a. Recognize Press-Enterprise Scholars

The District has been notified that a local assistance grant for the Comprehensive Teacher Education Institute (CTEI) Program has been awarded in the amount of \$38,912. These funds are to be used in collaboration with and to continue the teacher education program during 2003/04 school year. A copy of the award letter is included in the supporting documents. All donations are given to Jurupa Unified School District with the request that the money or item be used at the designated school.

Through an Edison International employee/employer contribution program, parents of Camino Real Elementary School students wish to donate a total of \$199.98. The funds will be used to purchase instructional materials for the school.

Nature's Life, Inc., of Garden Grove, wishes to donate miscellaneous supplies, glass coffee pots, and a desk, with the request that all items be used to benefit the students and staff at Granite Hill Elementary School. The total estimated value of the items is \$1,716.89.

Mr. Brian Henry, Mr. John Vigrass, and Ms. Tamara Rose, teachers at Rustic Lane Elementary School, are requesting approval to travel to Pathfinder Ranch in Garner Valley on Wednesday, February 11 through Friday, February 13, 2004 with approximately one hundred ten (110) sixth grade students. The purpose of the trip is to provide an opportunity for students to attend Science Camp. The cost of the trip is \$108.90 per student plus the cost of transportation. Students participate in fundraising activities to earn the money for the entire sixth grade class to attend the science school. Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

The three day and two night program includes academic coursework with lecture, laboratory and field experiences, meals, and lodging. Health and accident insurance for each attendee is included in the fee, and the school maintains an infirmary with a resident nurse. Students are in "class" most of the day and evening; however, they do have supervised recreation time scheduled.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Brian Henry, Mr. John Vigrass, and Ms. Tamara Rose to travel to Pathfinder Ranch in Garner Valley with one hundred ten sixth-grade students to attend Science Camp on Wednesday, February 11 through Friday, February 13, 2004.

B. Consider CSBA Conference Expenses for Newly Elected Board Member (Mr. Edmunds)

The Board received a request from Mr. Cook Barela to place an item on the agenda to consider the District paying for all costs associated with the CSBA Conference for the newly elected Board Member, Mr. Michael Rodriguez. A copy of Mr. Barela's request is included in the supporting documents.

Following discussion, the Board may wish to provide direction concerning the District's responsibility for CSBA Conference expenses for the newly elected Board member, Mr. Michael Rodriguez.

C. <u>Approve 2003-2004 Indicator for Alternative Schools Accountability Model</u> (Mr. Jensen)

In 1999, the California legislature passed legislation to address the need for a different accountability model for alternative schools and programs. At that time, it was determined that the STAR testing program did not address some of the unique characteristics of the alternative school populations in the state.

The accountability model that will require districts to gather data and establish baselines for program evaluation is now in place. The District is required to select and receive local school board approval for a third performance indicator; two of the indicators that were chosen in August 2001 are program attendance and credits issued. The schools and programs that are part of this process are the STEPS Community Day School, Independent Study, and Rio Vista and Nueva Vista Continuation High Schools.

The District selected Indicator 2, Suspensions, as the third indicator to complete the set of three. Detailed information on the Alternative Schools Accountability Model (ASAM) and all 15 proposed indicators is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the District's selection of Indicator 2, Suspensions, as the Third Indicator for the Alternative Schools Accountability Model (ASAM).

* D. Act on Student Discipline Matters

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases; these cases will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and (SCORE) the School and Community OutREach Team for follow-up:

EXPULSION CASES:

1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-023 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (k) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION CASES (Continued):

- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>#04-026</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-027 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-028 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-029 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 6. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-036 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 7. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-039 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (a3), (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-022 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and 48915 (a2), (b) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-030 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and 48915 (a2), (b) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-034 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (.4) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-037 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES (Continued):

5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-053 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

The following special conditions apply:

October 1, 2003

- 1. All approved program funds for the 2003-04 grant must be legally obligated or expended by September 30, 2004. Encumbrances may be made at any time after the beginning date of the grant, October 1, 2004.
- 2. The grant shall be administered in accordance with your approved application and budget. Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies relating to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds including, but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California. No more than 10 percent of the total budget may be used for computers, software, and telecommunication equipment; any such expenditure must be made in compliance with Education Code Section 51871.5(a) which requires a district to have an education technology plan prior to using funding for technology-based materials, equipment, or systems.
- 3. The district shall maintain clear and auditable records of the expenditure of funds and provide unencumbered access to all fiscal and program reports to CDE representatives.
- 4. The grantee agrees to participate in a formal evaluation by CDE or its designee and provide data and other information upon request. Site visits by CDE or its designee may be scheduled at CDE's discretion.
- 5. Either party may cancel its participation in the project by giving thirty (30) calendar days advance written notice. The grantee shall submit a final expenditure report within sixty (60) days after cancellation, and the grantee shall return unexpended funds to the CDE upon receipt of billing.



- 6. The enclosed Certification of Acceptance of Grant Conditions (Attachment A), Drug-Free Workplace Certification (Attachment B), and Union Organizing Certification (Attachment D) shall be signed by an authorized official and returned no later than ten days after receipt of this letter to the CDE address provided below.
- 7. Upon completion and return of the enclosed Certification of Acceptance of Grant Conditions, Drug-Free Workplace Certification, and Union Organizing Certification, CDE will release 75 percent of the grant award. Please allow four to six weeks for processing. The final payment of 25 percent will be released upon CDE's receipt of an End-of-Year Financial Report (Attachment E), detailing the fully expended grant award. If total reported expenditures are less than the grant award, the final payment will be reduced to reflect the lower expenditures. The End-of-Year Financial Report may be submitted as soon as all grant funds have been expended, but is due no later than October 31, 2004.
- 8. The grantee shall comply with the enclosed General Assurances (Attachment C).
- 9. Indirect costs for grant administration may not exceed CDE's approved indirect cost rates.
- 10. The grantee shall submit all documents indicated above by their due dates. Failure to submit the required reports may result in a billing from CDE for the entire amount of any grant funds advanced or possible reduction of any subsequent grants(s).
- 11. This award is made contingent upon the availability of funds. You should be aware that the State Legislature is currently considering numerous proposals, including those made by the Governor, in light of the State's current budget crisis. Many of these proposals could potentially reduce and/or defer funds available for this award. This is to advise you that if the legislature takes action to reduce or defer the funding upon which this award is based, then this award will be amended accordingly.
- 12. To acknowledge acceptance of the amendment requirements, this notification must be signed by an authorized official and returned to David Almquist, California Department of Education, Curriculum Leadership Unit, 1430 "N" Street, Suite 4401, Sacramento, CA 95814, no later than 10 days after receipt of this notice.

Call for Nominations for CSBA Delegate Assembly

Nominations for CSBA's Delegate Assembly will be accepted until Monday, January 5, 2004. Any CSBA member board is eligible to nominate board members within their geographical region or subregion. Each board may nominate as many individuals as it chooses by using the enclosed nomination form or submitting a letter of nomination. All nominees must submit the enclosed required biographical sketch. An optional résumé may also be submitted. The U.S. Post Office postmark or fax deadline for this required biographical sketch and optional résumé is Monday, January 12. (A mailed copy is preferable to a fax.)

CSBA Delegates serve two-year terms. Those elected in 2004 will serve from May 1, 2004 to April 30, 2006. There are two Delegate Assembly meetings each year, one in May prior to CSBA's Legislative Action Conference in Sacramento and one preceding the CSBA Annual Education Conference in December. In accordance with CSBA Bylaws, CSBA does not pay travel expenses associated with Delegate Assembly meetings. Districts and county associations often cover or offer supplemental help with expenses.
