- 3. <u>Administrative Reports and Written Communications Blueprint for Learning Point 1:</u> Focus Fiscal Resources
  - a. Hear Report on Special Education Legislative Action Day (Mr. Duchon 5 Minutes) May 2, 2006 was designated as Special Education Legislative Action Day. This event is held annually in Sacramento, with the purpose of raising legislative awareness and advancing key topics of interest for special education students in our state. Special Education Local Planning Agency (SELPA) representatives from around the state participated in this annual event. SELPA Community Advisory Council (CAC) parent advisory representatives are also invited to participate.

This year, the District's parent and Riverside County SELPA CAC representative, Ms. Marybeth Feild, and her son, R.J. Feild, were selected to attend the Legislative Action Day event. R.J. has additionally distinguished himself as the first student delegate selected to attend this event. The District and Riverside County SELPA are proud to have Ms. Feild and Mira Loma Middle School eighth grader, R.J. Field, representing the local SELPA at this important event. This year's key topics included: "Impact of Bifurcated COLA for Special Education" and "Fully Funded Mental Health Services." Ms. Feild will be present to provide a brief report to the Board regarding her involvement as a parent advisor on the SELPA CAC. Information only.

- \* b. Accept Initial Bargaining Proposal from NEA-J (Mrs. Elzig 2 Minutes) The District is in receipt of the initial contract re-opener proposal from NEA-J for the 2006-2007 school year. It is recommended that the Board receive the proposal and withhold comment at this time. This proposal is being publicized to permit public comments in the hearing session at the regular Board Meeting on June 19, 2006.
- \* c. Announce Initial District Proposal for Negotiations with CSEA (Mrs. Elzig 2 Minutes) The Board will have reviewed in Closed Session the District's preliminary proposal for re-opener negotiations with CSEA. If the Board is prepared, this proposal will be publicized at this time to permit public comments in the verbal hearing session at the regular Board Meeting on June 19, 2006. Information only.
  - d. <u>Hear Report on K-8 Summer ELO Program</u> (Dr. Jindra 2 Minutes) The first day of the summer K-8 Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) program will begin on July 10<sup>th</sup> and end on August 9<sup>th</sup>. The program will start with approximately 4,000 students in attendance in grades K-8, respectively, 2,500 in grades K-5 and 1,500 in grades 6-8. The program runs from Monday through Thursday.

The school sites this year where the program will be held are Ina Arbuckle, Granite Hill, Van Buren, Peralta, Mira Loma Middle, and Jurupa Middle schools. Funds from the state's "Retention/At Risk of Retention and Core Academic" programs were combined with funding from federal Title I to maximize the number of students that could be served. All grades 6-8 students will be attending their respective middle school site based on their high school feeder (i.e., Jurupa Valley students at Mira Loma; and Rubidoux students at Jurupa Middle). The District is adding two School Readiness programs, one at Ina Arbuckle and the other at Van Buren, for pre-kindergarten students. In addition, there is one Newcomer program at Ina Arbuckle.

d. Hear Report on K-8 Summer ELO Program (Continued)

(Dr. Jindra – 2 Minutes)

ELO focuses on State standards in the areas of language arts, mathematics, and English language development (ELD). ELO also features standards-based reading, writing, ELD, and mathematics materials; standards-aligned lesson plans and homework packets; purchase orders for teachers to obtain standards-based supplemental materials; and report cards that communicate pre- and post-test scores on standards mastery to parents, teachers, and principals.

The following support is also included: transportation, breakfast, lunch, principals that administer the program and two TSAs at each school—one to manage the site and one to coach teachers on their implementation of the instructional program. Each site also receives a secretary and translator clerk, a food services worker, a roving nurse, health aide, three activity supervisors, two campus supervisors at the middle school, two custodians, and crossing guards. The conference will be held in Englewood, Colorado, Monday, July 24, 2006 through Tuesday, July 25, 2006. While attending the conference, Mr. Trujillo will have the opportunity to further enhance his knowledge, leadership and facilitation skills, which he uses continuously with departments and small groups of teachers. The academic progress of Rubidoux High School over the last three years is largely attributed to the teachings of Doug Reeves and the Center for Performance Assessment. Travel will be by air. All expenses will be paid by Mr. Trujillo. A copy of the Travel Request is included in the supporting documents. - \*10. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High (Dr. Jindra) Mr. Jay Hammer, head cross country coach at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Mammoth Lakes on Saturday, July 29, 2006 through Saturday, August 5, 2006 with approximately fifteen (15) students. The purpose of this trip is for students to train at a very high altitude which will improve their endurance. Costs for the trip will be paid through various fundraisers and donations. Transportation will be by district vehicle and private cars; supervision will be provided by staff members; lodging and accommodations will be at a local hotel and restaurants. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Hammer to travel to Mammoth Lakes with approximately fifteen (15) students on Saturday, July 29, 2006 through Saturday, August 5, 2006.
- Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Rubidoux High Girls Cross \*11. Country Varsity Team (Dr. Jindra) Mr. Jay Hammer, head cross country coach at Rubidoux High School, is requesting approval to travel to Big Bear on Monday, August 21, 2006 through Wednesday, August 23, 2006 with approximately ten (10) students. The purpose of this trip is to provide team building skills and high altitude training for the Rubidoux Girls Cross Country varsity team. Supervision will be provided by Mr. Jay Hammer, Head Coach, Ms. Shannon Robinson, Assistant Coach, and a parent volunteer; district vehicles will be used to provide transportation; lodging will be provided at the Hammer private lodge. There will be no cost to the team members for this experience. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Hammer to travel to Big Bear with approximately ten (10) students on Monday, August 21, 2006 through Wednesday, August 23, 2006.

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\*12. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Jurupa Middle School (Dr. Jindra) Mr. Jay Hakomaki, teacher at Jurupa Middle School, is requesting approval to travel to Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. on Monday, April 9, 2007 through Wednesday, April 18, 2007 with approximately fifty (50) students. The purpose of this trip is for students to experience the places and events that formed the beginning of the United States. This trip will also greatly reinforce the eighth grade History Curriculum Standards. Costs for the trip will be paid through fundraisers and donations. Transportation will be by district vehicle to the airport; supervision will be provided by staff members; lodging and accommodations will be provided by EF Tours. Administration has been assured that no student will be denied an opportunity to participate in this activity due to the lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request from Mr. Hakomaki to travel to Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. with approximately fifty (50) students on Monday, April 9, 2007 through Wednesday, April 18, 2007.

- B. Take Necessary and Appropriate Action Related to Governing Board Election of November 7, 2006 (Mr. Duchon 5 Minutes) In accordance with Education Code Sections 5323 and 5340, "school district governing board member elections for two or more school districts of any type to be held in the same district or area on the same day shall be consolidated..." The purpose is to allow persons entitled to vote in two or more such elections to do so at the same time and place and with one ballot. Also, the cost of the election to each district is kept lower by consolidation.
  - 1. Adopt Resolution #2006/46, Ordering Consolidated Governing Board Member Biennial Election, Specifications of the Election Order, and Request for Consolidation
    The seats of Trustee Area 1 (now held by Michael Rodriguez), Trustee Area 3 (now held by Mary Burns), and Trustee Area 5 (now held by Sam Knight), will expire November 30, 2006. The new term will begin the first Friday in December, which is December 1, 2006, for all three seats. The terms of Trustee Areas 2 and 4 will expire December 5, 2008.

To meet requirements of Education Code Sections 5304, 5322, and 5340, Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2006/46, Ordering of an Election November 7, 2006, which includes the Specifications of the Election Order and Request for Consolidation.

2. Review District Policy Regarding Payment of Cost of Candidate Statements

# C. Approve Five Point Plan for Dress Code, Language, Clean & Safe Campuses and Student Discipline Standards - Blueprint for Learning Point 5 - The Support

(Mr. Duchon – 30 Minutes)

Board President Carl Harris requested to review the District's dress code, language, clean and safe campuses and student discipline standards and practices as they relate to campus environment. The supporting documents contain copies of relevant policies as well as current high school and middle school dress code comparisons. Information will be presented on current policies and practices, and the Board will be asked to consider whether revision in policy is necessary and to approve the following five point plan:

#### (1) Set Standards

- Review current policies and Board standards.
- Review other district standards and enforcement procedures.
- Visit other sites.
- Set standards for dress, demeanor, and behavior, including the use of profanity, and clean and safe campuses.

#### (2) Notify Parents, Students and Staff

- Letters will be sent to all parents before the close of school indicating that dress, language, clean and safe campuses and student discipline standards will be tightened.
- Students and staff will be provided with information during the summer and orientation at the beginning of school.
- Staff will be provided with extra training.

