6. Administrative Reports and Written Communications

a. Review Approval of 2007/2008 First Interim Financial Report (Mrs. Lauzon – 1 minute) The Riverside County Office of Education has notified the District that the 2007/2008 First Interim Financial Report has received positive certification and that they have notified the California Department of Education accordingly. * b. Report on District Pesticide Use

(Mrs. Lauzon – 2 minutes)

The Integrated Pest Management Policy adopted by the District in 1996, which called for an "as needed" approach to pesticide use, has had a lasting impact over the years. This has resulted in a continued reduction in the amounts of pesticide product used. In response to California's Department of Pesticide Regulation's changing guidelines, pesticide applicators have had to adjust the products they use to accommodate least toxic/most effective use of chemicals in our schools. Therefore, product lists for the district must be continuously monitored and revised throughout the year. Included in the supporting documents are charts of pesticide product use over the last ten years.

The amount of annual rainfall, temperature fluctuations and the associated fluctuations in target pest populations (weeds, gophers, ants, etc.) will cause a variance in product utilization from year to year. High utilization of some products, such as Glyphosate (Roundup) and Ronstar G (a pre-emergent weed killer), can also be attributed to such things as field renovations and establishing new sites.

Staff controls structural and landscape pest problems with the least possible hazard to people and the environment. The health and safety of all students and staff members is a primary concern of the Board of Education and the administration.

* B. Authorize Preparation for Potential Budget Reductions for 2008/2009 Fiscal Year

(Mrs. Lauzon – 5 minutes)

At the January 22nd Board meeting administration reported to the Board that in the Governor's January Budget Proposal, the Governor proposed massive cuts to K–12 education. The Governor's proposal includes a \$400 million mid-year cut in the current year (2007/08) and a \$4.4 billion reduction in funding for the budget year (2008/09). The Business Office has analyzed all the current proposals for mid-year cuts and next year's budget. The impact of the mid-year cut would result in a \$561,764 loss of revenue in the current year and an estimated decrease of \$5.2 million in budget year 2008/09.

While it is too early to project what will actually play out in the State budget at this time, the Riverside County Office of Education, along with the Fiscal Crisis & Management Assistance Team (FCMAT), are asking school districts to plan for the cuts proposed in the Governor's budget, starting with the 2007/08 Second Interim Financial Report. At this time, it is anticipated that District's will not have any additional budget information prior to the Governor's May Revise. When the May Revise is released, any new information will be incorporated into the Adopted Budget when it is submitted to the Board at the June 16th Board meeting.

Based on this information, administration is looking at all options available to the District to help address the possible budget reductions in 2007/08 and 2008/09. It is essential that the District maintain its flexibility for next year's budget. Therefore, administration is recommending that the District take the legal steps necessary to reduce programs and services, if needed. The current target for next year's budget shortfall is \$5.2 million, based on the District's analysis. In addition, the District will need to address the almost \$562,000 shortfall in the current year. It should be made clear that administration is not asking the Board to make a decision about final budget reductions at this time. However, because there is a legal requirement to send notice of potential certificated layoffs before March 15, 2008, administration recommends that the Board preserve its options to balance the budget by considering reductions in the programs listed below, and sending layoff notices to certificated staff associated with those programs. While reductions may be considered in the classified service, only a 45 day notice is required.

At a future date, administration will bring the Board a recommendation of actual budget reductions that may be necessary to offset the loss of state revenue. Effective immediately, all expenditures and vacant positions are being reviewed and only essential expenses will be approved.

The list of recommendations above will generate enough savings to offset the one-time and ongoing cuts proposed in the in Governor's January 2008/09 budget proposal. A summary of 2007/2008 and 2008/2009 Budget Reductions/Adjustments is included in the supporting documents.

It is recommended that the Board authorize staff to implement the budget plan to maintain the flexibility to enact the potential budget reductions listed above and instruct staff to begin preparing other potential budget reductions. Formal action to authorize administration to prepare layoff notices to certificated staff to provide flexibility to enact program reductions will be brought back to the Board on March 3, 2008.

