*f. Recognize Governor's Scholars Program Award Winners

(Dr. Mason)

The District was recently notified of the recipients of a \$1,000 Governor's Scholars Award. Students who received this award had qualifying scores on selected 2002 STAR Program examinations. In order to be eligible, students must have met the following qualifications: (1) been enrolled in a California public school for at least twelve consecutive months prior to the administration of the STAR Program examinations; (2) taken all the required Stanford 9 and California Standards examinations, and (3) earned a qualifying score by placing in the top 5% of students in their grade level statewide or in the top 10% of students in their grade level at their comprehensive high school. The names of the students who received the \$1,000 scholarship awards are listed in the supporting documents. Information only.

g. Accept Donations

- a. Hear Presentation on Plans for Rubidoux High School Modernization

 As the Board is aware, there are preliminary plans to house Rubidoux High School on the Glen Avon High School campus for a period of time while the Rubidoux High School campus is modernized. The opening of the third high school provides many opportunities for innovative programs to meet the needs of students. For the past several months, Mr. Gaylaird Christopher and Ms. Jessica Berman of Concordia Design have been interviewing school and community leaders about future plans for Rubidoux High School. It is now prudent to begin a more in-depth planning process for how Rubidoux High School can be modernized and ways to accommodate such programs. Mr. Christopher will present information already gathered from interviews conducted and the planning process, which will benefit combined building and program designs. Information only.

 Due to retirements and/or reassignments, a number of administrative positions in Education Services will be vacant as of July 1, 2003. After considerable analysis and discussion, administration has developed a plan, which we believe will allow us to continue to deliver high quality programs and services with a substantial cost savings. This evening, Mrs. Ellen French, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services, will present an overview of a plan to restructure Education Services. Public Verbal Comments

* 6. Adopt at Second Reading Board Policy #5131.7, Weapons & Dangerous Instruments

(Mr. Edmunds)

At the last Board meeting, new Board Policy #5131.7 was reviewed at first informational reading following additional revisions recommended by legal counsel that were incorporated into the Policy. Board Policy 5131.7 requires the expulsion for not less than one year of any student who is determined to have brought a firearm (handgun, shotgun, rifle, or other firearms that include explosive devices) to school. It also allows the governing board to modify the expulsion requirement on a case-by-case basis. This policy requires referral to the criminal justice system, juvenile justice system, or local law enforcement agency of any student who brings a firearm or weapon to school. Weapons and dangerous instruments are identified and are not limited to the items listed. This policy is in compliance with 20 United States Code 8921 and Education Code Sections 48915(c) and 48916. Administration recommends adoption at second reading of Board Policy #5131.7, Weapons and Dangerous Instruments.

7. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Jurupa Valley High (Dr. Mason) Ms. Melva Morrison, Jurupa Valley High vocal music teacher, is requesting approval to travel to Sacramento with 28 students on Wednesday, May 28 through Saturday, May 31, 2003. The purpose of the trip is to provide students an opportunity to perform in unique settings. Students will perform in two informal performances in San Francisco, sing in the rotunda of the Capitol Building in Sacramento, and a choral competition called "Music in the Parks" at Six Flags Magic Mountain. Transportation will be provided by charter bus, staff members and parent volunteers will provide supervision, and lodging will be at various hotels. Costs for this trip will be paid through the choir's auxiliary, performances, and fundraisers. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Ms. Melva Morrison to travel to Sacramento with 28 students May 28-31, 2003 to perform in various performances, including San Francisco and the Capitol Building in Sacramento.

*B. Adopt Board Proposal to NEA-J

(Mrs. French)

In a prior meeting, the Board has received and reviewed a proposal from the National Education Association-Jurupa regarding reopener negotiations. The Board has also reviewed and announced its proposal in response. Subject to any changes directed by the Board after public comments in the verbal hearing session, <u>administration recommends adoption of the Board's proposal as printed in the supporting documents as a basis for negotiations.</u>

*C. Approve Revised Special Education Local Plan

(Dr. Tibbetts)

Pursuant to Education Code (EC) 56202 and EC 56836.03, all Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPA) must have an approved revised Local Plan that meets the requirements of EC 56205, including all signatures on file with the California Department of Education (CDE) no later than June 30, 2003. In order to meet this deadline, the Riverside County SELPA is submitting the Local Plan to all SELPA-member Boards of Education, of which Jurupa Unified School District is a member, for approval and signature. CDE has indicated to the Riverside County SELPA that the draft Local Plan received their preliminary approval. The revision of the Local Plan under EC 56205 will allow the SELPA to operate with greater programmatic and fiscal flexibility established by AB 602. Once approved by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), the Local Plan will be considered permanent. Local Plans submitted to CDE need to be amended only when there is change in federal or state law or regulation.

The supporting documents contain a copy of the Approval Letter from CDE dated April 3, 2003, an Executive Summary of the Riverside County SELPA Local Plan, the Local Educational Agency Assurance Statement indicating that the SELPA demonstrates, in conformity with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) 1413(a), that it has policies, procedures, and programs that are consistent with state laws, regulations, and policies governing 22 required areas, a Board Adoption document, and the Riverside County draft Local Plan approved by CDE. The SELPA is requesting approval of the Draft Local Plan, and that the required signatures be returned to their office by June 13, 2003. Dr. Terry Tibbetts, Administrator of Education Support Services, reviewed all documents related to the Draft Local Plan and as a member district in the Riverside County SELPA, recommends approval of the Revised Special Education Local Plan. Administration recommends approval of the Revised Special Education Local Plan.

D. Approve 2003 Mandated, Core Academic, and Special Education Summer School Program Grades 8-12 (Dr. Mason)

The State of California provides funding which allows school districts to provide summer school instruction for students in Grades K-9 who have been retained or who are at-risk of retention, as well as students in Grades 7-12 who are not making sufficient progress towards meeting the High School Exit Exam. Furthermore, limited funds are provided to support core academic classes at the high schools. The chart below displays summer school courses proposed for both comprehensive high schools. It is recommended that the Board approve the 2003 summer school offerings as presented.

H. Review and Approve School Plan Revisions to Include Centralized Service Outlines for Economic Impact Aid/Limited English Proficient (EIA-LEP) Program (Mr. Mendez)

Schools receiving categorical funds covered by the Consolidated Application are required to design programs and submit plans for the use of these funds. Programs included in these plans are: School Improvement (School Based Coordinated Programs), Title I (Schoolwide and Targeted), Economic Impact Aid-Limited English Proficient (EIA-LEP), Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities (DFSC), Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE), and Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP). The school plans must contain the proposed expenditures of all state and federal funds allocated to the school in the amounts contained in the Consolidated Application. For Title I, School Improvement, School Based Coordinated, and English learner programs our school plans must contain the budgets, proposed centralized services, and proposed expenditures per Coordinated Compliance item VI-CON.23.

As part of our district's Coordinated Compliance Review (CCR) process, we were found out of compliance in the area of lacking a centralized service outline for the EIA-LEP program. The following school level plans have been updated to include these EIA-LEP centralized service outlines: West Riverside, Van Buren, Sunnyslope, Indian Hills, Ina Arbuckle, Rubidoux High, and Mission Middle. As other schools in the district have their outlines approved by their School Site Councils (SSCs), they will be submitted to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the revision of the school plans to include the EIA-LEP centralized service outlines for the above referenced school sites for the 2002-2003 school year.

I. Review and Approve Submittal of State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan

(Mr. Duchon)

The State Deferred Maintenance Program provides State-matching funds to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, floor systems, etc. The District has participated in the State Deferred Maintenance Program for many years. Legislation (Education Code Section 17584.1) requires that the Governing Board review and discuss proposals and plans for expenditure of funds for the deferred maintenance of school district facilities at a regularly scheduled public hearing.

The Deferred Maintenance Five Year Plan is now due, and it is included in the supporting documents. This plan provides a listing of eligible items of major repair or replacement to be considered by the District over a five-year period. The State Allocation Board does not fund the projects from the five-year plan but rather approves the plan as being eligible for the District to expend funds from its "District Deferred Maintenance Fund." Projects listed on the five-year plan are limited to those school facility components, which have approached or exceeded their normal life expectancy. This plan may remain in effect for the full five years, or the District may amend its plan once per fiscal year. Actual work completed will be based on the amount of funding available from the State combined with the District's matching contribution.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the submittal of the State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan.

J. Request Authorization to Solicit Bids for Asphalt Maintenance at 12 School Sites

(Mr. Duchon)

Administration is requesting authorization to solicit bids for asphalt maintenance at eight (8) elementary sites, two (2) middle school sites, and two (2) high school sites as follows:

Asphalt maintenance includes applying a seal coat to existing asphalt, restriping of parking lots, playgrounds, and United States maps, and the painting of curbs. The estimated cost for this project is \$150,000. This project will be funded from the State Deferred Maintenance funding is available. Administration recommends that the Board authorize district personnel to solicit bids for asphalt maintenance at eight elementary schools, two middle schools, and two high schools.

