- \* 5. Certify Authorized Agents for Business Functions
  The County requires a list of Board members and school district employees authorized to transact various business functions for the school district. Changes were made to the Authorized Agents list that includes changes of agents for all District processes, and the addition of a category for Contracts Consultant Agreements. It is recommended the Authorized Agents list in the supporting documents be approved.
- Lt. Colonel William Frank, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada on Monday, June 21 through Saturday, June 26, 2004 with approximately twenty-five (25) students. The purpose of the trip is to provide an opportunity for students to participate in a Summer Leadership School to experience military aviation opportunities. Transportation will be by district vehicle, staff members and volunteers will provide supervision, and costs will be paid through Air Force contributions, donations, and AFJROTC funds. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Lt. Colonel William Frank to travel to Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada on Monday, June 21 through Saturday, June 26, 2004 with approximately twenty-five (25) students.

  Mr. Sam Gee, track coach at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Mammoth Lakes on Sunday, August 1 through Sunday, August 8, 2004 with thirty (30) students. The purpose of the trip is to provide altitude training for cross-country athletics. The cost of the trip is being paid through student fundraising activities, transportation is by private and district vehicles, and staff members and volunteers are providing supervision. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Sam Gee to travel to Mammoth Lakes on Sunday, August 1 through Sunday, August 8, 2004.

  Mr. Sam Gee, track coach at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Basic High School in Las Vegas, Nevada on Friday, September 10 through Sunday, September 12, 2004 with forty (40) students. The purpose of the trip is to provide students an opportunity to participate in the Las Vegas Cross Country Invitational. The cost of the trip is being paid through student fundraising activities and donations, transportation is by district vehicles, and staff members and volunteers are providing supervision. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Sam Gee to travel to Las Vegas, Nevada on Friday, September 10 through Sunday, September 12, 2004 with forty (40) students to participate in the Las Vegas Cross Country Invitational.

### B. <u>Take Necessary and Appropriate Action Related to Governing Board Election of November 2, 2004</u> (Mr. Duchon)

In accordance with Education Code Sections 5323 and 5340, "school district governing board member elections for two or more school districts of any type to be held in the same district or area on the same day shall be consolidated..." The purpose is to allow persons entitled to vote in two or more such elections to do so at the same time and place and with one ballot. Also, the cost of the election to each district is kept lower by consolidation.

\* 1. Adopt Resolution #2004/44, Ordering Consolidated Governing Board Member Biennial Election, Specifications of the Election Order, and Request for Consolidation

The seats of Trustee Area 2 (now held by John Chavez) and Trustee Area 4 (now held by Carolyn Adams) will expire December 2, 2004. The new term will begin the first Friday in December, which is December 3, 2004, for both seats. The terms of Trustee Areas 1, 3, and 5 will expire November 30, 2006.

To meet requirements of Education Code Sections 5304, 5322, and 5340, <u>Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2004/44, Ordering of an Election November 2, 2004, which includes the Specifications of the Election Order and Request for Consolidation.</u>

2. Review District Policy Regarding Payment of Cost of Candidate Statements

Board Policy 1101 directs that candidates who elect to publish qualification statements must pay for them. The Registrar of Voters office has indicated that the estimated deposit for a candidate's statement is \$450.00. Information only.

\*\* C. Approve Issuance of 2002-2003 School Accountability Report Cards (Mr. Mercurius)

State law requires that local boards of education issue annual School Accountability Report Cards (SARC's) for every school in the district. The SARC reports contain information about the 2002-2003 school year conditions; for example, student achievement, enrollment, expenditures, class size, textbooks and instructional materials, etc.

The SARC reports are made available upon request to parents or citizens desiring information on a particular school. Upon approval by the Board, the reports will be posted to the District website.

Administration recommends that the Board authorize the issuance of the 2002-2003 School Accountability Report Card as presented in the supporting documents for Board members.