**C. Approve Submittal of Part II of the 2007-2008 Consolidated Application

(Mrs. Espinoza – 2 minutes)

The Consolidated Application is a declaration of our intent to apply for 2007-2008 funding for eight categorical programs. Part I was approved by the Board of Education on July 2, 2008 and submitted to the State Department of Education. For 2007-2008, the entitlements for these programs are reported in Part II of the Consolidated Application in the total amount of \$11,294,780. This figure represents \$7,366,027 in federal funding and \$3,928,753 in state funding. A copy of Part II of the Consolidated Application has been provided to the Board under separate cover, along with prior year carryovers. The two program entitlements covered by state funding include: Economic Impact Aid, \$3,899,920, supplement for the English Learner program; and Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE), \$28,833, supports tobacco prevention education in grades 4-8.

The six federal program entitlements are also a part of the application. The Title I (Basic Grant) program, \$5,519,646, is designed to provide supplemental funds for underachieving students at schools with a high concentration of poverty. Title II (Teacher Quality), \$922,468, is intended to prepare and recruit high-quality teachers and principals. Title III (LEP), \$702,620, ensures that all limited English proficient (LEP) students attain English proficiency and meet the same challenging state academic standards as all other students. Title III (Immigrant), \$79,040, supports services to LEP students in the country less than 12 months. Title IV (Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities), \$108,893, supports school- and community-based drug education and prevention programs. Title V (Innovative Strategies), \$33,360, provides counseling and library services. The School Improvement (SI) funding is now included as part of the AB825 School and Library Improvement Block Grant and not reported on the Consolidated Application.

In response to the requirements of No Child Left Behind (NCLB), the district was required to submit a Local Education Agency Plan (LEAP) that is linked to the state adopted goals and accountability system. Our district's LEAP was approved at the June 2, 2003 Board meeting and our LEAP addendum at the July 5, 2005 Board meeting. This plan outlines how state and federally-funded initiatives are aimed at improving student achievement and work in tandem in order to have the greatest impact.

Benoit Announces Winner Of "There Ought To Be A Law" Contest

RIVERSIDE - Assemblyman John J. Benoit (R-Bermuda Dunes) today announced the winner of his first "There Ought To Be A Law" contest for high school students. The winner of the contest is R.J. Feild, a Riverside sophomore, with a proposal to mandate random drug testing for applicants of welfare benefits.

Feild has persisted in school and even serves as a student delegate to his school district despite being afflicted by spastic triplegic cerebral palsy, a condition of being born at two pounds, two ounces with traces of heroin, marijuana, methamphetamine, alcohol, and cocaine in his body. Feild, whose pregnant mother consumed illegal drugs while on state assistance, proposed "RJ's Law" to break the destructive cycle of supporting drug addicts with public assistance monies. "RJ's Law" would apply the same standard for drug screening that employees undergo in order to obtain employment, a precursor to paying taxes, to welfare recipients. In the midst of a budget crisis, RJ's law would dispense hard-earned tax dollars wisely, dollars that were earned by employees who had to undergo drug testing.

"With over 200 entries submitted by high-school students in Riverside County, we had the difficult dilemma of choosing only one entry among so many good ideas," said Benoit. "R.J.'s captivating story provided a clear reason why we need his law. This contest was rewarding for us to see how eager our high school students are to pitch their ideas. I look forward to introducing RJ's law in this legislative session."

R) Feild will receive a tour of the State Capitol, commemoration with an honorary plaque, lunch with Assemblyman Benoit, and the opportunity to formally introduce his bill on the floor of the State Assembly.

AGENDA/MEETING MATERIALS

Board agendas shall state the meeting time and place and shall briefly describe each business item to be transacted or discussed, including items to be discussed in closed session. (Government Code 54954.2)

Each Regular Meeting Agenda will include in the Communication Session an item entitled Public Verbal Comments. This item will provide an opportunity for citizens to make suggestions or identify concerns about matters affecting the school district. Topics raised under this item may, at the direction of the Board, be included as separate items in future agendas.

