HEARING SESSION

I. Hold Public Hearing on Intent to Adopt Increased Statutory School Fees (Level I Fees) Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development (Mr. Duchon) In January 2004, the State Allocation Board authorized an inflation increase in statutory school facilities fees, also known as "Level I Fees", levied pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 et seq. of ten cents per square foot on new residential construction, and two cents per square foot on new commercial/industrial construction. Our current Level I Fees are \$2.14 per square foot on new residential construction and \$0.34 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction.

David Taussig & Associates, Public Finance and Planning Consultants, prepared a "School Fee Justification Study" to update both the residential and commercial/industrial statutory school facilities fees which substantiates the continuing need to collect such fees in the maximum allowable amount. Both the residential and commercial/industrial Fee Justification Study are available for review in the office of the Director of Centralized Support Services and the Glen Avon Library.

The purpose of this public hearing is to receive input and testimony on levying Level I Fees as proposed in Resolution #2004/34, which would adjust the fee from the current \$2.14 per square foot to \$2.24 per square foot for residential construction and from the current \$0.34 to \$0.36 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction.

President Carolyn Adams should formally open and close the public hearing on this matter. The Board will consider action on Resolution #2004/34 Increasing Statutory School Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development under Agenda Item C.

*II. Hold Public Hearing to Consider the Adoption of a Resolution of Necessity to Acquire a Fee Interest in Certain Real Property Located in Riverside County, California, More Particularly Described as APN 183-030-022, by Eminent Domain, for the Construction of a Parking Lot as a Part of a High School Facility (Mr. Duchon)

At tonight's meeting, the Board will engage in several activities that will precede and set the stage for potential eminent domain proceedings.

- Conduct a Hearing to Consider the Adoption of the Proposed Resolution of Necessity, including providing all interested parties of the affected property, their attorneys or their representatives, an opportunity to be heard on the issues relevant to the Resolution of Necessity.
- 2. Make the following findings as hereinafter described in this report:
 - (i) The public interest and necessity require the proposed project.
 - (ii) The project is planned or located in a manner that will be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury.
 - (iii) The real property to be acquired is necessary for the project.
 - (iv) The offers of just compensation have been made to the property owners.
- Adopt a Resolution of Necessity declaring that the acquisition of fee interest in certain real property located in Riverside County, California, more particularly described as APN 183-030-022, by eminent domain, is necessary for the construction of a parking lot as part of a high school facility.

DISCUSSION:

Information from Davis Demographics (Enrollment Projections, Existing and Future Development) and by David Taussig & Associates (School Facility Needs Analysis/School Facility Fee Justification Study) identified the need for not less than one new elementary school, one new middle school, and one new high school to be constructed in the Jurupa Unified School District. The determination was partially formula driven.

This project is necessary to house existing and future students generated from growth within the District. The majority of the District's growth is expected at the high school level. An increase of approximately 4,000 students is expected in the District by the year 2010 in grades K-12. (See, Davis Demographics & Planning, Inc., Fall 2003/2004 Student Population Projections by Residence.)

In 1990 the Jurupa Unified School District acquired a 50-acre parcel through the State School Building Program, entitled the Leroy F. Greene Lease/Purchase Program. The property is located between Mission Boulevard and Jurupa Road, west of the intersection of Camino Real and Jurupa Road, in the Glen Avon area of Riverside County, California. The purpose of the acquisition was to construct the District's High School No. 3. The school site was selected based on the demographics of the District and projected population increases.

*II. Hold Public Hearing to Consider the Adoption of a Resolution of Necessity to Acquire a Fee Interest in Certain Real Property Located in Riverside County, California, More Particularly Described as APN 183-030-022, by Eminent Domain, for the Construction of a Parking Lot as a Part of a High School Facility (Continued) (Mr. Duchon)

Based on the need to house students, the District formed a design advisory committee and selected an architect and consultants and proceeded with the design of the high school. The site was designed based on guidelines set forth by the State of California School Facility Planning Division of the California Department of Education, School Facility Planning Division.

School site selection is based on current and future needs. Selection is affected by size, location, health, safety, and cost. Both the present and future characteristics of a site must be evaluated along with its surrounding properties. Screening and ranking procedures are followed based on the criteria outlined in the California Department of Education, School Site Section and Approval Guide. This site was selected based on its size of 50 acres, its rectangular shape, access on two sides by Mission Boulevard and Jurupa Road, and its central location. Cost and availability were factors as well. The subject property is adjacent to the 50-acre site and is to be used for the construction of a parking lot for the high school.

As part of the regulatory process, the California Department of Education required that the District perform a traffic study, which was conducted by David Leonard and Associates and incorporated into the California Environmental Quality Act compliance process.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED:

The overall school site consists of several parcels totaling 50 acres. Of this property, only one parcel has not been acquired through negotiated purchase. The subject property, to be used for parking lot purposes, is an approximately 0.45-acre portion from a triangular-shaped 4.27-acre parcel that is zoned for residential purposes. The property is situated at the northerly terminus of Camino Real, north of Jurupa Road, south of Mission Boulevard, within the Community of Jurupa, unincorporated Riverside County, California. The property is also identified as Assessor Parcel Number 183-030-022.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The construction of High School No. 3 as a whole consists of the construction of a 214,000 square foot campus designed to accommodate grades 9 through 12, situated on approximately 50 acres. The campus will open in September 2005, with approximately 2,500 students with a maximum capacity of approximately 3,200 students, as well as teaching, administrative and support staff. The classroom complex, administration, gymnasium, library/media center, performing arts, janitor/storage/mechanical rooms, and visitor parking are located within the north half of the property situated toward Mission Boulevard. Parking lots for students and staff are located east of the campus with access off Camino Real.