### D. Approve Golden Bell Award Application: Student Assistance Program/Teen Center

(Ms. Sheppy)

Jurupa Unified School District Student Assistance Program, in partnership with local universities, is in its fourth year of operation. Serving K-12 students and families in the District. the program accepts referrals from administrators, parents and students who are at risk of dropping out of school. Student Assistance Counselors, who are practicing therapists, help develop a plan for the student, connect the student and family to resources within the district and community, and provide counseling services, if needed. The program also provides crisis intervention when situations arise that inhibit learning. The Golden Bell Award is a program sponsored by the California School Boards Association to recognize excellence. The District is applying for this prestigious award in the category of "Student Support" to recognize the successful endeavors of the YOC staff, parents, and students in helping to keep students in school, help out-of-school youth return to school and graduate, and help older youth find continuing education and employment. Applications must be postmarked by June 18, 2004. The winners will be selected in October and honored in San Francisco at the California School Boards Association annual Education Conference. A copy of the draft application is included in the supporting documents. Administration recommends approval of the Golden Bell Award application for the Student Assistance Program/Teen Center.

### E. <u>Approve Purchase of Three, Two-Story Relocatable Classroom Buildings (72X40) for Peralta Elementary School</u> (Mr. Duchon)

Peralta Elementary School has a current enrollment of 578 students. The site is at capacity, with no room for growth. Enrollment for school year 2004/05 is projected to be at 672 students, an increase of 111 students over the current year enrollment. Administration proposes to install three, two-story relocatable classrooms, size 72' X 40', for a total of six classrooms, to accommodate the projected growth at Peralta Elementary School. relocatable classrooms will be purchased utilizing the Val Verde Unified School District piggyback Bid #99-01-A, awarded to Modtech Manufacturing and Construction. The total cost for the relocatables will be \$913,548.48. Developer Fees and CFD #1, Improvement Area #2, funds will be used to purchase the relocatable classroom buildings. A copy of the site plan showing the proposed location of the relocatables on the site is included in the supporting documents. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval. Administration recommends the Board authorize Administration to purchase three, two-story relocatable buildings in the amount of \$913,548.48 utilizing the Val Verde Unified School District piggyback Bid #99-01-A, awarded to Modtech Manufacturing and Construction.

F. Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Bids for Site Work for the Installation of Three, Two-Story Relocatable Classrooms for Peralta Elementary School (Mr. Duchon) Administration intends to advertise and solicit bids for the site work associated with the installation of three, two-story relocatable classrooms, size 72 X 40, for a total of six classrooms, to be placed at Peralta Elementary School. Administration intends to solicit bids during July 2004 and bring the award of the bid to the Board on or about September 7, 2004. Developer Fees and CFD #1, Improvement Area #2, funds will be used for the site work and installation of the relocatable classrooms. Administration recommends the Board approve the advertisement and solicitation of bids for site work for the installation of three, two-story relocatables, size 72X40, to be installed at Peralta Elementary School.

### \*G. Approve Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement for Hudson Street Sidewalk Project (Mr. Duchon)

The County of Riverside is constructing sidewalks with curb and gutter along the west side of Hudson Street, between Limonite Avenue and 58<sup>th</sup> Street. The project has been developed to improve safety for children under the Safe Routes to School Program. The project will also address existing drainage issues within the project limits. In exchange for the Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Easement, the Transportation Department will pay for all of the following expenses: (1) All surveying, engineering, utility coordination, preparation of specifications, bidding, contract administration, construction staking and inspection; (2) Necessary relocations of signs, mail boxes; (3) Matching all driveways in-kind with concrete/asphalt driveways; (4) Clearing and grubbing, including the removal of all physical obstacles such as bushes, trees and other features within the road right of way. The term of the Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement shall be for 12 months or upon completion of said project. The project is scheduled to bid on June 30, 2004, with the work beginning July 2004; there will be no cost to the District for this project. Administration recommends the Board approve the Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement for the Hudson Street Sidewalk Project.

\*H. Adopt Urgency Ordinances #2004/04, #2004/05, #2004/06 Levying Special Taxes (Mr. Duchon) The District is the lead agency for three (3) Community Facilities Districts (CFDs). Each CFD has issued special tax bonds, which are repaid through the annual levy of property taxes within the boundaries of the CFD. Bonds in the principal amount of \$6.9 million were issued by CFD #1 in December 1990. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities, water facilities, sewer facilities and fire protection and suppression facilities to service development within the CFD boundaries. These bonds were subsequently refunded in July 2002 by bonds in the principal amount of \$6.19 million. This refunding resulted in additional funding for school facilities and a reduction in the special taxes of the CFD. Bonds in the principal amount of \$1.22 million were issued by CFD #2 in March 1993. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities, water facilities and sewer facilities to service the development within the CFD boundaries. Bonds in the principal amount of \$1.73 million were issued by CFD #3 in July 2002. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities to service the development within the CFD boundaries.

