* 7. Approve Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request
The Jurupa Valley High School ASB Executive Board requested permission to attend the California Association of Directors of Activities (CADA) Conference held at the University of California, Santa Barbara, on July 13 – 17, 2007. Student leaders participated in government training and leadership seminars. Approximately six students attended this event. All expenses, including meals and lodging, were paid with ASB funds. Transportation was by district van and students were chaperoned by Josh Lewis, JVHS Teacher. Administration indicated that no student was denied the opportunity to participate in this activity due to lack of funds. A copy of the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request is included in the supporting documents. It is recommended that the Board approve the Non-Routine Student Field Trip Request for Jurupa Valley High School ASB Executive Board to attend the CADA Conference with six (6) students at the University of California, Santa Barbara, July 13 – 17, 2007.

B. Request Approval to Issue Request for Proposal for Retiree Health Benefits Actuarial Study (Mrs. Lauzon - 2 minutes)

Administration requests permission to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) to solicit offers from qualified health benefit actuaries to provide an actuarial study of the District's "Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB)" in accordance with the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements 43 and 45; and actuarial calculations. This study will provide information to enable the District to manage the costs and liabilities associated with its retiree OPEB benefits.

Administration recommends the Board approve the Issuance of a Request for Proposal for Retiree Health Benefits Actuarial Study.

**C. <u>Adopt Urgency Ordinance Nos. 2008/02, 2008/03, 2008/04, 2008/05, 2008/06</u> <u>Levying Special Taxes</u> (Mrs. Lauzon - 5 minutes)

As the Board may recall, the Jurupa Unified School District ("District") is lead agency for five (5) Community Facilities Districts ("CFDs"). CFD Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4 have issued special tax bonds which are repaid through the annual levy of special taxes within the boundaries of each CFD. No bonds have been issued within CFD No. 6. However, special taxes levied within such CFD will be used to finance school facilities and certain administrative expenses.

Bonds in the principal amount of \$6.9 million were issued by CFD No. 1 in December 1990. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities, water facilities, sewer facilities and fire protection and suppression facilities to service development within the CFD boundaries. These bonds were subsequently refunded in July 2002 by bonds in the principal amount of \$6.19 million. This refunding resulted in additional funding for school facilities and a reduction in the special taxes of the CFD.

**C. Adopt Urgency Ordinance Nos. 2008/02, 2008/03, 2008/04, 2008/05, 2008/06 <u>Levying Special Taxes</u> (continued)

Bonds in the principal amount of \$1.22 million were issued by CFD No. 2 in March 1993. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities, water facilities and sewer facilities to service the development within the CFD boundaries.

Bonds in the principal amount of \$1.73 million were issued by CFD No. 3 in July 2002. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities to service the development within the CFD boundaries.

Bonds in the principal amount of \$3.17 million were issued by CFD No. 4 in December 2005. A portion of the proceeds of these bonds were used to finance school facilities and park facilities to service the development within the CFD boundaries.

In order to pay the principal and interest on the outstanding bonds of CFD Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and to pay for school facilities and administrative expenses in connection with CFD No. 6, the Board, acting as the Governing Board of such CFD, must adopt an ordinance levving the special taxes on the parcels within the CFD boundaries (included in supporting documents). An exhibit showing the parcels within CFD Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 and the corresponding special taxes to be levied in fiscal year 2007/2008, is attached to each ordinance. Each ordinance must be approved and submitted to the County Tax Assessor, along with the special tax levy prior to August 10, 2007. Dolinka Group, Inc., formerly David Taussig and Associates, Inc., Special Tax Consultant to the District, has prepared a report for CFD Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 that includes general information regarding the CFD and outlines the calculation and apportionment of the special taxes among the parcels within the CFD ("Community Facilities District Administration Report"), which has been provided as supporting documentation for Board members only. Additional copies of the Community Facilities District Administration Reports are available for review in the Business Office of the School District. Copies of the ordinances are included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends that the Board adopt Ordinance Nos. 2008/02, 2008/03, 2008/04, 2008/05, and 2008/06 levying the special taxes in fiscal year 2007/2008 within each CFD for the payment of principal and interest on the outstanding bonds and the administrative expenses of the applicable CFD.