K. <u>Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Measure "C" Phase II Proposals for Site Improvements for Modular Restrooms and the Camino Real Bus Loop</u> (Mr. Bowers)

To maintain our current schedule and to take advantage of industry conditions, Administration intends to advertise and solicit bid proposals for Measure "C" Phase II projects, site improvements for modular restrooms and the Camino Real Bus Loop. The bid date for the project is scheduled for June 3, 2003 at 2:00 p.m. Administration intends to request award of bid at the June 16, 2003 Board Meeting. Work is scheduled to begin June 26, 2003.

Administration recommends the Board approve staff to advertise and solicit contractors for site improvements for modular restrooms and the Camino Real Bus Loop.

L. <u>Approve Reinstatement of Class Size Reduction in Kindergarten, First, and Second Grades</u> (Mr. Duchon)

While the Legislature is yet to approve the State Budget, the District must now determine whether or not it is possible to reinstate the Class Size Reduction program at any grade levels. Administration has previously identified approximately \$3.9 million of budget reductions as listed below that will permit the District to have a balanced budget for the 2003/04 school year, depending upon the level of State funding provided to school districts. Administration has now been able to analyze information contained in the May 14th May Revision to the Governor's Budget. Our budget projections had anticipated a 0% COLA, plus a \$100 per ADA reduction in Revenue Limit funding. The May Revise includes a 0% COLA and a Revenue Limit reduction of \$60 per ADA, which results in \$800,000 more revenue than in our previous projections. Based upon this information, Administration now believes it will be possible to retain the class size reduction program in Kindergarten, first and second grades.

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline case subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

SUSPENDED EXPULSION:

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-167 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b1) for the Spring Semester 2003 and Fall Semester 2003. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended and the pupil be placed on school probation for the term of the expulsion order. The pupil shall be assigned to Mira Loma Middle School. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. The pupil shall be assigned to Mira Loma Middle School. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 2004.

EXPULSION/SUSPENDED EXPULSIONS:

The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case will be referred to the *Student Assistance Program* and the *School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE)* for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 2004.
- 7. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 2004.
- 9. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-177 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (i), (k) and 48915 (e1), (e2) for the Spring Semester 2003 and Fall Semester 2003. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and the School and Community OutREach Team (SCORE) for follow-up. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 20, 2004.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

N. Approve Personnel Matters

- * 1. Approve Personnel Report #20 (Mrs. French)

 Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #20 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.
 - 2. Consider Creation of Director of Secondary Education Position

(Mrs. French)

The restructuring plan presented this evening recommends that the position of Assistant Superintendent Education Services not be filled. The plan proposes the creation of the position of Director of Secondary Education. A work year of 248 days, with 22 vacation days and a salary of \$109,500 is suggested. This proposed change would result in a savings of over \$18,356. Administration recommends the creation of a position for Director of Secondary Education with the salary and work year as proposed.

3. Appoint Director of Secondary Education

(Mrs. French)

Contingent upon Board approval of the position of Director of Secondary Education, administration recommends that Mr. Paul Jensen, current Principal of Adult and Alternative Education, be promoted to Director of Secondary Education.

4. Consider Modification of Existing Position of Director of Curriculum and Staff Development (Mrs. French)

The restructuring proposal being made additionally recommends modifying the existing position of Director of Curriculum and Staff Development to become Director of Elementary Education. This proposed change would have no cost impact.

Administration recommends modifying the existing position of Director of Curriculum and Staff Development to become Director of Elementary Education.

N. Approve Personnel Matters (Continued)

5. Consider Creation of Director of Categorical Projects Classified Management Position
(Mrs. French)

It is proposed that the position of Director of Research and Categorical Projects, which will be vacant on July 1, 2003, not be filled. Administration proposes to create a classified management position for Director of Categorical Projects. A work year of 248 days, with 22 vacation days and a salary of \$77,100 is proposed. This proposed change would result in a savings of over \$22,163.

Administration recommends the creation of a Classified Management Position for Director of Categorical Projects.

6. Appoint Director of Categorical Projects

(Mrs. French)

Contingent upon Board approval of the classified management position of Director of Categorical Projects, administration is proposing Ms. Terri Moreno be appointed to this position and that her current position of Categorical Projects Manager not be filled. This proposed change results in an additional cost savings of over \$61,752.

Administration recommends that Ms. Terri Moreno be promoted to Director of Categorical Projects.

7. Consider Modification of Existing Position of Administrator of Educational Technology (Mrs. French)

Other recommended restructuring proposed changes include not filling the position of Coordinator of Research and Assessment, which will also be vacant as of July 1, 2003. Administration proposes that the Administrator of Educational Technology would assume the duties of this position. A proposed title change from Administrator of Educational Technology to Administrator of Educational Technology and Assessment is accordingly recommended. This proposed change would result in a cost savings of over \$86,359.

Administration recommends modification of the job description of Administrator of Educational Technology to Administrator of Educational Technology and Assessment.

8. Consider Modification of Existing Position of Administrator of Student and Community Services (Mrs. French)

Another component of the Education restructuring proposal involves changes of the job description of the Administrator of Student and Community Services, and that the title of this position be changed to Administrator of Student Services, Standards and Accountability. This proposed change would have no cost impact.

Administration recommends modification of the job description of Administrator of Student and Community Services to Administrator of Student Services, Standards and Accountability.

- * 1. Review 2003 Graduation and Promotion Exercises (Mr. Edmunds)
 The supporting documents include the 2003 Graduation and Promotion Exercises chart.
 Information only.
- * 2. Review Approval of 2002/2003 Second Interim Report (Mr. Duchon)
 The Riverside County Office of Education has notified the District that the 2002/2003
 Second Interim Financial Report has received positive certification and that they have notified the California Department of Education accordingly. The County Office also recommends that the Board continue to review updated multi-year financial projections to assist in providing for the long-range stability of the District. Information only.
 - 3. Hear Report on K-8 Summer Extended Learning Opportunity Program (ELO) (Mr. Mendez) For the fourth year in a row, a summer school (ELO) program is being offered district wide for students in grades K-8. Funds from the state's "Retention/At Risk of Retention, Reading Intensive, and Core Summer" programs were combined with funds from federal Title I and state English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP) funds to maximize the number of students that could be served. As a result, the K-8 level will serve approximately 3,126 retention, recommended for retention, and at-risk students with reading, writing, and mathematics instruction four hours a day in a 20-day program from July 7 to August 7, 2003. These classes will have a lower teacher-student ratio with a mastery-oriented instructional program based on essential curriculum standards and expanded intervention strategies. In addition, 606 English learners will receive English Language Development (ELD) on ELD standards and 264 special education students on standards-aligned IEP goals.

The program this year will be at Camino Real, Glen Avon, Pacific Avenue, Van Buren, and Mission Middle. Due to budget constraints, we have reduced the size of the program by over one-third from that of the previous year. K-5 students will be housed at the four designated elementary sites and students in grades 6-8 will attend Mission Middle School on a rotational schedule. Teachers on Special Assignment assist in the management of the program as well as assessment, staff development, and other curriculum planning coordination under the supervision of two principals (one for elementary sites and one for Standards aligned lessons and middle school) who are contracted for the summer. supplemental materials are provided for teachers as well as homework packets. Auxiliary services include clerical and secretarial staff, activity supervisors, a rotating nurse, To encourage student attendance, custodians, crossing guards, and limited busing. breakfast, lunch, and light snacks as well as periodic pizza and ice cream parties are provided by food services. Over the past four years, test results have shown an average gain of 10% on pre- and post-criterion referenced assessments of minimum and essential standards in language arts and mathematics. Retainees are reassessed at the end of the summer and a determination is made to either promote or retain these students based on their progress towards mastery of standards. Information only.



APPROVE FOR DISTRICT TO PAY BOARD MEMBER REGISTRATION FEES TO ATTEND CONFERENCES -Motion #263	The Superintendent stated that this item was placed on the Agenda due to a difference of opinion whether the original motion relating to Board member conference expenses included expenses related to Mr. Chavez attending the Delegate Assembly. Mr. Knight stated that he thought a decision was already made that Board members would pay for their own food, travel, and lodging expenses. Mr. Chavez stated that this statement is incorrect, this matter was already taken care of at a previous meeting and the Delegate Assembly was not included in the motion. At that time he requested the Superintendent's Assistant to read the motion three times. He indicated that the Delegate Assembly is not a conference or a workshop, it is a working meeting on behalf of all school boards in California; he was elected to serve in this position with the support of this Board and other school boards to do work at the state level. Mr. Chavez asked for the item to be postponed until the next meeting so he could meet with the California School Boards Association attorney to clarify whether the Delegate Assembly was included in the original motion. Secondly, he asked how this item came to be on the Agenda? The Superintendent noted that Mrs. Burns contacted him concerning the motion and asked how it would impact the attendance of Mr. Chavez at the Delegate Assembly. Since there remained a difference of opinion on the intent of the motion, he talked with the Board President about placing the item on the Agenda for clarification. Mrs. Burns stated that in the discussion following the original motion, she was quite clear that the motion included expenses relating to the Delegate Assembly and all other Board member travel.



