ANNUAL ORGANIZATION MEETING

*This year, each school district is required to hold an Annual Organization Meeting on a date between December 5 through December 19, 2003. At the November 17, 2003 regular meeting, the Board announced its Annual Organization Meeting would be combined with the December 8 regular meeting, and as such a certification form was sent to the County Office of Education. Other code provisions regarding organization are included in the supporting documents.

*1. Ceremonially Administer Oath

(Mr. Edmunds)

Riverside County Board of Education Vice President, Ms. Lynne Craig, will ceremonially administer the Oath of Office to newly elected Board member, Mr. Michael Rodriguez. The supporting documents include the Certificate of Canvass of Election from the Registrar of Voters Office and the Oath of Office that was administered by the Registrar of Voters Office on November 17, 2003. As per his request, Mr. Rodriguez was seated at the November 17, 2003 Board meeting.

*2. Elect Board President

(Mrs. Burns)

State law requires election of a President. Board Policy requires election of a President and Clerk. <u>As immediate past Clerk of the Board, it is suggested that Mrs. Burns conduct an election for President of the Board for the one-year term beginning with this meeting.</u> The elected president should receive the gavel.

*3. Elect Clerk

(The President)

The newly elected Board President will conduct an election for Clerk of the Board for the one-year term beginning with this meeting.

4. Break

Board members should rearrange their seating to reflect past practice, which is the President, Clerk, and other Board members in alphabetical order.

*5. Select Day, Time, and Place of Regular Meetings

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board must adopt a schedule of meeting dates, time, and location. A recommended meeting schedule based on policy provisions is included in the supporting documents. The schedule calls for regular meetings on the first and third Monday except in August and December. When the meeting date is a holiday it is scheduled for the next day. It is recommended the Board adopt the calendar of regular meetings shown in the supporting documents as Regulation 9310.

6. Select Representative for Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election

(Mr. Edmunds)

By law, the Board is required to select a representative to vote in the Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election. The annual election is usually held in conjunction with a meeting of the Riverside County School Boards Association in the fall of each year. This is the only regular responsibility of the Board representative. Mr. Chavez has served as the representative for the past year. It is recommended that the Board select a representative to the County Committee on School District Organization Election.

*7. Certify Signatures and Authorized Agents for Business Functions

(Mr. Duchon)

The County requires a list of Board members and school district employees authorized to transact various business functions for the school district be approved at the Annual Organization Meeting. The election of Board officers may change the Certification of Signatures form. It is recommended the Certification of Signatures in the supporting documents be approved.

*8. Appoint Liaison Representatives to District Advisory Committees

(Mr. Edmunds)

Board Policy 1221.3 provides for the Board to designate one of its members as a Liaison Representative to each district-wide advisory committee. Such committees may be required by the regulations or guidelines for categorical projects. The Board should designate a member as Liaison Representative to each of the three Advisory committees: Consolidated Application, English Language Learner, and Vocational Education. The chart in the supporting documents includes the current representative in parenthesis and spaces to fill in new appointees.

In light of this recent accident, Board member Mary Burns requested consideration of a resolution to request the County of Riverside to investigate pedestrian safety in this area. A copy of proposed Resolution #2004/20 is included in the supporting documents. Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #2004/20, Requesting the County of Riverside to Investigate Pedestrian Safety along the stretch of 42nd Street, including the area between Riverview Drive and Pacific Avenue, and the surrounding area.

Throughout the school year, the Business Office monitors and adjusts the District's various budgets with respect to both revenue and expenditures. Changes in revenue result from grant applications, increased funding, adjustments to ADA, apportionment reductions, etc.

The method by which the revenue side of the budget is adjusted is to adopt a Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds. In this action the Board approves adding revenue to the budget for various purposes. Since the budget was adopted on June 16, 2003, the District has received revenue adjustments in the amount of \$5,622,960 as identified below. Of this total, \$567,461 is unrestricted and will increase the unrestricted reserve. The balance remaining, \$5,044,499 is restricted in its use and offsetting expenditures are budgeted in these funds.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2004/19, Expenditure of Excess Funds.