* D. Approve Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement to the Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside, Rubidoux Area 3 Street and Sidewalk Improvement Projects (Mrs. Lauzon-2 minutes)

The Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside will be constructing sidewalks, installing street lights and improving the streets within the Rubidoux area. The project has been developed to improve safety conditions for pedestrians and automobile traffic, and to contribute to the visual attractiveness of the Rubidoux area.

* D. Approve Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement to the Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside, Rubidoux Area 3 Street and Sidewalk Improvement Projects (continued)

The Rubidoux Area 3 Street Improvement Project focus will be to construct sidewalks with curbs and gutters, reengineer street grades, repave current streets and to extend the street widths where necessary. In order to accomplish these improvements, the designated contractor will be required to enter upon a portion of District property, Rubidoux High School, to meet the new street right-of-way, or to do such other work as may be necessary. **There will be no cost to the District.**

The Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside is requesting the District grant a Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement from September 14, 2007 until August 31, 2008, or until completion of the Rubidoux Area 3 Sidewalks Project, whichever is sooner. A copy of the agreement is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board approve the Right of Entry and Temporary Construction Agreement, Rubidoux Area 3 Street and Sidewalk Improvement Projects, to the Redevelopment Agency for the County of Riverside.

* E. <u>Approve at Second Reading Ordinance No. 2008/01, Levying a Special Tax on</u> <u>Community Facilities District No. 7</u> (Mrs. Lauzon - 2 minutes)

Ordinance No. 2008/01 is needed to authorize and levy special taxes within Community Facilities District No. 7 at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Resolution #2008/03, adopted at the July 2nd Board Meeting. A copy of the Ordinance is included in the Supporting Documents.

Administration recommends approval of Ordinance No. 2008/01, Levying a Special Tax on Community Facilities District No. 7.

F. Approve Purchase of Inlet CNG Dryer for the Transportation Department

(Mrs. Lauzon - 2 minutes)

The Transportation Department is requesting permission to purchase a Xebec Inlet CNG Dryer from ANGI International to be installed at the inlet of the Compressed Natural Gas dispenser recently purchased. The dryer is required to cool the compressor package on the operating system. The lead time for the manufacturing of the dryer is 12 weeks and the cost of the dryer is \$39,013.04 (tax and shipping included). The following three quotes were received:

ANGI International \$39,013.04 Greenfield Compression, Inc. \$40,468.74 Xebec (manufacturer) \$48,410.50

F. <u>Approve Purchase of Inlet CNG Dryer for the Transportation Department</u> (cont) The purchase of the dryer will be paid from the Transportation Budget.

Board policy requires purchases greater than \$12,000 be brought to the Board for approval.

Administration recommends the Board approve the purchase of an Inlet CNG Dryer from ANGI International in the amount of \$39,013.04.

* G. Adopt Resolution #2008/07, Approve Child Development Contract

(Mr. Duchon - 2 minutes)

The State Preschool program has provided a high quality child development program and comprehensive support services to low-income children and families for over 30 years. This contract will provide a part-day educational experience that enhances the social competence and school readiness for 216 pre-kindergarten children in programs located at Mission Bell, Rustic Lane, Sunnyslope, Van Buren and West Riverside Elementary Schools. The California Department of Education Child Development contract has a maximum reimbursable amount of \$747,909.00. A copy of the Child Development contract is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends the Board adopt Resolution #2008/07, Approve Child Development Contract.

H. <u>Discuss Board Member Travel and Related Expenses Allocation</u>

(Mr. Duchon - 2 minutes)

Currently, Board Member travel reimbursement is set at \$4,000 per Board member per year. This amount was established by the Board at the March 5, 2007 meeting. At times, Board Members have exceeded this amount. Mr. Rodriguez has requested that any remaining 2006/2007 travel funds in his account be allocated to Mr. Chavez for his 2006/2007 travel expenses.

Following discussion, the Board may wish to approve Mr. Rodriguez's request and discuss and/or approve handling of board member travel expenses in the future.