Any member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent with supporting documents and information, if any, at least thirteen days before the scheduled meeting date. The Superintendent or designee shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board and whether an item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session.

Any Board member may submit an item for the Board agenda any time before the agenda is posted. Items submitted less than thirteen days before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting.

Any Board action that involves borrowing \$100,000 or more shall be discussed, considered and deliberated upon as a separate item of business on the meeting agenda. (Government Code 53635.7)

All public communications with the Board are subject to requirements of relevant Board policies and administrative regulations.

Consent Items

In order to promote efficient meetings, the Board may act upon more than one item by a single vote through the use of a consent agenda. Consent items are items of a routine nature or items for which no Board discussion is anticipated and for which the Superintendent recommends approval.

Governing Board meeting agendas shall state the meeting time and place and shall briefly describe each business item to be transacted or discussed, including items to be discussed in closed session. (Government Code 54954.2)

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices) (cf. 9321- Closed Session Purposes and Agendas)

Each Regular Meeting Agenda will include in the Communication Session an item entitled Public Verbal Comments. This item will provide an opportunity for citizens to make suggestions or identify concerns about matters affecting the school district. Topics raised under this item may, at the direction of the Board, be included as separate items in future agendas.

***Note: AB 3035 (Ch. 300, Statutes of 2002) amended Government Code 54954.2 to require that the agenda include information regarding how, when and to whom a person may request a disability-related accommodation or modification in order to participate in the meeting. See BB 9320 - Meetings and Notices. ***

Note: The following paragraph should be modified to reflect district practice as to when and to whom such a request should be made.

The agenda shall specify that an individual who requires disability-related accommodations or modifications including auxiliary aids and services in order to participate in the Board meeting should contact the Superintendent or designee in writing.

Agenda Preparation

***Note: Education Code 35145.5 mandates the Board to adopt reasonable regulations which ensure that members of the public can place matters directly related to school district business on the agenda of Board meetings. ***

Note: The following section, including the timelines, should be revised to reflect district practice. Districts are free to establish their own timelines for placing an item on the agenda, taking into account staff time and resources, as long as the established timeline is a reasonable one.

The Superintendent, as Secretary to the Board, in consultation with the Board president,

shall prepare the agenda for each regular and special meeting.

(cf. 9121 - President) (cf. 9122 - Secretary)

Any member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent with supporting documents and information, if any, at least thirteen days before the scheduled meeting date. The Superintendent or designee shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board and whether an item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session.

Any Board member may submit an item for the Board agenda any time before the agenda is posted. Items submitted less than thirteen days before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting.

All such items submitted by either a Board member or member of the public shall be placed on the Board Agenda for discussion. If the Board deems that it would like to consider the item for action, it shall be placed on a future agenda as an action item.

The Board president and Superintendent shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. Items not within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board may not be placed on the agenda. In addition, the Board president and Superintendent shall determine if the item is merely a request for information or whether the issue is covered by an existing policy or administrative regulation before placing the item on the agenda.

The Board president and Superintendent shall decide whether an agenda item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session, and whether the item should be an action item, informational item or consent item.

Note: The following section, including the timelines, are CSBA suggested language, as per Government Code 54954.2.

When an item properly posted for a regular meeting is continued to a subsequent meeting, it may need not be on the agenda of the subsequent meeting if the subsequent meeting occurs within five days. The Board shall publicly identify the item before discussing it. (Government Code 54954.2)

Any Board action that involves borrowing \$100,000 or more shall be discussed, considered and deliberated upon as a separate item of business on the meeting agenda. (Government Code 53635.7)



Examples of alternative formats, also referred to as "auxiliary aids and services," are listed in 28 CFR 36.303 and include audio recordings or Braille materials.

