a. Hear Report on Youth Opportunity Center Westside Aviation Program

(Mr. Duchon)

Westside Aviation Entrepreneurship Program started as a result of a partnership between the Jurupa Unified School District Youth Opportunity Center and the Wathen Foundation. That in turn led to a partnership with the Polyfiber Corporation, the largest airplane fabric covering manufacturing plant in the West Coast. The purpose of the partnership was to begin addressing issues regarding dropout rates and guiding at-risk students toward a pathway of success. Five students were selected. In order to participate in the program, these students had to stay in school, work on completing school, work every weekday after school at Flabob Airport, and avoid negative contact with law enforcement. What started off as a way to keep these students out of trouble turned into an entrepreneurship--West Side Aviation. This evening, Ms. Nancy Matzenauer, Youth Opportunity Center Coordinator, and Dr. Art Petersen, Flabob Airport, will share information on the successes of the Youth Opportunity Center's Westside Aviation Program. ** 7. Rejection of Claim

(Mr. Duchon)

On May 5, 2004, Administration received a claim against Jurupa Unified School District from the law office of Arteaga & Garcia on behalf of Nicholas Hammack and Kathleen Hammack and Isaac Hammack. The claim alleges suffering of physical and psychological injuries, and anxiety and emotional distress, as the result of assault and battery by a substitute teacher. Administration recommends rejection of the claim, with appropriate notice to the district insurance carrier. (A copy of the claim is available for Board review.)

- ** 8. Rejection of Claim
 On April 23, 2004, Administration received a claim against Jurupa Unified School District on behalf of Ryan Lingo, a minor by and through his Guardian Ad Litem, Dorian Montellano. The claim alleges he suffered serious personal injuries as the result of being hit by a car while walking to Rubidoux High School. Administration recommends rejection of the claim, with appropriate notice to the district insurance carrier. (A copy of the claim is available for Board review.)
- * 9. Adopt Resolution No. 2004/42, Year-End Budget Transfers/Revisions (Mrs. Lauzon) Each year at this time, the Riverside County Office of Education requests each school board to authorize budget revisions which may be necessary to correct imbalances in any major account at the end of the year. During the year, from October through May, the Board receives regular reports on appropriation transfer requests and resolutions for expenditure of excess funds.

The process of closing the financial records for the 2003/04 fiscal year has begun, and when all revenues and expenditures have been accrued, it may be necessary to process transfers in various funds to balance these accounts. This does not involve additional expenditures; rather, the budget is revised by transferring to an account that has a negative balance from one that has a positive balance, so that the final financial records of the District meet all legal requirements. Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution 2004/42, Resolution For Year-End Budget Transfer/Revisions.

* B. Approve Golden Bell Award Application: Riverside County Office of Education/Jurupa Unified School District Partnership Literacy: A Template for Success Project (Dr. Kinnear) The Jurupa Unified School District and the Riverside County Office of Education have been in a literacy professional development partnership for the past three years. The Golden Bell Award is a program sponsored by the California School Boards Association to recognize excellence. Riverside County Office of Education and Jurupa Unified School District are applying for this prestigious award to recognize the successful Riverside County Office of Education/Jurupa Unified School District partnership. Applications must be postmarked by June 18, 2004. The winners will be selected in October and honored in San Francisco at the California School Boards Association's annual Education Conference. A copy of the application is included for Board members.

Administration recommends approval of the Golden Bell Award application for the Riverside County Office of Education/Jurupa Unified School District Partnership Literacy: A Template for Success Project.

C. Recognize Enhancing Education Through Technology Competitive Grant Award

(Mr. Mercurius)

The Jurupa Unified School District has been notified it will receive \$1.031 million from the Title II, Part D, Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) Competitive grant over two years. The competitive EETT grant was established as part of the Federal program, *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001*.

The grant's focus is to improve the information literacy skills for middle school students at the District's three middle schools: Jurupa Middle, Mira Loma Middle and Mission Middle. The grant program, *POWER InLit*, will positively impact student academic achievement through the acquisition, training, and expansion of comprehensive high-quality information literacy and technology resources that support State standards and district adopted language arts curriculum. A minimum of 25 percent of funds must be used to provide ongoing, sustained, high-quality professional development for middle school language arts teachers and library technicians in the area of information literacy. The balance of the funding will support the acquisition and technical support of the information literacy resources and technologies.

Administration recommends that the Board approve acceptance of the Title II, Part D, Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) Competitive grant.

D. Approve Gifted And Talented Education (GATE) Program Application (Ms. Sheppy)

The gifted and talented education (GATE) program provides challenging curriculum and instruction to students capable of achieving significantly beyond the level of their peers. Often even a good quality educational program is not sufficiently challenging for a student with special gifts or talents. The GATE funds are used to design and deliver a supplemental differentiated program for individuals or groups of gifted and talented students with special needs.

At the elementary and secondary levels, GATE funding supports implementation of differentiated curriculum based on the core curriculum provided during the regular school day through special day classes and part-time and cluster grouping. GATE funding may also support other differentiated learning activities, such as pullout classes, extended day classes, intercession opportunities, Saturday seminars, independent study, acceleration, and postsecondary education. At the elementary, middle, and high school levels, high school districts use GATE funding to support Advanced Placement (AP), honors, or International Baccalaureate (IB) programs.

