b. Recognize English Language Acquisition Program Grant Award

(Ms. Moreno)

The District was notified that it would receive a \$240,800 apportionment for the English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP). The ELAP program is a State-funded program that provides services to pupils enrolled in grades four to eight and identified as English learners. These funds support the District's Newcomer program, after- and summer-school programs, as well as instructional coaching for teachers of English learners. Funding is provided on a priority basis based on the highest proportion of English learners and can be deferred or amended based on the condition of the State's budget. Information only.

3. Administrative Reports and Written Communications

* a. Hear Report on Corrected 2004 API Growth Reports

(Mr. Duchon)

On January 20, 2005, the California Department of Education released API Growth Reports for those districts that submitted data corrections. The District submitted data corrections in order to assure that baseline data for 2004 were correct. Mr. Sandy Sanford, Data Systems Architect for Sanford Systems, is present this evening to provide a description of the State's testing program along with an analysis of the District's API growth reports.

Mr. Sanford has been involved extensively as a consultant with the California Department of Education and many school districts in California; he has been analyzing high stakes testing since the API was instituted in 1999 and a number of years previous to that. Mr. Sanford has also provided support to the Riverside County Achievement Team that has been working with our school district for many years.

The District's "Blueprint for Learning" is contained later in the Agenda and outlines the District's plan for implementing a Standards Based Curriculum. Charts that show trends of API growth since the State's accountability program was instituted in 1999 are included in the supporting documents as well. <u>Information only.</u>

b. Appoint Board Member to Serve on District Education Technology Plan Committee (Mr. Duchon)

The Education Technology Department is in the process of forming a committee to revise the current District Education Technology Plan, which will expire June 2005. As an eligible entity for the Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) funding under Title II, Part D and as a recipient of the EETT Competitive Grant for the three middle schools, the District's Education Technology Plan must be revised and submitted to the California Department of Education no later than April 6, 2005. Twenty-five percent of the EETT funding must be spent on professional development related to helping teachers use technology as an effective tool to improve teaching and student achievement. The balance of the funding is to be spent on education technology expenses in accordance with the District's approved Education Technology Plan. Currently, two meetings are scheduled: February 24, 2005 (1:00-4:00 p.m.) in the Personnel Conference Room and March 17, 2005 (9:00 a.m.–12:00 Noon) in Room B-206. Staff has requested that the Board President appoint a Board member to serve on the District Education Technology Plan Committee.

- c. Appoint Board Member to Serve on District Library Plan Committee (Mr. Duchon) In accordance with the K-12 California Public School Library Act of 1998, the District is in the process of forming a committee to review and revise the current District Library Plan. To receive Library Act funding a current, local governing board-approved district library plan must be available (*Education Code* §18180-18185). While the funds are apportioned based on the prior year ADA (P2 Report), they are distributed within the District based on this plan. Funds can only be dispersed to those schools that have a dedicated library space. (*Education Code* §18183) Currently, the District Library Plan Revision Meeting is scheduled for March 24, 2005 from 3:00 4:30 p.m. in the Board Room Staff has requested that the Board President appoint a Board member to serve on the District Library Plan Committee.

* 6. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from the Youth Opportunity Center

(Mr. Jensen)

The Youth Opportunity Center staff and students request permission to attend the Youth and Government 57th Model Legislative Court held in Sacramento, California on Wednesday, February 16 through Tuesday, February 22, 2005. This conference is the culminating activity to a year-long process which enables our young people to experience "hands-on" the political and legislative processes and how these impact their lives.

Approximately 40 students will attend this event. The cost per student is \$20 per day. The YMCA will pay hotel accommodations, conference fees, VIP fees, and student/advisor transportation expenses. Meals and VIP transportation costs will be paid with YOC funds. Students will be chaperoned by Juan Salas, Lead Advisor, Pen Fawaz, Advisor, Felix Ponce, Advisor, and Dinery Villagomez, Advisor.

Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from the Youth Opportunity Center staff and students to attend the Youth and Government 57th Model Legislative Court held in Sacramento, California on Wednesday, February 16 through Tuesday, February 22, 2005.

* 7. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High

(Mr. Jensen)

Rubidoux High School AVID students and staff request permission to participate in the AVID Juniors College Tour on Tuesday, March 29 through Friday, April 1, 2005. This activity provides an opportunity for 11th grade AVID students to tour college campuses in northern and central California. Students will learn college life skills, collaboration and study skills, and will gain a better understanding of social/community responsibility.

Approximately 30 students will be participating in the tour. The cost per student is \$540. AVID funds will be used to pay for a portion of the expenses as well as student contributions. Students and staff will be housed at various local motels. Travel will be by Southwest Airlines and California Charter Bus. Students will be chaperoned by Mark McFerren, AVID Coordinator, Oscar Reynoso, teacher, and five or six parent volunteers.

Administration has indicated that no student will be denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the <u>Board approve</u> the <u>Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from AVID students and staff to travel to northern and central California to participate in the AVID Juniors College Tour on March 29-April 1, 2005.</u>

* 8. Approve Out-of-State Travel Request from Behavior Specialist

(Mr. Jensen)

Ms. Loni Kuhn, Behavior Specialist, is requesting approval to travel to Atlanta, Georgia to attend the National Association of School Psychology Conference, which will be held on Tuesday, March 29 through Saturday, April 2, 2005.

Attending this conference will enhance Ms. Kuhn's knowledge base and skills as a behavior specialist for the Jurupa Unified School District. Ms. Kuhn will be attending several workshops on a variety of topics. Participants will learn prevention and intervention strategies, culturally competent practice, new research that contributes to evidence-based practice, and the latest developments in federal legislation.

All expenses related to this conference (air fare, lodging, meals, registration) will be paid by Ms. Kuhn. A copy of the Travel Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Out-of-State Travel Request from Ms. Loni Kuhn to travel to Atlanta, Georgia to attend the National Association of School Psychology Conference on March 29-April 2, 2005 be approved.