B. Certify 2003/2004 First Interim Report

(Mr. Duchon/Mrs. Lauzon)

Since January 1986, State legislation has required the District to prepare and submit to the County Office of Education First and Second Interim Reports of the financial condition of the District. The Business Office analyzes and projects revenue and expenditures for the year and prepares the certification that the District will be able to meet its financial obligations. AB1200 added the requirement for certification of the ability to meet financial obligations for subsequent fiscal years as well.

The First Interim Report is now due, and it is included in the supporting documents. It incorporates budget revisions based on the most recent estimates of revenue and expenditures. A detailed listing of additional revenue is included in the Resolution for Expenditure of Excess Funds under item A-5 in the Agenda. The first two pages of the Interim Report show the combined figures for Unrestricted and Restricted programs; Page 3 and 4 show Unrestricted only, and Pages 5 and 6 show Restricted only.

The report forms require the following format: The original budget adopted by the Board on June 16, 2003 (Column A); the present operating budget which incorporates changes approved by the Board through October 31, 2003 (Column B); actuals to date (Column C); the latest estimate of what actual figures will be at the end of the year (Column D); and the difference between the operating budget and the final projection (Column E). This annotation will review all the changes that have occurred since the June 16 budget adoption through the latest estimate.

BEGINNING BALANCE

The Beginning Balance for 2003/04 is the Ending Balance for 2002/03 carried over to the new fiscal year. The difference between the estimated and the actual ending balance is the result of increases and decreases in both revenue and expenditures in the 2002/03 year, which occurred after the budget estimates were made. These differences were presented to the Board on September 15, 2003. The most significant are:

Revenue

\$ (1,528,098)

This amount is comprised of increases in Revenue Limit funding (\$140,042) and Special Education funding; offset by adjustments for deferred revenue in Categorical funding (\$1,582,389).

Expenditures

\$ (1,981,731)

Overall expenditures decreased by \$1,981,731. The difference is comprised of the savings realized by the District as a result of freezing expenditures on non-essential items district wide and lower than anticipated expenditures for School Operation Allocations, Donations, Governor's Performance Grants and Categorical Programs. Balances remaining for Donations, Site Grants, Governor's Performance Grants, and Categorical Programs are carried over to be expended in 2003/04.

Net Increase in Beginning Balance \$ 453,631

(Mr. Duchon/Mrs. Lauzon)

REVENUE/SOURCES

<u>Unrestricted Increase</u>

+ 567,461

This amount is the net result of increased enrollment (\$527,168); PERS Reduction Savings funding (\$90,021), and a prior year adjustment for Class Size Reduction Funding (-\$49,728).

Restricted Increase

+ 2,766,473

This increase is the net result of increased Special Project funding (\$2,577,937), offset slightly by decreases in funding for Transportation (-\$141,818), and GATE (-\$46,718).

Net Increase in Revenue

+ 3,333,934

EXPENDITURES/USES

Unrestricted Increase

+ 326,876

This amount is the net result of increases and decreases in all expenditure categories. An increase in the workers' compensation rate is the biggest factor (\$458,018). This increase along with expenditure adjustments for carryover amounts designated as a restricted part of the ending balance for 2002/03 is offset slightly by salary savings from employee turnover and attrition.

Restricted Increase

+ 2,471,083

This amount includes the expenditure adjustments to categorical projects for increased funding, carryover from 2002/03, and increased workers' compensation costs (\$121,000).

Net Increase in Expenditures

+ 2,797,959

FLEXIBILITY PROVISIONS

The State Budget Act for 2003/04 included several flexibility provisions to help alleviate the financial distress districts have been experiencing due to mid-year cuts, revenue deferrals, and reduced revenue limit funding due to deficits and unfunded COLA's. The combination of the 1.2% deficit placed on Revenue Limit funding for 2003/04 along with the unfunded COLA of 1.86% imposed a 3.002% deficit.