* I. Approve Special Meeting to Establish Governance Goals and Utilize Ms. Leslie DeMersseman of CSBA (Mr. Duchon - 5 minutes)

The California School Boards Association (CSBA) recommends that all School Boards set goals for governance. Mrs. Brewer requests that a special meeting be held to set governance goals for our Board. Ms. Leslie DeMersseman from CSBA is available as a facilitator. A copy of the District Mission Statements and Goals is included in the supporting documents.

Administration recommends that the Board hold a special meeting to establish governance goals and utilize Ms. Leslie DeMersseman of CSBA.

<u>EXPULSION / SUSPENDED EXPULSION CASES - AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:</u>

- 1. Discipline Case #07-389 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a)(1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.
- 2. Discipline Case #07-392 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (k) and 48915 (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.
- 3. Discipline Case #07-398 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a)(1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. However, the Board of Education may wish to consider that the enforcement of the expulsion be suspended for the Fall Semester and the student be placed on school probation. The pupil shall be assigned to Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed in August for educational placement for the Fall Semester 2007. This case will be reviewed for possible reinstatement to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.

EXPULSION CASE - ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING:

1. Discipline Case #07-323 is recommended for expulsion by Administrative Hearing for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a)(1), (b), (k) and 48915 (b), (c)(2), (e) for one calendar year. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before July 7, 2008.

EXPULSION CASES – AGREEMENT AND STIPULATION:

- 1. Discipline Case #07-382 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (i), (k) and 48915 (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.
- 2. Discipline Case #07-399 is recommended for expulsion by Agreement and Stipulation for violation of Education Code Sections 48900 (a)(1), (k) and 48915 (b), (e) for the Summer and Fall Semesters 2007. The pupil shall be assigned to the Community Day School, operated at the District Learning Center. This case shall be reviewed for possible readmission to the Jurupa Unified School District on or before January 22, 2008.

The Administrative Hearing Panel recommends readmission of the pupil in Discipline Case #07-112 to the schools of the Jurupa Unified School District.



NEA-J Initial Bargaining Proposal Collective Bargaining Agreement Effective July 1, 2007

NEA-J proposes to open the following articles of the collective bargaining agreement:

Article VII - Hours of Duty

- The Association proposes creating language to compensate members for preparation time lost to testing schedules.
- The Association proposes seeing that all members are compensated for time spent attending IEP meetings outside of the workday.

Article VIII - Class Size

- The Association proposes addressing the extra workload and responsibilities faced by teachers of combination classes.
- The Association proposes addressing the extra workload and responsibilities faced by teachers of specialty classes such as, art and ceramics, at the secondary level.
- The Association proposes addressing problems caused by exceeding class size maximums.
- The Association proposes that the issue of caseload and class size for special education and resource specialist teachers be addressed

Article XIII – Work Year

• The Association proposes participating in the District's calendaring process.

Article XIV - Basic Compensation

- The Association proposes increasing the compensation for nurses.
- The Association proposes examining the issue of teaching experience and how longevity is credited.
- The Association proposes examining the structure of the longevity increments of the Basic Certificated Salary Schedule (BCSS)
- The Association proposes increasing the BCSS.
- The Association proposes restructuring the configuration of the BCSS.

Article XV - Extra Compensation

- The Association proposes increasing the rate of pay for extra-duty teaching assignments.
- The Association proposes re-examining the compensation and duties of testing coordinators.
- The Association proposes defining the duties and compensation for high school athletic assistants.

Article XVII - Health and Welfare Benefits

- The Association proposes improving member's health and welfare benefits.

