### **HEARING SESSION**

### \* I. Hold Public Hearing on Proposed High School Attendance Boundaries (Mrs. Lauzon)

In developing the current proposal for high school boundaries, district staff considered important variables for setting boundaries, i.e., equalizing size and future housing development. Other criteria, such as proximity and busing distance and the need to leave some capacity to house students whose parents desire to exercise the option for intradistrict transfer, were also used by staff in developing the proposal.

6. Accept Donations

7. Certification of Annual Organization Meeting of the Governing Board (Mr. Duchon-2 minutes) In accordance with the Education Code, the Governing Board of each school district shall hold an Annual Organization meeting. In a year in which a regular election for governing board members is conducted, the meeting shall be held on a day within a 15-day period that commences with the date upon which a governing board member elected at that election takes office. B. <u>Approve at First Informational Reading Revised Board Policy 6020 and New Regulation 6020, Parent Involvement - Blue Print for Learning Point 5: Support (Dr. Jindra – 2 minutes)</u>

With the changes made to Title I schools under the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation, additional requirements for parent involvement are incorporated into the revised Board Policy 6020 and newly developed Regulation 6020.

Even though Jurupa has a Title I Parent Involvement policy that was developed in conjunction with our staff and parents to meet the NCLB requirements, it was not adopted by the Board. To ensure compliance with federal and state requirements, we will be modifying our current parent involvement policy distributed to parents to meet the Board adopted policy and regulation. The proposed changes to the policy, which are underlined and the new regulation are included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt at first reading Revised Board Policy 6020 and New Regulation 6020, Parent Involvement.

<u>Programs- Blueprint for Learning Point 3</u>

Under the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation, additional requirements for Title I programs are incorporated into this new Board Policy and Regulation 6171. Areas addressed are relative to our Local Educational Agency Plan (LEAP) as well as comparability and program evaluation services required under the Title I legislation. A copy of the policy and regulation are included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt at first reading the newly developed Board Policy and Regulation 6171, Title I Programs.

### D. Adopt Resolution #2007/26, State Preschool Contract for Instructional Materials for School Year 2006-2007 - Blueprint for Learning Point 3 (Dr. Jindra – 5 minutes)

The California Department of Education has notified the District it has received a Child Development contract for a maximum reimbursable amount of \$2,626.00. These funds will be used for instructional materials and supplies to enhance the Preschool programs located at Mission Bell, Rustic Lane, Sunnyslope, Van Buren and West Riverside Elementary Schools. A copy of the Child Development contract is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #2007/26, State Preschool Contract for Instructional Materials for School Year 2006-2007.

### E. Approve Instructional Materials for Review - Blueprint for Learning Point 3

At the October 16, 2006, Board meeting, the Board approved for review the following textbook. The textbook was on display from October 17 through November 6, 2006 at the Education Center, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, 4850 Pedley Road; Rubidoux Public Library, Children's Section; and Glen Avon Public Library, Children's Section.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the adoption of the textbook <u>World Civilizations: The Global Experience</u> at a cost of \$27,913.46. These instructional materials will be paid for with District Instructional materials funds.

### F. Approve Request to Issue Invitation for Bids for the Relocation and Installation of Various Relocatable Classroom Buildings, Summer 2007-Blueprint for Learning Point 1 (Mrs. Lauzon – 5 minutes)

During summer 2007, Rubidoux High School will be relocated from the Patriot High School campus back to the Rubidoux High School Campus, Opal Street. To begin preparing for the move, during the summer 2007, relocatable classroom buildings will be moved off the Patriot High School campus to various other designated school campuses throughout the district. District staff will issue an Invitation for Bids for the relocation and installation of the relocatable classroom buildings.

The estimated total cost to relocate and install the buildings is \$130,000.00 and will be paid Developer Fee funds.

Administration recommends the Board approve request to issue Invitation for Bids for the relocation and installation of various relocatable classroom buildings from the Patriot High School Campus to various school campuses throughout the district.