#### (3) Provide Staff with Resources to Implement Standards

- Conduct benchmark studies of other districts.
- Evaluate current structures.
- Consider adding temporary staff at the beginning of the year to provide extra reinforcement to staff.
- Appropriate staff with credentialed personnel to handle discipline follow-through and reinforcement.
- Consider modifying or adding new job descriptions for personnel.

#### (4) Enforce Standards with Appropriate Consequences and Follow-Through

- As mentioned above, provide extra staff at the beginning of the year to enforce standards and support school site staff with disciplinary procedures.
- Continually communicate to parents and staff in newsletters, on the web site and in the press.
- While setting clear and unmistakable standards with attached consequences for non-compliance, assuring that the punishment meets the crime as determined by Administration, also assuring that students are appropriately disciplined for violations of dress code, use of profanity and inappropriate behavior on the school campus.
- Explore the use of security cameras.

#### (5) Reward Good Behavior

 Provide principals with resources to reward students for clean campuses, good behavior and appropriate dress.

Administration recommends approval of the Five Point Plan for Dress Code, Language, Clean and Safe Campuses and Student Discipline Standards to be fully implemented by the start of the 2006-2007 school year.

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# \* D. <u>Approve Submittal of Golden Bell Award Application</u> Blueprint for Learning – Delivery Step 10 – Celebrate

(Mr. Duchon – 2 Minutes)

The Golden Bell Award is a program sponsored by the California School Boards Association to recognize excellence. Jurupa Unified School District and the University of California are applying for this prestigious award to recognize the successful Jurupa Unified School District/UCR partnership. The Jurupa Unified School District and the University of California have been in a professional development partnership for the past four years, and wish to submit a Golden Bell Award Application for the Jurupa Unified School District/UCR Mathematical ACTS Partnership. Applications must be postmarked by June 16, 2006. The winners will be selected in October and honored in San Francisco at the California School Boards Association's annual Education Conference.

Administration recommends approval to submit the application of the Jurupa Unified School District/UCR Mathematical ACTS Partnership for the Golden Bell Award.

# E. <u>Approve Submittal of High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP) Application</u> <u>Blueprint for Learning Point 3: Focus Fiscal Resources</u> (Dr. Jindra – 3 Minutes)

The California Department of Education (CDE) announced that the Legislature has authorized funding for a second cohort of schools to participate in the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP). Two schools in the District were identified for participation, Glen Avon and Pedley Elementary Schools. Priority for participation in the program was determined by ranking schools in deciles 1, 2, and 3 that have not previously received funds from HPSGP, the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP), or the Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) program. CDE will allocate \$50,000 for each school accepting the invitation to participate in order to assist in the development of a plan designed to improve student learning and school academic performance. This modified school Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) must support coherent implementation of the nine Essential Program Components (EPCs) endorsed by the State Board of Education.

Following the planning process, the modified SPSA must be submitted to CDE in order to be considered for funding of the implementation process. This process will provide schools with \$400 per student for up to four years. Schools accepting implementation funds will be subject to the conditions of the Public Schools Accountability Act pertaining to the HPSGP.

Grant award notification letters would be sent by CDE on June 9, 2006 and the district's Board would need to approve the modified SPSA and application packet by January 15, 2007. HPSGP schools would begin to implement their school plans on July 1, 2007.

Administration recommends approval to submit the High Priority Schools Grant program Application.

#### F. Approve for Review 4-6 Reading Intervention Series

(Dr. Jindra – 2 Minutes)

Blueprint for Learning Point 3: The Materials

A committee of upper grade elementary teachers convened on March 27 and April 11, 2006 to review the California State Board of Education approved textbooks for grades 4-6 Reading Intervention. The textbooks reviewed were as follows:

- (a) High Point, Hampton Brown Publishers
- (b) Language! 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition, Sopris West Educational Services

After careful review by the committee members and completion of an evaluation for each reading intervention series, *Language!* 3<sup>rd</sup> *Edition* received the highest evaluation average of 11.69 out of a possible score of 15. *Language!* 3<sup>rd</sup> *Edition* was selected as the best suited Reading Intervention series to meet the needs of 4-6 grade students in the Jurupa Unified School District. The following factors influenced the recommendation:

- (a) Explicit phonics instruction
- (b) Aligns with District Step Up To Writing Program
- (c) Lessons taught to mastery
- (d) Variety of ongoing and frequent assessments

Instructional Council approved the selection at the May 22, 2006 meeting. <u>Administration</u> recommends that the Board approve for review the 4-6 grade Reading Intervention series, *Language!* 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition, Sopris West Educational Services.

# G. <u>Approve for Review K-5 English Language Development Series</u>(Dr. Jindra – 2 Minutes) Blueprint for Learning Point 3: The Materials

A committee of English Learner Facilitators convened on March 25, 2005 and April 14, 2006 to review the SB 1113 textbooks for English Language Development. The English Language Development series reviewed were as follows:

- (a) Avenues, Hampton Brown Publishing
- (b) National Geographic, National Geographic School Publishing
- (c) On Our Way to English, Harcourt Achieve, Rigby & Steck-Vaughn

On April 14, 2006, by way of consensus the Jurupa Unified School District's English Learner Facilitators selected *On Our Way to English* published by Harcourt Achieve, Rigby & Steck-Vaughn, for the K-5 English Language Development series. A representative for each elementary school participated in the selection process. The following factors influenced the recommendation:

- (e) Lessons designed for 30 minutes of instruction
- (f) Serves student needs based on current student fluency levels
- (g) Prior SB 1113 approval from the California Department of Education

Instructional Council approved the selection at the May 22, 2006 meeting. <u>Administration recommends that the Board approve for review the K-5 English Language Development series</u>, *On Our Way to English*, Harcourt Achieve, Rigby & Steck-Vaughn.

# H. <u>Approve High School Instructional Materials for Review</u> (Dr. Jindra – 2 Minutes) Blueprint for Learning Point 3: The Materials

The following instructional materials were presented to the Instructional Council at its regular meeting on May 22, 2006 for review, and approved. The supporting documents contain information regarding the cost of the instructional materials, other instructional materials considered by the selection committee, and information regarding the rationale for selection. These instructional materials will be available for public review at the Instructional Media Center and the Rubidoux and Glen Avon public libraries for the time period specified in Board Policy 6200. After the thirteen-day review period, the books will be presented to the Board for approval.

The following textbooks have been reviewed and recommended for submittal by the Instructional Council:

#### High School

- 1. Prego! 6<sup>th</sup> Edition for grades 9 12
- 2. The Practice of Statistics: Ti 83/89 Graphing Calculator Enhanced 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition for grades 11 12

It is recommended that the Board approve for public review the following instructional materials: "Prego!" and "The Practice of Statistics: Ti 83/89 Graphing Calculator Enhanced."

I. Provide Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement to the Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside for Conning Street Improvement Project - Blueprint for Learning Point 1: Focus Fiscal Resources (Mrs. Lauzon – 3 Minutes) The Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside will be constructing sidewalks, installing street lights and improving the streets in the Conning Street Improvement Project area.

In order to accomplish these improvements, the designated contractor will be required to enter upon a portion of District property, Mission Bell Elementary School, to grade the driveway to meet the new street right-of-way, or to do such other work as may be necessary. There will be no cost to the District.

The Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside is requesting the District grant a Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement from May 2006 until May 2008, or until completion of the Conning Road Improvement project. A copy of the agreement is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board approve the Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement, Conning Road Improvement Project, with the Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside.

# \* J. <u>Adopt Resolution #2006/41, Authorization to Conduct Surplus Sale</u> <u>Blueprint for Learning Point 1: Focus Fiscal Resources</u> (Mrs. Lauzon – 3 Minutes)

Throughout the year, the warehouse accumulates surplus items throughout the District that are old, obsolete, non-repairable or uneconomical to repair. A list of such items is included in the supporting documents.

Education Code Section 17545 states that the governing board of any school district may sell for cash any personal property belonging to the district if the property is not required for school purposes, or if it should be disposed of for the purpose of replacement, or if it is unsatisfactory or not suitable for school use. The board shall sell the property to the highest responsible bidder. Education Code Section 17546(a) allows that items, whether one or more, which do not exceed a value of \$2,500 may be sold at private sale without advertising. Section 17546(b) allows that any items having previously been offered for sale pursuant to Section 17545, for which no qualified bid was received, may be sold at private sale without advertising; and Section 17546(c) allows that property of insufficient value to defray the cost of arranging for a sale may be either donated to a charitable organization or disposed of in the local public dump.

The list of items included in the supporting documents exceeds \$2,500 in value.

