the school districts participation in this cooperative venture. Total students involved in interdistrict transfers were 414 into the district and 523 out of the district. Information only.

2. Review Report on 2001/2002 Saturday School (Mr. Edmunds) The Jurupa Unified School District operated the Saturday School program during the 2001-2002 school year at Rustic Lane and Van Buren Schools for elementary students and Jurupa Valley High School and the Learning Center for middle and high school students. Students were assigned Saturday School in lieu of suspension and were able to clear truancies and unexcused absences when they attended.

This year, Saturday School cleared 2,290 days for students who were assigned to Saturday School in lieu of suspension. The amount to be reimbursed to the District for 2,290 days X \$25.77 per ADA amounts to \$59,013.30. The ADA recovered by using Saturday School for truancies and unexcused absences was 1,464 days X \$25.77 ADA, which amounts to \$37,727.28. Information only.

The Administrator of Education Technology reported that the District received notification concerning a \$26,000 grant award for Ina Arbuckle Elementary School through the Technology Literacy Challenge Grant 2002 Part B program. The funds are to be used to purchase computers to lower the student-to-computer ratio in 4 <sup>th</sup> – 8 <sup>th</sup> grade classrooms to a 10-1 ratio or lower or on curriculum based software.

Mr. Knight requested the Deputy Superintendent to confirm the amount of \$14.01 as the donation amount from Pipe Vine, Inc.
HEAR REPORT ON DISTRICT MATH TEACHER CREDENTIALING	Ms. Ellen French, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services, explained that at the request of Mr. Knight she prepared the report in the supporting documents indicating the number of fully credentialed mathematics teachers at the secondary level (51, or 88%) vs. mathematics teachers with an emergency credential (7). She noted that the report indicates a high level of competency for the District's mathematics teachers. Ms. French commented to Mr. Knight that having 100% fully credentialed mathematics teachers, although being the goal of the District, is not necessarily a contributing factor to increasing test scores. She pointed out that the District has developed standards, focused curriculum, staff development, and an emphasis on basic skills to assist in raising the District's test scores in mathematics and all other areas. The Superintendent responded that the proposed changes to graduation requirements are an added measure to emphasize mastering basic math skills. In addition, the District's administrative staff is working diligently to continue to find ways to assist students in passing the High School Exit Exam.
HEAR REPORT ON LEVEL I, II, AND III DEVELOPER FEES	Mr. Greg Bowers, Director of Facility Planning and Development, explained that the purpose of collecting Developer Fees is to pay for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, fee justification studies, conducting a School Facilities Needs Analysis, administrative costs to collect the Developer Fees, or related expenditures to accommodate enrollment growth. Typical Developer Fee expenditures include the costs for relocatable classrooms or new school facilities.

HEAR REPORT ON LEVEL I, II, AND III DEVELOPER FEES (CONTINUED)	The Director reviewed that current Level I Developer fees for residential units are \$2.05 per square foot and \$0.33 per square foot for commercial/industrial fees. A justification study was recently completed in order to allow the District to collect the maximum allowable fees, \$2.14 per square foot for residential units and \$0.34 per square foot for commercial/industrial. Additionally, with the recent passage of the local bond in November, the District is eligible to collect Level II fees at \$3.07 per square foot and Level III Alternative School Fees at \$6.14 per square foot if the state runs out of funds. Mr. Bowers indicated that a Public Hearing would be conducted at the August 5, 2002 meeting to request that the three fee levels be implemented. If adopted, the effective date for the new Level I rate is October 4, 2002, and the effective date for Level II (while the State has bond funds) and Level III rates (once the State declares there are no bond funds) is August 6, 2002 through August 5, 2003.  The Board participated in a question and answer session concerning the proposed changes to Developer Fees. The Director noted for the Board that the Needs Analysis identified that four new schools are necessary to accommodate growth in the area, a 3 <sup>rd</sup> high school, a 4 <sup>th</sup> middle school, and elementary schools 17 and 18. Mr. Bowers explained during this session that it is highly unlikely that the District would be in a position to collect Level III fees; however, it is important to have the amount in place should the State declare no