The parking lots east of the campus will be accessed from Camino Real. The 0.45-acre parcel is required in order to allow for vehicular access to the parking lots by students, staff, and the general public. No other parcels are available in the vicinity that could be used to access the parking lots. The District is acquiring only what is needed for construction and access of the parking lot.

HEARINGS AND REQUIRED FINDINGS:

California eminent domain law provides that a public entity may not commence an eminent domain proceeding until its governing body has adopted a Resolution of Necessity, which resolution may only be adopted after the governing body has given each party with an interest in the affected property or their representatives a reasonable opportunity to appear and be heard on the following matters:

- 1. The public interest and necessity require the proposed project.
- 2. The project is planned or located in the manner that will be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury.
- 3. The real property to be acquired is necessary for the project.
- 4. The offers of just compensation have been made to the property owners.

A notice of hearing was mailed by first class mail to the property owners and states the District's intent to consider the adoption of the resolution, the right of each person to appear and be heard on these issues, and that failure to file a written request to appear will result in a waiver of the right to appear and be heard. The District has scheduled this hearing at which all persons who filed a written request within 15 days of the date of notice was mailed may appear and be heard. The District's legal counsel mailed the required notice to the property owner on April 2, 2004.

The above four required findings are addressed as follows:

1. The Public Interest and Necessity Require the Proposed Project

Studies performed by Taussig and Associates and Davis Demographics identified the need for one new high school in the Jurupa Unified School District. A parking lot for use by students, staff, and the general public is necessary for the project. This parking lot will be accessed from Camino Real. The project will provide joint-use facilities such as playing fields, tennis courts, basketball courts, library, and a gymnasium. The acquisition of the 0.45-acre parcel and the completion of the parking facilities will improve traffic flow on existing public streets.

2. The Project is Planned or Located in a Manner that will be Most Compatible with The Greatest Public Good and the Least Private Injury

In 1990 the Jurupa Unified School District acquired a 50-acre parcel through the State School Building Program, entitled the Leroy F. Greene Lease/Purchase Program. The property is located between Mission Boulevard and Jurupa Road, west of the intersection of Camino Real and Jurupa Road, in the Glen Avon area of Riverside County, California. After review of other potential sites and recommendations from the California Department of Education, it was determined that this property would result in the least private injury. In addition, the location of this site in relation not only to the high school, but also the existing residential development to the east and west and two main community arteries to the north (Mission Boulevard) and south (Jurupa Road) makes this site most compatible with the greatest public good. The purpose of the acquisition was to construct the District's High School No. 3. The school site was selected based on the demographics of the District and projected population increases.

2. The Project is Planned or Located in a Manner that will be Most Compatible with The Greatest Public Good and the Least Private Injury (Continued)

Proceeding with acquisition of the adjacent parcel is less injurious to all parties involved than proceeding with condemnation of an entirely new site from unwilling sellers, at an increased cost to the District.

The project will improve the community, provide new joint-use facilities, improve traffic flow, and improve existing public streets. The subject property (0.45 acre) is required for access to the parking lots, which will be used by students, staff, and the general public. Construction of the school is 75% complete. No other property in the vicinity of the site could be used to access the parking lots.

3. The Real Property Sought to be Acquired is Necessary for the Proposed Project

Along with other street improvements on Mission Boulevard and Jurupa Road, the traffic study recommended that Camino Real be constructed to connect with the existing southerly roadway, Jurupa Road, and that a traffic signal be installed at the intersection of Camino Real and Mission Boulevard. The project as a whole was designed to have full access to Camino Real and right turn in/out movement only to Mission Boulevard and Jurupa Road. This parking lot will provide additional parking for use by students, staff, and the general public.

The project as designed will need additional parking. The parcel being considered for acquisition is conveniently located adjacent to the high school site. There are no other parcels adjacent to the school site, which are available at this time. In order to access parking lots by students, staff, and the general public, the 0.45-acre parcel is required. No other properties are available which would give the District access to the parking lots.

4. The Offer of Just Compensation Has Been Made

An appraisal was prepared by Mason & Mason to establish the fair market value of the real property the District is seeking to acquire. An offer of just compensation was made to the property owners to purchase the real property as established by the approved appraisal and as required by Section 7267.2 of the California Government Code. Although a negotiated settlement may still be possible for the real property cited above, it would be appropriate to commence the procedures to acquire the property through eminent domain to ensure that the real property will be available to meet the time frames associated with the development of the project.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

Compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) has been satisfied by the District's passage and adoption of a Mitigated Negative Declaration on December 10, 2001.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The property acquisition is funded by the State School Building Lease/Purchase Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

Administration recommends that the Governing Board make the necessary findings as stated above and adopt the Resolution No. 2004/35, "Resolution of Necessity."

Education Code Section 42600 requires approval of the school district governing board for the transfer of funds between expenditure classifications. It is sometimes necessary to transfer funds from one expenditure classification to another during the course of the fiscal year in order to meet educational objectives. Previously, the Board approved resolutions that authorized transfers for categorically funded project budgets and transfers of \$200 or less within the general and lottery funds. Listed in the supporting documents are the appropriation transfers that are needed at this time. These transfers exceed the \$200 limit.