APPROVE FOR DISTRICT TO PAY BOARD MEMBER REGISTRATION FEES TO ATTEND CONFERENCES -Motion #263 (CONTINUED) Mr. Chavez pointed out again that he had the motion read three times when it was originally given to clarify that it did not include expenses related to the Delegate Assembly. He felt that the motion related to workshop and conference expenses only. Mrs. Adams recalled that when she first came on the Board in 1996, the District only paid for registration expenses; the District did not pay for Delegate Assembly expenses; she paid for her own travel expenses to many conferences at that time. Mr. Knight indicated that the focus of the decision relates to the finances of the District and the Board's part in reducing those expenses. Other school districts have decided to pay for Delegate Assembly participation and Board member conference expenses; however, this Board decided not to pay for food, travel, and lodging in order to take part in budgetary reductions. MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE FOR THE DISTRICT TO PAY FOR BOARD MEMBER REGISTRATION EXPENSES TO ATTEND CONFERENCES; THE DISTRICT WOULD NOT PAY FOR BOARD MEMBERS' ROOM AND BOARD, FOOD, OR TRAVEL EXPENSES. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION. The Superintendent's Assistant was asked to read the motion two times to review the wording in the motion. Mrs. Burns pointed out that Board members gave something up in light of the budget crisis; they agreed to pay for food, travel, and lodging out of their stipend, instead of using funds out of their \$4,000 conference allocation. She provided the definitions for conference, governance, and delegate out of the dictionary and stated that the intent of the motion is clear, Board members are giving up having their expenses paid for, except for registration fees. Superintendent indicated that the matter in question is what each Board member defines as a conference and whether the Delegate Assembly is categorized as a conference. Since he is responsible for administering and monitoring the Board's conference budget, he needs clarification concerning the District's responsibility for those expenditures. Mrs. Burns asked if she could provide that clarification by making an amendment to the motion to include expenses related to the Delegate Assembly. Mr. Knight indicated that the motion is clear: Board members made a commitment to reduce spending out of their \$4,000 allocation by not asking the District to pay for lodging, food, and travel expenses; therefore, an amendment is not needed. According to the motion, no funds would be used out of this allocation to cover these costs; the District would only pay for registration fees. CSBA expenses come out of this same account; the motion covers all expenses that are related to this account. A VOTE WAS TAKEN, THE MOTION CARRIED 3-1, NAYE, MR. CHAVEZ. challenged the motion and vote since he felt the Board already voted on this matter at a previous meeting; this motion is exactly the same, and CSBA Delegate Assembly work is not included.

	The Deputy Superintendent reviewed the routine process for school site PTA's to donate funds for students to attend field trips. He noted that a donation was approved by the Board at a previous meeting for Sunnyslope Elementary School students to participate in two field trips to the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center (JMCC). However, when the Purchase Orders were presented to the Board for approval at the last meeting, Mr. Chavez requested postponement of the decision to allow Board members an opportunity to review a legal opinion concerning conflict of interest matters for Mrs. Burns, since she is Executive Director of JMCC. Since the field trips were scheduled to occur prior to this evening's meeting, the funds were returned to the PTA, and they wrote a check directly to JMCC. The Deputy Superintendent reviewed a legal opinion regarding conflict of interest for Mrs. Burns that was requested by Mr. Chavez. Mr. Chavez questioned how funds could be returned to the PTA without the Board's approval. The Deputy Superintendent stated that parents and students already raised funds for this field trip to occur; and since the welfare of students is the District's primary concern, under his authority the funds were released back to the PTA so the field trip could occur, while the Board dealt with their own matters relating to conflict of interest. He did not feel it was outside his authority to make this decision.
REVIEW ROUTINE INFORMATION REPORTS & QUESTIONS FROM THE BOARD	Mr. Knight requested a presentation from Ms. Dawn Brewer, newly elected Jurupa Council PTA President, on the recent PTA convention. He commented that there is a process for individuals to follow if there is an issue or concern; he requested that when individuals have a comment concerning anything listed on the Agenda, they should do so in a respectful manner. Mr. Knight pointed out that Board members are elected officials and should receive due respect from the public during the meeting, as the public is afforded that same respect. He indicated that challenging the Board President's authority during a meeting is inappropriate and is not setting a good example for the students that are present.
	Mrs. Burns requested a presentation/report on <i>No Child Left Behind</i> mandates. Mr. Knight stated that Ms. Terri Moreno, Categorical Projects Manager, could provide this information and related information on the District's LEAP Plan. Mrs. Burns indicated that she would be interested in obtaining the cost for the individual mentioned by Mr. Chavez to report to the Board on <i>NCLB</i> .
,	Mr. Knight invited anyone interested in discussing his comments concerning civil, courteous, and respectful behavior at Board meetings to meet with him after the meeting.

Weapons and Dangerous Instruments

The Governing Board desires students and staff to be free from the fear and danger presented by firearms and other weapons. The Board therefore prohibits any person other than authorized law enforcement or security personnel from possessing weapons, imitation firearms, or dangerous instruments of any kind in school buildings, on school grounds or buses, or at a school-related or school-sponsored activity away from school.

Possession of Weapons

Under the power granted to the Board to maintain order and discipline in the schools and to protect the safety of students, staff and the public, any school employee is authorized to confiscate a weapon, dangerous instrument or imitation firearm from any person on school grounds.

Any student who is determined to have brought a firearm (handgun, shotgun, rifle, or other firearm that includes explosive devices) to school shall be expelled for not less than one year. The Governing Board may modify the duration of the expulsion on a case-by-case basis.

Students possessing or threatening others with a weapon, dangerous instrument or imitation firearm are subject to suspension and/or expulsion in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulations.

The principal or designee shall notify law enforcement authorities when any student possesses a weapon or commits any act of assault with a firearm or other weapon. (20 USC 8922; Education Code 48902; Penal Code 245, 626.9, 626.10)

Upon written permission of the principal or designee, a student may possess a weapon on school grounds when necessary for a school-sponsored activity or class. The principal or designee shall inspect the weapon to ensure that necessary safety precautions have been taken.

The Board recognizes that students age 16 or older may legally possess tear gas or tear gas weapons such as pepper spray for the purpose of self-defense. However, to prevent potential misuse that may harm students or staff, students are prohibited from carrying such items on campus or at school activities.

Reporting of Injurious Objects

The Board encourages students to promptly report the presence of weapons, injurious objects or other suspicious activity to school authorities. The identity of a student who reports such activity shall remain confidential to the extend permitted by law.



The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies designed to facilitate student reporting of the presence of injurious objects on school grounds, such as tip hotlines, electronic transmissions, or other methods that preserve the student's anonymity. Incident reports and records shall not identify the student who reported the possession. The strategy shall also include means of informing staff, students and parents/guardians that students who report the presence of injurious objects on school campuses are to be protected and their identity shielded.

Jurupa Unified School District Collective Bargaining Proposal May 5, 2003

The current Agreement with the National Education Association-Jurupa allows for reopener negotiations for the 2003-2004 school year. NEA-J has notified the Board of its intent to modify language in the following articles: Article XIV-Basic Compensation, Article XVII-Health and Welfare Benefits, Article VII-Hours of Duty, and Article XVII-Supplemental Retirement Benefits. In response, it is proposed that the 2001-2004 Agreement be continued as it stands except for necessary technical and grammatical adjustments and areas of interest to the District which are proposed in anticipation of a substantial decrease in state revenue and increased costs.

- Article XIV-Basic Compensation In anticipation of decreased State revenue, the District has an interest in maintaining 2003-2004 salaries at the 2002-2003 level by freezing step and column salary advancement.
- Article XVII-Health and Welfare Benefits In anticipation of a substantial increase in premium costs, the District has an interest in containing the cost of Health and Welfare benefits to the product of the current Unit Member Allowance times the number of full time equivalent unit members.
- Article VII-Class Size In anticipation of decreased State revenue, the District proposes to modify class size maximums so that pupils certified eligible for full-time Special Education classes count as one (1) rather than two (2) pupils when mainstreamed in regular classes. The District additionally proposes to increase the average caseload limit for Guidance Coordinators by 70 students. The District further proposes to eliminate the additional teacher position at each comprehensive high school that provides release time to teachers of language arts classes.
- Article XIII-Work Years To remedy the unintentional result of current contract language which gives higher seniority rights to new teachers who are fully certified over returning teachers who become fully certified after the last day of service for the preceding year, the District proposes that the work year for returning unit members who were not fully credentialed before the last day of service for the preceding year, shall be the Basic Work Year plus one (1) day.
- Article II- Duration The District proposes to extend the Agreement through June 30, 2005.

RIVERSIDE COUNTY SELPA LOCAL PLAN

Executive Summary Prepared for Riverside County SELPA Member School District Boards of Education April, 2003

Special Education is a program mandated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Public education functions under the version of this law passed in 1997; however, Congress is currently working on its reauthorization. California laws comply with federal statutes.

California has divided regions of the state into Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs). SELPAs consist of a specific group of local educational agencies (LEAs) charged with the responsibility of providing a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) to qualified students within its geographical region. Both federal and state special education funds are directed to the SELPA, and the member LEAs collaborate to meet the needs of its students and to devise a method for equitable distribution of funds.