### G. Approve Bid #07/05, Edward E. Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School, Stadium Grandstand-Blueprint for Learning Point 1 (Mrs. Lauzon – 5 minutes)

At the September 18, 2006 Board of Education meeting, the Board approved the advertisement and solicitation of bids for the renovation of the Edward E. Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School. As stated in the agenda item, the project will be bid in two separate phases. On October 10, 2006, 2 p.m., the Purchasing Department staff received and opened the following grandstand bids:

### Bid Category 29 - Stadium Bleachers

Southern Bleacher Construction Company, Inc. \$720,370.00 Steel Stadiums \$883,000.00

The lowest, most responsive bidder was Southern Bleacher Construction Company, Inc., in the amount of \$720,370.00. The Rubidoux High School Stadium renovation will be paid from Redevelopment and State School Building funds. Administration recommends the Board approve Bid #07/05, Edward E. Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School, Stadium Grandstands to Southern Bleacher Construction Company, Inc., in the amount of \$720,370.00.

### \*\* H. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Duchon – 2 Minutes)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel or the Agreement and Stipulation to Student Expulsion in the following discipline cases. These cases will be referred to the Student Assistance Program and (SCORE) the School and Community OutREach Team for follow-up:

### **REVOKE - SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES**

- 1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #05-039 for violation of Education Code Section 48900 (k), (.2) and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. The pupil will be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by Riverside County Office of Education. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 16, 2007.
- 2. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #06-165 for violation of Education Code Section 48900 (h), (k) and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. The pupil will be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by Riverside County Office of Education. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 16, 2007.
- 3. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #06-223 for violation of Education Code Section 48900 (a1), (i), (k) and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. The pupil will be referred to the Jurupa Community School, operated by Riverside County Office of Education. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 16, 2007.

### SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

- 1. Discipline Case #07-062 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to an Elementary School within the district and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 2. Discipline Case #07-073 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Jurupa Valley High and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 3. Discipline Case #07-074 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Jurupa Middle School and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 4. Discipline Case #07-075 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Rio Vista High School and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 5. Discipline Case #07-077 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k), (m) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to an Elementary School within the district and reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.

### EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

1. Discipline Case #07-054 is recommended for expulsion by the by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. However, the Board of Education

may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Spring Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in January for educational placement for the Spring Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.

### **EXPULSION CASE - ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING:**

- 1. Discipline Case #07-023 is recommended for expulsion by the Administrative Hearing Panel for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a1), (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 2. Discipline Case #07-027 is recommended for expulsion by the Administrative Hearing Panel for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before June 18, 2007.
- 3. Discipline Case #07-045 is recommended for expulsion by the Administrative Hearing Panel for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (b), (c3), (e) for one calendar year. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before November 5, 2007.
- 4. Discipline Case #07-047 is recommended for expulsion by the Administrative Hearing Panel for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (f), (k) and 48915 (e) for the Fall Semester 2006 and Spring Semester 2007. Annual Organizational Meetings, in years in which no such regular election for governing board members is conducted, shall be held during the same 15-day period on the calendar. This year, the dates are December 1 through December 15, 2006. Unless otherwise provided by rule of the governing board, the day and time of the Annual Organizational Meeting shall be selected by the board at its regular meeting held immediately prior to the first day of such 15-day period, and the board shall notify the County Superintendent of Schools of the day and time selected. The clerk of the board shall, within 15 days prior to the date of the Annual Organizational Meeting, notify in writing all members and members-elect of the date and time selected. If the board fails to select a day and time for the annual meeting, the County Superintendent of Schools shall designate, within the 15-day period, the day and time of the meeting. (E.C. Section 35143)

The Oath of Office must be administered before any officer enters on the duties of his/her office. (E.C. Section 60 and Govt. Code Section 1360) If the Oath of Office has been administered, the term of office for a newly elected board member begins Friday, December 1, 2006. (E.C. Section 5017) The Oath of

Office may be administered at the organizational meeting. An Oath of Office form is furnished by the Registrar's Office.

#### **Community College District**

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of a community college district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a secretary (E.C. Section 72000(2)).

#### City and Unified School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, each city board of education shall organize by electing a president from its members (E.C. Section 35143). Whenever a unified school district has within its boundaries a chartered city with a population of more than 8,000 or whenever the average daily attendance of a unified school district is 1,500 or more, for all purposes the district shall be deemed a city school district governed by a city board of education, and the governing board thereof shall be deemed a city board of education (E.C. Section 5206). The board of education of a unified school district that meets the standards of Education Code section 5206 is required to elect a president at the Annual Organizational Meeting. A unified school district with five board members that does not meet the standards of Education Code Section 5206 would be required to elect a president and a clerk (E.C. Section 35022, 35143, and 5206).

