* 8. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High School (Dr. Jindra)

Ms. Rhonda Fuller, teacher at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to New York, New York and Louisville, Kentucky on Saturday, October 22, 2005 through Saturday, October 29, 2005, with five (5) students. The purpose of this trip is for students to receive a patriotic, historical study in New York, Philadelphia and Gettysburg and then continue to Louisville where they will attend the National FFA Convention to obtain leadership training. Costs for the trip will be paid from fundraisers and donations. Transportation will be by air flight; supervision will be by staff members and accommodations will be at local motels. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Ms. Fuller to travel to New York, New York and Louisville, Kentucky with five (5) students on Saturday, October 22, 2005 through Saturday, October 29, 2005.

* 9. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Van Buren Elementary (Dr. Jindra)

Ms. Lynnae Amatriain, teacher at Van Buren Elementary School, is requesting approval to travel to Garner Valley on Tuesday, November 1, 2005 through Friday, November 4, 2005 with approximately one hundred six (106) students. The purpose of this trip is for students to attend the Pathfinder Outdoor Science School where they will receive course work with lecture, laboratory and field experience in the areas of forest ecology, chaparral ecology, freshwater ecology, field geology, ethnobotany, entomology, soil science, anthropology and astronomy. Costs for the trip will be paid from fundraisers, donations and special projects. Transportation will be by district vehicle; supervision will be by staff members and lodging and accommodations will be at the Pathfinder Ranch. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Ms. Amatriain to travel to Garner Valley to attend the Pathfinder Outdoor Science School with approximately one hundred six (106) students on Tuesday, November 1, 2005 through Friday, November 4, 2005.

* D. Approve at First Informational Reading Revised Board Policy 1901, Public Complaint
(Mr. Duchon)
Procedure

At the Board's request, Board Policy 1901, Public Complaint Procedure, received a preliminary review at the September 19, 2005 meeting. During discussion, Board Member Michael Rodriguez requested the addition of a sentence to reflect that if a complaint reaches the level of the Board of Education and a complainant requests that it be heard by the Board, that the request always be granted. This addition appears in bold print in the supporting documents under Board Policy 1901 for the Board's consideration. Following discussion, the Board may wish to approve at first informational reading revised Board Policy 1901, Public Complaint Procedure.

* E. Adopt Resolution #2006/08, Emergency Replacement of Two 10-Ton Rooftop Gas/Electric HVAC Units at Mira Loma Middle School

The two 10-ton rooftop gas/electric HVAC units at Mira Loma Middle School must be replaced immediately. Due to the size of the units, they can only be put in place by helicopter, which requires a contractor with FAA clearances. The units were installed on Saturday, September 24, 2005.

Bidding this work would have delayed installation for approximately 6-8 weeks. Any significant temperature increase or decrease could force the District to temporarily discontinue some classes at Mira Loma Middle School and put students and staff at risk. Maintenance staff cannot repair the units and the units were determined to be unserviceable.

The District obtained three competitive quotes for the installation of the units as shown below:

These items will be purchased out of State Deferred Maintenance Funds. The Public Contract Code requires public works projects exceeding \$14,999 to be legally bid. However, Public Contract Code 20113 states that in an emergency to permit the continuance of existing classes, or to avoid danger to life or property, the Board may adopt a resolution (included in supporting documents) and enter into a contract without advertising for or inviting bids.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #2006/08, Emergency Replacement of Two 10-Ton Rooftop Gas/Electric HVAC Units at Mira Loma Middle School and approve the issuance of Purchase Order #60080 in the amount of \$27,985.00 to Hasco, Inc.

F. Consider Adoption of Resolution #2006/09, Opposing Proposition 74, Public School Teachers – Waiting Period for Permanent Status Period. Dismissal Period, Initiative Statute Period (Mr. Duchon)

The California School Boards Association has provided a sample resolution opposing Proposition 74, Public School Teacher – Waiting Period for Permanent Status Period. They are requesting school boards throughout California to demonstrate their opposition to Proposition 74 by adopting the proposed resolution contained in the supporting documents. This initiative would increase the probationary period from two to five years for public school teachers and would modify the process by which school boards can dismiss a teaching employee who receives two consecutive unsatisfactory performance evaluations. According to CSBA, by extending teachers' probationary periods to five years, this would require local boards and county offices to perform two additional performance evaluations during a teacher's first five years, resulting in an additional 35,000 evaluations each year statewide. Proposition 74 would also redefine "unsatisfactory performance" as it relates to the dismissal of permanent or tenured teachers: a change that could require boards and county offices to abandon their own locally adopted definitions.

Following discussion, <u>Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #2006/09, Opposing Proposition 74, Public School Teachers – Waiting Period for Permanent Status Period.</u>

Dismissal Period, Initiative Statute Period.

G. Consider Adoption of Resolution 2006/10, Opposing Proposition 76, the California Live (Mr. Duchon)

The California School Boards Association (CSBA) provided information concerning Proposition 76, a measure being sponsored by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger called the "Live Within Our Means Act. Governor Schwarzenegger believes that this is a fiscally responsible move that would be ultimately good for schools. However, this bill, according to CSBA, cuts education funding by \$4 billion per year, undermines the basic education funding provisions and guarantees, as expressed by voters when they passed Proposition 98, would place California as one of the lowest states in the nation for per pupil funding, and expose school districts to the threat of mid-year budget cuts. A position paper describing the bill and CSBA's reasons for opposing it are included in the supporting documents. CSBA has stressed its opposition to this measure and is requesting school boards throughout California to demonstrate their opposition to Proposition 76 by adopting the proposed resolution contained in the supporting documents.