Administration recommends approval of the Appropriation Transfers.

* 7. Adopt Resolution No. 2004/36, Authorization to Encumber Funds for the 2004/05 Fiscal Year (Mr. Duchon)

It is sometimes necessary to issue purchase orders for the new fiscal year before the year begins. This ensures that necessary materials will be on hand when needed. For example, purchase orders for summer school athletic equipment are needed for early practice sessions, or for items that have a lead-time of several months.

The County Office of Education requires the adoption of a resolution, which is included in the supporting documents, for districts that use the automatic purchase order program and wish to commit funds before the approval of the Budget for 2004/05.

Administration recommends the adoption of Resolution 2004/36, Authorization to Encumber Funds for the 2004/05 fiscal year.

* 8. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request

Ms. Cathe Giles, teacher at Ina Arbuckle Elementary, is requesting approval to travel to Pathfinder Ranch in Garner Valley with ninety (90) 6th grade students. The purpose of the trip is to participate in an outdoor science camp. Each 6th grade teacher will accompany his/her class. The dates scheduled are Monday, May 17 through Wednesday, May 19, 2004. The cost of this program is \$103 per student plus the cost of transportation. **Costs for this trip will be paid through community and PTA donations, fundraisers, and School Improvement Funds.** Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

The program, for three days and two nights, includes academic coursework with lecture; laboratory and field experiences; meals, and lodging. Health and accident insurance for each attendee is included in the fee, and the school maintains an infirmary with a resident nurse. Students are in "class" most of the day and evening, but they do have supervised recreation time scheduled. Academic courses include forest ecology; chaparral ecology; freshwater ecology; field geology; field ornithology and entomology; soil science; anthropology; ethnobotany; birds of prey; astronomy; gardening; archaeology; orienteering; and human ecology. Recreation includes archery, survival skills, swimming, short ropes course, canoeing, and water safety.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Field Trip request by Ms. Cathe Giles to travel to Garner Valley with ninety (90) 6th grade students to attend the Pathfinder Outdoor Science School on Monday, May 17 through Wednesday, May 19, 2004.

* 9. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from Food Services Department (Mr. Mercurius)

Ms. Robin Coutu, Technology Facilitator Food Services, is requesting approval to travel to Atlanta, Georgia on Sunday, May 23 through Friday, May 28, 2004. The purpose of the trip is to attend the Horizon Project Manager Certification Training. The training is required to enhance Ms. Coutu's skills and abilities to administer the Horizon Food Management System in Jurupa Unified School District. Travel will be by air, and the **Food Services Department will pay all costs.** A copy of the travel request is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board approve the Out-of-State Travel Request for Robin Coutu to attend the Horizon Project Manager Certification Training May 23-28, 2004.

B. Present Options for Design of Middle School #4

(Mr. Duchon)

In December 2000, the district contracted with Perkins & Will to develop plans and specifications for the construction of Middle School #4, which was to be located on Limonite Avenue. Subsequent problems with the site forced the District to select another site on which to construct Middle School #4. The plans as designed by the architect intended for the District to take advantage of the Use of Grants policy contained in the State School Building/School Facility Program regulations. Even after value engineering of the plans as designed, the project is over budget.

B. Present Options for Design of Middle School #4 (Continued) (Mr. Duchon) Significant redrawing of the plans will be required in order to realign the project with the budget and to adapt the project to the new site. The significant amount of redesign required provided a good opportunity for the Board to look at a prototype school at a lesser price. Staff contacted two architects and requested proposals for a prototype middle school. Construction costs and fees associated with a prototype school and redesign of Middle School #4 are outlined below.

The options available to the Board are as follows:

- (1) Utilize the existing plans as provided by Perkins & Will and adapt the plans to the new site or;
- (2) Utilize a prototype design from other architect and adapt the plans to the new site.

The costs associated with both options are outlined below.

Administration is requesting direction from the Board on how to proceed with Middle School #4 plans and specifications.

Administration recommends that the Board direct Staff to utilize a prototype school and retain Higginson, Cartozian for the design of Middle School #4.

C. Adopt Resolution No. 2004/34, Increasing Statutory School Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development (Mr. Duchon)

The District currently collects statutory school facilities fees (Level 1 Fees) in the amount of \$2.14 per square foot on new residential construction and \$0.34 per square foot for commercial/industrial. In January 2004, the State Allocation Board authorized an inflation increase in the Level 1 Fees to \$2.24 per square foot for new residential construction and \$0.36 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction.

In order to increase fees to the new statutory level, the District must justify that the fee is reasonable and demonstrate that it bears a relationship on the impact of new housing and commercial/industrial construction. The District retained David Taussig & Associates, a consulting firm, to update the current School Facilities Fee Justification Studies that establish a connection between new residential and commercial/industrial construction and the need for new school facilities.

C. Adopt Resolution No. 2004/34, Increasing Statutory School Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development (Continued) (Mr. Duchon)

The proposed increase of the fee to its statutory maximum bears a reasonable relationship to the need for new school construction. The fee justification studies are available for review in the office of the Director of Centralized Support Services and the Glen Avon Library. In order to collect the proposed increased Level 1 Fees, the Board would need to adopt Resolution No. 2004/34, provided in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution No. 2004/34, Increasing Statutory School Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development.

