4. Administrative Reports and Written Communications

* a. Hear Update on Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA) Allocation

(Dr. Jindra – 2 minutes)

In March 2007, the Board approved the submittal of an application for Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA) funds for six elementary schools in the district. The California Department of Education recently notified the district that two of our schools qualified for these funds. Pacific Avenue Elementary School will receive \$204,167 and Rustic Lane Elementary School will receive \$350,719 for the 2007-08 fiscal year. QEIA funds are to be used to support lower class sizes, ensure highly qualified teachers with experience equal to or better than the District average and professional development to help meet student achievement outcomes. After the first three years of full funding, schools in the program must exceed their Academic Performance Index growth target for the school averaged over the first three years of funding. A QEIA funded school that continues to meet the program and achievement requirements will be funded annually through the 2013-14 fiscal year. b. Hear Update on K-5 Summer Extended Learning Opportunities (ELO) Program

(Dr. Jindra – 5 minutes)

The first day of summer K-5 Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) program will begin on July 2nd and end on August 7th. The program will start with approximately 2,500 students in attendance and will run from Monday through Thursday. The school sites this year will be Ina Arbuckle, Camino Real, Stone Avenue and Pedley Elementary Schools. Funds from the State's "Retention/At Risk of Retention and Core Academic" programs are combined with funding from federal Title I to maximize the number of students that can be served. We have added two School Readiness programs at Ina Arbuckle for pre-kindergarten students. In addition, we will have one Newcomer program at Ina Arbuckle.

Typically, approximately one-half of the K-5 students are Limited English Proficient (LEP). Limited English students at the Beginning and Early Intermediate will be receiving an intensive program of English Language Development (ELD) on ELD standards at their proficiency levels. In addition, 180 Special Education students will be attending the elementary program on standards aligned to their IEP goals.

ELO focuses on State standards in the areas of language arts, mathematics, and English language development (ELD). ELO also features standards-based reading, writing, ELD, and mathematics materials; standards-aligned lesson plans and homework packets; purchase orders for teachers to obtain standards-based supplemental materials; and report cards that communicate pre- and post-test scores on standards mastery to parents, teachers, and principals.

The following support is also included: bus transportation, breakfast, lunch, principals that administer the program and two TSAs at each school—one to manage the site and one to coach teachers on their implementation of the instructional program. Each site also receives a secretary and translator clerk, food services worker, health aide, activity supervisors, custodians, and crossing guards. Information only.

c. Hear Update on Secondary Summer Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) Program

(Dr. Jindra – 5 minutes)

The first day of summer school 6-7 Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) program will begin on July 2nd and end on August 7th. The program runs Monday through Thursday. The school sites this year will be Mission Middle School and Mira Loma Middle School.

All 8th grade students who will begin their freshman year of high school in the fall will be assigned to Jurupa Valley High School, Patriot High School and Rubidoux High School. Rubidoux High School will be housed on the Mission Middle School Campus and all high school classes will begin on Monday June 25th, 2007 and conclude on August 2nd. Summer School Graduation will be held on Tuesday August 7th at 5:00 P.M.

Funding for the ELO program will come from the State's "Retention/At Risk of Retention and Core Academic programs as well as Title I funding to maximize the number of students that can be served. We have also maximized our efforts to provide the English Language Learners with the opportunity to advance their CELDT Level through summer school this year. In addition to our ELL, we will also have a strong Special Education program at all secondary summer schools which will be standards-based and aligned to the students IEP goals. At Mission Middle School, we have also added a Math Academy for incoming 6th graders to prepare them for Algebra.

ELO focuses on State standards in the area of English/language arts, reading, writing, English Language Development (ELD) and mathematics. The program includes standards-aligned lesson plans and homevork packets, along with standards-based supplemental materials. Parents and students will receive a report card that will communicate the student's growth and obtainment of mastery of the standards.

Additional support also includes bus transportation for the middle school students and ELL students, breakfast and lunch, administrators and two TSA's to support the management and curriculum implementation of the program. Each site will have a secretary, translator clerk, food service worker, health aide, activities supervisors and custodial support. Information only.

HEARING AND ACTION SESSION

I. <u>Adopt Resolution No 2008/02, Approving Joint Community Facilities Agreement with Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District for Community Facilities District No.</u>
(Mrs. Lauzon – 5 Minutes)

At tonight's meeting, the Board will be asked to adopt resolutions to establish Community Facilities District No. 7 for the purpose of financing through the sale of bonds the design, construction and acquisition of school and park facilities, which are necessary to meet increased demands placed upon the school district and park districts as a result of the development of real property. A Community Facilities District may finance facilities to be owned or operated by a public agency other than the agency that created the district if each entity adopts a resolution declaring that such a joint agreement would be beneficial to the residents of that entity. A copy of the Resolution and Joint Community Facilities Agreement are included in the supporting documents.

The Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District Board approved the Joint Community Facilities Agreement on June 14, 2007.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Resolution #2008/02, Approving Joint Community Facilities Agreement with Jurupa Area Park and Recreation District for Community Facilities District No. 7.

* II. Conduct Public Hearing and Adopt Resolutions #2008/03, #2008/04 and #2008/05 (Mrs. Lauzon – 5 Minutes)

On May 21, 2007, the Board of Education adopted resolutions initiating proceedings under the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 to establish community Facilities District No. 7 for the financing of public school facilities and park and recreational facilities. The resolution of intention to establish Community Facilities District No. 7 and the resolution declaring the necessity of CFD No. 7 to incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000, adopted on May 21, 2007, scheduled a public hearing for July 2, 2007. As required by law, notices of the hearing were mailed to the property owners and were published in The Press-Enterprise and the Riverside County Record newspapers.

President Harris will open the public hearing and follow the agenda for conducting the public hearing that has been provided by bond counsel. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board will be asked to adopt Resolutions #2008/03, #2008/04 and #2008/05. Adoption of such resolutions will establish Community Facilities District No. 7, authorize the issuance of bonds within Community Facilities District No. 7 in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 upon voter approval and call for an election for the levy of special taxes within the Community Facilities District and the issuance of bonded indebtedness therein. Copies of the resolutions are included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends adoption of Resolution #2008/03, #2008/004 and #2008/05. Following adoption, the Board President may close the public hearing.

III. Canvass of Ballots and Adoption of Resolution #2008/06 (Mrs. Lauzon - 5 Minutes) Immediately following the public hearing on the formation of Community Facilities District No. 7, sealed Official Ballots will be delivered to the Clerk of the Board of Education. At that time, the Clerk of the Board of Education will canvas the ballots. Since the property owners have requested the formation of the community facilities district, it is expected that they will cast their votes in favor of the propositions set forth in the Official Ballots. After the Clerk of the Board has canvassed the ballots, the Board of Education will consider the adoption of Resolution #2008/06, the resolution declaring the results of the election. A copy of the resolution is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #2008/06 that concludes the proceeding for the formation of Community Facilities District No. 7.

IV. Review at First Informational Reading Ordinance No. 2008/01, Levying a Special Tax on Community Facilities District No. 7 (Mrs. Lauzon – 5 Minutes) Ordinance No. 2008/01 is needed to authorize and levy special taxes within Community Facilities District No. 7 at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Resolution #2008/01. A copy of the Ordinance is included in the supporting documents for the Board's review. A second reading and adoption will be placed on the July 16th agenda for the Board's consideration.

Administration recommends approval at a first informational reading Ordinance No. 2008/01, Levying a Special Tax on Community Facilities District No. 7.

B. Approve Submittal of Part I of the 2007/2008 Consolidated Application

(Dr. Jindra -10 minutes)

The State Department of Education requires that districts desiring to apply for certain categorical funds submit a consolidated application. This application requests funds for twelve categorical programs including: 1) the federal Title I program which provides supplemental funds to qualified low income schools in the district to plan and implement programs for underachieving compensatory education students, 2) federal Title II (Teacher Quality) provides professional development to teachers and principals, federal Title III (Immigrant), 4) federal Title III (LEP Students), 5) federal Title IV (Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities); 6) federal Title V (Innovative Education) provides library and counseling services, 7) AB1113 School Safety Block Grant to support violence prevention, 8) CalSAFE is a school-based program for expectant and parenting students and their children, 9) state Economic Impact Aid for compensatory and bilingual education; 10) state Peer Assistance Review (PAR) program for teacher mentoring; 11) state Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (TUPE), and (12) Middle and High School Supplemental Counseling program for support of students who have not passed the CAHSEE or are two or more years behind grade level.

Part I of the Consolidated Application contains 153 separate assurances covering the In addition, this portion of the legal compliance requirements for each program. document requires that the district submit certification of private school participation (if applicable) and compensatory education ranking of schools for Title I and state compensatory education funding. The district uses the percentage of students receiving free and reduced lunches as the economic criterion to rank schools. The district must also report data relative to students who have received Title I services from 2006-2007 as well as activities implemented for program improvement schools. In addition, a form identifying the number of NCLB compliant teachers and paraprofessionals is used to evaluate district's compliance with ensuring "Highly Qualified" staff. When the initial application is submitted, final appropriations are not known, therefore, district and school site personnel are directed to base their planning for the next fiscal year on prior year funding. We currently have ten schools receiving Title I funding: West Riverside, Ina Arbuckle, Troth Street, Mission Bell, Rustic Lane, Pacific Avenue, Granite Hill, Sunnyslope, Stone Avenue and Indian Hills. The remaining seven qualifying schools receive Economic Impact Aid funding: Pedley, Van Buren, Glen Avon, Peralta, Mission Middle, Mira Loma Middle, and Jurupa Middle schools. In November, the district request will be updated and Part II of the Consolidated Application will be submitted with final appropriations. A copy of the application is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the submittal for Part I of the 2007-2008 Consolidated Application.

C. Approve District Education Technology Plan (2008-2011) (Mrs. Lauzon -10 minutes)

Administration is requesting approval of the District Education Technology Plan (2008-2011). This approval will enable the district to file the plan with the California Technology Assistance Project (CTAP) for their review and approval, which is a necessary step in order to submit our July 2007 Request for Proposal for our 2008-2009 Districtwide Fiber Optic Network Services to the E-Rate program. The district intends to file a revised, more elaborate version of the 2008-2011 Education Technology Plan later this year, after this initial plan has been reviewed and updated further by the appropriate committees.

A brief description of the Plan is included in the supporting documents. The comprehensive Education Technology Plan is provided to Board Members under separate cover.

Administration recommends the Board approve District Education Technology Plan (2008-2011).

D. Approve Deductive Change Order 1, Category 2 - Genesis Paving, Inc., Contract 1000294, Renovation of Edward Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School

(Mrs. Lauzon -5 minutes)

At the May 4, 2007 Board of Education meeting, the Board approved the bid for the renovation of the Edward Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School. In the agenda item, Staff informed the Board that a deductive change order in the amount of \$86,548.00 to eliminate the live grass planting and irrigation system under Category 1 would be brought back to the Board for approval. This deductive change order will decrease Category 2, Landscaping contract as follows:

Category 2 - Landscaping Genesis Paving, Inc. \$ 313,452.00 *(*86,548.00) Change Order, deductive

226,904.00 **Revised Contract Amount**

The deductive change order will reduce the total dollar amount of Contract 1000294, Genesis Paving by \$86,548.00 or from \$313,452.00 to \$226,904.00.

Administration recommends the Board approve Deductive Change Order 1, Category 2-Genesis Paving, Inc., Contract 1000294, Renovation of Edward Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School in the amount of \$86,548.00 or from \$313,452.00 to \$226,904.00.

E. Approve Resolution #2008/01, Emergency Abatement of Asbestos at Edward E. (Mrs. Lauzon -5 minutes) Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School During renovation of the Edward E. Hawkins Stadium, the Board entered into a contract with Janus Corporation for the abatement and removal of asbestos and lead prior to demolition of the bleachers and related structures. During this same time frame, an asbestos cement water pipe was discovered below grade by the grading contractor on the stadium site. Sections of the pipe were found at both the east and west perimeters of the site. Upon discovery of the pipe, grading was halted and environmental specialists were

called to assess the situation. A visual inspection and further testing concluded that the water pipe contained asbestos. Because the pipe was exposed, the district believed it necessary to immediately abate and remove the asbestos. Although asbestos is not harmful if not disturbed, the exposed pipe posed a health and safety risk to the public if disturbed. Since Janus Corporation was already on site, staff contacted them to immediately abate and remove the asbestos. The amount to abate the asbestos was \$26,503.00.

Public Contract Code 20113 states the district may enter into a contract for the performance of the work without advertising for bids in an emergency to avoid danger to life or property. Staff is requesting the Board approve Resolution #2008/01, Emergency Abatement of Asbestos at the Edward E. Hawkins Stadium in order to avoid danger to life or property. A copy of the Resolution is included in the supporting documents.

The replacement cost was paid from Redevelopment funds.

Administration recommends the Board approve Resolution #2008/01, Emergency Abatement of Asbestos at Edward E. Hawkins Stadium, Rubidoux High School. The work was performed by Janus Corporation in the amount of \$26,503.00.

F. Ratify Emergency Purchase of Greenfield Dual Hose Dispenser (Mrs. Lauzon -5 minutes)

On or about May 22, 2007, an accident involving the CNG fuel pump resulted in a nonfunctioning fuel station. In order to have as little down time as possible, the district took immediate action to repair the fuel station by ordering the new fuel dispenser. The estimated lead time for the manufacturing of the new dispenser was estimated to be between 10 to 12 weeks. The cost of the fuel pump is \$49,383.76 and is being manufactured by GreenField Compression, Inc., the manufacturer of the CNG station. This item was pulled from the June 2, 2007 Board agenda as it was brought as an emergency resolution, which is not required since the dollar amount is within the bid limit threshold of \$69,100.00 for materials and supplies.

The replacement cost will be paid from Self-Insured funds.

Administration recommends the Board Ratify the Emergency Purchase of the Greenfield Dual Hose Dispenser from GreenField Compression, Inc. in the amount of \$49,383.76.

G. Act on Student Discipline Cases

(Mr. Duchon)

The Board of Education hereby accepts and adopts as its own the Findings of Fact and the Conclusions of Law submitted by the Administrative Hearing Panel in each of the following discipline cases:

REVOKE - EXPULSION CASE:

1. It is recommended that the Board of Education revoke the Suspended Expulsion Order of the following pupil in Discipline Case #06-319 for violation of Education Code Section 48900 (k) and expel the pupil under the terms of the original expulsion order. The pupil will be referred to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before September 4, 2007.

SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

- 1. Discipline Case #07-395 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (g), (k) and 48915 (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. Pupil shall be placed at Jurupa Valley High School. The pupil shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008
- 2. Discipline Case #07-396 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a)(1), (a)(2), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended and the student be placed on school probation. Pupil shall be placed at Jurupa Valley High School. The pupil shall be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.

EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

1. Discipline Case #07-350 is recommended for expulsion by Administrative Hearing for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (f), (g), (k), (l) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.

2. Discipline Case #07-394 is recommended for expulsion by Administrative Hearing for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k) and 48915 (a)(2), (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.

EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

- 1. Discipline Case #07-384 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (c), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.
- 2. Discipline Case #07-387 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (g), (k) and 48915 (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.
- 3. Discipline Case #07-388 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (b), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008

APPROVED READMISSION/SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASE (1)

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends readmission/suspended of the pupil in Discipline Case #07-084 to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District.

DENIED READMISSION CASES (2)

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends denied readmission of the pupils in Discipline Cases #06-414 and 07-097 and the pupils shall continue in their current educational placement.

Administration recommends the discipline actions as described and listed above subject to corrections and changes resulting from review in Closed Session.

Congratulations! The California State Board of Education at its May 10, 2007 meeting approved the allocation of Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA) funds to school(s) within your district. The enclosed list identifies the funded school(s) and the associated QEIA award amount for Fiscal Year 2007-08. Funds are allocated according to the school's county-district-school code based on the school's certified enrollment from each prior year.

QEIA funds support school improvement efforts at the school level. Specifically, the intent of QEIA is to:

- Improve the quality of academic instruction and the level of pupil achievement in schools in which pupils have high levels of poverty and complex educational needs through, among other efforts, class size reduction, improved teacher quality and training in schools at all grade levels, and improved pupil-to-counselor ratios in funded high schools.
- Develop exemplary district and school practices that will create the working conditions and classroom learning environments that will attract and retain well qualified teachers, administrators, and other staff.
- Focus school resources, including all categorical funds, on instructional improvement and services to pupils.

Program Accountability

Participating schools will be required to meet interim and final program requirements established in law. After the first three years of full funding, schools in the program must exceed their Academic Performance Index growth target for the school averaged over the first three years of funding. A QEIA funded school that continues to meet the

program and achievement requirements will be funded annually through the 2013-14 fiscal year.


The California Department of Education expects to distribute up to \$261 million in fiscal year 2007-08 and up to \$400 million every year thereafter through fiscal year 2013-14. These funding levels are contingent upon the availability of funds and legislative action. To accommodate the lower first year funding level, the first year apportionments have been prorated. The proration reflects the ratio of the 2007-08 funding level of \$261 million to the future year funding level of \$400 million (261/400 = .6525). They are:

Funds will be released to districts on an annual basis. Eighty percent of the funds will be released in July 2007, and twenty percent will be released in January 2008. Allocations in future years will follow a similar schedule.

Article XIV - Basic Compensation

- The Association proposes increasing the compensation for nurses.
- The Association proposes examining the issue of teaching experience and how longevity is credited.

- The Association proposes increasing the BCSS.
- The Association proposes restructuring the configuration of the BCSS.

Article XV - Extra Compensation

- The Association proposes increasing the rate of pay for extra-duty teaching assignments.
- The Association proposes re-examining the compensation and duties of testing coordinators.
- The Association proposes defining the duties and compensation for high school athletic assistants.

Article XVII – Health and Welfare Benefits

- The Association proposes improving member's health and welfare benefits.

RESOLUTION NO. 2008/02

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT APPROVING JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT WITH JURUPA AREA PARK AND RECREATION DISTRICT (COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7)

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2007, the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") adopted a resolution stating its intention to establish a community facilities district, to be designated "Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District" (the 'Community Facilities District"), and initiating proceedings pursuant to Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code, commonly known as the "Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982," for the formation of the Community Facilities District, for the purpose, among others, of financing through the sale of bonds the design, construction and acquisition of park facilities which are necessary to meet increased demands placed upon the District and Jurupa Area Park and Recreation District (the "Park District") as a result of the development of said real property; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 53316.2 through 53316.6 of the California Government Code, a community facilities district may finance facilities to be owned or operated by an entity other than the agency that created the district pursuant to a joint community facilities agreement if the legislative body of each entity adopts a resolution declaring that such a joint agreement would be beneficial to the residents of that entity; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Section 53316.2, the District may have primary responsibility for the formation of a community facilities district pursuant to such a joint community facilities agreement if it is reasonably expected to have responsibility for providing facilities to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of bonds of the district established pursuant to the joint community facilities agreement than any other local agency, and it is expected that the District will have responsibility for providing facilities to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of the bonds of the Community Facilities District than any other agency, including the Park District, whose facilities and fees will be financed with the proceeds of the sale of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented to the Board of Education a form of joint community facilities agreement to be entered into by the District and the Park District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has determined that the proposed joint community facilities agreement will be beneficial to the residents of the District and the Community Facilities District;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:



Section 1. The Board of Education determines that the joint community facilities agreement entitled "Joint Community Facilities Agreement Between Jurupa Unified School District, Jurupa Area Park and Recreation District and Loring Ranch 31503, LP (Community Facilities District No. 7)" (the "Agreement"), attached hereto as Exhibit "A," will be beneficial to the residents of the District and the Community Facilities District.

Section 2. The Agreement is approved in the form submitted to the Board of Education at the meeting at which this resolution is adopted and the President and the Secretary of the Board of Education are authorized to execute and deliver the Agreement on behalf of the District. The Assistant Superintendent of Business Services of the District is authorized to consent to such modifications of the Agreement as are determined by bond counsel to the District to be necessary to comply with provisions of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 and which do not affect the net amount of the proceeds of the sale of the bonds of the Community Facilities District which will be received by the District for financing the design, construction and acquisition of parks and park and recreation facilities and master plan water and sewer system facilities or which are not otherwise material.

Section 3. The Clerk of the Board of Education shall deliver an executed copy of the Agreement to the Park District.

JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT BY AND AMONG JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, JURUPA AREA RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT, AND LORING RANCH 31503, L.P.

(Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District)

THIS JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the 1st day of June, 2007, by and among the JURUPA AREA RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT, a California recreation and park district formed and existing pursuant to Division 5, Chapter 4, commencing with Section 5780, of the California Public Resources Code (the "Park District), the JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a California public school district organized and operating pursuant to the applicable provisions of the California Education Code ("School District") and LORING RANCH 31503, L.P., a California limited partnership (the "Property Owner" and/or "Developer"). The parties hereto may be referred to in some instances as a party ("Party") or parties ("Parties").

RECITALS:

- A. The Property Owner owns approximately 28.30 acres of land, located within the boundaries of the Park District and the School District, as shown on Exhibit "A" (the "Property").
- B. The Property Owner desires to develop the Property primarily for residential purposes, and has obtained, or will obtain, the necessary development approvals to construct approximately 85 single family detached residential units ("SF/DU") on the Property ("Project"). Development of the Project will require the Developer to construct certain recreational and park facilities ("Park District Facilities") to be acquired by the Park District in lieu of paying fees for the Project pursuant to Government Code Section 66477, as further specified in the Acquisition Agreement, defined below. Park District Facilities and costs incurred by the Park District in connection with the formation of the CFD No. 7, defined below, and the issuance of Bonds thereof (the "Park District Costs"), may be paid from time to time from Bond Proceeds, as hereinafter defined. The development of the Property will also require the Developer to finance the acquisition and construction of certain school facilities (the "School Facilities") by the School District.
- C. Pursuant to the request of the Property Owner, the Board of Education of the School District, intends to form Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District ("CFD No. 7"), pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, commencing with Section 53311 of the Government Code of the State of California ("Act").
- D. CFD No. 7 is being established to provide, among other things, financing of School Facilities to accommodate students resulting from development of the Property and Park



District Facilities and Park District Costs pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement and the Acquisition Agreement, as defined below.