Administration recommends the Board approve Resolution #2006/41, Authorization to Conduct Surplus Sale. Administration further recommends that the Board direct the Director of Centralized Support Services to dispose of the unsold items pursuant to Education Code Section 17546 either by private sale, donation to a charitable organization or disposed of in the local public dump.

# \* K. <u>Adopt Resolution #2006/42, Adopting Local Guidelines for Implementing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Blueprint for Learning Point 5: The Support</u>

(Mrs. Lauzon – 3 Minutes)

During the 2005 Legislative Session, the Governor signed into law several changes to CEQA; there were also changes in case law. These changes are reflected in the provisions in the District's Guidelines for Implementing CEQA. District's counsel, Best, Best & Krieger LLP, prepared the 2006 Local Guidelines for Implementing CEQA. A summary of these changes are included in the supporting documents; the notebook of current CEQA guidelines are provided under separate cover for Board members only. The Guidelines are also available for public review in the Director of Centralized Support Services' office.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2006/42, Adopting Local Guidelines for Implementing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

L. Adopt Resolution #2006/44, Approve Mitigation Agreement Between Jurupa Unified School District and Lennar Homes of California, Inc. Relating to Jurupa Community Services District CFD No. 34 - Blueprint for Learning Point 1: Focus Fiscal Resources (Mrs. Lauzon – 3 Minutes)

The District has been approached with a proposal to participate in Community Facilities District No. 34, which will be established by the Jurupa Community Services District, acting as the lead agency. The CFD encompasses the following residential tracts: Tract 30466, 30466-1, 30466-2, and 30466-3 (244 homes), located off of Hamner and Bellegrave.

Resolution #2006/45 approving the school district's participation through a Joint Community Facilities Agreement in CFD No. 34 is located in the Board agenda under Item M.

The mitigation agreement with Lennar homes includes a fee of \$4.23 per foot, which is \$.43 more per foot than the statutory Level II fee of \$3.80 per foot. This provides an additional \$297,569 to be used for school facilities needs that will be generated by this development.

A copy of the Resolution and Agreement are included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends Increase in Health & Welfare Benefit allowance for Management and Confidential employees.

#### \* 3. Adopt 2006-2007 Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators

(Mrs. Elzig – 2 Minutes)

Each year, the Board must adopt a "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" as a prerequisite to the issuance of emergency teaching permits for the District. This declaration is one of the state requirements of the Commission on Teacher Credentialing governing the issuance of emergency permits and the orientation, guidance and training of emergency permit holders. The District has historically needed to hire some teachers on emergency permits for CLAD and BCLAD authorizations to meet the requirements of the Williams Settlement. The information in the supporting documents accounts for all anticipated needs for the 2006-2007 school year.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt the "Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators" for 2006-2007.

4. Approve CBEST Waiver for Day-to-Day Substitute Teachers (Mrs. Elzig - 2 Minutes) The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing is allowing districts to temporarily waive the CBEST exam requirement for day-to-day (2006-2007) substitute teachers. The district-wide waiver would be for a maximum of one year. Substitute teachers would have one calendar year to take and pass CBEST, rather than having to pass prior to beginning work. The Commission has developed and it is recommended that the following statement be submitted to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends that the Board declare that the District has been unable to recruit enough day-to-day substitute teachers who have had an opportunity to take and pass the California Basic Education Skills Test (CBEST). The District anticipates employing fifty substitutes on variable term CBEST waivers for the 2006-2007 school year.

#### 1. Recognize ROP Teacher

On May 1, 2006, a tenth grade student collapsed in the P.E. locker room. Ms. Lisa Lewis, an ROP teacher, was first on the scene. In the period of 15 minutes, the student stopped breathing and lost consciousness three times due to a severe asthmatic attack. Ms. Lewis performed rescue breathing and revived the student each time. Lisa remained completely calm, directed the scene, and remained at the student's side until paramedics arrived on the scene relieving her. The student was transported to Riverside Community Hospital and was able to return to school the next day. Lisa's quick actions and training saved this student's life. 

#### NEA-J Initial Bargaining Proposal Re-openers to the 2004-2007 Collective Bargaining Agreement

NEA-J proposes the following changes and additions to the 2004-2007 collective bargaining agreement.

#### Article VII - Hours of Duty

• Unit members shall not be required to bubble answer sheets or student information sections of student tests.

#### Article XIV - Basic Compensation

- The Basic Certificated Salary Schedule shall be increased by the percentage increase in the Base Revenue Limit for the 2006-07 school year.
- Release time provided to teachers of designated English learners shall be increased from 1 to 2 days per year and from ½ to 1 day per year as specified in Section 6 C.
- Unit members meeting the certification requirements of AB466 shall receive a one-time bonus payment of \$500 for each certification requirement met.

#### Article XV - Extra Compensation

- A stipend shall be created and paid to elementary grade level leaders.
- A stipend shall be created and paid to special education team leaders.
- The rate of pay for teaching in the Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) program shall be increased from the hourly rate of pay to ½ of the unit member's daily rate of pay per hour of student contact.

#### Article XVIII - Health and Welfare Benefits

• The Association proposes that the District contribution to Health and Welfare benefits be increased by the percentage increase in the Base Revenue Limit for the 2006-07 school year.

The California School Employees Association (CSEA), Jurupa Chapter 392, proposes to re-open the Collective Bargaining Agreement as follows:

- > ARTICLE 13 -- CLASSIFIED SALARY SCHEDULE, APPLICATIONS AND RANGES
- > ARTICLE 15 -- HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS
- ARTICLE 21 -- DURATION

Our wage package proposal is to increase wages and benefits in accordance with the increase in the State Budget to Education (K-12), currently estimated at 8.7%, effective July 1, 2006.

We propose that wage and benefit parity ("me too") continue.

We propose to negotiate any PERS-related savings.

We propose a contract renewal to June 30, 2010, with annual reopeners.

We submit this bargaining proposal with the intent to begin negotiations as soon as possible. Our concern is that the District will create its 2006-2007 budget without providing sufficient reserves to cover our anticipated negotiated wage package increase. This has historically been the case — and CSEA negotiators at the table receive the same statements from District negotiators, to wit: there is no money in the budget.



### STUDENT FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION

Students in the Jurupa Unified School District shall have the right to exercise freedom of expression through their speech, writings, artistic performances, demonstrations, use of bulletin boards, distribution of printed materials or petitions, and wearing of buttons, badges, and other insignia.

Student freedom of expression shall be limited only as allowed by law in order to maintain an orderly school environment and to protect the rights, health, and safety of all members of the school community.

Students shall not be disciplined solely on the basis of constitutionally protected speech or other communication.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that due process is followed when resolving disputes regarding student freedom of expression.

Legal Reference EDUCATION CODE 48907





### SCHOOL RULES

### Student Behavior

Proper student conduct shall be a concern of all personnel including the Board of Education, the Superintendent, principals, teachers, pupils, parents, and classified employees. Each pupil will be expected to develop individual responsibility for his/her conduct in accordance with accepted district standards.

### Discipline

Students are expected to conform with the regulations of the school and obey all directions of the teachers and others in authority. Rules and regulations consistent with the laws of the State of California, the Education Code, and California Administrative Code, Title V, and relating to areas of discipline including corporal punishment, suspension, expulsion, exclusion, exemption, and transportation shall be spelled out in a Code of Discipline for approval and periodic review by the Board of Education.

All pupils shall comply with the regulations, pursue the required course of study, and submit to the authority of the teachers of the schools.

-Education Code, Section 10609

Every pupil shall attend school punctually and regularly; conform to the regulations of the school; obey promptly all the directions of his/her teacher and others in authority; observe good order and propriety of deportment; be diligent in study; respectful to his/her teacher and others in authority; kind and courteous to schoolmates; and refrain entirely from the use of profane and vulgar language.

-C. A. C., Title 5, Section 300

While on the school grounds (or elsewhere when under the authority or direct supervision of school personnel or when such conduct is otherwise related to school activity or school attendance), a pupil shall refrain from any and all of the following acts:

- (a) Gambling; immorality, profanity; and the use or possession of tobacco, intoxicating liquor, narcotics or other hallucinogenic or dangerous drugs or substances. (Drugs shown to have been prescribed by a licensed physician for a pupil are an exception as to that pupil.)
- (b) Willful or negligent conduct likely to result in injury to other pupils or school employees or in damage to school property.

-C. A. C., Title 5, Section 301



### SCHOOL RULES

A pupil who goes to school without proper attention having been given to personal cleanliness or neatness of dress, may be sent home to be properly prepared for school, or shall be required to prepare himself/herself for the schoolroom before entering.