D. Approve Proposal for Internal Waste Management Services

(Mr. Duchon)

The Jurupa Unified School District currently contracts with Waste Management Services for trash pick-up and recycling. Upon termination of our contract with Waste Management Services on June 30, 2004, the Purchasing Department proposes that Jurupa Unified School District provide its own services. The implementation of this program would consist of purchasing equipment including one front-load dump truck, 100 trash/recycling bins, the recruitment of a driver, and the cost of disposal fees. Based on our current contract with Waste Management Services of \$132,519.55 and on what other districts currently pay, the Purchasing Department has determined that the Jurupa Unified School District could realize a savings of not less than \$50,000 per year with this program. A copy of the proposal is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board approve the proposal for Internal Waste Management Services.

E. <u>Approve Submittal of Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) Program Application</u> <u>Form for Fiscal Year 2004-2005</u> (Mr. Jensen)

Currently the District participates in the Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) Program. However, districts must apply annually to continue participation as authorized by *Education Code* Sections 315 and 316, which was enacted by Proposition 227 in June 1998. Funding is allocated on a formula basis utilizing the results of the most recent R-30 Annual Language Census, approximately \$30 per English learner. Administration is requesting approval by the Board to submit an application to participate in the CBET Program in 2004-2005. A copy of the application form is included in the supporting documents

It is recommended that the Board approve the submittal of the application form for the District to participate in the CBET Program in 2004-2005.

F. Approve Purchase of Audio Visual Equipment for Granite Hill

(Mr. Duchon)

Granite Hill Elementary wishes to purchase thirty-five each of the following items: Projectors - Visual Presentation Cameras - Projector Screens. Quotes received for the equipment are:

*CDW-G did not carry the visual presentation camera as the other two vendors and quoted an ELMO

The equipment will help insure student mastery of the standards and promote parent/teacher/student communication. The projectors, presentation cameras, and projector screens will be purchased using II/USP funds (Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program). Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of Audio Visual Equipment from Troxell Communication, in the amount of \$54,155.15 (tax included) for Granite Hill Elementary.

G. Approve Purchase of Dell computers for Mira Loma Middle School
Mira Loma Middle School wishes to purchase 20 Dell Optiplex GX 270 computers to upgrade the computer lab. The computers will be purchased from Dell using the California Education WSCA (DGS State Contract 70004/WSCA Contract # 92-00151) and will be installed by September 7, 2004. The purchase will total \$21,060.38. The computers will be purchased using II/USP funds (Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program). Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of 20 Dell Optiplex GX 270 computers from Dell, in the amount of \$21,060.38 (tax included).

** H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Edmunds)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the *Student Assistance Program* and *(SCORE)* the *School and Community OutREach Team* for follow-up:

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:

1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-112 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.

The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-160 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-167 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

(Ms. Nash)

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #18 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

- Consideration of Possible Approval of Superintendent's Contract and Salary
 This item is for the Board to consider and possibly approve a contract with Mr. Elliott Duchon as Superintendent of the Jurupa Unified School District commencing on July 1, 2004. The contract will set forth the Superintendent's salary and other terms of employment.
- 3. Approve STRS Exemption for Employment in an Emergency Situation

(Ms. Nash)

The State Teachers' Retirement System currently limits the post-retirement earnings of its retirees, if they return to a position requiring a credential. However, such a retiree may be granted an exemption to the earnings limitation for employment in an "emergency situation" to fill a vacant administrative position consistent with the provisions of Section 24216. The retired STRS member must be employed to fill a vacancy that was unanticipated and occurred due to circumstances beyond the control of the employer. This vacancy is the result of the inability of Ms. Theresa Castillo, newly appointed Principal of Mission Middle School, to begin her employment with the District until July 1, 2004. The position requires an individual with highly specialized skills, knowledge, and experience. Ms. Benita Roberts, retired Jurupa Unified School District Superintendent, has these skills. There is no one currently employed by the Jurupa Unified School District that is both qualified and available to fill the position on a temporary basis. Ms. Roberts is not a candidate for a permanent position. With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Ms. Benita Roberts be approved for temporary employment through the end of this school year as Principal at Mission Middle School under the authorization of Education Code Section 24216.

RESOLUTION NO. 2004/35

A RESOLUTION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING THAT THE ACQUISITION OF FEE INTERESTS IN CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY LOCATED IN RIVERSIDE COUNTY, CALIFORNIA, MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED AS APN 183-030-022, BY EMINENT DOMAIN IS NECESSARY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A PARKING LOT AS PART OF A HIGH SCHOOL FACILITY

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") proposes to acquire a fee interest in certain real property, located in Riverside County, California, more particularly described as APN 183-030-022, for purposes of the construction of a parking lot as part of a high school facility pursuant to the authority granted to it by section 35270.5 of the California Education Code; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1245.235 of the California Code of Civil Procedure, the District scheduled a public hearing for Monday, April 19, at 7:00 p.m., at the Education Center on 4850 Pedley Road, Riverside, California, and gave to each person whose property is to be acquired and whose name and address appeared on the last equalized county assessment roll, notice and a reasonable opportunity to appear at said hearing and be heard on the matters referred to in section 1240.030 of the California Code of Civil Procedure; and

WHEREAS, said hearing has been held by the District and each person whose property is to be acquired by eminent domain was afforded an opportunity to be heard on said matters; and

WHEREAS, the District may now adopt a Resolution of Necessity pursuant to section 1240.040 of the California Code of Civil Procedure;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND DECLARE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Compliance with California Code of Civil Procedure and California Environmental Quality Act. There has been compliance by the City with the requirements of section 1245.235 of the California Code of Civil Procedure regarding notice and hearing and with the California Environmental Quality Act.