- E. School District and Park District are authorized by Section 53313.5 of the Act to finance, by means of CFD No. 7, the Park District Facilities and Park District Costs and the School Facilities. This Agreement constitutes a "joint community facilities agreement" ("JCFA") within the meaning of Section 53316.2 of the Act by and among the Park District, the Property Owner the School District, pursuant to which the CFD No. 7, when formed, will be authorized to finance the Park District Facilities and Park District Costs. As provided by Section 53316.6 of the Act, the Park District shall be responsible for the acquisition, operation and maintenance of the Park District Facilities.
- F. Subsection (e) of Section 53316.2 of the Act provides that, notwithstanding any other provision of the Act, no local agency which is party to a joint exercise of powers agreement or joint community facilities agreement shall have primary responsibility for formation of a community facilities district unless that agency is one or more of certain specified types of agencies, including an agency that is reasonably expected to have responsibility for providing facilities or services to be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of Special Taxes and bonds of the community facilities district or districts created pursuant to the joint exercise of powers agreement or the joint community facilities agreement than any other local agency.
- G. The School District and the Park District have determined that the School Facilities will be financed by a larger share of the proceeds of the Special Taxes and the Bonds than the Park District Facilities.

ARTICLE I GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1.1 Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct and are hereby incorporated by this reference.

Section 1.2 <u>Definitions</u>.

Unless the context clearly otherwise requires, the terms defined in this Section shall, for all purposes of this Agreement, have the meanings herein specified.

- a) "Act" means the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, commencing with Government Code Section 53311, et seq.
 - b) "Agreement" means this Joint Communities Facilities Agreement.
- c) "Acquisition Agreement" means the Agreement Providing for Construction of Facilities dated June 14, 2007 entered into between the Park District and Property Owner.
 - d) "Board" means the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District.
- e) "Bond Proceeds" or "Proceeds of the Bonds" shall mean those net funds generated by the sale of the Bonds, or other securities issued on behalf of or for the benefit of CFD No. 7.



- f) "Bond Resolution" means that resolution, resolution supplement, fiscal agent agreement, or other equivalent document(s) providing for the issuance of the Bonds.
- g) "Bonds" shall mean those bonds, or other securities, issued in one or more series by, or on behalf of, CFD No. 7, as authorized by the qualified electors within CFD No. 7.
- h) "CFD No. 7" means Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District.
- i) "Deposits" means a deposit of fees authorized to be charged by the Park District pursuant to Government Code 66477 to finance Park District Facilities and advances of Park District Costs made by the Property Owners prior to the disbursement of Bond Proceeds to School District.
- j) "Mitigation Agreement" means the School Facilities Mitigation Agreement dated May 21, 2007 to be entered into between the Jurupa Unified School District and Property Owner.
- k) "Rate and Method" means the Rate and Method of Apportionment of the Special Tax expected to be authorized for levy and collection pursuant to proceedings undertaken for the formation of CFD No. 7 pursuant to the Act.
- 1) "Park District Costs" mean those Park District Costs incurred by the Park District in the formation of CFD No. 7 and/or issuance of the Bonds, including costs associated with the preparation of this Agreement and the Acquisition Agreement. All such costs shall be documented in the form of an invoice and presented to the School District in a written requisition in accordance with the Mitigation Agreement.
- m) "Park District Facilities" means those park and recreational facilities to be owned and maintained by the Park District which are constructed by the Property Owner or the Park District in lieu of payment of fees for the Project pursuant to Government Code Section 66477.
- n) "Park District Facilities Account" means the fund or account of CFD No. 7 (regardless of its designation within the Bond Resolution) into which a portion of the Proceeds of the Bonds may be deposited in accordance with the Mitigation Agreement for payment of Park District Facilities and Park District Costs.
 - o) "State" means the State of California.
- p) "Special Taxes" means the special taxes expected to be authorized to be levied and collected pursuant to the final Rate and Method as approved by CFD No. 7.

ARTICLE II FORMATION OF CFD AND ISSUANCE OF BONDS

Section 2.1 Formation of CFD No. 7. The School District, pursuant to the written request of the Property Owner, and in its sole discretion, will initiate proceedings pursuant to the Act for the formation of CFD No. 7, the authorization of the Special Taxes within CFD No. 7 and the authorization of Bonds on behalf of CFD No. 7. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to limit the discretion of the School District in that regard and the School District shall



have no liability to Park District if CFD No. 7 is not formed or if the Special Taxes and Bonds are not authorized by the qualified electors within CFD No. 7.

Section 2.2 <u>Issuance and Sale of Bonds</u>. In the event CFD No. 7 is formed and the Special Taxes and Bonds are authorized by the qualified electors within CFD No. 7, the Board, acting as the Legislative Body of CFD No. 7 may, in its sole discretion, in accordance with its adopted policies ("CFD Policies"), and in consultation with the Property Owner, adopt the Bond Resolution and issue the Bonds.

Section 2.3 <u>Bond Proceeds</u>. Upon the issuance and sale of the Bonds, and receipt of the Bond Proceeds, the School District, or CFD No. 7 (as may be applicable), upon consultation with the Property Owners shall determine the amount of the Bond Proceeds allocable to pay Park District Facilities and Park District Costs in accordance with the Mitigation Agreement and shall deposit such amount in the Park District Facilities Account.

In conjunction with the recording of the final subdivision maps for the Property, the issuance of building permits for the construction of homes within the Property, it may be necessary for Property Owner, or their successors or assigns, to make Deposits before Bonds are issued or Bond Proceeds are disbursed to Park District. Upon and following the issuance and sale of the Bonds, Park District may execute and submit a payment request to the CFD No. 7 in the format and meeting the requirements as set forth in Exhibit "B" herein requesting disbursement for Park District Facilities and/or Park District Costs from the Park District Facilities Account. Within thirty (30) days after Park District's receipt of funds pursuant to such disbursement request, Park District shall return the Deposits to Property Owner and credit Property Owner for Park District Facilities and Park District Costs in an amount equal to such disbursement. In the event Bond Proceeds are not disbursed to Park District within twelve (12) months after the date of any Deposit, such Deposit related to the payment of fees for the Project may at the written direction of Park District to be applied to pay Park District fees and not reflected as a Deposit on the account of Park District.

Upon such reimbursement to the Property Owner for Park District Facilities acquired by the Park District pursuant to the Acquisition Agreement, the Property Owner shall be deemed satisfied of its obligation to pay fees pursuant to Government Code Section 66477 in the amount of such reimbursement. If the amount of such reimbursement is less than the fees that the Developer would have otherwise been required to pay pursuant to the Government Code Section 66477 then the Developer shall pay the Park District the difference between such amounts prior to the acquisition of the Park Facilities pursuant to the Acquisition Agreement.

Section 2.4 Responsibility for Park District Costs and Facilities.

- a) The Parties hereto acknowledge and agree that the final responsibility to finance Park District Facilities and Park District Costs lies with the Property Owner.
- b) If the amount derived from Bond Proceeds, including investment earnings thereon, if any, are not sufficient to fund the total cost of the Park District Facilities and Park District Costs, the Parties hereto agree that all responsibility and liability for the amount of such shortfall shall be and remain with the Property Owner and shall not lie with the School District, CFD No. 7 or Park District.



- (b) <u>Definition of Private Use</u>. For purposes of this Section 2.9, the term "Private Use" means any activity that constitutes a trade or business that is carried on by persons or entities, other than governmental entities. The leasing of the facilities or the access of a person or entity other than a governmental unit to property or services on a basis other than as a member of the general public ("General Public Use") shall constitute a Private Use unless the Park District obtains an opinion of Bond Counsel to the contrary. Use of the Bond Proceeds in a trade or business constitutes General Public Use only if the property is intended to be available and is in fact reasonably available for use on the same basis by natural persons not engaged in a trade or business.
- (c) <u>Management and Service Contracts</u>. With respect to management and service contracts, the determination of whether a particular use constitutes Private Use under this Section 2.9 shall be determined on the basis of applying Revenue Procedure 97-13, 1997-5 C.B. 632. As of the date hereof, no portion of the Park District Facilities is expected to be used to provide property subject to contracts or other arrangements with persons or entities engaged in a trade or business (other than governmental units) that involve the management of property or the provision of services that do not comply with the standards of Revenue Procedure 97-13.

The Park District reasonably expects to expend the Bond Proceeds on the Park District Costs and Park District Facilities listed in Exhibit "C," attached hereto, which list may be amended by the Park District from time to time with approval of the parties hereto, and by this reference herein incorporated, within 3 years from the date of issuance of the Bonds. The Park District further agrees to maintain Bond Proceeds requisitioned from the Park District Facilities Account in accordance with the Mitigation Agreement in a separate account, apart from all other funds and accounts of the Park District. Park District shall maintain adequate controls over its payment and of Bond Proceeds accounting records in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures as to its receipt and expenditure of Bond Proceeds for the Park District Costs and Park District Facilities. The Park District will, upon request, provide School District and/or Property Owner with access to the Park District's records related to the Park District Costs and Park District Facilities and will provide to the Park District its annual financial report certified by an independent certified public accountant upon the Park District's request and payment of applicable copying charges, if any, in accordance with the Park District's Public Record Act guidelines.

The School District and CFD No. 7 agree to maintain full and accurate records of all amounts, and investment earnings, if any, expended from the Park District Facilities Account for such Project. The School District or CFD No. 7 will, upon request, provide the Park District and/or the Property Owner with access to the School District's or CFD No. 7's records relating to the Park District Facilities Account.

Section 2.10 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Property Owner shall assume the defense of, indemnify and hold harmless the Park District and its officers, employees, representatives and agents, and each of them from and against all actions, damages, claims, losses or expenses of every type and description to which they may be subject or put, by reason of, or resulting from, this Agreement, the establishment of CFD No. 7, the levy of the Special Taxes, the issuance of the Bonds, the financing of the School District Facilities or any matters relating thereto, including any disclosure made in connection with the offering and sale of the Bonds and any



continuing disclosure made at any time with respect to the Bonds. If the Property Owner fails to do so, the Park District shall have the right, but not the obligation, to defend the same and charge all of the direct or incidental costs of such defense, including any fees or costs, to, and recover the same from, the Property Owner.

No indemnification is required to be paid by the Property Owner for any action, damages, claim, loss or expense arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Park District or its officers, employees or agents.

ARTICLE III TERM AND TERMINATION

- Section 3.1 <u>Effective Date</u>. This Agreement shall become effective and of full force and effect as of the date ("Effective Date") it is approved by the governing boards of both of the Parties, to be confirmed by the execution hereof by the authorized representatives of the Parties hereto.
- **Section 3.2** <u>Termination</u>. If the District is unable to complete the sale of the Bonds prior to January 1, 2012, this Agreement shall thereafter automatically terminate and be of no further force or effect.

ARTICLE IV ADDITIONAL GENERAL PROVISIONS

- Section 4.1 <u>Recordkeeping: Inspection of Records</u>. Each Party hereto agrees to keep and maintain full and accurate records of all amounts, and investment earnings, if any, paid to Park District for the Park District Costs and Park District Facilities as to the Property and amounts expended from the Park District Facilities Fund as provided for in the Bond Resolution. Each Party further agrees to make such records available to the other Parties hereto during normal business hours upon reasonable prior notice. All such records shall be kept and maintained by the appropriate Party as provided by applicable law and their respective policies.
- **Section 4.2** <u>Partial Invalidity</u>. If any part of this Agreement is held to be illegal or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Agreement shall be given effect to the fullest extent reasonably possible.
- Section 4.3 Successors and Assigns. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the Parties hereto (other than individual homeowners). This Agreement may not be assigned without the prior written consent of the other Parties hereto, and any such non-consented assignment shall be void. This Agreement is for the sole benefit of the School District, Park District, Property Owner and their successors and assigns (other than individual homeowners), and no other person or entity shall be deemed to be a beneficiary hereof or have an interest herein.
- **Section 4.4** Notice. Any notice, payment or instrument required or permitted by this Agreement to be given or delivered to any Party or other person shall be deemed to have been received when personally delivered or upon deposit of the same in the United States Post Office registered or certified, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

Section 4.5 <u>Captions</u>. The captions to Sections used herein are for convenience purposes only and are not part of this Agreement.

Section 4.6 Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of California applicable to contracts made and performed in such State.

Section 4.7 Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the matters provided for herein and supersedes all prior agreements and negotiations between the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement, except for, as between the Property Owner and the Park District only, this Agreement shall be construed in such a manner as to be consistent with that certain Acquisition Agreement.

Section 4.8 Amendments. This Agreement may be amended or modified only in writing executed by the authorized representative(s) of each of the Parties hereto.

Section 4.9 <u>Waiver</u>. The failure of any Party hereto to insist on compliance within any of the terms, covenants or conditions of this Agreement by any other Party hereto, shall not be deemed a waiver of such terms, covenants or conditions of this Agreement by such other Party, nor shall any waiver constitute a relinquishment of any other right or power for all or any other times.



- Section 4.10 <u>Cooperation and Execution of Documents</u>. The Parties hereto agree to complete and execute any further or additional documents which may be necessary to complete or further the terms of this Agreement.
- Section 4.11 <u>Attorneys' Fees</u>. In the event of the bringing of any action or suit by any Party against another Party arising out of this Agreement, the Party in whose favor final judgment shall be entered shall be entitled to recover from the other Party all costs and expenses of suit, including reasonable attorneys' fees.
- Section 4.12 <u>Exhibits</u>. The following exhibits attached hereto are incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ESTABLISHING COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES THEREOF

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2007 the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") has heretofore adopted Resolution No. 2007/06, stating its intention that a proposed community facilities district to be known as "Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California" (the "Community Facilities District"), is proposed to be established pursuant to Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code, commonly known as the "Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982" (the "Act"), and fixing the time and place for a public hearing on the establishment of the Community Facilities District; and

WHEREAS, notice was published and mailed to the owner of all of the property in the Community Facilities District as required by law relative to the intention of the Board to establish the Community Facilities District, the levy of special taxes therein, the provision of public facilities therefor and the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by the Community Facilities District, and of the time and place of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, the Board held a public hearing as required by law relative to the establishment of the Community Facilities District, the levy of special taxes therein, the provision of public facilities therefor, and the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by the Community Facilities District; and

WHEREAS, prior to the commencement of the hearing there was filed with the Board a report (the "Report") containing a description of the public facilities required to meet the needs of the Community Facilities District, and an estimate of the cost of such facilities, as required by Section 53321.5 of the California Government Code; and

WHEREAS, at the public hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the establishment of the Community Facilities District, the levy of the special taxes, the provision of the public facilities and the incurring of the bonded indebtedness were heard, and a full and fair hearing was held; and

WHEREAS, at the public hearing evidence was presented to the Board on the matters before it, and the Board at the conclusion of the hearing was fully advised as to all matters relating to the establishment of the Community Facilities District, the levy of the special taxes, the provision of the public facilities and the incurring of the bonded indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, the Board may therefore proceed to establish the Community Facilities District.



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Findings. The Board finds as follows:

- (a) All of the preceding recitals are true and correct;
- (b) On July 2, 2007, pursuant to notice thereof duly given as provided by law, the Board conducted a public hearing with respect to the establishment of the Community Facilities District, the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by and for the Community Facilities District and the annual levying of specified special taxes on the taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay principal of and interest on bonds to be issued by and for the Community Facilities District to finance the public facilities which are described in Section 3 hereof;
- (c) The boundary map of the Community Facilities District was recorded on June 6, 2007 pursuant to Sections 3111 and 3113 of the California Streets and Highways Code, at page 29 in Book 71 of Maps of Assessment and Community Facilities Districts and as Instrument No. in the official records of the County of Riverside;
- (d) All prior proceedings with respect to the establishment of the Community Facilities District prior to and during the hearing with respect to the establishment of the Community Facilities District which were conducted by the Board on July 2, 2007 were valid and in conformity with the requirements of the Act;
- (e) No written protests were received, at or prior to the time of the hearing, against the establishment of the Community Facilities District, or the levying of the special taxes, or the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by the Community Facilities District, and the special taxes have, therefore, not been eliminated by majority protest pursuant to Section 53324 of the California Government Code;
- (f) The Board is, therefore, authorized to adopt a resolution of formation pursuant to Section 53325.1 of the California Government Code for the establishment of Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, and the Community Facilities District should be established.
- Section 2. Establishment of District. Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, is hereby established. The boundaries of the Community Facilities District are shown on the map entitled "Boundaries of Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California," which is on file with the Clerk of the Board, and those boundaries are hereby established.

Section 3. Types of Facilities; Incidental Expenses.

The types of public facilities proposed to be provided for and financed by the Community Facilities District (the "Facilities") are:



- (a) public school facilities;
- (b) park and recreation facilities;
- (c) acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for the school facilities and park and recreation facilities specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) above; and
- (d) The incidental expenses which will be incurred are: (i) the cost of engineering, planning and designing such facilities and the cost of environmental evaluations thereof, (ii) all costs associated with the creation of the proposed community facilities district, issuance of the bonds thereof, the determination of the amount of and collection of taxes, the payment of taxes, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of the community facilities district, and (iii) any other expenses incidental to the construction, acquisition, completion, and inspection of such school facilities, park and recreation facilities and public capital improvements.

Section 4. Special Taxes. Except where funds are otherwise available, special taxes sufficient to pay for all such Facilities and to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District and the annual administrative expenses of the District and the Community Facilities District in determining, apportioning, levying and collecting such special taxes, and in paying the principal of and interest on such bonds and the costs of registering, exchanging and transferring such bonds, secured by the recordation of a continuing lien against all taxable or nonexempt property in the Community Facilities District, shall be annually levied within the Community Facilities District.

The rate and method of apportionment of special taxes ("Rate and Method") to be levied on parcels of taxable property to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District which may be issued and sold to finance the design, construction and acquisition of public facilities, and such other expenses and costs, shall be as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof.

The maximum amounts of special taxes which may be levied in any year on parcels within the Community Facilities District which are specified in the Rate and Method.

The conditions under which the obligation to pay the special taxes may be prepaid and permanently satisfied are as set forth in Exhibit "A" hereto.

Pursuant to Section 53340 of the California Government Code, said special taxes shall be collected in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem property taxes are collected and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure, sale, and lien priority in case of delinquency as is provided for ad valorem taxes.

Upon recordation of a notice of special tax lien pursuant to Section 3114.5 of the California Streets and Highways Code, a continuing lien to secure each levy of the special taxes shall attach to all non-exempt real property in the Community Facilities District and that lien



shall continue in force and effect until the special tax obligation is prepaid and permanently satisfied and the lien cancelled in accordance with law or until collection of the special taxes ceases. The Office of the Superintendent of the District, 4850 Pedley Road, Riverside, California 92509, telephone number (951) 360-4100, is designated as the office responsible for preparing annually a current roll of special tax levy obligations by assessor's parcel numbers, and for estimating future special tax levies pursuant to Section 53340.2 of the California Government Code.

Section 5. Exempt Property. In the event that a portion of the property within the Community Facilities District shall for any reason be or become exempt, wholly or partially, from the apportionment and levy of the special taxes pursuant to Exhibit "A" hereto, the Board shall, on behalf of the Community Facilities District, increase the amount of special taxes to the extent necessary and permitted by law and these proceedings to be levied upon the remaining property within the Community Facilities District which is not exempt in order to provide the required debt service payments on any outstanding bonds of the Community Facilities District, or to prevent the Community Facilities District from defaulting on any of its other obligations or liabilities.

Section 6. Annexation of Territory. Other property within the boundaries of the School District may be annexed into the proposed community facilities district upon the condition that parcels within that territory may be annexed only with the unanimous approval of the owner or owners of each parcel or parcels at the time that parcel or those parcels are annexed.

Section 7. Necessity. The Facilities are necessary to meet increased demands placed upon the District as a result of new development occurring within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District.

Section 8. Bonded Indebtedness. The Board declares that it is necessary that a bonded indebtedness be incurred by and for proposed Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 for the purpose of financing the design, acquisition, construction, equipping and furnishing of the public facilities set forth in Section 3 herein.

Section 9. Appropriations Limit. In accordance with the Act, the annual appropriations limit, is hereby established at \$500,000 and such appropriations limit shall be submitted to the voters of the CFD as hereinafter provided. The proposition establishing the appropriations limit shall only become effective upon voter approval.

Section 10. Report. The Report is hereby approved and is made a part of the record of the public hearing regarding the formation of the Community Facilities District, and is ordered to be kept on file with the Clerk of the Board as part of the transcript of these proceedings.

Section 11. Repayment of Funds Advanced or Work-in-Kind. Pursuant to Section 53314.9 of the California Government Code, the Board proposes to accept advances of funds or work-in-kind from private persons or private entities and to provide, by resolution, for the use of those funds or that work-in-kind for any authorized purpose, including but not limited



to, paying any costs incurred by the District in creating the Community Facilities District, and to enter into agreements, by resolution, with the persons or entities advancing the funds or work-in-kind to repay the funds advanced, or to reimburse the persons or entities for the value, or cost, whichever is less, of the work-in-kind, as determined by the Board.

Section 12. Prohibition of Owner Contracts. Pursuant to Section 53329.5 of the California Government Code, the Board finds that the public interest will not be served by allowing the owners of property within the Community Facilities District to enter into a contract in accordance with subdivision (a) of that section, and that such owners shall not be permitted to elect to perform the work and enter into a written contract with the Board for the construction of the Facilities pursuant to Section 53329.5 of the California Government Code.

<u>Section 13</u>. <u>Description of Voting Procedures</u>. The voting procedures to be followed in conducting the consolidated special elections on the propositions set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto shall be as follows:

- a. If at least 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory of the Community Facilities District for each of the 90 days preceding the close of the public or protest hearing (the "protest hearing"), the vote in the consolidated special elections shall be by the registered voters of the Community Facilities District with each voter having one vote. In that event, the consolidated special elections shall be conducted by the Registrar of Voters of the County of Riverside and shall be held on a date selected by the Board in conformance with the provisions of Section 53326 of the California Government Code and pursuant to the provisions of the California Elections Code governing elections of school districts, insofar as they may be applicable, and pursuant to said Section 53326, the ballots for the consolidated special elections shall be distributed to the qualified electors of the Community Facilities District by mail with return postage prepaid and the consolidated special elections shall be conducted as a mail ballot election.
- b. If at the time of the close of the protest hearing, and for at least the preceding 90 days, less than 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory of the Community Facilities District, and pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, the vote is therefore to be by the landowners of the Community Facilities District, with each landowner of record at the close of the protest hearing having one vote for each acre or portion of an acre of land that he or she owns within the Community Facilities District, the consolidated special elections shall be conducted by the Clerk of the Board (the "Clerk") as follows:
- date, following the adoption by the Board of this resolution, the resolution determining the necessity for the Community Facilities District to incur a bonded indebtedness pursuant to Section 53351 of the California Government Code and a resolution pursuant to Section 53326 of said Code submitting the propositions with respect to (i) the levy of special taxes to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District, and (ii) the establishing of an appropriations limit therefor to the qualified electors of the Community Facilities District, upon which such elections can be held pursuant to said Section 53326 which



may be selected by the Board, or such earlier date as the owners of land within the Community Facilities District and the Clerk agree and concur is acceptable.