The SELPA and LEAs must be in compliance with all state and federal special education laws. Failure of an LEA to remedy required noncompliant items could result in withholding of funds from the entire SELPA and/or a deduction from the superintendent's salary.

The first level of compliance is establishing and maintaining a Local Plan for Special Education. This Plan contains statements from IDEA that briefly summarize major elements of IDEA. It also includes all of the required elements as set forth by the California Department of Education. Local school boards within our SELPA, the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools, and the State Board of Education must approve the Local Plan. All additional policies and procedures that define the way that the Riverside County SELPA operates shall be maintained on file at the SELPA Office with copies in each LEA. Each LEA shall supplement the Local Plan, SELPA polices and SELPA procedures with its own policies and procedures, such as parent and teacher handbooks.



RIVERSIDE COUNTY SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA

LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY (LEA) ASSURANCE STATEMENT

1. FREE APPROPRIATE PUBLIC EDUCATION (FAPE)

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a free appropriate public education is available to all children residing in the LEA between the ages of birth through 21 inclusive, including children with disabilities who have been suspended or expelled from school. Appropriate education is that combination of educational and related service(s) as determined on an Individualized Education Program (IEP) that meets the unique needs of each individual in order to benefit from his/her access to educational opportunities.

2. FULL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all pupils with disabilities have access to the variety of educational programs and services available to non-disabled pupils including nonacademic and extra-curricular services and activities.

3. CHILD FIND

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and related services are identified, located and evaluated.

4. INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM (IEP)

It shall be the policy of this LEA that an Individualized Educational Program (IEP) is developed, reviewed and revised for each child with a disability who requires special education and related services in order to benefit from his/her individualized education program.

5. LEAST RESTRICTIVE ENVIRONMENT

It shall be the policy of this LEA that to the maximum extent appropriate, children with disabilities, including children in public or private institutions or other care facilities, are educated with children who are not disabled. Special classes, separate schooling, or other removal of children with disabilities from the regular educational environment, occurs only when the nature or severity of the disability of the child is such that education in regular classes with the use of supplemental aids and services can not be achieved satisfactorily.



6. PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS

It shall be the policy of this LEA that children with disabilities and their parents shall be provided with safeguards throughout the identification, evaluation, placement process, and provision of a free appropriate public education to the child.

7. ANNUAL / TRIENNIAL REASSESSMENT

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a review will be conducted on at least an annual basis to review the child's progress. This review shall include, but is not limited to, the achievement of annual goals, the appropriateness of placement, and/or to make any necessary revisions.

The LEA shall conduct a reassessment of each child with a disability at least once every three years, or more frequently, if conditions warrant a reassessment or if the child's parent or teacher requests a reassessment and a new Individualized Education Program (IEP) to be developed.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the confidentiality of personally identifiable data information and records maintained by the LEA relating to children with disabilities and their parents and families shall be protected at collection, storage, disclosure, and destruction.

9. PART C, TRANSITION

It shall be the policy of this LEA that children participating in Early Intervention Programs (IDEA, Part C) and who will participate in preschool programs (IDEA, Part B) experience a smooth and effective transition between these programs.

10. PRIVATE SCHOOLS

It shall be the policy of this LEA to assure that children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled by their parents in private school shall receive special education and related services in accordance with local procedures. The required proportion of federal funds received will be allocated for the purpose of providing special education services to children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private school by their parents.

11. COMPLIANCE ASSURANCES

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the local plan shall be adopted by the appropriate local board(s) (district/county) and is the basis for the operation and administration of special education programs; and that the agency(ies) herein represented will meet all applicable requirements of state and federal laws and regulations, including compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Section 504 of Public Law and the provisions of the California Education Code, Part 30.



12-13. GOVERNANCE

It shall be the policy of this LEA to support and comply with the provisions of the governance structure and any necessary administrative support to implement the plan.

14. COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM OF PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CSPD)

It shall be the policy of this LEA that it will support and assist the state's efforts and activities to ensure an adequate supply of qualified special education, general education, and related services personnel.

15. PERSONNEL STANDARDS

It shall be policy of this Local Education Agency (LEA) to make an ongoing, good faith effort to recruit and hire appropriately and adequately trained personnel, as defined by state standards to provide special education and related services to children with disabilities. Where there is a shortage of such personnel, the most qualified individuals available who are making satisfactory progress toward completing applicable coursework necessary to meet state standards, shall be assigned.

16. PERFORMANCE GOALS & INDICATORS

It shall be the policy of this LEA to comply with the requirements of the performance goals and indicators developed by the state and provide data as required by the state.

17. PARTICIPATION IN ASSESSMENTS

It shall be the policy of this LEA that, students with disabilities are included in general State and district-wide assessment programs, with appropriate accommodations, where necessary. For those children with disabilities who cannot participate, alternate assessment will be conducted.

18. SUPPLEMENTATION OF STATE/FEDERAL FUNDS

It shall be the policy of this LEA to include this information in the Annual Budget Plan submitted annually to the State.

19. MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide assurances that funds received from Part B of the IDEA will be expended in accordance with the applicable provisions of the IDEA; will be used to supplement state, local and other Federal funds and not to supplant those funds; and will not be used to reduce the level of local funds and/or combined level of local and state funds expended for the education of children with disabilities except as provided in Federal law and regulations.



20. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

It shall be the policy of this LEA that prior to its adoption of policies and procedures, the LEA shall make the policies and procedures available to the general public, hold public hearings and provide an opportunity for comment by the general public.

21. SUSPENSION/EXPULSION

It shall be the policy of this LEA that data on suspension and expulsion rates will be provided in a manner prescribed by the State.

22. PART C

It shall be the policy of this LEA to submit the Part C (infant/toddler) Local Interagency Agreements to the State as part of the Annual Service Plan.

State Requirements Local Policy/Procedures

I. Governance and Administration of the Local Plan

This section describes the Riverside County Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) Governance Structure responsibilities and procedures, the administrative functions necessary for implementation of the plan, and the relationship of the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) to governance.

A. Governance Structure

This section addresses the responsibilities of the governing boards, superintendents, special education administrators, finance committee, participating agencies, and procedures for changing the governance structure. Riverside County SELPA "Governance Structure" flowchart can be found in Appendix 1 and the "Managerial Job Responsibilities" can be found in Appendix 2.

1. Governing Board Responsibilities

Each participating Local Education Agency (LEA) governing board accepts responsibility in the policy-making process as demonstrated by approval of the 2003 Local Plan for the Riverside County SELPA. The procedures for carrying out that responsibility are locally defined but typically carried out by regular communication with the respective superintendent and the administrator responsible for special education.

2. Superintendent Responsibilities - Governance Council

The Governance Council consists of the twenty participating district superintendents and the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools (RCSS). The superintendents serve as representatives of the district and the county governing boards in overseeing the delivery and effectiveness of special education programs. The officers of the Governance Council are Chair and Vice Chair, with the Vice Chair succeeding the Chair the following year. The SELPA Executive Director serves as Secretary to the Governance Council. The Governance Council operates as a committee of the whole to formulate policies and develop regulations and guidelines for the operation of the Master Plan for Special Education, to allocate resources and develop an annual budget, and to mediate problems arising from the implementation of the Master Plan and the administration of contracts. It is the intent of the Governance Council to minimize financial encroachments upon school districts' general education funds.

The Governance Council adopts bylaws to govern meetings (Appendix 3), selects the SELPA Executive Director, and provides for other appropriate requirements as mandated by law.

The Governance Council Steering Committee is a subcommittee of the Governance Council. The Committee develops the agenda for Governance Council meetings and performs other duties and responsibilities as needed. The Governance Council Steering Committee consists of a representative from each zone (selected by each zone), the RCSS, the Coordinating Council Chair, and a Finance Committee Liaison. Also, the Chair and Vice Chair serve as a zone representative. The Governance Council Chair is responsible for evaluating the SELPA Executive Director.



3. Coordinating Council

The coordinating Council consists of the special education administrator, or a designated person, from each participating LEA who has been empowered by the superintendent, and/or special education administrator to act in behalf of said LEA in fiscal and educational matters related to special education. The Coordinating Council formulates potential decisions for program organization, structure, allocation, and policy issue recommendations to assure that all Individuals With Exceptional Needs (IWENS) receive appropriate program and services; provides recommendations to the Governance Council and SELPA Finance Committee; and disseminates and exchanges information. The officers of the Coordinating Council are the Past Chair, Chair and Vice Chair, with the Vice Chair succeeding the Chair the following year. The SELPA Executive Director serves as Secretary to the Coordinating Council. The Coordinating Council operates according to adopted bylaws (Appendix 4).

The Coordinating Council Steering Committee develops the agenda for Coordinating Council meetings and serves as the nominating committee in recommending a Vice Chair to the Coordinating Council. This committee consists of the SELPA Executive Director, the current and past Coordinating Council Chair, County Director of Special Education, and a representative from each zone.