·	Mr. Mark Gard, Jurupa Valley High School Coach; Mr. Ray Marisnek, Patriot High School Athletic Director; Mr. Chet Edmunds, Volunteer High School Coach; Mr. Johnny Mosher, High School Walk-On Coach; and Mr. Kevin Corridan, Rubidoux High School Coach, all spoke against the Board's proposal to raise the GPA for athletes. Mr. Brian Schafer, Community Member, spoke in favor of the proposal.
BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS	Mr. Rodriguez reported that he will be participating in the Country Village 4th of July Parade. He reported that he had attended the Center for Community Action & Environmental Justice (CCAEJ) meeting on air pollution in Jurupa and requested that the Board formulate a resolution requesting commercial warehouses in the Jurupa Valley High School area redirect their diesel truck traffic away from Bellegrave Avenue and the athletic fields at Jurupa Valley High School. Mr. Rodriguez thanked the teachers that spoke on the GPA topic.
	Mr. Chavez reported that he had also attended the CCAEJ meeting and was very concerned with the amount of truck traffic in the area of Jurupa Valley High School and the health concerns this causes our athletes. He would also like to see the Board adopt a resolution requesting that the trucks be rerouted away from JVHS. Mr. Chavez addressed public comments made regarding his attendance at conferences. He stated that he was elected by the Board to serve on various committees and this involves travel to be a part of discussions on school issues, especially those that are held in Sacramento. Mr. Chavez remarked that he agreed with many of the statements made by the Coaches regarding the GPA proposal and that the Board represents all the children.
	Mrs. Brewer suggested that intervention classes be implemented districtwide, which would include students participating in athletics and other extra-curricular activities. She would also like the district to look at grade standards for students participating in out-of-state field trips. ORDINANCE NO. 2008/02

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 1 OF JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on May 7, 1990, Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District ("JUSD") established Community Facilities District No. 1 of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") pursuant to Chapter 2.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5, commencing with Section 53311, of the California Government Code (the "Act"), to finance certain school facilities (the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, notice was published as required by the Act relative to the intention of the Board of Education to form the District and to provide for the Facilities;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act relative to the determination to proceed with the formation of the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to finance the costs of the Facilities;

WHEREAS, at said hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District and the levy of said special taxes were heard, substantial evidence was presented and considered by the Board of Education and a full and fair hearing was held;

WHEREAS, subsequent to said hearing, the Board of Education called a special election and submitted to the voters of the District a proposition with respect to the annual levy of special taxes within the District to pay principal of and interest on bonds thereof, and a proposition with respect to the establishment of an appropriations limit for the District which election was held on June 19, 1990; and

WHEREAS, an election was held within the District in which the sole eligible landowner elector approved said propositions by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit "C" to the Resolution of Formation and Exhibit "A" hereto (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2007-2008 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of JUSD issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs of administering the District.



<u>Section 2</u>. The Superintendent of JUSD is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 3. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of JUSD in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected. JUSD's Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

<u>Section 6</u>. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

<u>Section 7</u>. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its passage at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within JUSD boundaries.

APPENDIX A

RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT OF SPECIAL TAX FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 1 JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

A Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel in Community Facilities District No. 1 (herein "CFD No. 1") shall be levied and collected according to the tax liability determined by the Board of Education (the "Board") of Jurupa Unified School District (the "District") acting in its capacity as the legislative body of CFD No. 1 though the application of the appropriate amount or rate of Special Tax for "Developed Property" or "Undeveloped Property," as described below. All of the property in CFD No. 1, as depicted on the map of the boundaries thereof on file with the Clerk of the Board of Education, unless exempted by law or by the provisions of Section F below, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent and in the manner herein provided. All of the property in CFD No. 1 is included in Improvement Area No. 1 or Improvement Area No. 2 of CFD No. 1, as depicted on the boundary map.

A. Definitions

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

"Alternative Special Tax" for Developed Property means an amount equal to \$0.185 per square foot of an Assessor's Parcel for Improvement Area No. 1 and \$0.272 per square foot of an Assessor's Parcel for Improvement Area No. 2.

"Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel shown on a map of the County Assessor of the County of Riverside with an assigned Assessor's Parcel Number.

"Assigned Special Tax" means the Special Tax determined in accordance with Section C and Section D below.

"Developed Property" means all Assessor's Parcels in CFD No. 1 for which a foundation building permit has been issued as of March 1 of the previous Fiscal Year, but not prior to April 2, 1990.

"Fiscal Year" means the period starting on July 1 and ending the following June 30.