In order to pay the principal and interest on the outstanding bonds of each CFD, the Board, acting as the Governing Board of such CFD, must adopt an ordinance levving the special taxes on the parcels within the CFD boundaries (included in supporting documents). An exhibit showing the parcels within the CFD and the corresponding special taxes to be levied in fiscal year 2004/2005 is attached to each ordinance. Each ordinance must be approved and submitted to the County Tax Assessor along with the special tax levy prior to August 10, 2004. David Taussig & Associates, Inc., Special Tax Consultant, has prepared a report for each CFD that includes general information regarding the CFD and outlines the calculation and apportionment of the special taxes among the parcels within the CFD (CFD Administration Report), which has been provided as supporting documentation for Board members. Additional copies of the CFD Administration Reports are available for review in the District's Business Office. Administration recommends that the Board adopt Ordinances #2004/04, #2004/05, and #2004/06 levying the special taxes in fiscal year 2004/2005 within each CFD for the payment of principal and interest on the outstanding bonds and the administrative expenses of the applicable CFD.

### \*\* I. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Duchon)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the *Student Assistance Program* and *(SCORE)* the *School and Community OutREach Team* for follow-up:

### **REVOKE - SUSPENDED EXPULSION:**

1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the April 5, 2004 Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #04-045 and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. The pupil will be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.

### **EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES:**

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-207 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b) and 48915 (b) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-208 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c) and 48915 (b), for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 3. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-209 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c) and 48915 (b) for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center and this case will be reviewed in August, for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2004 and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 18, 2005.
- 4. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #04-211 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (b), (e), for the Spring Semester 2004 and Fall Semester 2004. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation.   Each year, the Board must adopt a "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" as a prerequisite to the issuance of emergency teaching permits for the District. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits, particularly to fill partial assignments, specialized areas of instruction such as math and science, or areas of statewide shortage such as bilingual education and special education. The information shown in the supporting documents accounts for all of these needs for next school year. It is recommended that the Board adopt the "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" for 2004-2005.

    The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing is allowing districts to temporarily waive the CBEST exam requirement for day-to-day (2004-2005) substitute teachers. The district-wide waiver would be for a maximum of one year. Substitute teachers would have one calendar year to take and pass CBEST, rather than having to pass prior to beginning work. The Commission has developed and it is recommended that the following statement be submitted to the Board for approval. It is recommended that the Board declare that the District has been unable to recruit enough day-to-day substitute teachers who have had an opportunity to take and pass the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST). The District anticipates employing fifty substitutes on variable term CBEST waivers for the 2004-2005 school year.

	Mr. Chavez acknowledged the importance of the comments made during the Public Verbal Comments session by Ms. Sylvia Holguin regarding the need for sidewalks near the new high school, especially on Mission and Pedley Roads. He asked the Superintendent to send a letter to the County Supervisor asking him to address these issues. Mr. Chavez noted that he requested a letter be sent to the Supervisor regarding similar dangerous routes to school near Rubidoux High School, and he has not received a report back on this information. ### STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM & TEEN CENTER

1. Demonstrated evidence of success: Principals and teachers struggle to understand the causes of low achievement scores and poor school ratings figured on mathematical formulas that even experienced statisticians cannot figure out. They have aimed attention and resources at all the known contributors to effective schools: a focused curriculum, the creation of a learning organization, professional development programs, datadriven decision making, and strong leadership, and so forth. In most cases, overall improvement eventually occurs, even in schools with low socio-economic and parent education indicators. However, there are still groups of students and individual students who one year may help bring up the site's averages but the next contribute to a dip in its API. The barriers they face are not language or learning disabilities, although sometimes these may contribute. What keeps them from successful performance are the tumultuous situations going on in their home life, within their neighborhood, or within their own thoughts and emotions. The Teen Center and the Student Assistance Program have demonstrated a considerable difference in the lives of students and their families.