B. Consider Reinstating Class Size Reduction in Third Grade Beginning in 2001/02 and continuing into 2002/03 and 2003/04, school districts have faced severe budget cuts from the State. This has created a financial hardship on districts and a need to implement budget cuts in order to maintain fiscal solvency. Over this three year period, the District has implemented budget reductions and transfers in excess of \$8.2 million.

for the District to maintain their fiscal solvency.

The Board has requested that the reinstatement of third grade Class Size Reduction be considered for the 2005/06 school year. To implement third grade Class Size Reduction, it will be necessary to hire 28 additional teachers (\$1,649,004) and to place portable classrooms (16 classrooms - \$224,032) at some of the school sites. The District would generate approximately \$1,539,175 in additional Class Size Reduction revenue, which would result in a net cost of \$333,861. The cost for the additional teachers will be an ongoing General Fund

In 2003/2004, Class Size Reduction in third grade was eliminated as one of the cuts necessary

Included in the supporting documents is a multi-year budget projection, which includes the expense of the additional teachers and the revenue generated for Class Size Reduction. This projection shows that the District will be able financially to implement third grade Class Size Reduction if that is the Board's decision. <u>Administration recommends that the Board have discussion regarding the reinstatement of Class Size Reduction in third grade.</u>

* C. Re-Consider Action on Salary Increase for Management & Confidential Employees

cost and the cost for the portable classrooms will be paid from Developer Fees.

(Mrs. Nash)

At the January 18, 2005 meeting, the Board took action to deny a salary increase for Management and Confidential Employees with a 3-2 vote. Since that time, two letters were received in the Superintendent's office from former Superintendent, Dr. Ed Hawkins, and Mr. George Monge, Principal of Adult/Alternative Education requesting to place this item back on the Agenda to allow the Board to reconsider their decision. Copies of their letters are included in the supporting documents along with the cost to implement a salary increase.

During school year 2002/03, the District faced budget cuts. As a result, salary increases for Classified, Management and Confidential employees were not brought to the Board for approval, as had typically been the District's practice for approximately 20 years. A memorandum of understanding between CSEA and the District was produced with acknowledgement that another employee group (Certificated) received a salary enhancement for the 2002-2003 school year. The Parties agreed that before any other employee group receives a salary enhancement in the future, the Classified Bargaining unit members shall receive the equivalent increase with a 1% salary enhancement effective July 1, 2002, and another 1% salary enhancement effective July 1, 2003.

Classified Management and Management/Confidential positions that are held by certificated and confidential employees are not represented by an association. We have generally recommended increases for these employees in amounts comparable to those employees who engage in formal collective bargaining. Administration recommends salary enhancement for the 2004/05 school year comparable to the Classified Bargaining unit members for Certificated and Classified Management and Management/Confidential Employees.

D. Review 2005/2006 Preliminary Budget Projection

(Mrs. Lauzon)

In January, Governor Schwarzenegger released his budget proposal for the 2005/2006 fiscal year. The Governor's budget proposal includes a 3.93% COLA and growth funding for Revenue Limits and Special Education. Almost all categorical programs will receive a proposed 3.93% increase for COLA plus growth. The proposed budget also includes Deficit Reduction funding of 1.132%. This would reduce the current deficit factor to .98868. The Deficit Reduction funding, added to the COLA, would increase revenue limit funding by approximately 4.97%.

The Governor has also proposed that the State's current annual payment of \$469 million dollars, which is paid to STRS, be shifted to Proposition 98 and that the expense be paid by the school districts. The employer STRS contribution rate would increase from 8.25% to 10.25% in 2005/06. This would reduce the total new revenue by \$1.3 million dollars (equal to almost 1.25% of Revenue Limit funding). This proposal, in addition to the Governor breaking the "Deal" with the education community to limit the cut in the Proposition 98 guarantee to no more the \$2 billion for 2004/05, as well as the other Proposition 98 amendments that he has proposed, will be devastating to California schools.

Proposed Proposition 98 Amendments:

- 1. Elimination of suspension of the guarantee.
- 2. Elimination of the Maintenance Factor, which ensures that long-term funding reaches the Test 2 level.
- 3. Subjecting education funding to across-the-board mid-year cuts imposed by the State Controller, along with other state programs, if the state spending plan falls out of balance.
- 4. Prohibiting borrowing from special funds and Proposition 98.

The 2005/2006 Preliminary Budget Projection has been prepared using the 2004/2005 Budget as a base, then rolling the budget forward and modifying it using a set of assumptions concerning revenue (based on the Governor's Proposed Budget) and expenditures for next year. The preliminary budget projection and the assumptions used to generate it are included in the supporting documents.

The first step in developing the 2005/2006 Preliminary Budget Projection was to project a Beginning Balance, which essentially consists of the 2004/2005 Ending Balance carried over into the next fiscal year. The Ending Balance estimate is prepared by analyzing and revising current year revenues and expenditures. As a result of this analysis, the Unrestricted Beginning Balance for 2005/2006 is estimated to be \$5,627,275 and the estimated Restricted Beginning Balance is \$489,174.

Revenue has been estimated using a projected enrollment of 21,549 students, which represents an increase of 350 students (1.65%) over the current year. As noted above, the Revenue Limit funding includes a 3.93% COLA. The COLA for 2005/2006 was originally estimated to be 2.7%, and that figure was used in the multi-year budget projection presented to the Board in December with the First Interim Report. Special Education and Class Size Reduction funding includes growth and a 3.93% COLA. All other sources of funding are assumed to remain the same as this year. Based on these assumptions, revenue for 2005/2006 is estimated to be \$146,532,791. Adding this figure to the Beginning Balance results in Total Resources of \$152,649,240.

Expenditures have been projected by applying standard budget allocation formulas for staffing and supplies to the projected enrollment. In addition, assumptions have been made concerning anticipated expenditure increases in the areas of payroll costs, personnel, utilities and capital outlay. For the 2005/06 school year, the District will be required to deposit an amount equal to 3% of total General Fund expenditures into the Routine Maintenance Fund. As the Board may recall, with the passage of SB 409 in 2004/05, we were only required to deposit 2% of the total General Fund expenditures. This will increase the contribution (expenditures) in 2005/06 by \$1.2 million. Using this method, the Estimated Expenditures for 2005/2006 are \$146,025,112.