4. Finance Committee

The purpose of the SELPA Finance Committee is to analyze all financial and related issues with the resulting recommendations transmitted to the Governance Council and Coordinating Council via their respective steering committees. The SELPA Finance Committee shall support the Governance Council to minimize financial encroachment upon the school districts' general education funds. The SELPA Finance Committee operates according to adopted bylaws (Appendix 5).

The SELPA Finance Committee shall be comprised of the following members: a Chief Business Official or the Superintendent's designee from each participating zone and the Riverside County Office of Education, a Fiscal Liaison to the Governance Council (to jointly serve as his/her zone representative), a Program Liaison from Coordinating Council, and the SELPA Executive Director.

5. Community Advisory Committee

The Community Advisory Committee (CAC) serves the Special Education Local Plan Area in an advisory capacity, in accordance with EC §56190-56194.

Parents comprise a majority of the membership of the CAC and of these members, the majority must be parents of children with disabilities. Members of local PTAs, special education teachers, general education classroom teachers and school personnel, students with disabilities, representatives of related public and private agencies and other persons concerned with the needs of children with disabilities may also be represented. The CAC operates according to adopted bylaws (Appendix 6).



6. Participating Agency Responsibilities

The procedures for determining the responsibility of each participating LEA to provide special education and assure access to special education and related services for all IWENs residing in the geographic area served by the Local Plan are described herein.

Each LEA is responsible to oversee the operation of those special education programs offered by that LEA and assures access to special education and related services for all IWENs residing in the area. Districts are responsible for home teaching (including severely handicapped (SH)) IWENs, Special Day Class (SDC) programs for non-SH and SH, when appropriate, Resource Specialist Programs (RSP), and Designated Instruction and Services (DIS). Pursuant to California EC §56170 and 56200, local plans may incorporate joint powers agreements and contracts between agencies within a service area. Subsequently, a SELPA-member LEA may contract with another SELPA member LEA for special education programs/services within the Riverside County SELPA. The districts contract with the RCSS (see Appendix 7) to operate programs for SH students and provide DIS for low incidence populations.

The SELPA makes available an "Intra-SELPA Permit for Individuals with Exceptional Needs Between Districts Within Riverside County SELPA" (Appendix 8), and an "Inter-SELPA Permit for Individuals with Exceptional Needs" among SELPAs (Appendix 9). Typically, the resident special education administrator initiates these permits when there is no appropriate program within the LEA. These permits facilitate the transfer of funds from the resident district to the service providers.

7. Procedures for Changing the Governance Structure

Any changes in the governance structure of the Riverside County SELPA, including dividing the SELPA into more than one operating entity or changing the designation of and/or responsibilities of the Responsible Local Agency, are subject to specific provisions of EC §56140, 56195, et seq., 56195.7 et seq., 56200 et seq., and 56205 et seq.

- 1. Any local agency which is currently designated as an LEA participating in the Riverside County SELPA may elect to pursue an alternative option from those specified in EC §56195.1 by notifying the RCSS and the Governance Council at least one year prior to the date the alternative plan would become effective (EC §56195.3(b)).
- 2. Any alternative plan of an LEA is subject to the approval of the Governance Council and the RCSS (EC §56140).
- 3. Approval of a proposed alternative plan shall be based on the capacity of the district(s) to ensure that special education programs and services are provided to all children with disabilities and meet the Size and Scope Standards presented in EC §56195.1.
- 4. The proposed SELPA(s) shall cooperate with the Office of the County Superintendent of Schools and other school districts in the geographic area in order to assure that the SELPA is compatible with the other SELPAs in the county, as required by EC §56195.3, and shall consider the impact of the formation of the new SELPA on the county as a whole and upon the SELPA or SELPAs from which they are seeking to separate, including their ability to meet the minimum size standard of 30,000 reported units of average daily attendance and the scope of requirements. Potential adverse programmatic and/or fiscal impacts must be addressed and any potential problems that effected local



educational agencies might have with the criteria and standards for fiscal accountability issues must be mitigated.

- 5. If the RCSS and the Governance Council do not approve an alternative plan, the RCSS shall return the plan with comments and recommendations to the district(s). The district or districts participating in the alternative plan may appeal the decision to the Superintendent of Public Instruction (EC §56140(b)(2)).
- 6. Any changes in the designation of the responsible local agency for the Riverside County SELPA must conform to the above code provisions and the administrative provisions for approval as specified in the Local Plan.

A change in governance structure is not the same as program transfers. Any SELPA member LEA intending to withdraw a portion or all of its SH student program from RCSS operations shall give a written preliminary notice to the Riverside County SELPA and to RCSS as specified in the "Program Transfer Language for Students with Severe Disabilities" which was approved by Governance Council, March 23, 2001. See Appendix 10 which describes types of program transfers, program transfer timelines, allocation formula for county-operated regional programs, program transfer formula, and SELPA Finance Committee and Coordinating Council Review of Requests.

B. Administrative Functions Necessary for Implementation of the Plan

This section describes the administrative functions of the responsible local agency, meeting the legal requirements for procedural safeguards, program specialist services, and the CAC responsibilities necessary for implementation of the plan.

1. Responsible Local Agency

The governing board of each participating school district has elected to join with the county office to submit to the superintendent this local plan in accordance with EC §56200. The Governance Council has designated the Riverside County Office Of Education (RCOE) to serve as the responsible Local Agency Administrative Unit (AU) as provided for in EC §56030. As such, the duties include, but are not limited to, receiving and distributing regionalized services funds in accordance with the approved budget, providing administrative support, and coordinating the implementation of the Plan. The AU is entitled to the funds generated from the indirect cost rate applied to regional income.

The SELPA Executive Director is selected by Governance Council Steering but is an employee of the RCOE. The RCOE is an equal opportunity employer. All the standard county personnel requirements and procedures shall be employed. The SELPA Executive Director is supervised and evaluated by the Governance Council Steering Committee. The SELPA Executive Director selects the SELPA staff members, who are also employees of the RCOE. The SELPA Executive Director serves as Secretary to the Governance Council, serves as Secretary to the Coordinating Council, serves as Chair to the Finance Committee, directs the SELPA office, provides support to the CAC, and performs other duties as required.



2. Meeting the Legal Requirements for Procedural Safeguards

The AU is responsible for meeting the legal requirements for procedural safeguards of Public Law 101-467 and statutes and regulations including (a) equal access to all programs and services in the region, (b) advice to parents on availability of free or low cost legal services, (c) complaints and the correction of identified problems, and (d) due process.

a. Equal Access to All Programs and Services in the Region

Both state and federal law provide that IWENs are entitled to a free, appropriate public education (FAPE) that includes special education and related services to meet their unique needs in the least restrictive environment (LRE). Each LEA must ensure that all children residing within their jurisdiction who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and related services, are identified, located, and evaluated. The LEA must establish a goal of providing full educational opportunity to all IWENs, aged birth through 21.

The laws are written to ensure that the rights of IWENs and their parents are protected. The laws require that the parent/guardian of the IWEN receive from the LEA a written description of procedural rights. This requirement is met through the Riverside County SELPA "Notice of Procedural Safeguards and Parent Rights" (Appendix 11).

b. Advice to Parents on Availability of Free or Low Cost Legal Services

Both the parents and the LEA have significant legal rights in connection with the special education of an IWEN. These rights become operative when there is a proposal or refusal by either party to initiate or change the identification, assessment, or educational placement of an IWEN or the provision of FAPE to the child. This most often occurs in connection with the development of an Individualized Education Program (IEP) for the IWEN. Any disagreement regarding proposals or refusals described above is an appropriate issue for a due process hearing. Either or both parties have the right to initiate a due process hearing petition. Upon request, the Riverside County SELPA, RCOE, and/or LEA will provide advice to parents on availability of free or low cost legal services (Appendix 12).

c. Complaint Procedures and Uniform Complaint Procedures

Each LEA must annually notify in writing its students, employees, and the parents/guardians of its students about the procedures for filing a complaint. The LEA notification includes the opportunity to appeal a local decision to the California Department of Education (CDE), any civil law remedies that may be available, and the procedures the CDE will use in investigating the complaint.

The "Notice of Procedural Safeguards and Parent Rights" contains information on complaint procedures. The Riverside County SELPA Complaint Procedures are provided in Appendix 13. Because the RCOE serves as the responsible local agency administrative unit, the SELPA follows the county office Uniform Complaint Procedures (Appendix 14).

d. <u>Due Process</u>. The description of due process procedures in EC §56500.2-56507, for purposes of Code of Regulations, 34 CFR 300.237, are hereby included in the Local Plan by reference. The Riverside County SELPA Procedural Safeguards explain definition of

terms, confidentiality of information, when rights come into effect, initiating a due process procedure/mediation conference (including stay put provisions to reflect EC \$56343 (d) "appropriateness of placement"), due process hearing, rights and responsibilities of the hearing officer, and award of attorney fees.

3. Annual Evaluation Activities

The Riverside County SELPA realizes the need to establish an ongoing evaluation process to ensure that special education programs are offered for all IWENs within the geographical area. Such evaluation provides the information necessary to refine and improve policies, regulations, guidelines and procedures and fulfill evaluation requirements under EC §56601.