LEA's must submit an application for funding to the California Department of Education and may be approved for a one to five year approval. Upon approval and the availability of funds, the State provides funding based on the District's enrollment figures. The application requires Board approval before submission and must be received by June 15, 2004. The application is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends approval of the 2004-2005 GATE application.

E. <u>Approve Purchase of OCE VP2060 Copier for Granite Hill Elementary</u> (Mr. Duchon) Granite Hill Elementary School wishes to purchase the Oce VP2060 copier to replace a Konica 7065 and a Canon NP6050. The current cost per copy with the Konica is \$.00998 and for the Cannon is .0173. The new cost per copy, with the purchase of the Oce, will be \$.0045. (Average monthly copies of 64,000 will generate a \$4,752.00 annual savings.) **The copier will be purchased using II/USP Funds.** Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval. The following are the quoted prices for equivalent copiers received:

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of the OCE VP2060, in the amount of \$20,561.93 (tax included) for Granite Hill Elementary School.

F. <u>Approve Purchase of Television/Monitor Equipment for Troth Street</u> (Mr. Duchon) Troth Street Elementary wishes to purchase 41 each of the following items: 27" TV/Monitors, VCR/DVD combos, and Wall Mounts to supplement technology equipment and replace aged and damaged equipment. The 27" TV/Monitors, VCR/DVD combos, and wall mounts will be purchased using Title I funds. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval. Quotes received for the equipment were:

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of Television/Monitor Equipment from Troxell Communication, in the amount of \$22,530.52 (tax included) for Troth Street.

G. Approve Submittal of State Deferred Maintenance Five-Year Plan (Mr. Duchon) The State Deferred Maintenance Program provides State-matching funds to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, floor systems, etc. The District has participated in the State Deferred Maintenance Program for many years. Legislation (Education Code Section I7584.1) requires that the Governing Board review and discuss proposals and plans for expenditure of funds for the deferred maintenance of school district facilities at a regularly scheduled public hearing. The Deferred Maintenance Five Year Plan is now due to the state and is included in the supporting documents. This plan provides a listing of eligible items of major repair or replacement to be considered by the District over a five-year period. The State approves the plan as being eligible for the District to expend funds from its "District Deferred Maintenance Fund." Projects listed on the five-year plan are limited to those school facility components that have approached or exceeded their normal life expectancy. This plan may remain in effect for the full five years, or the district may amend its plan once per fiscal year. Actual work

* H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Duchon)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the *Student Assistance Program* and *(SCORE)* the *School and Community OutREach Team* for follow-up:

EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-179 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-185 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-186 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-187 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and 48915 (b) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 5. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-193 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (c), (h), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 6. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-196 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (k) and 48915 (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education, for the period of this expulsion. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.

** H. Act on Student Discipline Cases (Continued)

SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE:

1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-206 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester 2004 and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Nueva Vista High School and this case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 7, 2004.

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-168 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-200 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and 48915 (b), for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

1. Approve Personnel Report #20

(Mrs. Nash)

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #20 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

2. Consider Approval of Superintendent's Contract and Salary

(Mrs. Nash)

This item is for the Board to consider and possibly approve a contract with Mr. Elliott Duchon as Superintendent of the Jurupa Unified School District commencing on July 1, 2004. The contract will set forth the Superintendent's salary and other terms of employment.

3. Ratify Tentative Agreement with NEA-J

A tentative agreement has been reached with NEA-J on items subject to reopener negotiations for the 2003-2004 school year. Specifically, it has been agreed to increase the District's annual maximum contribution for Health and Welfare benefits by \$500 for the 2003-2004 school year only. Additionally, modifications have been agreed to for the 2004-2005 school year subject to conditions outlined in the tentative agreement. A copy of the tentative agreement is included in the supporting documents. NEA-J ratified the agreement on April 28, 2004. Public disclosure requirements have been satisfied.

Administration recommends that the Board ratify the tentative agreement with NEA-J.

4. Review Increase of Health & Welfare Benefit Allowance for Classified Employees

(Mrs. Nash)

Contingent on the Board ratification of the NEA-J Tentative Agreement; CSEA currently has a memorandum of understanding which provides that if another employee group receives a negotiated increase in unit member allowance that they shall receive equivalent increases. The Classified Health & Welfare Benefit allowance should be increased by \$500 for the 2003/04 school year. Information only.

5. <u>Approve Increase Health & Welfare Benefit Allowance for Certificated Management, Classified Management, and Management/Confidential Employees</u> (Mrs. Nash)

Management positions that are held by certificated and classified employees are not represented by a union and/or are covered by individual contracts. Included among these positions are all the district principals and site-based administrators, several coordinators with district-site responsibilities, classified supervisors, directors of major district support programs, and confidential secretarial and personnel specialists, as well as employees on contracts entitled to the same benefits as other management employees. We have generally recommended increases for these employees in amounts comparable to those employees who engage in formal collective bargaining. That is the case, again, this year.

Administration recommends that the Health & Welfare Benefit Allowance for Certificated Management, Classified Management, and Management/Confidential Employees be increased by \$500 for the 2003/04 school year.

3. Review Report on R-30 Annual Language Census

Each spring, districts throughout California are required to conduct an annual language census and report this information to the State Department of Education. This census must include an accounting of all students with a home language other than English, and a count of all pupils redesignated since the last census. Students are reported as either limited English proficient (LEP) or fluent English proficient (FEP). For initial classification, students are identified by their parents as having a home language other than English and must be given a test of their oral proficiency in English. Information from this report determines supplemental funding for programs and services at school sites that assist students in gaining proficiency in the English Language Development Standards and in accessing the core content areas.

