GATE Mission and Services




The Gifted and Talented Education Program offers differentiated instruction in the classroom to all those students who are in need of more advanced and challenging tasks, as well as a variety of extension programs at the school and district levels.

Elementary

GATE instruction occurs throughout the day.

At the elementary level, clustering is the most common model utilized in our schools. Students may be grouped in a regular grade classroom with a cluster of other gifted students with classroom instruction, assignments, and assessments that are modified to challenge and engage the gifted learner.

Secondary



At the secondary level, advanced program and course placement are encouraged options.


Honors classes are offered for Middle school students. High School students are offered Honors and AP classes and may also enter the <u>Dual or Concurrent Enrollment program</u>.

Teacher Training

3-4 professional development offerings will be available for Elementary and Secondary teachers for differentiation in the areas of depth, complexity, novelty and acceleration.



Know the facts...about your child


It is important to gather information.

- Copies of achievement test scores
- Samples of class work
- Information about your child's learning preferences and interests, strengths and weaknesses.

Know How to Communicate Effectively



Assume Positive Intentions

Enter the meeting assuming
everyone involved cares about
your child and wants to work as
a team.

Avoid using inflammatory words

"Gifted" and "Bored" can inflame the situation or shut it down completely.

Instead of: My child is bored in math class. I've noticed that Johnny is not completing his classwork and you said that he is distracted and staring out the window when you are teaching, yet I know from his math tests that he is scoring 100% on tests.



Practice Self Reflection

How might your words and actions be perceived?

Are you bringing workable solutions or are you primarily identifying problems and making demands?

Are you being appropriately assertive?

Establish a Relationship

- -Volunteer in the classroom or for field trips
- -Attend back to school nights or school events
- -Reach out with a positive aspect you have noticed about the teacher




Consider Timing


Give your child's teacher time to get to know your child. The first day of school may be too early for the teacher to adequately respond and process your requests.

Pick your Battles

Your ultimate goal may be to meet all of your child's needs but you may need to tackle one service or need at a time.

Prioritize your requests.





Know How to Encourage your Child to Self Advocate




Teach your child how to be their own best advocate.

 Can you ask your teacher to point out the 5 hardest problems that you could complete or ask for more challenging work?

Ask, Listen, Act Cycle

Ask	Listen	Act
Ask your child in an informal way about their education	Really listen.	Encourage your child to take action on one area they would like to change.
What things are you really good at?	Reassure there is no right or wrong answer.	Identify multiple solutions for the area they want to change
What do you really like about school?	Don't provide your own answer or solution.	Evaluate the choices and choose a strategy.
What do you struggle with? Why? What fructrates you about	Don't minimize their concerns.	Implement the plan.
What frustrates you about school? What needs improvement?	Ask follow up questions.	Reflect on how the plan went. Celebrate.



GATE Testing and Alternate Pathways

All 2nd grade students are tested from October through November of 2022.

The test that is used is the NNAT3.

The NNAT utilizes shapes and figures

Naglieri Nonverbal Ability Test® Third Edition


to evaluate the problem-solving and reasoning abilities of a child without relying on their language skills. In other words, the NNAT assesses how a student thinks instead of what a student knows.

The NNAT3 takes 30 minutes to complete and includes 48 questions broken down into four unique question types.


Four Subtypes of NNAT3 Questions

- Pattern completion Students must perceive a pattern within a larger design from which a section has been removed and then identify the correct missing piece (this type often resembles a jigsaw puzzle).
- Reasoning by analogy Students use visual-spatial reasoning abilities to discern logical relationships between various geometric shapes and figures (e.g., large triangle to small triangle, then large circle to small circle and so on).
- **Serial reasoning** Students must recognize sequences created by shapes and figures that change visually to form logical patterns. For example: Once a student identifies the relationship between two images shown in the top row, the same rule applies to images shown in subsequent rows.
- Spatial visualization Students must determine how two or more designs would look when they're combined (and it some cases, rotated). They may also see questions that ask what a design should look like after it's been folded, rotated or otherwise altered, like punching holes in a piece of folded-up paper and then identifying the new pattern that's visible when it's unfolded.



Topics will include some of the following:


- -What it means to be Gifted