	President Burns thanked Mr. Bowers for his informative report and asked the Superintendent why an increase in Developer Fees had not been requested for some time? The Superintendent responded that up until the passage of the Measure C bond, the District did not meet all of the requirements to qualify for an increase.
PUBLIC VERBAL	President Burns opened the Public Verbal Comments session.
COMMENTS  REQUEST FOR REVIEW  OF POLICY	Ms. RaeAnn Magnon, teacher, requested the Board to consider amending the current Board Policy regarding the use of videos in classrooms relating to the curriculum. She stated that currently, teachers are only allowed to show "G" rated videos; however, she gave a recent example of how a "PG" rated movie related to the curriculum but could not be shown due to its rating. She explained that if the amendment is made, it could also include a clause indicating that a "PG" rated movie could be shown only with the permission of the Principal and parental approval. The Superintendent responded that he would follow-up on her request for a review of this policy.
BOARD MEMBER REPORTS & COMMENTS	Mr. Chavez reported that the ad hoc School District/Park District committee met on July 12 to discuss a proposed Master Plan for the property from Jurupa Road to Agate at Pedley Road. ### RESOLUTION #03/03 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT IN SUPPORT OF PROPOSITION 47 THE KINDERGARTEN-UNIVERSITY PUBLIC EDUCATION FACILITIES BOND ACTS OF 2002-2004

WHEREAS, California public education is being called upon to prepare students for an increasingly competitive global economy where knowledge and innovation, achieved through education, are vital to societal and economic success; and,

WHEREAS, California's system of public education is in desperate need of repairs, renovations, improvements and updates in classrooms, libraries, laboratories and other basic facilities if California students are to receive the education they need and deserve; and,

WHEREAS, decisive action is needed to meet these urgent needs; and,

WHEREAS, The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004 will provide \$25.3 billion in badly needed support for California public education from kindergarten through university level; and,

WHEREAS, Legislation authorizing The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004 will be divided between two statewide ballots - a \$13 billion general obligation bond measure on the November 5, 2002 ballot and an additional \$12.3 billion bond measure on the March 2004 ballot; and,

WHEREAS, Legislation authorizing the Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004 received overwhelming bipartisan support in the California Legislature and was signed by the Governor; and,

WHEREAS, In addition to providing much-needed funding of K-12 education, The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004 would provide \$1.65 billion in 2002 and \$2.3 billion in 2004 for the University of California, the California State University and the California Community Colleges; and,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that in view of the manifest needs of California public education from kindergarten through university level, the Jurupa Unified School District's Board of Education offers its strong endorsement and support of The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004;

AND THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Jurupa Unified School District's Board of Education urges all California voters to vote Yes on Proposition 47 on the November 5, 2002 ballot and vote as well in favor of The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Acts of 2002-2004 when the second part of the bond acts appears on the March 2004 ballot.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 03/04**

A RESOLUTION OF THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT INCREASING STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, the Governing Board ("Board") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("District") provides for the educational needs for students in grades K-12 within the unincorporated areas of Riverside County ("County"); and

WHEREAS, Education Code Section 17620 et seq. and Government Code Section 65995 authorize the governing board of any school district within the state of California ("State") to levy a fee against new residential, commercial and industrial development projects within the school district for the purpose of funding the construction and reconstruction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously adopted and imposed statutory school fees in the amounts of \$2.05 per square foot of new residential development and \$ .33 per square foot of new commercial and industrial development in accordance with the fee justification study previously adopted by the District ("Statutory School Fees"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65995(b)(3), the State Allocation Board, at its January 23, 2002 meeting, increased the maximum amount of the Statutory School Fees to \$2.14 per square foot of new residential development as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) and \$0.34 per square foot of new commercial and industrial development as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2); and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the school facilities of the District continue to operate at overcapacity and that the educational programs are seriously impacted by the increasing student population caused by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the boundaries of District; and SDPUBNDOHY265847