Following discussion, Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #2006/10, Opposing Proposition 76, The California Live Within Our Means Act.

H. Approve Purchase of 31 Dell OptiPlex GX620 Computers for Jurupa Valley High School (Mrs. Lauzon)

Jurupa Valley High School is requesting approval to purchase 31 Dell OptiPlex GX620 computers. The computers will be purchased from Dell using the California Education NASPO (DGS State Contract A63307 #N39913654). The purchase will total \$42,118.68. The computers will be purchased using II/USP: SAIT Funds. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of 31 Dell OptiPlex GX620 computers from Dell, in the amount of \$42,118.68 (tax included).

I. <u>Approve Purchase of One (1) Relocatable Restroom Building for Stone Avenue</u> <u>Elementary School</u> (Mrs. Lauzon)

Administration is requesting approval to purchase and install one (1) 12' X 40' relocatable restroom building for Stone Avenue Elementary School. The building is being installed to accommodate growth at the site. The restroom will be purchased utilizing the Nuview Union School District Bid # 2005 — modulars, piggyback contract awarded to Modular Structures International, Inc. The cost to purchase the restroom relocatable will be \$111,053.00. The relocatable will be purchased with Developer Fee Funds.

Administration recommends the Board approve the purchase of one (1) 12' X 40' relocatable restroom building for Stone Avenue Elementary School from Modular Structures International, Inc., in the amount of \$111,053.00.

J. <u>Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Bids for the Site Work Associated with the Installation of One (1) Relocatable Restroom Building for Stone Avenue Elementary School</u> (Mrs. Lauzon)

Administration intends to advertise and solicit bids for the site work associated with the installation of one (1) 12' X 40' relocatable restroom building for Stone Avenue Elementary School. It is anticipated that bids will be solicited during October 2005 and the award of the bid brought back to a Board meeting in December 2005. The site work is estimated to cost approximately \$90,000. The site work will be paid for out of Developer Fee Funds.

Administration recommends the Board approve the advertisement and solicitation of bids for the site work associated with the installation of one (1) relocatable restroom building for Stone Avenue Elementary School.

K. <u>Approve Advertisement and Solicitation of Bids to Purchase and Install Three (3)</u> <u>Marquee Signs for Patriot High School and Jurupa Valley High School</u> (Mrs. Lauzon)

Administration is seeking approval to solicit bids for the purchase and installation of three (3) exterior marquee signs. The purchase is for one marquee sign to be purchased and installed at Jurupa Valley High School and two marquee signs to be purchased and installed at Patriot High School. The purchase will total approximately \$100,000.00.

The marquee for Jurupa Valley High School will be paid for from Measure "C" funds. One marquee for Patriot High School will be paid for from State School Building funds and Measure "C" funds. The second marquee for Patriot High School will be paid for from Rubidoux High School ASB funds.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the advertisement and solicitation of bids to purchase and install three (3) marquee signs for Patriot High School and Jurupa Valley High School.

L. <u>Approve Bid #06/02, Asbestos and Lead Abatements at Pacific Avenue and Pedley Elementary Schools and Mission Middle School</u> (Mrs. Lauzon)

On Tuesday, September 20, 2005, at 2:00 p.m., the Purchasing Department received and opened the bids for the asbestos and lead abatements at Pacific Avenue and Pedley Elementary Schools and Mission Middle School.

The following is a recap of the bids:

The lowest, most responsive bidder was Brickley Environmental. The asbestos and lead abatement projects will be paid for out of Deferred Maintenance Funds.

Administration recommends the Board approve Bid #06/02, Asbestos and Lead Abatements at Pacific Avenue and Pedley Elementary Schools and Mission Middle School, to Brickley Environmental in the amount of \$698,490.00.

M. Approve Purchase of Bookcases for Patriot High School

(Mrs. Lauzon)

The District wishes to purchase the following furnishing, furniture and equipment to be delivered and installed at Patriot High School. Quotes were received as follows:

85 - Maple Bookcases (50-5 shelf & 35-2 shelf)

The bookcases will be purchased out of Furnishing, Furniture and Equipment funds from Measure C and the State School Building Program for the Patriot High School construction project. Board policy requires that purchases in excess of \$12,000.00 be presented to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of 85 bookcases from Oaktree Products in the amount of \$15,273.56 (tax included) for Patriot High School.

N. Approve Purchase of 21 Portable Classroom Ramps

(Mrs. Lauzon)

With the relocation of portable classrooms to accommodate the re-implementation of third grade class size reduction and growth at Rubidoux High School, it will be necessary to install ramps for access to the portable classrooms. These ramps must also adhere to Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. District staff looked at three options to provide for this need: (1) Pour permanent concrete ramps, (2) Rent ramps, and (3) Purchase portable ramps. Due to the fact that these portables will be moving in the future, it does not seem feasible to construct permanent concrete ramps. The cost to rent a ramp is \$150/month, which totals \$1,800/year, plus a set-up fee of \$939 for each ramp. The cost to purchase the ramps directly from the manufacturer, Sunrise Construction, Inc., is \$2,400 per ramp for a total of \$50,400. By purchasing these ramps, they can be moved with the portables at any time. This purchase will be paid for out of Developer Fee Funds.

