HEARING SESSION

I. Hold Public Hearing on Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP)

(Mr. Edmunds)

The District currently has 12 schools that receive funding through the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP). Under the Public Schools Accountability Act (PSAA), a school is eligible to apply for II/USP funding if it placed in the lower five deciles of the API statewide ranking and failed to meet its API growth target. According to the law, to meet its growth target, a school must not only meet its five percent school wide growth target, but also growth targets for all numerically significant pupil subgroups in the school.

The act of applying for II/USP funding is a proactive step, demonstrating commitment on the part of administrators, teachers, and parents in eligible schools to be held accountable for academic performance. Schools selected for II/USP received a \$50,000 planning grant for developing the school's action plan to improve pupil achievement and up to \$200 per pupil in implementation funding for two years.

The Education Code requires that a public hearing be held regarding II/USP schools that have not met their API growth targets in either or both of their first two implementation years. There are five schools in the District that fall into this category: Pacific Avenue, Van Buren, Mission Middle, Jurupa Valley High, and Rubidoux High Schools. The purpose of the public hearing is to provide information on the status of these schools and the interventions in place to continue progress toward meeting growth targets.

Each of these II/USP schools has been working with an external evaluator to develop and implement an Action Plan with involvement from staff, parents, and community. These Action Plans identify interventions that are designed to improve instruction and increase student achievement. While each school has identified a variety of specific intervention strategies, these can be grouped into broad programs:

- Staff development in content literacy, differentiated instruction, data analysis, and other areas.
- Curriculum and classroom instruction focused on mastery of standards.
- Assessments to modify instructional practice and target appropriate interventions.
- Extended learning opportunities available for students.
- Increased parent involvement and communication.

President Carolyn Adams should formally open a public hearing on the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP). After public comments or questions, the hearing should be formally closed.

II. <u>Hold Public Hearing on Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Program</u> (Mr. Mercurius)

Education Code 60119 specifies that governing boards of a school district are required to hold a public hearing for Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials compliance. The Board President should formally open a hearing on the Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive program grades K-12. The California Department of Education requires that the local Board of Education authorize the District to enter into an agreement to provide child care services in the State Preschool Program. In addition, the State requires approval of a resolution that includes those employees authorized to sign transactions for the Governing Board. A copy of Resolution #2004/06 is included in the supporting documents. Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2004/06, entering into an agreement with the California Department of Education to provide childcare and developmental services in the fiscal year 2003/04.

* 6. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for Jurupa Valley High (Mr. Jensen)

Mr. Rob Norwood, teacher at Jurupa Valley High School, is requesting approval to travel to Mammoth Lakes with six (6) students on Sunday, August 10 through Tuesday, August 12, 2003. The purpose of the trip is to participate in an FFA Officer Planning Retreat and develop the year's calendar and events. Students will camp at the New Shady Rest Campground in Mammoth Lakes. Transportation will be provided through district and personal vehicles, **costs will be paid through the FFA account**, and staff and parent volunteers will provide supervision. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for Mr. Rob Norwood to travel to Mammoth Lakes with six (6) students to participate in an FFA Office Planning Retreat on Sunday, August 10 through Tuesday, August 12, 2003.

Mr. Jay Hammer, Mr. Sam Gee, and Mr. Ruben Aguirre, teachers at Rubidoux High School, are requesting approval travel to Henderson, Nevada on Friday, September 12 through Sunday, September 14, 2003 with forty (40) students. The purpose of the trip is to attend the annual Cross Country Invitational and compete against students from various high schools. Transportation will be by district vehicles, lodging will be at the Wild Wild West Motel in Las Vegas, costs will be paid through fundraiser activities and donations, and staff members will provide supervision. The Cross Country Invitational will be hosted by Basic High School in Henderson. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for Mr. Jay Hammer, Mr. Sam Gee, and Mr. Ruben Aguirre, teachers at Rubidoux High School, to travel to Henderson, Nevada on Friday, September 12 through Sunday, September 14, 2003 with forty (40) students to participate in the annual Cross Country Invitational.