WHEREAS, new development continues to generate additional students for the District's schools and the District is required to accommodate such students; and

WHEREAS, the District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, including acquisition of school sites, construction of permanent school facilities, and interim school facilities to accommodate students generated from new development; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed, considered, and based its findings on the reports prepared by David Taussig & Associates entitled "Commercial/ Industrial Development School Fee Justification Study for Jurupa Unified School District" and "Residential Development School Fee Justification Study for Jurupa Unified School District ("Studies"), which analyzes the District's current school facilities, the estimated number of students which will be generated by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the District, and the estimated costs which will be required to construct permanent school facilities to accommodate the students generated by such new development; and

WHEREAS, the findings in the Studies demonstrate that the estimated costs of providing school facilities for students generated by new development will exceed the maximum amount of revenue which will be collected from Statutory School Fees levied pursuant to Education Code Sections 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995; and

WHEREAS, the Studies justify the District's imposition of Statutory School Fees on residential construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing student generation data for residential development projects and by demonstrating that new school facilities are necessary to accommodate increased enrollment resulting from such development; and

WHEREAS, the Studies further justify the District's imposition of Statutory School Fees on new commercial and industrial construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing specific categories of commercial and industrial development which were determined to impact the District's school facilities based upon the square footage of the construction, the



anticipated number of employees and the number of new students generated by such employees; and

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the students, teachers, parents and electorate of the District that the Statutory School Fees levied by the District under Education Code Sections 17620, 17623 and Government Code Section 65995 be increased to \$2.14 per square foot of new residential development and \$0.34 per square foot of new commercial/industrial development; and

WHEREAS, the Statutory School Fees levied against new residential, commercial and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to accommodate students generated from such new development, including but not limited to, acquisition of new school sites, remodeling of existing school facilities, acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related facilities in accordance with Education Code Section 17620; and

WHEREAS, the Studies have been reviewed by the Board and District staff in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and

WHEREAS, no city or county may issue a building permit for any new residential, commercial or industrial development within the District absent a certification by the District of compliance by the owner/developer with the requirements regarding school facilities fees as set forth in Education Code Section 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995; and

WHEREAS, the appropriate land use jurisdictions will be notified of the adoption of the Study and the increased Statutory School Fees levied by the District; and

WHEREAS, the District (1) has made available to the public, at least ten (10) days prior to its public meeting, the Studies and data indicating the estimated cost required to provide the service for which the increased Statutory School Fees are levied and the revenue sources anticipated to provide the service as demonstrated in the Studies; (2) has mailed notice at

least fourteen (14) days prior to this meeting to all interested parties who have requested in writing notice of adoption of a fee justification study for the levy of Statutory School Fees pursuant to Government Code Section 65995; and (3) has held a duly noticed, regularly scheduled public meeting at which oral and written testimony was received regarding the Study and the proposed increase in Statutory School Fees.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board has reviewed the Studies and hereby adopts the findings contained therein.

Section 2. The Board increases the Statutory School Fees levied against all new residential development and additions resulting in an increase of assessable space in excess of five hundred (500) square feet pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 and Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) to an amount of \$2.14 per square foot.

Section 3. The Board increases the Statutory School Fees levied against all new commercial and industrial development to \$0.34 per square foot as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2).

Section 4. The Board has reviewed the Studies and finds, based upon the Studies, information and testimony presented in conjunction therein, as follows:

Section 4.1. New residential, commercial and industrial development will result in a substantial increase in student enrollment which will require the District to provide additional school facilities to accommodate new growth, and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the District's Statutory School Fees, which are necessary to fund the construction and reconstruction of school facilities to accommodate such new growth, and the types of development on which the Statutory School Fees will be imposed.

