The purpose of the trip is to provide an opportunity for sixth grade students to study sea life and animal behavior and training as a culmination activity for science. District vehicles will provide transportation; costs will be paid through PTA donations and School Improvement Funds; and staff members will provide supervision. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. B. <u>Approve Joining So Cal ReLiEF JPA for Comprehensive Property and Liability Insurance</u> (Mr. Duchon)

The District's comprehensive property and liability insurance expired on January 15, 2003. Administration arranged for interim coverage until the Board approves a contract for annual coverage. Talbot Insurance and Financial Services, the District's Insurance Broker of Record, has been aggressively marketing the district to prospective insurers nationwide since October 2002, in an effort to obtain affordable coverage. Talbot solicited quotes from the few companies that currently offer insurance to larger school districts. The quotes are as follows:

The district was aware that the re-insurance marketplace was such that the likelihood of multiple and competitive quotes for property & liability coverage was slim. In anticipation of an unfavorable market search, district administration solicited quotes from ASCIP JPA and So Cal ReLiEF JPA. Both JPA's offer property and liability coverage comparable to fully insured programs. JPA's are more competitive than fully insured programs in the "hard" market that the industry had entered prior to 9/11 and has accelerated since then. The quotes from ASCIP and So Cal ReLiEF are as follows:

So Cal ReLiEF JPA has 20 Riverside County School Districts and Colleges in its current membership of 63 member districts. Their quote has a property SIR of \$5,000 and a liability SIR of \$100,000 with an annual premium of \$283,150. ASCIP's quote is very close to SCR, but has a much higher SIR (\$100,000) for property.

Administration recommends that the Board approve joining the So Cal ReLiEF JPA for Comprehensive Property and Liability insurance coverage at a prorated cost of \$129,682 for the period January 15, 2003 through June 30, 2003.

C. Approve Purchase of Track and Field Equipment for Jurupa Valley High (Mr. Duchon)
School

Jurupa Valley High School requests the purchase of Track and Field equipment to furnish their stadium, which will provide the opportunity to host track and field events (for an itemized list of equipment, please see the supporting documents). Funding for this equipment will come from Redevelopment Funds. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval. The following are the quoted prices received.

Administration recommends the Board approve the issuance of Purchase Order #45807 to Sports Supply Group in the amount of \$25,294.49 (including tax) for the purchase of Track and Field equipment for Jurupa Valley High School.

D. Review and Act on School Facility Matters

* 1. Approve Architect Selection for Measure "C" Phase II Summer 2003 Projects (Mr. Bowers) To facilitate the design and construction of smaller projects throughout the District, Administration contacted two architectural firms to participate in oral interviews for the design of Measure "C" Phase II Summer 2003 projects as well as miscellaneous deferred maintenance and growth-related projects. The firms interviewed were Michael Merino and Associates (of Orange), and Higginson & Cartozian Architects, Inc. (of Redlands).

A questionnaire was developed and interviews conducted by Gregory Bowers, Director of Facility Planning and Development; Shelia Carpenter, Director of Central Support Services; Bill Elzig, Senior Building Inspector, and Jo Anne Farey, Administrative Secretary of Facility Planning and Development. The interviewing panel unanimously selected Higginson & Cartozian Architects, Inc. The architectural fees will be paid out of Measure "C" Bond funds. A fee schedule for the smaller projects is included in the supporting documents. Administration recommends the Board authorize the selection of Higginson & Cartozian Architects, Inc. to develop plans and specifications for the Measure "C" Phase II Summer 2003 projects, including but not limited to, the restrooms at twelve separate sites, a bus loop at Camino Real, miscellaneous repair projects, growth-related projects, and deferred maintenance projects, as required.

** E. Act on Student Discipline Cases

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

REVOKED - SUSPENDED EXPULSION

1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the March 19, 2001, Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #01-062 and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. Pupil violated Education Code Sections 48900 (i) and (k). The pupil will be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case will be referred to Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 16, 2003.