* 8. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High

(Mr. Jensen)

Mr. Jay Hammer, Mr. Sam Gee, and Mr. Ruben Aguirre, teachers at Rubidoux High School, are requesting approval travel to Palo Alta, CA on Thursday, September 25 through Sunday, September 28, 2003 with thirty (30) students. The purpose of the trip is to attend the annual Cross Country Invitational and compete against students from various high schools. Transportation will be by district vehicles, lodging will be at a local motel, costs will be paid through fundraiser activities and donations, and staff members will provide supervision. Stanford University in Palo Alto will host the Cross Country Invitational. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Jay Hammer, Mr. Sam Gee, and Mr. Ruben Aguirre, teachers at Rubidoux High School, to travel to Palo Alto on Thursday, September 25 through Sunday, September 28, 2003 with thirty (30) students to participate in the annual Cross Country Invitational at Stanford University.

B. Affirm Submittal of 2003-2004 Agricultural Vocational Education Incentive Grant Proposals (Mr. Jensen)

The Director of Secondary Education submitted an Agricultural Vocational Education Incentive Grant for each comprehensive high school for the period of July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004. Rubidoux High School is eligible to apply for \$24,350 and Jurupa Valley High School is applying for \$21,130. The purpose of this grant is to improve the quality of the educational program by upgrading agriculture equipment and instructional materials. Due to the stalled State budget process the grant notification was sent late by the California Department of Education and it was not possible for this request to be submitted to the Board in a timely manner. A copy of each application is included in the supporting documents. Although this application requires matching funds, the District is requesting a Superintendent's waiver due to the reduction of program and educational support and the District's continued increase in student population. Administration requests that the Board affirm submittal of the Agricultural Vocational Education Incentive Grant proposals for Rubidoux and Jurupa Valley High Schools.

C. Adopt Resolution #2004/05, Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Programs, Grades K-12 (Mr. Mercurius)

The Education Code (E.C.) specifies that the governing boards of school districts are subject to the requirements of E.C. 60119 in order to receive funding for the Pupil Textbooks and Instructional Materials Program, Grades K-12 and/or funding for instructional materials from any state source. The Board shall make a determination by adopting a resolution, as to whether each pupil in each school in the district has, or will have prior to the end of the fiscal year, sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in each subject that are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the state board.

Listed below is a summary of E.C. 60119 specific requirements for district eligibility to receive funds from the Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Program:

- The governing board shall hold a public hearing or hearings at which time the governing board shall encourage participation by parents, teachers, members of the community, and bargaining unit leaders.
- Ten days notice of the public hearing or hearings containing the time, place, and purpose of the hearing and posting in three public places in the district.
- Through a resolution make a determination whether each pupil in each school in the district has or will have prior to the end of the fiscal year sufficient textbooks or instructional materials or both pursuant to the curriculum framework adopted by the state board.
- If the determination is that there are insufficient textbooks or instructional materials or both, the governing board shall provide information to classroom teachers and to the public identifying the reasons that each pupil does not have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials and take action to ensure within a two year period from the determination that sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials are provided.

Administration has determined that the District meets the specific requirements of E.C. 60119 and, therefore, recommends adoption of Resolution 2004/05 to certify that the District has complied with the requirements of Education Code 60119(c).

D. Approve Issuance of Purchase Order #47749, Support and Maintenance Contract for Follett Library System (Mr. Mercurius)

The Education Technology Department is requesting renewal of the annual maintenance and support contract for the Follett Library System Software-Catalog, Union Catalog, Circulation, and Web Collection for all school sites in the amount of \$13,545.25, which will be paid for out of the General Fund. Prior to the 2000/01 school year, individual schools had contractual agreements with the Follett (Library) Software Company for purchase, support, and maintenance. Beginning in the 2000/01 school year, the purchase of the Follett Library Software was consolidated at the district level, which resulted in a \$4,418.75 savings and provided consistent software and maintenance systems at all sites. Administration recommends that the Board approve issuance of Purchase Order #47749, annual support and maintenance contract for the Follett Library System.