- (2) Pursuant to said Section 53326, the consolidated special elections may be held earlier than 90 days following the close of the protest hearing if the qualified electors of the Community Facilities District waive the time limits for conducting the elections set forth in said Section 53326 by unanimous written consent and the Clerk concurs in such earlier election date as shall be consented to by the qualified electors.
- (3) Pursuant to said Section 53326, ballots for the consolidated special elections shall be distributed to the qualified electors by the Clerk by mail with return postage prepaid, or by personal service.
- Pursuant to applicable sections of the California Elections Code (4)governing the conduct of mail ballot elections of school districts, and specifically Division 4 (commencing with 4000) of the California Elections Code with respect to elections conducted by mail, the Clerk shall mail or deliver to each qualified elector an official ballot in a form specified by the Board in the resolutions calling and consolidating the consolidated special elections, and shall also mail or deliver to all such qualified electors a ballot pamphlet and instructions to voter, including a sample ballot identical in form to the official ballot but identified as a sample ballot, a statement pursuant to Section 9401 of said Code, an impartial analysis by the county counsel pursuant to Section 9500 of said Code with respect to the ballot propositions contained in the official ballot, arguments and rebuttals, if any, pursuant to Sections 9501 to 9507, inclusive, and 9509 of said Code, a return identification envelope with prepaid postage thereon addressed to the Clerk for return of the voted official ballots, and a copy of this resolution and the exhibit hereto; provided, however, that such statement, analysis and arguments may be waived with the unanimous consent of all the landowners, and in such event a finding regarding such waivers shall be made in the resolution adopted by the Board calling the consolidated special elections. Such statement and argument, if any, shall be prepared by the Business Manager of the District.
- designee thereof, to each landowner-voter shall have printed or typed thereon the name of the landowner-voter and the number of votes to be voted by the landowner-voter and shall have appended to it a certification to be signed by the person voting the official ballot which shall certify that the person signing the certification is the person who voted the official ballot, and if the landowner-voter is other than a natural person, that he or she is an officer of or other person affiliated with the landowner-voter entitled to vote such official ballot, that he or she has been authorized to vote such official ballot on behalf of the landowner-voter, that in voting such official ballot it was his or her intent, as well as the intent of the landowner-voter, to vote all votes to which the landowner-voter is entitled based on its land ownership on the propositions set forth in the official ballot as marked thereon in the voting square opposite each such proposition, and further certifying as to the acreage of the landowner-voter's land ownership within the Community Facilities District.
- (6) The return identification envelope to be mailed or delivered by the Clerk to each landowner-voter shall have printed or typed thereon the following: (i) the name of the landowner, (ii) the address of the landowner, (iii) a declaration under penalty of perjury



stating that the voter is the landowner or the authorized representative of the landowner entitled to vote the enclosed ballot and is the person whose name appears on the identification envelope, (iv) the printed name and signature of the voter, (v) the address of the voter, (vi) the date of signing and place of execution of said declaration, and (vii) a notice that the envelope contains an official ballot and is to be opened only by the Clerk.

- (7) The instruction to voter form to be mailed or delivered by the Clerk to the landowner-voters shall inform them that the official ballots shall be returned to the Clerk properly voted as provided thereon and with the certification appended thereto properly completed and signed in the sealed returned identification envelope with the certification thereon completed and signed and all other information to be inserted thereon properly inserted by 6:00 pm. on the date of the elections.
- (8) Upon receipt of the return identification envelopes which are returned prior to the voting deadline on the date of the elections, the Clerk shall canvass the votes cast in the consolidated special elections, and shall file a statement with the Board as to the results of such canvass and the election on each proposition set forth in the official ballot.

The procedures set forth in this section for conducting the consolidated special elections may be modified as the Board may determine to be necessary or desirable by a resolution subsequently adopted by the Board.

RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7 OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT



Rate & Method of Apportionment for Community Facilities District No. 7 Jurupa Unified School District

The following sets forth the Rate and Method of Apportionment for the levy and collection of Special Taxes (as defined below) by Community Facilities District No. 7 ("CFD No. 7") of Jurupa Unified School District ("School District"). A Special Tax shall be levied on and collected from Taxable Property (as defined below) in CFD No. 7 each Fiscal Year (as defined below) in an amount determined through the application of the Rate and Method of Apportionment described below. All of the real property in CFD No. 7, unless exempted by law or by the provisions hereof, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent, and in the manner herein provided.

Section A: Definitions

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

- "Acre" or "Acreage" means the land area of an Assessor's Parcel as shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, or if the land area is not shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, the land area shown on the applicable Final Subdivision Map, parcel map, condominium plan, or other recorded County parcel map, that creates the boundaries of each Assessor's Parcel Number.
- "Act" means the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, being Chapter 2.5, Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code.
- "Administrative Expenses" means any ordinary and necessary expense incurred by the School District on behalf of CFD No. 7 related to the determination of the amount of the levy of Special Taxes, the collection of Special Taxes including the expenses of collecting delinquencies, the administration of Bonds, the proportional payment of salaries and benefits of any School District employee to the extent duties are directly related to the administration of CFD No. 7, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of CFD No. 7.
- "Annual Special Tax" means the Special Tax actually levied in any Fiscal Year on any Assessor's Parcel.
- "Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel of land designated on an Assessor's Parcel Map with an assigned Assessor's Parcel Number within the boundaries of CFD No. 7.
- "Assessor's Parcel Map" means an official map of the Assessor of the County designating parcels by Assessor's Parcel Number.
- "Assessor's Parcel Number" or "APN" means that number assigned to an Assessor's Parcel by the County for purposes of identification.
- "Assigned Annual Special Tax" means the Special Tax of that name described in Section D.
- "Board" means the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District or its designee as the legislative body of CFD No. 7.
- "Bond Index" means the national Bond Buyer Revenue Bond Index, commonly referenced as the 25-Bond Revenue Index. In the event the Bond Index ceases to be published, the index used shall be based on a comparable index for revenue bonds maturing in 30 years with an average rating equivalent to Moody's A1 and S&P's A-plus, as reasonably determined by the Board.



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- "Bonds" means any obligation to repay a sum of money, including obligations in the form of bonds, notes, certificates of participation, long-term leases, loans from government agencies, or loans from banks, other financial institutions, private businesses, or individuals, or long-term contracts, or any refunding thereof, which obligation may be incurred by CFD No. 7 or the School District.
- "Bond Yield" means the yield on the last series of Bonds issued by or on behalf of CFD No. 7, as calculated at the time such Bonds are issued pursuant to Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended for purpose of the Non-Arbitrage (Tax) Certificate or other similar bond issuance document.
- "Building Permit" means a permit for the construction of one or more Units issued by the County, or another public agency in the event the County no longer issues permits for the construction of Units within CFD No. 7. For purposes of this definition, "Building Permit" shall not include permits for construction or installation of commercial/industrial structures, parking structures, retaining walls, utility improvements, or other such improvements not intended for human habitation.
- "Building Square Footage" or "BSF" means the square footage of assessable internal living space of a Unit, exclusive of any carports, walkways, garages, overhangs, patios, enclosed patios, detached accessory structure, or other structures not used as living space, as determined by reference to the Building Permit for such Unit.
- "Calendar Year" means the period commencing January 1 of any year and ending the following December 31.
- "County" means the County of Riverside, State of California.
- "Developed Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Taxable Property for which Building Permits were issued on or before May 1 of the prior Fiscal Year, provided that such Assessor's Parcels were created on or before January 1 of the prior Fiscal Year and that each such Assessor's Parcel is associated with a Lot, as determined reasonably by the Board.
- "Exempt Property" means all Assessor's Parcels designated as being exempt from Special Taxes in Section K.
- "Final Subdivision Map" means a final tract map, parcel map, lot line adjustment, or functionally equivalent map or instrument that creates building sites, recorded in the County Office of the Recorder.
- "Fiscal Year" means the period commencing on July 1 of any year and ending the following June 30.
- "Homeowner" means any owner of a completed unit constructed and sold within CFD No. 7.
- "Lot(s)" means an individual legal lot created by a Final Subdivision Map for which a Building Permit has been or could be issued. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the case of an individual legal lot created by such a Final Subdivision Map upon which condominium units are entitled to be developed but for which a condominium plan has not been recorded, the number of Lots allocable to such legal lot for purposes of calculating the Undeveloped Tax applicable to such Final Subdivision Map shall equal the number of condominium units which are permitted to be constructed on such legal lot as shown on such Final Subdivision Map.



"Lot 86" means the property identified as Lot 86 on the County tentative tract map No. 31503 dated August 2006, which consists of approximately 12.91 acres as potentially modified upon recordation.

"Maximum Special Tax" means the maximum Special Tax, determined in accordance with Section C, that can be levied by CFD No. 7 in any Fiscal Year on any Assessor's Parcel.

"Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement" means the amount required in any Fiscal Year to pay: (i) the debt service or the periodic costs on all outstanding Bonds, (ii) Administrative Expenses of CFD No. 7, (iii) the costs associated with the release of funds from an escrow account, and (iv) any amount required to establish or replenish any reserve funds established in association with the Bonds, less (v) any amount available to pay debt service or other periodic costs on the Bonds pursuant to any applicable bond indenture, fiscal agent agreement, trust agreement or similar agreements and supplements thereto, if any. In arriving at the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement the Board shall take into account the reasonably anticipated delinquent Special Taxes based on the delinquency rate for Special Taxes in the previous Fiscal Year.

"Minimum Taxable Acreage" means the applicable Acreage listed in Table 3 as set forth in Section K.

"Partial Prepayment Amount" means the amount required to prepay a portion of the Annual Special Tax obligation for an Assessor's Parcel as described in Section H.

"Prepayment Amount" means the amount required to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation in full for an Assessor's Parcel as described in Section G.

"Present Value of Taxes" means the present value of any Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel in the current Fiscal Year not yet received by the School District for CFD No. 7, plus the expected Annual Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel in each remaining Fiscal Year until the termination date specified in Section J but not to exceed thirty-three (33) Fiscal years, using as the discount rate (i) the Bond Yield after Bond issuance or (ii) the most recently published Bond Index prior to Bond issuance.

"Proportionately" means that the ratio of the actual Annual Special Tax levy to the applicable Assigned Annual Special Tax is equal for all applicable Assessor's Parcels.

"Reserve Fund Credit" means, for each owner of an Assessor's Parcel wishing to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation of such Assessor's Parcel, an amount equal to the reduction in the reserve requirement for the outstanding Bonds resulting from the redemption of Bonds with the applicable prepaid Special Taxes. In the event that a surety bond or other credit instrument satisfies the reserve requirement or the reserve requirement is under funded at the time of the prepayment, no Reserve Credit shall be given.

"Special Tax" means any of the special taxes authorized to be levied by CFD No. 7 pursuant to the Act.

"Taxable Property" means all Assessor's Parcels which are not Exempt Property.

"Undeveloped Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Taxable Property which are not Developed Property.

"Unit" means each separate residential dwelling unit which comprises an independent facility capable of conveyance separate from adjacent residential dwelling units.



Section B: Classification of Assessor's Parcels

Each Fiscal Year, beginning with Fiscal Year 2007/2008, (i) each Assessor's Parcel within CFD No. 7 shall be classified as Taxable Property or Exempt Property; and (ii) each Assessor's Parcel of Taxable Property shall be classified as Developed Property or Undeveloped Property. Developed Property shall be further classified based on the Building Square Footage of the Unit. The classification of Exempt Property shall take into consideration the minimum Net Taxable Acreage as determined pursuant to Section K.

Section C: Maximum Special Taxes

1. Developed Property

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Developed Property for any Fiscal Year shall be the amount determined by the greater of (i) the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax or (ii) the application of the Backup Annual Special Tax for a given Final Subdivision Map.

2. Undeveloped Property

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Undeveloped Property for any Fiscal Year shall be the amount determined by the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax.

Section D: Assigned Annual Special Taxes

1. Developed Property

The Assigned Annual Special Tax in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be determined by reference to Table 1 according to the Building Square Footage of the Unit, subject to increase as described below.

Each July 1, commencing July 1, 2008, the Assigned Annual Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be increased by two percent (2.00%) of the amount in effect the prior Fiscal Year.

2. Undeveloped Property

The Assigned Annual Special Tax per Acre in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 for each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property shall be determined by reference to Table 2, subject to increase as described below.

Each July 1, commencing July 1, 2008, the Assigned Annual Special for each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property shall be increased by two percent (2.00%) of the amount in effect the prior Fiscal Year.

Section E: Backup Annual Special Taxes

Each Fiscal Year, each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be subject to a Backup Annual Special Tax. The Backup Annual Special Tax for Developed Property within a Final Subdivision Map shall be the rate per Lot calculated according to the following formula in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 or such later Fiscal Year in which such Final Subdivision Map is created:

The terms above have the following meanings:

B = Backup Annual Special Tax per Lot in each Fiscal Year

U = Assigned Annual Special Tax per acre of Acreage for Undeveloped Property in the Fiscal Year the calculation is performed

A = Acreage of Taxable Property in such Final Subdivision Map after subtracting the Exempt Property as determined by the Board in Section K

L = Lots in the Final Subdivision Map at the time of calculation

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if all or any portion of the Final Subdivision Map(s) described in the preceding paragraph is subsequently changed or modified, then the Backup Annual Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in such Final Subdivision Map area that is changed or modified shall be a rate per square foot of Acreage calculated as follows:

- 1. Determine the total Backup Annual Special Taxes anticipated to apply to the changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area prior to the change or modification.
- 2. The result of paragraph 1 above shall be divided by the Acreage of Taxable Property which is ultimately expected to exist in such changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area, as reasonably determined by the Board.
- 3. The result of paragraph 2 above shall be divided by 43,560. The result is the Backup Annual Special Tax per square foot of Acreage which shall be applicable to Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property in such changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area for all remaining Fiscal Years in which the Special Tax may be levied. The Backup Annual Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in a Final Subdivision Map that is not changed or modified shall not be recalculated.



Section F: Method of Apportionment of the Annual Special Tax

Commencing Fiscal Year 2007/2008 and for each subsequent Fiscal Year, the Board shall levy Annual Special Taxes as follows:

Step One: The Board shall levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of

Developed Property in an amount equal to the Assigned Annual Special Tax

applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel.

Step Two: If the sum of the amounts collected in step one is insufficient to satisfy the Minimum

Annual Special Tax Requirement, then the Board shall Proportionately levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property in an amount up to the Assigned Annual Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's

Parcel to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement.

Step Three: If the sum of the amounts collected in steps one and two is insufficient to satisfy the

Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement, then the Board shall Proportionately levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property up to the Maximum Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel, to satisfy the

Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement.

Section G: Prepayment of Annual Special Taxes

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or an Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property may be prepaid in full, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties, or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel at the time the Annual Special Tax obligation would be prepaid. The Prepayment Amount for an Assessor's Parcel eligible for prepayment shall be determined as described below.

An owner of an Assessor's Parcel intending to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation shall provide CFD No. 7 with written notice of intent to prepay. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of such written notice, the Board shall reasonably determine the Prepayment Amount of such Assessor's Parcel and shall notify such owner of such Prepayment Amount. The Prepayment Amount shall be calculated according to the following formula:

P = PVT - RFC + PAF

The terms above have the following meanings:

P = Prepayment Amount
PVT = Present Value of Taxes
RFC = Reserve Fund Credit

PAF = Prepayment Administrative Fees

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no prepayment will be allowed unless the amount of Annual Special Taxes that may be levied on Taxable Property, net of Administrative Expenses, shall be at least 1.1 times the regularly scheduled annual interest and principal payments on all currently outstanding Bonds in each future Fiscal Year and such prepayment will not impair the security of all currently outstanding Bonds, as reasonably determined by the Board. Such determination shall include identifying all Assessor's Parcels that are expected to become Exempt Property.

With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is prepaid, the Board shall indicate in the records of CFD No. 7 that there has been a prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and shall cause a suitable notice to be recorded in compliance with the Act to indicate the prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and the release of the Annual Special Tax lien on such Assessor's Parcel, and the obligation of such Assessor's Parcel to pay such Annual Special Tax shall cease.



Section H: Partial Prepayment of Annual Special Taxes

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel may be partially prepaid at the times and under the conditions set forth in this section, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties, or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel at the time the Annual Special Tax obligation would be prepaid.

1. Partial Prepayment Times and Conditions

Prior to the conveyance of the first production Unit on a Lot within a Final Subdivision Map, the owner of no less than all the Taxable Property within such Final Subdivision Map may elect in writing to the Board to prepay a portion of the Annual Special Tax obligations for all the Assessor's Parcels within such Final Subdivision Map, as calculated in Section G.2. below. The partial prepayment of each Annual Special Tax obligation shall be collected for all Assessor's Parcels prior to the conveyance of the first production Unit on a Lot within such Final Subdivision Map.

2. Partial Prepayment Amount

The Partial Prepayment Amount shall be calculated according to the following formula:

 $PP = P_G x F$

The terms above have the following meanings:

PP = the Partial Prepayment Amount

P_G = the Prepayment Amount calculated according to Section G

F = the percent by which the owner of the Assessor's Parcel is partially prepaying the Annual Special Tax A obligation

3. Partial Prepayment Procedures and Limitations

With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is partially prepaid, the Board shall indicate in the records of CFD No. 7 that there has been a partial prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and shall cause a suitable notice to be recorded in compliance with the Act to indicate the partial prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and the partial release of the Annual Special Tax lien on such Assessor's Parcel, and the obligation of such Assessor's Parcel to pay such prepaid portion of the Annual Special Tax shall cease. Additionally, the notice shall indicate that the Assigned Annual Special Tax and the Backup Annual Special Tax for the Assessor's Parcel has been reduced by an amount equal to the percentage which was partially prepaid.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no partial prepayment will be allowed unless the amount of Annual Special Taxes that may be levied on Taxable Property after such partial prepayment, net of Administrative Expenses, shall be at least 1.1 times the regularly scheduled annual interest and principal payments on all currently outstanding Bonds in each future Fiscal Year and such partial prepayment will not impair the security of all currently outstanding Bonds, as reasonably determined by the Board. Such determination shall include identifying all Assessor's Parcels that are expected to become Exempt Property.

Section I: Excess Assigned Annual Special Taxes

In any Fiscal Year which the Annual Special Taxes collected from Developed Property, pursuant to Step One of Section F, exceeds the Minimum Annual Special Tax requirement, the School District shall use such amount for acquisition, construction or financing of school facilities in accordance with the Act, CFD No. 7 proceedings and other applicable law as determined by the Board.

Section J: Termination of Special Tax

Annual Special Taxes shall be levied for a period of thirty-three (33) Fiscal Years after Bonds have been issued, provided that Annual Special Taxes shall not be levied after Fiscal Year 2047/2048.

Section K: Exemptions

The Board shall classify as Exempt Property (i) Assessor's Parcels owned by the State of California, Federal or other local governments, (ii) Assessor's Parcels which are used as places of worship and are exempt from ad valorem property taxes because they are owned by a religious organization, (iii) Assessor's Parcels used exclusively by a homeowners' association, (iv) Assessor's Parcels with public or utility easements making impractical their utilization for other than the purposes set forth in the easement, (v) Assessor's Parcels developed or expected to be developed exclusively for non-residential use, including any use directly servicing any non-residential property, such as parking, as reasonably determined by the Board, (vi) Lot 86, and (vii) any other Assessor's Parcels at the reasonable discretion of the Board, provided that no such classification would reduce the Net Taxable Acreage to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage listed in Table 3 below.

Not withstanding the above, the Board shall not classify an Assessor's Parcel as Exempt Property if such classification would reduce the sum of all Taxable Property to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage. Assessor's Parcels which cannot be classified as Exempt Property because such classification would reduce the Acreage of all Taxable Property to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage will continue to be classified as Developed Property or Undeveloped Property, as applicable, and will continue to be subject to Special Taxes accordingly.

Section L: Appeals

Any property owner claiming that the amount or application of the Special Tax is not correct may file a written notice of appeal with the Board not later than twelve months after having paid the first installment of the Special Tax that is disputed. In order to be considered sufficient, any claim of appeal must: (i) specifically identify the property by address and Assessor's Parcel Number; (ii) state the amount in dispute and whether it is the whole amount or any a portion of the Special Tax; (iii) state all grounds on which the property owner is disputing the amount or application of the Special Tax, including a reasonably detailed explanation as to why the amount or application of such Special Tax is incorrect; (iv) include all documentation, if any, in support of the claim; and (v) be verified under penalty of perjury by the person who paid the Special Tax or his or her guardian, executor or administrator. A representative(s) of CFD No. 7 ("Representative") shall promptly review the appeal, and if necessary, meet with the property owner, consider written and oral evidence regarding the amount of the Special Tax, and rule on the appeal. If the Representative's decision requires that the Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel be modified or changed in favor of the property owner, a cash refund shall not be made (except for the last year of levy), but an adjustment shall be made to the Annual Special Tax on that Assessor's Parcel in the subsequent Fiscal Year(s) as the representative's decisions shall indicate.