EXPULSIONS:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-062 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k), (.4) and 48915 (b1), (b2), (e1) and (e2) for the Spring Semester 2003 and Fall Semester 2003. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended for the Fall Semester 2003 and the pupil be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Spring Semester 2003. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed in June for educational placement, at Nueva Vista High School, for the Fall Semester 2003 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 2004.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #303-063 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b1) and (e1), for the Spring Semester 2003. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation for the term of the expulsion order. The pupil shall be assigned to the Independent Study Program, located at the Learning Center. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. ACCEPT 2001-02 AUDIT REPORT -Motion #174

The Deputy Superintendent reviewed that during the last fiscal year, the District was required to implement the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 34 (GASB 34) to report to the public the overall status of the District's financial health. Mr. Jeff Nigro from the auditing firm of Nigro, Nigro & White, LLP provided a summary of the completed audit of the financial statements for the Jurupa Unified School District for the year ended June 30, 2002 and addressed questions raised by the Board. He reviewed that his firm conducted their audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States to assess the accounting principles used. Mr. Nigro noted that the District was found to be in compliance in all areas, and as a result of this compliance an unqualified audit report has been issued. He commended Ms. Pam Lauzon, Director of Business Services, and her staff for their outstanding work to comply with GASB 34 requirements.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD ACCEPT THE 2001/02 AUDIT REPORT AND DIRECT THE AUDITOR TO PROVIDE COPIES TO STATE AND COUNTY AGENCIES AS REQUIRED BY LAW. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE CONTRACT FOR AUDITING SERVICES -Motion #175

The Deputy Superintendent reviewed that the firm of Nigro, Nigro & White LLP submitted the lowest proposal for auditing services over a three-year period, and now in their second year of service, the Board has the option to extend the contract another year based on their performance.

MR. TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE CONTRACT FOR AUDITING SERVICES WITH NIGRO, NIGRO AND WHITE LLP IN THE AMOUNT OF \$25,000 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002/03. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION. The Superintendent explained to Mr. Chavez that Nigro, Nigro & White submitted the lowest total bid for a three-year period since their services included GASB 34 requirements; whereas the three-year proposal from Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co would cost an additional \$12,000.00 for GASB 34 requirements. A VOTE WAS TAKEN, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

OPPOSE ABOLISHMENT OF TRUSTEE AREAS -Motion #176

The Deputy Superintendent noted that a written request to place an item on the Agenda to abolish Trustee Areas was received from a community member. He reviewed that when the Jurupa Unified School District was organized in 1963, in order to maintain the voice and representation of each area of the community, five trustee positions were allocated from the geographical areas, with two trustee positions representing the larger area of Rubidoux. In 1985, in order to address the disparities in the number of registered voters in the different trustee areas, the Rubidoux area was divided into Trustee Area 4 and 5; all Board members were elected every four years, and Board members continued to be required to live in the Trustee Area they represented. The Deputy Superintendent discussed the process to abolish trustee areas so that candidates residing anywhere in the District could run for any board seat. He reviewed the flowchart included in the supporting documents showing how a proposal is either initiated by a Governing Board or the County Committee, a Public Hearing must be held, the County determines either to approve or disapprove the proposal; if it is approved, an election is ordered, and the proposal must be approved by voters. Another alternative is for a petition requesting an election is submitted, and the request is presented to voters at the next district election.

OPPOSE ABOLISHMENT OF TRUSTEE AREAS -Motion #176 (CONTINUED)

MR. TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD SUPPORT THE ABOLISHMENT OF TRUSTEE AREAS. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION. expressed his support of the current system that ensures that each area of this diverse community is equally represented. However, he felt that if the electorate voted to abolish Trustee Areas, then it would be appropriate and right because the electorate made that decision, not the Board of Education. Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Adams also shared Mr. Knight's opinion; they spoke in support of the current Trustee Area system, the importance of not disenfranchising any area of the community, while remaining concerned about all families in the District. Mrs. Burns also raised the issue of financial concerns and the cost to the District to hold an election and obtain voter approval if the Board voted in favor of abolishing the current system. Mr. Chavez stated that the Trustee Area system is antiquated and only two other districts in the County still use this system. He commented that at one time the five Trustee Areas were separate and distinct areas representing Pedley, Glen Avon, Mira Loma, Rubidoux, and Sunnyslope. However, now the area has grown; there is no distinct line between communities, Board members serve only one purpose, and that is to provide the best education for all of the children in Jurupa. Mr. Chavez felt that it would provide a better candidate pool if the system changed to an at-large system. Mr. Teagarden agreed that the system currently being used is antiquated, with only four districts out of the 24 school districts in Riverside County requiring school board members to live in the area they represent. He indicated that he represents all of the children and parents in Jurupa; therefore, he supported abolishing the Trustee Area system. A VOTE WAS TAKEN; THE MOTION DID NOT CARRY BY A 3-2 VOTE: NAYE, MRS. ADAMS, MRS. BURNS, MR. KNIGHT; AYE, MR. TEAGARDEN, MR. CHAVEZ. Mr. Cook Barela stated that a Brown Act violation occurred because the Board did not allow Mr. James Cypert, the author of the Agenda item, to speak prior to making a decision on the matter.