The Student Assistance Program (SAP) in its last evaluation of the two school years of 2001/2002, provided 8,627 hours of direct service to JUSD students and their families. As an extension of the SAP, the Teen Center alone provides on an average of 800 service hours per year. These services include individual, group and family counseling. Groups also run in the evening for parent and family participation. The Teen Center staff consists of a secretary, licensed therapist, and several part time therapist interns.

Teen Center staff has helped students cope with many crises this year. Late in the second semester, four students walking to school were hit by a van driven by a former student. Three of them were siblings, one died. The fourth student is still rehabilitating from his serious injuries. Several students witnessed the accident, and a campus supervisor, the first to arrive on the scene, performed CPR on the dying child. The Teen Center staff kept its doors open early and late that week, working with groups of students and staff to debrief the heart-breaking event, meeting with the parents, working through the process of getting students back into class to focus on learning.

Also this year, fifteen students have sought help at the Center because of serious thoughts about committing suicide. Four students have shared incidents of sexual assaults by older boyfriends. Teen Center staff provided support to these students and others as well as the encouragement to cooperate with law enforcement, with Child Protective Services, with parents, other health providers, and school administration.



A teacher who helps sponsor the Center has provided trained student-peer counselors through an elective class that meets daily in the Center. They work with groups of students experiencing the stress and strain of parents' divorce and other groups working through the complexities of relationships. Some students voluntarily meet with counselors, trying to understand how to escape drug, alcohol, or tobacco addiction, and other students, through the discipline process, work in groups focusing on anger management and avoidance of drug and alcohol abuse.

When evaluating the program, Teen Center staff looks at behavior, attendance, self-report surveys, grade point averages (GPA), and follow-up indicators for students who are receiving on-going services and are case-managed. GPA increased by a mean score of 12.70. Overall change in attendance improved with a mean of 0.29. Reading scores on norm referenced tests improved for approximately 66% of the students who received services and were case managed, although Math SAT's showed no significant change. Qualitative information, however, provides the most significant evidence of success. Students and staff at the host school, Rubidoux High, along with parents who have participated in services all attest to the improved outlook on life, increased motivation to learn, and reduced anxiety and other emotional barriers to learning.

- 2. An innovative and exemplary program: The Student Assistance Program in conjunction with the Teen Center, provides services to the entire district. The district SAP is responsible for crisis intervention, referrals for elementary and secondary counseling from administrators, parents, and students. The program provides Parenting classes, Multi-family groups, Anger Management groups and various other psycho-educational, clinical groups. SAP staff continue to assist in the referral process to numerous private and public agencies, organizations, and programs leaning heavily on our partner relationships for speedy and beneficial services. Many districts who implement the SAP rely on referring outside the district for their counseling services. Our SAP is unique because of the therapist and interns that we staff on site; therefore, our students and their families can receive professional mental health treatment within the district. Counseling is no cost and convenient and support is on-going, consistent, and closely monitored.
- 3. <u>Sustainability</u> When a Healthy Start grant went into operation seven years ago, it helped to develop a community collaborative, the Jurupa Community Partnership, which a year ago formed its own nonprofit company. The grant supported a portable on the parking lot of one of the district's middle schools located at the center of the district, near the construction site of the current district office. By partnering with the County Health Department, Child Protective Services, the local YMCA, the Jurupa Area Parks and Recreation Department, and several



community members including a representative from the County Supervisor's Office, this group was able to offer services and referrals to other agencies to students and families in the district long after grant funds were spent.

During those first three years, district staff formed a connection to three local universities, who provide marriage, family therapist practicum students and interns. The district hired a licensed therapist who supervises these interns on site, allowing for the convenience of individual, group, and family counseling for those without insurance or access to these services. A second Healthy Start grant opened a second site opened at Rubidoux High School. While the main SAP office is located at the district so that staff can be dispatched where needed, the RHS site houses its own staff in order to serve more efficiently the population where a major source of referrals for service originate.

