* b. Recognize Receipt of California Partnership Academies Grant for Jurupa Valley High
(Mr. Jensen)

The District was recently notified that Jurupa Valley High School has been awarded a California Partnership Academies Grant for the operation and maintenance of the Engineering and Construction Academy. This grant was approved for \$81,000 contingent upon availability of funds and is to be used between July 1, 2003 and June 30, 2005. A copy of the award notification is included in the supporting documents. Information only.

* c. <u>Recognize ESEA, Title III, Limited English Proficient Student Program Apportionment</u> (Ms. Sheppy)

The California Department of Education recently notified the District that a \$406,084.00 apportionment would be awarded to the Limited English Proficient (LEP) program. Title III funds resulted from a per pupil allocation of \$75.75 for each LEP student reported on the Language Census (R-30LC) of March 2002, which included 5,291 students. Funds are used to provide supplemental programs and services to LEP students and their families as authorized by the *No Child Left Behind Act*. Information only.

d. Accept Donations

All donations are given to Jurupa Unified School District with the request that the money or item be used at the designated school.

Parents of third grade students at Camino Real Elementary School wish to donate \$689.00, with the request the funds be used to pay admission for a student field trip to the Performance Riverside presentation of "The Wizard of Oz."

The Exxon Mobile Corporation, at Limonite and Valley Way, wishes to donate \$500.00, with the request the funds be used to enhance the reading program at Camino Real Elementary School.

Parents of sixth grade students at Indian Hills Elementary School wish to donate \$380.00, with the request the funds be used to pay expenses for sixth grade student field trips.

Through a corporate school fundraising program whereby parents use a Target Guest Card for 1% of the purchase to go to a school, Target Stores raised funds to donate to the following schools:

Mrs. Sandra Rizzo, resident, wishes to donate \$25.00, with the request the funds be used to purchase materials and supplies for Mrs. Macias' classroom (Room 4) at Mission Bell Elementary School.

SBC, through an Employee Giving/United Way Campaign, wishes to donate \$52.82, with the request the funds be used to benefit Pacific Avenue Elementary School. The funds will be used to purchase instructional materials.

Parents of fifth grade students at Peralta Elementary School wish to donate \$407.10, with the request the funds be used to pay expenses for a student field trip to Jensen-Alvarado Ranch.

Parents of kindergarten students at Sunnyslope Elementary School wish to donate \$478.00, with the request the funds be used to pay expenses for various kindergarten student field trips.

At the October 6, 2003 meeting, the Board approved revised Regulation 5152, <u>Recognized Student Organizations</u>. Since that time, the Education Services division received the bylaws and a request from the Ceramics Club at Rubidoux High School to be added to the list of approved Student Organizations. The bylaws of the Ceramics Club meet all district guidelines for operating a Student Organization.

Administration recommends adoption at first reading of revised Regulation 5152, Recognized Student Organizations, to include the addition of the Ceramics Club at Rubidoux High School.

* 9. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for Troth Street

(Mr. Jensen)

Ms. Julia Holt, Mr. Jesus Romero, and Ms. Bonnie Werner, teachers at Troth Street, are requesting approval to travel to Thousand Pines with approximately one hundred twenty (120) sixth grade students on Wednesday, May 5 through Friday, May 7, 2004. The purpose of the trip is to provide sixth grade students an opportunity to attend an outdoor science school and participate in activities to culminate activity/field experience for the geology/ecology unit. Costs for the trip will be paid through PTA and student fundraisers and donations. Transportation will be by district vehicles and staff members will provide supervision. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Ms. Julia Holt, Mr. Jesus Romero, and Ms. Bonnie Werner to travel to Thousand Pines with one hundred twenty (120) sixth grade students on Wednesday, May 5 through Friday, May 7, 2004 to attend an outdoor science school.

B. Approve Submittal of Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Grant

(Mr. Jensen)

The District currently has an approved Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Act of 1998 plan for 2000-2004. Each year, however, the District must submit an application for funds with a budget plan and must include a current-year Board approval date. The District will receive \$160,356 in funding for the 2003-2004 school year. A copy of the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education grant application is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve submittal of the application for funding for the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Act of 1998 in the amount of \$160,356.

C. Approve Receipt of Community Development Block Grant

(Mr. Jensen)

The Riverside County Economic Development Agency recently notified the District that the Family Achievement Network (F.A.N.) Club has been authorized to receive \$10,000 of Community Development Block Grant monies. These funds will be used to provide ten (10) scholarships per site for students from low/moderate income households to participate in enrichment activities including field trips, service learning projects, and other youth development activities. The funds will be used specifically to pay for snacks, transportation, and a portion of staff salaries (direct service). A copy of the grant award letter is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the receipt of Community Development Block Grant funds in the amount of \$10,000 from the Riverside County Economic Development Agency to be used for the Family Achievement Network (F.A.N.) Club.