-C. A. C., Title 5, Section 302

A pupil who defaces, damages, or destroys any school property or willfully or negligently injures another pupil or school employee is liable to suspension or expulsion, according to the nature of the offense.

-C. A. C., Title 5, Section 305

Principals are responsible for establishing specific regulations essential for the protection of student health and safety in the activities of the school, and for the protection of school property and equipment. Special precautions should be implemented in areas of instruction such as physical education, athletics, laboratory and shop activities.

Each elementary school principal should advise teachers that elementary school pupil recess time may be restricted for disciplinary purposes. However, teachers must use discretion to avoid a situation which could be harmful to a student's health.

Each principal must review school rules with his/her faculty each September and file a copy of rules relating to health and safety with the Director of Education Operations by October 15.

The principal must then ensure their effective communication of the school rules to students and parents, and the principal must supervise their enforcement.

### SCHOOL UNIFORMS

The Board believes that appropriate dress and grooming contribute to a productive learning environment. The Board expects students to give proper attention to personal cleanliness and to wear clothes that are suitable for the school activities in which they participate. Students' clothing must not present a health or safety hazard or a distraction which would interfere with the educational process.

Students and parents/guardians shall be informed about the school dress code at the beginning of the year and when revised. A student who violates the dress code shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Further, the Board recognizes that, in order to promote student safety and discourage peer rivalry, the principal, staff and parents/guardians at a district school may wish to establish a reasonable dress code requiring students to wear uniforms. Such a dress code may be included as part of the school safety plan and must be presented to the Board for approval.

The Board shall approve such dress codes when it determines they are necessary for the health and safety of the school's students.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures whereby parents/guardians may choose to have their children exempted from an adopted school uniform policy. Students shall not be penalized academically, otherwise discriminated against or denied attendance to school if their parents/guardians so decide.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that resources are identified to assist economically disadvantaged students in obtaining uniforms.

### SCHOOL UNIFORMS

When a significant interest in the use of schoolwide uniforms develops among staff and/or parents, a Uniform Committee shall be established at the school. The committee shall be comprised of representative parents, teachers, staff members and the principal. When organized, the committee's procedures shall include the following activities:

- Distribute a survey to assess parent/guardian interest in implementing a schoolwide uniform rule. Surveys shall be mailed in English and the predominant second language. Efforts to maximize the return rate shall be made.
- 2. Survey results will be tabulated and reported along with other relevant information to the school staff, School Site Council, Bilingual Advisory Committee, PTA and other established groups at the school.
- 3. When a majority of parents/guardians who respond to the survey are in favor of school uniforms, the Uniform Committee shall submit a recommendation, including a specific uniform selection to the Superintendent or designee regarding the implementation of a schoolwide uniform rule.
- 4. Upon approval of the recommendation by the Superintendent or designee, the school's plan for the use of school uniforms will be submitted to the Board of Education for approval.

Following Board approval, the school administration shall inform all parents/guardians of the schoolwide uniform rule at least six months in advance of its implementation. Information sent to parents/guardians shall include: (1) how to obtain uniforms, (2) provisions for informing the principal of their desire to not comply, and (3) availability of resources for families in financial need.

Students who participate in a nationally recognized youth organization (such as ROTC, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc.) shall be allowed to wear organization uniforms on days when the organization has a scheduled meeting (Education Code 35183).

The Superintendent or designee shall establish criteria for determining student eligibility for financial assistance when purchasing uniforms.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a method for recycling or exchanging uniforms as students grow out of them.

If the parent(s) or guardian desires to exempt his or her child from the uniform policy, the parent(s) or guardian must observe the following procedure:

1. Request by mail or in person an Application for Exemption from the Uniform Program from the student's school site.

- Complete the exemption in full and submit it to the designated administrator handling uniform program exemptions at the student's school.
- 3. Meet with the designated administrator to discuss the uniform policy and the nature of the parent(s) or guardian's objections to the policy. The purposes of this meeting include (1) ensuring that the parent(s) or guardian understands the reasons for, and goals of, the uniform policy; (2) verifying the accuracy of the information on the application; (3) preventing fraud or misrepresentation.
- 4. The exemption becomes effective after the parent meets with the designated administrator.
- Students whose parents choose to exempt them from the School Uniform Policy must still abide by the school dress code included in the School Safety Plan,

Schools requiring students to wear uniforms shall evaluate the uniform policy on an annual basis to determine the effectiveness of the policy and to consider appropriate modifications to the policy.

If any provision of this policy or administrative regulation is held to be invalid or unenforceable by the final decision of a court or competent jurisdiction, all remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

#### STUDENTS' RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Board of Education recognizes the right of the individual student to exercise freedom of expression. The Board also recognizes that the establishment of a public educational program requires the formation of rules and regulations necessary to maintain an orderly process of learning and to maintain standards of student conduct and language appropriate to an academic environment.

#### SECTION I

The purpose of this policy is to insure the exercise of the students' rights with due regard to the rights of others and the need for reasonable restrictions in the operation of the public school system.

#### SECTION II

Students of the District have the right to exercise free expression including, but not limited to, the use of bulletin boards, the distribution of printed materials or petitions, and the wearing of buttons, badges and other insignia.

A. <u>Circulation of Petitions, Circulars, Newspapers, and Other Printed</u>
Matter

Students shall be allowed to distribute petitions, circulars, leaflets, newspapers and other printed matter subject to the following specific limitations.

#### 1. Time

The time of distribution shall be limited to the hours before school begins, during the lunch hour and after school is dismissed.

#### 2. Manner

- a. Manner of Expression Students are expected to use good taste in their manner of expressing ideas. All language, pictures, drawings or photographs used in any material distributed, displayed or circulated pursuant to this policy must not be vulgar or profane. Vulgar as used herein includes that which is lewd, profane, coarse, crude or offensive and all language and pictorial expression which infringes on the minimum standards of propriety and the accepted norm of public behavior on or near school campuses.
- b. Manner of Distribution and Display No student shall use coercion to induce students or any other person to accept printed matter or to sign petitions; neither shall there be any funds or donations collected for any material distributed.



#### STUDENTS' RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

#### b. Manner of Distribution and Display (Cont'd)

All printed matter distributed on campus or in the immediate vicinity of school property including, but not limited to, all petitions, circulars, leaflets and newspapers and all material displayed on bulletin boards shall be submitted to the appropriate school official at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to such distribution or display. Approval or disapproval of such distribution or display shall be in accordance with the standards set forth in this policy. The official may limit the number of students or group of students that may distribute materials in any one day.

The principal of each school or his designee shall be the person to review the material and exercise administrative responsibility as required by this policy. The name of the designated person shall be suitably posted. Any student may appeal a decision concerning this policy to the appropriate assistant superintendent who shall render a decision no later than one (1) school day after receipt of the appeal. In the event a student is not satisfied with the decision of the assistant superintendent, he shall have an appeal to the superintendent who shall expeditiously render a final decision.

No written materials distributed or circulated pursuant to this policy shall be left unattended or stacked for pickup while unattended at any place in the school or school grounds or property in the immediate vicinity of the school.

#### 3. Place

The place and activity of distribution shall not interfere with the normal flow of traffic within the school corridors and entrance walkways nor impede entrance to or exit from school premises nor impede bus lanes.

#### B. Buttons, Badges and Other Insignia of Symbolic Expression

Students are permitted to wear buttons, badges, armbands and other insignia as a form of expression subject to the restrictions as to the manner of expression set forth in paragraph A2a above, and the prohibitions set forth in Section III below.

#### C. <u>Bulletin Boards</u>

Students shall be provided with bulletin boards for use in posting student materials at campus locations convenient for student use. Where feasible, location and number of such bulletin boards shall be by joint agreement of local school student government representatives and the local school administration. In the event a decision cannot be reached, the administration shall make the final determination.



#### STUDENTS' RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

#### C. Bulletin Boards (Cont'd)

Posting of student materials on said bulletin boards shall be subject to the limitations concerning the manner of exercising students' rights of free expression set forth in paragraphs A2a and A2b above, and the prohibitions set forth in Section III of this policy.

All material displayed shall clearly indicate the author or agency responsible for its production and shall be dated.

The principal of each school shall prescribe reasonable lengths of time during which such printed materials may be posted on the bulletin boards with the object of assuring fair access to the bulletin boards for all students.