The 2004 Language Census indicates there are 5,967 limited English proficient students, 28.7% of our student population. This is an increase of 47 students from the year before. At the time of the census, 315 students had been redesignated from the previous year, indicating a rate of 5.3%. Spanish continues to be the dominant language of LEP students, although 18 different languages are represented on the report. Most language categories; however, are represented by students from individual families. Ten elementary schools have LEP students representing over a third of their student population. Tables in the supporting documents include more specific information. District staff, principals, teachers, and classified staff at all sites are working together to provide an appropriate curriculum and support services that help students acquire the English language become successful learners in all content areas, as our recent Comite graduation supports. The Deputy Superintendent responsed that the use of standardized legal language is used in contracts regarding omissions; however, he would use due diligence to review the construction management contract to ensure proper responsibility on their part for this project. Mr. Rodriguez asked how the District found this architectural firm and inquired regarding the age of the firm. The Deputy Superintendent stated that his staff is aware of different firms that specialize in particular projects; this prototype school would most likely not win any design awards; however, it would be fu

Partnership Literacy: A Template for Success

This is about a partnership to improve reading and writing through professional development. One partner—The Riverside County Office Education's Riverside County Achievement Team (RCAT)—is an on-site review and assistance program for schools and districts. RCAT s been recognized statewide and nationally for improving student learning through professional development, improvement plans, and site unitoring. The other partner—Jurupa USD, a district of 20,924 students—had developed a district-wide teacher buy-in process for the opted state standards and quarterly criterion referenced benchmark tests to measure student progress in literacy before the summative state its. Curriculum and assessment were aligned; aligning instruction was next.

This is where Partnership Literacy began in 2001. "We needed to get organized," says the Director of Elementary Education. "We inted to improve the consistency from one school to another. We saw the need for a common vocabulary to build a common culture of eracy among administrators and teachers in order to deliver aligned instruction. Partnership Literacy did that." Partnership Literacy not ly has brought the written, tested, and taught curriculum into alignment with state and district tests and standards, but has produced a ofessional development template that has been replicated both in and outside the district.

A Program That Is Innovative and Exemplary: In 2001, RCAT was asked to present a dynamic professional development proposal to rupa USD. From the beginning, the process was innovative. The proposal was first presented to Jurupa's Educational Services Division d approved by cabinet, but, before the program could take wing, K-12 principals critiqued the plan and validated the proposed program's ility to affect student achievement. A committee of Jurupa principals interviewed K-12 principals from other districts about the efficacy of RCOE base program. The result was a customized program to meet the needs of the Jurupa USD.

The plan outlined four years of integrated professional development for school teams in all 23 elementary, middle, and high schools in the strict. The key players attending all 17 days of training over the first three years were district and site administrators, teachers on special signment, and classroom teachers, the last two groups to be trainers of trainers. The district administrators, from assistant superintendent to ordinator level, represented curriculum and instruction, assessment, and technology. Their participation signaled the desired change in lture and provided them with the information to monitor success. The principals led the shift at the site, supported by the teachers on signment who peer coached, taught demonstration lessons, and presented workshops on the content of the professional development ssions. The teachers formed a site implementation team, taking on a co-leadership role with the principal at the school.

A feedback loop was built into the trainings. Participant evaluations and suggestions from a cadre of principals, teachers on assignment, strict and county staff whittled and refashioned the next training. The focus was always on meeting participant needs.

A Program That Is Sustainable: The Aligned Lesson Design was the vehicle for Year One (5 days), the "Jurupa Alignment and ontent Literacy Project for Grades K-12." The lesson plan called for the alignment of the written (standards), the tested (assessments), and ught (instructional strategies) curriculum. Within that context, scientifically research-based content literacy strategies, such as anticipation rides, graphic organizers, and interaction journals, became core elements in the lesson. At the end of Year One, site teams created an applementation Plan for their school. The Implementation Plan was designed to meet the particular needs of each staff in using the tool of e Aligned Lesson Design and the research-based literacy strategies.

The Aligned Lesson Design was again central in Year Two (4 days), "Differentiated Instruction for Grades K-12"—how to make the core rriculum universally accessible to all students: regular education, special education, gifted, at risk, and English language learner students. 12 enhanced lesson plan targeted alignment and the added components for universal access unique to each student. At the end of Year Two, the teams designed another Implementation Plan to add differentiation to instruction.

Year Three (8 days), "Effective Reading Strategies and Step Up to Writing for Grades K-6," led participants through scientifically search-based reading strategies used in the district's newly adopted reading textbook and a structured approach to teaching writing that can integrated into the new reading text. Again, teams developed Implementation Plans to align instruction using the state adopted texts and a nuctured writing program. Once more, the Aligned Lesson Design was central in implementing the structure of the newly adopted oughton Mifflin Reading Series emphasizing universal access and aligned standards, assessments, and instructional strategies.

Year Four (8 days) will repeat Year Three, but for secondary schools, grades 7-12, and their particular texts. Teachers on assignment ill attend a workshop on the newly published RCOE document, *Aligning Step Up to Writing with Houghton Mifflin Reading*. They will en present the information at individual school sites on the explicit organizational strategies for aligning Step Up strategies to each theme in e elementary reading texts.

Partnership Literacy professional development set up a template for action: teams, district support, quality training, individual site uplementation plans, and monitoring of student achievement. This has become part of the district's continuous improvement and program valuation process.