Section M: Manner of Collection

The Annual Special Tax shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary ad valorem property taxes, provided, however, that CFD No. 7 may collect Annual Special Taxes at a different time or in a different manner if necessary to meet its financial obligations.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7 TO INCUR A BONDED INDEBTEDNESS IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$4,000,000 FOR PROVIDING PUBLIC FACILITIES FOR THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT AND CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT ON A PROPOSITION FOR INCURRING SUCH BONDED INDEBTEDNESS

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2007, the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District"), pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code, adopted Resolution No. 2007/07 declaring the necessity for Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District"), to incur a bonded indebtedness for the purpose of providing public facilities which are necessary for the development of the property therein, and scheduling a hearing thereon; and

WHEREAS, notice was published and mailed to the owner of all of the property in the Community Facilities District as required by law relative to the intention of the Board to establish the Community Facilities District, the levy of special taxes therein, the provision of public facilities therefor and the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by the Community Facilities District, and of the time and place of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, the Board conducted the hearing and afforded all persons interested, including persons owning property within the Community Facilities District, an opportunity to be heard on the proposed authorization to incur bonded indebtedness, and no protests were received; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, at the conclusion of the hearing, pursuant to Section 53325.1 of the California Government Code, the Board adopted the resolution of formation establishing Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that it is necessary for the Community Facilities District to incur a bonded indebtedness for the purpose of providing public facilities which are necessary to the development of the property therein.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Bonded Indebtedness</u>. The Board declares that it is necessary that a bonded indebtedness be incurred by and for the proposed Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, in an amount not to



exceed \$4,000,000 with respect to the Community Facilities District for the purpose of financing the design, acquisition, construction, equipping and furnishing of the public school facilities described in the Resolution Establishing Community Facilities District No. 7 heretofore adopted by the Board (the "Resolution of Formation"), which are:

- (a) public school facilities;
- (b) park and recreation facilities;
- (c) acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for the school facilities and park and recreation facilities specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) above; and
- (d) The incidental expenses which will be incurred are: (i) the cost of engineering, planning and designing such facilities and the cost of environmental evaluations thereof, (ii) all costs associated with the creation of the proposed community facilities district, issuance of the bonds thereof, the determination of the amount of and collection of taxes, the payment of taxes, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of the community facilities district, and (iii) any other expenses incidental to the construction, acquisition, completion, and inspection of such school facilities, park and recreation facilities and public capital improvements.

Section 2. Payment of Bonded Indebtedness. Pursuant to Section 4 of the Resolution of Intention and Section 53351 of the California Government Code, all parcels of taxable property within the Community Facilities District shall be subject to the levy of special taxes to pay the principal of and interest on the aggregate principal amount of the bonds of the Community Facilities District which may be issued and sold to finance public facilities which are of benefit to parcels of property within the Community Facilities District.

Section 3. Amount of Debt; Terms of Bonds. The aggregate principal amount of the bonded indebtedness to be incurred by the Community Facilities District shall not exceed \$4,000,000 for the Community Facilities. The maximum term of the bonds shall not exceed 40 years. The maximum annual rate of interest to be paid semiannually on the bonds shall not exceed 12 percent per annum or such other rate as may be the maximum interest rate permitted by law.

Section 4. Propositions to be Submitted to Voters.

(a) The propositions to be submitted to the voters within the Community Facilities District with respect to the proposed bonded indebtedness shall be as follows:

Shall a bonded indebtedness in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 be incurred by and for within Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, for a maximum term of not more than 40 years and with interest at a rate or rates not to



exceed 12 percent per annum, or such other rate as may be the maximum interest rate permitted by law, for the purposes of providing for the Community Facilities District public school facilities, acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for the school facilities, park and recreation facilities, water and wastewater facilities, and certain other incidental expenses, as provided in Resolution of Formation adopted by the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District on July 2, 2007, and paying costs incidental to the sale of bonds and the formation of the community facilities district, including satisfaction of contractual obligations relating to expenses or the advancement of funds for expenses existing at the time the bonds are issued, architectural, engineering, inspection, legal, fiscal and financial consultant fees, bond and other reserve funds, bond discount, interest on bonds estimated to be due and payable within two years of their issuance, election costs, and all costs of issuance of the bonds?

Shall special taxes be levied annually on taxable property within Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the community facilities district issued and sold to finance the public school facilities, the acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for the school facilities, water and wastewater facilities, park and recreation facilities and certain other incidental expenses, as provided in the Resolution of Formation adopted by the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District on July 2, 2007, and paying costs incidental to the sale of bonds and the formation of the community facilities district, to replenish the reserve fund for the bonds, or to accumulate funds for future bond payments, and to pay expenses incidental thereto and to the levy and collection of the special taxes, so long as the special taxes are needed to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and for such other purposes, at the special tax rates and pursuant to the method of apportioning the special taxes set forth in Exhibit "A" to Resolution of Formation adopted by the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District on July 2, 2007?

Shall an appropriations limit, as defined by subdivision (h) of Section 8 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution, be established for Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, in the amount of \$500,000?

Section 5. Election. The date of the special election with respect to the incurring of the aforementioned bonded indebtedness, at which time the propositions set forth in Section 4 hereof shall be submitted to the voters of the Community Facilities District is July 2, 2007, and that special election is herby called for that date. The special election shall be consolidated with the special elections with respect to the propositions for (i) the levy of special taxes for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District, and (ii) establishing an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District which have also been called for July 2, 2007. The consolidated special elections shall be conducted by mail-ballot pursuant to applicable provisions of the California Elections Code with respect to mail-ballot elections of school districts and specifically the provisions of Division 4 (commencing with Section 4000) of that Code, insofar as they may be applicable. The official



ballots are required to be received by the Clerk of the Board by 6:00 o'clock p.m. on the said date of the election; provided that the election shall be closed before such hour if the Clerk determined that all the qualified voters have voted.

Section 6. Accountability Measures. Pursuant to Section 53410 of the California Government Code, if the voters approve the propositions contained in the official ballots for the consolidated special elections with respect to the Community Facilities District incurring bonded indebtedness for the purposes for which such indebtedness is to be incurred and bonds of the Community Facilities District are to be issued (the "Bond Propositions"), the incurring of such bonded indebtedness and the issuance of bonds of the Community Facilities District shall be subject to the following accountability measures:

- a) The Bond Propositions shall identify the specific purposes for which the bonds are to be issued;
- b) The proceeds of the Bonds shall be applied only for the specific purposes identified in the Bond Propositions;
- c) An account or accounts shall be created pursuant to the fiscal agent agreement for such bonds into which the proceeds of the sale of such bonds shall be deposited; and
- d) The Superintendent of the District shall file a report with the Board of Education no later than January 2 of the calendar year beginning after the year in which the bonds are issued and annually thereafter, which shall contain the information required by Section 53411 of the California Government Code.

The Board of Education finds that the Bond Propositions which will be set forth in the official ballots for the consolidated special elections, and which are set forth in Section 4 hereof, identify the specific purposes for which the Community Facilities District will incur bonded indebtedness and issue bonds.

RESOLUTION NO. 2008/05

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA SCHOOL DISTRICT CALLING SPECIAL UNIFIED ELECTIONS AND SUBMITTING TO THE VOTERS OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7 PROPOSITIONS WITH RESPECT TO THE ANNUAL LEVY OF SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT TO PAY PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON BONDS OF THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT WHICH MAY BE ISSUED AND SOLD TO FINANCE PUBLIC FACILITIES FOR THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT FOR THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, pursuant to Section 53325.1 of the California Government Code, the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District ("the District") adopted the resolution of formation (the "Resolution of Formation") for Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District"), establishing the Community Facilities District and the boundaries thereof; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, pursuant to Section 53351 of that Code, the Board also adopted a resolution determining that it is necessary that the Community Facilities District incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 within Community Facilities District for the purpose of financing the design, construction, and acquisition of certain public facilities for the Community Facilities District (the "Resolution of Determination"); and

WHEREAS, by the Resolution of Determination, the Board called a special election on the proposition to be submitted to the voters of the Community Facilities District with respect to the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness for the financing of such public facilities for the Community Facilities District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, it is necessary that the Board also submit to the voters of the Community Facilities District the proposition relating to the annual levy of special taxes on the property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District which may be issued and sold to finance the design, construction and acquisition of the public school facilities for the Community Facilities District, if such bonds are authorized and issued; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53325.7 of the California Government Code, the Board may also submit to the voters of the Community Facilities District a proposition for the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District.



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Findings. The Board finds that: (1) the foregoing recitals are Section 1. correct; (ii) less than 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory of the Community Facilities District for each of the 90 days preceding the close of the protest hearing on July 2, 2007; (iii) pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, as a result of the finding set forth in clause (ii) above, the vote in the special elections called by this resolution shall be by the landowners of the Community Facilities District whose property would be subject to the special taxes if they were levied at the time of the election, and each landowner shall have one vote for each acre, or portion thereof, which he or she owns within the Community Facilities District which would be subject to the proposed special taxes if they were levied at the time of the election; (iv) the sole landowner of the Community Facilities District has by unanimous written consent (a) waived the time limits set forth in said Section 53326 for holding the elections called by this resolution and the election on the propositions of the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness for financing the design, construction and acquisition of public facilities, which pursuant to Section 4 hereof is consolidated with the elections called hereby, (b) consented to the holding of the consolidated elections on July 2, 2007, (c) waived notice and mailed notice of the time and date of the consolidated elections, and (d) waived an impartial analysis by the county counsel of the ballot propositions pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code and arguments and rebuttals pursuant to Sections 9501 to 9507, inclusive, and 9509 of that Code; and (v) the Clerk of the Board has consented to the holding of the consolidated elections on July 2, 2007.

Section 2. <u>Call of Elections</u>. The Board hereby calls and schedules the special elections for July 2, 2007 within and for the Community Facilities District on the proposition of the annual levy of special taxes within the Community Facilities District for the payment of principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District which may be issued and sold to finance public school facilities, and on the proposition of the establishment of an appropriations limits for the Community Facilities District.

Section 3. <u>Propositions</u>. The propositions to be submitted to the voters of the Community Facilities District at such special elections shall be as set forth on Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 4. Consolidation of Elections. The special elections called hereby on the propositions to be submitted to the voters of the Community Facilities District, as set forth in Section 3 hereof, shall be consolidated with the election on the proposition for the incurring of a bonded indebtedness by the Community Facilities District for financing the design, construction and acquisition of public facilities for the Community Facilities District. The ballot for the consolidated elections shall be in the forms attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

Section 5. Conduct of Elections. Except as otherwise provided in Section 6 hereof, the consolidated elections shall be conducted by the Clerk of the Board (the "Clerk") pursuant to the provisions of the California Elections Code governing mail ballot elections of school districts, and in particular the provisions of Division 4 (commencing with § 4000), of that Code, insofar as they may be applicable.



- Section 6. Description of Voting Procedures. The voting procedures to be followed in conducting the consolidated special elections on (i) the proposition of the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000, (ii) the proposition with respect to the levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District, and (iii) the proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District in the amount of \$500,000 shall be as follows:
- (a) Pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code, ballots for the consolidated special elections shall be distributed to the qualified electors by the Clerk by mail with return postage prepaid, or by personal service.
- (b) Pursuant to applicable sections of the California Elections Code governing the conduct of mail ballot elections of school districts, and specifically Division 4 (commencing with 4000) of the California Elections Code with respect to elections conducted by mail, the Clerk shall mail or deliver to each qualified elector an official ballot in the form attached hereto as Exhibit "A," and shall also mail or deliver to all such qualified electors a ballot pamphlet and instructions to voter, including a sample ballot identical in form to the official ballot but identified as a sample ballot, a return identification envelope with prepaid postage thereon addressed to the Clerk for return of the voted official ballots, and a copy of the Resolution of Formation and the exhibit thereto.
- each landowner-voter shall have printed or typed thereon the name of the landowner-voter and the number of votes to be voted by the landowner-voter and shall have appended to it a certification to be signed by the person voting the official ballot which shall certify that the person signing the certification is the person who voted the official ballot, and if the landowner-voter is other than a natural person, that he or she is an officer of or other person affiliated with the landowner-voter entitled to vote such official ballot, that he or she has been authorized to vote such official ballot on behalf of the landowner-voter, that in voting such official ballot it was his or her intent, as well as the intent of the landowner-voter, to vote all votes to which the landowner-voter is entitled based on its land ownership on the propositions set forth in the official ballot as marked thereon in the voting square opposite each such proposition, and further certifying as to the acreage of the landowner-voter's land ownership within the Community Facilities District.
- (d) The return identification envelope to be mailed or delivered by the Clerk to each landowner-voter shall have printed or typed thereon the following: (i) the name of the landowner, (ii) the address of the landowner, (iii) a declaration under penalty of perjury stating that the voter is the landowner or the authorized representative of the landowner entitled to vote the enclosed ballot and is the person whose name appears on the identification envelope, (iv) the printed name and signature of the voter, (v) the address of the voter, (vi) the date of signing and place of execution of said declaration, and (vii) a notice that the envelope contains an official ballot and is to be opened only by the Clerk.
- (e) The instruction to voter form to be mailed or delivered by the Clerk to the landowner-voters shall inform them that the official ballots shall be returned to the Clerk properly voted as provided thereon and with the certification appended thereto properly



completed and signed in the sealed return identification envelope with the certification thereon completed and signed and all other information to be inserted thereon properly inserted by 7:00 o'clock p.m. on the date of the elections.

- (f) Upon receipt of the return identification envelopes which are returned prior to the voting deadline on the date of the elections, the Clerk shall canvass the votes cast in the consolidated special elections, and shall file a statement with the Board as to the results of such canvass and the election on each proposition set forth in the official ballot.
- Section 7. Accountability Measures. Pursuant to Section 53410 of the California Government Code, if the landowner voters approve the propositions contained in the Proposition A and Proposition B of the Official Ballots for the consolidated special elections, which are attached hereto as Exhibit "A," with respect to the Community Facilities District incurring bonded indebtedness for the purposes for which such indebtedness is to be incurred and bonds of the Community Facilities District are to be issued (the "Bond Propositions"), the incurring of such bonded indebtedness and the issuance of bonds of the Community Facilities District shall be subject to the following accountability measures:
- (a) The Bond Propositions shall identify the specific purposes for which the bonds are to be issued;
- (b) The proceeds of the bonds shall be applied only for the specific purposes identified in the Bond Propositions;
- (c) An account or accounts shall be created pursuant to the fiscal agent agreement for such bonds into which the proceeds of the sale of such bonds shall be deposited; and
- (d) The Superintendent of the District shall file a report with the Board of Education no later than January 2 of the calendar year beginning after the year in which the bonds are issued and annually thereafter, which shall contain the information required by Section 53411 of the California Government Code.

The Board of Education finds that the Bond Propositions, as set forth in the Official Ballots attached hereto as Exhibit "A," identify the specific purposes for which the Community Facilities District will incur bonded indebtedness and issue bonds.

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Introduction

Ι.

The Board of Education ("Board") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("School District"), pursuant to the provisions of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, being Chapter 2.5, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California ("Act"), and specifically Section 53321.5 thereof, has directed the filing of a written report with the Board as to a proposed community facilities district. All capitalized terms not otherwise defined within this Community Facilities District Report ("Report") shall have the meanings assigned to them in the Rate and Method of Apportionment ("RMA"), which is included as Exhibit A.

This community facilities district hereinafter shall be referred to as:

COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT No. 7 OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ("CFD No. 7")

WHEREAS, The Resolution of the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District Declaring its Intention to Establish Proposed Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District and To Authorize the Levy of Special Taxes Therein ("Resolution of Intention"), adopted by the Board on May 21, 2007 did direct that the Report generally contain the following:

- A description of the facilities by type which will be required to adequately meet the needs of CFD No. 7; and
- 2. A cost estimate for planning, construction, leasing, and/or purchasing of the facilities which will be funded by CFD No. 7, as well as an identification of all costs associated with the formation, issuance of B onds, and administration of the Special Taxes of CFD No. 7.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Elliott Duchon, the authorized representative of the School District, caused the Report to be prepared pursuant to the provisions of the Act, and do hereby submit this Report.



II. Description of CFD

CFD No. 7 is composed of approximately 11.73 gross acres located within the unincorporated territory of the County of Riverside ("County") (Exhibit B contains a map of the proposed boundaries of CFD No. 7). The property is located on the south side of Wallace Street, north of Loring Ranch Road and east of Crestmore Road, south of the Flabob airport. Table 1 displays the expected product composition of the 85 Units (as defined herein) that are being planned within CFD No. 7.

A School Facilities Mitigation Agreement ("Agreement") was entered into by and between the School District and Loring Ranch 31503, L.P. CFD No. 7 will finance the acquisition/construction of school facilities that will directly or indirectly serve students generated from residential units constructed within CFD No. 7.

In addition, it is anticipated that the School District will enter into a Joint Community Facilities Agreement ("JCFA") with the Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District ("JARPD") on July 2, 2007. The JCFA establishes the terms by which CFD No. 7 will finance JARPD recreation and park facilities necessitated by the development within CFD No. 7. A copy of the JCFA will be on file at the School District and will be available for public review upon request.



III. Senate Bill 165 Compliance

After January 1, 2001, any voter-approved local special tax and/or bond measure that would provide for the imposition of a special tax or sale of bonds by a local agency is subject to the requirements of Senate Bill ("SB") 165. Generally, SB 165 requires that any such measure contain a statement indicating the purpose of the special tax and/or bond; that the proceeds of the special tax and/or bond proceeds be applied only to the purpose identified; that an account be created in which the proceeds are to be deposited; and that an annual report be prepared pursuant to Section 50075.3 or 53411 of the Government Code, providing an accounting of the funds collected and expended and a status report of any project required or authorized to be funded.

The Resolution of Intention, as well as other documents approved by the Board, indicates the purpose of the Special Tax, and the Owner has provided a written acknowledgement of such purpose in the Agreement. As of the date of this Report, no other requirements of SB 165 pertain with respect to CFD No. 7. However, the School District is aware of all its obligations under SB 165 and intends to satisfy all such obligations on an ongoing basis to ensure continued compliance with SB 165 in the future.



IV. Description of Facilities

The purpose of CFD No. 7 is to provide for the cost of financing the acquisition, construction, expansion, improvement, or rehabilitation of the authorized facilities. Descriptions of the authorized facilities, which are defined in Exhibit A to the Resolution of Intention, are provided below.

A. General Description

- I. Public school facilities
- II. Park and recreation facilities
- III. Acquisition of land, rights-of-way and easements necessary for the school facilities specified and park and recreation facilities specified in paragraph (I) and (II) above
- IV. The incidental expenses which will be incurred are: (i) the cost of engineering, planning and designing such facilities and the cost of environmental evaluations thereof, (ii) all costs associated with the creation of the proposed community facilities district, issuance of the bonds thereof, the determination of the amount of and collection of taxes, the payment of taxes, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of the community facilities district, and (iii) any other expenses incidental to the construction, acquisition, completion, and inspection of such school facilities and public capital improvements.

B. <u>Estimated Cost of Capital Improvements</u>

CFD No. 7 is currently expected to issue one (1) series of Bonds, or equivalent securities, to finance the acquisition, construction, expansion, improvement, or rehabilitation of the authorized facilities. The total amount of construction proceeds to be generated from the series of Bonds is currently projected to be \$1,695,410. Of this amount \$1,232,266 is expected to be used to finance school facilities and \$463,144 is expected to be used to finance non-school facilities. Table 2 provides a summary of this information. However, these amounts are estimates and subject to change, depending on the interest rates of the Bonds, the cost of issuance of the Bonds, the actual fees which the JARPD levies and collect and other factors to be determined at the time Bonds are issued.

C. <u>Estimated Incidental Expenses</u>

Pursuant to Section 53340 of the Act, the proceeds of any Special Tax levied and collected by CFD No. 7 may be used only to pay, in whole or in part, for the cost of providing public facilities, services, and incidental expenses. The incidental expenses which will be incurred are: (i) the cost of engineering, planning, and designing such facilities and the cost of environmental evaluations thereof, (ii) all costs associated with the creation of the proposed community facilities district, issuance of the bonds thereof, the determination of the amount of and collection of Special Taxes, the payment of Special Taxes, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of the community facilities district, and (iii) any other expenses incidental to the construction, acquisition completion, and inspection of such school facilities and public capital improvements. The incidental expenses associated with the formation of CFD No. 7 and the issuance of Bonds are not expected to exceed \$589,244 which include issuance costs for the Bonds, up to twelve (12) months of capitalized interest, pre-funded administration, underwriter's discount, and a reserve fund deposit to be equal to (i) the maximum annual debt service on the Bonds, (ii) 10% of the principal amount of the Bonds or (iii) 125% of the average annual debt service for the Bonds. The incidental expenses associated with the annual administration of CFD No. 7 are not expected to exceed \$25,000 in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 and will escalate by two percent (2%) each successive Fiscal Year. However, these amounts are estimates and subject to change.



V. Rate and Method of Apportionment

All of the property located within CFD No. 7, unless exempted by law or by the RMA, shall be taxed for the purpose of providing necessary facilities to serve CFD No. 7. As shown in Exhibit A, the RMA provides information sufficient to allow each property owner within CFD No. 7 to estimate the Maximum Special Tax applicable to his or her property. The discussion of the RMA provided below is intended merely as a general description of the RMA, not as a substitute, and in no way supersedes the RMA.

A. Classification of Assessor's Parcels

Each Fiscal Year, beginning with Fiscal Year 2007/2008, (i) each Assessor's Parcel shall be classified as Exempt Property or Taxable Property and (ii) each Assessor's Parcel of Taxable Property shall be classified as Developed Property or Undeveloped Property. Developed Property shall be further classified based on the Building Square Footage of the Unit. The classification of Exempt Property shall take into consideration the Minimum Taxable Acreage listed in Section K of the RMA.

B. Maximum Special Taxes

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel in CFD No. 7 classified as Developed Property in any Fiscal Year shall be the greater of (i) the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax or (ii) the application of the Backup Annual Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel.

The Maximum Special Tax for Assessor's Parcels classified as Undeveloped Property in any Fiscal Year shall be the amount determined by the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel. Table 3 and Table 4 display the Assigned Annual Special Tax rates for Developed Property and Undeveloped Property, subject to increases described below.

Each July 1, commencing July 1, 2008, the Assigned Annual Special Tax per acre of Acreage for each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property shall be increased by two percent (2.00%) of the amount in effect the prior Fiscal Year.