Administration recommends the Board authorize the purchase of 21 portable classroom ramps from Sunrise Construction, Inc., in the amount of \$50,400 to accommodate the reimplementation of third grade class size reduction and growth at Rubidoux High School.

O. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Duchon)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in the following discipline cases and these cases will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and (SCORE) the School and Community OutREach Team for follow-up:

ADMISSION CASE APPROVED:

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends admission of the pupil in Discipline Case #05-006 to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District.

DENIED READMISSION/APPROVED SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE:

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends denied readmission of the pupil in Discipline Cases #04-124. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended and the pupil be placed on school probation for Fall Semester 2005. The pupil shall be assigned to Jurupa Middle School. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 17, 2006.

SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #06-015 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2005. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion order be suspended and the pupil be placed on school probation for the term of the expulsion order. The pupil shall be assigned to Nueva Vista High School. This case shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 17, 2006.

EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

- 1. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #06-014 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (k) and 48915 (b) for the Fall Semester 2005 and Spring Semester 2006. The pupil shall be assigned to the Jurupa Community School, operated by the Riverside County Office of Education for the term of the expulsion order. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 19, 2006.
- 2. The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends the expulsion of the pupil in Discipline Case #06-019 for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (j), (k) and 48915 (b), (k) for the Fall Semester 2005 and Spring Semester 2006. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center for the term of the expulsion order. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 19, 2006.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

Administration recommends approval of Personnel Report #5 as printed subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

(Mrs. Elzig) 2. Publicize Tentative Agreement with CSEA A tentative agreement has been reached with CSEA on items subject to reopener negotiations for the 2004-2005 school year. Specifically, it has been agreed to continue the salary and health and welfare parity agreements that recently expired. The Agreement also includes criteria for disbursing monies from the classified employee health and welfare benefit pool to allow for a one-time 2% payment to eligible employees to offset the cost of rising health care. Additionally, modifications have been agreed to in three other areas. These areas are Absences and Leaves; Classified Salary Schedule, Application and Ranges; Health and Welfare Benefits; and Duration. A copy of the tentative agreement including these articles is included in the supporting documents with the changes highlighted. We have been informed that CSEA has scheduled the ratification meeting on October 6, 2005. It is anticipated that ratification would occur at that time. Current law (Government Code Section 3527.5) requires that the District disclose major provisions of a collective bargaining agreement at a public meeting prior to final approval by the governing board. A copy should also be made available for public inspection. Additionally, the Riverside County Office of Education requires receipt of disclosure information ten days prior to the Board action on the proposed agreement. These requirements are being met at this time. A completed copy of the "Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreement" form is included with the supporting documents. Assuming that CSEA has ratified, the Board will be asked to ratify the Tentative Agreement at its regular meeting, October 17, 2005.

The 2004/2005 Intradistrict (Open Enrollment) Attendance Permit Summary provides information on incoming and outgoing transfers within the District, and the number of students involved at each school. Total students involved in district open enrollment transfers were 931.

The 2004/2005 Interdistrict Attendance Permit Summary provides information on outgoing and incoming transfers to and from other districts, reasons for the transfers, number of students involved, and identifies the school districts participation in this cooperative venture. 

2. Review Report on Saturday School Program

The Jurupa Unified School District operated the Saturday School Program during the 2004/2005 school year at Rustic Lane and Van Buren Schools for elementary students and Jurupa Valley High School and the Learning Center for middle and high school students. Mira Loma Middle School students attended Mira Loma Middle School. Students were assigned Saturday School in lieu of suspension and were able to clear truancies and unexcused absences when they attended. This year, Saturday School cleared 177 days for students who were assigned to Saturday School in lieu of suspension. The amount to be reimbursed to the District for 177 days x \$27.51 per ADA amounts to \$4,869.27. The ADA recovered by using Saturday School for truancies and unexcused absences was 1,416 days x \$27.51 ADA, which amounted to \$38,954.16. Information only.

Proposition Numbers for Qualifying Initiatives November 2005 Special Election

Proposition 73: Parental Notification for Abortion

This initiative would amend the California Constitution to define and prohibit abortion for unemancipated minors until 48 hours after the physician notifies the minor's parent/guardian, except in medical emergency or with parental waiver.

Proposition 74: Teacher Tenure Reform - Increased Time To Tenure

This initiative would increase the probationary period from two to five years for public teachers and would modify the process by which school boards can dismiss a teaching employee who receives two consecutive unsatisfactory performance evaluations.

Proposition 75: Paycheck Protection - Authorization for Union Political Contributions

This initiative would prohibit using public employee union dues for political contributions without individual employee consent, except when contributions are to benefit charities or employees.

Proposition 76: Live Within Our Means - State Budget Reform

This initiative would limit state spending to the prior year's level plus three previous years' average revenue growth, and would permit the Governor to, under specified circumstances, reduce budget appropriations at his/her discretion.

Proposition 77: Redistricting – Redrawing of Legislative Districts

This initiative would amend California's Constitution to require a three-member panel of retired judges selected by legislative leaders to draw the boundaries for the State Senate, State Assembly, Congressional, and Board of Equalization districts.

Proposition 78: Prescription Drugs – Voluntary Price Controls

This initiative would establish a discount prescription drug program for certain low- and moderate-income Californians. The Department of Health Services would be authorized to contract with participating pharmacies for discounts and with participating drug manufacturers for rebates.