"Maximum Special Tax" means the Maximum Special Tax, determined in accordance with Sections C and D below, that can be levied by the Board in any Fiscal Year on an Assessor's Parcel in each class of Developed Property and Undeveloped Property.

"Single Family Attached Residential Unit" means one or more Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property which contain(s) a structure or structures, made up of two or more units that share common walls.



"Single Family Detached Residential Unit" means an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property which contains one dwelling unit.

"Special Tax(es)" means the special taxes to be levied in each Fiscal Year on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or Undeveloped Property to pay the amounts hereinafter specified.

"Taxable Property" means all Assessor's Parcels in CFD No. 1 which are not exempt from the levy of Special Taxes pursuant to law or Section F below.

"Undeveloped Property" means all Taxable Property in CFD No. 1 not classified as Developed Property.

B. Assignment of Land Use Class

For each Fiscal Year (commencing with the 1991-92 Fiscal Year), all Taxable Property within CFD No. 1 shall be categorized either as a Developed Property or as Undeveloped Property and shall be subject to the levy of Special Taxes in accordance with the rates and method of apportionment set forth in Sections C, D, and E below.

For purposes of determining the applicable Maximum Special Tax pursuant to Sections C and D, Developed Property shall be assigned to one of the classes designated in Table 1 or Table 2 below. Single family Detached Residential Units shall be assigned to Classes 1 through 5 based upon the square footage of the residential unit to be constructed on an Assessor's Parcel as set forth in the most recent building permit issued for the Assessor's Parcel. The square footage of residential units shall be exclusive of garages or other structures which are not used as living spaces, as set forth on the most recent building permit issued therefore. Single Family Attached Residential Units shall be assigned to Class 6. Commercial/Industrial Developed Property shall be assigned to Class 7. The square footage of a Commercial/Industrial building shall be assigned to Class 7. The square footage for the building(s) as reflected in the building permit(s) issued therefore. The acreage of a Commercial/Industrial parcel shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map or to the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

Notwithstanding Section F below, for purposes of computing the Alternative Special Tax for Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property assigned to Class 6, the square footage of the entire underlying Assessor's Parcel or lot, as indicated on the current Assessor's Parcel map or corresponding subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, shall be used. The Alternative Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel in Class 6 shall be apportioned to the number of units located on the Assessor's Parcel.

C. <u>Maximum Special Tax: Improvement Area No. 1</u>:

1. Developed Property.



The Maximum Special Tax in any Fiscal Year for an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property in Classes 1 through 5 shall be the greater of (i) the amount derived by multiplying the square footage applicable to the Assessor's Parcel by the Alternative Special Tax, or (ii) the Assigned Special Tax Rate determined by reference to Table 1. For purposes of this Section C, the acreage or square footage of an Assessor's Parcel shall be determined by reference to the most current Assessor's Parcel Map, the most current parcel map or other subdivision tract map recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County.

E. <u>Method of Apportionment of the Special Taxes to Developed Property and Undeveloped Property.</u>

Starting with Fiscal Year 1991-92 and for each following Fiscal Year, the Board shall determine the amount of Special Tax to be levied and collected from Taxable Property in each of the Improvement Areas in the Fiscal Year (the "Special Tax Requirement"). <u>Second</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first step has been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property, exclusive of property exempt from Special Taxes pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property;

<u>Third</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first two steps have been completed, the levy of the Special Tax on Assessor's Parcels in all classes of Developed Property, exclusive of property exempt from Special Taxes pursuant to Section F below, shall be increased by equal percentages above the Special Tax rates determined pursuant to the first two steps above, up to 100% of the Assigned Special Tax for each class, determined by reference to Table 1 or Table 2;

<u>Fourth</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first three steps have been completed, the levy of Special Tax on Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property for which the Maximum Special Tax is determined by application of the Alternative Special Tax, shall be increased by an equal percentage from the Assigned Special Tax up to the full amount of the Alternative Special Tax for the Assessor's Parcels:

<u>Fifth</u>: If additional funds are needed after the first four steps have been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property irrevocably offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association which has not been exempted from the Special Tax pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property; and

Sixth: If additional funds are needed after the first five steps have been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied proportionally on each Assessor's Parcel of



Undeveloped Property conveyed to a public agency which has not been exempted from the Special Tax pursuant to Section F below, up to the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property.