Comparing Total Resources to Total Expenditures, the District's **Unrestricted Reserve** is estimated to be \$5,587,833 or 3.82% of total expenditures. The District is required to carry a 3% Unrestricted Reserve or \$4,380,753. It is important to note that any negotiated salary increases for 2004/2005 are not known at this time, and therefore have not been included in the projection.

As noted above, several items in the Governor's budget proposal are controversial and may be significantly altered by the Legislature as the State Budget Act is developed. As is customary, the Business Office will monitor State finance trends, as well as District revenues and expenditures. This information will then be used to develop the 2005/2006 Budget that will be presented to the Board for adoption in June. <u>Information only</u>.

** E. Approve Submittal of Part II of the 2004-2005 Consolidated Application (Ms. Moreno) The Consolidated Application is a request for funds for eleven categorical aid programs. Part I was approved by the Board of Education on June 21, 2004 and submitted to the State Department of Education. For 2004-2005, the funding for these programs is reported in Part II of the Consolidated Application in the total amount of \$10,958,672. This figure represents \$8,011,848 in federal funding and \$2,946,824 in state funding. A copy of Part II of the Consolidated Application is included in the supporting documents for Board members.

The five program entitlements covered by state funding include: School Improvement, \$1,026,160 (K-6 funding) and \$103,755 (7-8 funding)--supports elementary and middle school improvement efforts; Economic Impact Aid, \$1,669,531--supplement for the English Learner program; Tenth Grade Counseling, \$41,417--allocated to Jurupa Valley, Rubidoux, and Nueva Vista to provide extra counseling to tenth grade students to determine whether they are making satisfactory progress toward meeting graduation requirements; Peer Assistance and Review (PAR), \$76,774--allows exemplary teachers to assist other teachers who need help developing their subject matter knowledge and teaching strategies; and Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE), \$29,187--support tobacco prevention education in grades 4-8.

The six federal program entitlements are also a part of the application. The Title I (Basic Grant) program is designed to provide supplemental funds for underachieving students at schools with a high concentration of poverty. Title II (Teacher Quality) is designed to prepare and recruit high-quality teachers and principals. Title II (Technology) provides staff development funding to assist teachers in using technology to support academic achievement through standards mastery. Title III (LEP) is to ensure that all limited English proficient (LEP) students attain English proficiency and meet the same challenging state academic standards as all other students.

** E. <u>Approve Submittal of Part II of the 2004-2005 Consolidated Application</u> (Ms. Moreno) (Continued)

Title IV (Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities) provides support of school- and community-based drug education and prevention programs. Title V (Innovative Strategies) provides counseling and library services. The federal 2004-2005 funding allocations are as follows: Title I, \$6,175,007; Title II (Teacher Quality), \$976,662; Title II (Technology), \$164,717; Title III (LEP), \$468,436; Title IV (SDFSC), \$129,483; and Title V (Innovative Strategies), \$97,543.

In response to the requirements of No Child Left Behind (NCLB), the District was required to submit a Local Education Agency Plan (LEAP) that is linked to the state adopted goals and accountability system. Our district's LEAP was approved at the June 2, 2003 Board meeting. This plan outlines how state and federally-funded initiatives are aimed at improving student achievement and work in tandem in order to have the greatest impact.

Part II of the Consolidated Application also contains the allocations by site and reporting on teacher quality requirements under NCLB. School level "Single Plans for Student Achievement" describe how these funds will be spent. Any new funds received for this year must be used for the purposes described in each school's plan, or changes in priorities must be amended and approved by the School Site Council and submitted to the Director of Categorical Projects.

Administration recommends that the Board approve submittal of Part II of the 2004-2005 Consolidated Application.

F. Approve for Review, K-6 Science Series

(Dr. Kinnear)

A committee of teachers convened on January 13, 2005, to review the California State Board of Education approved textbooks for Science. The textbooks reviewed were as follows:

- (a) Houghton Mifflin: Discovery Works (K-6)
- (b) Harcourt School Publishers: Harcourt Science (K-5)
- (c) Prentice Hall: Prentice Hall Science Explorer (6)
- (d) McGraw Hill: McGraw Hill Science (K-6)

After review by committee members and teachers' participation at the school sites in January 2005, Harcourt School Publishers: Harcourt Science (K-5) received the highest evaluation rating of 12.59 average out of a 15 possible score. Since this is a K-6 adoption also Prentice Hall: Prentice Hall Science Explorer (6) received the second highest evaluation rating of 11.89 average out of a 15 possible score. Harcourt Science (K-5) and Prentice Hall Science Explorer (6) were selected as the best suited Science series to meet the needs of K-6 students in the Jurupa Unified School District. Instructional Council approved the selection at the January 31, 2005 meeting.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the review of the K-5 Science series, Harcourt Science and the 6th grade Prentice Hall Science Explorer Science series.

G. <u>Approve Purchase of Audiovisual Equipment for Sunnyslope Elementary</u> (Mrs. Lauzon) Sunnyslope Elementary School wishes to purchase the following audiovisual equipment: Projectors, visual presentation cameras and miscellaneous equipment (screens, carts, & DVD/VCR combo player). Quotes received for the equipment were:

- * 1. <u>Approve Personnel Report #13</u> (Mrs. Nash) <u>Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #13 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session</u>.
 - 2. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request
 State credentialing laws require that prior to hiring an individual to teach under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver (Title V, Section 80122), specific individual approval must be granted by the governing board. Usually, this type of waiver is necessary for hard-to-fill positions in shortage areas (examples: Special Education, Bilingual Education, Mathematics or Science) or when an unexpected vacancy occurs in the middle of a school year. In this case, the recommendation is to fill a vacancy for a Special Day Class Teacher at Rubidoux High School. The person being recommended is Mr. Keith Gustafson, who received his Bachelor's Degree from California State University, San Bernardino in History.