The SELPA Executive Director is responsible for the overall coordination, implementation, and reporting of annual evaluation efforts. Forms and surveys for the gathering, recording, and compilation of data are reviewed by the SELPA Executive Director and Coordinating Council for relevancy, consistency, duplication, and effective reduction of paperwork. Data gathering, compilation, reporting, and local review are completed by the LEA designated responsible individual. Each LEA responsible individual involves DIS personnel, regular teachers, special education teachers, administrators, parents, program specialists, and others as appropriate in the evaluation activities. Aggregated data collected by district responsible individuals is forwarded to the SELPA Executive Director for compilation into the annual evaluation. The SELPA Executive Director prepares a pupil count report that includes, but is not limited to, racial and ethnic distribution of IWENs.

II. Regionalized Services to Local Programs

In order to implement the Local Plan, the SELPA Managerial Staff has been delineated specific job responsibilities (Appendix 2) and the provision of regionalized service as follows:

- Coordinating services with other agencies
- Ensuring program availability for all children with disabilities
- Guidance for surrogate parent training
- Community Advisory Committee support
- 0 Transition planning
- Legal assistance
- Budget planning and review evaluation
- Program coordination
- Fiscal management
- Program coordination
- Community awareness
- Personnel development for staff, parents, community and governing boards as appropriate. Such staff development programs will be coordinated with other staff development programs in the SELPA. LEAs may also provide personnel development coordinated within their respective district.
- Data collection and implementation of required county supported Management Information Systems.
- Curriculum and program development and support for special education programs and services in the SELPA.
- Ongoing review of special education programs and procedures in the SELPA, and mechanisms for correcting any identified problems. Such review and procedures will be in



accordance with any state level procedures, but may include local interventions starting at the most direct level of intervention, e.g., district support to the classroom teacher who needs it, or training and instruction in the identified problem area.

Program Specialist dollars are distributed to each SELPA member LEA to conduct services as defined in EC § 56368. Program Specialists are hired by the local LEA and hold a valid Special Education credential, or are a school psychologist authorization and has advanced training on related experience in the education IWENs and have specialized in-depth knowledge in preschool disabilities, career vocational development, or one or more areas of major disabling conditions. Program specialist activities include:

- Observe, consult with, and assist resource specialists, designated instruction and services instructors, and special class teachers.
- Plan programs, coordinate curricular resources, and evaluate effectiveness of programs for individuals with exceptional needs.
- Participate in each school's staff development, program development, and innovation of special methods and approaches.
- Provide coordination, consultation and program development primarily in one specialized area or areas of his or her expertise.
- Be responsible for assuring that pupils have full educational opportunity regardless of the district of residence.

III. Verification that a CAC has been Established

Riverside County SELPA assures that a Community Advisory Committee (CAC) as described in the Governance section of this document has been established. The CAC serves the Special Education Local Plan Area in an advisory capacity, in accordance with EC §56190-56194 has been established. Several SELPA-member districts have their own local parent groups that support the SELPA's CAC activities.

IV. Supplementation of State/Federal Funds

It shall be the policy of this SELPA to include this information in the Annual Budget Plan submitted annually to the State.

V. Maintenance of Effort

It shall be the policy of this SELPA to provide assurances that funds received from Part B of the IDEA will be expended in accordance with the applicable provisions of the IDEA; will be used to supplement state, local and other Federal funds and not to supplant those funds; and will not be used to reduce the level of local funds and/or combined level of local and state funds expended for the education of children with disabilities except as provided in Federal law and regulations.

VI. Public Participation

Members of the public, including parents or guardians of IWENs who are receiving services under the plan, may address questions or concerns to the governing body at quarterly meetings of the SELPA Governance Council. The Governance Council agenda provides opportunities for the public to address the council regarding agenda and non-agenda items at each meeting.



VII. Annual Budget Plan

The Riverside county SELPA has developed a funding diagram displaying how the money flows to SELPA and LEAs (Appendix 15). There are four major funding sources:

- Local Property Taxes (approximately 36% of the county office allocation)
- Federal Services (local assistance and pass-through grants)
- State Aid and revenue limit apportionment
- Other state and local revenue

The distribution of funds is based on the Assembly Bill (AB) 602 Final Funding Allocation Plan approved by Governance Council. The Allocation Plan contained in Appendix 16 includes guiding principles and the following funding components:

- 2. SELPA Funds and Services
- 3. Allocation of Funds for Nonpublic Schools/Agencies (NPS/A)
- 4. Allocation of Funds for Contracted Regional Special Education Programs/Services
- 5. Special Education Revenue Generated by Students in Alternative Education Programs
- 6. Desert Center Unified School District (USD)
- 7. Inter/Intra SELPA Transfers and Services
- 8. Declining ADA Adjustment
- 9. Allocation of Equity Funds
- 10. Extended School Year (ESY) Funds
- 11. Facilities, Maintenance and Operations Agreements
- 12. Program Transfers
- 13. Budget Process
- 14. Procedures for Making Changes in Budgetary Allocations
- Addendum 1a Funding for Contracted Regional Special Education Programs/Services
- Addendum 1b SELPA Member District Allocations
- Addendum 2 SELPA Policy for Special Circumstance Assistants and County-operated SH Student Programs
- Addendum 3 Program Transfer Language for Students with Severe Disabilities

Any changes will be made, as needed, by vote of the Governance Council.

An Annual Budget Plan is prepared and presented to the SELPA Finance Committee and Governance Council by mid June for the following year. Other budgets/reports per the Memorandum of Understanding between RCSS and the Riverside County SELPA. The following budges/reports shall be prepared and presented to the SELPA Finance Committee and Governance Council pursuant to the following timelines:

- 2002-2003 First Interim Report by mid December 2002
- 2002-2003 Second Interim Report by late March 2003
- 2003-2004 Preliminary Budget by late March 2003
- 2003-2004 Annual Budget by mid June 2003



The procedure for any change in governance structure follows the same procedure outlined in Section V G, Procedures for Making Changes in Budgetary Allocations, in that, the three major committees (Governance Council, Coordinating Council, Finance Committee) are included in the review of all phases.

VIII. Annual Service Plan

In accordance with EC §56205(b)(2), the Riverside County SELPA Annual Service Plan demonstrates that all individuals with exceptional needs shall have access to services and instruction appropriate to meet their needs as specified in their individualized education programs.

Development of Flexible Service Delivery Models

The Riverside County SELPA has a strong commitment to creating a single, seamless and unified service delivery model for all students. The SELPA recognizes its obligation to provide concerted efforts to support students in the least restrictive environment. Therefore, we acknowledge the need to expand strategies to maintain students in general education. This requires the provision of supplementary aids and services to support students with disabilities in general education classes; thereby, ensuring a full spectrum of program options including quality special education class services in various locations. To this end, it is the intent of Riverside County SELPA to support member LEAs in developing programs that offer flexible service delivery. The SELPA has a coordinator on staff whose job description includes assisting districts in developing new ways of looking at how we support the needs of all students. Part of the job responsibilities of this Coordinator is to provide vehicles for districts to initiate and implement collaboration between special and general education and to work with districts in designing alternative delivery systems for students currently in more restrictive environments.

Current Program Options

The Riverside County SELPA ensures that a continuum of program options is available to meet the needs of IWENs for special education and related services. The IEP team's determination of appropriate program placement, related services needed, and curriculum options to be offered is based upon the unique needs of the disabled pupil rather than the label describing the disabling condition or the availability of the program.

The following program options apply to 3-5 year old IWENs as well as 6-21 years olds. Program options for identified children under three years of age and their families are addressed in Section 9 of this plan. IWENs may receive special education and related services in any one or more of the following program options:

- Regular Class with Accommodations: Student is educated in the general education classroom. Accommodations to the general education curriculum are determined and implemented through collaboration between general and special education personnel.
- Resource Services (school-based program): Services as described in the school plan to
 address student's IEP goals are provided in an integrated resource program including general
 education and special education program options.



- Resource Specialist Program: Service that provides instruction and services to those students whose needs have been identified in an IEP, and are assigned to regular classroom teacher for the majority of a school day.
- Special Day Inclusion Services: Student is educated in the general education classroom. Modifications to the general curriculum are usually required more than 50% of the school day.
- Special Day Class in Pubic Integrated Facility: Setting that provides intensive instruction and services to pupils when the nature or severity of the disability precludes their participation in the regular school program for a majority of a school day.

This includes children placed in self-contained special classrooms with part-time instruction in a regular class or self-contained special classrooms full-time on a regular school campus. (EC §56364).

- Special Day Class in Public Separate Facility: Setting in which disabled children and youth receive special education and related services of a majority of the school day in a public separate facility.
- Special Day Class in Nonpublic School: Setting in which disabled children and youth
 receive special education and related services for a majority of the school day in a nonpublic
 facility.
- Home and Hospital: Services delivered in the home or hospital to student when, for medical reasons (including psychiatric reasons) or any other reasons, the student is unable to attend school.

Designated Instruction and Services

A student with an identified disability may be provided with DIS while participating in general education environment the majority of the school day, part time, and/or while in special education the majority of the school day.