A Program That Is Connected to the District, County, and State Plan: On the state level: Partnership Literacy runs directly parallel the state standards-based accountability system. At its core are standards, assessment, research-based instructional literacy strategies, and ate-adopted instructional materials. A consistent thread throughout the program is the structure provided by the California eading/Language Arts Framework and the principle of universal access for all students. On the county level: RCOE's RCAT is the "engine at drives the train" according to Riverside County Superintendent Dr. David Long. This is the regional office's premiere method for aproving student achievement in the 23 school districts served by the county office, and is, therefore, central to its basic mission. Intereship Literacy has been a four-year commitment by RCAT. On the district level: This program is based on the Jurupa USD board-lopted mission, goals, and action plan that calls for improving student achievement in literacy in every school within the district. Each year, e Director of Elementary Education, given a set of prescribed criteria, reviews and approves the Implementation Plans from the training. ans are also approved by the district superintendent. Student achievement outcomes are monitored by the district's Assessment Division. The director also approves site professional development day proposals and agendas. If someone were to walk by a given school on a ofessional development day during the last three years, he would have seen proof that implementation is truly happening, for what is being elivered at the site—by classroom teachers and teachers on assignment—is a replication of what happened in the district training sessions.

A Program That Serves All Students: Of the 20,924 students in Jurupa, 61.5% qualify for free and reduced priced lunch; 25% are nglish learners; and 67% are Hispanic, 26% White, 4% Black, and 2% Asian and Filipino. To serve these students, the program fully adorsed the principles of the state framework: (1) "Assume that all learners will work toward the same standards yet recognize that not all

rners will acquire skills and knowledge at the same rate..." (2) "Address the full range of learners in classrooms, with specific attention ng given to language arts instruction and the learning needs of English learners, special education students, students with learning ficulties, and advanced learners;" ... and (3) "Assume that virtually all students can learn to read."

The Aligned Lesson Design was the vehicle for integrating all four years of training. The first year focused on the basics of alignment, second on differentiating instruction for literacy learning. To the Aligned Lesson Design were added specific sections adapting the core triculum and instruction for each student subgroup. The third year provided elementary staff with tools to match strategies to state-adopted tructional materials to teach these students in reading and writing. The fourth year will do the same for secondary levels, then fully egrate the two programs: *Step Up to Writing* and Houghton Mifflin.

A Program That Is Communicated to the Community: Reports to the Jurupa USD Board were built into the master plan for rtnership Literacy. The reports detailed the outcomes of the professional development, with presentations by principal/teacher teams and OE. At the end of the year, board members, RCOE, and Jurupa staff celebrated each school's success at implementing the training. Since the professional development master plan was customized for Jurupa USD, RCOE has shared the potential with other county and t-of-county districts. To date, six other schools in the county have selected modules from the yearly programs to use in training their staffs. Itside the county, another two schools and a large district have also adopted and adapted the content of the trainings. As the plan developed d success was evident, RCOE and Jurupa presented the program at annual conferences: the National School Boards Association, the New exico School Boards Association, and the California School Boards Association

A Program That Is Replicable: The comprehensive Partnership Literacy program, or individual content modules, is ready for plication, as are all accompanying Power Point presentations. Supplemental materials include these three publications: Three Key Pieces an Effective Lesson: Teacher-Developed Model Lessons, Differentiated Instruction: Responding to the Needs of All Learners in the assroom, and Aligning Step Up to Writing with Houghton Mifflin Reading. Resources to assist districts and sites in implementing the ining include: the Aligned Lesson Design, Lesson Design Rubrics, Principal Lesson Design Observation Checklist, Implementation Plan iteria, and Sample Implementation Plans.

Both the content of the training and the tools for using the training are available to those who would like to emulate the project.

Program of Student Success: As a result, the percent of students in every grade 2-11 scoring at the proficient and advanced levels in eracy on the California Standards Test (those meeting or exceeding standards) has continuously increased over the past three years.

 - A four-year partnership between Jurupa USD and the Riverside County Office of Education has brought literacy instruction to life. Teachers say, "Students have never been so engaged!" The reasons: integrated professional development targeting aligned instruction, on-site implementation, and performance accountability.
- 3. Please address the following points: a) the program goals and objectives; b) the need the program was developed to meet; and c) how the program is innovative or exemplary.
 - (a) Goals and objectives: To align literacy instruction with standards and assessments; to build a culture of literacy from the district office to the classroom; to increase student achievement in reading and writing K-12.
 - (b) The need: The district had in place an advanced system of standards and assessment, but not connected to aligned instruction to meet the unique needs of all students
 - (c) Innovative and exemplary: Partnership Literacy—a four-year, cohesive professional development program—was supported at three levels: the county, the district, and the 23 school sites. Before and after each training, the program was revised as needed by a committee of principals, district, and county office staff. District curriculum staff, principals, teachers on assignment, and classroom teachers formed teams to write and implement plans monitored by the county and district. The program has created a template for the district's professional development. As a trailblazer, Jurupa has gone far beyond state requirements for text-based literacy training, adding components that have been used in other districts, both in Riverside County and outside. The bottom line is that student achievement has significantly improved over the past three years.