<u>Accessing Ending Reserves</u> – Districts may access 100% of their State restricted ending balances and deferred revenues as of June 30, 2003, for any purposes. This is called a Flexibility Transfer.

Based on the multi-year financial projections it has been decided that the District will need to utilize the Flexibility Transfers. The transfers are as follows:

Reserve for Economic Uncertainties — Statutory requirements for Reserve for Economic Uncertainties in 2003/04 and 2004/05 have been reduced by 50%. For Jurupa this would allow a reserve of 1.5% in these fiscal years only. The reserve requirements will be reinstated in 2005/06. Based on the multi-year projections it has been determined that this provision will be utilized in the 2004/05 fiscal year.

ESTIMATED RESERVE:

As a result of the listed adjustments and increased enrollment, the 2003/04 Unrestricted Reserve is now projected to be \$4,383,083 or 3.22% of total expenditures, \$308,390 over the 3% reserve. The amount above the 3% reserve was generated from the utilization of the Flexibility Transfers. These funds are needed to pay for the District's ongoing expenses in 2004/05. Even with these adjustments the 2004/05 reserve will be \$537,530 below the 3% level. The projected Restricted Reserves total \$166,693. This total is restricted Categorical 2003/04 Certificated project carryover. lt is important to note that Management/Confidential salary and benefit negotiations have not been concluded, and any improvements for employees would have to be funded from the Unrestricted Reserve.

MULTI-YEAR BUDGET PROJECTION

Following the First Interim Financial Report in the supporting documents is a Multi-Year Budget Projection for Fiscal Years 2004/05 and 2005/06. The assumptions used for estimating revenue and expenditures are listed immediately following the projected budget figures.

School Services of California provides a Financial Projection Dartboard estimating COLA, Deficits, and Lottery Funding for a five year period to school districts for developing their multi-year projections. It is important to note that the multi-year projection presented on June 16, 2003 with the 2003/04 budget adoption included a funded COLA of 2.1% on the 2004/05 Revenue Limit. On September 12, 2003 after the Governor's Budget was adopted, School Services provided an updated Financial Projection Dartboard that now projects a 2.1% COLA; offset by a 2.1% deficit (an unfunded COLA).

(Mr. Duchon/Mrs. Lauzon)

The loss of COLA funding is \$1.4 million to Jurupa each of the 2004/05 and 2005/06 fiscal years. This loss coupled with the increased workers' compensation rates created a reserve in 2004/05 that is \$1.65 million less than the 3% reserve requirement. Administration determined that it will be necessary to implement budget cuts in the 2004/05 fiscal year. The Proposed Budget Reduction list created in the 2002/03 fiscal year has been reviewed for potential cuts and they are as follows:

Management, Classified, and Certificated positions (12)

\$766,947

It is anticipated that this will be covered through attrition. However, the Board should note that in certifying this projection that it is committed to making necessary cuts in the 2004/05 fiscal year.

By cutting \$767,000 in expenditures from the 2004/05 budget along with the \$308,000 carried over from 2003/04 this leaves the unrestricted reserve under the 3% by \$537,000 (.4%). The Unrestricted Reserve is projected to be almost \$3.5 million (2.6%). In 2004/05 the Flexibility Provision that allows a district to carry less than their 3% reserve will be utilized.

In 2005/06 the District will need to maintain the budget cuts implemented in 2004/05 to restore the reserve to the 3% required by law. The Unrestricted Reserve is projected to be \$4.1 million (3.0%).

Issues that could potentially impact this multi-year projection:

Negotiations

It is important to note that 2003/04 salary negotiations have not been concluded for Certificated and Confidential/Management personnel, and any salary or health and welfare improvements for employees would have to be funded from the Unrestricted Reserve.

Potential Impact of Current Negotiations for Certificated Health and Welfare

The certificated bargaining unit (NEA-J) has challenged district action utilizing payroll deductions for increases in health insurance costs with three actions – a grievance; an unfair labor practice complaint, and negotiations are presently at impasse over this issue. While contract language explicitly states that payroll deductions will be utilized for such increases, if teachers are successful in any of these actions the estimated cost in 2003/04 is \$772,033.