Section 4.2. New residential, commercial and industrial development will result in a substantial increase in student enrollment which will require the District to provide additional school facilities and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the District's need for new and reconstructed school facilities and the types of development on which the Statutory School Fees will be imposed.

<u>Section 4.3</u>. Statutory School Fees levied on new residential, commercial and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to serve students generated from such development.

Section 5. The Board finds that a separate account has been established for the deposit of Statutory School Fee revenue collected from residential and commercial/industrial development and that said account has at all times since been separately maintained, except for temporary investments, from other funds of the District.

Section 6. The Board finds that the funds of the account, described in Section 5, consisting of the proceeds of Statutory School Fees have been imposed for the purposes of constructing and reconstructing those school facilities necessitated by new residential and commercial/industrial development, and that, these funds may be expended for those purposes. The Statutory School Fee revenue may also be expended by the District for the costs of performing any study or otherwise making the findings and determinations required under subdivisions (a), (b), and (d) of Section 66001 of the Government Code. In addition, the District may also retain, as appropriate, an amount not to exceed in any fiscal year, three percent (3%) of the Statutory School Fee revenue collected in that fiscal year pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 for reimbursement of the administrative costs incurred by the District in collecting the Statutory School Fees.



Section 7. The Board hereby establishes a process that provides the party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed an opportunity for a hearing to appeal the imposition of Statutory School Fees on a commercial/industrial development project as required by Education Code Section 17621(e)(2). The appeal process is as follows:

Section 7.1. Within ten (10) calendar days of being notified, in writing, by personal delivery or deposit in the U.S. Mail, of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees to be imposed on a particular commercial/industrial project, or within ten (10) calendar days of paying the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees pursuant to Education Code Section 17620(a)(1)(A), a party shall file a written appeal with the District's Director of Facilities and Planning regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees. The party shall state in the written appeal the grounds for opposing the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees and the written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the Director of Facilities and Planning.

Section 7.2. The possible grounds for an appeal include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.

Section 7.3. The Director of Facilities and Planning, or his designee, shall render a written decision within thirty (30) calendar days following the receipt of the written appeal unless an extension is agreed to by both parties. The Director of Facilities and Planning, or his designee, shall deliver the written decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the party.

Section 7.4. The party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed may appeal the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board. Any appeal to the Board must be filed within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the Director of Facilities and Planning's written decision.

Section 7.5. The party appealing the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board, shall state in the written appeal to the Board the grounds for opposing the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision. The written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the President of the Board.

Section 7.6. The possible grounds for an appeal of the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.

Section 7.7. Within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written appeal of the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board regarding

the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees, the Board Secretary or his designee, shall give notice in writing of the date, place and time of the hearing before the Board, to the party appealing the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision. The Board shall notice and conduct said hearing at the next available regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the appealing party is given notice at least five (5) calendar days prior to the meeting of the Board. The Board shall render a written decision on the appeal within thirty (30) calendar days following the Board's hearing on the party's appeal, and serve the Board's decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the appealing party.

Section 7.8. The party appealing the imposition of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees shall bear the burden of establishing that the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are improper.

Section 8. No statement or provision set forth in this Resolution, or referred to herein shall be construed to repeal any preexisting fee previously imposed by the District on any residential or nonresidential development.

Section 9. The Board finds and determines that the adoption or imposition of Statutory School Fees in accordance with Government Code Section 65995 is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Code Section 17621(a).

Section 10. District staff is directed to file a Notice of Exemption with the Riverside County Clerk's Office.

Section 11. District staff is hereby instructed to work with the appropriate land use jurisdictions to ensure compliance with Education Code Section 17620(b), which provides

(C P3.8)

that no city or county may issue a building permit for any development project within the District

without certification by the District of compliance by that development project with the school

facilities fee requirements of this Resolution. The Board determines that Statutory School Fees

are not subject to Government Code Section 66007, and that a Certificate of Compliance is

required, prior to the issuance of any building permit.