Additionally, Mr. Gustafson has fourteen years of working in private and nonpublic schools with children that ranged in age from preschool to adolescent and at different levels of educational abilities. He believes that all children can succeed and has demonstrated that he is flexible, caring and can work well with parents, students and staff. Also, he has shown his commitment by admission to California State University, San Bernardino in the Mild/Moderate program; has completed eight quarter units and is taking coursework during the Winter Quarter 2005. Mr. Gustafson is highly motivated and in our recruitment efforts he is the best candidate for the position. With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Keith Gustafson be approved for temporary employment through the end of this school year as a Special Day Class Teacher under the authorization of a Variable Term Waiver.

M. Review Information Reports

1. Review Report on "Blueprint for Learning" (Mr. Duchon)
The Superintendent is presenting to the Board a plan to meet achievement goals
throughout the District. This plan incorporates state requirements as well as best practices
for implementing a standards-based curriculum.

The goal is that all schools in the District will show a pattern of continuous improvement for academic achievement and meet their growth targets as established by the State.

The District has started implementation by the steps outlined below:

- Each school has been provided with the Academic Program Survey designed by the State of California that will be used as a self-study and planning tool.
- The Riverside County Office of Education has been contacted to provide coaches for instructional support.
- The District has participated in training on Professional Learning Communities. Coaches will support schools in the implementation of this process.
- The District is recommending standards-aligned science textbooks for adoption. These will be purchased and available for the next school year.
- The District has purchased standards-aligned social science guides to be used with the textbook series.
- The District continues to monitor textbook needs.

Blueprint for Learning Five Point Plan

A "Blueprint for Learning" is being implemented in the Jurupa Unified School District. Research tells us that we must focus on learning. Teaching can only be effective in an environment in which students are motivated and have an opportunity to learn. A five-point plan is outlined below:

- (1) <u>The Resources</u>: Focus fiscal resources including categorical monies on providing tools to sites including staff development, assessment, support and materials, and human resources. Utilize an evaluation system with administrators to clarify expectations focusing on the implementation of the plan. Provide training and support to teachers.
- (2) The Structure: Utilize the Academic Program Survey (APS) developed by the California Department of Education for School Assistance Intervention Team (SAIT) schools at every school in the District. This will provide for planning, implementing, and evaluating a standards-based curriculum. Base the instructional program on all State Standards with a focus on the most Essential Standards.
- (3) The Materials: Continue with full implementation of standards-based textbooks.
 - Purchasing standards-based textbooks in English/language arts, math, science and history/social science.
 - Provide professional development to teachers (AB 466) and to principals (AB 75) on full implementation of standards-based textbooks.
 - Establish a clear evaluation system for certificated administrators.

- (4) The Method: Utilize a model of Professional Learning Communities (PLC) and continuous improvement devised from Quality Systems Theory. Create grade level, cross grade level, and disciplinary (subject area) teams at every school to focus on improving student learning by:
 - Utilizing data to drive the instructional process.
 - Sharing and critiquing instructional strategies.
 - · Looking collaboratively at student work.
 - Evaluating and modifying the instructional process.
 - Creating clear expectations in the staff evaluation system.
- (5) The Support: Provide district support for plan implementation. Provide coaches to aid in the implementation of collaborative teams using the PLC model and the application of APS.

A standards-based curriculum promotes clarity and consistency about what students are expected to learn. It provides an appropriate foundation for all children to learn. The State of California has adopted standards that provide a framework for local educators to ensure that students throughout the state will receive a similar education.

Jurupa Unified School District, like every district in California, is expected to teach state standards and the district is mandated to test students using the California Standards Tests (CSTs), California Achievement Test, 6th Edition (CAT 6), California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), California English Language Development Test (CELDT), and the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE).

Achieving the standards is the goal for every student. Achievement is measured by what is learned, not by what is taught. Our job as educators is to deliver our curriculum to every student in a way that assures that he or she receives basic skills and knowledge. Every student must have an opportunity to learn.

Outline for Delivery of a Standards-Based Curriculum

- **Step 1:** <u>State Standards</u>: The curriculum of the District is the state adopted standards. The state provides frameworks and blueprints to enhance and describe standards. Adopted textbooks are standards-based and facilitate the teaching of standards.
- Step 2: <u>Essential Standards</u>: The District has identified Essential Standards that are the most critical standards on which to focus.
- Step 3: Plan and Pace: It is important to understand all components of each standard. Curriculum must be paced so that each student has an opportunity to learn each standard. Instruction should also be differentiated so that students of varying abilities and learning styles have an opportunity to learn each standard.
- Step 4: <u>Assess</u>: Students are assessed periodically using multiple measures in order to know whether individual students have attained the standards for their grade level. Teachers need to be able to determine how effectively their entire class is learning each standard. Both district criterion referenced tests and embedded assessments from textbooks are used by teachers to monitor student progress.

- Step 5: <u>Teach</u>: Teaching strategies and assessment must be aligned to the standards. Our district has a model for differentiated lesson plans to address the individual needs of students. Differentiated instruction assures that teaching is varied and provides an opportunity for each student to learn.
- Step 6: <u>Teacher Collaboration</u>: A critical aspect of our educational process is the collaboration among teachers. This may include sharing lesson plans, student work, and common assessments. The District will support time for collaboration and staff development for this process.
- Step 7: <u>Student Data</u>: Individual and class data are analyzed to determine if standards are being achieved.
- **Step 8:** Pre-teach and Re-teach: When appropriate, a teacher will pre-teach to readiness or reteach to mastery in order that students achieve standards.
- Step 9: <u>Analyze and Evaluate the Outcomes</u>: CSTs, CAT 6, CAPA, CELDT, and the CAHSEE provide data district-wide. Individual school and district test data results are disaggregated by subgroups.
- **Step 10:** Celebrate: Successes will be recognized and celebrated throughout the District and community.