Estimated cost in future years - \$772,033 plus increases on insurance premiums are estimated to be in double digits for the foreseeable future. A 1% increase on Certificated H & W premiums costs \$59,852. A 10-15% increase would cost between \$598,520 and \$897,780. The potential cost is \$3.5 million - \$4.1 million dollars for this three-year period.

(Mr. Duchon/Mrs. Lauzon)

State Budget

The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) recently released a State budget forecast for 2003/04 through 2008/09. At this time there is a projected \$17.8 billion budget shortfall for the end of the 2004/05 fiscal year. Through 2008/09, it is projected that the annual budget gaps will average \$15 billion. Given the magnitude of this problem the LAO concludes that the state is not going to grow its way out of this budget problem.

Regarding Proposition 98 the LAO notes that the increase in state tax revenues for May and June 2003, beyond original projections, results in about a \$100 million increase in the Proposition 98 minimum funding level for 2002/03, and that the State will need to appropriate this amount to K-14 education. However, the exact timing and amount of this repayment won't be known for some time. The LAO also predicts growth for Proposition 98 over the next several years including \$875 million in the current year, 2003/04, and up to \$2.4 billion in the 2004/05 budget year.

While the outlook is good for Proposition 98 funding there is too much uncertainty at this time to determine what future funding will look like. With the forecast of a \$17.8 billion budget shortfall, if there are no revenue increases, this would require the State general fund expenditures to be cut by more than 20% in 2004/05. If Proposition 98 funding is not cut at all, the cuts needed on the Non-Proposition 98 side would jump to about 35%. Given this, there is concern that there will be reductions to Proposition 98 funding; it is likely these formula driven cuts would not fall below current funding level, but cuts to what would have been increases in the Proposition 98 fund guarantee.

These projections should be viewed as a tool for the Board to use in assessing the general financial condition of the District. It is extremely difficult to make financial projections as far as two years with precision because too many variables are unknown. Variances in State provided COLA's, ADA growth, and expenditure patterns could have dramatic impact on the projections presented here.

However, the Board should exercise extreme caution in all budget actions and recognize that even while the Proposition 98 fund guarantee appears to be substantial as stated above, the State is experiencing a fiscal crisis. It is unlikely that education will not be expected to share in the effort of the State's recovery.

Administration recommends the Board certify that the District will be able to meet its financial obligations for the 2003/04 and two subsequent years.

C. <u>Approve Expenditure of Governor's Performance Award Funds for Mission Bell Elementary School</u> (Ms. Moreno)

As the Board will recall, Mission Bell Elementary was allocated funds through the Governor's Performance Award in the amount of \$36,839.00. Mr. Andrew Huben, Principal, is requesting approval to purchase the following:

Step up to Writing Materials

\$3,000.00

(One kit per teacher)

Accelerated Math Scanners

\$5,000.00

(Purchase one scanner per classroom in grades 4-6)

Classroom Equipment

\$15,000.00

(Purchase classroom equipment as needed: white boards, overhead projectors/screen, wall maps, bookshelves, chairs, desks, PC to TV converters)

Software

\$5,000.00

(Purchase software programs compatible with new PC's)

Literacy Materials/ Supplies

\$8,839.00

(Purchase guided reading books, Accelerated Reading books and quizzes, classroom library books, and other literacy needs.)

Total

\$ 36,839.00

The School Site Council at its regular meeting on October 21, 2003 approved these expenditures.

It is recommended that the Board approve the request for Mission Bell Elementary to spend an amount not to exceed \$36,839.00 from their Governor's Performance Award.