1. Program Design

Jurupa Unified School District provides a comprehensive continuum of services and program options that are responsive to the needs, interests, and abilities of gifted students and based on philosophical, theoretical, and empirical support. The plan was constructed with input from school site GATE coordinators, teachers, administrators, and the District GATE Advisory Committee, which meets a minimum of four times annually. The plan was approved by the Jurupa Unified Board of Education on May 17, 2004. Copies are disseminated to school sites, advisory committee members, and is available for inspection in the Education Services Offices. Key components of the plan upon approval by the State will be placed on the district's website, in the GATE Program Brochure, and in individual sites' Parent Handbooks. A district GATE coordinator oversees the implementation of the plan and its compliance with State guidelines.

All schools have aligned the goals of their program with the district's GATE plan and the goals of their individual site's Single Plan for Student Achievement. Site plans are reviewed by their parent advisory committee, either their School Site Council at the secondary level, or their GATE Advisory Committee, for elementary schools serving a larger number of students. Sites align their available resources for all programs based upon this plan, which wasinformed by student achievement data, student, staff, and GATE parent advisory committee input, and direction from their School Site Council.

Philosophy:

The mission of Jurupa Unified School District is to create for our students a dynamic learning environment that is safe, healthy, and based on mutual respect, cooperation, and support among students, staff, parents, and the broader community. Staff and parents serve as educators and positive role models for all students by helping them develop a sense of responsibility, character, creativity, and the skills to become successful, productive citizens of our democracy.

The goals of our GATE program support our mission and include the following:

- 1. All students participating in the Gifted and Talented Education Program will meet or exceed State academic content standards.
- 2. Gifted and talented students should have opportunities to interact with peers with common abilities, talents, and interests as well as with peers of varying skill levels, talents, and interests.
- 3. Teachers of GATE students should provide opportunities for students to demonstrate what they know and are able to do, particularly in their area(s) of giftedness.
- 4. The district plan will be reviewed annually by site and district staff and parent advisory committees and revised as needed. The plan will comply with State requirements and District assurances and include opportunities for sites to individualize components based on their students' strengths and needs.



5. The GATE program is open to any student meeting the identification criteria. Student participation is not limited by achievement barriers such as language, learning disabilities, environmental factors, or is it limited by logistics.

Grades K-2

Students in grades K-2 are not formally assessed for participation into the GATE program. However, through observation of behavior, participation, work samples, and from parent input, teachers identify students who exhibit characteristics of gifted students. Schools cluster students as much as possible and given the student-teacher ratio of 20:1, teachers are able to meet the needs of exceptional students. For 04/05, teachers are developing a K-2 profile of attributes for teachers to help identify students who are gifted along with strategies to help address their special needs.

Grades 3-6

Students in grades 3-6 are assessed through multiple measures noted in Section 2, and upon identification, they are served through clustering with teachers identified as capable of serving gifted learners. Where clustering due to numbers is impractical, students are served with a part-time grouping structure and with differentiated instruction by their regular classroom teacher. Teachers differentiate instruction in core content areas of math, language arts, science, and social studies, where appropriate, based on the individual learners' areas of strengths and needs. In addition, sites provide supplemental services in several ways: part-time classes where students are grouped for enrichment activities based on their program and needs; before and after school classes for tutoring, if needed, extended learning opportunities that provide additional complexity and novelty of state standards, or activities that develop creativity in the visual and performing arts; and pull-out programs

Grades 7-8

In the middle schools, GATE students have honors classes available in ELA and social studies and are clustered in other classes. One middle school offers additional honors classes in Science and mathematics; another offers an after-school program that provides extended activities in other disciplines, and the third middle school supplements its honors offerings by weekly elective classes that use thematic units to enrich learning for GATE students. Middle school students and parents meet with the high school guidance coordinators in the spring to learn about classes at the high school and college requirements, and GATE students are recruited into honors and advanced classes at this time.

Grades 9-12

In high school, GATE students are placed in Algebra or Geometry, honors English-language arts, and/or Honors Biology. The offering of advanced classes continues through each grade level to the senior year with offerings such as Honors or AP English Literatures, AP World History, Honors Chemistry, Honors or AP Physics, AP U.S. History, AP Foreign Language, and other honors and AP classes based upon enrollment. The guidance coordinators and teachers are given a list of identified students in order to appropriately serve these students. Other students identified as having high achievement, specific academic ability, or intellectual ability in order to be successful in these content areas may also be placed in these classes. The principal has discretion in determining the final class enrollment for fiscal accountability.



Optional Program Services

All sites provide activities that involve parents and community members in their students' learning. All GATE students are encouraged to participate in the district Science Fair and district Art Fair.

Jurupa Unified School District uses a process to identify students for the Gifted and Talented Education Program based upon multiple criteria. All students are eligible for nomination into this process regardless of socioeconomic, linguistic, cultural background, and/or disabilities. In the fall, each site's GATE Coordinator trains staff on the identification process and nomination forms. Principals receive training during principals' meetings. Students may be recognized for nomination by their teacher or parent because of superior achievement on district or state criterion reference tests or the national norm referenced test. In addition, referrals may come from counselors, guidance coordinators, administrators, or community members who note exceptional achievement.

*Furthermore, teachers may nominate a student based upon classroom observation and student work that demonstrate a student's exceptional ability in leadership, creativity, or excellence in the visual or performing arts. These last three categories are weighted on the identification forms and contribute to a student's identification in the category of High Achievement.

Besides achievement data, the identification forms include a parent survey and teacher survey asking a multitude of questions that provide a complete picture of the student's abilities, strengths, interests and needs. This multifaceted identification criteria also includes recognition of performance inhibitors caused by environment, culture, language, economic or health disadvantages, and learning disabilities and helps to ensure students are not overlooked because of these barriers.