Section 12. District staff is hereby instructed to transmit certified copies of this

Resolution, accompanied by all relevant supporting documentation including the Studies and a

map of the boundary area of the District subject to the Statutory School Fees, to all appropriate

land use jurisdictions issuing building permits within the District, informing each of them of the

District's current school facilities fee for development projects.

Section 13. The Statutory School Fees designated herein shall take effect sixty

(60) days from the date of this Resolution.

SECTIONS 65995.5, 65995.6, AND 65995.7

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Jurupa Unified School District (ABoard@) has elected to participate in the school facilities funding program established pursuant to the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (AAct@) for both modernization and new construction projects; and

WHEREAS, under the Act, the Board may establish fees to offset the cost of school facilities made necessary by new construction following the making of certain findings; and

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Unified School District (ADistrict@) has undertaken a review of its eligibility to establish fees under the Act; and

WHEREAS, the District has prepared an analysis entitled ASchool Facilities Needs Analysis for Consideration of Alternative School Facility Fees,@ dated June 17, 2002 (the ANeeds Analysis@) for purposes of adopting alternative school facility fees pursuant to Government Code Sections 65995.5 (ALevel II Fee@) and 65996.7 (ALevel III Fee@) (collectively referred to as AAlternative School Facility Fees@) in accordance with applicable law; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65352.2(c), the Board has notified and provided copies of relevant and available information, including the proposed Needs Analysis relating to the potential expansion of existing school sites or the necessity to acquire additional school sites to the planning commissions with land use jurisdiction within the District at least 45 days prior to completion of the Needs Analysis, and has otherwise complied with the requirements of that Section; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed and considered the Needs Analysis which includes all of the findings required by applicable law, including an analysis of the purpose of the Alternative School Facility Fees and the reasonable relationship between the Alternative School

(Pari

Facility Fees and the need for new school facilities to accommodate students generated from new residential construction; and

WHEREAS, the District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, including acquisition of school sites, construction of permanent school facilities, and interim school facilities to accommodate students generated from new development; and

WHEREAS, the Board has satisfied all of the requirements of Government Code Section 65995.5 to be eligible to establish and levy fees pursuant to the Act; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Government Code Sections 65995.5, 65995.6 and 65995.7, the purpose of this Resolution is to adopt a Needs Analysis and to establish and levy fees under the provisions of the Act consistent with the information and data set forth in the Needs Analysis and upon such other information and documentation prepared by or on file with the District, as presented and described to the Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct.
- Section 2. <u>Procedure</u>. The District has complied with all applicable notice, public review, and hearing requirements necessary to adopt the Needs Analysis and establish and levy fees under the Act. Specifically:
- (a) Prior to the adoption of this Resolution, the Board conducted a public hearing to adopt the Needs Analysis at its August 5, 2002 regular meeting, at which time all persons desiring to comment on the Needs Analysis were heard and all information was duly considered.
- (b) Notice of the time and place of the public hearing, including the location and procedure for viewing or requesting a copy of the proposed Needs Analysis and any proposed revision of the Needs Analysis, has been published in a newspaper of general circulation in accordance with Government Code Section 65995.6(d), and a notice, including a statement that the Needs Analysis required by Government Code Section 65995.6 was available, was mailed at least 30 days prior to the public hearing to any interested party who had previously filed a written request with the District for mailed notice of the meeting on new or increased fees or service charges within the period specified by law.
- (c) At least 30 days prior to the public hearing, the District made available to the public in its Needs Analysis, data indicating the amount of the costs, or estimated costs, required to provide the facilities for which the fee is to be levied pursuant to this Resolution, and the revenue sources anticipated to provide this service.