Section 2. Public Use. The public use for which the fee interest is to be acquired is the construction and operation of a parking lot as part of a high school facility pursuant to the authority granted to it by section 35270.5 of the California Education Code. For the provision of public education, section 35270.5 of the California Education Code authorizes the District to acquire by eminent domain property necessary for such purposes.

<u>Section 3</u>. <u>Description of Property</u>. Attached and marked as Exhibit "A" is the legal description and plat map of the real property to be acquired by the District, which describe the general location and extent of the property with sufficient detail for reasonable identification.

<u>Section 4</u>. <u>Findings</u>. The District hereby finds and determines each of the following:

- (a) The public interest and necessity require the proposed project;
- (b) The proposed project is planned or located in the manner that will be most compatible with the greatest public good and least private injury;
- (c) The property described in Exhibit "A" is necessary for the proposed project; and
- (d) The offers required by section 7267.2 of the California Government Code were made.
- (e) The public entity has fully complied with the California Environmental Act for the proposed project.

Some or all of the real property to be acquired is subject to easements and rights-of-way appropriated to existing public uses. The legal descriptions of these easements and rights-of-way are on file with the District and describe the general location and extent of the easements and rights-of-way with sufficient detail for reasonable identification. In the event the herein described use or uses will not unreasonably interfere with or impair the continuance of the public use as it now exists or may reasonably be expected to exist in the future, counsel for the District is authorized to acquire the herein described real property subject to such existing public use(s) pursuant to section 1240.510 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.

Section 6. More Necessary Public Use. Some or all of the real property to be acquired is subject to easements and rights-of-way appropriated to existing public uses. To the extent that the herein described use or uses will unreasonably interfere with or impair the continuance of the public use as it now exists or may reasonably be expected to exist in the future, the District finds and determines that the herein described use or uses are more necessary than said existing public use. Counsel for the District is authorized to acquire the herein described real property appropriated to such existing public use(s) pursuant to section 1240.610 of the California Code of Civil Procedure. Staff is further authorized to make such improvements to the real property being acquired that it determines are reasonably necessary to mitigate any adverse impact upon the existing public use.

<u>Section 7</u>. <u>Further Activities</u>. Counsel for the District is hereby authorized to acquire the hereinabove described real property in the name of and on behalf of the District by eminent domain, and counsel is authorized to institute and prosecute such legal proceedings as may be required in connection therewith. Legal counsel is further



authorized to take such steps as may be authorized and required by law, and to make such security deposits as may be required by order of court, to permit the District to take possession of and use said real property at the earliest possible time. Counsel is further authorized to correct any errors or to make or agree to non material changes in the legal description of the real property that are deemed necessary for the conduct of the condemnation action or other proceedings or transaction required to acquire the subject real property.

Section 8. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect upon adoption.

He pointed out that there was never discussion in Open Session and now the Agenda says that the outgoing Superintendent is the negotiator for the new Superintendent and there is an appointment of an Assistant Superintendent Business Services. The Superintendent stated that both items are relevant and appropriate for Closed Session. Mr. Chavez stated that the Board determines what is discussed, not one Board member, and not one Superintendent. The Superintendent stated that he sets the Agenda with the Board. Mr. Chavez stated that what he is talking about is interviewing a person. He stated that the interview process was very hard for all Middle School Principal participants that applied for the position. Since the positions listed are above a principal's position, there should be an interview as thorough as the one for a principal. What he has seen on the Agenda is appointment without discussion, interview, or the individual's vision for Jurupa. This is out of order; a person is appointed without knowing their vision. The Superintendent stated that this item was placed on the Agenda with the permission of the President and Clerk of the Board and it is an appropriate agenda item for Closed Session. At 4:38 p.m., the Board recessed to Closed Session in the Board Conference Room. At 6:57 p.m., the Board adjourned from Closed Session.

The Riverside County Office of Education verified the documentation submitted by Mrs. Caron Winston, Principal, and made the determination that they are a successful Title I award recipient. The Superintendent stated that the District is proud of the Principal, students, and staff for receiving this outstanding Academic Achievement Award.
RECOGNIZE STATE COMITE TEAM VISIT	The Superintendent reported that after comprehensive observations, interviews, and document reviews, the California Department of Education (CDE) Comité team concluded last week that the District exited from the monitoring process of Comité. The only requirement remaining is preparing an Evaluation Plan. Consultants for the CDE Comité visited three of our schools, Rustic Lane Elementary School, Jurupa Middle School, and Jurupa Valley High School, as well as interviewing the Principals at Mira Loma Middle School and Rubidoux High School. Both consultants provided positive feedback regarding the high numbers of CLAD and SDAIE authorized teachers in the District, as well as the successful analysis and use of assessment data to guide instruction in the classroom. The Superintendent recognized principals and teachers in the District for focusing their efforts on the Comite process, and he acknowledged Language and Education Services staff, and in particular, Ms. Norie Garavito, Language Services Coordinator, and Ms. Lucinda Sheppy, Administrator of Student Services, Standards, and Accountability, for heading up the Comite process.
PUBLIC VERBAL COMMENTS	President Adams opened the Public Verbal Comments session.
	Ms. Joyce Lenoir brought to the Board's attention a five-day suspension that occurred today for a senior at Rubidoux High School. She announced that this student would be speaking before the Board this evening since she has a sincere desire to graduate.
	The Superintendent told the speaker that since this is an appeal of a suspension, it is not appropriate for the matter to be discussed at this time. The District would be happy to work with the family to try to resolve their concern; however, since it involved student discipline, there was a confidentiality issue. President Adams asked the speaker to contact the Superintendent's office regarding their concern. Ms. Susan Funston, Sky Country Elementary School teacher, read a poem that she wrote concerning the re-imaging of teacher computers, which caused the loss of
	memory on their computers to occur. Teachers lost critical information and their records on student progress in various programs. President Adams asked Ms. Funston to contact the District Office to receive feedback on this matter.