APPROVE SUBMITTAL OF ERATE APPLICATION & COMMIT TO TECHNOLOGY EXPENDITURES FOR 2003/04 -Motion #177

The Deputy Superintendent stated that the Education Technology Department is requesting to submit the annual E-Rate application requesting funds in the amount of \$371,552.00 for telecommunications and Internet access services. The District's portion of the project is \$174,848.00.

MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE SUBMITTAL OF THE YEAR 6 E-RATE COMMIT TO THE EXPENDITURE FOR 2003/2004 APPLICATION AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND INTERNET **ACCESS SERVICES** IN THE APPROXIMATE AMOUNT OF \$174,848.00. MR. KNIGHT SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

AWARD BID FOR DRYWALL & PLASTER FOR GLEN AVON HIGH -Motion #178

The Director of Facility Planning and Development, Mr. Greg Bowers, stated that out of the four bids submitted, the low bid was received from Standard Drywall, Inc. for the drywall and plaster portion of the Glen Avon High School project in the amount of \$4,704,075.00 for both phases of the project.

MR. TEAGARDEN MOVED THE BOARD AWARD BID #03/03L, CATEGORY #15 – DRYWALL & PLASTER FOR GLEN AVON HIGH SCHOOL TO STANDARD DRYWALL, INC., IN THE AMOUNT \$1,898,595.00 FOR PHASE 1 AND AWARD PHASE 2 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,884,905.00, DEDUCT ALTERNATE 7 PHASE 1 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$30,825.00 AND DEDUCT ALTERNATE 7 PHASE 2 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$48,600.00, FOR A TOTAL BID AWARD OF \$4,704,075.00. MR. CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.



AWARD BID FOR RESTROOM ACCESSORIES FOR GLEN AVON HIGH -Motion #179

The Director of Facility Planning and Development, Mr. Greg Bowers, requested the Board to award the bid for restroom accessories for Glen Avon High School to Inland Empire Architectural Specialties in the amount of \$159,000.00 for both phases of the project. He noted that they are the second lowest bidder, since the low bidder was considered non-responsive for failure to provide a complete bond and bid proposal. MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD AWARD BID #03/03L, CATEGORY #21 RESTROOM ACCESSORIES, FOR GLEN AVON HIGH SCHOOL TO INLAND EMPIRE ARCHITECTURAL SPECIALTIES, INC. IN THE AMOUNT \$58,742.00 FOR PHASE 1 AND AWARD PHASE 2 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$100,258.00, FOR A TOTAL BID AWARD OF \$159,000.00. MR. TEAGARDEN SECONDED THE MOTION. Mr. Bowers noted for Mr. Chavez that even though the low bid was not in compliance with bid proposal guidelines, it is still listed so that the Board has information on why it was not accepted. Mr. Teagarden suggested that an asterisk be placed by a bid that is not accepted with the reason that it was not accepted listed below. Mr. Bowers noted for Mrs. Burns that restroom accessories include purchase and installation of partitions, soap dispensers, toilet paper holders, etc. A VOTE WAS TAKEN, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

APPROVE PURCHASE OF GREENHOUSE FOR JURUPA VALLEY HIGH -Motion #180

The Deputy Superintendent stated that the Jurupa Valley High Agriculture Department is requesting to purchase a 30' x 72' greenhouse building using Agriculture Vocational Incentive Grant funds.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE THE ISSUANCE OF PURCHASE ORDER #44079 TO CONLEY'S MANUFACTURING AND SALES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$24,173.71 FOR THE PURCHASE OF ONE 30' X 72' GABLE SERIES 7500 BUILDING FOR JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT NOTIFICATION OF OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR SCHOOLS OF CHOICE

Dear Parent/Guardian:

For the tenth year, the Jurupa Unified School District is implementing its open enrollment policy for schools within the district. Our sixteen elementary, three middle schools, and two comprehensive high schools offer a variety of programs designed to meet the needs of children and their families. There are situations which make it desirable for a family to select a school outside of the attendance area designated for their residence. As such, we offer this transfer opportunity through the Open Enrollment process.

Although we are experiencing considerable enrollment growth at most of our schools, once again this year parents may choose to have their children attend a school other than the school of residence, provided there is space. After reviewing data on projected enrollment for the new school year, the District staff determines how many transfer spaces are available at each school. You may find that some schools are unable to accommodate new students because of student growth; others have a few spaces, while others can accommodate a number of transfer requests. If there are more requests for transfers to a particular school than available spaces, district policy requires the use of a random selection procedure.