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- (d) Copies of the Needs Analysis have been provided to all local agencies responsible for land use planning within the District=s boundaries for their review and comment in compliance with Government Code Sections 65352.2(c) and 65995.6(c), and the Board has responded to any written comments it has received regarding the Needs Analysis.
- (e) By way of a public meeting, the Board received oral and written presentations by District staff which are summarized and contained in the District's Needs Analysis and the District's applications and related documents filed with the State Allocation Board in accordance with relevant law, along with materials which formed the basis for the action taken pursuant to this Resolution.
- Section 3. <u>Findings</u>. The Board has reviewed the provisions of the Needs Analysis as it relates to proposed and potential development, the resulting school facilities needs, the cost thereof, and the available sources of revenue including the fees provided by this Resolution, and based thereon and upon all other written and oral presentations to the Board, the Board hereby approves and adopts the Needs Analysis and makes the following findings:
- (a) Enrollment at the various District schools is presently at or exceeding capacity;
- (b) Additional development projects within the District, whether new residential construction or residential reconstruction involving increases in habitable area will increase the need for school facilities;
- (c) Without the addition of new school facilities, further residential development projects within the District will result in a significant decrease in the quality of education presently offered by the District;
- (d) New residential development is projected within the District's boundaries and the enrollment produced thereby will exceed the capacity of the schools of the District. Projected development within the District, without additional school facilities, will result in conditions of overcrowding which will impair the normal functioning of the District's educational programs;
- (e) The fees proposed in the Needs Analysis and levied pursuant to this Resolution are for the purpose of providing adequate school facilities and related support facilities to maintain the quality of education offered by the District;
- (f) The fees proposed in the Needs Analysis and levied pursuant to this Resolution will be used for construction and reconstruction of school facilities and support facilities as identified in the Needs Analysis;

- (g) The uses of the fees proposed in the Needs Analysis and levied pursuant to this Resolution are reasonably related to the types of development projects on which the fees are imposed;
- (h) The fees proposed in the Needs Analysis and levied pursuant to this Resolution bear a reasonable relationship to the need for school and support facilities created by the types of development projects on which the fees are imposed;
- (i) The fees proposed in the Needs Analysis and levied pursuant to this Resolution do not exceed the estimated amount required to provide funding for the construction of reconstruction of school and support facilities for which the fees are levied; and in making this finding, the Board declares that it has considered the availability of revenue sources anticipated to provide such facilities, including general fund revenue; and
- (j) The fees will be collected for school and support facilities for which an account has been established and funds appropriated and for which the District has adopted a construction schedule or in some instances, will be used to reimburse the District for expenditures previously made.

### Section 4. <u>Determination of Eligibility</u>.

- (a) The District has submitted a timely application to the State Allocation Board for new construction funding, and has met the eligibility requirements for new construction funding pursuant to the provisions of the Leroy F. Green School Facilities Act of 1998.
- (b) In accordance with Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(3)(B), the District has placed at least one general obligation bond measure on the ballot in the last four (4) years and received at least 50 percent plus one of the votes cast.
- (c) In accordance with Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(D), the District uses relocatable classrooms for at least 20% of its teacher stations.
- Section 5. Adoption of Needs Analysis. The Board has reviewed the provisions of the Needs Analysis along with such oral and written information as has been presented by District staff and consultants and has determined that the Needs Analysis meets the requirements of Government Code Section 65995.6 and is a suitable basis for the establishment of Level II and Level III fees in accordance with the provisions of Government Code Section 65995.5 and 65995.7, and hereby adopts the Needs Analysis.
- Section 6. <u>Determination and Establishment of Fees</u>. Based upon the foregoing findings, the Board hereby establishes and levies a new fee upon residential construction within the District, to be known as the ALevel II Fee@ and the ALevel III Fee@ as follows:



