a. Hear Report on No Child Left Behind Act

(Mr. Mendez)

On January 8, 2002, President Bush signed into law the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001, the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This legislation is based on four basic principles: (1) Increased accountability; (2) Expanded options for parents; (3) Increased flexibility; and (4) An emphasis on teaching methods based on scientific research. One of the more specific requirements for school districts under NCLB is informing parents of students attending Title I schools that they have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's teacher. In addition, districts having schools identified as Program Improvement schools, (schools not meeting their annual achievement growth targets for two consecutive years), must notify parents that they may, within certain guidelines, request to transfer their child to another public school with transportation provided, or obtain supplemental educational services for the child. Currently in the Jurupa Unified School District, only Glen Avon Elementary School has been identified as a Program Improvement school. The principal and staff along district administration have been working together to ensure that the necessary support and resources are provided to meet all requirements applicable to Program Improvement schools under the NCLB legislation. This evening Mr. Memo Mendez, Director of Research and Categorical Projects, will provide a brief overview on the major components of the No Child Left Behind law. Information only.

5. Adopt Resolution #03/09, Appropriations Limit to Article XIIIB of the California State Constitution (Mrs. Lauzon)

In November of 1979, California voters adopted Proposition 4, commonly called the Gann amendment. This amendment was incorporated into the State Constitution as Article XIIIB. It requires all public agencies, including school districts, to compute an appropriations limit each year, based on a formula provided by the State. The District limit changes each year, depending on increases in pupil attendance and the Consumer Price Index.

On October 15, 2001, the Board approved the calculation of the 2001-2002 appropriations limit based on estimated revenue and pupil attendance. At this time, the District is required to submit to the State for recalculation for 2001-2002, based on actual figures, and a calculation for 2002-2003, based on budget projections.

These appropriation limits, also known as the "Gann Limit," have to do with how much tax money the State may appropriate. They do not affect the amount of money the District may spend. The 2001-2002 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District was recalculated and decreased from \$90,032,789 to \$89,420,797; the 2002-2003 appropriations limit for Jurupa Unified School District is \$90,642,366. Calculations are shown in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board Adopt Resolution No. 03/09, Appropriations Limit for 2001-2002 and 2002-2003

B. Consider Date for Joint Board Meeting of the Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District and the Jurupa Unified School District (Mr. Edmunds)

During the past year, administrative staff and Board members from the School District and Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District have been meeting as an ad hoc committee to discuss master planning for the block where our respective district offices are located at the corner of Jurupa and Pedley Road as well as other issues of mutual interest. The significant issues for the School District concern the need to develop a Master Plan that allows for additional parking, contiguous access to our MOT facility, and a Food Service warehouse. The Park District issues concern their need for a Skateboard Park, improved Community Center, and equestrian facilities. We have also discussed the possibility of jointly developing improved ball fields and tennis courts on the Jurupa Middle School field.

The ad hoc School District/Park District Committee has made significant progress toward reaching consensus on a conceptual Block Master Plan. However, many details including more exact cost estimates and identification of available resources need to be addressed. The Committee believes that in order to move forward to implement the Plan and other possible joint projects, it may be desirable for the School District and Park District to consider a Joint Powers Agreement so that we can work together more effectively and cooperatively. The Committee has recommended a joint meeting of the Boards of the Park District and School District for the purpose of reviewing and discussing the conceptual plan as well as the possibility of a Joint Powers Agreement. The date of Monday, October 28, 2002 at 7:00 p.m. in the Education Center Board Room has been suggested for the date, time, and location for a joint Board meeting. Following discussion, Administration recommends that the Board set a date for a joint Board meeting between the Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District and the Jurupa Unified School District.

* C. Approve High School Instructional Materials for Review

(Dr. Mason)

The following instructional materials were reviewed and approved by the Instructional Council at a special meeting on September 23, 2002. The supporting documents contain information regarding the cost of the instructional materials, other instructional materials considered by the selection committees, and information regarding rationale for selection. These instructional materials will be available for public review at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon libraries for the time period specified in Board Policy 6200. After the thirteenday review period, the books will be presented to the Board for approval. The following textbooks have been reviewed and recommended for submittal by the Instructional Council:

** D. <u>Approve 2002-03 School Plans for Mira Loma Middle and Rustic Lane Elementary</u> Schools (Mr. Mendez)

Schools receiving categorical funds covered through the Consolidated Application Process are required to design programs for the use of these funds. The school plans for Mira Loma Middle School and Rustic Lane Elementary School have been updated to reflect information regarding student achievement and changes in priorities. Copies of these school-based coordinated plans have been presented to board members. All other school plans were approved at the September 3, 2002 Board meeting. Administration recommends that the Board approve the 2002-2003 school plans for Mira Loma Middle School and Rustic Lane Elementary School.