C. Method of Apportionment

Each Fiscal Year, beginning in Fiscal Year 2007/2008, Annual Special Taxes shall be levied on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property at the Assigned Annual Special Tax rate. Annual Special Taxes collected will be used to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement. If additional Annual Special Taxes are still required to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement, then the Annual Special Tax shall be levied Proportionately on all Undeveloped Property up to the Assigned Annual Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel. If additional Annual Special Taxes are still required to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement, the Annual Special Taxes shall be levied Proportionately on Developed Property up to the Maximum Annual Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement.

D. Prepayment of Annual Special Tax Obligations

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or an Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property for which a Building Permit has been issued may be prepaid in full, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties, or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel. The Prepayment Amount for an Assessor's Parcel shall be determined as set forth in Section G of the RMA. The Prepayment Amount for each Assessor's Parcel shall be determined by the present value of the remaining Annual Special Tax obligation of such Assessor's Parcel.

E. Partial Prepayment of Annual Special Tax Obligation

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or an Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property for which a Building Permit has been issued may be partially prepaid, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel. The Partial Prepayment Amount shall be determined as set forth in Section H of the RMA.

F. Termination of Special Tax

Annual Special Taxes shall be levied for a period of thirty-three (33) Fiscal Years after the Bonds have been issued, provided that Annual Special Taxes shall not be levied after Fiscal Year 2047-48.



G. Excess Assigned Annual Special Taxes

In any Fiscal Year, proceeds of the Assigned Annual Special Tax for Developed Property in excess of the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement shall be available to the School District for acquisition, construction, and financing of school facilities in accordance with the Act, CFD No. 7 proceedings and the applicable law as determined by the Board.



VI. Boundaries of Community Facilities District

A map of the boundaries of CFD No. 7 is included in Exhibit B. The boundaries of CFD No. 7 include all of the properties on which Special Taxes may be levied by CFD No. 7. A boundary map of CFD No. 7 was recorded in the Official Records of the Recorder of the County of Riverside on June 5, 2007 in Book 71, Page 29, as Instrument No. 2007-0371723.



VII. General Terms and Conditions

The general terms and conditions of CFD No. 7 are as follows:

A. Substitution of Facilities

The description of the authorized facilities, as set forth herein, is general in their nature. The final nature of the authorized facilities will be determined upon the preparation of final plans and specifications. The final plans may show substitutes in lieu of, or modifications to, the proposed work in order to accomplish the authorized purposes of CFD No. 7. Any such substitution shall not be considered a change or modification in the proceedings so long as the facilities are substantially similar to those set forth in this Report and authorized by the proceedings under which CFD No. 7 was formed.

B. Bonds

In order to finance the school facilities set forth in this Report, it is necessary that Bonds be issued pursuant to the terms, conditions, and authorizations as set forth in the Act, commencing with Section 53311 thereof and specifically, Article 5 therein. The maximum authorized bonded indebtedness for CFD No. 7 has been specified as an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000.

C. Appeals and Interpretation Procedure

According to Section L of the RMA, any property owner claiming that the amount or application of the Special Tax is not correct may file a written notice of appeal with the Board not later than twelve (12) months after having paid the first installment of the Special Tax that is disputed. A representative(s) of CFD No. 7 shall promptly review the appeal, and if necessary, meet with the property owner, consider written and oral evidence regarding the amount of the Special Tax, and rule on the appeal. If the representative's decision requires that the Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel be modified or changed in favor of the property owner, a cash refund shall not be made (except for the last year of levy), but an adjustment shall be made to the Annual Special Tax on that Assessor's Parcel in the subsequent Fiscal Year(s).

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EXHIBIT A

RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Rate & Method of Apportionment for Community Facilities District No. 7 Jurupa Unified School District

The following sets forth the Rate and Method of Apportionment for the levy and collection of Special Taxes (as defined below) by Community Facilities District No. 7 ("CFD No. 7") of Jurupa Unified School District ("School District"). A Special Tax shall be levied on and collected from Taxable Property (as defined below) in CFD No. 7 each Fiscal Year (as defined below) in an amount determined through the application of the Rate and Method of Apportionment described below. All of the real property in CFD No. 7, unless exempted by law or by the provisions hereof, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent, and in the manner herein provided.

Section A: Definitions

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

- "Acre" or "Acreage" means the land area of an Assessor's Parcel as shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, or if the land area is not shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, the land area shown on the applicable Final Subdivision Map, parcel map, condominium plan, or other recorded County parcel map, that creates the boundaries of each Assessor's Parcel Number.
- "Act" means the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, being Chapter 2.5, Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code.
- "Administrative Expenses" means any ordinary and necessary expense incurred by the School District on behalf of CFD No. 7 related to the determination of the amount of the levy of Special Taxes, the collection of Special Taxes including the expenses of collecting delinquencies, the administration of Bonds, the proportional payment of salaries and benefits of any School District employee to the extent duties are directly related to the administration of CFD No. 7, and costs otherwise incurred in order to carry out the authorized purposes of CFD No. 7.
- "Annual Special Tax" means the Special Tax actually levied in any Fiscal Year on any Assessor's Parcel.
- "Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel of land designated on an Assessor's Parcel Map with an assigned Assessor's Parcel Number within the boundaries of CFD No. 7.
- "Assessor's Parcel Map" means an official map of the Assessor of the County designating parcels by Assessor's Parcel Number.
- "Assessor's Parcel Number" or "APN" means that number assigned to an Assessor's Parcel by the County for purposes of identification.
- "Assigned Annual Special Tax" means the Special Tax of that name described in Section D.
- "Board" means the Board of Education of Jurupa Unified School District or its designee as the legislative body of CFD No. 7.
- "Bond Index" means the national Bond Buyer Revenue Bond Index, commonly referenced as the 25-Bond Revenue Index. In the event the Bond Index ceases to be published, the index used shall be based on a comparable index for revenue bonds maturing in 30 years with an average rating equivalent to Moody's A1 and S&P's A-plus, as reasonably determined by the Board.



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- "Bonds" means any obligation to repay a sum of money, including obligations in the form of bonds, notes, certificates of participation, long-term leases, loans from government agencies, or loans from banks, other financial institutions, private businesses, or individuals, or long-term contracts, or any refunding thereof, which obligation may be incurred by CFD No. 7 or the School District.
- "Bond Yield" means the yield on the last series of Bonds issued by or on behalf of CFD No. 7, as calculated at the time such Bonds are issued pursuant to Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended for purpose of the Non-Arbitrage (Tax) Certificate or other similar bond issuance document.
- "Building Permit" means a permit for the construction of one or more Units issued by the County, or another public agency in the event the County no longer issues permits for the construction of Units within CFD No. 7. For purposes of this definition, "Building Permit" shall not include permits for construction or installation of commercial/industrial structures, parking structures, retaining walls, utility improvements, or other such improvements not intended for human habitation.
- "Building Square Footage" or "BSF" means the square footage of assessable internal living space of a Unit, exclusive of any carports, walkways, garages, overhangs, patios, enclosed patios, detached accessory structure, or other structures not used as living space, as determined by reference to the Building Permit for such Unit.
- "Calendar Year" means the period commencing January 1 of any year and ending the following December 31.
- "County" means the County of Riverside, State of California.
- "Developed Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Taxable Property for which Building Permits were issued on or before May 1 of the prior Fiscal Year, provided that such Assessor's Parcels were created on or before January 1 of the prior Fiscal Year and that each such Assessor's Parcel is associated with a Lot, as determined reasonably by the Board.
- **"Exempt Property"** means all Assessor's Parcels designated as being exempt from Special Taxes in Section K.
- "Final Subdivision Map" means a final tract map, parcel map, lot line adjustment, or functionally equivalent map or instrument that creates building sites, recorded in the County Office of the Recorder.
- "Fiscal Year" means the period commencing on July 1 of any year and ending the following June 30.
- "Homeowner" means any owner of a completed unit constructed and sold within CFD No. 7.
- "Lot(s)" means an individual legal lot created by a Final Subdivision Map for which a Building Permit has been or could be issued. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the case of an individual legal lot created by such a Final Subdivision Map upon which condominium units are entitled to be developed but for which a condominium plan has not been recorded, the number of Lots allocable to such legal lot for purposes of calculating the Undeveloped Tax applicable to such Final Subdivision Map shall equal the number of condominium units which are permitted to be constructed on such legal lot as shown on such Final Subdivision Map.



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- "Lot 86" means the property identified as Lot 86 on the County tentative tract map No. 31503 dated August 2006, which consists of approximately 12.91 acres as potentially modified upon recordation.
- "Maximum Special Tax" means the maximum Special Tax, determined in accordance with Section C, that can be levied by CFD No. 7 in any Fiscal Year on any Assessor's Parcel.
- "Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement" means the amount required in any Fiscal Year to pay: (i) the debt service or the periodic costs on all outstanding Bonds, (ii) Administrative Expenses of CFD No. 7, (iii) the costs associated with the release of funds from an escrow account, and (iv) any amount required to establish or replenish any reserve funds established in association with the Bonds, less (v) any amount available to pay debt service or other periodic costs on the Bonds pursuant to any applicable bond indenture, fiscal agent agreement, trust agreement or similar agreements and supplements thereto, if any. In arriving at the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement the Board shall take into account the reasonably anticipated delinquent Special Taxes based on the delinquency rate for Special Taxes in the previous Fiscal Year.
- "Minimum Taxable Acreage" means the applicable Acreage listed in Table 3 as set forth in Section K.
- **"Partial Prepayment Amount"** means the amount required to prepay a portion of the Annual Special Tax obligation for an Assessor's Parcel as described in Section H.
- "Prepayment Amount" means the amount required to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation in full for an Assessor's Parcel as described in Section G.
- "Present Value of Taxes" means the present value of any Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel in the current Fiscal Year not yet received by the School District for CFD No. 7, plus the expected Annual Special Tax applicable to such Assessor's Parcel in each remaining Fiscal Year until the termination date specified in Section J but not to exceed thirty-three (33) Fiscal years, using as the discount rate (i) the Bond Yield after Bond issuance or (ii) the most recently published Bond Index prior to Bond issuance.
- "Proportionately" means that the ratio of the actual Annual Special Tax levy to the applicable Assigned Annual Special Tax is equal for all applicable Assessor's Parcels.
- "Reserve Fund Credit" means, for each owner of an Assessor's Parcel wishing to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation of such Assessor's Parcel, an amount equal to the reduction in the reserve requirement for the outstanding Bonds resulting from the redemption of Bonds with the applicable prepaid Special Taxes. In the event that a surety bond or other credit instrument satisfies the reserve requirement or the reserve requirement is under funded at the time of the prepayment, no Reserve Credit shall be given.
- "Special Tax" means any of the special taxes authorized to be levied by CFD No. 7 pursuant to the Act.
- "Taxable Property" means all Assessor's Parcels which are not Exempt Property.
- "Undeveloped Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Taxable Property which are not Developed Property.
- "Unit" means each separate residential dwelling unit which comprises an independent facility capable of conveyance separate from adjacent residential dwelling units.



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Section B: Classification of Assessor's Parcels

Each Fiscal Year, beginning with Fiscal Year 2007/2008, (i) each Assessor's Parcel within CFD No. 7 shall be classified as Taxable Property or Exempt Property; and (ii) each Assessor's Parcel of Taxable Property shall be classified as Developed Property or Undeveloped Property. Developed Property shall be further classified based on the Building Square Footage of the Unit. The classification of Exempt Property shall take into consideration the minimum Net Taxable Acreage as determined pursuant to Section K.

Section C: Maximum Special Taxes

1. Developed Property

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Developed Property for any Fiscal Year shall be the amount determined by the greater of (i) the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax or (ii) the application of the Backup Annual Special Tax for a given Final Subdivision Map.

2. Undeveloped Property

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Undeveloped Property for any Fiscal Year shall be the amount determined by the application of the Assigned Annual Special Tax.

Section D: Assigned Annual Special Taxes

1. <u>Developed Property</u>

The Assigned Annual Special Tax in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be determined by reference to Table 1 according to the Building Square Footage of the Unit, subject to increase as described below.

Each July 1, commencing July 1, 2008, the Assigned Annual Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be increased by two percent (2.00%) of the amount in effect the prior Fiscal Year.

2. Undeveloped Property

The Assigned Annual Special Tax per Acre in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 for each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property shall be determined by reference to Table 2, subject to increase as described below.

Each July 1, commencing July 1, 2008, the Assigned Annual Special for each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property shall be increased by two percent (2.00%) of the amount in effect the prior Fiscal Year.

Section E: Backup Annual Special Taxes

Each Fiscal Year, each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property shall be subject to a Backup Annual Special Tax. The Backup Annual Special Tax for Developed Property within a Final Subdivision Map shall be the rate per Lot calculated according to the following formula in Fiscal Year 2007/2008 or such later Fiscal Year in which such Final Subdivision Map is created:

The terms above have the following meanings:

B = Backup Annual Special Tax per Lot in each Fiscal Year

U = Assigned Annual Special Tax per acre of Acreage for Undeveloped Property in the Fiscal Year the calculation is performed

A = Acreage of Taxable Property in such Final Subdivision Map after subtracting the

Exempt Property as determined by the Board in Section K

L = Lots in the Final Subdivision Map at the time of calculation

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if all or any portion of the Final Subdivision Map(s) described in the preceding paragraph is subsequently changed or modified, then the Backup Annual Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in such Final Subdivision Map area that is changed or modified shall be a rate per square foot of Acreage calculated as follows:

- 1. Determine the total Backup Annual Special Taxes anticipated to apply to the changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area prior to the change or modification.
- 2. The result of paragraph 1 above shall be divided by the Acreage of Taxable Property which is ultimately expected to exist in such changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area, as reasonably determined by the Board.
- 3. The result of paragraph 2 above shall be divided by 43,560. The result is the Backup Annual Special Tax per square foot of Acreage which shall be applicable to Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property in such changed or modified Final Subdivision Map area for all remaining Fiscal Years in which the Special Tax may be levied. The Backup Annual Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in a Final Subdivision Map that is not changed or modified shall not be recalculated.



Section F: Method of Apportionment of the Annual Special Tax

Commencing Fiscal Year 2007/2008 and for each subsequent Fiscal Year, the Board shall levy Annual Special Taxes as follows:

Step One:

The Board shall levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in an amount equal to the Assigned Annual Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel.

Step Two:

If the sum of the amounts collected in step one is insufficient to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement, then the Board shall Proportionately levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property in an amount up to the Assigned Annual Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement.

Step Three:

If the sum of the amounts collected in steps one and two is insufficient to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement, then the Board shall Proportionately levy an Annual Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property up to the Maximum Special Tax applicable to each such Assessor's Parcel, to satisfy the Minimum Annual Special Tax Requirement.

Section G: Prepayment of Annual Special Taxes

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or an Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property may be prepaid in full, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties, or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel at the time the Annual Special Tax obligation would be prepaid. The Prepayment Amount for an Assessor's Parcel eligible for prepayment shall be determined as described below.

An owner of an Assessor's Parcel intending to prepay the Annual Special Tax obligation shall provide CFD No. 7 with written notice of intent to prepay. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of such written notice, the Board shall reasonably determine the Prepayment Amount of such Assessor's Parcel and shall notify such owner of such Prepayment Amount. The Prepayment Amount shall be calculated according to the following formula:

P = PVT - RFC + PAF

The terms above have the following meanings:

Prepayment Amount Present Value of Taxes **PVT** Reserve Fund Credit **RFC** =

Prepayment Administrative Fees PAF

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no prepayment will be allowed unless the amount of Annual Special Taxes that may be levied on Taxable Property, net of Administrative Expenses, shall be at least 1.1 times the regularly scheduled annual interest and principal payments on all currently outstanding Bonds in each future Fiscal Year and such prepayment will not impair the security of all currently outstanding Bonds, as reasonably determined by the Board. Such determination shall include identifying all Assessor's Parcels that are expected to become Exempt Property.

With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is prepaid, the Board shall indicate in the records of CFD No. 7 that there has been a prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and shall cause a suitable notice to be recorded in compliance with the Act to indicate the prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and the release of the Annual Special Tax lien on such Assessor's Parcel, and the obligation of such Assessor's Parcel to pay such Annual Special Tax shall cease.



Section H: Partial Prepayment of Annual Special Taxes

The Annual Special Tax obligation of an Assessor's Parcel may be partially prepaid at the times and under the conditions set forth in this section, provided that there are no delinquent Special Taxes, penalties, or interest charges outstanding with respect to such Assessor's Parcel at the time the Annual Special Tax obligation would be prepaid.

Partial Prepayment Times and Conditions 1.

Prior to the conveyance of the first production Unit on a Lot within a Final Subdivision Map, the owner of no less than all the Taxable Property within such Final Subdivision Map may elect in writing to the Board to prepay a portion of the Annual Special Tax obligations for all the Assessor's Parcels within such Final Subdivision Map, as calculated in Section G.2. below. The partial prepayment of each Annual Special Tax obligation shall be collected for all Assessor's Parcels prior to the conveyance of the first production Unit on a Lot within such Final Subdivision Map.

Partial Prepayment Amount 2.

The Partial Prepayment Amount shall be calculated according to the following formula:

PP $= P_G x F$

The terms above have the following meanings:

the Partial Prepayment Amount PP

the Prepayment Amount calculated according to Section G P_{G}

the percent by which the owner of the Assessor's Parcel is partially prepaying

the Annual Special Tax A obligation

Partial Prepayment Procedures and Limitations 3.

With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is partially prepaid, the Board shall indicate in the records of CFD No. 7 that there has been a partial prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and shall cause a suitable notice to be recorded in compliance with the Act to indicate the partial prepayment of the Annual Special Tax obligation and the partial release of the Annual Special Tax lien on such Assessor's Parcel, and the obligation of such Assessor's Parcel to pay such prepaid portion of the Annual Special Tax shall cease. Additionally, the notice shall indicate that the Assigned Annual Special Tax and the Backup Annual Special Tax for the Assessor's Parcel has been reduced by an amount equal to the percentage which was partially prepaid.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no partial prepayment will be allowed unless the amount of Annual Special Taxes that may be levied on Taxable Property after such partial prepayment, net of Administrative Expenses, shall be at least 1.1 times the regularly scheduled annual interest and principal payments on all currently outstanding Bonds in each future Fiscal Year and such partial prepayment will not impair the security of all currently outstanding Bonds, as reasonably determined by the Board. Such determination shall include identifying all Assessor's Parcels that are expected to become Exempt Property.

Section I: Excess Assigned Annual Special Taxes

In any Fiscal Year which the Annual Special Taxes collected from Developed Property, pursuant to Step One of Section F, exceeds the Minimum Annual Special Tax requirement, the School District shall use such amount for acquisition, construction or financing of school facilities in accordance with the Act, CFD No. 7 proceedings and other applicable law as determined by the Board.



Section J: Termination of Special Tax


Annual Special Taxes shall be levied for a period of thirty-three (33) Fiscal Years after Bonds have been issued, provided that Annual Special Taxes shall not be levied after Fiscal Year 2047/2048.

Section K: Exemptions

The Board shall classify as Exempt Property (i) Assessor's Parcels owned by the State of California, Federal or other local governments, (ii) Assessor's Parcels which are used as places of worship and are exempt from ad valorem property taxes because they are owned by a religious organization, (iii) Assessor's Parcels used exclusively by a homeowners' association, (iv) Assessor's Parcels with public or utility easements making impractical their utilization for other than the purposes set forth in the easement, (v) Assessor's Parcels developed or expected to be developed exclusively for non-residential use, including any use directly servicing any nonresidential property, such as parking, as reasonably determined by the Board, (vi) Lot 86, and (vii) any other Assessor's Parcels at the reasonable discretion of the Board, provided that no such classification would reduce the Net Taxable Acreage to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage listed in Table 3 below.

Not withstanding the above, the Board shall not classify an Assessor's Parcel as Exempt Property if such classification would reduce the sum of all Taxable Property to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage. Assessor's Parcels which cannot be classified as Exempt Property because such classification would reduce the Acreage of all Taxable Property to less than the Minimum Taxable Acreage will continue to be classified as Developed Property or Undeveloped Property, as applicable, and will continue to be subject to Special Taxes accordingly.

Section L: Appeals

Any property owner claiming that the amount or application of the Special Tax is not correct may file a written notice of appeal with the Board not later than twelve months after having paid the first installment of the Special Tax that is disputed. In order to be considered sufficient, any claim of appeal must: (i) specifically identify the property by address and Assessor's Parcel Number; (ii) state the amount in dispute and whether it is the whole amount or any a portion of the Special Tax; (iii) state all grounds on which the property owner is disputing the amount or application of the Special Tax, including a reasonably detailed explanation as to why the amount or application of such Special Tax is incorrect; (iv) include all documentation, if any, in support of the claim; and (v) be verified under penalty of perjury by the person who paid the Special Tax or his or her guardian, executor or administrator. A representative(s) of CFD No. 7 ("Representative") shall promptly review the appeal, and if necessary, meet with the property owner, consider written and oral evidence regarding the amount of the Special Tax, and rule on the appeal. If the Representative's decision requires that the Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel be modified or changed in favor of the property owner, a cash refund shall not be made (except for the last year of levy), but an adjustment shall be made to the Annual Special Tax on that Assessor's Parcel in the subsequent Fiscal Year(s) as the representative's decisions shall indicate.

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Section M: Manner of Collection

The Annual Special Tax shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary ad valorem property taxes, provided, however, that CFD No. 7 may collect Annual Special Taxes at a different time or in a different manner if necessary to meet its financial obligations.