- (a) Level II Fees. The Level II Fee for new residential construction is hereby established and set at the rate of \$ 3.07 per square foot of residential development. The Level II Fee shall be collected as a precondition to the issuance of any building permit for construction within the District's boundaries.
- Section 65995.7, the District's Board is authorized to establish a fee in an amount higher than the Level II fee in the event the State Allocation Board is no longer approving apportionments for new construction in accordance with Education Code Section 17072.20 et seq. due to lack of funds, and the State Allocation Board has notified the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the Assembly, in writing, of the determination that such funds are no longer being allocated. In the event that on or before the Anniversary Date of this Resolution as defined below, the State Allocation Board is no longer approving apportionments due to inadequate funding and such fact is relayed to the appropriate state representatives, a fee calculated pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.7, the Level III fee, may be levied. The Level III Fee for residential construction is hereby established and set at the rate of \$ 6.14 per square foot of residential development.
- (c) The Level III Fee shall be placed in effect immediately by action of the Superintendent, without any additional action by the Board other than a determination by the Superintendent that the requirements of Government Code Section 65995.7 as outlined above have been met.
- Section 7. <u>Fee Adjustments and Limitations</u>. The fees established herewith shall be subject to the following:
- (a) The District's Level II Fee (or the Level III Fee when applicable) shall be effective for a period of one year following the effective date of this Resolution as set forth below and shall be reviewed annually to determine if such fee is to be re-established or revised.
- (b) The Level II Fee established hereby (or the Level III Fee when applicable) shall not apply during the term of any contract entered into between a subdivider or builder and the District, or any applicable city or county on or before January 1, 1987, that requires the payment of a fee, charge or dedication for the construction of school facilities as a condition to the approval of residential development.
- (c) The Level II Fee established hereby (or the Level III Fee when applicable) shall not apply during the term of any contract entered into between a person and the District or any applicable city or the County, after January 1, 1987 but before November 4, 1998 that requires payment of a fee, charge, or dedication for school facilities mitigation.
- (d) The Level II Fee established hereby (or the Level III Fee when applicable) shall not apply to any construction that is not subject to a contract such as described above, but that is carried out on real property for which residential development was made subject to a condition relating to school facilities imposed by a state or local agency in connection with a legislative act

D pg.5 approving or authorizing such residential development after January 1, 2000, such construction shall be subject to the Level II Fee or the Level III Fee as applicable.

- Section 8. <u>Additional Mitigation Methods</u>. The policies set forth in this Resolution are not exclusive, and the Board reserves the authority to undertake other or additional methods to finance school facilities including but not limited to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Government Code ' '53311, et seq.) and such other funding mechanisms as are authorized by Government Code Section 65996. This Board reserves the authority to substitute the dedication of land or other property or other form of mitigation requirement in lieu of the fees levied by way of this Resolution at its discretion, so long as the reasonable value of land to be dedicated does not exceed the maximum fee amounts contained herein or modified pursuant hereto.
- Section 9. <u>Implementation</u>. For construction projects within the District, the Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee, is authorized to issue Certificates of Compliance upon the payment of any fee levied under the authority of this Resolution.
- Section 10. <u>California Environmental Quality Act</u>. The Board hereby finds that, in accordance with Government Code Section 65995.6(g), the fees established pursuant to this Resolution are exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and hereby directs District staff to file a Notice of Exemption with the Office of the Riverside County Clerk.
- Section 11. <u>Effective Date</u>. The Board orders that the fees established hereby shall take effect immediately after adoption of this Resolution and shall be in effect for one (1) year.
- Section 12. <u>Notification of Local Agencies</u>. The Secretary of the Board or District staff designee is hereby directed to forward certified copies of this Resolution, accompanied by all relevant supporting documentation including the Needs Analysis, and a map of the boundary area of the District subject to the Level II Fees and Level III Fees, to all appropriate land use jurisdictions issuing building permits within the District, informing each of them of the District=s current school facilities fee for development projects.
- Section 13. <u>Severability</u>. If any portion of this Resolution is found by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be valid, such finding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution. The Board hereby declares its intent to adopt this Resolution irrespective of the fact that one or more of its provisions may be declared invalid subsequent hereto.