- Amends California Constitution, prohibiting abortion for unemancipated minor until 48 hours after physician notifies minor's parent/legal guardian, except in medical emergency or with parental waiver.
- Defines abortion as causing "death of the unborn child, a child conceived but not yet born."
- Permits minor to obtain court order waiving notice based on clear, convincing evidence of minor's maturity or best interests.
- Mandates various reporting requirements.
- Authorizes monetary damages against physicians for violation.
- Requires minor's consent to abortion, with certain exceptions.
- Permits judicial relief if minor's consent coerced.

Summary of Legislative Analyst's Estimate of Net State and Local GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

· Potential unknown net state costs of several million dollars annually for health and social services programs, the courts, and state administration combined.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

PRIOR STATE LEGISLATION

In 1953, a state law was enacted that allowed minors to receive, without parental consent or notification, the same types of medical care for a pregnancy that are available to an adult. Based on this law and later legal developments related to abortion, minors were able to obtain abortions without parental consent or notification.

In 1987, the Legislature amended this law to require minors to either obtain the consent of a parent or a court before obtaining an abortion. However, due to legal challenges, the law was never implemented, and the California Supreme Court ultimately struck it down in 1997. Consequently, minors in the state currently receive abortion services to the same extent as adults. This includes minors in various state health care programs, such as the Medi-Cal health care program for low-income individuals.





PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS. WAITING PERIOD FOR PERMANENT STATUS. DISMISSAL. INITIATIVE STATUTE.

SUMMARY OF LEGISLATIVE ANALYST'S ESTIMATE OF NET STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

Unknown net effect on school districts' costs for teacher compensation, performance evaluations, and
other activities. The impact would vary significantly by district and depend largely on future personnel
actions by individual school districts.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

Most of the employees of K-12 school districts are referred to as "certificated" employees. These consist mainly of teachers but also include instructional specialists, counselors, and librarians.

All of these employees must have some type of license (or certificate) prior to being employed by a district to show basic qualifications in their job area.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE UNION DUES. RESTRICTIONS ON POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS. EMPLOYEE CONSENT REQUIREMENT. INITIATIVE STATUTE.

• Probably minor state and local government implementation costs, potentially offset in part by revenues from fines and/or fees.





STATE SPENDING AND SCHOOL FUNDING LIMITS. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

STATE SPENDING AND SCHOOL FUNDING LIMITS. Initiative Constitutional Amendment.

- Limits state spending to prior year's level plus three previous years' average revenue geowth.
- Changes state minimum school funding requirements (Proposition 98); eliminates repayment requirement when minimum funding suspended.
- Excludes appropriations above the minimum from schools' funding base.
- Directs excess General Fund revenues, currently directed to schools/tax relief, to budget reserve, specified construction, debt repayment.
- Permits Governor, under specified circumstances, to reduce appropriations of Governor's choosing, including employee compensation/state contracts.
- Continues prior year appropriations if state budget delayed.
- Prohibits state special funds borrowing.
- Requires payment of local government mandates.

Summary of Legislative analyst's Estimate of Net State and Local GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

- The provisions creating an additional state spending limit and granting the Governor new power to reduce spending in most program areas would likely reduce expenditures relative to current law. These reductions also could apply to schools and shift costs to other local governments.
- The new spending limit could result in a smoother pattern of state expenditures over time, especially to the extent that reserves are set aside in good times and available in bad times.
- The provisions changing school funding formulas would make school and community college funding more subject to annual decisions of state policymakers and less affected by a constitutional funding guarantee.
- Relative to current law, the measure could result in a change in the mix of state spending—that is, some programs could receive a larger share and others a smaller share of the total budget.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

SUMMARY

This measure makes major changes to California's Constitution relating to the state budget. As shown in Figure 1, the measure creates an additional state spending limit, grants the Governor substantial new power to unilaterally reduce state spending, and revises key provisions in the California Constitution relating to school and community college funding.

The combined effects of these provisions on state spending are shown in Figure 2. The main impact is a likely reduction in spending over time relative to current law. In addition, the measure could result in a smoother pattern of state spending and a different mix of state expenditures.

Each of the measure's key provisions is discussed in more detail below.

BACKGROUND

CALIFORNIA'S STATE BUDGET

California will spend about \$113 billion to provide public services through its state budget this year.

Figure 1: Proposition 76: Main Provisions

✓ An Additional State Spending Limit

Places a second limit on state expenditures, which would be based on an average of revenue growth in the three prior years.

✓ Expanded Powers for Governor

Grants the Governor substantial new authority to unilaterally reduce state spending during certain fiscal situations.

✓ School Funding Changes

Changes several key provisions in the State Constitution relating to the minimum funding guarantee for K-12 schools and community colleges.

✓ Other Changes

Makes a number of other changes relating to transportation funding; loans between state funds; and payments to schools, local governments, and special funds.



REDISTRICTING. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

REDISTRICTING. INITIATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

- Amends process for redistricting California's Senate, Assembly, Congressional and Board of Equalization districts.
- Requires panel of three retired judges, selected by legislative leaders, to adopt new redistricting plan if
 measure passes and after each national census.
- Panel must consider legislative, public comments/hold public hearings.
- Redistricting plan effective when adopted by panel and filed with Secretary of State; governs next statewide primary/general elections even if voters reject plan.
- If voters reject redistricting plan, process repeats, but officials elected under rejected plan serve full terms.
- Allows 45 days to seek judicial review of adopted redistricting plan.