#### **High School District**

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of each high school district, union high school district, and joint union high school district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

#### **Elementary School District**

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with five or more board members shall elect a president and a clerk from among its members (E.C. Section 35022 and 35143). At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with less than five board members is required to elect one of its members as clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

## Selection of Representative to Vote in the Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election

The governing board of each school district of every kind or class shall annually, at its initial meeting, select one of its members as its representative, who shall have one vote for each member to be elected to the county committee. The

secretary or clerk of the district shall furnish the County Superintendent of Schools with a certificate naming the representative selected by the board (E.C. Section 35023) (72403 community college district).

After the Annual Organizational Meeting, please complete and return to Monica Martinez, no later than December 15, 2006, the enclosed form 3807 relating to the election of the governing board president, vice president (if one is elected), and clerk, the member selected to represent the school district at the annual election of members of the county committee, and the date, time, and place of regular meetings.

For your convenience, we have enclosed a copy of Secretary of State Form LP/SB-405 Rev. 12/99, "Statement of Facts Roster of Public Agencies Filing" amendment to be filed with the Secretary of State within ten days after any change of facts required to be stated pursuant to *Government Code Section* 53051(b).

#### Parent Involvement

The Governing Board recognizes that parents/guardians are their children's first and most influential teachers and that sustained parent involvement in the education of their children contributes greatly to student achievement and a positive school environment.

The Superintendent or designee shall work with staff and parents/guardians to develop meaningful opportunities at all grade levels for parents/guardians to be involved in district and school activities; advisory, decision-making, and advocacy roles; and activities to support learning at home.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of their rights to be informed about and to participate in their children's education and of the opportunities available to them to do so.

#### Title I Schools

Each year the Superintendent or designee shall identify specific objectives of the district's parent involvement program for schools that receive Title I funding. He/she shall ensure that parents/guardians are consulted and participate in the planning, design, implementation, and evaluation of the parent involvement program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's parent involvement strategies are jointly developed with and agreed upon by parents/guardians of students participating in Title I programs. Those strategies shall establish expectations for parent involvement and describe how the district will carry out each activity.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with parents/guardians of participating students in the planning and implementation of parent involvement programs, activities, and regulations. He/she also shall involve parents/guardians of participating students in decisions regarding how the district's Title I funds will be allotted for parent involvement activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school receiving Title I funds develop a school-level parent involvement policy.

#### Non-Title I Schools

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies applicable to each school that does not receive federal Title I funds to encourage the involvement and support of parents/guardians in the education of their children, including, but not limited to, strategies described below: In order to engage parents/guardians positively in their children's education, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff members at each school:

1. Engage parents positively in their children's education by helping parents to develop skills to use at home that support their children's academic efforts at school and their children's development as

responsible future members of our society. Help parents/guardians develop parenting skills and provide home environments that support their children's academic efforts and their development as responsible members of society;

- 2. Inform parent/guardians that they can directly affect the success of their children's learning, by providing parents with techniques and strategies that they may use to improve their children's academic success and to assist their children in learning at home.
- Initiate consistent and effective two-way communication between the home and school so that parents/guardians may know when and how to help their children in support of classroom learning activities;
- 4. Receive training that fosters effective and culturally sensitive communication with the home, including training on how to communicate with non-English speakers and how to give parents/guardian opportunities to assist in the instructional process both at school and at home.
- 5. Integrate parent involvement programs, including actions and strategies addressing this section, into the school's single plan for student achievement for academic accountability.
- 6. Encourage parents/guardian to serve as volunteers in the schools (Board Policy 1231), attend student performances and school meetings, and participate in site councils, advisory councils and other activities in which they may undertake governance, advisory, and advocacy roles.

School plans shall delineate specific measures that shall be taken to increase parental involvement with their children's education.