- E. <u>Approve Submittal of English Language Acquisition Program Application</u>* (Ms. Sheppy) The Language Services Department is requesting approval to submit an *English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP)* Application for Funding for 2003-2004. Funds would assist in increasing the rate of redesignation, increasing the high school completion rate, and improving test scores on ELD and State Assessments. A copy of the application is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve submittal of the *English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP)* application.
- F. Review and Approve Consolidated Application School Level Plans**

 (Ms. Moreno) Schools receiving categorical funds covered by the Consolidated Application are required to design programs and submit plans for the use of these funds. Programs included in these plans are: School Improvement (School Based Coordinated Programs), Title I (Schoolwide and Targeted), EIA-Compensatory Education, EIA-Bilingual, SB-1882 Staff Development, Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities (DFSC), Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE), and Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP). School level plans must contain a description of how sites will also serve students who are educationally disadvantaged, English Learners, special education, and gifted and talented students. The following school level plans have been updated and reflect data regarding student achievement and modifications to strategies based on analysis of this data: Camino Real, Glen Avon, Granite Hill, Ina Arbuckle, Indian Hills, Pacific Avenue, Pedley, Peralta, Rustic Lane, Sky Country, Stone Avenue, Sunnyslope, Troth Street, Van Buren, West Riverside, Jurupa Middle, Mission Middle, Rubidoux High, and Jurupa Valley High.

Title I regulations contain a provision for developing and implementing schoolwide programs that provide greater flexibility in the use of categorical funds and instructional programs that are focused on schoolwide program improvement. Currently, twelve schools (Glen Avon, Granite Hill, Ina Arbuckle, Mission Bell, Pacific Avenue, Pedley, Peralta, Rustic Lane, Sunnyslope, Troth Street, Van Buren, and West Riverside) are implementing schoolwide programs with strategies outlined in their school plans. There are also three Title I Targeted schools (Stone Avenue, Indian Hills, and Mission Middle). These schools are required to identify students not meeting grade level standards and provide them with intervention support in raising their academic achievement. Copies of school-based and schoolwide level plans have been presented to Board members. School plans for Mission Bell, Mira Loma Middle, and Nueva Vista will be submitted at a future board meeting. Administration recommends that the Board approve the school level plans for the 2003-2004 school year.

G. Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Measure "C", Phase II Projects for Parking Lot Improvements at Sky Country and Sunnyslope Elementary Schools (Mr. Duchon)

To maintain the District's current Measure "C" schedule, Administration proposes to advertise and solicit bids for the expansion of the parking lots at Sky Country Elementary and Sunnyslope Elementary Schools. The expansion is needed in order to separate the bus loading/drop-off lanes from the parent loading/drop-off lanes. Funding for the project will come from Measure "C" bond dollars.

Administration recommends the Board approve the advertisement and solicitation of bids for the parking lot improvements at Sky Country and Sunnyslope Elementary Schools.

** H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases and that each case will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and (SCORE) the School and Community OutREach Team for follow-up:

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE:

1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-219 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b) (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

RETRACTION OF EXPULSION ORDERS:

- It is recommended that the Board of Education retract the May 5, 2003 Expulsion Order of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-158 and expunge the Expulsion Order from the student's cumulative record. Student shall be immediately reinstated to the Jurupa Unified School District.
- 2. It is recommended that the Board of Education retract the June 16, 2003 Expulsion Order of the pupil in Discipline Case #03-225 and expunge the Expulsion Order from the student's cumulative record. Student shall be immediately reinstated to the Jurupa Unified School District.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

J. Review Information Reports

1. Review Information Regarding Public School Choice and Supplemental Educational Services for Title I Program Improvement Schools under No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Provisions

(Ms. Moreno)

Under No Child Left Behind, when a Title I school has been identified as not making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for two consecutive years, it is identified as a Program Improvement School. The District is required to provide all students enrolled in that school with the option to transfer to another public school served by the District that has not been identified for program improvement. Parents are not required to transfer their students but must be given the option. In providing students the option to transfer to another school, the District must give priority to the lowest achieving children from low-income families and provide transportation. The District's obligation to provide transportation for the student ends at the end of the school year if the school from which the student transferred is no longer identified for program improvement.