E. Approve 2001/02 Annual Report of Pupil Transportation and Program Cost Report

(Mr. Duchon/Mrs. Lauzon)

The District was recently notified that the State now requires the Annual Report of Pupil Transportation and Program Cost Report to be included for review and approval by the Board with the Unaudited Actuals. We were unaware of this requirement and the 2001/02 Unaudited Actuals were approved at the September 16, 2002 Board Meeting. Included in the supporting documents you will find the 2001/02 Annual Report of Pupil Transportation. The District received 2,364,295 from the State for transportation costs; expenses totaled \$3,659,932, which leaves an encroachment of \$1,295,637 on the District's General Fund. The total approved Transportation expense on the report includes direct costs, allocated direct support costs and indirect costs. The approved Home-School Transportation expense is \$2,521,729.72 and the Special Education Transportation expense is \$2,109,340.32. Also included is the 2001/02 Program Cost Report, which shows that our 2001/02 Indirect Cost Rate is 3.43%.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the 2001/02 Annual Report of Pupil Transportation and Program Cost Report to be filed with the County Office of Education.

F. <u>Approve Purchase of 15 OptiPlex GX240 Small Desktop Celeron Computers for Mission Bell Elementary School</u> (Mr. Duchon)

Mission Bell Elementary School requests the purchase of 15 OptiPlex GX240 small desktop computers with a Pentium 4 Processor, 1.8 GHz, 512 Cache, INT NIC and Sound. Funding for the equipment will come from II/USP funds (Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Programs) and will be "piggyback" purchased on the Los Angeles Unified School District Bid #70562. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve Purchase Order #43979 in the amount of \$15,468.00 (including tax) for the purchase of 15 OptiPlex GX240 small desktop computers for Mission Bell Elementary School.

G. Approve Purchase of 19 Dell Optiplex GX240 Computers for Indian Hills Elementary School (Mr. Duchon)

Indian Hills Elementary School requests the purchase of 19 Dell Optiplex GX240 small desktop Computers with Pentium 4, 1.8 GHZ, 512 Cache, INT NIC and Sound. Funding for the equipment will come from the School Site Bonus Award funds and will be "piggyback" purchased on Los Angeles Unified School District Bid #70562. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #43868 to Dell Computers in the amount of \$19,592.80 (including tax) for the purchase of 19 Dell desktop Computers for Indian Hills Elementary School.

Approve Variable Term Waiver Request State credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, Bilingual Education, Mathematics or Science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a vacancy for a Resource Specialist at Van Buren Elementary and an SDC teacher at Ina Arbuckle Elementary. The individuals being recommended are Ms. Kathy Crain and Ms. Janice McDermott. Ms. Crain holds a Professional Clear Multiple Subject credential and has worked as an elementary teacher in the Fontana School District for 16 years. She has had the desire for some time now to serve Special Education children. Ms. Crain is currently enrolled in the Special Education Credential program at National University and plans on completing her Special Education Credential by September 2003. Ms. McDermott earned her Bachelor's Degree from San Francisco State University in 1982 and has been a substitute teacher with Jurupa Unified School District since 1999. She is often requested by teachers to fill day-to-day substitute needs and has done very well. Recruitment efforts have not identified stronger candidates.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Ms. Kathy Crain and Ms. Janice McDermott be approved for employment through the end of this school year as a Resource Specialist and an SDC teacher under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.