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall make the agenda and/or agenda packet available in appropriate alternative formats to persons with a disability, as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act. (Government Code 54954.1)

***Note: Pursuant to Government Code 54954.1, as amended by SB 138 (Ch. 253, Statutes of 1997), any person may request that the district mail him/her a copy of the agenda or agenda packet. The request must be in writing and must be renewed annually.


The Superintendent or designee shall mail a copy of the agenda, or a copy of all the documents constituting the agenda packet, to any person who requests the items. The materials shall be mailed at the time the agenda is posted or upon distribution of the agenda to a majority of the Board, whichever occurs first. (Government Code 54954.1)

Any request for mailed copies of agendas or agenda packets shall be in writing and shall be valid for the calendar year in which it is filed. Written requests must be renewed following January 1 of each year. (Government Code 54954.1)

Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts that charge a fee for mailing the agenda or agenda packet pursuant to Government Code 54954.1. The fee shall not exceed the cost of providing the service.

Persons requesting mailing of the agenda or agenda packet shall pay an annual fee as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

Each Regular Meeting Agenda will include in the Communication Session an item entitled Public Verbal Comments. This item will provide an opportunity for citizens to make suggestions or identify concerns about matters affecting the school district. Topics raised under this item may, at the direction of the Board, be included as separate items in future agendas.

The agenda shall specify that an individual who requires disability-related accommodations or modifications including auxiliary aids and services in order to participate in the Board meeting should contact the Superintendent or designee in writing.

Agenda Preparation

The Superintendent, as Secretary to the Board, in consultation with the Board president, shall prepare the agenda for each regular and special meeting.

(cf. 9121 - President) (cf. 9122 - Secretary)

Any member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent with supporting documents and information, if any, at least thirteen days before the scheduled meeting date. MEETING CONDUCT

Meeting Procedures

All Governing Board meetings shall begin on time and shall be guided by an agenda prepared and delivered in advance to all Board members and to other persons upon request.

Meetings of the Board of Education shall be conducted informally, and the President is privileged to vote on every motion and may make a motion should s/he desire. With this exception, the presiding officer may invoke Robert's Rule of Order.

Voting shall be by roll call only when a dissenting vote or abstention is voiced, or when it is legally required.

The Board believes that late night meetings deter public participation, can affect the Board's decision-making ability, and can be a burden to staff. At 11:00 p.m., the Board President shall announce the time. The President will then bring forth such agenda items that need immediate attention so as to complete all necessary business before 12:00 midnight, except in urgency instances where all Board members present agree to continue the meeting. Consideration of remaining agenda items will be deferred to the next regular Board meeting, an adjourned meeting or a special meeting.

Quorum

A majority of the number of filled positions on the Board constitutes a quorum. (Education Code 5095, 35165)

Unless otherwise provided by law, affirmative votes by a majority of all the membership of the Board are required to approve any action under consideration, regardless of the number of members present. (Education Code 35164)

Abstentions

The Board believes that when no conflict of interest requires abstention, its members have a duty to vote on issues before them. When a member abstains, his/her abstention shall be considered to concur with the action taken by the majority of those who vote, whether affirmatively or negatively.

Public Participation

In order to conduct district business in an orderly and efficient manner, the Board requires that public presentations to the Board comply with the following procedures:

1. The Board shall give members of the public an opportunity to address the Board either before or during the Board's consideration of each item of



business to be discussed at regular or special meetings. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.3)

- 2. At a time so designated on the agenda, members of the public may bring before the Board, at a regular meeting, matters that are not listed on the agenda. The Board may refer such a matter to the Superintendent or designee or take it under advisement, but shall not take action at that time except as allowed by law. The matter may be placed on the agenda of a subsequent meeting for action or discussion by the Board. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.2)
- 3. Persons wishing to address the Board should complete and submit speaker request cards before the Board meeting begins.