Students are initially screened by the site's GATE committee to ensure parent permission, and that information is complete and accurate. They may then recommend the student for intellectual assessment using the Raven Standard Progressive Matrices, conducted by a licensed psychologist. Student may meet qualification for Intellectual Ability based upon these scores.

The site GATE committee reviews results of this assessment and all other identification forms before making a final recommendation and submit paperwork to the district GATE Coordinator



for a compliance check and final processing. Parents are notified of the results in writing in their primary language, including information regarding the appeal process including alternate assessments. Final parent approval must be received before placement in the site's program.

Students remain identified while in the Jurupa district, although services may change from year to year, based upon individual needs, parent request, or a change in the site's goals and objectives. The site coordinator meets with parents and students before any change is initiated. Before any student would be considered for complete withdrawal from the program, the site's Student Study Team must review information about the student with the parent and implement recommendations of interventions. A student entering Jurupa from another district's GATE program will be considered for placement upon receipt of the assessment information and review by the site's GATE committee. All students should complete the referral process within 45 days. Students going to another district take with them a check-out sheet that validates their participation in the GATE program and includes the assessment instruments used for identification.

3. Curriculum and Instruction

Teachers provide differentiated curriculum to GATE students by first assessing their level of mastery of the core curriculum of state content standards using both formative and summative measures. At grades 2-8, students take quarterly district criterion referenced tests in English language arts and math. Results are provided for individual students and the class as a whole, and give an item/standard analysis, pinpointing specific skills that are strengths or weaknesses. In addition, classroom diagnostic assessments help determine students' reading and comprehension levels. Using this information, teachers provide appropriately challenging material, literature, and activities that develop learning opportunities that involve acceleration, depth, complexity, and novelty.

As mentioned in Section 1, core instruction to GATE students occurs within the school day. Teachers received training in differentiated instruction during the 02/03 school year and were provided sample lesson plan models in math and English-language arts. Teachers use classroom assessments, learning contracts, and may test out students to assist in accelerating and compacting curriculum. Teachers partner in grade level teams to create thematic units and projects that provide opportunities for GATE students to work individually or in groups, learning novel and complex concepts. Newly adopted ELA series for K-6, Houghton-Mifflin, includes a Challenge Handbook with projects and activities that extend learning for students capable of acceleration. All secondary sites recently purchased new ELA textbooks by Prentice Hall and these include supplemental materials that provide challenge activities for accelerated learners as well.

In partnership with the University of California, Riverside, the district provides elementary teachers professional development opportunities in problem solving, deep conceptual thinking,



and connection of core concepts in mathematics to science and other content areas. In addition funds provide accelerated students in grades 4-9 summer opportunities for learning math through science lab experiences, through physical fitness, or in combination with art and the language arts. Teachers provide GATE students with regular opportunities to use computers for word processing for writing application and for research through a computer lab, wireless laptops, or classroom computers.

GATE students are also provided opportunities to increase social skills on field trips to cultural events such as plays, lectures, and concerts. Last year, all elementary students participated in a field trip to hear the Riverside Philharmonic in a special day time concert for schools throughout Riverside County.

Counselors and Guidance coordinators at the secondary level provide academic counseling on graduation and college requirements, and work with students and parents to assure GATE students maintain appropriate classes to meet their post-secondary goals, kept by the guidance coordinator in the students working file. Orientations at the middle school and high school keep parents informed of college requirements and financial assistance opportunities.

Gate teachers work together to develop and share lesson/unit plans that extend learning. Teachers are encouraged to maintain a GATE portfolio for each student with samples to demonstrate the student's progress. A GATE progress report was piloted at two school sites and will be provided next year to all sites. All teachers will be provided with <u>A GATE Teacher's Handbook</u> that includes instructional models using Bloom's Taxonomy, Dr. Roger Taylor's Wheel, Learning Style Inventories, a Multiple Intelligence Assessment & activities, a copy of *Teaching Gifted Kids in the Regular Clarssroom* by Susan Winebrenner, and other instructional models.

4. Social and Emotional Development

How does your district establish and implement plans to support the social and emotional development of gifted learners to increase responsibility, self-awareness, and other issues of affective development? Jurupa Unified School District recognizes the social and emotional needs of gifted learners and provides opportunities for students to increase responsibility, self-awareness, and other areas of affective development. Last year, teachers from each site were trained on the 40 Developmental Assets, and took the strategies back to share with their site staffs. The Search Institute's research on developing resilient youth focuses on young people's strengths and ways to develop these strengths.

GATE students may be referred to the site's Student Study Team when exhibiting at risk behavior or not meeting expectations of their program placement. Interventions are developed in consultation with the classroom teacher, parent, and student, where appropriate. The district's Student Assistance Program provides a therapist to work with students, upon parent permission, in crisis or recommended by their administrator due to at-risk behaviors. These therapists are also available to work with families, and they provide parenting workshops throughout the district. In addition, each site has an Cutreach Counselor that is available 1-2 days per week to counsel students individually or in groups.