RESOLUTION NO. 2008/06

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE CONSOLIDATED SPECIAL ELECTIONS WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") adopted Resolution No. 2007/11 determining the necessity for Community Facilities District No. 7 of Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California (the "Community Facilities District"), to incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 within the Community Facilities District calling a special election on the proposition of incurring such a bonded indebtedness for July 2, 2007, and providing for the consolidation of that election with the election on the propositions with respect to the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay principal of and interest on such bonds, and the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District; and

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, the Board also adopted Resolution No. 2008/05 calling a special election for July 2, 2007, for submitting to the voters of the Community Facilities District the proposition with respect to the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds thereof, and the proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District, and providing for the consolidation of that election with the election on the proposition of the Community Facilities District incurring a bonded indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, the Board has received a statement from the Clerk of the Board of Education (the "Clerk"), who pursuant to Resolution No. 2008/05 was authorized to conduct the consolidated special elections and act as the election official therefor, with respect to the canvass of the ballots returned in and the results of the consolidated special elections, certifying that more than two-thirds of the votes cast upon the propositions submitted to the voters in the consolidated special elections were cast in favor of approving all such propositions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Findings. The Board finds that: (i) there were no persons registered to vote within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District at the time of the close of the protest hearing on July 2, 2007, and pursuant to Section 53326 of the California Government Code ("Section 53326") the vote in the consolidated special elections was, therefore, to be by the landowners owning land within the Community Facilities District, with each landowner having one vote for each acre or portion of an acre of land that he or she owned within the Community



Facilities District which would have been subject to the special tax if levied at the time of the consolidated special elections; (ii) pursuant to Section 53326 and Resolution No. 2008/05, the Clerk distributed the ballot for the consolidated special elections to the owner of all of the land included within the boundaries of the Community Facilities District (the "Property Owner") by overnight mail delivery with return postage prepaid; (iii) the Property Owner waived the time limits for holding the consolidated special elections and the election dates specified in Section 53326, and consented to the calling and holding of the consolidated special elections on July 2, 2007; (iv) the consolidated special elections have been properly conducted in accordance with all statutory requirements and the provisions of Resolution No. 2008/05; (v) pursuant to Section 53326, the sole Property Owner, which owned approximately 28.30 acres, was entitled to a total of 24 votes; (vi) the ballot was returned to the Clerk prior to the close of the public hearing on July 2, 2007 by the Property Owner; (vii) the ballot which was returned to the Clerk by the Property Owner voted all votes to which the Property Owner was entitled in favor of all propositions set forth therein; (viii) more than two-thirds of the votes cast in the consolidated special elections on each such proposition were cast in favor thereof, and pursuant to Sections 53328, 53329 and 53355 of the California Government Code, all such propositions carried; (ix) the Board, as the legislative body of the Community Facilities District, is therefore authorized to take the necessary action to have the Community Facilities District incur a bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 within the Community Facilities District, and to annually levy special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District in amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds of the Community Facilities District; and (x) an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District has been established in the amount of \$500,000.

Section 2. Declaration of Results. All votes voted in the consolidated special elections on the propositions with respect to the Community Facilities District incurring a total bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 within the annual levy of special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds thereof, and the establishment of an appropriations limit in the amount of \$500,000 for the Community Facilities District were voted in favor thereof, and all such propositions carried.

Section 3. Effect of Elections. The effect of the results of the consolidated special elections, as specified in Section 2 hereof, is that the Board, as the legislative body of the Community Facilities District, is authorized to have the Community Facilities District incur a total bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 within the Community Facilities District for the purposes set forth in Proposition A of the Official Ballot for the consolidated special elections, and, after the Community Facilities District has incurred a bonded indebtedness and issued bonds therefor, to annually levy special taxes on taxable property within the Community Facilities District in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds at the special taxe rates and pursuant to the methodology for determining and apportioning such special taxes which are set forth in Exhibit "A" to the Resolution of Formation adopted by the Board on July 2, 2007, and an appropriations limit has been established for the Community Facilities District in the amount of \$500,000.

ORDINANCE NO. 2008/01

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 7

WHEREAS, on July 2, 2007, the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "School District") adopted a resolution entitled "Resolution of Intention of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District with respect to the Establishment of Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California" (the "Resolution of Intention") stating its intention to establish Community Facilities District No. 7 (the "District") pursuant to Chapter 2.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5, commencing with Section 53311, of the California Government Code (the "Act"), to finance certain facilities (the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, notice was published as required by the Act relative to the intention of the Board of Education to form the District and to provide for the Facilities;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act relative to the determination to proceed with the formation of the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to finance a portion of the costs of the Facilities;

WHEREAS, at said hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District and the levy of said special taxes were heard, substantial evidence was presented and considered by the Board of Education and a full and fair hearing was held;

WHEREAS, subsequent to said hearing, the Board of Education adopted resolutions entitled "Resolution of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District Establishing Community Facilities District No. 7 of the Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California, and Establishing the Boundaries Thereof " (the "Resolution of Formation") and "Resolution of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District Calling a Special Election and Submitting to the Voters of Community Facilities District No. 7 a Proposition with Respect to the Annual Levy of Special Taxes Within the Community Facilities District to Pay Principal of and Interest on Bonds Thereof, and a Proposition with Respect to the Establishment of an Appropriations Limit for the Community Facilities District" which resolutions established the District, authorized the levy of a special tax with the District, and called an election within the District on the propositions of incurring indebtedness, levying a special tax, and establishing an appropriations limit within the District, respectively; and

WHEREAS, an election was held within the District in which eligible landowner electors approved said propositions by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act.



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit A to the Resolution of Formation (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2007-08 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of the School District issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs administering the District.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Superintendent of the School District is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 3. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of the School District in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary *ad valorem* taxes are collected. The School District's Superintendent, or designee thereof, is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Superintendent of the School District may collect one or more installments of the special taxes by means of direct billing by the School District of the property owners within the District, if, in the judgment of the Superintendent, such means of collection will reduce the administrative burden on the School District or is otherwise appropriate under the circumstances. In such event, the special taxes shall become delinquent if not paid when due as set forth in any such respective billing to the property owners.



The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

Section 6. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

Section 7. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its passage at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the School District's boundaries.

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Introduction

he Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) encompasses forty-four square miles of rural and semi-rural areas in western Riverside County and serves four unincorporated communities with a population of approximately 66,835 in the communities of Rubidoux, Glen Avon, Pedley, and Mira Loma. The 2000 census reported that the JUSD demographics include a total population of approximately 70,000 comprising 26.3% Hispanic, 63.7% White, 5.0% African American and 3.0% other groups. The district's school population mirrors the demographic breakdown found in the State of California which includes an approximate enrollment of 20,232 students with 73% Hispanic, 21% White, 4% African American and 2% designated as other groups. English Learners make up approximately 28% of the district student population and approximately 66% of the population qualifies for the Free/Reduced Price Meals for Children program. The current teacher to student ratio is 21:1 with JUSD employing 977 full time teachers.

Education Technology Vision

The JUSD Education Technology Planning Committee recognizes that many areas of the educational process are directly and

Plan Structure

he 2008-2011 Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD)
Technology Plan focused on supporting equitable access
to technology for all schools in the district. At the time
the district realized the importance for the development of a strong
district wide infrastructure that would support future technology
growth. With the growth of JUSD's infrastructure and technology
accessibility, the district was propelled forward; thus, the need to
revise the technology use plan to include a curriculum based
foundation became evident.

This Education Technology Plan is focused on the five components listed below and spans a three year period (July 1, 2008-June 30, 2011):

- 1. *Curriculum* defines how technology can be used to help JUSD's students meet the academic content standards.
- 2. *Professional Development* outlines JUSD's plan to provide teachers, library media personnel, administrators, and technical support staff with the necessary training to support improved student achievement in the plan's concentration areas.
- 3. *Infrastructure, Hardware, Technical Support, and Software* identifies the technology and physical plant

Background

he Education Technology Plan was completed with input from stakeholders as to the best possible ways to meet and serve the needs of Jurupa's students. The process was developed to maximize input from a conglomerate of constituents and district members in four sections:

- 1. Interviewing principals,
- 2. Interviewing and surveying/questionnaire staffs,
- 3. Reporting and feedback from student Board (high school) Members, and elected Board members, and
- 4. Presentation and feedback from community members.

The purpose of this exhaustive data collection effort was to clearly identify all options available to the district as it embarked on developing a comprehensive district wide plan for 24 schools to access and effectively use education technology. This process provided the impetus for a global perspective of gathering information pertaining to education technology from numerous broad-base resources.

The process begun as follows:

1. Interviewing principals. In January 2001 the Superintendents' Cabinet discussed developing an Education Technology Plan for the district. The design

representatives from each high school), in open session, information from the correspondence dated May 8, 2001, from Delaine Eastin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The report to the Board focused on the district's responsibility for "meeting the *Education Code* Section 51871.5(a) requirement that school districts have an education technology plan as a precondition of receiving any education technology funding after January 1, 2002." The Board was also provided with a summary of the contents found in the "Education Technology Planning Guide" developed by the Commission on Technology in Learning and approved by the State Board of Education to assist in focusing the power of technology on enhancing teaching and learning in California.

4. Presentation and feedback from community members.

The process the School Based/Schoolwide Coordinated Program, District Advisory Council, the Board members, superintendent, assistant superintendents, administrators/principals, teachers, staff, student representatives, parents, businesses, and community members was extremely valuable to the process. However, the strongest influence in developing this plan is embedded from the excellent leadership and guidance of the Jurupa Unified School District Information Technology Department and California Technology Assistant Project (CTAP) region 10.

The input, suggestions, and critique during the development of this plan were without a doubt the most valuable resource available; consequently, the integration of technology into the curriculum in order to improve the education of our children is closer to fruition. Parallel to the technology department and CTAP's contribution is the exceptional work of the committee members (see acknowledgments). These participants represented a broadspectrum of the Jurupa community, but more significantly their alacrity, talent, and expertise enabled Jurupa Unified School District to develop an exemplary Education Technology Plan.

Curriculum

ven though the majority of research has shown that technology does not directly impact student achievement, some research points to the positive effects that technology has when appropriately integrated into the curriculum. It is the belief of the committee members and many others throughout Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) that appropriate and considerate integration of technology enhances critical thinking skills and can have an impetus on student achievement, resulting in an increase in student test scores and JUSD's Academic Performance Index (API) and Academic Yearly Progress (AYP).

In the past eleven years (1997-2008), JUSD has concentrated efforts on increasing student achievement on the district Criterion Referenced Test (CRT) and the STAR. The STAR is administered once a year, in May, while the district CRTs are administered as benchmarks four times per year. Although the district's language arts, reading, and mathematics scores have increased, JUSD still falls below in national percentile ranking (NPR) when compared to Riverside County and the State of California.

The development of an information literacy driven library system has been the goal of the District. The district's 23 libraries share resources through the district wide library system. Administrators, teachers, parents, students, and staff are able to view their own school library, or any of the other twenty-one school's library holdings, through the use of a web browser. In addition, parents, staff, administrators, students, teachers, and the community can access the JUSD library resources 24/7. This open library system is focused on improving all JUSD students' information literacy skills. JUSD operates several after school programs that use technology and technology resources to enhance the curriculum and increase student achievement.

Hardware and Software to Support Teaching and Learning

From 1997-2008 JUSD developed a strong information technology network. With the implementation of the student information system (SIS), the accounting system, and the purchasing system, the district has been able to increase its efficiency in the area of information technology. In addition, JUSD has plans to incrementally improve the use of these systems in order to consolidate management and administrative tasks that are currently accomplished through the use of several additional software programs. Daily attendance taken with the SIS is just one example of how the district continues to look for methods of maximizing efficiency in information technology. The attendance system is one item in the multiple measures needed to assess student achievement. For in many ways, student achievement is not shared by education services, only. Every department contributes to students' success. Food services implemented a food management system to provide expedient service to students. In the same way,

Destination Math®, Ed Vision's Skills Connection®, and MS Office 2000 Professional®, many schools also purchased the Accelerated Reader® reading practice software and Inspiration® (a critical thinking software). Teachers and students are using these programs to: manage student assessment; provide students with opportunities to extend content learning through integrated project-based activities; create individual learning programs; and improve research, information literacy, and critical thinking skills.

Again, the elementary schools have the widest variety of software purchased. From game-based educational programs to productivity software, the elementary schools have programs such as, Math Blaster®, Math Companion®, Storybook Weaver®, Writer's Workshop®, Oregon Trail®, Where in the World is Carmen San Diego®, Accelerated Reader®, Accelerated Math®, Skills Connection®, Inspiration®, Kidspiration®, Windows on Science®, AppleWorks®, and Microsoft Office Suite®. Teachers and students are using these programs to improve mathematics, reading, information literacy, and critical thinking skills.

District software purchases have focused mainly on supporting the language arts and reading curriculum. Many of the purchases have been made and implemented through the JUSD library program, such as, EBSCO Publishing and Online Reader databases, and World Book Online Encyclopedia. The Follett Destiny Library Software was purchased in 2004. The Library application provides access to a myriad of resources including, the opportunity for resource alignment to California State standards and specific visual support for English language learners. From the classroom, home, or anywhere that there is an available Internet connection, teachers, librarians, parents, administrators, and students can use these

Program Survey (APS) and develop a plan that specifically identifies reading and language arts as academic areas that have the greatest need for improvement intervention, and mathematics as the next most significant area for intervention.

There is a realistic need to converge education technology efforts on the goals that have been put forth in every curriculum plan to increase student achievement in language arts, reading, and mathematics. In addition, each plan has developed a technology component to assist in meeting student outcome goals. Thus, JUSD has a responsibility to direct technology resources, support, and implementation actions toward: a) improving learning and teaching in reading, language arts, and mathematics; b) ensuring technology access for all students, teachers, and administrators; c) providing teachers and administrators with improved technological record keeping and assessment instruments; and d) promoting communication between school, home, parents, and the community.

The Future

The No Child Left Behind Act (2001) has presented school districts with a challenge to improve student achievement. On the other hand, the NCLB has provided schools the opportunity to explore a variety of ways to measure student achievement. To utilize the multiple measure strategies, the use of technology is no longer a "fad," but a viable tool and resource which can help aggregate and disaggregate data to report to federal and state entities. Above all, school officials are able to use data for informed, meaningful decisions regarding student learning.

Appropriate Access to All Students

JUSD has made significant progress and continues to make progress in the area of technology access for all students. Through the implementation of a district WAN, JUSD has provided many classroom teachers and students with direct access to district purchased and site purchased software programs and resources. Many of these resources are used to assist JUSD's English learners (EL).

For example, the library resource includes a visual OPAC (Online Patron Access Catalog) and Title Seek interface that provides EL, special education, and diverse learners students with visually enhanced searching capabilities. Another example of software to assist special needs students is EBSCO Publishing Online database, and World Book Encyclopedia. Using EBSCO Publishing Online database, World Book Encyclopedia, teachers, students, and parents can access magazine and journal articles in English and Spanish.

Several of JUSD's schools use technology to enhance their GATE programs. These programs provide students with extended computer activities using online resources and productivity software. Students learn to solve problems through investigative lessons that use technology to research, record, analyze, and present solutions and findings. In addition, JUSD schools also use technology programs such as NovaNet, Skills Connection, Boxer Math, Cornerstone Language Arts, TechWorks, and Riverdeep Destinations to meet intervention needs for those students who need individual concentrated instruction.

Communication between Home and School

JUSD not only serves its students, it also serves the surrounding community members. The CBET program provides technology-based workshops for parents and adult learners. In addition, the district has been proactive in implementing the Follett Destiny® Library software and communication programs that are available outside the district for parents, students, teachers, administrators, and the community.

A continuous goal for JUSD's Information Technology
Department is to use technology to keep parents in communication with their children's teachers and administrator. The first step in this never-ending process is the development of the JUSD's Web e-mail system, which came online in November 2001. The system provides every teacher and administrator in the district with an e-mail address that can be accessed within or outside the district. This enables administrators and teachers to stay in communication with parents, supervisors, and colleagues on a regular basis.

Teacher and administrator Web e-mail addresses can be posted on school web sites to elicit parent-teacher communication.

Several of JUSD's schools have developed a web site to communicate school events, achievements, and resources. Currently, the school's Technology Coordinator or another full-time teacher maintains its school's Web site. However, the Information Technology Department (ITD) realizes proper maintenance of web sites requires a great degree of human resources; therefore, the ITD, along with the District Data Committee (DDC), will consider and discuss options for developing and maintaining JUSD's schools' web sites, in order to

Professional Development

esearch on successful professional development programs reveal that all members of an institution must share a common understanding of the goals and a knowledge base before an institution will improve. As a result, this plan addresses the professional development needs not only of teachers and administrators, but also of all members of the Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) community. This includes teachers, administrators, curriculum staff, counselors, librarians, and other educational professionals.

Needs and Resource Assessment

Prior to the design of any professional development plan it is necessary to determine the current skill level and identify the needs of those who will be participating. JUSD has used several methods to identify the needs of teachers, administrators, librarians/library personnel, and other educational professionals.

Since 1997, the Information Technology Department (ITD) has surveyed teachers and administrators in regards to their technology facilitates the Follett Library system, the Technology Facilitator for Food Management Service System facilitates the Food Service User Group Meetings, and the Network Manager facilitates the Technology Coordinator User Group Meetings. The support groups facilitate the training of new personnel or new users to the systems and programs, in addition to providing existing users with opportunities to ask questions, develop additional skills with the software and hardware, and share resources with their peers.

The site based Technology Coordinator stipend position was added in the 1999-2000 school year. Technology Coordinators are the schools first line of support for instructional technology needs in the classroom. To support the Technology Coordinators efforts, in September 2001, the ITD implemented a professional development program directed toward teachers using technology for classroom management and to enhance and reinforce the curriculum.

Prior to implementing the program, the ITD identified teachers and administrators' proficiency levels, classroom/site needs, and preference for professional development opportunities through direct questionnaires, the Online Technology Survey, and the CTAP² survey. Over 60% of JUSD teachers and administrators completed the CTAP² survey in 2004. Results demonstrated that most JUSD teachers and administrators considered themselves introductory or intermediate level users in eight of the nine surveyed categories. Word processing was the only category where a majority of the teachers and administrators rated themselves as proficient. The least proficient areas were databases, spreadsheets, presentation software, and instructional technology. The survey also revealed that teachers, as well as administrators, preferred to

Infrastructure, Hardware, Technical Support, and Software Component

ince 1997 the district experienced a 20% annual growth in computers. There has been an increase from 1,032 computers to over 3,300 computers distributed among the 24 schools. In the same way, the student population has increased from approximately 16,000 to approximately 20,200 over the same time period.

By the end of 2010/2011 school year, a projected 4,500 computers will be deployed throughout the district. This influx of hardware into the district was made possible by Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) formula and competitive grants and Title I funding.

Technology Hardware

Of the over 3,300 computers mentioned above, approximately 65% are more than 4 years old and 23% are between 1-4 years in age.

Only 12% of Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) computers fall

A data warehousing system is the short term goal of the district. The data warehousing system will provide each school and central office personnel with the ability to access a wide range of data its students. The system will provide schools with updated data querying of student information for decision making and support the district's curriculum goals.

Software

Of the 3,300 JUSD computers, over 98% use Microsoft Windows Operating Systems (OS), (98, 2000/3, or XP), and 2% use the Macintosh operating systems. In support of these computers, the district has 49 Microsoft Windows 2000/3 file servers; for example, an Internet server, Web filtering, email, Library, SQL database, DNS, and a Student Information System server. The goal is to upgrade these systems to meet the growth of the district and technological advancements.

The district also maintains an Intranet to support file sharing and other data warehousing for data driven decision-making. A Relational Database Management System (RDMS) is used to disaggregate test scores; plus, other multiple measure elements such as teacher quizzes and tests, and student attendance that are essential in measuring students' achievement are housed in the RDMS. On the other hand, most school sites maintain their discipline records and other site-specific data in File Maker Pro® or Microsoft Excel®. The goal is to purchase viable systems that can provide effective services to meet the district needs.

providing hands-on training for every "new" hardware and software purchased or introduced into the district.

The structure of any enterprise system requires that the technical network tools be properly in place and running efficiently. As the network expands, it is imperative for the district to set in process mechanisms to ensure that the technology staff will be able to use network management tools, out sourcing, and other technology innovation to lower the cost of network support and more importantly, the cost of ownership. Subsequently, the district's investment in talented personnel to maintain the infrastructure has been exceptional. The Director of Information Technology supervises eleven employees and has primary responsibility for maintaining the JUSD Student Information System (SIS), which includes the Wide Area Network (WAN), Local Area Network (LAN), administrative office computers, education technology (certificated) staff development, classified employees staff development, Follett Destiny Library Software system, EETT, E-Rate, and food services technology support systems.

Network Manager

The Network Manager monitors the integrity of the WAN, the reliability of the T1 lines, the 24 routers and core switches at all sites and installs and maintains the server farm, monitor and maintain back up server, internet filter, core switches, and the district's DS3 line. Besides supervising the above areas and being responsible for designing and modifying the network system, the Network Manager provides LAN assistance to school sites, approves technology purchases, monitors the network system to support other departments' services; e.g. accounting system, and

and supporting classroom teachers with education technology planning. In addition, the CET oversees EETT grants, serves as district technology leader representative at CTAP, acts as co-chair at technology coordinator meetings, and develops certificated and classified course catalogs.

Technology Facilitators, Student Information Services

The Technology Facilitators provide support for the district's SIS and other software programs. The Technology Facilitator's responsibilities include: implementing changes to software set-up; adding and modifying SIS personnel records, and permissions, assisting users with extracting data for various reports; coordinating, with the database administrator, a variety of strategies for implementing changes and troubleshooting software errors; identifying and correcting user data errors in regards to attendance reconciliation with Business Services; extracting data to prepare complex custom reports for administrators; teaching various levels of SIS training classes; facilitating monthly SIS Users' Group meetings; representing JUSD at monthly RCOE Student Information System Users' Group meetings, and providing extensive support for the secondary schools development of Master Schedules.

Other responsibilities include: fielding technology HelpDesk calls; logging and supporting all calls to the "OneOrZero HelpDesk" database system; assigning and completing trouble tickets to technicians; setting up and maintaining new users' accounts; maintaining software license, IP addresses, and computer serial numbers into database; providing support for school sites, food service, library, and EETT classrooms; data entry and maintaining

coordinate with food service supervisors and managers to implement, train, and communicate software procedures necessary for food service data integrity; organize and execute food service year end data rollover process; facilitate food service user group meetings; design and maintenance of the food service department's Website.

Administrative Secretary

The Administrative Secretary is responsible for maintaining scheduling of professional development classes. The secretary serves as the single-point-of-contact for calendaring and confirming staff attendance. In addition, the secretary provides the sign-in sheets, evaluation forms, and course materials.

Secretary/Account Clerk

The Secretary/Account Clerk is responsible for maintaining the district's school accountability report cards (SARCs) as well as the Spring and Fall Submissions to the California Student Information System (CSIS).

Infrastructure

The number of support personnel has expanded gradually in relation to the growth of the network, computers, and services. Presently, the business services department oversees fiber optics installation and maintenance including telecommunications and data wiring. This relationship with business services is beneficial for the sustainability of the district's infrastructure.

privilege in place at school sites and the education center; only people who are privy to specific information are granted access.