Accountability: The District is held accountable through both a state and a federal accountability program. California's Public School Accountability Act put into place a statewide system to test students and create an Academic Performance Index (API). No Child Left Behind also put into place a standards-based accountability system that includes a measure called Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) with Annual Measurable Objectives (AMO).

Meeting the Goals: We believe all students can learn and achieve state standards. The rate and depth of learning are affected by a number of factors, experiences, preparations, primary language, age, developmental ability, and readiness to learn. Our goal is that every school will meet its growth targets.

This plan is being presented to the Board for review before the final document is completed.

* 2. Review Approval of 2004/2005 First Interim Report

(Mrs. Lauzon)

The Riverside County Office of Education has notified the District that the 2004/2005 First Interim Financial Report has received positive certification and that they have notified the California Department of Education accordingly. The County Office also recommends that the Board continue to review updated multi-year financial projections to assist in providing for the long-range stability of the District. <u>Information only</u>.

3. Review Facility Construction and Modernization Funding Sources (Mrs. Lauzon)
District staff will present an overview of funding for the State School Building program,
along with information on the other sources available to fund new construction and
modernization projects. Funding for new schools and the modernization of existing schools
comes from the following sources:

State Funds

State School Building Funds:

- New construction projects are funded 50% State School Building funds and 50% from School District funds.
- Modernization projects are funded 60% from State School Building funds and 40% from School District funds.

School District Funds

Developer Fees:

- Developer fees are generated from new commercial and residential construction. These fees generate funding necessary to provide classrooms for growth.
- Level 1 \$2.24 per square foot for residential and .36¢ per square foot for commercial.
- Level 2 \$3.43 per square foot for residential and .36¢ per square foot for commercial.

The District is currently allowed to charge Level 2 fees for residential because we have met three of the four requirements required by law. The items that qualify us for Level 2 fees are:

- (a) We have passed a Bond Measure in the past four years.
- (b) More than 20% of our classrooms are relocatables.
- (c) We have exceeded 30% of our bonding capacity.

Community Facilities Districts (CFD's) - CFD's are formed when Developers and the School District agree on a mitigation fee that, in most cases, provides an amount in excess of the current developer fee. Another advantage for the District is that the funds are available up front as a lump sum, rather than in smaller increments over time as the houses are built. The District currently has approximately \$1.3 million dollars available in CFD improvement funds.

Redevelopment Funds - These are pass-thru funds that the District receives through an agreement with the County Economic Development Agency. The District receives approximately \$1.6 million dollars per year in redevelopment funds. Currently, redevelopment funds are used to pay debt service payments for the Jurupa Valley High School Stadium, the Energy Efficiency Bond loan, and the purchase of portable classrooms. In addition, the District's transfer to the Deferred Maintenance fund is from redevelopment funds.

General Obligation Bond - Proposition 39 authorizes bonds for repair, construction or replacement of school facilities and classrooms, if approved by 55% local vote. The Board previously approved, and the voters passed, Measure "C" in November 2001 for \$58 million dollars. The District is experiencing growth that will require facilities that are not funded under Measure "C" and only partially funded by developer fees. Further, there were a number of projects not included in Measure "C" that are becoming more critical, such as the extensive renovation of our older schools.

Administration recommends that the District establish an internal facility funding committee including staff and two Board members appointed by the Board President.

* 4. Review Schools of Choice Notification

(Mr. Duchon)

In accordance with Board Policy 5117.1, parents will be notified, beginning February 1, 2005 of the Schools of choice Open Enrollment Policy and Procedure. A copy of the parents' brochure is included in the supporting documents.

GRANT AWARD NOTIFICATION ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION PROGRAM

We are pleased to inform you that your local educational agency (LEA) will receive an apportionment for the English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP). Enclosed is a list of schools and the amounts allocated to each one. Funds are allocated only for the selected schools and may not be distributed to any other schools in the district.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction (SSPI) is required to allocate to each participating LEA one hundred dollars annually for each pupil enrolled in any of grades four to eight, inclusive, and identified as an English learner. This program is subject to funds appropriated in the annual Budget Act. For fiscal year 2004-05, the appropriation was \$54,999,000. Because this amount is insufficient to support the minimum allocation set forth, the SSPI is required to give priority for funding to schools with the highest proportion of pupils enrolled who are identified as English learners. Thus, you may find that not all of the schools included on your application were funded.

Warrants will be mailed to each county treasurer approximately six to eight weeks from the date of this letter. The treasurer of each county is requested to immediately deposit the amount received for each LEA to Income Account Number 8590 of the general fund of the LEA. For districts using the Standardized Account Code Structure (SACS), the Resource Code is 6286 and the Revenue Object Code is 8590. County Superintendents are requested to inform LEAs immediately of all pertinent data regarding this apportionment.

This award is made contingent upon the availability of funds. You should be aware that the State Legislature is currently considering numerous proposals, including those made by the Governor, in light of the State's current budget crisis. Many of these proposals could potentially reduce and/or defer funds available for current year programs, including the funds available for this award. This is to advise you that if the legislature takes action to reduce or defer the funding upon which this award is based, then this award will be amended accordingly.

HEARING SESSION

President Chavez formally opened the Public Hearing regarding the adoption of Resolution #2005/27, a "Resolution of Necessity" for the acquisition of fee interests in certain properties as identified within the agenda and resolution. Counsel, Mr. Steven C. DeBaun, Best, Best & Krieger LLP, explained the nature and scope of the hearing. Ms. Colleen Munds, Assistant to the Superintendent, testified that by virtue of the formal notices in her possession, property owners were properly noticed as prescribed by law. The amended notice advised property owners of the change in the location of the hearing. Ms. Pam Lauzon, Business Manager, provided a report on how the property to be acquired relates to the District's purpose. Ms. Munds, for the record, noted that no documents were received concerning written objections, protests, and requests to be heard. President Chavez invited any persons with an interest in the property to come forward, give testimony, and clearly state their name for the record.