The SAP and Teen Center are sustainable due to various categorical funding sources such as Violence

Prevention (SB1113), Safe and Drug Free Schools, smaller grants, as well as resources and in-kind commitment
from our community partnerships. One of the most recent awards has been from the County Department of Public
Social Services to provide mental health services to the Jurupa area for their Child Abuse Intervention Treatment
Program.

- 4. <u>Connection to District Plan:</u> The Student Assistance Program's Teen Center supports the JUSD Local Education Agency Plan and its goals for both high achievement and safe schools. District staff believes that a student who is supported, not only in the classroom, but also at home and within the community, can be better prepared to learn, grow and achieve academically, socially and behaviorally.
- 5. <u>Commitment to serve all students:</u> The SAP and the Teen Center provides on-going services to any student and family based on need, not ethnicity, race, religion, disability or affectional preference. students, family members, teachers, administrators or any other concerned party can submit a referral. Each referral is evaluated and services are determined and consented to by student and/or parent, as determined by law. The SAP and Teen Center staff share resources, information, and referrals with JUSD's Special Education Department, Administrative Services Division, and the Community and Student Support Services Department.


Communication about the program's implementation: The SAP and the Teen Center services are communicated at sites through newsletters, flyers, and by word of mouth from those receiving services. Information is provides at principals' meetings, staff meetings, registration, back to school night, parent-administrator meetings, parent-teacher meetings, suspensions and expulsion hearings, and any given opportunity. These services also have a presence in a larger community arena, within members of the Jurupa Community Partnership. It is within this organization that




relationships are created and nurtured, programs are acknowledged and encouraged and when need be if possible, financially supported.

Program's ability to be replicated: Although our program is not the only SAP, the Student Assistance Program is being replicated throughout the state, and the Riverside County Office of Education has received a grant that allowed them to implement the SAP in several districts. Programs at the university level require counseling students to complete field work, and the licensing requirements of MFT interns, make a program like the Student Assistance Program able to benefit children, youth, and families within the school setting in any district. JUSD has been able to enjoy a wonderful working relationship with the local universities in order to provide mental health services as well as act as a training site for Master and Ph.D students.

### RIGHT OF ENTRY AND TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT

1. The right is hereby granted County to enter upon and use the land of Grantor in the County of Riverside, State of California, described as:

Assessor's Parcel Number 165-100-026 highlighted on the map attached hereto, and made a part hereof

for all purposes necessary to facilitate and accomplish the construction of Hudson Street Sidewalk Project.

It is mutually understood and accepted that this right of entry is for the purpose of grading driveway(s) to match the existing grade and any other necessary work (i.e., relocation of fence/gate, mailbox, trees, etc...) which may exist within the County Right of Way to provide a smooth transition in accordance with approved plans, on the above described property. Said improvements are to be performed by a qualified contractor employed by County and directed by County's resident engineer.

A thirty (30) day written notice shall be given to Grantor prior to using the rights herein granted. The rights herein granted may be exercised for twelve (12) months after the thirty (30) day written notice, or until completion of said project, whichever shall be sooner.

- It is understood that the County may enter upon Grantor's property where appropriate or designated for the purpose of getting equipment to and from the construction area. County agrees not to damage Grantor's property in the process of performing such activities. In the event Grantor's landscaping and/or landscaping on Grantor's property are damaged, County will replace or repair, in kind, at no cost to Grantor.
- 3. The right to enter upon and use Grantor's land includes the right to remove and dispose of real and personal property located thereon. Grantor reserves the right to remove salvable real and personal property prior to expiration of the thirty (30) days written notice. If said property is not removed in its entirety at Grantor's expense, on or before said date for any reason whatsoever, the right to remove said property shall terminate and said property will become property of County to dispose of at its discretion.




- 4. At the termination of the period of use of Grantor's land by County, but before its relinquishment to Grantor, debris generated by County's use will be removed and the surface will be graded and left in a neat condition.
- 5. Grantor shall be held harmless from all claims of third persons arising from the use by County of Grantor's land.
- 6. Grantor hereby warrants that they are the owners of the property described above and that they have the right to grant County permission to enter upon and use the land.
- 7. This agreement is the result of negotiations between the parties hereto. This agreement is intended by the parties as a final expression of their understanding with respect to the matters herein and is a complete and exclusive statement of the terms and conditions thereof.
- 8. This agreement shall not be changed, modified, or amended except upon the written consent of the parties hereto.
- 9. This agreement supersedes any and all other prior agreements or understandings, oral or written, in connection therewith.