#### Parent Involvement

#### District Strategies for Title I Schools

To ensure that parents/guardians of students participating in Title  $\underline{I}$  programs are provided with opportunities to be involved in their children's education, the Superintendent or designee shall:

1. Involve parents/guardians of participating students in the joint development of the Title I local educational agency (LEA) plan and the process of school review and improvement.

#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Establish a district-level committee including parent/guardian representatives from each school site to review and comment on the LEA plan in accordance with the review schedule established by the Governing Board.
- b. Invite input on the LEA plan from other district committees and school site councils.
- Communicate with parents/guardians through the district newsletter, web site, or other methods regarding the LEA plan and the opportunity to provide input.
- d. Provide copies of working drafts of the LEA plan to parents/guardians in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents/guardians can understand.
- e. Ensure that there is an opportunity at a public Board meeting for public comment on the LEA plan prior to the Board's approval of the plan or revisions to the plan.
- Ensure that school-level policies on parent involvement address the role of school site councils and other parents/guardians as appropriate in the development and review of school plans.
- 2. Provide coordination, technical assistance, and other support necessary to assist Title I schools in planning and implementing effective parent involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance.

#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Assign person(s) in the district office to serve as a liaison to the schools regarding Title I parent involvement issues.
- b. Provide training for the principal or designee of each participating school regarding Title I requirements for parent involvement, leadership strategies, and communication skills to



- assist him/her in facilitating the planning and implementation of parent involvement activities.
- c. Provide ongoing district-level workshops to assist school site staff and parents/guardians in planning and implementing improvement strategies, and seek input from parents/guardians in developing the workshops.
- d. Provide information to schools about the indicators and assessment tools that will be used to monitor progress.
- 3. Build the capacity of schools and parents/guardians for strong parent involvement.

#### The Superintendent or designee shall:

- a. Assist parents/guardians in understanding such topics as the state's academic content standards and academic achievement standards, state and local academic assessments, the requirements of Title I, and how to monitor a child's progress and work with educators to improve the achievement of their children.
- b. Provide materials and training to help parents/guardians work with their children to improve their children's achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parent involvement.
- c. Educate teachers, student services personnel, principals, and other staff, with the assistance of parents/guardians, in the value and utility of parent/guardian contributions and in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents/guardians as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent/guardian programs, and build ties between parents/guardians and the schools.
- d. To the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parent involvement programs and activities with Head Start,
  Parents as Teachers Program, state preschool, and other programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents/guardians in more fully participating in their children's education.
- e. Ensure that information related to school and parent/guardian programs, meetings, and other activities is sent to the parents/guardians of participating students in a format and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents/guardians can understand.
- f. Provide other such reasonable support for parent involvement activities as parents/guardians may request.
- g. Inform parents/guardians and parent organizations of the existence and purpose of parent information and resource centers



in the state that provide training, information, and support to parents/guardians of participating students.

#### In addition, the Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Involve parents/guardians in the development of training for teachers, principals, and other educators to improve the effectiveness of such training.
- b. Provide necessary literacy training, using Title I funds if the district has exhausted all other reasonably available sources of funding for such training.
- c. Pay reasonable and necessary expenses associated with parent involvement activities, including transportation and child care costs, to enable parents/guardians to participate in school-related meetings and training sessions.
- d. Train parents/guardians to enhance the involvement of other parents/guardians.
- e. Arrange school meetings at a variety of times or, when parents/guardians are unable to attend such conferences, conduct in-home conferences between parents/guardians and teachers or other educators who work directly with participating students.
- f. Adopt and implement model approaches to improving parent involvement
- g. Establish a districtwide parent advisory council to provide advice on all matters related to parent involvement in Title I programs.
- h. Develop appropriate roles for community-based organizations and businesses in parent involvement activities.
- i. Make referrals to community agencies and organizations that offer literacy training, parent education programs, and/or other services that help to improve the conditions of parents/guardians and families
- j. Provide a master calendar of district activities and district meetings.
- k. Provide information about opportunities for parent involvement through the district newsletter, web site, or other written or electronic means.
- 1. Engage parent-teacher organizations to actively seek out and involve parents/guardians through regular communication updates and information sessions



- m. To the extent practicable, provide translation services at school sites and at meetings involving parents/guardians as needed.
- n. Provide training and information to members of district and school site councils and advisory committees to help them fulfill their functions.
- o. Regularly evaluate the effectiveness of staff development activities related to parent involvement.
- p. Include expectations for parent/guardian outreach and involvement in staff job descriptions and evaluations
- 4. Coordinate and integrate Title I parent involvement strategies with Head Start, Parents as Teachers Program, state preschool, and other programs.