The other method employed is special configuration of routers, switches, and the Cisco PIX to create a "firewall". The Lightspeed software filters provide features beyond URL filtering that aid in protecting the networks.

Another way the network is protected is through the use of Computer Associates e-Trust Anti-virus software deployed throughout the district. Every computer approved by the technology department that is connected to the networks **must** have the anti-virus software installed.

Maintenance Plan

The JUSD Computer Maintenance Program is intended for the coordination of repairs for computers and printers, which are no longer under warranty from the manufacturer. This plan would enable the technology department to manage the necessary repairs to ensure that the equipment is functional for continuous office production and classroom instruction.

School sites are placed in team/groups. An annual fee is assessed from each school. The funds are held in escrow and used at the discretion of the technology department to support and maintain computer system. At the end of the school year, each team's Total Cost of Operation (TCO) will be calculated, and the technology department will use the balance in the team account to purchase new or upgrade equipment based on a rotating schedule.

School sites will enter into an agreement with the technology department every school year for on-site diagnosis and repair of district own computers. The technology department will repair the problem or supply an equivalent loaner within eight hours, or sooner after a technician has made a diagnosis. If the problem cannot be fixed, the site will receive computer hardware of equal or greater value.

Policy for Obsolete Equipment

The Jurupa Unified School District acquires technology either through new purchases and/or through donations. Buying new equipment to increase computer inventory at school sites are funded by district, grants, or categorical monies. Donated equipment on the other hand is guided by district policy 6204. The policy defines the protocol for donated computers/equipment, which includes hardware, software, training, maintenance, networking, electrical, transportation, storage, eligible specification, and environmental considerations (Guidelines for accepting donations or gifts for school organization, JUSD Business Handbook, § D6).

The average use of a computer in a classroom is three years. The goal in Jurupa Unified School District is to establish a replacement policy and move towards a four-year replacement policy. The Information Technology Department continues to work with the District Data Committee to develop viable policies and strategies that address Total Cost of Ownership and provide for sustainable replacement policy.

Network

The infrastructure is strong. From a support perspective, the network's complexity is determined by the number of different pieces of equipment on the network and the make up of the network. The network comprises a Cisco 7206 VXR as the main core router; a Cisco 520 PIX provides the Network Address Translation (NAT).

JUSD operates an Enterprise Network System. The WAN consists of the 24 sites for service to over 20,000 students. The system operates with fictitious Internet Protocol (IP) addresses. The NAT serves as the intermediary, which translates the fictitious IP(s) to "Class C's" to be able to communicate with the World.

The Cisco Catalyst 6006 switch serves as the distribution point or central post office for the network system; the external router, Cisco 2621, is used to communicate with RCOE for the multiple services they provide, excluding telecommunication, which the district maintains. SBC telecommunications serves as JUSD's Internet Service Provider. To meet the requirement of the Children Internet Protection Act 2000 (CIPA), the district uses Lightspeed software to comply with the law. Microsoft 2000/3 operating system provides the backbone for the network. Microsoft Exchange 2003 is used for email and IIS6 for Web services.

Network Access Security

The protection of the data that transverse over the network is very important. The network configuration and encryption products deployed aid in this process. There is a hierarchical user access

database for "OneOrZero HelpDesk" library of technology documentation, software, and hardware available for checkout or loan; and assisting users with file conversion, using peripherals, and support for special projects.

Technicians

The district employs six technicians. Areas of responsibility include: installing and maintaining over 3,300 computers, Cisco routers, Cisco switches, and numerous Intermediate Distribution Frames (IDF) throughout the district. These technicians monitor the functionality of the LAN, maintain multiple labs, attend technology coordinators' meetings, implement the JUSD IP and naming scheme, and test and implement various software and hardware upgrades for network deployment. One of the district's six technicians is entrusted with special responsibilities such as the installation and maintenance of the Education Center computers, food service, and library computers.

Technology Facilitator, Food Services

The Food Service Technology Facilitator (FSTF) provides all aspects of support of the districts Food Service Department's hardware and software related services. The FSTF responsibilities include: Initial point of contact for all food service software and hardware problems. Implementation, training and support of the food service student eligibility and point-of-sale applications and school site food service hardware; coordinate with database administrator and the Coordinator of Educational Technology to maintain student information data consistency and communications between student information system and food service applications;

acts as a single point-of-contact for technology vendors, independent contractors, and Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE) Information Technology Department.

Database Administrator

The Director of Database Administration (DBA) provides technical expertise in the design, implementation, and maintenance of all relational database management systems (RDBMSs) used in the district. The DBA ensures that the applications that use these databases(s) are accurate and available for all users, at all times. In addition the DBA maintains and troubleshoots connectivity problems, assist with networking and computer issues, develop customized reports, web-based applications/forms, and provide services on projects for business services, administrative services, and education services.

Coordinator, Educational Technology

Coordinator, Educational Technology (CET) is responsible for the district's 24-library sites and the management of instructional materials inventory. At two sessions per month, the CET facilitates meetings for library personnel and provides training on the automated system, centralized library cataloging, library management and textbook management. The CET provides workshops for certificated and classified staff in software applications and special workshops for integrating technology into the curriculum. Other areas of responsibility include: the development of materials/resources for education technology staff development, conducting education technology planning meetings,

Electronic Learning Resources

Each school maintains a variety of educational software; however, every classroom computer is equipped with the MS Office Suite productivity software programs. In addition, the district maintains over 600 licenses for the graphic organization program, Inspiration and approximately 50 Kidspiration licenses. Other online electronic resources, such as, EBSCO Publishing, World Book Online Encyclopedia, and Destiny OPAC are available for every JUSD teacher and student via an Internet browser. On demand video streaming (Discovery Digital Curriculum) and EBSCO Online Reader is also available for students and teachers at JUSD's three middle schools.

Fifteen JUSD schools have purchased the Accelerated Reader program and 6 have purchased the Accelerated Math. Each Accelerated Reader program is housed on a school site server for shared access throughout the campus, whereas, Accelerated Math is installed within designated classrooms. Additionally, two secondary schools have purchased Boxer Math and another three have purchased Riverdeep's Destination Math. Each of these schools houses the math programs on school site servers.

Technical Support for Curriculum and Professional Development

Technology staff development and training has been made available to teachers, administrators, and staff. Since 1998, the Information Technology department has offered hands-on-training, for certificated, classified, and management personnel. The Information Technology department has been consistent in

into the 1 year old or less category. The majority of these newer computers were acquired through AB2882 funding, SRTG, EETT formula, and competitive grants, and other school sites' funds. See **Table 6A** for the 2006 California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS) report, which gives a breakdown of number of computers by school.

Access to electronic presentation tools, scanners, and digital devices are integral to reaching JUSD's curriculum and professional development. While several upper elementary and secondary JUSD classrooms are currently equipped with presentation tools (LCD projectors, TV displays, and/or VHS) and various computer peripherals (scanners, digital cameras, and/or digital camcorders), which are used to support teaching and learning and professional development, JUSD continues to work with schools, using site and grant funding, to increase access to these electronic learning tools.

All schools in the district have a data network connectivity service using Ethernet 10/100 Base-T topology. Every school's office and classrooms are (100%) wired. Each of these schools has a minimum of 2 data drops per classroom, with additional drops located in the libraries and computer labs.

Data and Telecommunication

Telecommunication upgrades and telephone accesses in the classroom are ongoing projects in the district. Every school is targeted for adequate telecommunication, networking, and electrical capability to sustain growth for the next five years.

goals; how they use technology to improve teaching and learning; level of technology proficiency; degree of technology integration; hardware, software, and technical support needs; and how they monitor and evaluate technology's impact on student achievement. Additionally, surveys have included questions related directly to support personnel and their technology use, needs, and experience. From the survey results, JUSD was able to design and implement an annual professional development program that encourages the growth of technology skills among district support personnel and teaching staff.

Professional Development Opportunities

JUSD's professional development for classified support personnel begun in 1998 and has remained an integral part of a successful professional development program. The training classes were, and continue to be designed, to facilitate the development of technology skills for the many support personnel who work in the school offices, Education Center, Maintenance, Operation and Transportation Office, administration, and teachers that use a particular software or hardware application in their daily work. Members of the Information Technology Department teach these classes on a volunteer basis.

In 1999, ITD added four monthly user support groups to its repertoire of training courses: Student Information System (SIS), Follett Library Automation System, the Food Management Services System, and the site based Technology Coordinators.

promote positive and timely communication between all schools, parents, and the community.

Given the speed in which technology develops, the availability and accessibility of remote resources grows exponentially each day. As the district expands its infrastructure capabilities it will search for additional methods of reaching out to parents and the surrounding communities. **Table 3G, Curriculum,** lists several activities to initiate this remote interaction between home, school, and the community. The table includes who will be responsible for the implementation and how the progress will be monitored and evaluated.

Student Record Keeping and Assessment

Technology is used to assist in making the administration and management of the schools more efficient: JUSD's Information Technology Department has made great strides in the implementation of enhanced student information system (SIS), for record keeping of student information. Teachers take attendance from their classroom desktop computer. This enables the attendance to be directly and immediately recorded into SIS.

This process provides a reliable, accurate, and accessible means to enable administrators and teachers to access student records. **Table 3F, Curriculum,** outlines the role of technology in student record keeping and assessment, the monitoring and evaluation method, and those responsible for each implementation activity.

Recommendations for assistive technologies for students with special needs are handled through Individual Education Plan (IEP) teams. The IEP teams recommend special devices such as, computers, keyboards, special software (voice activated), hearing devices, and sound systems. Riverside County Office of Education purchases the assistive devices using district appropriated low incidence funds. The devices stay with the individual student for as long as they are enrolled in a California school.

Table 3E, Curriculum, describes the technology access goals, objectives, and implementation activities. Also outlined is how the activities will be monitored and evaluated and who is responsible for implementing each planned activity.

Curriculum Goals and Academic Content Standards

JUSD is dedicated to helping all students experience measurable success in all programs. Technology is viewed as an instrument that can assist: a) students in learning and synthesizing academic content; b) teachers in enhancing classroom instruction and management; and c) administrators in managing and making informed decisions. As such, instructional technology in the JUSD has a two-fold purpose: first, technology is used to enhance and expand the teaching and learning process; and second, technology is used to assist in making the administration and management of the schools more efficient.

Technology is used to enhance and expand the teaching and

learning process: Reading, language arts, and mathematics are the academic focus areas for JUSD's curriculum goals and programs. The JUSD Improvement Plan which is a compilation of the following plans: Individual School Improvement, Title I, Title II, Title IV, Title VI, State Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Economic Impact Aid, State Program for English Learners (EIA-EL), EETT Power InLit, Tobacco Use Prevention Education, and School-Based Coordination Programs, expressly address the need for an increased use of technology for research, report writing, and development of language and mathematics skills.

The district was identified as a Program Improvement (PI) District in March 2005. Each school is required to adopt the Academic

future plans to implement a transportation course-plotting system and wireless PDA's for maintenance personnel to process work orders to support the school environment are in process.

Prior to implementing the above systems, the district realized the need to establish a solid infrastructure and hardware base. The building of a district wide area network (WAN) was one of the first projects to be undertaken and completed. Although the district continues to maintain and upgrade the WAN through the addition of more robust hardware and software, for the most part the backbone of WAN is complete and is able to support the school sites' hardware and software needs for administration and teaching and learning. In conjunction with the establishment of the WAN, new hardware and software were installed at each of the school offices and for all district personnel.

Mathematics, reading, and language arts have been and continue to be the fundamental concentration for our district. Thus, it is not surprising that those schools and teachers, who use the available technology, do so in the subject areas of language arts and mathematics. Seventy-five percent of teachers identified word processing as the most used application, while less than 25% stated students use technology for student demonstrations and problem solving.

Software purchases at the school sites and the district office have been made to complement and enhance the district curriculum goals. Purchases at the high school level include: Boxer Math, Riverdeep's Destination Math®, Ed Vision's Skills Connection®, Nova Net, Microsoft Office 2000 Professional®, and Career Exploration and Planning Software. In addition to the Riverdeep's

Teacher and Student Access to Technology

Based on the data from the school's California's School Technology Survey conducted by California Department of Education (CDE), there is a wide variation in the degree of technology access within JUSD. While some schools have technology in every classroom, other schools rely on a computer lab for access to technology. In general, the high schools have the most access; the District's six high schools (3 comprehensive, 2 continuation, and 1 community day school) have received numerous grants to purchase advance computer systems. In addition, these schools have provided for computer lab settings in addition to classroom technology options. In each of the middle schools, students and teachers have access to at least one computer lab and anywhere from one to eight computers in each classroom. Elementary schools have the widest variance in accessibility. While each elementary school has at least one computer in each classroom, the majority of elementary schools have less then three computers per classroom.

The use of computer labs varies from site to site. However, in the majority of cases the elementary schools use a pre-determined lab schedule that rotates students into the lab for 30-45 minutes every week or every other week. Whereas, the high schools primarily schedule their open computer labs on an as needed basis. The middle schools do not have labs that can be scheduled. The computer labs at these sites are dedicated to teaching technology as an elective course.

targeted representatives that spanned all grade levels, and who were interested in curriculum and/or technology integration into teaching a learning, which aligns with standards. Before the team was organized, information and concerns of principals' needs were collected and analyzed. The data gathered were the vehicle to move the district into implementing technology as an assistive component of the education process.

The answers provided by the principals were valuable in developing this plan. The principals' input, especially in the area of curriculum, was consistent with wanting to improve student performance on the STAR and augment the teaching of computer applications to the staff.

2. Interviewing and surveying/questionnaire staffs. In gathering information from staff, the questionnaire extracted a variation of data. First, the survey addressed administrators' perception of faculty and staffs' level of experience with technology namely: apprentice (novice), emerging (intermediate), and expert (advanced). Secondly, the survey examined administrators' proficiencies. The administrators were asked to respond "Yes" or "No" to a number of questions.

Again, the information received from the administrators was crucial to the design of this plan. The instructional leader is not a coveted title given to administrators; the ability to model the use of technology at the school site demonstrates a commitment to integrating technology into the curriculum. When administrators model the effective use of technology they set a standard for using technology in teaching and learning and encourage a culture of technology appreciation and value.

3. Reporting and feedback from student Board (high school) members, and elected Board members. In the July 2001 technology department annual report, the Administrator of Education Technology shared with the Jurupa Unified School District Governing Board (consisting of 5 elected members and 3 student

modifications that are needed to accomplish JUSD's Curriculum and Professional Development goals.

- 4. *Funding and Budget* identifies the funding sources that will be used to meet the curriculum, professional development, infrastructure, hardware, technical support, and software goals.
- 5. Monitoring and Evaluation each of the above areas contains a built-in monitoring and evaluation process to help assist the district in determining whether technology had a positive impact on student achievement.

The five components were developed through a collaborative process among teachers, administrators, parents, businesses, local organizations, and community members. The curriculum component was the driving force behind the design of the professional development; infrastructure, hardware, technical support, and software; funding and budget; and the monitoring and evaluation components. By design, the plan creates interdependence among each component, resulting in the development of a comprehensive and curriculum-centered document.

indirectly affected by technology. Technology is used in all aspects of JUSD's daily activities from classroom teachers using technology to enhance student learning to administrations use of technology to assist in the data-driven decision making. As technological capabilities move forward, so will many of the goals and objectives of the JUSD Education Technology Plan. Thus, JUSD has established the Superintendent's District Technology Data Committee (DTDC), made up of district administrators, principals, teachers, and education technology leaders, to provide additional input and review on issues pertaining to Education Technology. This is a decision making body that guides technology use in the district (e.g. the integration of technology in teaching and learning; monitoring the district's Education Technology Plan, Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) grants, and other technology related programs, projects, and grants). Subsequently, the focus of this plan, the DTDC, as well as the focus of the Education/Information & Assessment Technology Department, continues to be on using technology to enhance students' learning experiences, fostering the communication between home, school, and the community, and providing instructional and managerial resources to assist teachers and administrators in daily activities. JUSD is committed to the vision of Jurupa as a Community of Learners.

This JUSD vision can become a reality when stakeholders work collaboratively during the next 3 years to make the necessary improvements in the integration of technology into the core curriculum. This includes the development of curriculum and technology standards and benchmarks, instructional strategies, assessment, and opportunities for every student and teacher to use technology in the learning process.

- Expand the use of technology in the core curriculum;
- Provide opportunities for administrative use of technology;
- Enhance school-to-community communications and access to resources;
- Adopt Technology Standards for School Administrators (TSSA);
- Adopt International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) National Education Technology Standards (NETS) for teachers;
- Use NETS for students to develop district technology standards.

Data and Telecommunication

Telecommunication upgrades and telephone accesses in the classroom are ongoing projects in the district. Every school is targeted for adequate telecommunication, networking, and electrical capability to sustain growth for the next five years.

A data warehousing system is the short term goal of the district. The data warehousing system will provide each school and central office personnel with the ability to access a wide range of data its students. The system will provide schools with updated data querying of student information for decision making and support the district's curriculum goals.

Service

The technician responsible for specific school sites sets up a maintenance schedule to inspect, clean, and service the internal components of the computers at that site. For example, the process may include: (1) Clean internal components, mouse and keyboard part, (2) Check peripherals e.g. printer, scanner, zip, etc., (3) Run diagnostic utilities and defrag hard drive when necessary.

School Sites Technology Coordinator

An important consideration when determining the nature of the infrastructure in a school environment is how fast problems should be resolved in order to maintain efficient operations within the organization. For instance, problems may be most quickly addressed if support staff is located at each site. Each school has a stipend technology coordinator. The coordinator serves a dual role as the Information Technology (IT) and Education Technology

(ET) contact. The district provides user group workshops for these coordinators to augment their skills and knowledge in technical as well as technology curriculum development. These coordinators provide an important role as the first point of contact at the school site to resolve simple problems, quickly. The coordinators can handle problems such as a loose printer connection, bad memory chip, or defective components. When they are unable to resolve the problem at hand, the district's HelpDesk/Support Desk is contacted via phone or by using a Web-based trouble report to request the help of a technician or an expert in the area identified.

Help Desk

"OneOrZero HelpDesk" is the work order tracking system the ITD uses to provide support to district and school site microcomputer users. The tracking system maintains a database of support issues that the Helpdesk is unable to resolve by phone. "OneOrZero HelpDesk" enables the ITD to organize the workflow of the district support technicians and district staffs to enter work orders. The "OneOrZero HelpDesk" also serves as a knowledge base. The JUSD support desk has broad responsibilities in serving the needs of its staff. Customer Relationship Management (CRM) strategies are employed in the process.

Data and Equipment Security

All networks are insecure. The challenge to protect the integrity of the network, its applications, and the data that they contain is a daunting responsibility for all school districts. However, protecting the network resources of the Jurupa Unified School District involve preventing unauthorized access to the networked systems

and resources whether or not the threat comes from the inside or outside.

It becomes overwhelming when various subsystems within the system determine the importance of the network. Thus, the district has a two-way (network) highway system. One lane is primarily designed to secure the networks that manage school and student records, financial, business, and personnel data. The other lane is "open" to the teaching and learning environment. Regardless of the path taken on the network system, the first step is to prevent unauthorized access to the system; this is accomplished through user education and effective use of passwords.

The technology department entertains discussions regarding the interdependence of all users on the system and the ethical obligation each user has to protect the system; explaining the differences between those sources that are publicly available and those that are proprietary; and emphasizing the legal aspect of security.

The Director of Information Technology provides this information at Principals' Meeting twice annually. The network manager, the coordinator of education technology and the technology facilitators provide district employees at their users groups' meetings that are held monthly, continuous training and updates on administrative issues in school technology and legal considerations in regulating employee use of school technology. Furthermore, every employee of the district signs the Acceptable Use Policy document annually, as per Board Policy. Other Board Policies and Procedures cover copyrighting, confidentiality of information, and use of district resources.

Password

Another aspect of security education is explaining to users the importance of passwords. A variety of network or system breaches is the result of poor password selection and control. The district has implemented a six characters (combination of alpha and numeric) minimum password. Employees are instructed not to give their passwords to others or have it written down and available in common accessible areas. Users are also encouraged to select passwords with random characters and change their passwords as often as possible.

Looking Into the Future

The district will explore the expansion of existing and/or the addition of new online electronic resources, classroom peripherals, and standards based software programs that directly support the curriculum. While the district has made a significant impact in providing productivity software at all grade levels, there is a need to provide standards based instructional software on a district-wide scale. Specifically, the district will identify grade appropriate software and/or Individual Learning System for language arts and mathematics, accessible through a web browser, to support the reading, writing, and mathematics standards and curriculum. As well, continuation and expansion of learning programs and resources such as Accelerated Reader, Accelerated Math, Inspiration and Kidspiration, Discover Digital Curriculum, EBSCO Publishing, EBSCO Online Reader, World Book Online, and Follett Destiny will be a focus of district funding.

As identified earlier, the use of electronic presentation devices in JUSD classrooms has increased in recent years. The district will continue to focus on providing access to electronic presentation tools, such as, LCD projectors and TV displays that support both the curriculum and professional development needs.

With the growing number of computers in the district, the Microsoft Remote Assistance (MRA) for desktop PCs provides the opportunity for the technology department to enhance its services to PC users. The MRA will allow PC users to provide technicians remote access to their computers to assist in troubleshooting and solve technical issues.

The district is also exploring the use of Motorola Canopy Point-to-Multipoint Wireless Systems. This service would limit the use of T-1 lines throughout the district. Multiple service points can be setup for voice and data transmission within the confines of the district boundaries.

The continual upgrade of Microsoft Exchange will be ongoing to meet the needs of the growing e-mail demands on the system.

The California Student Information System (CSIS) was implemented in September 2005. This system requires constant monitoring of the integrity of district data that are reported to state agencies.

Various methods of security are likely in the future; the size of the network has a direct relationship to people's tasks. Thus, assigning domain name addresses to each system that is deployed in the district minimizes the critical administration function that can be well supported through the use of network management software.

Microsoft Remote Installation Services (RIS) can aid the service demands. The RIS would provide technicians with the ability to control and upgrade new computers attached to the network.