SUMMARY OF LEGISLATIVE ANALYST'S ESTIMATE OF NET STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

- One-time costs for a redistricting plan. State costs totaling no more than \$1.5 million and county costs in the range of \$1 million.
- Potential reduction in costs for each redistricting effort after 2010, but net impact would depend on decisions by voters.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

Every ten years, the federal census counts the number of people living in California. The California Constitution requires the Legislature after each census to adjust the boundaries of the districts used to elect public officials. This process is called "redistricting" (or sometimes "reapportionment"). The primary purpose of redistricting is to establish districts which are "reasonably equal" in population. Redistricting affects districts for the state Legislature (Assembly and Senate), Board of Equalization (BOE), and the U.S. House of Representatives.

Typically, redistricting plans are included in legislation and become law after passage of the bill by the Legislature and signature by the Governor. In the past, when the Legislature and Governor have been unable to agree on redistricting plans, the California Supreme Court oversaw the redistricting.

PROPOSAL

This measure amends the California Constitution to change the redistricting process for the state Legislature, BOE, and California members of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Panel of Retired Judges. This measure requires that a three-member panel of retired federal and/or state judges ("special masters") develop redistricting plans. The measure requires that the judges meet a number of criteria, including that they have never held partisan political office. (The nearby box provides more detail on the selection process for the special masters.)

Requirements of District Boundaries. The measure adds new requirements regarding the drawing of district boundaries. Among these requirements are:

- For the Legislature and BOE, population differences among districts cannot exceed 1 percent.
- Senate districts must be comprised of two adjacent Assembly districts, and BOE districts must be comprised of ten adjacent Senate districts.
- The plan must minimize the splitting of counties and cities into multiple districts.

In addition, when drawing boundaries, the panel could not consider information related to political party affiliations and other specified matters.

Schedule. A panel would be required to develop a redistricting plan for use at the next primary and general elections following the measure's approval and then following each future federal census.





DISCOUNTS ON PRESCRIPTION DRUGS. INITIATIVE STATUTE.

- Imposes \$15 annual application fee.
- Creates state fund for deposit of drug manufacturers' rebate payments.
- Requires Department's prompt determination of residents' eligibility, based on listed qualifications.
- Permits outreach programs to increase public awareness.
- Allows program to be terminated under specified conditions.

Summary of Legislative Analyst's Estimate of Net State and Local GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

- One-time and ongoing state costs, potentially in the millions to low tens of millions of dollars annually, for administration and outreach activities for a new drug discount program. A significant share of these costs would probably be borne by the state General Fund.
- State costs, potentially in the low tens of millions of dollars, to cover the funding gap between when drug rebates are collected by the state and when the state pays funds to pharmacies for drug discounts provided to consumers. Any such costs not covered through advance rebate payments from drug makers would be borne by the state General Fund.
- Unknown potentially significant savings for state and county health programs due to the availability of drug
- Potential unknown effects on state revenues and expenditures from changes in prices and quantities of drugs sold in California.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

Prescription Drug Coverage. Currently, several state and federal programs provide prescription drug coverage to eligible individuals. The state's Medi-Cal Program, which is administered by the Department of Health Services (DHS), provides prescription drugs for low-income children and adults. The state's Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board administers the Healthy Families Program, which provides prescription drugs for children in low-income and moderate-income families who do not qualify for Medi-Cal.

Beginning January 2006, the federal government will provide prescription drug coverage to persons enrolled in Medicare, a federal health program for elderly and disabled persons. (This would include some persons enrolled in Medi-Cal who are also enrolled in Medicare.) Various other programs funded with state or federal funds also provide assistance to help pay part or all of the cost of drugs for specified individuals.

In addition, many Californians receive coverage for prescription drugs through private insurance that is purchased by individuals or provided by their employer or the employer of a member of their

Drug Discount Programs. California, a number of other states, and private associations and drug makers have established drug discount programs. These programs help certain consumers, including individuals who are not eligible for state and federal programs that provide drug coverage, purchase prescription drugs at reduced prices. Current California law, for example, requires retail pharmacies to sell prescription drugs at a discount to elderly and disabled persons enrolled in Medicare as a condition of a pharmacy's participation in the Medi-Cal Program.

PROPOSAL

This proposition creates a new state drug discount program to reduce the costs that certain residents of the state would pay for prescription drugs purchased at pharmacies. The major components of the measure are outlined below.

- Rebates must be deposited in State Treasury fund, used only to reimburse pharmacies for discounts and to offset costs of administration.
- At least 95% of rebates must go to fund discounts.
- Establishes oversight board.
- Makes prescription drug profiteering, as described, unlawful.

Summary of Legislative Analyst's Estimate of Net State and Local GOVERNMENT FISCAL IMPACT:

- · One-time and ongoing state costs, potentially in the low tens of millions of dollars annually, for administration and outreach activities for a new drug discount program. A significant share of these costs would probably be borne by the state General Fund.
- State costs, potentially in the low tens of millions of dollars, to cover the funding gap between when drug rebates are collected by the state and when the state pays funds to pharmacies for drug discounts provided to consumers. Any such costs not covered through advance rebate payments from drug makers would be borne by the state General Fund.
- Unknown potentially significant net costs or savings as a result of provisions linking state Medi-Cal rebate contracts and the new drug discount program.
- Unknown potentially significant savings for state and county health programs due to the availability of drug
- Unknown costs and revenues from the provisions regarding lawsuits over profiteering on drug sales.
- Potential unknown effects on state revenues and expenditures from changes in prices and quantities of drugs sold in California.