	Mrs. Burns stated that she was invited to serve as "Principal for a Day" at Sky Country Elementary School; however, her visit was cancelled because the Principal, Mr. Dave Doubravsky, was out ill that day. She commented that she appreciated the poem that Ms. Funston read, and that there was no humor in what happened. Mrs. Burns stated that she spent three days at West Riverside Elementary School providing rock shows for students; it was a pleasure to see West Riverside students and staff again at this evening's Board meeting, and she appreciated the student presentation.
	Mr. Knight apologized to Ms. Funston for the incident at Sky Country Elementary School involving teacher computers; he noted that a process would be developed to ensure that this would not happen again. He commended Glen Avon Elementary School Principal, Ms. Susan Tibbetts, and Mr. Dave Doubravsky, Sky Country Elementary School Principal, for their recent School Site Council meetings regarding parent workshops and enhancing parent participation, respectively. Mr. Knight mentioned his visit to the Teen Expo on March 27, 2004 where he spoke with Ms. Liza Fimbres, Youth Prevention Specialist. He asked that Ms. Fimbres be invited to attend a Board meeting to discuss "Friday Night Live" programs being offered in the District. 	Mr. Chavez thanked West Riverside Elementary School students for their excellent patriotic presentation, and he thanked Ms. Peg Schmidt, choir director, and Ms. Sonia Porter, Principal, for bringing the students to the Board meeting. He reviewed his attendance at the RCSBA meeting on March 31, 2004, with keynote speaker, Ms. Sandy Silberstein, RCSAA Legislative Advocate. As follow-up to some of the information presented by Ms. Silberstein, Mr. Chavez requested a presentation on a proposal initiated by Secretary for Education Richard Reardon that would shift more control over school budgets to the school site. Mr. Trujillo reviewed the Report of Findings from the State Assistance and Intervention Team (SAIT) from the Riverside County Office of Education. Their key observations are that there has been extraordinary school and district support during the SAIT process. The process has also been valuable to the staff as they developed a self-study and analysis to identify areas for improvement and corrective action. Mr. Trujillo reviewed the nine essential components of the SAIT Findings, and noted that Dr. Mike Jones, from the Riverside County Office of Education and a member of the SAIT Team, is also present to answer any questions from the Board. Board members participated in a question and answer session regarding how the staff plans to implement the recommendations, which is a lot of extra work for teachers, as well as continuing to teach students in the classroom. Mr. Trujillo stated that they are currently working on a professional development calendar for next year and training begins in May and in the fall; his goal is to implement the recommendations and exit the SAIT program in two years, by June 2006. In addition, he noted that the State provided funding for Rubidoux High School to implement the corrective actions. MR. Mr. Rodriguez stated he requested this item on the Agenda due to the Board's recent workshop on hiring practices and the fact that the District's Board Policies in this area have not been updated for approximately 14 years. President Adams indicated that as Mr. Duchon, Deputy Superintendent, stated at the workshop, he is working with a consultant, Dr. Kenney, to compile sample CSBA Board Policies and incorporate them into the District's policies to present to the Board for review and approval by section. The Deputy Superintendent noted that additionally, Ms. Lois Nash, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services, would be reviewing personnel policies to ensure that they are updated and conform to current revisions in the law. He noted for President Adams that the timeline would be approximately five months for the policies to be updated. Mr. Chavez stated that what Mr. Duchon is doing might be good, but he supported a district committee and made the following motion. MR. CHAVEZ MOVED THE BOARD CREATE A COMMITTEE TO WORK ON ESTABLISHING A CONSISTENT HIRING PROCESS FOR ALL POSITIONS, ESPECIALLY MANAGEMENT POSITIONS. MR. RODRIGUEZ SECONDED THE MOTION. Mrs. Burns commented that it is already part of the Board Policy process for Board members to review revisions and vote at a first and second reading; she did not feel that a committee was appropriate. RESOLUTION NO. 2004/34

A RESOLUTION OF THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT INCREASING STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, the Governing Board ("Board") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("District") provides for the educational needs for students in grades K-12 within the unincorporated areas of Riverside County ("County"); and

WHEREAS, Education Code Section 17620 et seq. and Government Code Section 65995 authorize the governing board of any school district within the state of California ("State") to levy a fee against new residential, commercial and industrial development projects within the school district for the purpose of funding the construction and reconstruction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously adopted and imposed statutory school fees in the amounts of \$2.14 per square foot of new residential development and \$.34 per square foot of new commercial and industrial development in accordance with the fee justification study previously adopted by the District ("Statutory School Fees"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65995(b)(3), the State Allocation Board, at its January 28, 2004 meeting, increased the maximum amount of the Statutory School Fees to \$2.24 per square foot of new residential development as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) and \$0.36 per square foot of new commercial and industrial development as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2); and



WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the school facilities of the District continue to operate at overcapacity and that the educational programs are seriously impacted by the increasing student population caused by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the boundaries of District; and