The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Identify overlapping or similar program requirements.
- b. Involve district and school site representatives from other programs to assist in identifying specific population needs.
- c. Schedule joint meetings with representatives from related programs and share data and information across programs.
- d. Develop a cohesive, coordinated plan focused on student needs and shared goals.
- 5. Conduct, with involvement of parents/guardians, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the parent involvement policy in improving the academic quality of the schools served by Title I.

The Superintendent or designee shall:

- a. Ensure that the evaluation include the identification of barriers to greater participation in parent involvement activities, with particular attention to parents/guardians who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are of any racial or ethnic minority background.
- b. Use the evaluation results to design strategies for more effective parent involvement and, if necessary, to recommend changes in the parent involvement policy.
- Assess the district's progress in meeting annual objectives for the parent involvement program, notify parents/guardians of this review and assessment through regular school communications mechanisms, and provide a copy to parents/guardians upon their request.



#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Use a variety of methods, such as focus groups, surveys, and workshops, to evaluate the satisfaction of parents/guardians and staff with the quality and frequency of district communications.
- b. Gather and monitor data regarding the number of parents/guardians participating in district activities and the types of activities in which they are engaged.
- c. Recommend to the Board measures to evaluate the impact of the district's parent involvement efforts on student achievement.
- 6. Involve parents/guardians in the activities of schools served by Title I.

#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Include information about school activities in district communications to parents/guardians.
- b. To the extent practicable, assist schools with translation services or other accommodations needed to encourage participation of parents/guardians with special needs.
- c. Establish processes to encourage parent/guardian input regarding their expectations and concerns for their children.

The district's Board policy and administrative regulation containing parent involvement strategies shall be incorporated into the LEA plan and distributed to parents/guardians of students participating in Title I programs.

#### School-Level Policies for Title I Schools

At each school receiving Title I funds, a written policy on parent involvement shall be developed jointly with and agreed upon by parents/guardians of participating students. Such policy shall describe the means by which the school will:

- 1. Convene an annual meeting, at a convenient time, to which all parents/guardians of participating students shall be invited and encouraged to attend, in order to inform parents/guardians of their school's participation in Title I and to explain Title I requirements and the right of parents/guardians to be involved.
- 2. Offer a flexible number of meetings, such as meetings in the morning or evening, for which related transportation, child care, and/or home visits may be provided as such services relate to parent involvement.
- 3. Involve parents/guardians in an organized, ongoing, and timely way in the planning, review, and improvement of Title I programs, including



the planning, review, and improvement of the school's parent involvement policy and, if applicable, the joint development of the plan for schoolwide programs.

The school may use an existing process for involving parents/guardians in the joint planning and design of the school's programs provided that the process includes adequate representation of parents/guardians of participating students.

- 4. Provide the parents/guardians of participating students all of the following:
  - a. Timely information about Title I programs.
  - b. A description and explanation of the school's curriculum, forms of academic assessment used to measure student progress, and the proficiency levels students are expected to meet.
  - c. If requested by parents/guardians, opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions related to their children's education, and, as soon as practicably possible, responses to the suggestions of parents/guardians.
- 5. If the schoolwide program plan is not satisfactory to the parents/guardians of participating students, submit any parent/guardian comments when the school makes the plan available to the district.
- 6. Jointly develop with the parents/guardians of participating students a school-parent compact that outlines how parents/guardians, the entire school staff, and students will share responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents/guardians will build a partnership to help students achieve state standards.