In a Title I school that has not made AYP for three consecutive years, the school district is required to arrange for the provision of Supplemental Education Services (SES) for eligible students. The goal of these services is to ensure that students increase their proficiency in meeting the state's academic achievement standards in reading and mathematics. Services may include such assistance as tutoring, remediation, and academic intervention and must take place outside the regular school day. Parents must choose the SES provider for their children from among the providers approved by the state for our district. Eligible children are from low-income families, as determined by the free and reduced lunch data used to allocate funding under Title I. Priority must be given to the lowest-achieving children whenever funds are insufficient to meet the requests of all eligible families.

The District is required to spend an amount equal to a total of 20 percent of Title I funds to 1) provide transportation for public school choice, and 2) pay for supplemental services unless a smaller amount is needed. The required breakdown is: 1) an amount equal to 5 percent must be used to provide supplemental educational services, 2) an amount equal to 5 percent must be used for transportation for public school choice, and 3) an additional amount equal to 10 percent can be used for either or both supplemental services and public school choice. Information only.

This vote meant that the District would not be paying for any Board member travel related expenses. President Adams stated that the \$150.00 reimbursement request from Mr. Chavez on A-2, Page 6 should not be paid because it came after the Board voted on the Board member conference matter. Mr. Chavez stated that his reimbursement request is not for a conference, he served on a California School Boards Association working committee that he was nominated to serve on by not only this school board, but by other school Mr. Chavez reminded the Board that he requested clarification on boards as well. previous motions on several occasions, asking the secretary to read back each motion; the motions only pertained to conferences and workshops; his reimbursement is not for a conference or a workshop, it is legally an expense that he is entitled to receive reimbursement on until such time that the Board clarifies or includes in the motion Delegate Assembly expenses. He stated that the motions approved by the Board did not include his work on the Delegate Assembly, even though Mrs. Burns tried to amend the motion to include Delegate Assembly expenses, the motion was not amended or Therefore, it is a legal expense, he is entitled to receive accepted as such. reimbursement, and it is discriminatory to try to keep him from receiving it. Mr. Chavez stated that the topic should be brought back to the Board and handled correctly. He reminded the Board again that the Delegate Assembly is not a conference or a workshop. Mrs. Burns stated that Mr. Chavez misspoke on this matter; at the time the Board was considering Board member conference expenses she clarified the matter by previously reading into the minutes the definitions for conference, delegate, and assembly and it was well understood by the majority of the Board that they were relinquishing District payment of any expenses relating to travel and meals, or in other terms, they were giving up their \$4,000 per Board member conference budget to assist with budget reductions as a good faith gesture. Further, it was clearly understood by the majority of the Board that the motion included Delegate Assembly expenses or any other expenses relating to conferences and workshops; the majority of the Board did understand what they were voting for. The Deputy Superintendent stated to Mr. Knight that the language used on A-2 Page 6 is the standard explanation relating to travel expenses. Mr. Chavez stated that although the Superintendent's Assistant did not have the actual motions with her relating to this matter, the motions clearly state that the District would not be paying for expenses relating to conferences and workshops and his point is that the Delegate Assembly is not a conference or a workshop, a dictionary definition brings no clarification to this matter. Although he is being accused of misspeaking, he knows what he is talking about. There was an attempt to discriminate against one person on the Board and amend the motion to include the Delegate Assembly, and the motion was not accepted as such; therefore, legally he has a right to be reimbursed for this expense until the Board does something otherwise. - 1. That due to a lack of work and/or a lack of funds the following classified positions be discontinued:
 - a. Eight (8) Activity Facilitator positions.
- 2. That the positions specified hereinabove be discontinued or reduced pursuant to District rules and regulations and applicable provisions of the Education Code and the negotiated agreement with the C.S.E.A.
- 3. That the Superintendent be and he hereby is directed to give notices of layoff or reduction in hours the employees affected by this resolution pursuant to Education Code 45117.
- 4. That said layoffs or reductions shall become effective September 4, 2003.
- 5. That the employees laid off pursuant to this Resolution shall be eligible for reemployment pursuant to Education Code Section 45298.