WHEREAS, new development continues to generate additional students for the District's schools and the District is required to accommodate such students; and

WHEREAS, the District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, including acquisition of school sites, construction of permanent school facilities, and interim school facilities to accommodate students generated from new development; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed, considered, and based its findings on the reports prepared by David Taussig & Associates entitled "Commercial/ Industrial Development School Fee Justification Study for Jurupa Unified School District" and "Residential Development School Fee Justification Study for Jurupa Unified School District ("Studies"), which analyzes the District's current school facilities, the estimated number of students which will be generated by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the District, and the estimated costs which will be required to construct permanent school facilities to accommodate the students generated by such new development; and

WHEREAS, the findings in the Studies demonstrate that the estimated costs of providing school facilities for students generated by new development will exceed the maximum amount of revenue which will be collected from Statutory School Fees levied pursuant to Education Code Sections 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995; and



WHEREAS, the Studies justify the District's imposition of Statutory School Fees on residential construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing student generation data for residential development projects and by demonstrating that new school facilities are necessary to accommodate increased enrollment resulting from such development; and

WHEREAS, the Studies further justify the District's imposition of Statutory School Fees on new commercial and industrial construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing specific categories of commercial and industrial development which were determined to impact the District's school facilities based upon the square footage of the construction, the anticipated number of employees and the number of new students generated by such employees; and

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the students, teachers, parents and electorate of the District that the Statutory School Fees levied by the District under Education Code Sections 17620, 17623 and Government Code Section 65995 be increased to \$2.24 per square foot of new residential development and \$0.36 per square foot of new commercial/industrial development; and

WHEREAS, the Statutory School Fees levied against new residential, commercial and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to accommodate students generated from such new development, including but not limited to, acquisition of new school sites, remodeling of existing school facilities, acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related facilities in accordance with Education Code Section 17620; and

WHEREAS, the Studies have been reviewed by the Board and District staff in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and



WHEREAS, no city or county may issue a building permit for any new residential, commercial or industrial development within the District absent a certification by the District of compliance by the owner/developer with the requirements regarding school facilities fees as set forth in Education Code Section 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995; and

WHEREAS, the appropriate land use jurisdictions will be notified of the adoption of the Study and the increased Statutory School Fees levied by the District; and

WHEREAS, the District (1) has made available to the public, at least ten (10) days prior to its public meeting, the Studies and data indicating the estimated cost required to provide the service for which the increased Statutory School Fees are levied and the revenue sources anticipated to provide the service as demonstrated in the Studies; (2) has mailed notice at least fourteen (14) days prior to this meeting to all interested parties who have requested in writing notice of adoption of a fee justification study for the levy of Statutory School Fees pursuant to Government Code Section 65995; and (3) has held a duly noticed, regularly scheduled public meeting at which oral and written testimony was received regarding the Study and the proposed increase in Statutory School Fees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board has reviewed the Studies and hereby adopts the findings contained therein.

Section 2. The Board increases the Statutory School Fees levied against all new residential development and additions resulting in an increase of assessable space in excess of five hundred (500) square feet pursuant to Education Code Section



17620 and Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) to an amount of \$2.24 per square foot.

Section 3. The Board increases the Statutory School Fees levied against all new commercial and industrial development to \$0.36 per square foot as provided in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2).

Section 4. The Board has reviewed the Studies and finds, based upon the Studies, information and testimony presented in conjunction therein, as follows:

Section 4.1. New residential, commercial and industrial development will result in a substantial increase in student enrollment which will require the District to provide additional school facilities to accommodate new growth, and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the District's Statutory School Fees, which are necessary to fund the construction and reconstruction of school facilities to accommodate such new growth, and the types of development on which the Statutory School Fees will be imposed.

Section 4.2. New residential, commercial and industrial development will result in a substantial increase in student enrollment which will require the District to provide additional school facilities and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the District's need for new and reconstructed school facilities and the types of development on which the Statutory School Fees will be imposed.

Section 4.3. Statutory School Fees levied on new residential, commercial and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to serve students generated from such development.



Section 5. The Board finds that a separate account has been established for the deposit of Statutory School Fee revenue collected from residential and commercial/industrial development and that said account has at all times since been separately maintained, except for temporary investments, from other funds of the District.

Section 6. The Board finds that the funds of the account, described in Section 5, consisting of the proceeds of Statutory School Fees have been imposed for the purposes of constructing and reconstructing those school facilities necessitated by new residential and commercial/industrial development, and that, these funds may be expended for those purposes. The Statutory School Fee revenue may also be expended by the District for the costs of performing any study or otherwise making the findings and determinations required under subdivisions (a), (b), and (d) of Section 66001 of the Government Code. In addition, the District may also retain, as appropriate, an amount not to exceed in any fiscal year, three percent (3%) of the Statutory School Fee revenue collected in that fiscal year pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 for reimbursement of the administrative costs incurred by the District in collecting the Statutory School Fees.

Section 7. The Board hereby establishes a process that provides the party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed an opportunity for a hearing to appeal the imposition of Statutory School Fees on a commercial/industrial development project as required by Education Code Section 17621(e)(2). The appeal process is as follows:

Section 7.1. Within ten (10) calendar days of being notified, in writing, by personal delivery or deposit in the U.S. Mail, of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees to be imposed on a particular



commercial/industrial project, or within ten (10) calendar days of paying the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees pursuant to Education Code Section 17620(a)(1)(A), a party shall file a written appeal with the District's Director of Centralized Support Services regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees. The party shall state in the written appeal the grounds for opposing the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees and the written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the Director of Centralized Support Services.