#### This compact shall address:

- a. The school's responsibility to provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables participating students to achieve the state's student academic achievement standards.
- b. Ways in which parents/guardians will be responsible for supporting their children's learning, such as monitoring attendance, homework completion, and television viewing; volunteering in the classroom; and participating, as appropriate, in decisions related to their children's education and the positive use of extracurricular time.
- The importance of communication between teachers and parents/guardians on an ongoing basis through, at a minimum:



- (1) Parent-teacher conferences in elementary schools, at least annually, during which the compact shall be discussed as it relates to the student's achievement.
- (2) Frequent reports to parents/guardians on their children's progress.
- (3) Reasonable access to staff, opportunities to volunteer and participate in their child's classroom, and observation of classroom activities.
- 7. Build the capacity of the school and parents/guardians for strong parent involvement by implementing the activities described in items #3a-f in the section "District Strategies for Title I Schools" above.
- 8. To the extent practicable, provide full opportunities for the participation of parents/guardians with limited English proficiency, parents/guardians with disabilities, and parents/guardians of migrant children, including providing information and school reports in a format and language such parents/guardians can understand.

If the school has a parent involvement policy that applies to all parents/quardians, it may amend that policy to meet the above requirements.

Each school's parent involvement policy shall be made available to the local community and distributed to parents/guardians of participating students in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, provided in a language the parents/guardians can understand.

Each school receiving Title I funds shall annually evaluate the effectiveness of its parent involvement policy. Such evaluation may be conducted during the process of reviewing the school's single plan for student achievement.

The principal or designee, jointly with parents/guardians of participating students, shall periodically update the school's policy to meet the changing needs of parents/guardians and the school.

#### District Strategies for Non-Title I Schools

For each school that does not receive federal Title I funds, the Superintendent or designee shall, at a minimum:

1. Engage parents positively in their children's education by helping parents to develop skills to use at home that support their children's academic efforts at school and their children's development as responsible future members of our society.

The Superintendent or designee may:

a. Provide or make referrals to literacy training and/or parent education programs designed to improve the skills of



- parents/guardians and enhance their ability to support their children's education.
- b. Provide information, in parent handbooks and through other appropriate means, regarding academic expectations and resources to assist with the subject matter.
- c. Provide parents/guardians with information about students' class assignments and homework assignments.
- 2. Inform parent/guardians that they can directly affect the success of their children's learning, by providing parents with techniques and strategies that they may use to improve their children's academic success and to assist their children in learning at home.

#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Provide parents/guardians with information regarding ways to create an effective study environment at home and to encourage good study habits.
- b. Encourage parents/guardians to monitor their children's school attendance, homework completion, and television viewing.
- c. Encourage parents/guardians to volunteer in their child's classroom and to participate in school advisory committees.
- Initiate consistent and effective two-way communication between the home and school so that parents/guardians may know when and how to help their children in support of classroom learning activities.

#### The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Ensure that teachers provide frequent reports to parents/guardians on their children's progress and hold parent-teacher conferences at least once per year with parents/guardians of elementary school students.
- b. Provide opportunities for parents/guardians to observe classroom activities and to volunteer in their child's classroom.
- c. Provide information about parent involvement opportunities through district, school, and/or class newsletters, the district's web site, and other written or electronic communications.
- d. To the extent practicable, provide notices and information to parents/guardians in a format and language they can understand.
- e. Develop mechanisms to encourage parent/guardian input on district and school issues.



- f. Identify barriers to parent/guardian participation in school activities, including parents/guardians who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are of any racial or ethnic minority background.
- g. Encourage greater parent/guardian participation by adjusting meeting schedules to accommodate parent/guardian needs and, to the extent practicable, by providing translation or interpreter services, transportation, and/or child care.
- 4. Receive training that fosters effective and culturally sensitive communication with the home, including training on how to communicate with non-English speakers and how to give parents/guardian opportunities to assist in the instructional process both at school and at home.

The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Provide staff development to assist staff in strengthening twoway communications with parents/guardians, including parents/guardians who have limited English proficiency or limited literacy.
- b. Invite input from parents/guardians regarding the content of staff development activities pertaining to home-school communications.
- 5. Integrate parent involvement programs, including actions and strategies addressing this section, into the school's single plan for student achievement for academic accountability.

The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Include parent involvement strategies in school reform or school improvement initiatives.
- Involve parents/guardians in school planning processes.

#### Title I Programs

In order to improve the academic achievement of students from economically disadvantaged families, the district shall use federal Title I funds to provide supplementary services that reinforce the core curriculum and assist students in attaining proficiency on state academic standards and assessments.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide technical assistance and support to any school participating in the Title I program, including consultation in the development and implementation of school plans and activities.