D. Adopt Resolution 2004/16, Rescinding and Abandoning A Previous Resolution of Necessity for the Acquisition of Certain Real Property APN 165-120-004 and APN 165-120-006 by Eminent Domain (Mr. Duchon)

On December 9, 2002, the Board adopted Resolution No. 03/19, finding the acquisition of several parcels of real property by eminent domain was necessary and in the public interest for construction of a middle school facility. The Board has subsequently determined not to pursue the acquisition of parcels APN 165-120-004 and APN 165-120-006, respectively. With respect to the other parcels of real property named in Resolution No. 03/19, the Resolution shall remain in force. Administration recommends that the Board of Education Adopt Resolution #2004/16, Rescinding and Abandoning a Previous Resolution of Necessity for the Acquisition of Certain Real Property, APN 165-120-004 and APN 165-120-006, by Eminent Domain.

E. <u>Approve Change Order 1, Contract C-20257, Wheeler Paving, Inc., Camino Real Bus Loop, Sunnyslope Elementary and Sky Country Elementary Parking Lot Improvements</u>

(Mr. Duchon)

Change Order 1 in the amount of \$5,110.00, Contract C-20257, Wheeler Paving, is submitted for review and approval. This change order will increase the total amount of the contract by \$5,110.00 from \$227,734.00 to \$232,844.00. The change order impacts the parking lot improvements at Sunnyslope Elementary and Sky Country Elementary Schools. The increase at Sunnyslope Elementary School was required due to wet soil conditions, which made the pad unsuitable for compaction. The contractor was required to remove approximately 90 cubic yards of existing soil and replace it with decomposed granite. The increase at Sky Country Elementary was due to incorrect parking lot dimensions as noted on the plans. As a result, the parking lot size was required to be increased by 7,100 square feet. This change order adds four (4) days to the completion schedule, which moves the completion date from December 15, 2003 to December 19, 2003.

Administration recommends the Board approve Change Order 1, Contract C-20257, Wheeler Paving, Inc., in the amount of \$5,110.00.

F. Approve Award of Off-Site Street Improvement Bid for Glen Avon High School

(Mr. Duchon)

At the September 2, 2003 Board meeting, approval was given to advertise and solicit bids for the off-site street improvements at Glen Avon High School. The District is acting as agent for the County of Riverside to construct said street improvements, which includes advertising, bidding, and project management.

On Thursday, November 13, 2003, at 2:00 p.m., eight (8) bids were received and opened in the Board Room at the Education Center. The following is a recap of those bids:

Alternate bid includes traffic signal system and street improvements at the intersection of Camino Real and Jurupa Road.

Administration recommends the Board award the bid for Off-site Street Improvements including the alternate for Glen Avon High School to Sequel Contracting in the amount of \$2,425,369.25.

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the *Student Assistance Program* and *(SCORE)* the *School and Community OutREach Team* for follow-up:

This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-044 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (i), (k), (.4) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>*04-047</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (f), (g) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 6. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>*04-048</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (f), (g), (l) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 7. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>*04-049</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (f), (g) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

- 8. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-050 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k), (.4) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 9. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>*04-058</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE:

1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-064 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1) and 48915 (b) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement, at Rubidoux High School, for the Spring Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-041 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1) and 48915 (b) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the Fall Semester 2003 and Rubidoux High School for the Spring Semester 2004. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case <u>*04-053</u> for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (i) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2003 and Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the pupil assigned to Rio Vista High School on school probation. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.



Enclosed is a Certification Form 3806 to report the selection of day, time, and place of your district board's Annual Organizational Meeting. Please complete this form and return it to Tracey Richardson, Secretary to the Board of Education, on or before November 26, 2003.