Section 7.2. The possible grounds for an appeal include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.

Section 7.3. The Director of Centralized Support Services, or her designee, shall render a written decision within thirty (30) calendar days following the receipt of the written appeal unless an extension is agreed to by both parties. The Director of Centralized Support Services, or her designee, shall deliver the written decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the party.

Section 7.4. The party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed may appeal the Director of Centralized



Support Services' decision to the Board. Any appeal to the Board must be filed within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the Director of Centralized Support Services' written decision.

Section 7.5. The party appealing the Director of Centralized Support Services' decision to the Board, shall state in the written appeal to the Board the grounds for opposing the Director of Centralized Support Services' decision. The written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the President of the Board.

Section 7.6. The possible grounds for an appeal of the Director of Centralized Support Services' decision to the Board include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.

Section 7.7. Within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written appeal of the Director of Centralized Support Services' decision to the Board regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees, the Board Secretary or his designee, shall give notice in writing of the date, place and time of the hearing before the Board, to the party appealing the Director of Centralized Support Services' decision. The Board shall notice and conduct said hearing at the next available regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the appealing party is given



notice at least five (5) calendar days prior to the meeting of the Board. The Board shall render a written decision on the appeal within thirty (30) calendar days following the Board's hearing on the party's appeal, and serve the Board's decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the appealing party.

Section 7.8. The party appealing the imposition of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees shall bear the burden of establishing that the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are improper.

Section 8. No statement or provision set forth in this Resolution, or referred to herein shall be construed to repeal any preexisting fee previously imposed by the District on any residential or nonresidential development.

Section 9. The Board finds and determines that the adoption or imposition of Statutory School Fees in accordance with Government Code Section 65995 is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Code Section 17621(a).

Section 10. District staff is directed to file a Notice of Exemption with the Riverside County Clerk's Office.

Section 11. District staff is hereby instructed to work with the appropriate land use jurisdictions to ensure compliance with Education Code Section 17620(b), which provides that no city or county may issue a building permit for any development project within the District without certification by the District of compliance by that development project with the school facilities fee requirements of this Resolution. The Board determines that Statutory School Fees are not subject to Government Code



Section 66007, and that a Certificate of Compliance is required, prior to the issuance of

any building permit.

Section 12. District staff is hereby instructed to transmit certified copies of

this Resolution, accompanied by all relevant supporting documentation including the

Studies and a map of the boundary area of the District subject to the Statutory School

Fees, to all appropriate land use jurisdictions issuing building permits within the District,

informing each of them of the District's current school facilities fee for development

projects.

Section 13. The Statutory School Fees designated herein shall take effect

sixty (60) days from the date of this Resolution.

Waste Management Proposal

The Jurupa Unified School District currently contracts with Waste Management Services for trash pickup and recycling. The 03-04 annual base cost for the services is \$132,514.56. This cost is for the basic trash and recycling pickup services and does not include extra pick-up or roll off dumpsters for special events.

After communicating with Alvord Unified, regarding their internal waste management services and the savings they incurred, the Purchasing Department compiled the following information in anticipation of reducing waste management cost for the Jurupa Unified School District. This information contains the benefits and costs of providing trash pick-up and recycling services internally for Jurupa Unified School District. Upon termination of the Waste Management contract, June 30, 2004, the Purchasing Department proposes that Jurupa USD provide it's own services.

Several months of research have gone into the formulating of this proposal in order to discover the benefits. The Purchasing Department began by calling other districts currently providing these services internally. Alvord USD has been in the waste management business for approximately fourteen (14) years. Both the Director of Maintenance and Operations, and the district auditor indicated they saved a considerable amount of money over a period of years by performing these services internally. Considering that Alvord is a district of approximately the same size as Jurupa USD, we decided to model our program after Alvord USD.

Based on the current contract with Waste Management Services of \$132,519.55 and what other districts are currently paying, the Purchasing Department has determined that the Jurupa Unified School District will realize an estimated savings of \$22,238 per year during the first five years and an estimated \$59,000 after the sixth year with this program.

The results of our research found that by providing waste management services internally the district will ultimately achieve a cost benefit.

To summarize our proposal we would like to reiterate that by providing waste management services internally, it will ultimately give the Jurupa Unified School District a cost benefit. With current and past market charges the district has paid an average of \$132,519.55 annually for four years.

During the first year of the implementation of this program, the cost to the district will be \$310,380.21(with the purchase of a diesel truck vs. CNG). There is also the option of a lease purchase of the truck. The district will absorb the cost of implementing this program within 3.5 years, if not sooner, due to the projected increase in disposal fees at the end of this fiscal year when our contract expires.

The proposed scheduling for the set up of this program:

April 2004 – Purchase Dump truck

Delivery time for the truck is 180 to 225 days.

June 2004 - Purchase Bins

June 2004 - Recruitment of Class B Refuse/Grounds Equipment Operator

June 2004 - Cancellation of Waste Management Contract

Please Note: We are currently analyzing the benefits of trash compactors. Trash compactors could decrease disposal fees and reduce the number of trips per day thus reducing normal wear and tear of truck. Also we are re-analyzing the office paper recycling program that will pay \$.03 per pound for white bond paper, \$.0325 per pound for newspaper and \$.0325 per pound for cardboard.