The district and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent involvement policy.

#### Local Educational Agency Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other appropriate school personnel, and parents/guardians of participating students in the development, periodic review, and, as necessary, the revision of a local educational agency (LEA) plan. The plan and any revisions shall be submitted to the Governing Board for approval.

The plan shall describe the assessments, strategies, and services the district will use to help low-achieving students meet challenging academic standards.

The initial plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) and approved by the State Board of Education. Subsequent revisions of the plan shall be kept on file in the district.

#### Comparability of Services

State and local funds used in schools receiving Title I funds shall provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all district schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade span.

To demonstrate comparability of services among district schools:

- The Board shall adopt and implement a districtwide salary schedule.
- 2. The ratio of students to teachers, administrators, and other staff at each Title I school shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio across non-Title I schools.
- 3. Salary expenditures at each Title I school shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I schools.



- 4. All district schools shall be provided with the same level of base funding per student for curriculum and instructional materials.
- 5. The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of the quantity and quality of instructional materials and equipment at each school.

In determining comparability, the district shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. The district also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to disabled students, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I.

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall measure comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting the district's compliance. If any instances of noncomparability are identified, the Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

#### Program Evaluation

The Board shall use state assessment results and other available measures or indicators to annually determine whether each participating school is making adequate yearly progress toward ensuring that all students meet the state's proficient level of achievement on state assessments.

#### Title I Programs

#### Schoolwide Programs

A school may operate a Title I schoolwide program in order to upgrade the entire educational program of the school when at least 40 percent of the students in the school attendance area, or at least 40 percent of the students enrolled in the school, are from low-income families. The Superintendent or designee shall inform any such eligible school and the school's parents/guardians of the school's eligibility and its ability to consolidate funds from federal, state, and local sources for program purposes.

Any participating school shall develop, annually review, and update a single plan for student achievement which incorporates the plan for reforming the school's total instructional program and plans required by other categorical programs included in the state's consolidated application.

#### A schoolwide program shall include:

- 1. A comprehensive needs assessment of the entire school which includes the achievement of students in relation to state academic content and achievement standards.
- 2. Schoolwide reform strategies that:
  - a. Provide opportunities for all students to meet the state's proficient and advanced levels of achievement.
  - b. Use effective methods and instructional strategies, based on scientifically based research, that strengthen the school's core academic program, increase the amount and quality of learning time, help provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, and include strategies for meeting the educational needs of historically underserved populations.
  - c. Include strategies to address the needs of all students in the school, but particularly the needs of low-achieving students and those at risk of not meeting state achievement standards who are members of the target population of any program that is part of the schoolwide program.
  - Such strategies may include counseling, student services, mentoring services, college and career awareness and preparation, and the integration of vocational and technical education programs.
  - d. Address how the school will determine if student needs have been met.
  - e. Are consistent with and designed to implement state and local improvement plans, if any.



- 3. Instruction by highly qualified teachers.
- 4. High-quality and ongoing professional development for teachers, principals, paraprofessionals, and, if appropriate, student services personnel, other staff, and parents/guardians to enable all students in the school to meet state academic achievement standards.
- 5. Strategies to attract high-quality, highly qualified teachers to high-need schools.
- 6. Strategies to increase parent involvement.
- 7. Plans for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood programs to elementary school programs.
- 8. Measures to include teachers in decisions regarding the use of academic assessments to provide information on and to improve the achievement of individual students and the overall instructional program.
- 9. Activities to ensure that students who experience difficulty mastering the proficient and advanced levels of academic standards shall be provided with effective, timely additional assistance, which shall include measures for timely identification of students' difficulties and provision of sufficient information on which to base effective assistance.
- 10. Coordination and integration of federal, state, and local services and programs.

#### Targeted Assistance Programs

Any school that receives Title I funds but does not operate a schoolwide program shall use Title I funds to provide services to:

- 1. Students in grades PreK-8 identified by the school as failing, or most at risk of failing, to meet the state's academic achievement standards on the basis of criteria established by the district and supplemented by the school.
- 2. Students in preschool through grade 2 selected solely on the basis of such criteria as teacher judgment, interviews with parents/guardians, and developmentally appropriate measures.