Mr. Randy Babbish, representative of the Vernola family, owners of the property in question, noted a correction to the Public Notice, indicated that there have been some negotiations to achieve agreement on the price for the property; however, there is a discrepancy between the offer that was made by the school district, \$270,000 per acre, compared to recent comparable sales in the area at \$600,000 per acre. This is a significant difference of approximately \$3 million. Mr. Babbish commented that as part of the negotiations, the Vernola family is willing to accept less than fair market value for the property if the school district agrees to name the school after Mr. Vernola's mother and agrees to a special tax credit.

President Chavez stated that since there are no other persons who wish to be heard on this matter, this concludes the hearing portion of the proceeding; he formally closed the hearing. MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD ADOPT RESOLUTION #2005/27, RESOLUTION OF NECESSITY. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mrs. Pam Lauzon, Business Manager, reviewed for Mr. Harris the qualifications of Davis Demographics to conduct enrollment projections for the District that warranted the need for another elementary school in the area in question. In response to the concerns of Mr. Harris, she noted that the projections of Davis Demographics have been accurate, and since their projections were made based upon a study of development in the area from two years ago, given the new development that is now underway, likely there would be an additional 5,000 students added to the District's enrollment projections over the next several years. Ms. Shelia Carpenter, Director of Centralized Support Services, reported to Mr. Harris that three appraisals were conducted on the Vernola property, with the most recent one completed on December 13, 2004. She noted for Mr. Harris that appraisals were all conducted by the same company, which meets the requirements of the law, and the appraisal has been completed within the last six months in order to conduct eminent domain proceedings. Ms. Carpenter also assured Mr. Harris that the appraisal firm that was used is properly certified at the highest level. The Superintendent reviewed for Mr. Harris that the District has been involved in negotiations concerning the Vernola property for the past 1½ years, Davis Demographics projections have been parallel to actual enrollment by 100 to 200 students; with three additional developers in the planning stages of building 1,800, 450, and 1,200 units respectively, along with information from the 10-year East Vale Specific Plan, Davis Demographics has designated two areas that will be in need of elementary schools. He further stated that over the past 1½ years, an offer was brought forward by the property owner concerning the school name and the tax credit for gifting; however, the Board determined not to move in this direction.



PUBLIC HEARING RESOLUTION OF NECESSITY ACQUIRE PROPERTY APN 160-040-012 & 160-050-025 BY EMINENT DOMAIN FOR CONSTRUCTION OF AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (CONTINUED)	The Superintendent reviewed that the appraised value was determined using standard operating procedure and was completed three times; the District was not approached with a counter appraisal, and based on the condition of the property and the infrastructure, this was an accurate appraisal. He commented that proceeding with eminent domain proceedings would not prevent the District from continuing to work with the developer; however, he stressed the importance of moving forward so that, hopefully, an elementary school could be completed by 2006 to accommodate new students in this area. He expressed concern about meeting deadlines to construct the new school and meeting the District's responsibility to provide schools for its students.
,	Mr. Harris reviewed then that the only matter that was being contested by the Vernola family is just compensation and the tax credit. He felt that the District should have conducted appraisals by three different companies before taking someone's property. Mr. Rodriguez stated that it would be difficult for him to vote in favor of taking someone's property without obtaining appraisals from three different companies.
	The Superintendent pointed out that in order to meet the requirements in a court of law for eminent domain proceedings the District was following the correct process in terms of appraisals. Mr. DeBaun stated that in eminent domain proceedings, each side presents their case in terms of appraisals; a jury hears the information and makes an evaluation of the value of the land. This is the current process that has been set up for eminent domain proceedings and appraisals from one company are the standard for acceptance. The District has worked over a year to reach agreement concerning this property and agreement has not been reached; therefore, eminent domain proceedings were initiated in order to allow the District to move forward on the property. The Superintendent stated that if it is the pleasure of the Board for administration to request three appraisals from different companies, this would take approximately 6-8 weeks.
CONTINUE EMINENT DOMAIN PROCEEDINGS UNTIL A SUBSEQUENT MEETING IN ORDER TO OBTAIN ADDITIONAL APPRAISALS -MOTION #144	Mrs. Burns pointed out that it is not always easy to make difficult decisions as a School Board Member; she watched other school districts, such as Fontana and Colton, wait too long to build schools, developments went in fast, and there were not enough schools to house the students. She stated that it is the Board's responsibility to provide working space for teachers; however, she could support postponing the process to obtain another appraisal if that is the request before moving forward on eminent domain proceedings. Mr. Knight stated that the District is within the guidelines of the law and building the school is in the public's best interest. Mr. Chavez stated that although he would vote in favor of this resolution because he believed that there is a need for an additional elementary and middle school, he questioned first whether the District really looked at other areas to build this school, and second, he questioned the tax deferral that is being requested by the owner of the property. He stated that this should not stop the District from looking at other areas for school sites. Mr. Rodriguez stated that he would vote no because of the questions raised by Mr. Harris regarding obtaining other appraisals. In addition, he believed there are opportunities to find other land to place schools besides using eminent domain proceedings. Mr. Harris asked for this item to be tabled until two more appraisals are obtained. Mr. DeBaun reviewed that the Public Hearing has been closed; therefore, it would be his recommendation to continue the matter until the appraisals are obtained; at that time, the District may need to go through the whole process again, but the matter should be continued until that that time when the Resolution of Necessity can be reconsidered. MR. RODRIGUEZ MOVED THE BOARD CONTINUE THE ITEM UNTIL A SUBSEQUENT MEETING IN ORDER TO OBTAIN THE APPRAISALS. MR. HARRIS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED 4-1, NAY, MR. KNIGHT.

President Chavez stated that the previous name selection was questionable, did not provide for community input, and individuals questioned its validity. He suggested taking the process out of the Board's hands and putting Dr. Ed Hawkins and Mr. David Barnes in charge of the process to collect community input and come up with two to three names. Mrs. Burns said that she appreciated Dr. Hawkins' experience and proposal; however, she felt that the naming of schools should be handled by the Board; she agreed with making the process plain and clear. Dr. Hawkins agreed that the Board should make the decision once the public has been involved in the process. Under his suggested process, the winner's name would be placed on a plaque at the new high school. Dr. Hawkins declined the suggestion made by President Chavez.

