G. Approve Allocation for GATE Program

(Mrs. Espinoza – 5 minutes)

Martha Gomez will provide an overview of the proposed GATE Program, including student qualifications, certification of teachers, and site-based and centralized district programs. In order to move forward with all components of the GATE Program, <u>Administration is requesting that the Board approve an allocation of \$90,000 from Discretionary Block Grant Funds to support the GATE Program</u>.

**H. Approve 2007-2008 Consolidated Application School Level Plans for Nueva Vista, Rubidoux, Patriot, and Jurupa Valley High Schools (Mrs. Espinoza – 2 minutes)

Schools receiving categorical funds covered by the Consolidated Application are required to consolidate and submit single school plans, known as "Single Plans for Student Achievement (SPSAs)." Some of the state and federal programs included in the high school plans are: Title II (Highly Qualified Staff), Title III (LEP Students), Economic Impact Aid-Limited English Proficient (EIA-LEP), Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities (DFSC), Community Based English Tutoring (CBET), CAHSEE Intervention, and School Assistance Intervention Team (SAIT).

The plans contain a description of how sites will serve students who are educationally disadvantaged, English Learners, special education, and gifted and talented students. SPSAs are updated annually and reflect analysis of data regarding student achievement and modifications to strategies. Also, part of the school planning process for the high schools is the incorporation of the self-study results from the WASC accreditation process that requires an analysis and development of schoolwide goals, action steps, and expected learning results. Copies of school level plans have been presented to Board members under separate cover.

Administration recommends that the Board approve the school level plans for Nueva Vista, Rubidoux, Patriot, and Jurupa Valley High Schools for the 2007-2008 school year.

I. Approve Purchase of Chevrolet E1500 Van for Jurupa Valley High School

(Mrs. Lauzon – 2 minutes)

Jurupa Valley High School is requesting approval to purchase one (1) Chevrolet Van for use by its Agriculture classes. Four quotes were obtained (includes tax and fees, except as noted):

When an employee wishes to withdraw from the deferred pay program after the 2 month grace period, the County requires specific district Board action requesting refund of deferred pay. At the request of the employee, Administration is requesting board approval for Employee #166488, a teacher in the district, to withdraw from the deferred pay program.

Administration recommends approving request by Employee #166488, to withdraw from deferred pay program.

L. <u>Consider One-Time Grant to Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High School Swim Teams</u> (Mr. Duchon – 5 minutes)

Mr. Robert Bier, Community Member, requested that an item be placed on the November 19th Board Agenda to award the Jurupa Valley and Rubidoux High School swim teams a one-time grant of \$5,000 each.

After discussion, the Board may wish to approve a one-time grant of \$5,000 each to the Jurupa Valley High School swim team and the Rubidoux High School swim team.

2. Approve STRS Exemption for Employment in an Emergency Situation

The State Teachers' Retirement System currently limits the post-retirement earnings of its retirees, if they return to a position requiring a credential. However, such a retiree may be granted an exemption to the earnings limitation for employment in an "emergency situation" to fill a vacant administrative position consistent with the provisions of Section 24216. The retired STRS member must be employed to fill a vacancy that was unanticipated and occurred due to circumstances beyond the control of the employer. There is currently a need for an Interim Elementary Principal. The position requires an individual with highly specialized skills, knowledge and experience. Mr. Paul Jensen, a retired Director of Secondary Education, has these skills. Mr. Jensen is not a candidate for a permanent position.

With these considerations in mind, it is recommended that Mr. Paul Jensen be approved for temporary employment as an Interim Elementary Principal under the authorization of Education Code Section 24216.

3. Approve Variable Term Waiver Request for CLAD Authorization

For twenty years, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) has authorized a "Plan to Remedy" as the basis for addressing a shortage of teachers possessing EL certification. In August 2005, the CCTC gave notice to school districts that the "Plan to Remedy" would no longer be accepted for teachers without EL authorization. Teachers without authorization must apply for an emergency CLAD credential this year and complete the training and/or tests necessary to received certificate by the end of the school year.

At this time, there is one special education teacher in our district who is not eligible for the emergency CLAD certificate per CCTC guidelines. In order to remain compliant under the Williams Settlement and ensure that all CCTC legal guidelines are followed while assigning teachers to classrooms, it is recommended that the Board approve a variable term waiver for CLAD authorization for the following teacher;

Katherine Palagi SDC Teacher Intern Mild/Moderate

Pedley Elementary School

4. Reauthorize District "Committee on Assignments" (Ed. Code Section 44258

On September 6, 1988, the Board approved the establishment of a District "Committee on Assignments." The Committee approves teacher assignments in elective courses (i.e., no Math, Science, English, or Social Science), where the teacher has special skills or preparation. The Committee will now consist of the Assistant Superintendent of Personnel Services, Mrs. Tamara Elzig, and the President of NEA-Jurupa, Ms. Maudie Gooden. Due to changes in committee members, the Board should reauthorize the Committee.

It is recommended that the Board reauthorize the "Committee on Assignments" as provided in Education Code Section 44258.7, due to changes in the committee members.

Enclosed is a Certification Form 3806 to report the selection of day, time, and place of your district board's Annual Organizational Meeting. Please complete this form and return it to Monica Martinez, Secretary to the Board of Education, on or before Friday, November 30, 2007.