F. <u>Limitations</u>.

The Board shall not levy the Special Taxes on up to 16.39 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 1 or 32.89 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 2 conveyed or irrevocably offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association, on land which is a public right-of-way or which is a utility easement making impractical its utilization for other than the purpose set forth in such easement. If the total number of acres of land conveyed or offered for dedication to a public agency or owned by a homeowners' or property owners' association exceeds 16.39 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 1 or 32.89 acres of land in Improvement Area No. 2, the acres exceeding such total shall be taxed as Undeveloped Property to the extent set forth in the fifth and sixth steps in Section E above; provided, however, that in no event shall the Board levy the Special Taxes on land which is a public right-of-way or which is a public utility property not regularly occupied by personnel of the utility or a property encumbered with public or utility easements making impractical its utilization for other than the purpose set forth in such easement.

G. Manner of Collection.

The Special Taxes for CFD No. 1 shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary *ad valorem* property taxes, and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure, sale and lien priority in case of delinquency as is provided for *ad valorem* taxes.

JUSD's Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 6

WHEREAS, on August 7, 2006, the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Jurupa Unified School District (the "School District") adopted a resolution entitled "Resolution of Intention of the Board of Education of the Jurupa Unified School District with respect to the Establishment of Community Facilities District No. 6 of the Jurupa Unified School District, County of Riverside, State of California" (the "Resolution of Intention") stating its intention to establish Community Facilities District No. 6 (the "District") pursuant to Chapter 2.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5, commencing with Section 53311, of the California Government Code (the "Act"), to finance certain facilities (the "Facilities");

WHEREAS, notice was published as required by the Act relative to the intention of the Board of Education to form the District and to provide for the Facilities;

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act relative to the determination to proceed with the formation of the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to finance a portion of the costs of the Facilities;

WHEREAS, at said hearing all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District and the levy of said special taxes were heard, substantial evidence was presented and considered by the Board of Education and a full and fair hearing was held;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE JURUPA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. By the passage of this Ordinance, the Board of Education hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the District pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53328 and 53340, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit A to the Resolution of Formation (the "Rate and Method of Apportionment"). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2007-08 and, in each fiscal year thereafter, until payment in full of any bonds of the School District issued for the District (the "Bonds"), payment of all costs of the Facilities to be paid with such funds, and payment of all costs administering the District.

Section 2. The Superintendent of the School District is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax rate and amount to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, in the manner and as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 3. Properties or entities of the State, federal or local governments shall be exempt from any levy of the special taxes, to the extent set forth in the Rate and Method of Apportionment. In no event shall the special taxes be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum tax specified in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 4. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided for in the Act, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, and in the Resolution of Formation including, but not limited to, the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, the replenishment of the reserve fund for the Bonds, the payment of the costs of the Facilities, the payment of the costs of the School District in administering the District and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 5. The special taxes shall be collected from time to time as necessary to meet the financial obligations of the District on the secured real property tax roll in the same manner as ordinary ad valorem taxes are collected. The School District's Superintendent, or designee thereof, is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Riverside and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the District in each fiscal year until the Bonds are paid in full and provision has been made for payment of all of the administrative costs of the District.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Superintendent of the School District may collect one or more installments of the special taxes by means of direct billing by the School District of the property owners within the District, if, in the judgment of the Superintendent, such means of collection will reduce the administrative burden on the School District or is otherwise appropriate under the circumstances. In such event, the



special taxes shall become delinquent if not paid when due as set forth in any such respective billing to the property owners.

The special taxes shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for ad valorem taxes. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments.

Section 6. If for any reason any portion of this ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District shall not be affected.

Section 7. The President of the Board of Education shall sign this Ordinance and the Secretary shall cause the same to be published within fifteen (15) days after its passage at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the School District's boundaries.

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