Responsibility of Governing Board

In accordance with the Education Code, the governing board of each school district shall hold an Annual Organizational Meeting. In a year in which a regular election for governing board members is conducted, the meeting shall be held on a day within a 15-day period that commences with the date upon which a governing board member elected at that election takes office. Annual Organizational Meetings, in years in which no such regular election for governing board members is conducted, shall be held during the same 15-day period on the calendar. This year, the dates are December 5 through December 19, 2003. Unless otherwise provided by rule of the governing board, the day and time of the Annual Organizational Meeting shall be selected by the board at its regular meeting held immediately prior to the first day of such 15-day period, and the board shall notify the County Superintendent of Schools of the day and time selected. The clerk of the board shall, within 15 days prior to the date of the Annual Organizational Meeting, notify in writing all members and members-elect of the date and time selected. If the board fails to select a day and time for the annual meeting, the County Superintendent of Schools shall designate, within the 15-day period, the day and time of the meeting. (E.C. Section 35143)

The Oath of Office must be administered before any officer enters on the duties of his/her office. (E.C. Section 60 and Govt. Code Section 1360) If the Oath of Office has been administered, the term of office for a newly elected board member begins Friday, December 5, 2003. (E.C. Section 5017) The Oath of

Office may be administered at the organizational meeting. An Oath of Office form is furnished by the Registrar's Office.

Community College District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of a community college district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a secretary (E.C. Section 72000(2)).

City and Unified School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, each city board of education shall organize by electing a president from its members (E.C. Section 35143). Whenever a unified school district has within its boundaries a chartered city with a population of more than 8,000 or whenever the average daily attendance of a unified school district is 1,500 or more, for all purposes the district shall be deemed a city school district governed by a city board of education, and the governing board thereof shall be deemed a city board of education (E.C. Section 5206). The board of education of a unified school district that meets the standards of Education Code section 5206 is required to elect a president at the Annual Organizational Meeting. A unified school district with five Loard members that does not meet the standards of Education Code Section 5206 would be required to elect a president and a clerk (E.C. Section 35022, 35143, and 5206).

High School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of each high school district, union high school district, and joint union high school district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

Elementary School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with five or more board members shall elect a president and a clerk from among its members (E.C. Section 35022 and 35143). At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with less than five board members is required to elect one of its members as clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

Selection of Representative to Vote in the Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election

The governing board of each school district of every kind or class shall annually, at its initial meeting, select one of its members as its representative, who shall have one vote for each member to be elected to the county committee. The





Resolution #2004/20

Requesting the County of Riverside to Investigate Pedestrian Safety

WHEREAS.

On October 29, 2003, four students of the Jurupa Unified School District ("District") were struck by an automobile as they were walking down 42nd Street between Riverview Drive and Pacific Avenue on their way to Rubidoux High School. Sadly, one of the four students has died, another student remains in critical condition; and,

WHEREAS.

42nd Street, including that area between Riverview Drive and Pacific Avenue, is a narrow road and does not have sidewalks; and.

WHEREAS,

In light of this tragic accident, the Governing Board of the Jurupa Unified School District ("Board") has become greatly concerned regarding the safety of District students who walk along this particular stretch of 42nd Street as well as the surrounding areas; and,

WHEREAS.

The Board wishes to request that the County of Riverside investigate the safety of pedestrian paths along the stretch of 42nd Street including the area between Riverview Drive and Pacific Avenue and surrounding areas, and, if necessary, place the installation of sidewalks and pedestrian paths in such areas at the highest priority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. Sidewalks. The Board hereby requests that the County of Riverside investigate pedestrian safety along the stretch of 42nd Street, including the area between Riverview Drive and Pacific Avenue, and the surrounding areas. Following this investigation, if the County of Riverside finds that additional sidewalks and pedestrian paths are required in this area, the Board requests that the installation of sidewalks and pedestrian paths be placed at the highest priority.

PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS (CONTINUED)