The technology department is exploring Voice-over-IP (VOIP) technology to streamline the communication variance that presently exists. VOIP reduces landline costs by allowing large districts to use its extensive data network for voice communication.

Over the past two to three years, increasing use has been made of wireless networks, both as a medium for connecting Web-enabled cellular phones and PDAs to the Internet access points, and as a means to enable users of portable computers to "roam" within the office served by Ethernet-compliant wireless access points. Wireless technology is a viable alternative to costly wiring and sophisticated equipment needed to maintain internal communication; therefore, more classrooms and libraries will find it useful to roam mobile/wireless laptops from classroom-to-classroom and library-to-library.

Another future investigation is Virtual Private Network (VPN), which is a feasible solution for the short-term; given that providing access control, authentication, and administration are becoming more complex as access to data and applications are being enabled over public networks and the Internet. One strategy that is increasingly used to provide security in a distributed application access model is the VPN. One common implementation of a VPN is in telecommuting, a strategy that enables employees/students to work from a home-based PC while accessing applications located at the site or district office.

Table 5, Infrastructure, outlines suggested purchases and expenditures that are required, in order to meet the activities that have been described in the professional development and curriculum components of this plan. Funding and Budget

strong educational technology program requires a commitment to support the plan and implementation process through both human and financial sources.

JUSD is committed to providing a long-term financial plan that provides students, teachers, staff, and administrators with appropriate technology to support their needs, and at the same time, considers the community's investment. Responding to the financial challenges includes deliberation of: the initial purchase of equipment and software, additional infrastructure to support the equipment, and the professional development for the purchase and instructional strategies for the integration of the technology. In addition, the district has a plan in place for meeting the challenges of software and hardware obsolescence, upgrades, and growth.

The Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) formula and competitive grants have provided needed financial support to the district. Similarly, the E-Rate funding has provided the district with an opportunity to increase and improve the 23 school's infrastructure. The local bond, Measure C, passed in the fall of 2001, provided funding for additional schools' network and telephone communications.

Other funding sources that are site-based and have been used for some technology purchases in the past include: school improvement funds, Title I (several schools), EIA-Bilingual (for use with bilingual students only), GATE (for use with GATE students only), and II/USP schools. In order to use these funds they must be approved through the site's School Site Council and be in their site and II/USP plans prior to purchasing.

In order to implement the curriculum and staff development components of the plan, district student-to-computer ratios must be met. Fortunately, the district has achieved a 4.75:1 or better student-to-computer ratio in grades 9 through 12. This ratio provides adequate hardware and software to meet the components of the plan.

The **Table 6A**, **Number of Computers**, shows the student-to-computer ratios describe the student-to-computer ratio in grades K-12.

Monitor Progress and Update Funding and Budget Decisions

The Information Technology Department and the Superintendent's District Data Committee will be responsible for monitoring each year's funding resources. Special attention will be given to those schools that are not recipients of E-Rate or grant funding. The Information Technology department will continue to seek funding through federal, state, and local grant opportunities.

Monitoring and Evaluation

ne element of the Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) Education Technology Plan is to provide opportunities for administrators, teachers, students, and the community to benefit from the many technological resources that are available throughout the district. In order to determine whether JUSD is meeting the needs of its constituents, the Information Technology Department (ITD) and District Data Committee (DDC) will regularly review the plan's goals and objectives.

Both informal and formal assessment measures will be used to determine the degree to which each member of the JUSD community is benefiting from current and future technology-based endeavors. Each component of the plan contains a comprehensive list of activities that will be implemented to enable JUSD to meet the defined goals and objectives, including the year they would be accomplished, those responsible for the activity, and those who would evaluate and monitor the process.

While monitoring and evaluation are included under each of the components of the plan, a summary of the methods to be used will be described in this section. The curriculum component of the plan uses multiple methods of data gathering and assessment such as: electronic student portfolios; observations; rubrics for electronic presentations, spreadsheets, and writing samples; surveys; direct interviews; electronic activity and lesson logs; and direct feedback. Teacher observations will occur on a daily to weekly basis and will be reflected on progress reports and report cards. Students' work/electronic portfolios will be collected and recorded at the end of each grading period. The portfolios will include student generated writing samples, electronic presentations, and spreadsheets. Additionally, close attention will be paid to JUSD's quarterly CRTs and the STAR to monitor student performance.

A substantial and consistent professional development program is integral to the success of the curriculum plan; thereby, the JUSD Education Technology Plan recognizes the importance of providing for methods of assessing the "needs and wants" of the people who are working daily to carryout JUSD's goals and objectives.

The professional development component of the plan will use online surveys (CTAP²), participant evaluations, and needs surveys to revise existing professional development opportunities and plan for future JUSD offerings. Evaluation forms will be completed at the end of each professional development activity. Evaluations will be analyzed, by the ITD, quarterly to determine if program adjustments are needed to meet the needs of the participants.

In addition, the online enrollment program will enable participants to view his or her individual history of completed courses via the JUSD Intranet. The ITD can generate reports on an as needed basis to ensure the professional development goals are being met.

Infrastructure, hardware, technical support, and software should be purchased with the end in mind. It is the responsibility of the ITD and the DDC to establish guidelines that direct current and future human and monetary resources toward the most efficient and effective method of reaching the planned goals and objectives. The ITD will monitor hardware acquisition and installation on a daily basis.

The ITD will use its Education Technology Contingency Plan to address operational, security, and emergency procedures, for managing and sustaining technology resources. OneOrZero HelpDesk, system will be used to record model, serial, district identification, and classroom numbers for tracking specific hardware components. The installation process will be planned and conducted by technical support personnel within the ITD. Installations will be documented through the OneOrZero HelpDesk system.

Regularly scheduled meetings of the DDC, Principals' Meetings, and Superintendent's Advisory Council will act as the progress check toward goals, objectives, and benchmarks. Also, the ITD will report annually the progress of the Education Technology Plan to the Board of Education in June of each year. The DDC meets four times per year, from September through June, to discuss

issues relating to education and information technology. The ITD will use the Principals' meetings, held once a month, 10 months out of each year, as a forum for introducing new hardware and software purchases, professional development opportunities, and infrastructure plans.

JUSD will continue to make every effort to involve community stakeholders, as well as district officials, in the monitoring and evaluating process of the plan through School Site Council meetings, District Advisory Council meetings, and School Based/Schoolwide Coordinated Program meetings. There will continue to be a consorted effort made by the ITD to provide opportunities for stakeholders, and student representatives to share in the decision making process. This collaboration is crucial to achieving the necessary stakeholder commitment toward the plans goals.

Thus, the goal for the education technology planning process is to develop a living document that focuses on curriculum-based goals while addressing the changing needs of the district and students. Consequently, the Education Technology Plan is comprehensive and includes consideration for the long-term implications of the choices made. The development of clear goals and specific actions will enable the district to effectively use technology to help improve students' performance.

Collaboration with Adult Literacy

he Jurupa District community is rural and diverse. With over 20,000 students, 73% are Hispanic, 21% White, 4% African American and 2% designated as other groups. The English Learners are approximately 28% of the student body. Similarly, 31.7% of the parents have no more than a high school education, 38.0% have some post-secondary education, and 30.5% have not completed high school. The Jurupa Unified School District and The Rubidoux Library have formed the Jurupa Family Literacy Program to address the over growing numbers of non-reading adults in the program.

Collaboration with Adult Literacy Providers:

The District's Adult Education program works with other organizations to promote adult literacy through technology use.

The South San Francisco Adult Education ESL computer lab

closely coordinates lab and classroom instruction for day and evening ESL classes. Specific activities are designed that support the lessons taught in the regular classroom. The ESL teachers also create computer activities or locate new materials on the Internet. In addition to improving their English literacy skills, students also learn basic computer skills.

Similarly, the library is currently offering literacy programs on a limited basis in our community. The current program provides one-to-one tutorial. We currently provide out-reach through Community Based English Tutoring (CBET) program. The program utilizes technology to provide instructional information and assistance to parents, which would allow school sites to implement assignments with very small groups of parents on demand. ROP students also receive literacy skills in order to succeed in the area in which they are receiving training.

At both of our high school facilities, classrooms and labs are used during the traditional school day to provide ROP courses to students. The District Learning Center is a hub for adult learning activities operating from 7:00 AM to 10:00 PM. Students receive hands-on computer activities plus work with the Nova Net® tutorial program to improve their skills and learning at their own pace. In many of our after school programs, young adults refurbish donated computers that are given to classrooms and offer them to disadvantage and at-risk students to enhance their technology skills. **Table 7, Adult Literacy,** shows the alternate method for showing involvement of adult literacy providers – Goals and implementation plan.

In summary, JUSD is focused on meeting the Who? What? and How? to provide adult literacy. Who? Our goal at Jurupa Unified School District is to meet the one stop delivery system specified by the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (re-authorized in 1998 as part of the Workforce Investment Act) making families aware of the District's adult literacy services and other agencies. What? The community is aware that there are three services provided under the federally supported adult education programs such as Adult Basic Education for learners with skills below the eight-grade level, Adult Secondary Educational Development (GED) certificate, and English as a Second Language (ESL) services. How? Jurupa Unified School District's goal is to work with its partners to meet the needs of the community through technology. We know that adult learners receive a higher level of competency when real world problem based learning can be transferred to everyday life. Some of these factors include a literacy learning environment, workplace literacy programs, literacy-rich learning environment at home, and literacy rich environments in the community.

Funds and Resources

Funding sources are the Adult Education, Community-Based English Tutoring, AB 231 Literacy Grants, WIA, which provides additional vocational training and support services to adults up to the age of 21, and the District Technology department which provides equipment and additional technical support to run a full-time ESL/Literacy lab at the District Learning Center.

Effective Research-Based Methods and Strategies

he academic improvements are indicated in the curriculum goals and academic content standards (p.18) of the Education Technology Plan (ETP). Teachers and students are using technology as an integral part of the curriculum to: manage student assessment; provide students with opportunities to extend content learning through integrated project-based activities; create individual learning programs; and improve research, information literacy, and critical thinking skills.

What "strategy" or "model" of technology use and integration did you employ (will you employ) in your plan?

Each school has a conglomerate of software and technologies poised to improve students' skills, knowledge, comprehension, appreciation, and critical-thinking. Most schools have 30-station computer labs, average of six computers in a classroom, after school programs that use computers as one effective method of delivery to all students. Ongoing staff development, both in-house and outsourcing plays a crucial part in preparing the teaching staff in learning design model development, course development, curriculum integration, differentiated instructional models, and project-centered instruction. The types of software used to enhance teaching and learning are listed on page 15 of the ETP.

What kind of research is available that supports your strategy or model in curriculum integration and professional development?

The bibliography resources cited below aid in Jurupa Unified School District's staff development, lesson plans design, and teaching and learning. A wide range of research-based strategies are engaged to reach and motivate the diverse population – English learners, special education students, GATE students, alternative education learners, and adult learners.

A great number of teachers have long-term subscriptions to District Administrator, Educational Leadership, Curriculum Technology Quarterly, e-Week, T.H.E. Journal, Learning & Leading with Technology, Technology & Learning, and NASSP Bulletin. The technology department staff subscribes to the following magazines: Network Computing, Information Week, Telecommunications Magazine, and Customer Solutions.

With the variety of reading selections, JUSD's personnel keep current on the research, new hardware development, and software applications that are used in and out of the classroom to enhance and augment integration of technology into the curriculum.

How are your strategies based on reliable research and effective practices?

Reliable research either based on empirical data or practitioners' observation is screened continually for strategies that enhance the curriculum and instruction. Technical staff reviews research findings and their relevance to the district's infrastructure on a regular basis at the District Technology Coordinators' Committee meetings. The committee members' representative from each school site, the Network Manager, the Database Administrators, Coordinator of Education Technology, technicians, and the Director of Information Technology review various research-based strategies and best practices. The main purpose of the review of new technology is to determine how they will enhance and impact teaching and learning.

What research supports your model for improving student achievement?

In the ETP, professional development is a primary focus. The Education Technology Plan is consistent with the research in the following ways: (1) Teachers collaborate with various staff to produce and practice technology-integrated activities. (2) Teachers are provided with the opportunity to attend seminars and workshops that cover basic-to-advance use of technology; and (3) Our key (technology proficient) teachers are involved in leadership activities such as coaching, facilitating, and modeling the effective use of instructional technology.

Software evaluation and selection in the area of literacy are consistent with research from the Early Reading First initiative, which has identified five components essential to a child's learning to read: phonemic awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension. All software selected are evaluated for its ability to support the five key literacy components and follow the "assess, align, instruct, and evaluate" model to target instructional activities based on students' needs.

How will technology by used to increase course offerings?

The Jurupa Unified School District use resources from online and distant learning opportunities to increase the variety of course offerings that are available to students. Online Advanced Placement courses are be made available based on student needs and skills, particularly in situations where there may be an insufficient number of students interested or eligible for a course at a given site.

Nova NET® is a comprehensive e-learning system revolutionizing the relationship between students, teachers and technology. The Learning Center, which serves adult learners, English learners, and other alternative programs use the program for instructional and tutorial needs. The program ensures accountability by linking educators with progressive technology, standards-based curriculum and proven teaching methods to prepare today's students for the challenges of tomorrow.

Nova NET® is an online comprehensive courseware system that delivers thousands of hours of standards-based, interactive curriculum, integrated assessment and student management and

mentoring, workshop and conference presentations, and teaching courses and writing in publications for educators.

This book summarizes the research supporting a variety of instructional strategies with proven successes in improving student achievement. The research-based strategies include 1) identifying similarities and differences; 2) summarizing and note-taking; 3) reinforcing effort and providing recognition; 4) homework and practice; 5) nonlinguistic representations; 6) cooperative learning; 7) setting objectives and providing feedback; 8) generating and testing hypotheses; and 9) cues, questions, and advance organizers.

Process for incorporating research-based methods and models into ongoing program evaluation and modification

Quarterly, the Jurupa Unified School District Curriculum and Instruction Department and the District Data Committee examine the studies that align with the ETP. All committees use the *What Works* database maintained by the US Department of Education. The *What Works* clearinghouse, funded by the US Department of Education, will provide the following easily accessible and searchable online databases:

- An educational interventions registry that identifies potentially replicable programs, products, and practices that are claimed to enhance important student outcomes, and synthesizes the scientific evidence related to their effectiveness.
- An evaluation studies registry, which is linked electronically to the educational interventions registry, and contains information about the studies constituting the evidence of the effectiveness of the program, products, and practices reported.
- An approaches and policies registry that contains evidencebased research reviews of broader educational approaches and policies.

- Test instruments registry that contains scientifically rigorous reviews of test instruments used for assessing educational effectiveness.
- An evaluator registry that identifies evaluators and evaluation entities that have indicated their willingness and ability to conduct quality evaluations of education interventions.

Summary

Plan (ETP) 2008/2011 is dynamic. The plan is designed to provide administrators and teachers with a framework for using technology to support teaching and learning. The ETP is student centered and focuses on preparing technology-proficient educators to meet the challenges to improve student learning.

This plan is not a prescriptive guidebook. It does not stipulate the tools schools must purchase or use. The plan, however, provides endemic solutions guided by the state's content standards, curriculum frameworks, effective instructional strategies, and the use of technology to enhance and support the curriculum. Because of this design, the curriculum is the nucleus of the plan, and all other ancillaries gravitate to a supporting role.

In concert with the curriculum is staff development. The district staff development programs are rated highly in areas of curriculum, instruction, and education technology. There is an array of staff development opportunities presented during the school year to enrich staff skills in order to use technology more efficiently and effectively in the classroom.

The efforts of administrators, teachers, curriculum specialists, media personnel, and other disciplines collaborated to make this project successful. With the collaboration of the education services and Information technology department, the plan provides a framework for educators to enhance their skills and transfer their knowledge into effective instructional models to improve teaching and learning.

The infrastructure is the foundation to provide electronic resources to the classroom. The management and system maintenance of the district's network is vital to meeting the teaching and learning goals outlined in this plan with growing demands for online instruction, the efficiency of the network is paramount; likewise, the need for skilled technicians to provide support, updated equipment for speed and efficiency, and a cadre of competent teachers to improve instruction is also an essential element of JUSD's Education Technology Plan success.

E-Rate Supplement

he Jurupa Unified School District's Education Technology Plan for 2008/2011 was planned and developed to fulfill the requirements of federal, state, and local governments. In particular, this plan addresses the E-rate technology plan criteria.

- Fixed wireless and wireless access points
- Network security agents to prevent Internet-based attacks
- Deploy Virtual Private Network (VPN) to enable secure access
- Software licenses and upgrades for system efficiencies
- Electrical installation and upgrade
- Video Transmission Equipment

Goal: To expand telecommunications to Enabled Enterprise Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP)

Strategies: Enhance district's business and education efficiencies

- IP/PBX, and phones and point-to-point video phones for district personnel
- IP video surveillance for safety and security
- IP mobile solution for district needs

Goal: To improve Internet access to staff and students with DS3 and ATM service

Strategies: Use of the Internet to explore educational sites and learning possibilities

Both informal and formal assessment measures will be used to determine the degree to which each member of the JUSD community is benefiting from current and future technology-based endeavors. Each component of the plan contains a comprehensive list of activities that will be implemented to enable JUSD to meet the defined goals and objectives, including the year they would be accomplished, those responsible for the activity, and those who would evaluate and monitor the process.

Infrastructure, hardware, technical support, and software should be purchased with the end in mind. It is the responsibility of the ITD and the DDC to establish guidelines that direct current and future human and monetary resources toward the most efficient and effective method of reaching the planned goals and objectives.

The ITD will monitor hardware acquisition and installation on a daily basis.

Regularly scheduled meetings of the DDC, Principals' Meetings, and Superintendent's Advisory Council will act as the progress check toward goals, objectives, and benchmarks. Also, the ITD will report annually the progress of the Education Technology Plan to the Board of Education in

June of each year. The DDC meets four times per year, from September through June, to discuss issues relating to education and information technology. Budget

4. Jurupa Unified School District has developed a 5-year strategic plan to build two elementary and one middle school. During the same period, an aggressive plan has been developed to modernize six schools. These projects are financed with Measure C (local Bond measure) and state deferred maintenance. Table 8, 3-year E-Rate Budget, outlines budgeted funds by the district for 2008-2011. These figures include the E-Rate funding contributions expected throughout the course of the 3 year projection. The non-ERate portion of the expenditures will be funded through a combination of sources including bond proceeds and general fund contributions.

1. Describe your district's progress in meeting the goals and specific implementation plan for using technology to improve teaching and learning as described in Section 3.d., Curriculum Component Criteria, of the EETT technology plan criteria described in Appendix C. (1-3 paragraphs)

Since the inception of the 2002-2005 JUSD Education Technology Plan (ETP), Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) has converged its education technology efforts on two primary goals: (1) to enhance and expand the teaching and learning process; thus increasing student achievement in the core areas of language arts, reading, and mathematics, and (2) to provide teacher and administrative support for the management of data, record keeping, and student assessment.

Realizing that reading is the catalyst to all academic success, JUSD's foremost goal, for education technology, is to increase student achievement in reading and language arts. As such, a great number of resources have been committed to increasing teacher and student access to technology in these core classrooms. The most prolific progress in meeting JUSD ETP curriculum goals (Tables 3A, 3C, 3E) is found in those classrooms with increased access—defined as a classroom with a student to computer ratio of 6:1 or less. Teachers in these classrooms consistently develop and assign technology-based student projects focused on the core curriculum. Student use of word processing, multimedia presentation software, electronic graphic organizers, and online research resources (e.g., EBSCO Publishing, Discovery Education's Digital Curriculum, Follett Library's Destiny®), to enhance standards based assignments, are common elements among these classrooms. JUSD has continued to support the annual renewal of the online research resources, with additional resources purchased when the need is identified. Furthermore, as the number of district-wide resources grows, the need for infrastructure expansion intensifies. JUSD has upgraded school Internet access by installing a 5MB ATM line to accommodate the ever-expanding Web-based curriculum resources accessed from each school's T1 line.

Excellent progress has been made in increasing the access to student records and assessment tools (Table 3F). With the 2003-2004 implementation of online attendance, teachers are able to take attendance from their desktop computer and have it immediately recorded into the student information system (SIS). Additionally, in 2002-2003, teachers and administrators were provided with direct access to the JUSD Instructional Data Management System (IDMS). IDMS is used to identify and analyze district and State student assessment data.

2. Describe your district's progress in meeting the goals and specific implementation plan for providing professional development opportunities based on the needs assessment and the Curriculum Component goals, benchmarks and timeline as described in Section 4.b., Professional Development Component Criteria, of the EETT technology plan criteria described in Appendix C. (1-3 paragraphs)

Based on the curriculum goals outlined in the JUSD ETP, professional development (PD) opportunities have focused on using technology to support the teaching and learning of curriculum standards. Beginning in 2002-2003, the Education Technology Department provided bi-weekly PD opportunities for teachers and administrators (Table 4A). These sessions are designed around the integration of technology into the reading/language arts and math curriculum. Each session is a ½ day in length and held during the normal school workday. Teachers and administrators are able to register through an online registration system (Table 4B: Professional Development).

Customized, site based, professional development opportunities and district-wide user group meetings/trainings are also provided through the Education Technology Department. On an as needed basis, school administration may schedule customized technology integration or operational training sessions to accommodate the needs of the school (Tables 4A, 4B, 4C, and 4D). Examples of these type of opportunities include: Accelerated Reader®, Library Resource, peripheral devices, e-mail, SIS, and/or IDMS training. Daily users of the library automation system and the SIS receive monthly User Group Meetings/Trainings to provide up-to-date information on software enhancements/updates, procedural changes, and/or operational changes (Table 4B).

Teachers, administrators, technology coordinators, and classified personnel are provided with annual opportunities to attend Education Technology conferences and workshops focused on enhancing technical and technology integration skills (Table 4B). During the 2004-2005 school year, approximately 36 teachers and technology coordinators, 4 administrators, and 23 classified personnel attended technology related conferences/workshops, such as, Computer Using Educators (CUE) Conference, National School Boards Association Technology and Learning Conference (T & L2), Tech Ed, California School Library Association (CSLA), and Bureau of Education Research (BEHR). Outside conferences, workshops, JUSD district-wide PD, and customized site-based PD opportunities continue to be a valuable component in meeting the curriculum goals of JUSD's ETP.