#### SECTION III

In the exercise of the students' rights described above, no student shall distribute materials, wear buttons, badges, or other insignia, or post notices or other materials which:

- A. Are obscene to minors according to current legal definitions.
- B. Are libelous or slanderous according to current legal definitions.
- C. Incite students so as to create a clear and present danger of the imminent commission of unlawful acts on school premises or the violation of lawful school regulations or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school.
- D. Express or advocate racial, ethnic, or religious prejudice so as to create a clear and present danger of the imminent commission of unlawful acts on school premises or the violation of lawful school regulations or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school.
- E. Are distributed, displayed or circulated in violation of the time, place and manner requirements.
- F. Are determined to be gang related as definded by the Riverside County Sheriff's Office or the District Attorney.

#### SECTION IV

Violation of this policy by any student shall be sufficient cause for disciplinary action including suspension and expulsion.

This 5-year partnership (2003-2008) between Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) and University of California, Riverside (UCR) aims at teacher recruitment, effective instruction, and grades 4-8 math proficiency through collaborative professional development, challenging curriculum, parent involvement, and preparation of prospective teachers.

- (a) Goals and objectives: To increase math achievement of grades 4-8 students in Algebra, especially disadvantaged students; increase the number of students enrolling in higher-level math courses; and increase the number of teachers with math credentials and instructional competencies. (b) The need: JUSD—while successful in developing essential State standards, standards-based assessments, extended learning opportunities, and a program of aligned literacy professional development—had no major program for improving math instruction. In addition, middle school student success in Algebra—the gatekeeper course for college—and JUSD college-going rates were at low levels. (c) Innovative and exemplary: Math ACTS is a unique partnership of UCR professors and district teachers and leaders as well as county trainers and site leaders. The partnership has created a multi-tiered, comprehensive program of professional development, a successful teacher recruitment program, and research on math proficiency that informs and potentially enhances pre-service and in-service teaching of math. Achievement and advanced-course-taking in math are showing gains, some above those of the State and County.

#### Math ACTS: Achievement through Collaboration with Teachers and Students

Math ACTS is a National Science Foundation (NSF)-funded program that links practitioners from Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) to scholars from University of California, Riverside (UCR) to recruit math teachers, improve math instruction, and increase the math proficiency of JUSD students in grades 4-8. Math ACTS focuses on sustained and systematically designed pre-service and in-service professional development; a definition of proficiency that includes deep understanding of concepts and positive attitudes toward math; and alignment of curriculum, materials, assessment, instruction, and school organization. These aims are largely achieved through three professional development institutes:

(1) Mathematics Academy for Teaching Excellence (MATE); (2) Climbing Higher with the Academy for Mathematical Performance (CHAMPS); and (3) Accelerating Literacy through Integration of Algebra and Science (ALIAS).

Evidence the Program is Making a Difference for Students. Table 1 shows that, since the program was enacted, JUSD's grade 4-6 proficiency improvements and declines in below basic performance have kept pace with those of the State and Riverside County. At grades 7-8 JUSD's proficiency improvements and declines in below basic performance have outpaced those of California and Riverside County. These gains have been achieved despite increases in JUSD's percentage of grades 4-8 English learners (+20) and economically disadvantaged students (+57) that have far exceeded those of the State (+1, +22) and County (+10, +22). Moreover, a cohort comparison of mathematics proficiency between students in first-year treatment schools to that of control schools showed a trend favoring Math ACTS treatment schools. While such math proficiency gains may be attributable to various factors operating simultaneously within JUSD (e.g., NCLB, AB 466 training, new secondary student placement policies), Math ACTS has played an important role.

An Innovative and Exemplary Program. Math ACTS links public school practitioners and university scholars to improve instruction, develop a larger pool of qualified math teachers, and increase students' math proficiency, especially in algebra. University experts in science and math content as well as the art of teaching science and math provide practitioners three professional development institutes. MATE serves 40-50 JUSD teachers each summer to model exemplary teaching linked to math and science content and real-world applications. This 2-week institute provides teachers background research, opportunities to form school site teams, and material resources to implement demonstrated lessons. CHAMP creates, demonstrates, and tests innovative math instructional strategies during a weeklong lab school involving students, teachers, and grade-level math content. Teachers work as participant observers, practice model lessons, and provide peer coaching to validate instructional strategies designed to increase student conceptual understanding. ALIAS provides university faculty who design and oversee science inquiry lessons for teachers and their students. Hands-on demonstrations and experiments reinforce standards in math and language arts. Summer extensions of ALIAS provide teams of teachers and students a week-long experience at University labs.

Classroom support is provided through mentoring, class visits, guided discussion, and peer coaching.

Another unique component of Math ACTS is use of UCR math and science majors who participate in the California Mathematics and Science Teachers (CMST) Initiative. These prospective teachers receive financial support, mentoring, MATE and CHAMP training, and placement into JUSD classrooms for 150 hours. Finally, to motivate program students, Math ACTS provides a variety of summer offerings such as Girls Excelling in Mathematics and Science (GEMS) and Healthy Body, Healthy Mind.

A Sustainable Program. Sustainability is ensured for 2 more years, but NSF encourages program maintenance beyond funding. UCR and JUSD have planned toward maintaining three current components. First, three JUSD Teachers on Special Assignment (TSAs) have been trained in MATE, CHAMPS, and ALIAS. These TSAs have already assumed leadership of CHAMPS, and they have provided JUSD teachers AB466 math training that interlaced Math ACTS strategies with State-adopted instructional materials. TSAs will eventually train new JUSD teachers on Math ACTS strategies and, during their regular assignment to JUSD's 16 elementary schools, provide follow-up demonstrations and peer coaching to assure quality implementation. Second, current plans include maintaining JUSD's Math ACTS liaison. This individual, funded by JUSD as a half-time TSA, communicates with JUSD administrators and UCR principal

investigators, conducts implementation studies, and generates reports and recommendations for melding Math ACTS to JUSD math classrooms. Such communications, research, and reporting will inevitably change when funding ends, but maintaining a Math ACTS liaison will be valuable for continued collaboration. Third, each partner is interested in continuing the CMST Initiative at JUSD. UCR and JUSD have been partners in training teachers for well over a decade, and State and UCR funding will continue to support the training of prospective math and science teachers.

Connections to District, County, and State Vision. The Math ACTS emphasis on challenging curriculum, math proficiency, and effective instruction is aligned to California's content standards, California's *Mathematics Framework*, and AB 466 training. Hence, Math ACTS coaching, materials, and professional development feature explicit communications pointing to these connections. Recent AB 466 training delivered by district TSAs to JUSD elementary math teachers showcased how challenging standards and mathematical proficiency were important goals of the California *Frameworks*, AB466 training, and Math ACTs. MATE, CHAMPS, and ALIAS sessions feature direct links to State content standards identified by JUSD teachers as essential and particularly difficult for students. Of course, improved achievement, especially for disadvantaged students, is the foremost priority of each agency.

Serving All Student Populations. Math ACTS instructors demonstrate various strategies for addressing the needs of students from diverse backgrounds, including how to analyze students' prior knowledge, assess misconceptions, and assess and extend deep conceptual understanding. Math ACTS instructors believe that all students can develop proficiency, and they exemplify these expectations. Specific strategies may be found in the Math ACTS proposal and training guides, but an illustration of the effects of Math ACTS (as well as other successful district programs) on JUSD's most disadvantaged populations (EL and economically disadvantaged students) may be found in the disaggregated scores in Table 1. Table 1 suggests that, from 2003 to 2005, JUSD's English learners and economically disadvantaged students substantially outpaced these same subgroups in California and Riverside County.

Communicating with the Community about Math ACTS. Major communications have publicized Math ACTS, including several parent letters, newspaper articles, Web site postings, Advisory Committee meetings, UCR and JUSD newsletters, Community Celebrations, Board of Education and District Site Council presentations, and Math Nights at several elementary schools. Reports and papers have been presented at various State and national conferences.

Replicability. Math ACTS logic models; MATE, CHAMPS, and ALIAS manuals; and guides for implementation are available for replication. Materials lists, power point presentations, overhead transparencies, and agendas have been archived for reference and dissemination purposes. Moreover, all teachers and researchers active in creating and implementing the program are still involved in the project, and they are willing to assist those interested in replicating or adapting the program to improve mathematical proficiency in their district.

2005 CEQA Legislation

In 2005, the Legislature passed and the Governor signed only two bills relating to CEQA; all of the other CEQA bills failed to pass. The two bills that have been enacted into law are briefly summarized below.

#### **Assembly Bill 1170 (AB 1170)**

AB 1170 provides a specific, narrow exemption from CEQA for seismic retrofit work and joint use agreements undertaken by the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District. The impact of this law is limited to certain specified BART facilities, so no revisions to the Local Guidelines are necessary.