The Board President may terminate public verbal comments when such comments become repetitious or when time is required by the Board for other business. To the extent time permits, the Board President will call on speakers who have completed cards requesting to be heard and will then determine whether to allow additional public comment time for other speakers. The President will determine when it is appropriate to defer comments about specific items on the agenda until the Board reaches those items.

Generally, speakers will be requested to limit their comments to five minutes. The Board Clerk will assist the President by monitoring each speaker's time.

- 4. A person wishing to be heard by the Board shall first be recognized by the president and shall then proceed to comment as briefly as the subject permits.
- 5. Without taking action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. Additionally, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a Board or staff member may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his/her own activities. (Government Code 54954.2)

Furthermore, the Board or a Board member may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, ask staff to report back to the Board at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action directing staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda. (Government Code 54954.2)

6. The Board president may rule on the appropriateness of a topic. If the topic would be more suitably addressed at a later time, the president may indicate the time and place when it should be presented.

The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of its policies, procedures, programs, services, acts or omissions. (Government Code 54954.3)

Whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant of the Board's Public Complaint Procedure (Policy 1801), and request that the complainant utilize the process contained therein.

7. The Board president shall not permit any disturbance or willful interruption of Board meetings. Persistent disruption by an individual or group shall be grounds for the chair to terminate the privilege of addressing the Board. The Board may remove disruptive individuals and order the room cleared if necessary; in this case, members of the media not participating in the disturbance shall be allowed to remain, and individual(s) not participating in such disturbances may be allowed to remain at the discretion of the Board. When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9)

Recording by the Public

The Superintendent or designee shall designate locations from which members of the public may broadcast, photograph or tape record open meetings without causing a distraction.

If the Board finds that noise, illumination or obstruction of view related to these activities would persistently disrupt the proceedings, these activities shall be discontinued or restricted as determined by the Board. (Government Code 54953.5, 54953.6)

Smoking Prohibited

Smoking shall not be permitted in any meeting room or on the grounds of any school or facility of the School District during Board meetings or recesses.

Public Participation

(Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.3)
- At a time so designated on the agenda, members of the public may bring before 2. the Board, at a regular meeting, matters that are not listed on the agenda. The Board may refer such a matter to the Superintendent or designee or take it under advisement, but shall not take action at that time except as allowed by law. The matter may be placed on the agenda of a subsequent meeting for action or discussion by the Board. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.2)
- Persons wishing to address the Board should complete and submit speaker request cards before the Board meeting begins. Members of the public shall not be required to place his or her name on such request.

The Board President may terminate public verbal comments when such comments become repetitious or when time is required by the Board for other business. To the extent time permits, the Board President will call on speakers who have completed cards requesting to be heard and will then determine whether to allow additional public comment time for other speakers. The President will determine when it is appropriate to defer comments about specific items on the agenda until the Board reaches those items.

Any Board Member desiring to question persons addressing the Board shall refrain from asking any questions until that person has completed his or her remarks and the Board President has called for questions or comments from the Board. Board Members may only direct questions to the public through the Board President. The Board President shall only permit those questions by Board Members that the Board President determines are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board or are relevant to the agenda matter currently being addressed or considered by the Board. Board Members are not permitted to comment about the speaker personally or attack the speaker's motives.

When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9)

Recording by the Public

The Superintendent or designee shall designate locations from which members of the public may broadcast, photograph or tape record open meetings without causing a distraction.



If the Board finds that noise, illumination or obstruction of view related to these activities would persistently disrupt the proceedings, these activities shall be discontinued or restricted as determined by the Board. (Government Code 54953.5, 54953.6)

Smoking Prohibited

Smoking shall not be permitted in any meeting room or on the grounds of any school or facility of the School District during Board meetings or recesses.

BOARD BYLAWS

SUBJECT: Meeting Conduct

Meeting Procedures

All Governing Board meetings shall begin on time and shall be guided by an agenda prepared and delivered in advance to all Board members and to other persons upon request.