DIS options include the following:

- Adapted Physical Education (APE).
- Audiological Services
- Counseling
- Deaf/Hard of Hearing (DHH) Itinerant Services
- Guidance Services
- Nursing Services
- Occupational Therapy (OT)
- Orientation and Mobility
- Parent Counseling
- Physical Therapy (PT) Services
- Speech/Language (S/L) Services
- Special Circumstance Instructional Aide (SCIA)
- Social Work Services



- Visually Impaired (VI) Itinerant
- Vocational Education Training
- Recreation Services
- Vision Services
- Specialized Driver Training
- Psychological Services
- Specialized Services for Low Incidence Disabilities

Infant and Preschool Services

Infant services are available through Inland Regional Center and the Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE), and the Palo Verde Unified School District (PVUSD). Districts other than PVUSD begin serving identified students at age 2.6 - 2.9 for transition into specified program at age 3. The program specialist is the primary contact for preschool services. Students with identified disabilities aged 3-5 may receive any of the special education supports listed below as determined by the IEP team.

Least Restrictive Environment

The Riverside County SELPA endorses the California State Department of Education "Policy Statement of Least Restrictive Environment." The state policy is based on the principle that IWENs should receive their education in chronologically age appropriate environments with non-disabled peers. The principle maintains that both non-disabled and disabled children are most successfully educated in a shared environment where qualities of understanding, cooperation and mutual respect are nurtured. Children with disabilities are removed from the regular education environment only when the nature or severity of the disability is such that education in the regular education environment with supplementary aids or services cannot be achieved satisfactorily.

a. <u>SELPA Policy</u> The Riverside County SELPA provides a full range of program options designed to meet the educational service needs of IWENs in the least restrictive environment (LRE). The determination of LRE for each IWEN is based on IEP team consideration of where the goals/objectives can be implemented most successfully. The SELPA LRE policy states that:

"Special education programs and services under its jurisdiction shall be provided in the LRE to students with disabilities. Special assistance shall be offered to these students in a setting which promotes maximum interaction with the general school population and which is appropriate to both. The goal shall be maintained to provide the maximum opportunity for interaction with peers without disabilities, regardless of educational setting.

IX. Early Education Program Description

A. Interagency Agreement

The Riverside County SELPA has entered into an agreement with Inland Regional Center to describe selected policies and procedures relating to the implementation of California's Early Intervention Services Act (GC §95000 et seq.) and the regulations, procedures for resolving disputes, and other components necessary to ensure effective cooperation and coordination between the two agencies. (Appendix 17)



B. Program Description

The Riverside County Office of Education operates the Early Start Infant CIRCLE Program, the LEA component of Early Intervention Services. Infants residing in Riverside County who have medical or developmental problems and are under three years of age may be eligible for services. The infant CIRCLE Program has three primary focuses:

- Home visits include assessment in the home by a multidisciplinary team, parent training to maximize the infant's development, informal discussions and support.
- The school program offers group activities in a Parent-Infant classroom focusing on behavior skills and socialization. Parent training includes information on how a baby grows, disability awareness, and strategies and interventions to enhance the child's development.
- The parent support component includes discussion groups, parent inservices, assisting the family to acquire necessary additional services for the child, and connecting the family with other agencies.

1. Procedures for Initiating and Processing Referrals

Anyone who has a concern about an infant's growth or development may make a referral to the Early Start Infant CIRCLE Program. The staff complete an Early Start Program Referral Form and assign the referral to an intake coordinator. The intake coordinator contacts the parent/guardian to arrange for an initial intake interview in the child's home. This interview consists of basic questions regarding the child's health, developmental history, diagnosis (if any), strengths, weaknesses, and needs. Discussion of the family's needs and concerns also occurs at this time. The intake coordinator then determines the team members necessary for evaluation and the assessment segment of the identification process. Parent rights and responsibilities in the Early Start Program are explained and, upon completion of assessment, an Early Start Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed.

Anyone who has a concern about a preschool child's growth or development may make an initial referral. For infants previously identified as candidates for special education program services who have an IFSP, the transition process into a preschool program begins when the child reaches the age of 30 months (2 years, 6 months). The Early Start Infant CIRCLE staff discuss a transition plan with the family, update assessment reports as necessary, and forward a copy of the child's IFSP and assessment report(s) to the child's district of residence. LEA staff review the child's file, make a referral to the RCSS (if appropriate), and schedule joint IEP team meeting with past and potential services providers. The IEP team follows the procedures described below regarding IEP development. This process should occur by age 3.0 to ensure uninterrupted services and a smooth transition.

Initial preschool referrals are reviewed in a format similar to the SST process. The preschool team obtains information from the child's parent/guardian and from preschool program staff (when appropriate). The team meeting provides the opportunity to discuss the child's growth and development relative to expectations, intervention strategies, and the child's potential need for assessment to determine eligibility for special education program services.

2. Determining Eligibility

The results of testing will determine eligibility of the child for the program. Eligibility for services are based on developmental delay and/or one of the following diagnosed conditions:



- Chromosomal Abnormality
- Environmentally Caused Malformation
- Skeletal and Muscular System Malformations
- Neurological Disorder
- Metabolic Disorder
- Postnatal Handicapping Condition

3. Developing an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP)

The Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is to be developed after a multidisciplinary team completes an evaluation that determines that a child is eligible for early intervention services. The following requirements relate to the development of the IFSP:

- IFSP meeting is convened within 45 calendar days after the referral is received.
- Upon establishing eligibility, arrangements are made for a convenient meeting date, time and place. A written notice is provided to the family in a timely manner.
- If parent requests, the meeting is conducted in the parents' native language or primary mode of communication.
- Meeting participants must include parent, service coordinator, person(s) directly involved in evaluation; and may include other family members, advocate or person outside of the family, person(s) to be providing services.
- The IFSP is to be developed jointly by the family and the appropriate qualified personnel.
- Review of the IFSP must be done every six months or more frequently if the parent or service provider(s) requests.
- Review of the IFSP may be conducted at any time to update the IFSP and make revisions as needed.

Once identified as an IWEN the range of program options available include DIS only, Giving Real Advantage to Special Preschoolers, district-operated SDC, County-operated SDC placement, or NPS/A services.

X. Dispute Resolution Process

Should disputes arise concerning special education related matters or related to the interpretation of this Local Plan between or among the LEAs, the disputing LEAs shall first attempt to arrive at a settlement. If settlement is not reached at the LEA level, the Riverside County SELPA Executive Director shall mediate the dispute. Any dispute regarding program issues not successfully resolved by the SELPA Executive Director shall be referred to the Coordinating Council. Any dispute regarding fiscal issues not successfully resolved by the SELPA Executive Director shall be referred to the SELPA Finance Committee.

The Coordinating Council and/or Finance Committee will discuss issues, conflicts, or proposed changes until either a common recommendation to the Governance Council can be made or differing options can be presented. The Governance Council may adopt a position by a majority vote or refer the issue back to the Coordinating Council and Finance Committee with input so as to assist these two bodies in developing a consensus recommendation. The Governance Council shall hear the facts of the dispute and shall render a written decision on the matter, which shall be binding on the parties.

XII. Charter Schools

Provision of Special Education Services to Students Voluntarily Enrolled in Charter Schools

Introduction

This policy applies to all charter schools that are chartered by an LEA in the Riverside County Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) Riverside County SELPA (hereinafter SELPA) or granted a charter on appeal by the Riverside County Board of Education or the State Board of Education in which oversight responsibilities have been assigned to a SELPA-member LEA. This policy only extends to a charter school that was chartered by, or assigned to, an entity that is a member of the SELPA.

Students enrolled in charter schools are entitled to special education services provided in a similar manner to students enrolled in other public schools. Charter schools within the SELPA shall comply with requirements of all applicable state and federal law regarding provision of special education services (EC §56000 et seq., Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 20 U.S.C. Chapter 33). A charter school shall not discriminate against any pupil in its admission criteria on the basis of disability. Students enrolled in charter schools shall receive services in a manner similar to students enrolled in other public schools within the SELPA. The Charter School shall be treated as all other SELPA-member LEAs by the administrative unit and the SELPA Director.

Charter schools must delineate in their memorandum of understanding (MOU) the entity responsible for providing special education instruction and related services. This document must reference any anticipated transfer of special education funds between the granting LEA and the charter school and any provisions for sharing deficits and/or proration factors in funding. This document must affirm, in writing, that the district where the student resides, if different than the chartering LEA, is not responsible for providing special education services to students that are enrolled in the charter school.1 The written agreement must also state that prior to final approval of a request to be deemed a local educational agency (LEA), the charter school will be deemed a public school within the chartering entity.²

SELPA Involvement with Approval and Renewal of Charters

Prior to approval of a new charter school, or renewal of an existing charter school, the petitioner shall consult with both the superintendent or designee of the chartering entity and the SELPA Director to ensure that the charter school responds to district and SELPA guidelines and timelines as they related to special education. The petition presented must provide assurances that all eligible students enrolled in the charter school will receive appropriate special education services

in accordance with appropriate state and federal law and the SELPA Local Plan for Special Education (Local Plan). The petition shall provide that no student otherwise eligible to enroll in the charter school will be denied enrollment due to a disability or to the charter school's inability to provide necessary services. Each charter petition must contain a reasonably comprehensive description of the charter school's educational program, as it relates to the provision of special education services, including the following:

- The specialized instruction and services available at the charter school;
- The procedures for ensuring that students are referred, assessed and served in a timely manner;
- Assurances that staff members providing special education services are appropriately credentialed;
- Assurances that the facility used by the charter school does not present physical barriers that would limit an eligible student's full participation in the educational and extracurricular program;⁴
- Disenrollment, suspension and expulsion policies and procedures must ensure that the protections of federal and state law are afforded to special education and 504 eligible students; and
- Dispute resolution procedures that will apply to any disputes between educational entities, including the SELPA, regarding the provision of special education services in the charter school.