#### **Senate Bill 648 (SB 648)**

SB 648 changes the way the public review period is calculated for documents that are submitted to the State Clearinghouse. SB 648 specifies that the state review period begins when the State Clearinghouse distributes the document to state agencies, not when the State Clearinghouse receives the documents. SB 648 further provides that the public review period can run concurrently with the state agency review period, but the public review period cannot end before the state agency review period does. Thus, for all practical purposes, the public review period for documents that are submitted to the State Clearinghouse for state agency review has been extended for as long as the state review period. Because the State Clearinghouse has three days after receipt to distribute the documents, it would be prudent to calculate the public review period as beginning three business days after the State Clearinghouse receives the documents and ending either 30 days (for negative declarations) or 45 days (for EIRs) later.

In the wake of the Trinity River restoration program debate over which agency should assume the lead agency role for CEQA review, SB 648 also covers the topic of lead agency disputes. SB 648 provides that, for purposes of those provisions requiring the designation by the Office of Planning and Research of a lead agency, a "dispute" means a contested, active difference of opinion between two or more public agencies as to which of those agencies shall prepare any necessary environmental document, and that a dispute exists where a public agency claims that it either has or does not have the obligation to prepare an environmental document. SB 648 prohibits OPR from designating a lead agency in the absence of such a dispute.

SB 648 has been codified in amendments to Section 21091 and Section 21165 of the Public Resources Code. Sections 6.06 and 7.02 of your Local Guidelines has been revised to reflect changes in the calculation of public review periods for documents that are circulated



through the State Clearinghouse. Section 2.02 of your Local Guidelines has been revised to reflect the new statutory language relating to lead agency disputes.

WHEREAS, Section 21082 of CEQA requires all public agencies to adopt objectives, criteria and procedures for the evaluation of public and private projects undertaken or approved by such public agencies, and the preparation, if required, of environmental impact reports and negative declarations in connection with that evaluation; and

WHEREAS, the Jurupa Unified School District ("School District") wishes to adopt local guidelines for Implementing CEQA that are consistent with the current provisions and interpretations of CEQA.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

**SECTION 1**. The Board of Education adopts "Local Guidelines for Implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (2005)," a copy of which is on file at the offices of the School District and is available for inspection by the public.

WHEREAS, Lennar Homes of California, Inc., a California corporation (the "Owner"), as developer of certain proeprty has requested that the Jurupa Community Services District (the "Services District") establish a community facilities district (the "CFD") pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code (the "Mello-Roos Act") to include property in the Services District for the purpose of financing Services District facilities (the "Services District Facilities"), the acquisition of land and construction, furnishing and equipping of public school facilities (the "School Facilities") of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "JUSD"), Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District ("JARPD") facilities ("JARPD facilities"), and Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District ("County Flood") facilities ("County Flood Facilities") (collectively, the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, in such connection, there has been presented to the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("JUSD") an agreement entitled Mitigation Agreement (the "Agreement"), attached as Exhibit "A" hereto and hereby incorporated, by and between JUSD and Owner in which the Owner agrees to pay a higher fee for school facilities than the statutory stated amount, to be financed by the CFD and JUSD agrees to use its best efforts to enter into a joint community facilities agreement for the purpose financing school facilities through the CFD; and

WHEREAS, the CFD, if formed, will levy and collect special taxes on the property within the CFD to pay the principal and interest on the bonded indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has determined that the Agreement should therefore be approved;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, CALIFORNIA that the Agreement is approved and the Superintendent is authorized to execute and deliver the Agreement on behalf of JUSD in the form presented to the Board of Education at the meeting at which this resolution is adopted, with such changes therein as the officer executing the same may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

# EXHIBIT A MITIGATION AGREEMENT



## MITIGATION AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND LENNAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA, INC. RELATING TO JURUPA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT CFD NO. 34

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into as of the 1st day of June 2006 by and between the JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a school district of the State of California (the "School District"), and LENNAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA, INC., a California corporation ("Developer").

#### **RECITALS:**

- A. The Developer has requested that the Jurupa Community Services District (the "Services District") establish a community facilities district (the "CFD") pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code (the "Mello-Roos Act") to include property in the Services District for the purpose of financing Services District facilities (the "Services District Facilities"), the acquisition of land and construction, furnishing and equipping of public school facilities of the School District (the "School Facilities"), Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District ("JARPD") facilities ("JARPD facilities"), and Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District ("County Flood") facilities ("County Flood Facilities") (collectively, the "Facilities").
- B. Developer owns property within the CFD planned for 244 dwelling units pursuant to Tract No. 30466, 30466-1, 30466-2, and 30466-3 (the "Project").
- C. The School District and Developer have met and negotiated in good faith an appropriate means for financing the impact of students generated from the development of the Project upon the School Facilities pursuant to the levy of school fees imposed pursuant to Education Code Section 17620, Government Code Section 65995, Government Code Section 65995.5 or Government Code Section 65995.7 ("School Fees") as such statutory provisions may be modified or superseded, and pursuant to any other requirement of the School District or other public agency for the provision or funding of School Facilities.
- D. To finance the School Facilities, the School District and the Services District are considering entering into a Joint Community Facilities Agreement pursuant to Sections 53316.2, 53316.4 and 53316.6 of the California Government Code.
- E. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the understandings of the parties with respect to the amount of mitigation fees to be paid through the CFD if formed and to establish a mechanism for the advance payment of such mitigation fees.



NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the preceding recitals and the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. <u>Formation Proceedings</u>. The Services District Board of Directors shall conduct proceedings pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act for the establishment of the proposed CFD which shall be designated "Jurupa Community Services District Community Facilities District No. 34." The Services District Board of Directors shall also conduct proceedings pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act to authorize the CFD to incur bonded indebtedness for the purpose of financing the Facilities.

Section 2. <u>Issuance of Bonds</u>. Upon completion of the proceedings for the establishment of the CFD and the authorization of bonded indebtedness, the Services District shall proceed to issue and sell bonds of the CFD (the "Bonds") for financing the construction and/or acquisition of the Facilities. The Services District shall proceed with the issuance and sale of the Bonds when it is determined that all of the conditions which must be satisfied in connection with the issuance and sale of bonds have been satisfied. In making such determination, the Services District shall be guided by the advice of its bond counsel and financial advisor and the underwriter of the Bonds.

Section 3. <u>Mitigation Payments</u>. At the time requested by School District following the issuance of the Bonds, Developer agrees to fund an amount equal to \$11,906 per dwelling unit ("Mitigation Amount per Unit") multiplied by the total number of dwelling units proposed to be developed within the Project ("School Funding Requirement"). The Owner and the School District acknowledge that this amount shall be increased each July 1, commencing July 1, 2007 by the Marshall & Swift eight (8) California Cities Class B Construction Cost Index, or if this index ceases to be used by the State Allocation Board ("SAB"), a reasonably comparable index used by the SAB to estimate changes in construction costs. Any amount not satisfied by the Bond proceeds will be paid in cash by the Developer to the School District at the time of Bond issuance.

Section 4. <u>School Facilities</u>. Those public school facilities which may be financed by the proposed CFD, include, but are not limited to:

(a) Any and all actual costs of construction and acquisition of school facilities, including, but not limited to, equipping the school facilities with furniture, fixtures and equipment and tangible property with a useful life of five (5) years or longer, modifications, maintenance ("maintaining" or "maintenance" of such facilities shall be limited to replacing tangible property with an estimated useful life of five (5) years or longer such as roofing, air conditioning or heating systems) acquisition, constructing, expansion, relocation, rehabilitation, leasing or purchasing of necessary school facilities, and improvements and the required sites therefor and appurtenances thereto, including, but not limited to, athletic and recreation facilities, child care facilities, administrative facilities; payment of fees, including but not limited to the planning and design work related thereto, as well as property, easements and rights-of-way, which District is authorized by law to contribute revenue to, construct, own and operate, including the



cost of leasing or purchasing completed facilities, construction, expansion, and/or rehabilitation of facilities, and the cost of financing all such facilities which are necessary to meet increased demands placed on District and/or JARPD, as a result of development of the Project, and the costs of planning, financing, engineering, designing, applying for State funding, contract administration, construction management, obtaining permits and licenses, insurance, change orders, legal, and fiscal and inspection fees, necessary or appropriate for such facilities and related facilities.