The district prevention curriculum, *Too Good For Drugs* at the elementary level, *Project Alert* and *Second Steps*, at the middle school level, and *Towards No Drug Use* and *Get Real About Violence*, and the high school, teaches all students refusal skills, conflict resolution, relationship skills, and other life skills that assist students in affective development. Several elementary schools use monthly themes where they incorporate activities with a megaskill, such as responsibility. At the secondary level, students have opportunities to join student government, to participate in lunchtime and after school clubs based upon their interests, and to serve on advisory groups. Last year, students at the three middle schools were trained as peer coaches and one of the high schools has an elective class for training students to be peer counselors. Both high schools provide community service opportunities through clubs, their Economics classes, and student government. At both high schools, AP teachers facilitate clubs that provide opportunities for GATE students enrolled in those classes to socialize and support each other.

In the fall, teachers will receive additional training on how to support affective development of GATE students and on recruiting students into GATE youth development acitivities.

5. Professional Development

How does your district provide professional development opportunities related to gifted education to administrators, teachers and staff to support and improve educational opportunities for gifted students? The Jurupa Unified School District provides ongoing training for teachers and administrators in strategies for working with gifted students through a wide range of professional development opportunities. All newly hired teachers are required to attend workshops including curriculum development and differentiation strategies. Teachers new to the profession in our district participate in the Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment (BTSA) program. Through this program, teachers learn to identify gifted students and adjust instruction to meet individual needs. JUSD has also required Literacy and Differentiated Instruction seminars for teachers district-wide, providing all teachers with skills and strategies to differentiate instruction in every classroom. This year we have added training in the Step Up to Writing program, which helps teachers to focus and improve student writing at every ability level.

Teachers are regularly informed about and encouraged to attend a variety of other professional development opportunities throughout the year. This includes on-site staff workshops in identification, strategies and evaluation, the California Association for the Gifted (CAG) conference, local seminars by such presenters as Susan Winebrenner and Roger Taylor, as well as certification courses offered by UCR and other colleges or universities.

Staff members are surveyed annually to determine professional development needs. The results of this survey help determine focus areas, existing staff expertise and resources for future staff development. Our goal is to build district capacity in the defined competencies expected of teachers of the gifted, as identified in current research literature and effective practices. In addition, student assessment data is studied at both the site and district levels to identify trends in student achievement and areas of need by grade levels and departments. Site and district



advisory councils, made up of parents, teachers, and administrators, also offer input as to professional development needs.

JUSD encourages teachers to complete professional growth hours for credential applications that focus on gifted education, such as the GATE certification program offered through the University of California at Riverside, and is developing criteria to identify competencies for a district certification, as well. The ultimate goal of Jurupa's professional development plan is to ensure that teachers assigned to teach gifted students are qualified through available training and certification programs that develop gifted education competencies. The annual Teachers' survey is used to identify which option(s) individual teachers wish to use to pursue certification.

Jurupa's GATE professional development survey also serves to identify teachers who are willing to informally share their expertise and successful teaching practices with one another and/or act as peer coaches. School sites will provide 1-3 days of release time each year for GATE staff members to meet, assess their programs, share strategies and resources, and plan for future programs. Outside support personnel, identified through the Riverside County Office of Education GATE Coordinators' group, local universities, the California Department of Education, CAG, and experts in the field from other organizations, will provide further resources and training for GATE staff.

Finally Jurupa's professional development plan includes training for administrators, counselors, and support staff that is designed to relate specifically to their roles and responsibilities in the GATE program. This training focuses on the characteristics of gifted learners, district identification procedures, GATE curriculum and instruction, social/emotional needs, effective programs, and available resources and support systems. Non-teaching staff will be encouraged to participate with teachers in the ongoing professional development program related to gifted learners.

6. Parent and Community Involvement

The Jurupa Unified School District will operate the GATE program as a District program and will continue to have a GATE Advisory Committee which will be responsible for providing input on the GATE plan. GATE meetings will be open to the public.

The district GATE coordinator collaborates with the district GATE Advisory Committee to offer professional development opportunities to staff, parents, and community members related to gifted education including the following:

- information of college classes related to the GATE program
- various workshops on gifted education
- associations for the gifted for example, the California Association for the Gifted (CAG) and Support for the Emotional Needs of the Gifted (SENT). –

Parents will be continuously involved in the planning and evaluation of the GATE Program through feedback at Parent-Teacher Conferences, surveys/inventories, and end-of-year evaluations. Parents will be involved in GATE activities at three levels: classroom (parent-teacher communication), school site (School Site Council meetings, interest inventories, program evaluation), and district (District GATE Advisory Committee). This year based upon parent surveys for both the GATE and Title I programs, a parent involvement conference was held May 15th and included many workshops developed because of feedback on the parent surveys.

A GATE Student, Parent, Teacher Contract will be used by all sites so that parents will be more significant partners in GATE education. The Contract will outline the GATE program and opportunities at each school site as well as list the responsibilities of the student, parent, and teacher.

Elementary schools with more than 20 GATE students will develop a GATE Advisory Committee made up of the principal, teachers and parents. They will meet 3 times a year. The advisory committee will be informed of current research on gifted education through information



from the district office and/or GATE coordinator, training sessions from GATE trained teachers and posted information on the district's web site.

Efforts will be made to ensure GATE parents on the GATE Advisory Committees (district and site-level) are an accurate representation of the student population. Typically underrepresented parents of GATE students (including those with special needs such and English Language Learners or learned disabled) will be encouraged to participate. Each school will take into account cultural dimensions and linguistic differences, and be sensitive to the cultural issues. Provisions such as translators, transportation, *childcare*, and flexibility of meetings and times will be offered to encourage broad parent participation. Parent communication is in both English and Spanish.