If you wish to have your child continue to attend the school serving your residence, you do not need to notify the school. Students currently attending a school on an open enrollment transfer need not complete a new application for the 2003-2004 school year unless they are moving up to the 7th or 9th grade, and the school of residence is different than the school which they wish to attend. If you wish your child to attend a school other than the one he/she is currently attending, please follow the instructions on page three.

Your involvement in your child's education is one of the most critical factors in his/her school success. I urge you to visit your child's school and talk to the staff; volunteer when you have time and join the PTA or other parent organization.

BEFORE YOU APPLY, PLEASE CONSIDER:

Parents who wish incoming kindergartners to attend the same transfer school as other siblings must apply for a transfer.

New 7th and 9th graders who wish to attend a school other than the school of residence must apply for a transfer.

If you are anticipating a move, which will change your school of residence, and you wish your child to remain at the present school, you must apply for a transfer.

Secondary students may receive transfers during Open Enrollment, however, it is difficult to obtain a transfer in September because of schedules, and possible credit loss. Students in athletics are required to follow CIF eligibility guidelines.

MEETING RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS: (Education Code 48204)

Students shall have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance provided he or she:

- a. is living with a parent/guardian or caregiver within the district, or
- b. is an emancipated minor living in the district, or
- c. is living in a licensed foster home, family home, state hospital, or licensed children's institution within the district, or
- d. is granted an interdistrict transfer based on the parent/guardian being employed within the boundaries of the school district.

Program Options in the District:

A variety of programs are available in the Jurupa Unified School District. A description of each program is provided below. The directory pages that follow list which programs are offered at each school site.

<u>Special Education</u> – Programs and services are available at each school for students with exceptional needs. Enrollment in these classes will be based on Individualized Education Program placement and space availability.

School Improvement – This state-funded program supports and guides schoolwide improvements to help meet the needs of all students and is offered at all elementary and middle schools.

<u>Title I/EIA</u> – These state and federally-funded programs serve grades one through eight for students who need additional academic support in the areas of reading, language, or math and are available at specific schools.

<u>Structured English Immersion Program</u> – English language learners (ELL) receive direct instruction and materials in a Structured English Immersion Program that includes content-based English Language Development (ELD). This English language development is given primary language support by authorized teachers and/or tutors.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) - This program serves eligible students in grades kindergarten through twelve at each school, who have been identified as gifted and talented.

<u>Title IV</u> - These federal funds assist each school (K-12) to provide prevention of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, early intervention, referral or rehabilitation as necessary.

<u>Title VI</u> Innovative—These federal funds assist the school in purchasing library books and instructional materials and also provides counseling for each elementary school through the Youth Service Center of Riverside. Crisis counseling, classroom presentations, and conflict management is available to students one day a week.

Title VI Class Size Reduction - Federal funding provided to carry out staff development for class-size reduction in the early elementary grades.

<u>Class-Size Reduction</u> - This state program for grades K-3 allows all elementary school to reduce class size to 20 pupils per classroom.

<u>Instrumental Music/Elementary</u> - Three instrumental music teachers provide band instruction at each elementary school, each week.

<u>Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE)</u> - State funding for tobacco-specific student instruction, reinforcement activities, special events and cessation programs for students in grades 4-8.

10th Grade Counseling - This state program provides funds to assist in providing counseling and guidance services to high school students.

Elementary Counseling Program - Through the use of a model student assistance program and life skills training, students and families receive an array of services at the school site. The program also links parents and students to other needed services in the community.

AsCent (middle schools) F.A.N. Club (elementary schools) - Staff from YMCA and Parks and Recreation Department work with school staff to plan and implement an after school program which includes clubs, homework assistance, tutoring, sports, speakers and field trips.



PROCEDURE FOR APPLYING FOR A PRANSFER:

- 1. Applications may be obtained in the office of any school in the District, and are due FEBRUARY 28, 2003.
- 2. Completed applications must be mailed to the Jurupa Unified School District, 4850 Pedley Road, Riverside, CA 92509 no later than FEBRUARY 28, 2003. Meeting the application deadline of February 28, 2003 is critical due to the rapid pace of growth in the District. If your application is received after the close of the open enrollment period, a decision on your application will be delayed until after school start in the Fall, and your chances of receiving a transfer are greatly reduced.
- 3. Transfer and admission to a school of choice shall be granted if the space is available, and as established by the Jurupa Unified School District.
- 4. Parents will be notified by mail after the close of the enrollment period as to the status of their request.
- 5. Transportation to the school of choice is the responsibility of the parent.