### ORDINANCE NO. 2004/04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 1 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on May 7, 1990, Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("JUSD") established Community Facilities District No. 1 of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") pursuant to Chapter 2.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5, commencing with Section 53311, of the California Government Code (the "Act"), to finance certain school facilities (the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, notice was published as required by the Act relative to the intention of the Board of Education to form the District and to provide for the Facilities;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act relative to the determination to proceed with the formation of the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to finance the costs of the Facilities;

WHEREAS, at said hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District and the levy of said special taxes were heard, substantial evidence was presented and considered by the Board of Education and a full and fair hearing was held;

WHEREAS, subsequent to said hearing, the Board of Education called a special election and submitted to the voters of the District a proposition with respect to the annual levy of special taxes within the District to pay principal of and interest on bonds thereof, and a proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the District which election was held on June 19, 1990; and

WHEREAS, an election was held within the District in which the sole eligible landowner elector approved said propositions by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit "C" to the Resolution of Formation and Exhibit "A" hereto (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2004-2005 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of JUSD issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs of administering the District.



<u>Section 2</u>. The Superintendent of JUSD is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

<u>Section 3</u>. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of JUSD in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected. JUSD's Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

Section 6. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

Section 7. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its passage at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within JUSD boundaries.

### APPENDIX A

### RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT OF SPECIAL TAX FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 1 JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

A Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel in Community Facilities District No. 1 (herein "CFD No. 1") shall be levied and collected according to the tax liability determined by the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") acting in its capacity as the legislative body of CFD No. 1 though the application of the appropriate amount or rate of Special Tax for "Developed Property" or "Undeveloped Property," as described below. All of the property in CFD No. 1, as depicted on the map of the boundaries thereof on file with the Clerk of the Board of Education, unless exempted by law or by the provisions of Section F below, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent and in the manner herein provided. All of the property in CFD No. 1 is included in Improvement Area No. 1 or Improvement Area No. 2 of CFD No. 1, as depicted on the boundary map.

### A. Definitions

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

- "Alternative Special Tax" for Developed Property means an amount equal to \$0.185 per square foot of an Assessor's Parcel for Improvement Area No. 1 and \$0.272 per square foot of an Assessor's Parcel for Improvement Area No. 2.
- "Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel shown on a map of the County Assessor of the County of Riverside with an assigned Assessor's Parcel Number.
- "Assigned Special Tax" means the Special Tax determined in accordance with Section C and Section D below.
- "Developed Property" means all Assessor's Parcels in CFD No. 1 for which a foundation building permit has been issued as of March 1 of the previous Fiscal Year, but not prior to April 2, 1990.
- "Fiscal Year" means the period starting on July 1 and ending the following June 30.
- "Maximum Special Tax" means the Maximum Special Tax, determined in accordance with Sections C and D below, that can be levied by the Board in any Fiscal Year on an Assessor's Parcel in each class of Developed Property and Undeveloped Property.
- "Single Family Attached Residential Unit" means one or more Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property which contain(s) a structure or structures, made up of two or more units that share common walls.



"Single Family Detached Residential Unit" means an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property which contains one dwelling unit.

"Special Tax(es)" means the special taxes to be levied in each Fiscal Year on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or Undeveloped Property to pay the amounts hereinafter specified.

"Taxable Property" means all Assessor's Parcels in CFD No. 1 which are not exempt from the levy of Special Taxes pursuant to law or Section F below.

"Undeveloped Property" means all Taxable Property in CFD No. 1 not classified as Developed Property.

### B. <u>Assignment of Land Use Class</u>

For each Fiscal Year (commencing with the 1991-92 Fiscal Year), all Taxable Property within CFD No. 1 shall be categorized either as a Developed Property or as Undeveloped Property and shall be subject to the levy of Special Taxes in accordance with the rates and method of apportionment set forth in Sections C, D, and E below.