COMMENT: SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

Ms. Hope Kazama, 13-year resident in the community, felt that a recent accident involving students on 42nd Street could have been avoided if there were sidewalks, crossing guards, and school zone signs as students walk to Rubidoux High School. She noted that the intersection of Riverview and Mission Boulevard is a dangerous walking route for Mission Middle School students, and a crossing guard is needed at 42nd and Riverview for West Riverside Elementary School students. Ms. Kazama distributed pictures for the Board to review regarding dangerous areas. In addition, she pointed out that as Rubidoux High students are moved to the Glen Avon High School campus, the Board needs to consider that Jurupa Road is dark and unsafe for students to be on late at night when returning from extra-curricular activities. Mrs. Burns commented to Ms. Kazama that if she decided to bring her concerns forward at a County meeting, she would be happy to accompany her. Mrs. Burns also suggested a Board adopted resolution in support of sidewalk concerns near Rubidoux High. Mr. Chavez asked the Superintendent to send a letter to the County regarding the need for sidewalks. The Superintendent noted that he spoke with Ms. Anne Stephens from Supervisor Tavaglione's office as well as the Economic Development Agency regarding this matter. They indicated that sidewalks at 42nd Street would receive priority; however, he did not have a timeline concerning installation. Mr. Chavez commented that information provided verbally to the County could be overlooked; it is better to place a request in writing, and the Superintendent indicated that he would do so. Mr. Knight asked that prior to contacting the County, the District should review specific safety concerns relating to sidewalk access to and from schools, bring this information back to the Board to share with the community, and propose the information to the County regarding access roads to and from schools that are safety issues. The Superintendent commented that throughout the school district there are many areas without sidewalks; however, he would work with staff to identify the areas of primary concern regarding student safety.

COMMENT: JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT

Ms. Connie Perez, parent of a 10th grade student at Jurupa Valley High School, stated that it should not have taken the District eleven years to finally recognize that her son has an auditory processing disorder. Her son is reading at the 4th grade level, he has instead been punished for misbehavior, and his teachers missed the fact entirely that he has a learning disability. Ms. Perez requested outside tutoring at the District's expense, appropriate interventions and redesignations provided for her son, and she requested a timeline for when this would occur.

Ms. Sylvia Holguin provided a list of employees at Van Buren Elementary School that were impacted by the recent fires. She stated that on October 24, 2003 there was a significant presence of ash in the air and a gas line broke causing students' and staff members' eyes and throats to burn. There are individuals that are still suffering from the unhealthful air quality on that day and are using inhalers and going to the hospital for breathing treatments. Ms. Holguin stated that students should have been more important than the money the District collected for having students in school on this date; it was not right that employees were asked to work in these unhealthful conditions, and the Superintendent is responsible for the decision not to cancel school.

Ms. Lita Whitehead addressed the Board regarding a mold issue at Camino Real Elementary School. She stated that the Deputy Superintendent was made aware of the situation; she asked the Board to look into this issue in depth as well as considering changing filters more frequently on the school's filtering system since the air quality in this area is known to be the worst in the nation.

President Adams responded that administration would respond to the concerns brought forward during the Public Verbal Comments session.

BOARD MEMBER	Mr. Michael Rodriguez thanked his wife and members of the community for helping
COMMENTS	him with his campaign. He noted that he met with the Superintendent all day on Friday, November 14, 2003 and received information from administrators in charge of each division at the District Office. Mr. Rodriguez commented that he is looking forward to attending the CSBA Conference in December and getting up to speed on the things he should know as a new Board member, he is available to the community on Fridays since this is his day off, and he plans to tour the schools in the area.
,	Mrs. Burns welcomed new Board member, Mr. Michael Rodriguez and indicated that she is available for any questions that he might have. She referred to the public comments made regarding mold; she was aware of this matter, there are several types of mold; some are not dangerous, and a report is forthcoming on the issue. Referring to the gas line rupture that Ms. Holguin referred to in her comments, Mrs. Burns indicated that she was not aware of a gas line rupture occurring by Van Buren Elementary.
	Mr. Knight congratulated the Student Ambassadors for their informative reports. He asked the Superintendent to look into the allegations concerning Jurupa Middle School and return with a report as it relates to these allegations. He welcomed Mr. Michael Rodriguez, the newly elected Board member, and he congratulated the wife of Mr. Rodriguez for her efforts and support of his campaign. Mr. Knight asked everyone present to focus on the needs of students. He encouraged anyone with concerns to contact him by phone. He commended the Superintendent for his ability to look into issues and to be supportive of the community. Mr. Knight thanked administrative staff for their work on a daily basis.
	Mr. Chavez welcomed Mr. Michael Rodriguez as the newly elected Board member. He encouraged him to attend the New Board Member Workshop to learn what is expected of him as a board member. He noted his attendance at the Jurupa Valley High School ROTC Veterans Day celebration on Monday, November 11, 2003. Mr. Chavez stated that Mr. David Barnes, VFW Commander, provided the message to students. He noted that he did receive a letter from the students with words of thanks for the event. Mr. Chavez noted that the following Wednesday, November 12, 2003 he served as a volunteer mentor at Riverside Community College. He plans to bring the student he is mentoring to visit the District, and he encouraged others to serve as mentors as well as it helps students meet their educational goals.