#### Section 5. Obtaining Certificates of Compliance.

- Prior to Issuance of Bonds. Prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the (a) Developer shall be permitted to obtain from the School District the certification required by Education Code Section 17620(b) and a certification otherwise evidencing that any and all requirements of the School District with respect to School Facilities impacts of a dwelling unit have been satisfied ("Certificates of Compliance") by (i) making a cash deposit with the School District or (ii) delivering to School District an irrevocable standby letter of credit, issued by a bank which is acceptable to School District and which names School District as beneficiary. The cash deposit or stated amount of the letter of credit shall equal the applicable Mitigation Amount Per Unit for all residential units which are being issued a Certificate of Compliance. In the event the Developer makes a cash deposit with the School District as set forth above, including cash deposits equal to the applicable statutory school fee made prior to approval of this Agreement and formation of the CFD, School District shall refund the party which made such cash deposit the full amount of such cash deposit, excluding earnings thereon, at the time an amount equal to the Mitigation Amount Per Unit for all residential units for which the statutory school fee was made is deposited in the account maintained by the fiscal agent for the Bonds for the financing of School Facilities (the "School Facilities Subaccount"). In the event the Developer delivers to School District an irrevocable standby letter of credit as set forth above, such letter of credit shall be maintained by the Developer and renewed as necessary until an amount equal to or exceeding the amount of such letter of credit is deposited in the School Facilities Subaccount at which time such letter of credit shall be released by School District and returned to the issuing bank.
- (b) After the Issuance of Bonds. At the time Bonds are issued and funds are deposited in the School Facilities Subaccount, School District shall, upon the Developer's request, issue a Certificate of Compliance for the number of dwelling units within the Project equal to the amount deposited in the School Facilities Subaccount divided by the Mitigation Amount per Unit (the "Mitigated Units"). At no time shall School District be required to issue a Certificate of Compliance for a dwelling unit within the Project that is not a Mitigated Unit unless and until the payment is made by the Developer of the applicable Mitigation Amount Per Unit for such dwelling unit. For the first unit above the number of Mitigation Units, a credit shall be provided for the amount of the deposit to the School Facilities Subaccount that is not applied to a Mitigated Unit.



- Statutory Fees If CFD Not Formed or Bonds Not Issued. (i) In the event the CFD is not formed or Bonds are not issued within 12 months of the date hereof for any reason other than as set forth in Section (ii) below due to, among other things, (A) a default in performance by School District of their obligations under this Agreement, (B) the formation of the CFD is not economically viable as determined by the Services District, and/or (C) the formation of the CFD does not meet the Goals & Policies for formation of CFDs adopted by the Services District, then the Developer's obligation to pay the Mitigation Amount per Unit shall cease and Developer shall pay the School District's statutory school fees under SB 50 ("Statutory Fee") in an amount equal to the fees at the time certificates of compliance are requested. If Developer has previously made payments to the School District to receive a certificate of compliance prior to CFD formation, adjustments shall be made as follows: (X) If Developer has made a cash payment of the Mitigation Amount per Unit on any unit within the Project and the amount of the then current Statutory Fee is less, the School District shall refund the difference to the Developer, (Y) if, however, Developer has previously made a cash payment and the Statutory Fee is more, Developer shall pay the difference to the School District, and (Z) if Developer has delivered an irrevocable standby letter of credit to secure payment for such residences, the School District shall release the letter of credit for cancellation upon receiving payment from Developer of the Statutory Fees.
- (ii) In the event the CFD is not formed due to a default in performance by Developer of its obligations under this Agreement, the Mitigation Amount per Unit shall be due for each unit in the Project in order to receive a certificate of compliance.

Full Mitigation. A purpose of this Agreement is to establish a Section 6. method of providing School Facilities necessary to mitigate the impact on the School District of development of the Project. The parties intend this Agreement to be binding upon each party and its successors, notwithstanding the provisions of any existing or future legislation, ordinance, resolution, regulation, policy or court decision (collectively and individually, any "Law") issued or adopted by any court, the State of California, the County of Riverside, the Riverside County Local Agency Formation Commission, or any subdivision thereof (collectively and individually, a "Government Unit"), which would require or authorize the payment of School Fees or other School Facilities mitigation requirement other than those required by this Agreement. In consideration of the covenants contained in this Agreement, Developer and School District expressly waive the benefit arising from any existing or future Law issued or adopted by any Governmental Unit affecting the rights or obligation(s) of an owner, developer or user of real property, to mitigate the impact of development of the Project upon the availability of School Facilities, or the rights or obligations of the School District to impose School Fees or other school mitigation requirements.

The School District hereby covenants that it will not, except as authorized in this Agreement, under any circumstances at any time:



- (a) oppose development of the Project on the basis of inadequate School Facilities or seek other forms of mitigation with respect to the adequacy of School Facilities as a condition to development of the Project, including, but not limited to, the imposition of any School Fees against the Project; provided, however, that the limitations contained in this clause shall not preclude a general obligation bond election by the registered voters of the School District;
- (b) exercise any power or authority (under Section 17620 of the California Education Code or any other provision of applicable law) to levy or collect School Fees for the purpose of funding or financing any School Facilities;
- (c) require or request the Services District or any other Government Unit to exercise, or cooperate with the District or any other Government Unit in the exercise of, the power under Title 7, Division 1, Chapter 4.7 of the California Government Code (commencing with Section 65970) or any other provision of applicable law, to require any School Fee or other mitigation for School Facilities as a condition to the approval of development of the Project within the boundaries of the CFD; or
- (d) advise or require any owner or any other public or private entity to advise anyone that School Facilities are inadequate to accommodate students generated by development of the Project.
- Section 7. Advance of School District Costs. Developer has advanced \$10,000 to the School District to cover financial advisor and legal costs incurred by the School District with respect to this Agreement. Developer agrees to advance additional funds, not to exceed \$25,000, to cover such costs incurred by the School District that cannot be paid with the initial advance. The Developer and School District agree that the amount of funds advanced by the Developer pursuant to this Section 7 shall be reimbursed from the costs of issuance to be funded with the proceeds of the Bonds and any unexpended portion of the funds advanced will be returned to the Developer at the time Bonds are issued.
- Section 8. <u>Amendment</u>. This Agreement may be amended at any time by a subsequent written agreement signed on behalf of all parties.
- Section 9. <u>Beneficiaries</u>. No person or entity shall be deemed to be a third party beneficiary hereof, and nothing in this Agreement (either express or implied) is intended to confer on any person or entity other than the School District and Developer any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Agreement.
- Section 10. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which shall constitute but one agreement.



Section 11. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement may be assigned, in whole or in part, by Developer to the purchaser of land within the Project provided, however, such assignment shall not be effective unless and until the School District has been notified, in writing, of such assignment.

Section 12. <u>California Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

#### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT APPROVING JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT WITH THE JURUPA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT

WHEREAS, Lennar Homes of California, Inc., a California corporation (the "Owner"), as developer of certain property has requested that the Jurupa Community Services District (the "Services District") establish a community facilities district (the "CFD") pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code (the "Mello-Roos Act") to include property in the Services District for the purpose of financing Services District facilities (the "Services District Facilities"), the acquisition of land and construction, furnishing and equipping of public school facilities (the "School District") of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "JUSD"), Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District ("JARPD") facilities ("JARPD facilities"), and Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District ("County Flood") facilities ("County Flood Facilities") (collectively, the "Facilities"); and

WHEREAS, the Owner has requested that the School District enter into a joint community facilities agreement with the Services District to finance the School Facilities; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 53316.2 through 53316.6 of the California Government Code, a community facilities district may finance facilities to be owned or operated by an entity other than the agency that created the district pursuant to a joint community facilities agreement if the legislative body of each entity adopts a resolution declaring that such a joint agreement would be beneficial to the residents of that entity; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Section 53316.2, the Services District may have primary responsibility for the formation of a community facilities district pursuant to such a joint community facilities agreement if it is reasonably expected to have responsibility for providing facilities to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of bonds of the community facilities district created pursuant to the joint community facilities agreement than any other local agency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the proposed joint community facilities agreement, the Services District will receive in excess of fifty percent of the net amount from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds of the proposed community facilities district for financing the design, construction and acquisition of public school facilities and the modernization of existing school facilities, and the School District will receive less than fifty percent from the net amount of the proceeds of the sale of bonds of the proposed community facilities district for financing of School Facilities; and it is, therefore, reasonably expected that the Services District will have responsibility for providing public facilities to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of such bonds; and



WHEREAS, the Board of Education has determined that the proposed joint community facilities agreement will be beneficial to the residents of the School District, the Services District and the proposed community facilities district;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Board of Education determines that the joint community facilities agreement entitled "Joint Community Facilities Agreement between Jurupa Community Services District and Jurupa Unified School District (Community Facilities District No. 34)" (the "Agreement"), attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein, will be beneficial to the residents of the School District and the proposed community facilities district.