For purposes of determining the applicable Maximum Special Tax pursuant to Sections C and D, Developed Property shall be assigned to one of the classes designated in Table 1 or Table 2 below. Single family Detached Residential Units shall be assigned to Classes 1 through 5 based upon the square footage of the residential unit to be constructed on an Assessor's Parcel as set forth in the most recent building permit issued for the Assessor's Parcel. The square footage of residential units shall be exclusive of garages or other structures which are not used as living spaces, as set forth on the most recent building permit issued therefore. Single Family Attached Residential Units shall be assigned to Class 6. Commercial/Industrial Developed Property shall be assigned to Class 7. The square footage of a Commercial/Industrial building shall be assigned to Class 7. The square footage for the building(s) as reflected in the building permit(s) issued therefore. The acreage of a Commercial/Industrial parcel shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map or to the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

Notwithstanding Section F below, for purposes of computing the Alternative Special Tax for Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property assigned to Class 6, the square footage of the entire underlying Assessor's Parcel or lot, as indicated on the current Assessor's Parcel map or corresponding subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, shall be used. The Alternative Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel in Class 6 shall be apportioned to the number of units located on the Assessor's Parcel.

### C. <u>Maximum Special Tax: Improvement Area No. 1:</u>

### 1. Developed Property.



The Maximum Special Tax in any Fiscal Year for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in Classes 1 through 5 shall be the greater of (i) the amount derived by multiplying the square footage applicable to the Assessor's Parcel by the Alternative Special Tax, or (ii) the Assigned Special Tax Rate determined by reference to Table 1. For purposes of this Section C, the acreage or square footage of an Assessor's Parcel shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map, the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

The Maximum Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property may exceed the Assigned Special Tax Rate if the Alternative Special Tax (\$0.185 per square foot for Developed Property) is to be applied pursuant to Section E below. The Alternative Special Tax (for Developed Property) will be applied under the Fourth step of Section E to the following:

Class 1 lots larger than 7,994 square feet Class 2 lots larger than 7,264 square feet Class 3 lots larger than 6,902 square feet Class 4 lots larger than 6,178 square feet Class 5 lots larger than 5,448 square feet

### 2. Undeveloped Property.

The Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property is \$8,500 per acre. For purposes of this Section C(2), the acreage of Undeveloped Property shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map or the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.



### D. <u>Maximum Special Tax: Improvement Area No. 2:</u>

### 1. Developed Property

The Maximum Special Tax in any Fiscal Year for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in Classes 1 through 5 shall be the greater of (i) the amount derived by multiplying the square footage applicable to the Assessor's Parcel by the Alternative Special Tax, or (ii) the Assigned Special Tax Rate determined by reference to Table 2. For purposes of this Section D, the acreage or square footage of an Assessor's Parcel shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map, the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

The Maximum Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property may exceed the Assigned Special Tax Rate if the Alternative Special Tax (\$0.272 per square foot for Developed Property) is to be applied pursuant to Section E below. The Alternative Special Tax (for Developed Property) will be applied under the Fourth step of Section E to the following:

Class 1 lots larger than 5,117 square feet Class 2 lots larger than 4,650 square feet Class 3 lots larger than 4,419 square feet Class 4 lots larger than 3,952 square feet Class 5 lots larger than 3,488 square feet

### 2. Undeveloped Property

The Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property is \$12,400 per acre. For purposes of this Section D(2), the acreage of Undeveloped Property shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map or the most current



parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

### E. <u>Method of Apportionment of the Special Taxes to Developed Property and Undeveloped Property.</u>

Starting with Fiscal Year 1991-92 and for each following Fiscal Year, the Board shall determine the amount of Special Tax to be levied and collected from Taxable Property in each of the Improvement Areas in the Fiscal Year (the "Special Tax Requirement"). The Special Tax Requirement shall be calculated separately for each Improvement Area and shall include the sums necessary to pay principal and interest on the portion of the outstanding bonds of CFD No. 1 which was issued to finance public facilities for the Improvement Area, replenish the reserve fund for the bonds, and to pay administrative expenses of the District. The Board shall levy the Special Taxes separately within Improvement Area No. 1 and Improvement Area No. 2 as follows:

<u>First</u>: The Special Tax shall be levied on all Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property, exclusive of property exempt from Special Taxes pursuant to Section F below, up to 87% of the Assigned Special Tax Rate for each class of Developed Property determined by reference to Table 1 or Table 2;