D. <u>Approve Expenditure of Governor's Performance Award Funds for West Riverside</u> Elementary School (Ms. Moreno)

As the Board will recall, West Riverside was allocated funds through the Governor's Performance Award in the amount of \$45,851.00. Mrs. Sonia Porter, Principal, is requesting approval of the expenditures listed below. The School Site Council at its regular meeting on October 6, 2003 approved these expenditures.

** E. Act on Student Discipline Matters

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and (SCORE) the School and Community OutREach Team for follow-up:

REVOKE - SUSPENDED EXPULSION:

1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the February 18, 2003, Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #03-232 and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. Pupil violated Education Code Sections 48900 (i), (k), (.4). The pupil will be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-013 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-015 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-017 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-020 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (c3), (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

** E. Act on Student Discipline Matters (Continued)

(Mr. Edmunds)

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-016 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-019 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (c3), (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

As required by California Education Code sections 54690-54697, CPAs are expected to develop a model California Partnership Academy in grades 10-12 with one half of the Academy population at risk using the criteria outlined in the California Education Code Section 54690 (d) and 54691 (d)(1). Expenditures must be restricted to implementation and maintenance of the required program components.

ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION ACT TITLE III LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENT STUDENT SUBGRANTS FOR 2003-04

I am pleased to enclose a copy of your local educational agency (LEA) Grant Award Notification for the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Title III, Limited English Proficient (LEP) Program for Fiscal Year (FY) 2003-04. Please read the grant award carefully and keep it on file in the LEA.

I would like to highlight the fact that California's Title III allocation increased from \$118 million in 2002-03, to \$140 million in 2003-04. This means that the per pupil allotment grew from \$68.00 to \$76.75.

The California Department of Education's accountability plan for the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001 was recently approved by the U.S. Department of Education and includes a provision to include former LEP students [commonly referred to as Redesignated Fluent English Proficient (R-FEP) students] in the accountability system to determine annual yearly progress (AYP) for the LEP subgroup. Progress for all subgroups is reported at the school, LEA, and state levels. This also means that LEAs will now have expanded flexibility to use NCLB funds, including Title III subgrants, to serve eligible R-FEP students in addition to LEP students. Additional information regarding the status of R-FEP students will be forthcoming.

If the LEA is a lead agency of a consortium, the grant award includes funds for each of the participating LEAs in the consortium. A list of consortium partners is included in the Grant Award Notification. If the LEA is a member of a consortium, the LEA is receiving a copy of the grant award for the lead LEA since Title III funds may not be granted to consortium members directly.



The clerk of the board shall, within 15 days prior to the date of the Annual Organizational Meeting, notify in writing all members and members-elect of the date and time selected. If the board fails to select a day and time for the annual meeting, the County Superintendent of Schools shall designate, within the 15-day period, the day and time of the meeting. (E.C. The Oath of Office must be administered before any officer enters on the duties of his/her office. (E.C. Section 60 and Govt. Code Section 1360) If the Oath of Office has been administered, the term of office for a newly elected board member begins Friday, December 5, 2003. (E.C. Section 5017) The Oath of

Community College District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of a community college district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a secretary (E.C. Section 72000(2)).

City and Unified School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, each city board of education shall organize by electing a president from its members (E.C. Section 35143). Whenever a unified school district has within its boundaries a chartered city with a population of more than 8,000 or whenever the average daily attendance of a unified school district is 1,500 or more, for all purposes the district shall be deemed a city school district governed by a city board of education, and the governing board thereof shall be deemed a city board of education (E.C. Section 5206). The board of education of a unified school district that meets the standards of Education Code section 5206 is required to elect a president at the Annual Organizational Meeting. A unified school district with five board members that does not meet the standards of Education Code Section 5206 would be required to elect a president and a clerk (E.C. Section 35022, 35143, and 5206).

High School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of each high school district, union high school district, and joint union high school district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

Elementary School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with five or more board members shall elect a president and a clerk from among its members (E.C. Section 35022 and 35143). At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with less than five board members is required to elect one of its members as clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

Selection of Representative to Vote in the Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election

The governing board of each school district of every kind or class shall annually, at its initial meeting, select one of its members as its representative, who shall have one vote for each member to be elected to the county committee. The

secretary or clerk of the district shall furnish the County Superintendent of Schools with a certificate naming the representative selected by the board (E.C. Section 35023) (72403 community college district).