MR. RODRIGUEZ MOVED THE BOARD ACCEPT DR. ED HAWKINS' PROPOSAL, OPTION (5), AS THE PROCESS FOR NAMING THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL. MR. HARRIS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED 4-1, NAY, MR. KNIGHT.

Mr. Knight stated that his comments are not directed at Dr. Hawkins, he simply feels that perhaps extending the process to include additional input from sites; that possibly an even better process other than the six suggested would emerge. Mr. Rodriguez pointed out that the Board did just vote on the process. The Superintendent reviewed that he would take Dr. Hawkins process, place it in the form of a letter and accept any community input. President Chavez asked that the local press be included in notification of the process.

DENY SALARY INCREASE FOR MANAGEMENT & CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES -MOTION #148

Mrs. Lois Nash, Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services, stated that the District has generally recommended increases for Management and Confidential employees in amounts comparable to those employees who engage in formal collective bargaining. Due to budget cuts, this did not occur and this employee group has not received a comparable cost of living increase.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE A SALARY ENHANCEMENT FOR THE 2004/05 SCHOOL YEAR COMPARABLE TO CLASSIFIED BARGAINING UNIT MEMBERS FOR CERTIFICATED AND CLASSIFIED MANAGEMENT AND MANAGEMENT/CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mr. Harris noted the additional cost of \$85,000 per year to implement this salary increase with \$295,000 to cover the retro-pay. Mrs. Pam Lauzon, Business Manager responded that if this salary increase is approved, there would still be funding left to cover the cost of re-implementing third grade Class Size Reduction, which would be brought to the Board on February 7, 2005. Mr. Rodriguez stated that the Board should wait to make this decision until after the State Budget is known. Although he values classified and confidential management employees, there is a culture change and funds should be directed back to the classroom. He planned to vote against this because he did not believe that a salary increase would produce a better, quality education for students.

The Superintendent stated that his commitment on February 7, 2005 is to include a recommendation to re-implement third grade Class Size Reduction. He stated that there are funds to do that as well as implement this salary increase.



DENY SALARY INCREASE FOR MANAGEMENT & CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES -MOTION #148 (CONTINUED) Mr. Harris stated that it is important to reward achievement and not reward those who are underperforming. He said that there is a need to change the management model from one that provides for gratuitous raises to that of expecting X, Y, or Z. Mr. Harris felt that it was difficult to justify the raise based on the recommendation, and it is particularly difficult to swallow in light of budget cuts and the re-implementation of third grade Class Size Reduction. He would gladly approve raises if they were attached to a form of accountability and were merit-based. Mr. Harris stated that he could not support this raise because it did not provide any motivation to do better.

Mrs. Burns respectfully disagreed with Mr. Harris since merit pay still needs to be discussed as a Board; the presentation before the Board has nothing to do with merit pay. She said that it is the responsibility of the Board to take care of the management and leadership of our school district. Mrs. Burns pointed out that at the last Board meeting two principals gave an exceptional report on their SAIT plans. She stated that there is no magic potion that will change test scores overnight, but there are things that have already been done to bring about that change. She supported taking care of these employees; she did not want to lose good administrators by not doing so. Mrs. Burns emphasized that the Board gave certificated and classified employees a raise and it is important that all employees are treated with respect.

Mr. Harris responded that the District is underperforming and those that are not doing the greatest job don't deserve a raise; he said that we cannot rest on our laurels and do things as they have been done in the past; the management model is wrong; some are doing a fantastic job, but there are some who are not.

Mr. Knight stated that we need to pay the people, they are human beings with families, and the District has the money to provide the salary increase.

Mr. Rodriguez said that he would vote against this salary increase because it is not right to give money without performance; how about expecting a raise in test scores? He said that the presentations provided by the two principals were great, but principals should be paid on results, he is adamantly against a raise if they do not perform; a change in culture is needed; this is taxpayers' money, and how can we give them money when they are not meeting goals? Mr. Knight said that the District is making growth; however, it takes time, and we need to pay the people.

Dr. Ed Hawkins requested to speak. He stated that the Board is not using a level playing field. Teachers and classified employees were given raises without having to meet certain requirements or discuss merit pay. Now the Board is saying to management employees that they want to use salaries to evaluate them; this is punishing employees for not meeting a target when the target was never set. Dr. Hawkins stated that this salary increase is not a matter of evaluating employees; it is a matter of addressing an inequity in salary increases.

President Chavez stated that he did not feel comfortable giving out money until the Governor decided how he is going to distribute funds to education. He felt it was the financial responsibility of the Board to ensure that the District is fiscally solvent; he would like to see this brought back after the Governor decides what kind of funding is available for education and what the limitations are. He did not feel the District should be committing monies at this time.



DENY SALARY INCREASE FOR MANAGEMENT & CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES -MOTION #148 (CONTINUED)	The Superintendent stated that he would be remiss if he did not speak on behalf of management employees. He is instituting an evaluation process that will hold management employees accountable. In addition, he would not bring forward any recommendation if there was a question of fiscal solvency. There is money for this raise, this is a cost of living allowance, and public agencies across the state as well as the over 1,000 school districts in California provide COLA's for their employees. The Superintendent noted that this salary increase impacts all managers in the District including warehouse, transportation, centralized support services, etc. He stated that this is a retroactive salary increase and it is critical to keep principal salaries and other managers in line with benchmark districts. His final words are to say that this group of employees is very deserving.



2004-05 FIRST INTERIM FINANCIAL REPORT

We have received and reviewed your 2004-05 First Interim Financial Report. Your governing board has made a positive certification that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. We have notified the California Department of Education of your district's positive certification. I commend you and your staff for your efforts in the preparation of these reports.