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

Prescription Drug Coverage. Currently, several state and federal programs provide prescription drug coverage to eligible individuals. The state's Medi-Cal Program, which is administered by the Department of Health Services (DHS), provides prescription drugs for low-income children and adults. The state's Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board administers the Healthy Families Program, which provides prescription drugs for children in low-income and moderate-income families who do not qualify for Medi-Cal.

Beginning January 2006, the federal government will provide prescription drug coverage to persons also enrolled in Medicare, a federal health program for elderly and disabled persons. (This would include

ANALYSIS BY THE LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

BACKGROUND

Provision of Electricity Service. Californians generally receive their electricity service from one of three types of providers: investor owned utilities (IOUs), local publicly owned electric utilities, and electric service providers (ESPs). Investor owned utilities have a defined geographic service area and are required by law to serve customers in that area. The three largest electricity IOUs in the state are Pacific Gas & Electric Company, Southern California Edison Company, and San Diego Gas & Electric Company. The California Public Utilities Commission (PUC) regulates the IOUs' rates and how electricity service is provided to their customers (commonly referred to as "terms of service"). (See the nearby text box for definitions of commonly used terms throughout this analysis.)

Publicly owned electric utilities are public entities that provide electric service to residents and businesses in their local area. Unlike IOUs, they are not regulated by the PUC. Major publicly owned electric utilities include the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, the Sacramento Municipal Utility District, and the Imperial Irrigation District.

The ESPs provide retail electricity service to customers who have chosen not to receive electricity service from the utility that serves their area.

Instead, these customers have entered into "direct access" contracts with ESPs for their electricity. This electricity is delivered to these ESP customers through the transmission and distribution system of their local utility. There are currently eighteen registered ESPs operating in the state, generally serving large industrial and commercial businesses. The ESPs also provide electricity to certain state and local government entities, such as the California State University system, several University of California campuses, some community college districts, and some local school districts.

Under current law, ESPs are only required to register with the PUC for licensing purposes; their rates and terms of service are not regulated by the PUC. However, the PUC has applied certain additional requirements to ESPs (discussed below).

Currently, the IOUs provide about 71 percent of the electricity in the state; publicly owned electric utilities provide 14 percent; ESPs provide 11 percent; and the state's Department of Water Resources provides 4 percent (chiefly for the operation of the State Water Project).

Deregulation and Direct Access. California began the process of restructuring electricity service in the early 1990s by introducing competition into the generation of electricity, with the ultimate goal being lower prices for IOU customers. The plan ultimately adopted in 1996 included a "transition"

Mrs. Pam Lauzon, Business Manager, stated that the 2004/2005 fiscal year is now over and all actual revenue and expenditure amounts are available, which are referred to as the 2004/2005 Unaudited Actuals. The major differences between the budget estimates and the Unaudited Actuals are \$2,566,535 less than anticipated in revenue and \$3,002,490 less than anticipated for Expenditures Plus Other Sources and Uses. These changes resulted in an increase in the Total Ending Balance of \$413,521. The unrestricted portion of the Ending Balance increased by \$240,205. This reflects an increase of \$90,496 in the carryover balances along with an increase of \$149,711 to the unrestricted reserve. The restricted portion of the Ending Balance increased by \$173,316 and offsetting expenditures were adjusted.

Mr. Harris favored the K-8 concept; he felt that it would ultimately provide schools for students at a lower cost, saving the District approximately \$5 million, and it provided the flexibility needed for the District when it is unclear whether more space would be needed for elementary students or middle school students.

Mr. Rodriguez asked Mr. Cartozian if he had ever donated to the Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center. Mr. Cartozian said, no, he had not. Mrs. Burns, (clarified later stated that she said this in jest), asked him if he would like to. President Chavez said that comments were out of order. Mr. Cartozian then proceeded to address several questions raised by Board members.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE A K-8 SCHOOL TO BE PLANNED, DESIGNED AND BUILT FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL #17. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED 3-1, NAY, MR. RODRIGUEZ; 1 ABSTENTION, MR. HARRIS.

DISCUSS AND APPROVE K-8 SCHOOL FOR ELEMENTARY #19 -MOTION #65 President Chavez questioned whether there was a Conflict of Interest for Mrs. Burns on this matter. The Superintendent stated that according to the opinion of legal counsel which Board members had before them, this item did not constitute a Conflict of Interest for Mrs. Burns. Mrs. Burns said that the District has a legal opinion before them stating there is not a Conflict of Interest for her on this item; therefore, she did not plan on removing herself from the Board Room. Mr. Rodriguez suggested obtaining an opinion from another law firm on the matter; he suggested tabling the matter until the District receives a second opinion.

Mr. Harris said that he did not see a Conflict of Interest on this matter for Mrs. Burns; he disagreed with Mr. Rodriguez. Mr. Knight said that the District has a legal opinion before them from a law firm that the District has been working with for numerous years and the Board needs to move forward. Mrs. Burns said that the objection to her voting on this matter is a personal slam; she appreciated making sure this was not a Conflict of Interest for her; however, with a legal opinion before the Board stating that it is not a Conflict of Interest, to entertain further discussion on this matter is nonsense. Mr. Rodriguez said that he would like to recommend tabling this item to be sure that no one needs to leave the room on this matter; this is not a question of someone being attacked; he wanted to ensure that later on, the District is not subject to a lawsuit. MR. RODRIGUEZ MOVED TO TABLE APPROVAL FOR A K-8 SCHOOL FOR ELEMENTARY #19. PRESIDENT CHAVEZ SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH DID NOT CARRY 3-2, NAY, MR. KNIGHT, MRS. BURNS, MR. HARRIS; AYE, PRESIDENT CHAVEZ, MR. RODRIGUEZ.