<u>Second</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first step has been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property, exclusive of property exempt from Special Taxes pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property;

<u>Third</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first two steps have been completed, the levy of the Special Tax on Assessor's Parcels in all classes of Developed Property, exclusive of property exempt from Special Taxes pursuant to Section F below, shall be increased by equal percentages above the Special Tax rates determined pursuant to the first two steps above, up to 100% of the Assigned Special Tax for each class, determined by reference to Table 1 or Table 2;

<u>Fourth</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first three steps have been completed, the levy of Special Tax on Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property for which the Maximum Special Tax is determined by application of the Alternative Special Tax, shall be increased by an equal percentage from the Assigned Special Tax up to the full amount of the Alternative Special Tax for the Assessor's Parcels;

<u>Fifth</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first four steps have been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property irrevocably offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association which has not been exempted from the Special Tax pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property; and

Sixth: If additional funds are needed after the first five steps have been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionally on each Assessor's Parcel of

Undeveloped Property conveyed to a public agency which has not been exempted from the Special Tax pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property.

### F. Limitations.

The Board shall not levy the Special Taxes on up to 16.39 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 1 or 32.89 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 2 conveyed or irrevocably offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association, on land which is a public right-of-way or which is a utility easement making impractical its utilization for other than the purpose set forth in such easement. If the total number of acres of land conveyed or offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association exceeds 16.39 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 1 or 32.89 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 2, the acres exceeding such total shall be taxed as Undeveloped Property to the extent set forth in the fifth and sixth steps in Section E above; provided, however, that in no event shall the Board levy the Special Taxes on land which is a public right-of-way or which is a public utility property not regularly occupied by personnel of the utility or a property encumbered with public or utility easements making impractical its utilization for other than the purpose set forth in such easement.

### G. Manner of Collection.

The Special Taxes for CFD No. 1 shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary *ad valorem* property taxes, and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure, sale and lien priority in case of delinquency as is provided for *ad valorem* taxes.

### ORDINANCE NO. 2004/05

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("JUSD") adopted Resolution No. 93/9 stating that Community Facilities District No. 2 of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") is proposed to be established pursuant to Chapter 2.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5, commencing with Section 53311, of the California Government Code (the "Act"), to finance certain school facilities (the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, notice was published as required by the Act relative to the intention of the Board of Education to form the District and to provide for the Facilities;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act relative to the determination to proceed with the formation of the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to finance the costs of the Facilities;

WHEREAS, at said hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District and the levy of said special taxes were heard, substantial evidence was presented and considered by the Board of Education and a full and fair hearing was held;

WHEREAS, subsequent to said hearing, the Board of Education adopted resolutions entitled "Resolution of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District Establishing Community Facilities District No. 2 of the Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, and Establishing the Boundaries Thereof", being Resolution No. 93/12, (the "Resolution of Formation") and "Resolution of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District Calling a Special Election and Submitting to the Voters of Community Facilities District No. 2 a Proposition with Respect to the Annual Levy of Special Taxes Within the Community Facilities District to Pay Principal of and Interest on Bonds Thereof, and a Proposition with Respect to the Establishment of an Appropriations Limit for the Community Facilities District" which resolutions established the District, authorized the levy of a special tax with the District, and called an election within the District on the proposition of incurring indebtedness, levying a special tax, and establishing an appropriations limit within the District, respectively; and

WHEREAS, an election was held within the District in which the sole eligible landowner elector approved said propositions by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:



Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit "C" to the Resolution of Formation (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2004-2005 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of JUSD issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs of administering the District.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Superintendent of JUSD is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

<u>Section 3</u>. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of JUSD in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected. JUSD's Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

<u>Section 6</u>. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

Section 7. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its

WHEREAS, an election was held within the District in which the sole eligible landowner elector approved said propositions by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act.



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit "C" to the Resolution of Formation (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2004-2005 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of JUSD issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs of administering the District.

Section 2. The Superintendent of JUSD is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 3. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of JUSD in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected. JUSD's Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

<u>Section 6</u>. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a



Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

<u>Section 7</u> . The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its passage at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within JUSD boundaries.