The district GATE coordinator and Advisory Committee will solicit community support through options such as career field trips, guest speakers, donations, sponsorships, and judges for the school site and district Science Fairs. JUSD will capitalize on the talents of GATE parents by including a section on the interest inventory that will ask about hobbies, interests, and professions they might share with the students. Other resources may include financial contributions by parents or community members and volunteering time in the classroom. JUSD will attempt to establish partnerships between the GATE program and businesses/organizations. These partnerships may also include the entire school and be in the form of career mentors, teaching job skills, providing donations for school supplies and field trips, and/or similar to the adopt-a-school program.

7. Program Assessment

Formal evaluation methods and instruments used to assess the performance of gifted students include the quarterly district assessments and yearly state criterion reference test (California Standards Test) for grades 2-8, and semester district tests and the annual CST for grades 9-12. District assessments also include writing samples scored on a 4-point rubric. This achievement data is kept in our Individual Data Management System (IDMS) and can be disaggregated by standard for individual students, classes, or by program, in this case, students in the GATE program. In this way, GATE teachers can pull up a list of their students' scores and determine progress towards achieving State standards and beyond. In addition, the GATE Student Progress Report will be used at the elementary level and student grades will be considered at the secondary level when looking at individual student performance.

To evaluate our gifted program, we will annually gather student achievement data of GATE students, enrollment numbers by school site disaggregated by demographic and program information, and informal instruments including the teacher, parent, and student surveys. In addition, each site is required to annually submit a summary of how their site meets compliance using the State rubric's questions. Copies of their plan, achievement results, and surveys are



reviewed by the District's GATE Advisory Committee meeting. The matches and gaps are noted, and recommendations are made and brought back to Principals and site GATE Coordinators for modification, if necessary. Annual results and any modifications to the plan are shared with School Site Councils, School Advisory Committees and the Board of Education.

8. Budgets

Budget requests occur each spring based upon a calculation of anticipated revenue. The budget includes 30% of a program Secretary and 40% of a School Psychologist. Funds are set aside for district coordinated staff development and GATE Coordinator meetings. In addition, money for supplies including creating and distributing the GATE Teacher Handbook and GATE Program Brochure. Remaining funds are allocated to school sites based upon the number of identified students at the school, the school's needs based upon their program and student demongraphics. The GATE program is supplemented with School Improvement funds and other site money. Expenditures are approved by the site's GATE Advisory Committee and/or School Site Council. The School Board has final approval of all plans and expenditures as they review the GATE plan, annual budget, and Single Plan for Student Achievement. In addition, the District GATE Coordinator monitors all expenditures for legal compliance, alignment to the District plan, and ability to meet the needs of gifted students.



Tentative Agreement



- 1. The District's annual maximum contribution of \$4700 for Health and Welfare benefits shall be increased by \$500 for the 2003-2004 school year only. This amount shall be distributed per mutual agreement of the District and NEA-J.
- 2. For the 2004-2005 school year, the District will continue the \$500 increase to Health and Welfare benefits provided all of the following conditions are met:
 - a) The budget as signed by the Governor provides a 1.84 % COLA to revenue limit
 - b) The deficit factor is .9789
 - c) Supplemental grants are funded at \$778,490
 - d) Equalization is funded at \$11.81 per A.D.A.
 - e) Home to school transportation is funded at \$1,135,543
 - f) Special education transportation is funded at \$537,961
 - g) Special education funding is provided at \$2,413,855 of Federal funding and \$5,941,360 of State funding
 - h) Class Size Reduction is funded at \$923 per enrollee
 - or, if the actual total revenue generated from these funding sources is greater than or equal to the projections listed above.

If these criteria are not met and the total funding is below the projected amounts, the \$500 shall be prorated on the basis of actual revenue impact per A.D.A.

The District shall notify the Association as soon as it is known, but no later than August 25, 2004, whether or not these criteria are met.

3. For the 2004-05 school year, an additional \$200 shall be added to Health and Welfare benefits. If the District contribution for routine maintenance is calculated on the basis of 3% of the combined general fund rather than 3% of the unrestricted general fund, then the \$200 may be deducted from the remaining pay warrants for the 2004-2005 school year.



The District shall notify the Association by March 18, 2005 if this deduction shall occur.

- 4. If the District receives more funding from the state than set forth under the criteria in number 2 and/or number 3 above, the parties agree to reopen negotiations for Health and Welfare benefits.
- 5. Unit member Health and Welfare benefit surcharges for the 2004-05 school year shall be determined by the Association prior to September 8, 2004. The total amount collected through surcharges shall be equal to the total Health and Welfare benefit cost minus the total District contribution.
- 6. The additional \$500 set forth in numbers 1 and 2 and/or the additional \$200 set forth in number 3 above shall not be added to any unit member's cash option payment.
- 7. Upon ratification of this tentative agreement by both the District and the Association, the grievance and pending arbitration between NEA-J and the District related to this issue shall be dismissed without prejudice.
- 8. The Association and District agree to begin the process of revising the language of Article XVII as soon as possible with ratification by both sides prior to July 1, 2004.
- 9. Nothing in this tentative agreement shall prohibit the District and/or the Association from exploring alternatives to the current health benefit program or implementing agreed upon alternatives to the current health benefit program for 2004-2005 or thereafter.
- 10. This tentative agreement concludes bargaining re-openers for the 2003-2004 school year.