DISCUSS AND APPROVE K-8 SCHOOL FOR ELEMENTARY #19 -MOTION #65 (CONTINUED) Mrs. Burns said that there is clearly a hidden agenda here since at the last meeting the Board did not go forward on this item either. Mr. Rodriguez emphasized the importance of handling this properly; waiting two weeks to obtain a second opinion on whether Mrs. Burns should vote would not hurt the project.

Mrs. Pam Lauzon stated that Elementary School #19 will be located west of the 15 freeway, near Bellegrave and Hamner Avenues. The elementary school will be adjacent to *The Resort*, a Lewis Operating Corporations development. The school will be built with joint use of the park located adjacent to the school site. Students from the Swan Lake Mobile Home Park, the Homecoming Apartment Complex, and any other developments in the area would attend this school. Based on the advantages and the need to provide for elementary and middle school students on the west end of the District, administration recommends that Elementary #19 be designed and built as a K-8 school.

Mr. Rodriguez questioned whether this item constituted a Conflict of Interest for Mr. Harris. President Chavez said he did not see a reason for this ruling. Mr. Rodriguez said that it would be a Conflict of Interest if there is any financial gain on his part or if he planned to have sales to this company. Mr. Harris said that he has not, as yet, conducted any business with this company; he has called on Architecture4Education, but they did no business together. He then retracted his comment.

Mr. Randall Lewis stated that he is very sorry for what has happened regarding this matter; it is the kids who will suffer if a school is not built in this area. He has been discussing with District staff over the past 1½ years the importance of doing the right thing for the children. As far as a Conflict of Interest matter, he makes hundreds of donations to organizations; this one was made because of the interest of his daughter in paleontology, he apologized openly for this mistake. Mr. Lewis reviewed for the Board the concept and design of his development, *The Resort*. He said that the K-8 concept is good for the community and it has educational benefits for the students. Ms. Miriam Grethel and Mr. Craig Windsor, Architecture4Education representatives, presented a preliminary design for Elementary School #19 as a K-8 school and responded to questions raised by Board members.

MR. KNIGHT MOVED THE BOARD APPROVE A K-8 SCHOOL TO BE PLANNED, DEVELOPED AND BUILT FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL #19. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED 3-1, NAY, MR. RODRIGUEZ (MR. KNIGHT WAS NOT PRESENT IN THE BOARD ROOM WHEN THE VOTE WAS TAKEN).

APPROVE HOLDING BOARD MEETING BEYOND 11:00 P.M. -MOTION #66 President Chavez noted that it is getting close to the eleven o'clock hour, there are approximately 16 items left to address, and a motion is needed to determine whether to continue the Board meeting past 11:00 p.m. The Superintendent noted that there are approximately ten items that still need to be addressed. MR. KNIGHT MOVED TO COMPLETE THE AGENDA AS PRINTED AND HOLD THE MEETING BEYOND 11:00 P.M. MRS. BURNS SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. Mr. Rodriguez noted that although he agreed to hold the meeting past 11:00 p.m., Board members should not have to reduce the number of questions they want to ask because of how late it is. He felt that the meeting should have started on time.

PUBLIC COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

- A. The District recognizes the integrity and professionalism of employees and desires to support their actions in such a manner that they are freed from unnecessary, spiteful, or negative criticism and complaints.
- B. Every effort will be made to resolve complaints concerning employees at the earliest possible stage in accordance with the following procedures:
 - Complaints concerning employees should, whenever possible, be made by the complainant directly to the employee against whom the complaint is lodged.
 - Complaints not resolved at the informal level above, shall be directed by the complainant to the employee's immediate supervisor.
 - a. Any complaint regarding the employee's job performance shall be discussed with the employee as soon as possible.
 - b. Should the immediate supervisor or involved employee deem it appropriate, a meeting shall be held with the complainant, employee and administrator to review the stated concern. Such meetings shall be held at reasonable time (within the employee's workday) and place mutually agreed upon by the parties. Adequate notice of the complaint shall be given to the employee prior to the meeting.
 - c. If informal discussion between the administrator and the complainant fails to bring about resolution of the complaint, the complainant shall be requested to state the complaint in writing. Such written complaint shall be discussed with the involved employee. Failure of the complainant to state the complaint in writing shall be deemed by the District to be a withdrawal of the complaint.
 - d. The administrative supervisor shall appropriately review and analyze the written complaint and submit resolution strategies to the complainant and involved employee.
 - 3. If the complaint, after review by the immediate supervisor, remains unresolved, the supervisor shall refer the written complaint, together with the supervisor's report and analysis of the situation, to the Superintendent/designee. The resolution decision of the Superintendent/designee shall be final unless the complainant, the employee or the Superintendent requests a closed hearing before the Board of Education on the complaint. All requests for a closed hearing before the Board of Education will be granted.
 - 4. No hearing will be held by the Board of Education on any complaint unless and until the Board has received the Superintendent's written report concerning the complaint.