Responsibility of Governing Board

In accordance with the Education Code, the governing board of each school district shall hold an Annual Organizational Meeting. In a year in which a regular election for governing board members is conducted, the meeting shall be held on a day within a 15-day period that commences with the date upon which a governing board member elected at that election takes office. Annual Organizational Meetings, in years in which no such regular election for governing board members is conducted, shall be held during the same 15-day period on the calendar. This year, the dates are December 7 through December 21, 2007. Unless otherwise provided by rule of the governing board, the day and time of the Annual Organizational Meeting shall be selected by the board at its regular meeting held immediately prior to the first day of such 15-day period, and the board shall notify the County Superintendent of Schools of the day and time selected. The clerk of the board shall, within 15 days prior to the date of the Annual Organizational Meeting, notify in writing all members and members-elect of the date and time selected. If the board fails to select a day and time for the annual meeting, the County Superintendent of Schools shall designate, within the 15-day period, the day and time of the meeting. (E.C. Section 35143)

The Oath of Office must be administered before any officer enters on the duties of his/her office. (E.C. Section 60 and Govt. Code Section 1360) If the Oath of Office has been administered, the term of office for a newly elected board member begins Friday, December 7, 2007. (E.C. Section 5017) The Oath of



Office may be administered at the organizational meeting. An Oath of Office form is furnished by the Registrar's Office.

Community College District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of a community college district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a secretary (E.C. Section 72000(2)).

City and Unified School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, each city board of education shall organize by electing a president from its members (*E.C. Section 35143*). Whenever a unified school district has within its boundaries a chartered city with a population of more than 8,000 or whenever the average daily attendance of a unified school district is 1,500 or more, for all purposes the district shall be deemed a city school district governed by a city board of education, and the governing board thereof shall be deemed a city board of education (*E.C. Section 5206*). The board of education of a unified school district that meets the standards of Education Code section 5206 is required to elect a president at the Annual Organizational Meeting. A unified school district with five board members that does not meet the standards of Education Code Section 5206 would be required to elect a president and a clerk (*E.C. Section 35022*, *35143*, *and 5206*).

High School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of each high school district, union high school district, and joint union high school district shall organize by electing a president from its members and a clerk (E.C. Section 35143).

Elementary School District

At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with five or more board members shall elect a president and a clerk from among its members (*E.C. Section 35022 and 35143*). At the Annual Organizational Meeting, the governing board of an elementary school district with less than five board members is required to elect one of its members as clerk (*E.C. Section 35143*).

Selection of Representative to Vote in the Annual County Committee on School District Organization Election

The governing board of each school district of every kind or class shall annually, at its initial meeting, select one of its members as its representative, who shall have one vote for each member to be elected to the county committee.

The secretary or clerk of the district shall furnish the County Superintendent of Schools with a certificate naming the representative selected by the board (E.C. Section 35023) (72403 community college district).

After the Annual Organizational Meeting, please complete and return to Monica Martinez, no later than December 21, 2007, the enclosed form 3807 relating to the election of the governing board president, vice president (if one is elected), and clerk, the member selected to represent the school district at the annual election of members of the county committee, and the date, time, and place of regular meetings.

For your convenience, we have enclosed a copy of Secretary of State Form NP/SF 405 Rev. 03/2005, "Statement of Facts Roster of Public Agencies Filing" amendment to be filed with the Secretary of State within ten days after any change of facts required to be stated pursuant to *Government Code Section* 53051(b).

Adjust JUSD AVID Program Funding

Goals: To have JUSD restore our budget from the recently adjusted \$40,000 back to \$300 per student or \$60,000 per year.

Issues of concern:

- 1. Program is stronger now, than it ever has been. We have 8 sections of AVID classes and approximately 200 students. This number is strong, despite the drop in enrollment due to the opening of a third high school in the district. Our retention rate is steadily increasing, as is the number of students who wish to join AVID later in their high school years.
- 2. The funding for our program has been decreased despite a steady growth in the program. We currently employ 8 AVID college tutors who get paid wages competitive to neighboring AVID sites. "

The JVHS AVID staff and student-run AVID Club try to help do their part to raise money by conducting various fundraisers all year long. This money helps to supplement expenses; furthermore, we are proud to give select graduating AVID seniors some scholarship money at the end of each year.

Benefits of JVHS AVID:

- 3. Consistently, 88-95% of AVID seniors have been accepted to four-year colleges. Last year alone, AVID seniors received approximately \$150,000 in financial aid. As a note of comparison, last year's JVHS graduates reported the following college going rate: 4.24% to UC, 9.29 to CSU, and 32% to a community college. Overall, 41% of non-AVID graduates completed the CSU/UC entrance requirements.
- 4. In the senior year, students are "walked through" the college application process for UC, CSU, private, and out of state colleges. We also do this with the filing process for the FAFSA. One hundred percent of AVID students take a college preparatory curriculum with the most rigorous courses they can handle. Consistently, between 95-100% of juniors and seniors take the college preparatory exams they need such as the SAT, ACT, and the SAT II.
- 5. AVID helps increase the enrollment of minority students in AP/Honors courses as well as helping to increase the SAT/ACT scores of these same students.
- 6. AVID students serve as mentors to other JVHS students who are seeking information about college entrance and financial aid. Teachers frequently comment about how knowledgeable AVID students are regarding note-taking, organization, college information, and deadlines.
- 7. AVID addresses the special needs of first generation college-bound students and students who come from economically disadvantages homes. Through the AVID



- program, these students are provided "equal access" to the university system and equal access to rigorous curriculum in high school.
- 8. AVID encourages community service. AVID students serve as summer school tutors to the incoming AVID summer bridge class. Furthermore, they frequently attend parent workshops to speak on behalf of the program. These AVID juniors and seniors regularly go back to their middle school to assist in the MLMS AVID program. They coach the upcoming students about the rigors of high school and the importance of a college education.