Meetings of the Board of Education shall be conducted informally, and the President is privileged to vote on every motion and may make a motion should s/he desire. With this exception, the presiding officer may invoke Robert's Rules of Order.

Voting shall be by roll call only when a dissenting vote or abstention is voiced, or when it is legally required, except that the Board may display its voting electronically.

The Board believes that late night meetings deter public participation, can affect the Board's decision-making ability, and can be a burden to staff. At 11:00 p.m., the Board President shall announce the time. The President will then bring forth such agenda items that need immediate attention so as to complete all necessary business before 12:00 midnight, except in urgency instances where all Board members present agree to continue the meeting. Consideration of remaining agenda items will be deferred to the next regular Board meeting, an adjourned meeting or a special meeting.

Quorum

A majority of the number of filled positions on the Board constitutes a quorum. (Education Code 5095, 35165)

Unless otherwise provided by law, affirmative votes by a majority of all the membership of the Board are required to approve any action under consideration, regardless of the number of members present. (Education Code 35164)

Abstentions

revised:

The Board believes that when no conflict of interest requires abstention, its members have a duty to vote on issues before them. When a member abstains, his/her abstention shall be considered to concur with the action taken by the majority of those who vote, whether affirmatively or negatively.

Public Participation

In order to conduct district business in an orderly and efficient manner, the Board requires that public presentations to the Board comply with the following procedures:

- The Board shall give members of the public an opportunity to address the Board during the public comments session of the meeting or just prior to the Board's consideration of each item of business to be discussed at regular or special meetings. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.3)
- At a time so designated on the agenda, members of the public may bring before 2. the Board, at a regular meeting, matters that are not listed on the agenda. The Board may refer such a matter to the Superintendent or designee or take it under advisement, but shall not take action at that time except as allowed by law. The matter may be placed on the agenda of a subsequent meeting for action or discussion by the Board. (Education Code 35145.5, Government Code 54954.2)
- Persons wishing to address the Board should complete and submit speaker request cards before the Board meeting begins. Members of the public shall not be required to place his or her name on such request.

The Board President may terminate public verbal comments when such comments become repetitious or when time is required by the Board for other business. To the extent time permits, the Board President will call on speakers who have completed cards requesting to be heard and will then determine whether to allow additional public comment time for other speakers. The President will determine when it is appropriate to defer comments about specific items on the agenda until the Board reaches those items.

Generally, speakers will be requested to limit their comments to five minutes. The Board Clerk will assist the President by monitoring each speaker's time.

- A person wishing to be heard by the Board shall first be recognized by the president and shall then proceed to comment as briefly as the subject permits.
- Without taking action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. Additionally, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a Board or staff member may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his/her own activities. (Government Code 54954.2)

(update: Jan 08)

Furthermore, the Board or a Board member may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, ask staff to report back to the Board at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action directing staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda. (Government Code 54954.2)

Any Board Member desiring to question persons addressing the Board shall refrain from asking any questions until that person has completed his or her remarks and the Board President has called for questions or comments from the Board. Board Members may only direct questions to the public through the Board President. The Board President shall only permit those questions by Board Members that the Board President determines are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board or are relevant to the agenda matter currently being addressed or considered by the Board.

6. The Board president may rule on the appropriateness of a topic. If the topic would be more suitably addressed at a later time, the president may indicate the time and place when it should be presented.

The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of its policies, procedures, programs, services, acts or omissions. (Government Code 54954.3)

Whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant of the Board's Public Complaint Procedure (Policy 1801), and request that the complainant utilize the process contained therein.

7. The Board president shall not permit any disturbance or willful interruption of Board meetings. Persistent disruption by an individual or group shall be grounds for the ehair President to terminate the privilege of addressing the Board. The Board may remove disruptive individuals and order the room cleared if necessary; in this case, members of the media not participating in the disturbance shall be allowed to remain, and individual(s) not participating in such disturbances may be allowed to remain at the discretion of the Board. When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9)