Our analysis of the report included the multi-year financial projections approved by the board. For the current fiscal year, the projections indicate that expenditures and other uses will exceed revenues by \$1,848,427 in the unrestricted general fund and by \$840,181 in the restricted general fund. The deficit spending is primarily due to the one-time expenditures of carryover funds. The projections indicate that the district will be able to meet its financial obligations and maintain minimum state required reserves in the 2005-06 and 2006-07 fiscal years based on the following major assumptions:

Should these assumptions not materialize as planned, the board will need to adjust the budget plan accordingly.

Our analysis also included a review of the cashflow projections submitted with the report. The projected cashflow indicates that the district will have a positive cash balance at the end of the fiscal year.

The First Interim Financial Report indicates that salary negotiations have not been concluded for the current fiscal year. Government Code Section 3547.5 requires that the major provisions of a proposed collective bargaining agreement be disclosed at a public meeting prior to governing board approval. The disclosure must include a written certification signed by the district superintendent and chief business official that the district can meet the costs incurred by the district during the term of the agreement. Please provide a copy of this information to our office ten days prior to board approval.

Education Codes 42126-27 and 42130 require the board to approve multi-year financial projections for the current and at least two subsequent fiscal years that separately project unrestricted resources, restricted resources and the combined general fund. The projections should reflect current and anticipated changes in the district's revenues, operational programs, debt service obligations and/or enrollment and attendance trends. This process will assist the board in providing for the long-range financial stability of the district. Please provide our office with a copy of the updated multi-year financial projections, including assumptions, with the submission of your Second Interim Financial Report.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

For the twelfth year, the Jurupa Unified School District is implementing its open enrollment policy for schools within the district. Our sixteen elementary, three middle schools, and two comprehensive high schools offer a variety of programs designed to meet the needs of children and their families. There are situations which make it desirable for a family to select a school outside of the attendance area designated for their residence. As such, we offer this transfer opportunity through the Open Enrollment process.

Although we are experiencing considerable enrollment growth at most of our schools, once again this year parents may choose to have their children attend a school other than the school of residence, provided there is space. After reviewing data on projected enrollment for the new school year, the District staff determines how many transfer spaces are available at each school. You may find that some schools are unable to accommodate new students because of student growth; others have a few spaces, while others can accommodate a number of transfer requests. If there are more requests for transfers to a particular school than available spaces, district policy requires the use of a random selection procedure.

If you wish to have your child continue to attend the school serving your residence, you do not need to notify the school. Students currently attending a school on an open enrollment transfer need not complete a new application for the 2005-2006 school year unless they are moving up to the 7th or 9th grade, and the school of residence is different than the school which they wish to attend. If you wish your child to attend a school other than the one he/she is currently attending, please follow the instructions on page three.

Your involvement in your child's education is one of the most critical factors in his/her school success. I urge you to visit your child's school and talk to the staff; volunteer when you have time and join the PTA or other parent organization.

BEFORE YOU APPLY, PLEASE CONSIDER:

Parents who wish incoming kindergartners to attend the same transfer school as other siblings must apply for a transfer.

New 7th and 9th graders who wish to attend a school other than the school of residence must apply for a transfer.

If you are anticipating a move, which will change your school of residence, and you wish your child to remain at the present school, you must apply for a transfer.

Secondary students may receive transfers during Open Enrollment, however, it is difficult to obtain a transfer in September because of schedules, and possible credit loss. Students in athletics are required to follow CIF eligibility guidelines.

MEETING RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS: (Education Code 48204)

Students shall have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance provided he or she:

- a. is living with a parent/guardian or caregiver within the district, or
- b. is an emancipated minor living in the district, or
- c. is living in a licensed foster home, family home, state hospital, or licensed children's institution within the district, or
- d. is granted an interdistrict transfer based on the parent/guardian being employed within the boundaries of the school district.

Program Options in the District:

A variety of programs are available in the Jurupa Unified School District. A description of each program is provided below. The directory pages that follow list which programs are offered at each school site.

<u>Special Education</u> - Programs and services are available at each school for students with exceptional needs. Enrollment in these classes will be based on Individualized Education Program placement and space availability.

School Improvement – This state-funded program supports and guides schoolwide improvements to help meet the needs of all students and is offered at all elementary and middle schools.

<u>Title I/EIA</u> – These state and federally-funded programs serve grades Kindergarten through eight for students who need additional academic support in the areas of reading, language, or math and are available at specific schools.

<u>Structured English Immersion Program</u> – English language learners (ELL) receive direct instruction and materials in a Structured English Immersion Program that includes content-based English Language Development (ELD). This English language development is given primary language support by authorized teachers and/or tutors.

<u>Gifted and Talented Education (GATE)</u> – This program serves eligible students in grades kindergarten through twelve at each school, who have been identified as gifted and talented.

<u>Title IV</u> – These federal funds assist each school (K-12) to provide prevention of drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, early intervention, referral or rehabilitation as necessary.

<u>Title VI</u> Innovative— These federal funds assist the school in purchasing library books and instructional materials and also provides counseling for each elementary school through the Youth Service Center of Riverside. Crisis counseling, classroom presentations, and conflict management is available to students one day a week.

Class-Size Reduction - This state program for grades K-2 allows all elementary school to reduce class size to 20 pupils per classroom.

Instrumental Music/Elementary - Three instrumental music teachers provide band instruction at each elementary school, each week.

<u>Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE)</u> – State funding for tobacco-specific student instruction, reinforcement activities, special events and cessation programs for students in grades 4-8.

10th Grade Counseling - This state program provides funds to assist in providing counseling and guidance services to high school students.

<u>Elementary Counseling Program</u> – Through the use of a model student assistance program and life skills training, students and families receive an array of services at the school site. The program also links parents and students to other needed services in the community.

<u>AsCent (middle schools)</u> - Staff from YMCA and Parks and Recreation Department work with school staff to plan and implement an after school program which includes clubs, homework assistance, tutoring, sports and speakers.