Educación Especial - En cada escuela están disponibles programas y servicios para los estudiantes con necesidades excepcionales. La inscripción en estas clases será basada en la colocación del Programa de Educación Individual y en el espacio disponible.

<u>Reforma Escolar</u> - Este programa, apoyado por el estado, sostiene y guía una amplia cantidad de reformas escolares, para poder satisfacer las necesidades de todos los estudiantes y se ofrece en todas las escuelas primarias y mediantes.

<u>Título I/EIA</u> - Estos programas, con apoyo federal y estatal, le ofrecen servicios a los estudiantes del primer hasta al grado ocho, que necesitan un apoyo académico adicional en el área de lectura, leguaje, o matemática y están disponibles en escuelas particulares.

Programa de Estructura de Inmersión en Inglés - Principiantes del idioma inglés (ELL) reciben instrucción directa y materiales en un programa de Estructura de Inmersión en Inglés que incluye un contenido basado en el Desarrollo del Idioma Inglés (ELD). Este desarrollo del idioma inglés es apoyado por el idioma primario por maestros y tutores que han sido autorizados.

(«GATE») La Educación de Don y Talento - Este programa le provee servicio, a los estudiantes del grado kinder al grado 12, que han sido identificados con tener un don y un talento excepcional.

<u>Título IV</u> - Estos fondos federales asisten a las escuelas, los grados (K-12), para que proveen la prevención de las drogas, el alcohol, el uso de tabaco, intervención prematura, y la referencia o rehabilitación como sea necesaria.

<u>Título VI</u> Innovador - Estos fondos federales asisten en la compra de libros para la biblioteca y en la compra de materias instructivo. También proveen asesoramiento por medio del Centro de Servicio Juvenil de Riverside. Un día de la semana se les provee y están disponibles para los estudiantes, asesoramientos en casos de una crisis, para la comprensión de las presentaciones dentro de los salones de clase, y para el manejamiento de conflictos.

<u>Título VI</u> La disminución del Tamaño de la Clase - Este programa federal proveído para realizar el desarrollo de la facultad en disminución del tamaño de las clases en los grados K-3.

2002-2003 FIRST INTERIM FINANCIAL REPORT

We have received and reviewed your 2002-2003 First Interim Financial Report. Your governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

The 2002-2003 State Budget Act and related legislation deferred categorical funding, totaling \$681 million statewide, to 2003-2004. It is uncertain at this time whether or not the legislature will appropriate these funds. In the event the State's economic condition further deteriorates and subsequent legislation is enacted that eliminates this deferred revenue, the board may need to revise the district's budget accordingly.

Our analysis of the report included the multi-year financial projections approved by the board. The projections indicate expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$4,357,014 in the current fiscal year. Projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 fiscal years based on the following major assumptions:

Should these assumptions not materialize as planned, the board will need to adjust the budget plan accordingly.

Last year at this time we noted in our review that, due to the extraordinary rapid decline in state revenues, Governor Davis had announced proposed reductions to amounts already appropriated in the 2001-2002 State Budget. As you are aware, state revenues have continued to decline and a \$21 - \$34.8 billion deficit is anticipated in the next 18 to 24 months. A special session of the legislature was convened on December 9, 2002, to address the state budget crisis.

We recommend that the board review the impact of the potential revenue reductions on the 2002-2003 budget and multi-year financial projections. It is important that the board review and rank the district's priorities and programs and plan for options to address the likely reductions in state revenue.

Given the uncertainty of revenues for the current fiscal year, we recommend that school districts avoid and defer discretionary spending. We further recommend that the board not incur additional financial obligations unless conservative projections of revenues demonstrate the district's ongoing ability to meet those obligations.

The report indicates that classified salary negotiations have not been concluded for the current fiscal year. Government Code Section 3547.5 requires that the major provisions of a proposed collective bargaining agreement, including the projected cost of the agreement, be disclosed at a public meeting prior to governing board approval. Please provide a copy of this information to our office ten days prior to board approval.

Education Codes 42126-27 and 42130 require the board to approve multi-year financial projections for the current and at least two subsequent fiscal years that separately projects unrestricted resources, restricted resources and the combined general fund. The projections should reflect current and anticipated changes in the district's revenues, operational programs, debt service obligations and/or enrollment and attendance trends. This process will assist the board in providing for the long-range financial stability of the district. Please provide our office with a copy of the updated multi-year financial projections, including assumptions, with the submission of your Second Interim Financial Report.