Categories of Charter Schools

For the purposes of provision of special education services, charter schools shall be deemed either a public school within the chartering district or an LEA that receives funds and provides services independent of the chartering entity. All approved charter schools will be deemed public schools within the chartering entity until the charter school has been deemed an LEA following this policy and decision making process outlined in Section II, Governance and Administration of the Local Plan. The categorization as a separate LEA will become effective on the first day of the fiscal year (July 1), following final approval by the SELPA Governance Council.

A. <u>Public School Within a School District or RCOE</u>

Charter schools that are deemed to be public schools within the chartering entity will participate in state and federal funding in the same manner as other schools or programs within the chartering entity. The chartering entity will be responsible for ensuring that all children with disabilities enrolled in the charter school receive special education and designated instruction and services in a manner that is consistent with all applicable

provisions of state and federal law. The chartering entity will determine the policies and procedures necessary to ensure that the protections of special education law extend to students in the charter school in the same manner as students enrolled in other schools or programs administered by the chartering entity.

The chartering entity will:

- Receive all applicable special education funds as specified in the SELPA's Assembly Bill (AB) 602 Funding Allocation Plan. The allocation per ADA in the charter school will be the same as that received by the chartering entity, if chartered by a district. If the chartering entity is the COE, the allocation for students enrolled in the charter school will be equal to the average allocation per ADA of member districts within the SELPA, excluding Desert Center Unified School District as this district is treated as a sparse LEA.
- Represent the needs of the charter school in the SELPA governance structure;
- Be responsible for ensuring that all eligible students enrolled in the charter school are appropriately referred, assessed and served in a timely manner;
- Be responsible for procuring and funding appropriate special education services, where ever the student may reside; and
- Provide necessary special education services or contract for these services with public or private educational agencies.

The chartering LEA and the charter school may enter into business agreements or contracts whereby the charter school agrees to pay for the excess costs associated with providing special education services to identified students, including the administration of special education programs. When the chartering entity is a district, the charter school should be held fiscally responsible for a fair share of any encroachment on district general funds that is created by the provision of special education services throughout the district⁵.

B. Charter School As an LEA Within The SELPA

Application must be made to the SELPA on or before February 1 of the school year preceding the school year in which the charter school anticipates operating as an LEA within the SELPA. LEA status will not become effective prior to July 1 of the year in which final approval was granted. Once granted LEA status, a charter school will participate on an equal basis with other members in the governance of the SELPA. The LEA charter school will choose a representative to the Governance Council and a representative to the Coordinating Council. The representative to the Governance Council Bylaws. The representative to the Coordinating Council must be an authorized agent designated by the governing board of the charter school. Like other members of the SELPA, the

charter school will be represented on the SELPA Finance Committee by the individual chosen from the geographic zone in which the charter school is located.

The applicant charter school will be deemed an LEA if the SELPA Governance Council determines that the charter school has met all requirements to be included as a member LEA of the SELPA as specified in this policy and the Local Plan. These requirements include:

- Provide assurances that all individuals with exceptional needs (ages birth to 22) shall have access to appropriate special education programs and services;
- Provide assurances that each certificated employee is appropriately credentialed to serve in his/her assignment;
- Provide necessary staff as required to meet federal and state mandates;
- Follow all SELPA policies and procedures;
- Utilize SELPA approved forms;
- Place special education students in programs administered by other SELPA members only with; either inter or intra SELPA permits and/or interdistrict permits;
- Provide transportation as indicated on the student's IEP; and
- Indemnify and hold harmless each of the member entities.

Once deemed an LEA, the charter school shall:

- Participate in governance of the SELPA by naming one representative to the Governance Council and a representative to the Coordinating Council;
- Contribute to, participate in, and receive the benefits of reimbursement from the SELPA Nonpublic School/Agency Pool in the same manner as other members. 6
- Receive state and federal funding for special education in accordance with the SELPA AB 602 Funding Allocation Plan. The LEA charter school will be entitled to special education allocations that are based on the school's ADA at the average rate received by member districts, excluding Desert Center Unified in calculating the average;
- In the same manner as other members of the SELPA, any available federal funds will be disbursed one year in arrears and calculated based on applicable special

education counts⁷;

- Be responsible for all costs incurred in the provision of special education services. These costs may include, but are not limited to, instruction, services, transportation, nonpublic school/agency placements, inter/intra SELPA placements, due process proceedings, complaints and attorney fees;
- Document that all State and Federal special education funds apportioned to the charter school are used for the sole purpose of providing special education instruction and/or services to identified students with disabilities; and

Special education apportionment must be used solely for the purpose of providing special education instruction and/or services to identified students with disabilities. Any apportionment not used for provision of special education will be reviewed by the Governance Council and Finance Committee for potential recapture and/or reallocation of funds.

XIII. Literacy

All students with special needs will have the opportunity to participate in the general education curriculum as developed by the IEP team. The IEP team will consider the special needs of a student on an individual basis. One of the areas of participation will be the California Reading Initiative. Special education instructional personnel will participate in staff development inservice opportunities in the area of literacy that include:

- 1. information about current literacy and learning research
- 2. state adopted standards and frameworks
- 3. increased participation of students with disabilities in statewide student assessments
- 4. research-based instructional strategies for teaching reading to a wide range of diverse learners in order to increase the percentage of children with disabilities who are literate.

In order to address these goals, we assure that students with disabilities will have full access to:

- 1. all required core curriculum including state adopted core curriculum text books and supplementary text books; and
- 2. instructional materials and support in order that students with disabilities attain higher standards in reading.

2002-2003 SECOND INTERIM FINANCIAL REPORT

We have received and reviewed your 2002-2003 Second Interim Financial Report. Your governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

The 2002-2003 State Budget Act and related legislation deferred categorical funding, totaling \$681 million statewide, to 2003-2004. In addition, subsequent to the board's positive certification, Governor Davis signed special legislation, SB X1 18, that further addresses the current year state deficit. A summary of the major provisions of this legislation prepared by School Services of California, Inc. is enclosed for your information. We recommend that the district review this information in conjunction with your current operating budget and revise the budget accordingly.

A major provision in this legislation is the deferral of the 2002-2003 June apportionment from June 25 to July 2. The payroll schedule for June will remain the same. The 12M payroll and fixed charges will post to the district's financial accounts on June 26. Payroll warrants will not be released if the district has insufficient cash. We recommend that the district review and revise as appropriate the cash flow projections in order to assess your ability to meet June financial obligations. Please refer to our March 6, 2003, correspondence regarding Cash Flow Requirements for borrowing options available to school districts (copy enclosed).

Our analysis of the Second Interim Financial Report included the multi-year financial projections approved by the board. The projections indicate expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$961,444 in the current fiscal year. The projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 fiscal years based on the following major assumptions:

Should these assumptions not materialize as planned, the board will need to adjust the budget plan accordingly.

The report indicates that classified salary negotiations have not been concluded for the current fiscal year. Government Code Section 3547.5 requires that the major provisions of a proposed collective bargaining agreement, including the projected cost of the agreement, be disclosed at a public meeting prior to governing board approval. Please provide a copy of this information to our office ten days prior to board approval.

While SB 1X 18 addressed the current state deficit, a significant deficit is still projected in the next 12 to 18 months. The Legislature has begun formal hearings on the 2003-2004 State Budget. It is anticipated that the May Revise will be released on May 14, which will provide an update on the status of state revenues. However, due to the dynamic nature of the legislative process, it may be difficult, if not impossible, to quantify the different proposals and their impact on your 2003-2004 budget and multi-year financial projections.

We recommend that districts take the following actions to prepare for the likely reductions in state revenues:

- Avoid and defer discretionary spending.
- Not incur additional financial obligations.
- Identify options for temporary borrowing to meet cash flow requirements.
- Review and rank the district's priorities and programs.
- Identify options for budget reductions.

Education Codes 42126-27 and 42130 require the board to approve multi-year financial projections for the current and at least two subsequent fiscal years that separately projects unrestricted resources, restricted resources and the combined general fund. The projections should reflect current and anticipated changes in the district's revenues, operational programs, debt service obligations and/or enrollment and attendance trends. This process will assist the board in providing for the long-range financial stability of the district. Please provide our office with a copy of the updated multi-year financial projections, including assumptions, with the submission of your 2003-2004 Adopted Budget.