She expressed her appreciation for her involvement in the all-day (8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.) orientation for Mr. Rodriguez on Friday, November 14, 2003. COMMENT: SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

Ms. Hope Kazama, 13-year resident in the community, felt that a recent accident involving students on 42nd Street could have been avoided if there were sidewalks, crossing guards, and school zone signs as students walk to Rubidoux High School. She noted that the intersection of Riverview and Mission Boulevard is a dangerous walking route for Mission Middle School students, and a crossing guard is needed at 42nd and Riverview for West Riverside Elementary School students. Ms. Kazama distributed pictures for the Board to review regarding dangerous areas. In addition, she pointed out that as Rubidoux High students are moved to the Glen Avon High School campus, the Board needs to consider that Jurupa Road is dark and unsafe for students to be on late at night when returning from extra-curricular activities. Mrs. Burns commented to Ms. Kazama that if she decided to bring her concerns forward at a County meeting, she would be happy to accompany her. Mrs. Burns also suggested a Board adopted resolution in support of sidewalk concerns near Rubidoux High. Mr. Chavez asked the Superintendent to send a letter to the County regarding the need for sidewalks. The Superintendent noted that he spoke with Ms. Anne Stephens from Supervisor Tayaglione's office as well as the Economic Development Agency regarding this matter. They indicated that sidewalks at 42nd Street would receive priority; however, he did not have a timeline concerning installation. Mr. Chavez commented that information provided verbally to the County could be overlooked; it is better to place a request in writing, and the Superintendent indicated that he would do so. Mr. Knight asked that prior to contacting the County, the District should review specific safety concerns relating to sidewalk access to and from schools, bring this information back to the Board to share with the community, and propose the information to the County regarding access roads to and from schools that are safety issues. The Superintendent commented that throughout the school district there are many areas without sidewalks; however, he would work with staff to identify the areas of primary concern regarding student safety.

COMMENT: JURUPA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT

Ms. Connie Perez, parent of a 10th grade student at Jurupa Valley High School, stated that it should not have taken the District eleven years to finally recognize that her son has an auditory processing disorder. Her son is reading at the 4th grade level, he has instead been punished for misbehavior, and his teachers missed the fact entirely that he has a learning disability. Ms. Perez requested outside tutoring at the District's expense, appropriate interventions and redesignations provided for her son, and she requested a timeline for when this would occur.

Ms. Sylvia Holguin provided a list of employees at Van Buren Elementary School that were impacted by the recent fires. She stated that on October 24, 2003 there was a significant presence of ash in the air and a gas line broke causing students' and staff members' eyes and throats to burn. There are individuals that are still suffering from the unhealthful air quality on that day and are using inhalers and going to the hospital for breathing treatments. Ms. Holguin stated that students should have been more important than the money the District collected for having students in school on this date; it was not right that employees were asked to work in these unhealthful conditions, and the Superintendent is responsible for the decision not to cancel school.

Ms. Lita Whitehead addressed the Board regarding a mold issue at Camino Real Elementary School. She stated that the Deputy Superintendent was made aware of the situation; she asked the Board to look into this issue in depth as well as considering changing filters more frequently on the school's filtering system since the air quality in this area is known to be the worst in the nation.

President Adams responded that administration would respond to the concerns brought forward during the Public Verbal Comments session.