#### A targeted assistance program shall:

- Use program resources to help participating students meet state academic achievement standards expected for all students.
- Ensure that program planning is incorporated into existing school planning.
- 3. Use effective methods and instructional strategies, based on



scientifically based research, that strengthen the core academic program, give primary consideration to providing extended learning time, help provide an accelerated, high-quality curriculum, and minimize removing students from the regular classroom during regular school hours for instruction provided by Title I .

- 4. Coordinate with and support the regular education program, which may include services to assist preschool students in the transition to elementary school programs.
- 5. Provide instruction by highly qualified teachers.
- 6. Provide opportunities for professional development for teachers, principals, paraprofessionals, and, if appropriate, student services personnel, other staff, and parents/guardians who work with participating students.
- 7. Provide strategies to increase parent involvement.
- 8. Coordinate and integrate federal, state, and local services and programs.

#### Participation of Private School Students

The Superintendent or designee shall provide or contract to provide special educational services or other Title I benefits to eligible private school students residing in a participating school attendance area. Such services and benefits shall be provided on an equitable basis with participating public school students.

Teachers, other educational personnel, and families of participating private school students shall have an opportunity to participate, on an equitable basis, in parent involvement activities and professional development.

Each year the Superintendent or designee shall contact officials of private schools with students who reside within district boundaries, regardless of whether the private school they attend is located within the district or whether or not those officials have previously indicated any interest in program participation.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult, in a meaningful and timely manner, with appropriate private school officials during the design and development of the district's Title I programs. Such consultation shall occur before the district makes any decision that affects the opportunities of eligible private school students to participate in Title I programs and shall include a discussion of:

- 1. How the needs of private school students will be identified.
- 2. What services will be offered.
- 3. How, where, and by whom the services will be provided.



- 4. How the services will be academically assessed and how assessment results will be used to improve those services.
- 5. The size and scope of the equitable services to be provided to private school students and the proportion of funds that is allocated for such services.
- 6. The method or sources of data that are used to determine the number of students from low-income families in participating school attendance areas who attend private schools.
- 7. How and when the district will make decisions about the delivery of service to such students, including a thorough consideration and analysis of the views of private school officials on the provision of services through a third-party provider.
- 8. How, if the district disagrees with the views of private school officials on the provision of services through a third-party provider, the district will provide to private school officials a written analysis of the reasons that the district has chosen not to use a contractor.

Meetings between district and private school officials shall continue throughout implementation and assessment of services.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain, and shall provide to the California Department of Education upon request, a written affirmation signed by officials of each participating private school that consultation has occurred.

If the private school officials do not provide such affirmation within a reasonable period of time, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of the consultation or the offer of consultation.

The Superintendent or designee also shall maintain records documenting that:

- The needs of private school teachers and/or private school students were identified.
- 2. The funds made available were equitable to those allocated for public school students and teachers.
- 3. The district's program met the needs of the private school teachers and/or private school students.
- 4. The district made efforts to resolve any complaints made by private school representatives.

#### STANDARD PROVISIONS FOR STATE CONTRACTS

- 1. The Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying work services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this Agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be injured or damaged by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement.
- 2. Contractor, and the agents and employees of Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers or employees or agents of the State.
- 3. The State may terminate this Agreement and be relieved of any payments should the Contractor fail to perform the requirements of this Agreement at the time and in the manner herein provided. In the event of such termination the State may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by the State. All costs to the State shall be deducted from any sum due the Contractor under this Agreement and the balance, if any, shall be paid to the Contractor upon demand.
- 4. This Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the State in the form of a formal written amendment.
- 5. Time is of the essence in this Agreement.
- 6. No amendment or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties and approved as required. No oral understanding or Agreement not incorporated in the Agreement is binding on any of the parties.
- 7. The consideration to be paid Contractor, as provided herein, shall be in compensation for all of Contractor's expenses incurred in the performance hereof, including travel, per diem, and taxes, unless otherwise expressly so provided.
- 8. Contractors entering into a contract funded wholly or in part with funds from the United States Government agree to amendments in funding to reflect any reductions in funds if the Congress does not appropriate sufficient funds.