Section 2. The Agreement is approved in the form submitted to the Board of Education at the meeting at which this resolution is adopted and the President and the Clerk of the Board of Education are authorized to execute and deliver the Agreement on behalf of the School District. The Superintendent of the School District is authorized to consent to such modifications of the Agreement as are determined by bond counsel to the Services District to be necessary to comply with provisions of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 and which do not affect the net amount of the proceeds of the sale of the bonds of the proposed community facilities district which will be received by the School District for financing the design, construction and acquisition of public school facilities or which are not otherwise material.

<u>Section 3</u>. The Secretary of the Board of Education shall deliver an executed copy of the Agreement with the Services District.

# JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT BETWEEN JURUPA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT AND JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 34)

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into as of the 1st day of June 2006 by and between JURUPA COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT, a public agency (the "Services District"), and JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a school district of the State of California (the "School District").

#### RECITALS:

- Lennar Homes of California, Inc., a California corporation has requested that Services District establish a community facilities district pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code (the "Mello-Roos Act") to include the property described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto (the "Property") for the purpose of financing the design, construction and acquisition of water system facilities, including capacity in existing facilities, and sewer system facilities, including capacity in existing facilities and sewage treatment capacity, of the Services District (the "Services District Facilities"), the design, construction and acquisition of school facilities of the School District (the "School District Facilities"), the design, construction and acquisition of park and recreation facilities of Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District ( the "Park District" and the "Park District Facilities"), and the design, construction and acquisition of flood control and drainage facilities of Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (the "Flood Control District" and the "Flood Control District Facilities") (collectively, the "Facilities"). The Services District Facilities and the School District Facilities are generally described in Exhibit "B" attached hereto.
- B. Pursuant to Sections 53316.2, 53316.4 and 53316.6 of the Government Code, (i) a community facilities district may finance facilities to be owned or operated by an entity other than the agency that created the community facilities district pursuant to a joint community facilities agreement or a joint exercise of powers agreement adopted pursuant to that section; (ii) a party to such an agreement may use the proceeds of any bonds or other indebtedness issued pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act to provide facilities which that party is otherwise authorized by law to provide even though another party to the agreement does not have the power to provide those facilities; and (iii) no local agency which is a party to a joint community facilities agreement shall have primary responsibility for formation of a community facilities district unless it is reasonably expected to have responsibility for providing facilities to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of bonds of the community facilities district created pursuant to the agreement than any other local agency.
- C. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the understandings of the parties with respect to the formation of the proposed community facilities district, if it is established, the authorization of bonded indebtedness and the sale of bonds of the community facilities district and the allocation of the proceeds of the sale of such bonds between the Services District and the School District for the design, construction and acquisition of the Services District Facilities and the School District Facilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the preceding recitals and the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

Services District shall conduct proceedings pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act for the formation of the proposed Community Facilities District, which shall be designated "Community Facilities District No. 34 (Eastvale Area) of Jurupa Community Services District, County of Riverside, State of California" ("CFD No. 34"). The Board of Directors shall also conduct proceedings pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act to authorize CFD No. 34 to incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$11,000,000 for the purpose of financing the design, construction and acquisition of the Facilities. The Board of Directors shall commence such proceedings as soon as is reasonably possible and shall thereafter conduct and complete such proceedings in a timely manner.

Issuance of Bonds. Upon completion of the proceedings for the formation of CFD No. 34 and the authorization of bonded indebtedness, the Services District shall proceed to issue and sell bonds of CFD No. 34 in an aggregate principal amount which shall, insofar as is reasonably possible, be sufficient to provide a net amount of approximately \$2,906,000 to the Services District for financing the design, construction and acquisition of the Services District Facilities, and a net amount to the School District of approximately \$2,905,000 for financing the design, construction and acquisition of the School District Facilities; provided that such net amounts shall be finally determined by the Services District, in consultation with its financial advisor and the underwriter of the bonds, at the time of the issuance of the bonds. The Services District shall proceed with the issuance and sale of such bonds when it is determined, in the sole discretion of the Services District, that all of the conditions which must be satisfied in connection with the issuance and sale of bonds of a community facilities district such as CFD No. 34, including the requirements of Section 53345.8 of the Government Code, have been satisfied. In making such determination, the Services District shall be guided by the advice of its bond counsel and financial advisor and the underwriter of the bonds.

Allocation of Construction Funds. Upon the issuance and Section 3. sale of the bonds of CFD No. 34, the fiscal agent agreement or bond indenture with respect to such bonds shall provide for the creation of an Improvement Fund. The Improvement Fund shall include four separate accounts (i.e., the "Services District Facilities Account," the "School District Facilities Account," the "Park District Facilities Account," and the "Flood Control District Facilities Account," collectively, the "Accounts"). Such agreement or indenture shall also provide for the School District drawing directly on the School District Facilities Account by requisition presented to the fiscal agent. Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of this section, if the School District certifies to the satisfaction of the Services District and its bond counsel that it has an immediate need for the full amount of the proceeds of such bonds which are to be deposited in the School District Facilities Account and that it will expend all of such proceeds for the construction and acquisition of specified public school facilities within thirty-six (36) months from the date of the issuance of the bonds, the fiscal agent may pay the full amount of such proceeds to the School District on the date of the issuance of the bonds or any date thereafter.

The net proceeds of the Bonds available for deposit in the Improvement Fund shall be deposited in the Accounts as follows: (i) in the Services District Facilities Account an amount not less than \$2,906,040; (ii) In the School District Facilities Account an amount not less than \$2,905,064; (iii) In the Park District Facilities Account an amount not less than \$800,000; and (iv) In the Flood Control District Facilities Account an amount not less than \$1,000,000.

Services District in complying with the arbitrage rebate requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and the Treasury Regulations which relate thereto, by keeping accurate records of the investment earnings on any and all investments which the School District may make with amounts drawn on the School District Facilities Account. At the end of each fiscal year the School District shall provide to the Services District and its consultants such records and documents as it may reasonably request to enable it to determine the nature of any such investments and the interest earnings thereon for purposes of determining whether any portion thereof must be rebated to the United States of America as rebateable arbitrage earnings. The School District advises the Services District that the School District's employer identification number is 33-074-0037.

Section 5. Governmental Use of School District Facilities. The School District shall not use or permit the School District Facilities to be used for any activity that would constitute a "Private Use." The School District understands (i) that the term "Private Use" means any activity that constitutes a trade or business that is carried on by persons or entities, other than governmental entities; (ii) that the leasing of the School District Facilities or access by persons or entities other than a governmental unit to the School District Facilities on a basis other than as a member of the general public ("General Public Use") would constitute a Private Use; and (iii) that the use of the School District Facilities in a trade or business would constitute a General Public Use only if the School District Facilities are intended to be available and are in fact reasonably available for use on the same basis by natural persons not engaged in a trade or business.

Section 6. Responsibility and Indemnification. The Services District shall have sole responsibility for the design, construction and acquisition of the Services District Facilities and the School District shall have sole responsibility for the design, construction and acquisition of the School District Facilities. The Services District agrees to indemnify and hold the School District harmless from any and all liability of any nature whatsoever, including attorneys' fees and costs, with respect to the design, construction and acquisition of the Services District Facilities. The School District agrees to indemnify and hold the Services District harmless from any and all liability of any nature whatsoever, including attorneys' fees and costs with respect to the design, construction and acquisition of the School District Facilities.

<u>Section 7</u>. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the matters provided for herein and supersedes all prior agreements and negotiations between the parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.



<u>Section 8</u>. <u>Amendment</u>. This Agreement may be amended at any time by a subsequent written agreement signed on behalf of both parties.

Section 9. Beneficiaries. No person or entity shall be deemed to be a third party beneficiary hereof, and nothing in this Agreement (either express or implied) is intended to confer on any person or entity other than the Services District and the School District any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Agreement.

<u>Section 10</u>. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which shall constitute but one agreement.

#### **SOLAR CUP 2006**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Last November, Jurupa Valley High School was selected to represent the Western Municipal Water District at this year's Metropolitan Water District Solar Cup competition. Western sponsored the team with \$3,000 in funding for the purchase of their boat's power source—solar panels, batteries, and all drive train components. Metropolitan hosted the competition and provided funding for the team's boat shell and all required training.

A total of 34 high school teams from across Southern California competed in the event this month. The event showcased high school students' ability to build and design 16-foot solar-powered vessels using alternative fuels that do not pollute water.

Jurupa Valley High School, who named themselves WattsUp, finished 4<sup>th</sup> in overall competition with their Total Qualifying – 38 (50 points possible); Workshop - 50 (50 points possible); Total Sprint – 222.68 (250 points possible); Total Endurance Laps – 378.4 (400 points possible); Visual Display - 81 (150 points possible); Technical Reports – 70.5 (100 points possible); Total Points – 840 (1,000 point possible).