PUBLIC COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

The Superintendent's report shall contain, but not be limited to, the following:

- The name of each employee involved.
- b. A brief but specific summary of the nature of the complaint and the facts surrounding it, sufficient to inform the Board and the employee(s) as to the precise nature of the complaint and to allow the employee to prepare a defense.
- c. A true copy of the signed original of the complaint itself.
- d. A summary of the action taken by the Superintendent in connection with the complaint, with the Superintendent's specific finding that the disposition of the case at the Superintendent's level has not been possible and the reasons therefore.
- e. The written report of the Superintendent shall be provided to the employee(s) involved at least five (5) workdays prior to any hearing held by the Board on such complaint.
- 5. All parties involved, including the school administration, shall be requested to attend such a hearing for the purposes of presentation of all available evidence, allowing every opportunity for explanation, for clarifying the issue.
- 6. The decision of the Board following the hearing shall be final. Any action of the Board shall be consistent with the terms of the existing Collective Bargaining Agreement(s).
- C. Uncorroborated complaints received or any information received from undisclosed complainants shall not adversely affect the performance evaluation of any employee.
- D. Any involved employee shall be afforded the full right to representation at all stages of this procedure.

Resolution #2006/09

Opposing Proposition 74, Public School Teachers – Waiting Period for Permanent Status Period. Dismissal Period, Initiative Statute Period

- WHEREAS, Trustees on local school boards and county boards of education are elected by their communities to recruit, hire and evaluate the teachers who educate the state's 6 million students; and,
- WHEREAS, The self-described "Put the Kids First Act," Proposition 74 on the November 8th ballot, is desperately simple and misleading: it claims to help school boards and county offices do their jobs while at the same time undermining their authority; and
- WHEREAS, The measure would make it more difficult for school boards and county offices to evaluate and dismiss underperforming teachers, but do nothing to reform the most cumbersome and expensive components of the existing tenure system; and
- WHEREAS, Proposition 74 would result in damaging unintended consequences on school boards and county offices by changing probationary periods for teachers and redefining unsatisfactory performance; and
- WHEREAS, Under current law the probationary period for teachers is two years, with performance evaluations required at least once each year for probationary teachers and at least once every two years for teachers with permanent status; and
- WHEREAS, Proposition 74 would extend teachers' probationary periods to five years, thus requiring local boards and county offices to perform two additional performance evaluations during a teacher's first five years, resulting in an additional 35,000 evaluations each year statewide; and
- WHEREAS, Proposition 74 would redefine "unsatisfactory performance" as it relates to the dismissal of permanent or tenured teachers: a change that could require boards and county offices to abandon their own locally adopted definitions; and
- WHEREAS, The initiative would also specifically link the definition of unsatisfactory performance that must be negotiated with teachers through collective bargaining, dramatically raising the stakes for these evaluations; and



- WHEREAS, This change could result in protracted negotiations over evaluation procedures, with impasses likely in many cases and an increase in grievances over evaluation procedures; and
- WHEREAS, The statewide costs of this expansion of the scope of collective bargaining and the additional evaluations required by the measure could run into the millions of dollars annually costs for which districts and county offices would not be reimbursed;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Jurupa Unified School District strongly opposes Proposition 74 on the November 8th special election ballot.

Resolution #2006/10 Opposing Proposition 76, The California Live Within Our Means Act

- California's 6 million students deserve high-quality schools with WHEREAS. well-trained educators, small class sizes, quality instructional materials, up-to-date textbooks and dynamic parental support; and.
- The California Live Within Our Means Act (Proposition 76) would WHEREAS. upset the balance of power between the governor and the legislature by giving the governor the power to both create and declare a fiscal emergency and then to take unilateral budget actions; and
- These actions give the governor the ability to cut mid-year WHEREAS, budgets at his discretion, which violates the constitutional priority given to K-12 by the voters of California and places K-12 funding at the mercy of the politics of the moment; and
- Proposition 76 would also eliminate basic provisions and WHEREAS, guarantees as provided by voters when they passed Proposition 98, including making the 2004-05 reductions to school funding permanent rather than temporary, and eliminating the requirement to restore any reductions to the funding guarantee; and
- Proposition 76 would seriously undermine the continuity and WHEREAS, quality of instructional programs by exposing schools to unstable funding and the constant threat of mid-year cuts, making it impossible to plan and budget for ongoing spending commitments because of the possibility of spending increases in one year and reductions the next year; and
- Proposition 76 would severely impact the funding base for WHEREAS, schools - resulting in as much as \$4 billion (\$600 per student) per year below the minimum funding base required by current law; and
- If Proposition 76 is approved, California would continue its WHEREAS, downward spiral from ranking in the top ten in per pupil funding to one of the lowest states in the nation (a recent "Quality Counts 2005" report by Education Week ranks California 44th in the nation); and



- WHEREAS, California schools have already suffered \$9.8 billion in cuts and deferrals in the last several years resulting in school closures, increases in class size, layoffs of teachers and support staff, and a shameful shortage of librarians, counselors, nurses, custodians and groundskeepers throughout the state; and
- WHEREAS, Proposition 76 breaks several promises made by Governor Schwarzenegger and the legislature to repay and restore minimum Proposition 98 base funding and settle-up funds; and
- WHEREAS, The California Live Within Our Means Act (Proposition 76) is unsound public policy, and unfairly punishes schools and students and undermines the education funding protections voters say they want;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Jurupa Unified School District strongly opposes Proposition 76 on the November 8 special election ballot.