HEAR PROGRESS REPORT – MIDDLE SCHOOL #4	The Director of Facility Planning and Development reviewed that over the last year, a Design Advisory Committee worked with the District's architect to develop a design for middle school #4. He introduced Mr. Bob Lavey and Mr. Dennis Roney, from the architectural firm of Perkins & Will, to provide a status report on the progress of middle school #4.
	Mr. Bob Lavey, from the architectural firm of Perkins & Will, indicated that the Design Advisory Committee participated in a lengthy process of working with his firm to keep the construction cost of middle school #4 at \$15 million, an 86,000 square foot structure, on 18.6 acres on Limonite and Felspar, with construction scheduled to begin in July 2003 and a completion date of January 2005. He commented that in considering the placement of buildings on this site, the prevailing wind factor was considered as well as public access identified off of Felspar. Mr. Lavey reviewed that the theme for this campus is "rancho" and grade-level courtyards to incorporate the history of Riverside. Mr. Roney reviewed pictures of classroom floor plans, lunch shelter, multi-purpose room, playing fields, locker rooms, a two-story building, roof forms that relate to the surrounding mountains, and the administrative building. He noted for the Board that the tower on top of the gymnasium would be used to draw air out and pull in the cool air to assist in ventilating the structure. In addition, there is an automatic system in classrooms to turn off air conditioners when windows are opened; the courtyards would be secure with security gates when the campus is not being used as well as a chain link fence installed around the perimeter of the grounds.
	Mr. Chavez requested the architects to consider placing parking areas by the playing fields to address the fields being used after school hours by students involved in various sports. Mr. Lavey and Mr. Roney presented the Board with a model of middle school #4 for viewing.

SELECT PROCESS FOR NAMING HIGH SCHOOL #3 -Motion #60 Following presentation by the Superintendent of four alternatives for selecting a name for high school #3, the Board determined to select a name by requesting input from a variety of organizations, such as the Bond Oversight Committee for Measure C, the PTA, and School Site Councils. From the list of suggestions submitted by the organizations and the list of names already listed on the Agenda, the Board would make the final selection for the name for high school #3.

MRS. ADAMS MOVED THE BOARD SELECT A NAME FOR HIGH SCHOOL #3 BY SEEKING INPUT FROM A VARIETY OF ORGANIZATIONS, SUCH AS THE BOND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE FOR MEASURE C, THE PTA, AND SCHOOL SITE COUNCILS. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION.

The Superintendent clarified that the Board would accept two suggestions submitted to the Superintendent's Office from each organization and individual School Site Council; however, the Board would make the final name selection of high school #3 at the second Board meeting in October.

HEAR REPORT ON GUIDANCE COORDINATOR PROGRAM

The Superintendent provided a comprehensive report on the Guidance Coordinator program to address questions raised by the Board during a preliminary report on August 5. He reviewed that one of the findings of the 1996-97 WASC Accreditation for Rubidoux High School was the absence of the use of school-wide personal learning plans within the guidance department. The WASC team recommended that Rubidoux High School develop a system or process by which all students would be provided with a comprehensive fouryear plan which would include important information regarding class scheduling, academic goals, testing, progress towards graduation and postgraduation. As a result of this recommendation, the Personal Learning Plan was developed (PLP) as a document to not only keep students updated on their academic progress, but their parents would receive a copy as well at an annual conference. Freshman entering Rubidoux in the 2000-01 school year were the first students initiated in the PLP four-year model, with sophomores and juniors receiving PLPs as well, reflecting their progress to that point. Superintendent referred to the packet of materials, "Guidance Coordinator Program Update," for a sample of the PLP along with a timeline for tracking credit deficiencies and student grades at Jurupa Valley High School that includes ongoing counseling contacts with students and parents during the school year. He also referred to the Guidance Calendar for Rubidoux High School to outline their plan for improving the Guidance Coordinator program by making sure students are aware of their services. In addition, an intervention screen would be added to each student's data screen to allow for better tracking of students.

- Gardner's Art Through the Ages is the standard textbook used at the colleges and universities for the art history course. The high schools that teach AP Art History should have textbook alignment with the colleges and universities.
- The present textbook is no longer on the AP list of suitable textbooks because it does not contain any information about non-Western art traditions which is an entirely new section that has been added to the AP History of Art curriculum. (See highlighted areas on attachments College Board page 5 and 6, and product description.)
- If AP Art History is to continue to be on the University of California A-G list to meet the Fine Arts requirement, we need to continue to meet the standards set by the University: out-of-date textbooks will not be acceptable.
- The present textbook is out of date, copyright 1991. *Gardner's Art Through the Ages* has a copyright date of 2001.
- The majority of the Advanced Placement test questions have been based on information from *Gardner's Art Through the Ages*.
- We will need new or additional textbooks for the school year 2002-03 because we (Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley High Schools) only have a few books and two sections of AP Art History are scheduled this year. Each student must be assigned their own book because of the heavy reading assignments for this class. In addition, the present book is no longer in print so it will be almost impossible to obtain additional copies of that book.
